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## LAS VEGAS, NEVADA, WEDNESDAY, APRIL 28, 2021

[Proceeding commenced at 9:11 a.m.]

[In the presence of the jury.]

THE COURT: Thank you. Good morning, everyone.

We're on the record is C-350623, State of Nevada versus Andrew

Young. Mr. Young is present with his attorney Mr. Fischer, both deputy district attorneys, Mr. Brooks as well as Mr. Stanton are

present.

Do both parties stipulate to the presence of the jury?

MR. BROOKS: Yes, Your Honor.

MR. FISCHER: Yes, Your Honor.

Judge, I have some hearing problems. I may have an issue, I'll just let you know right now, so --

THE COURT: Okay. Yeah, no -- that's --

MR. FISCHER: I don't want a hearing set, but I may need

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it, so.

Judge.

THE COURT: Okay. Yeah, that's no problem. And I'll do my best to keep my voice up, as well, because I know it's hard with the masks as well as the plexiglas.

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MR. FISCHER: I'm a leap-reader, I think. Thank you,

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THE COURT: Okay. No problem.

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All right. So ladies and gentlemen, before we broke yesterday, I explained to you that we would need to swear you in

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for jury service. So can you please stand up and raise your right hand for my clerk, please.

#### [Jury sworn.]

THE COURT: Thank you. All right. At this point in time, is the State prepared to give their opening statement?

MR. BROOKS: Yes, Judge. I'm trying to connect as we speak.

THE COURT: Okay. Just a second.

And then Mr. O'Kelly, would you mind kind of curving that TV, in case the jurors -- so as you recognize, there's two TVs in the room. So just turn which -- to whichever one is best for you. I'm going to have this one turned a little bit more towards you guys, so you have a good view. All right?

And then the State is just making sure -- we're having a little bit of Internet difficulties. So we just have to make sure that the Internet is on point that it doesn't break up their opening statement. Just give us a second.

## [Pause in proceedings.]

THE COURT: All right. State, whenever you're ready.

#### **OPENING STATEMENT FOR THE STATE**

MR. BROOKS: This is State of Nevada versus Andrew Young. And all the events that you're going to hear about occurred doing -- during the last summer, roughly about a month or a little over a month's timeframe.

Now, one of the odd things about a trial is during the

course of this, it's not going to be presented neatly and one witness after another chronologically. And so due to scheduling, you're going to have one witness come who's going to talk about August, and then the next witness is going to be a totally unrelated event going back to June and July.

And so what this opening is is kind of a way to present it in a coherent fluid-type fashion so that you understand what's going to be presented to you. And then during closing arguments, both the State and defense will stand up here and apply those facts back to the law that Her Honor's going to give you.

So the first thing I kind of want to bring to your attention, you're going to meet nine different victims here in a bunch of different incidents. So I'm just going to kind of give you names and one characteristic about each of them.

Mary Campo, 72 years old; Lydia Hefner, 68 years old; Rhonda Kay Hatcher, 63 years old; Joanne Frank, 77; Barbara Bowen, 80; Serry Mello, 69; Montho Boone, 80; Tina Leigh, 60; and Barbara Angersbach, who's 83. And at one point or another over the next couple of days, they'll come in here and talk to you.

Now, the first event chronologically occurs on June 29, 2012. It's at the Rampart Hotel. Mary Campo's 72 years old, she's seated there playing poker. In her bag next to her is her wallet and \$14-, \$1,500 of cash.

Now, she's going to tell you, oh, I was there, and that's my machine. No evidence is going to be presented that's her

machine, it's actually a Rampart Casino machine. But that's the one she likes, so she calls that her machine. She's sitting there. And what happens is while Mary is sitting there at 11:00 p.m. on June 29th, two men enter. Notice the shoes on that man who's entering right there. That man is Andrew Young, and those shoes are a going to become relevant throughout the course of this trial.

Notice that thing in his hand, a black jacket. That is also going to be prevalent throughout the course of all these events we discuss. And that's 10:41 they enter. And then by 11:05, they have encountered Mary Campo in some sort of way. And by encountered, let's watch exactly what happens.

There's Mary seated right there. Now, the defendant and his person who's with him, they're going to walk by Mary. Watch Mr. Andrew Young's eyeline, right here.

## [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: He's looking down in the bag, saying, huh, what's in there? Is it open?

# [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: Notice her bag. The defendant goes up to it, gives a sign to his partner that he's got the wallet inside, and walks off.

40 minutes later, while Mary Campo was still at the Rampart Hotel, Mary Campbell's credit card makes a transaction at a 7-Eleven across town. The receipt is there. And Marcia Martinez, who's, essentially, the manager for that 7-Eleven, she's going to

come in here, she's going to explain to you that right there at 11:42 p.m., someone used that credit card to buy a pack of cigarettes for \$8.80. That transaction occurs right there at 11:42. Notice the shoes the defendant is wearing, the same clothing, just having left the Rampart Hotel.

The next event occurs on July 8th around 2:30 p.m. Now, that right there is Vianca. Vianca calls police due to Andrew Young's kind of a man, she says, a Black male adult, kind of suspicious behavior, it's really odd, he's following around women in the supermarket. He has a jacket and he keeps folding and unfolding on his arm, it's the middle of July. And he's kind of — she describes the word stalking, the way he's going and following different women.

So here's some of the images that, essentially, she was watching, which caused her concern, and then she calls the police.

# [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: Notice he's looking in the shopping cart, seeing if that purse is open for something easy to grab. That woman to the left side of this video, that is Lydia. She's going to come and speak to you.

Now, initially, Vianca's going to tell you that that blonde woman right there is who initially gave her concern, and that's why she called police, because that's the person who Defendant was kind of following. It's not the person who he ends up taking anything from. That is Lydia you just saw.

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#### [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: And this camera angle, watch the defendant open the glass, look inside, has a perfect opportunity to look into that shopping cart to see what's in that woman's purse, if the purse is open or not.

#### [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: And then this is Lydia Hefner, 68 years old, her wallet is inside that purse right there. And she is going to be inside that refrigerator that's open, looking for something.

Defendant walks by, reaches inside, and just continues on. Lydia finishes with what she just got, her groceries, gets her cart, and starts walking off none the wiser, thinks nothing's occurred.

Now, on this particular day in July, because Vianca had called officers, they were watching that occur live. So they're watching through the Walmart asset protection headquarters, they're watching that. And then when that occurs, they go out, they stop the defendant, Andrew Young. They give him a citation. They return the wallet, because they catch him with the wallet right in the shopping cart that he was pushing. They return it to Lydia. And they get his information, give him a court date and say, Come back at this court date. It's a citation. At that point in time, it's just petty larceny, because that's what they saw.

## [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: The upper right were the shoes he was wearing when speaking to officers that day. The other three images

are the defendant's shoes when he's arrested on the group of charges about three weeks later. Those shoes you can see in almost each and every of these video surveillance.

Now, about eight hours later, because, remember,
Defendant's released there. He's given the citation, said, you know,
come back to court in a couple of months. He walks off. But eight
hours later, that same man walks into Caesar's Palace elevator.
And in that elevator, he encounters Rhonda Kay Hatcher, who's 63
years old.

#### [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: Look right there. Takes her wallet from her purse. Wearing the same exact outfit, shoes, with his black jacket.

Two weeks later, on July 22nd, in an Albertson's, Joanne Frank, 77 years old. She's going to be right there, looking for shrimp in the frozen food section. So she's looking, looking. And these two men keep getting really close to her. She's going to tell you that it's just kind of odd, you know, this is time of COVID, you're supposed to be separated. And these two men keep getting really close.

## [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: That arrow points to Defendant's shoes and the defendant right there, he can't be seen as we start this video.

And on this one, you're going to see that the person he's with does the taking and Defendant provides, essentially, the decoy

and the shade right there, so that the victim's unsure what's going on.

#### [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: Now, when she had started looking into that freezer department, her backpack was zipped. She's going to tell you she didn't end up buying anything that day. And so once she gets out to her car, she's, like, this backpack is way too light, what's wrong? Looks inside and notices that her wallet is gone.

The following day, on July 23rd, 2020, now, these are four different counts, Counts 11, 12, 13, and 14. And here's kind of the odd dynamic, like I said about trial, so you know how there's all these different witnesses with different time period. Well, cases occur in different fashions in different time periods.

With this group of counts, what happens is the victim has her wallet taken from her at a Walmart -- this Walmart is on Boulder Highway/Nellis area -- and doesn't really realize anything has occurred initially. When she sees her wallet's missing, she goes to surveillance. Surveillance can't find anything. Essentially, a police report is done. Detectives get the case. They go and try to find surveillance. And it just occurs at a dead spot in this Walmart.

Now, this is the Boulder Highway Walmart, because that Walmart that we saw the event from that's East Serene Road.

Obviously, Defendant's not going back there. So this is a new one.

Now, what you're going to also learn, though, is because there's no video surveillance, Detective Liske, who works this group

of cases, is saying, oh, well, I've got to work backwards. So he starts tracking down some of the credit card charges, whether they actually go through or whether they don't go through. Because what you'll find in different -- some of these victims will say different time periods and different places, is almost all the credit cards are attempted to be used. But some of the detectives are more concerned of IDing that person in the elevator, you know, because they don't know eight hours earlier he was just stopped by other officers. And some of the detectives, like at Rampart, they were trying to find out who these men are on surveillance. But in this situation I'm about to talk to, detectives are working backwards and they're saying who made these attempted charges?

So Barbara Bowen, 80 years old, she goes shopping at Walmart that's located on that Boulder Highway. And at the time [indiscernible] between 1:00 and 2:00 p.m. A transaction occurs at GameStop at 2:02, and at Walgreen's at 2:20. Barbara didn't make those transactions.

So, as you can see right there, on the left side of the screen, Barbara Bowen's credit card ending in 4527 gets approved at GameStop for a vanilla Visa prepaid kind of gift card at 1402, so 2:02.

And then a little bit thereafter, around 2:20, that's attempted -- it's a voided transaction, but it's an attempted transaction at the Walgreen's. And, if you notice, also 4527, the last four digits of the credit card that was attempted at Walgreen's.

So where's the Walmart? At the bottom of your screen. So that's where Barbara Bowen was when the taking occurred. There was no surveillance there, so they go to GameStop. GameStop is where that first transaction occurs, and then Walgreen's is that second one. So look how close that is, within walking distance and roughly appropriate 10-to-15-minute walk between those transactions.

This is the GameStop video footage. Now, you'll meet Kristen Trock, she's, essentially, the manager of this location. She's going to explain to you that our video is not always synched to our receipt transaction. Some places it is, some places it isn't. You'll learn from Walgreen's that the transactions with the receipt and the video are synched.

But in both instances where we'll show you GameStop video footage, the video's 15 minutes behind the transaction.

Walgreen's happens to be right on. And the man at the stop of the screen, engaging in the GameStop transaction, is the defendant.

# [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: Detective Liske pulls that receipt. He matches that receipt with ones talking to Kristen, the timestamp of the video, and says, Okay, look, we're a little bit back. And finds this transaction that goes through for the gift card.

# [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: Because you don't have to give your name or anything, Detective Liske just doesn't know exactly who this is,

but at least now he has a suspect. Okay. So this must be who took Barbara Bowen's cards. And so he begins continuing to investigate and at this point doesn't yet know about the other cases and incidents that we've discussed.

#### [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: The transaction concludes, and this is the keyhole image, as Defendant walks out after making that transaction.

Those are screenshots of video that you'll see and notice that's that 1419, which ends up being exactly, you know, 20 – or 2:19, 2:20 of the defendant attempting to make transactions wearing those same Jordans at Walgreen's on July 23rd.

On July 29th, the defendant encounters Serry Mello.

He's 69 years old and now this is a Flamingo Hotel elevator. So different than the Caesar's, but as you can see, very similar behavior.

## [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: Defendant's jacket's in his left hand. Serry Mello's going to explain to you that he had his wallet in his left front pocket, roughly \$300 and various cards in it. And the wallet was no longer in his pocket when he gets to his room.

Another thing that, you know, most people don't realize, but you'll come to learn, is that as you've seen, we've seen events in Boulder Highway and Nellis, we've seen events on the Strip, and then events at Rampart. Well, detectives are separated and so are

police forces into different area commands. So it's not as though the detective who gets this case from the Flamingo Hotel is also the same one who had the Rampart and/or the one in Boulder Highway.

Now, the Flamingo and the Caesar's detective both work the Strip corridor, so they would be able to see and speak to each other, and Detective Cipriano, who has this case, and Detective Jacobitz who has the Caesar's case, they would share notes and say, Hey, I have that exact fact pattern and the guy looks the exact same.

On August 1st, 2020, you get a similar situation to the one that we went over where it's the Walmart, then the GameStop, and then the Walgreen's. This is Montho Boone, 80 years old. Again, she goes shopping at the Walmart located at 5198 Boulder Highway, around 1:00 p.m. Video surveillance doesn't show the pick and the taking, so nothing, really, for Detective Liske to go off. So he works backwards. He finds a GameStop receipt for 1:32, and a Walgreen's attempted transaction at 1:47.

You'll notice there, Montho Boone with the last four of 3609 on a Visa card in a transaction at GameStop, also the 3609 on the transaction from Walgreen's. That photo up at the top right is your Walgreen's photo. You'll have the video and we'll go through it. We'll actually go through it to the point where you'll see the defendant insert the chip, as you see how it says Integrated Chip Card, Card Swipe. You'll be able to see, oh, there it is. He put the chip in, didn't work, swiped, didn't work, swipe. So we'll go

through that with the video.

And then this was the GameStop. After that transaction, this is August 1st, I know it's going to look exactly like July 23rd. But different date and he walks out. Notice the timestamp again, 15 minutes delayed on the video from the receipt at the GameStop.

August 7th, 2020, this is that same Walmart, 5198 Boulder Highway. But this time tina Leigh, who's 60 years old, can be seen on video surveillance. That's Tina right there, she just moved to town. She's getting some cleaning supplies.

#### [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: Defendant walks up, his jacket's in his right hand, someone's talking to Tina, and right there, Defendant reaches into her shopping cart, spin move, and we're done.

#### [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: The last event you'll hear about is

August 9th. August 9th at the real end of the day into the early
morning hours of August 10th. So, essentially, both of those dates
will be said occasionally. Barbara Angersbach, 83 years old, she is
seated right there playing video poker at Suncoast. Notice the tall
man to the right and the defendant to the left. The tall man starts
speaking to her. Notice where her bag is.

# [Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: While here attention is kind of diverted,
Defendant starts reaching into that bag. Watch his left pocket now
as he gets what he's reaching in for. She's going to tell you her

wallet was taken.

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[Video played.]

MR. BROOKS: And right here, he's completed it.

And as I said, detectives, because they're set up on different area commands, they don't always speak. But when enough cases start trickling in, and they start being at different points -- because now we're -- think about it, the first event you're going to hear about Rampart, the last event you're going to hear about is Suncoast. Now we're back in Summerlin a second time. You saw those ones in Boulder Highway and Nellis and then the Strip.

All of a sudden, detectives who used to be at a different area command are talking and four to five identifications are made. They have the video footage from July 8th, when Defendant was actually spoken and talked to those officers and put it all together, Defendant's arrested and here we are.

The end of this trial, the State's going to stand before you and explain kind of that conduct with the charges and the law that Her Honor will apply, we'll ask you to find the defendant guilty on all counts. Thank you.

MR. FISCHER: I can't rearrange anything here, Judge, is that right? Is my spot here?

THE COURT: Yeah, of course.

MR. FISCHER: I like to have a spot for my things. And the ELMO is on. Fogging up here. All right.

#### **OPENING STATEMENT FOR THE DEFENDANT**

MR. FISCHER: All right. Good morning.

Ladies and gentlemen, you're here today to decide whether or not Andrew Young, who's seated here, is responsible for the crimes the State is alleging he committed.

Let me talk to you a little bit about the evidence that you're going to see and the State's given you a preview.

Understand that we're talking about theories. Just because the State is presenting one theory doesn't mean there aren't other possibilities. So keep an open mind to the evidence that will be presented. And understand that you should look at it very closely and don't make any assumptions or jump to conclusions.

But the main event I want you to focus on is July 8th of 2020. That's day one. And why is the day one -- that's day one, so first time that law enforcement -- or the only time that law enforcement makes contact with Mr. Young. And that's also something that happens in the context of -- ELMO's on. Reduce this a little bit. A misdemeanor trespass warning occurring at the 2310 East Serene Avenue Walmart. And then it references if you see a citation number, 1211422.

He is also cited on that same day for petty larceny. And you'll notice the officer, who you should be hearing from, Officer Wheeler, is the signing officer. And let me go back to the original warning, the trespass notice. You'll see Officer Cunningham's signature. So these are the two officers who make contact in

addition to one -- Ms. Eskildsen, with Walmart Asset Protection.

And there is a -- there is going to be some testimony from her. So pay really close attention to that.

But, ultimately, that's the contact that's made. Okay?

Mr. Young makes contact with law enforcement on July 8th. He's cited for misdemeanor. He's let go, carries on.

What happens next is something that he couldn't have anticipated. Okay. Now, you hear the State talking about a lot about certain identifying features, right? We have two Black men, they say. Right, they're saying look at some of the characteristics. Yes, do that. I want you to do that very closely. I want you to consider the source of the information that's being presented.

We talked a little bit about law enforcement and the credibility of the law enforcement versus a regular lay witness. Give that consideration, does law enforcement get things wrong? Do they make mistakes? Do they have pressures? Do they have to move cases? Meaning do they have to conclude cases? You have a series of pickpocket-type thefts that were occurring in the valley. Very convenient to sort of solve those with the generic description of two Black men, and there's maybe some other minor descriptors. And there we go, we can solve a series of these and we can move on, wrap it up in a bow. Okay.

How much direct evidence do we have? We have one incident involving Office Cunningham and Officer Wheeler. Have the interaction with Mr. Young over a misdemeanor citation. From

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there, it's a separate detective, Jacobitz, Byrd, you'll hear from them, who make connections based on videos and based on communications internally with Metro.

Later, the district attorneys office gets involved. Jointly, they decide this is Mr. Young and he should be responsible for all the counts he faces here today. When, in fact, all he's responsible for is a misdemeanor theft for that July 8th incident. So when the evidence has been concluded, ladies and gentlemen, that's what you'll determine, that he is responsible for one count of petty larceny at best.

Thank you very much.

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Fischer.

State, first witness.

MR. STANTON: Mary Campo.

#### MARY CAMPO,

[having been called as a witness and first duly sworn, testified as follows:]

THE CLERK: Please be seated. Will you please state your name and spell it for the record.

THE WITNESS: My name is Mary Campo, M-A-R-Y, C-A-M-P-O.

THE CLERK: Thank you.

THE COURT: Good morning, Ms. Campo.

THE WITNESS: Good morning.

THE COURT: So a couple of things I just wanted to go

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over before we get started. Because of the masks and because of the plexiglas that's in front of us, sometimes it can be difficult for my jurors or some of the individuals in the back of the room to hear what you and I are saying. So that black thing right in front of you, that's red -- it's a microphone.

THE WITNESS: Okay.

THE COURT: You don't need to bend over to speak into it, but if you could get as close as you could, and then just keep your voice up as loud as possible and the microphone will pick you up.

And I know it's hard and I'll remind you throughout. Okay?

THE WITNESS: Okay.

THE COURT: Thank you. I appreciate that.

Mr. Stanton.

MR. STANTON: Thank you, Your Honor.

#### **DIRECT EXAMINATION**

Q Well, you know, we want to keep it a little bit focused and I don't want a confused either.

## A I'm --

O I'm just trying to get to the -- if you're telling me, to the best of your recollection, what you're given as testimony, that's what you can recall, and, you know, we can leave it at that now. I'm not trying to have you remember something that you don't. I don't want you making anything up here, so.

A Okay.

Q So is the answer still the focus was on the black sweater and the wallet disappearing, correct?

A Well, let me go back just a little bit. I was very uneasy in the store. It was not a good neighborhood. I was stuck in that neighborhood because my house wasn't ready and I had my dogs and my cats with me in this hotel. And I just had walked to the store, I wasn't comfortable, it was close. And I really was very aware that I was not in the best neighborhood.

And I had my purse strapped into the cart. And, I mean, I was very wary going in there. And so it's almost like my senses were hyper-alert. And I remember just, like, being hyper-alert, I guess. And I went in there and as soon as I -- as soon as he asked me that question, I was already aware that someone was coming in

## **FURTHER EXAMINATION**

BY MR. BROOKS:

Q Tina, if I represented to you that the video is in real time, would maybe the experience or -- and the feelings that you felt at the time change, essentially, how you perceived it as opposed to kind of what we just watched, which was real time; could that be?

- A I'm sorry, I don't understand the question.
- Q Is it fair to say sometimes people remember experiences fast and jumbled, and then when we're all sitting here watching a video, it seems slower than you remembered it?
  - A Yes.
  - Q Okay.

MR. BROOKS: Nothing further, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Anything based on that?

MR. FISCHER: No, Your Honor. Thank you.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you so much. Please don't share your testimony with anyone else involved in the trial. But you are excused and free to leave.

THE WITNESS: Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you.

All right. Ladies and gentlemen, we are going to take our lunch recess at this time.

During the recess you must not discuss or communicate with anyone, including fellow jurors, in any way regarding the case or its merits either by voice, phone, e-mail, text, Internet, or other

A I'm now Convention Center Area Command, which encompasses the Las Vegas Strip.

Q So if you could, just for us, can you break down the different area commands for patrol and then the different divisions and area commands for detective bureaus?

A I think what you're asking is -- so we work specific areas. Those areas encompass different area commands, which could be on the opposite side of the valley. Like I said, I specifically work the Strip. We have several detectives and each detective is assigned to either -- is assigned to a specific sector beat, which encompasses specific casinos. There's a lot of work to do down there, so that's why we handle it the way we handle it.

Q So, for example, tell me how the city is broken up into areas with Metro.

A Well, it's broken up into -- they'll give it a -- an initial -- a letter with each area and then a number on top of that to designate specific areas within specific area commands. We have the Mary -- mostly the Mary Sector Beats, Mary 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5. And that is where I work.

Q Now, what is -- a detective who, essentially, works out in, let's say, Summerlin, what area command would he deal with?

A They have -- so they're in the northwest area commands.

They have the new ones, which are the Summerlin Area

Commands. There's several of them up that way. And they all have their own designators as well.

police station or coming in face-to-face contact with the detective?

A So you can get online, anybody can get online and submit a non-violent report. That's just by pulling up the website and completing a report. So as long as you don't have a suspect name or anything crazy, we can look into it from online. Otherwise, we would typically come out and either have a patrol officer take a report or we'll make a visit. There's several ways to do it. But that's fairly new to us.

- Q If a victim were from out of state -- and because you deal with the Strip, I'm assuming that some people are out of state; is that fair?
  - A Yes.
- Q If a victim were out of state, how is the most common way that they would do one of those reports?
  - A Likely an online report.
- O Now, what are some things that you don't like about online reports because of what happens with your end?
- A Online reports take a while to get to an assigned detective. They're typically sitting in queues and ditched off from one area command to another before they find their correct home. So it could take some time. I typically like to jump on things and at least get a review in before -- at the earliest possible convenience. But it's just the way it works with them.
- Q The incident that brings us here to court today, when Rhonda Hatcher submits this online report, did you ever get to meet

A So based upon my training and experience, a distract is -it's more -- it's something where team comes in and they have a set
target, likely someone that they've been casing in the -- in this case,
down in the casino. They follow them into the -- where -- into a
corner or into an area and they work together as smoothly as they
can. These guys -- he's smooth, this guy's smooth. And they take
the other person's belongings without them knowing, in most
cases.

MR. FISCHER: Judge, I object to the commentary. As to

who is he smooth?

THE COURT: Okay. So your objection is to you don't know which one he's talking about?

MR. FISCHER: Yes, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay. Can you clarify he, which one were you discussing?

THE WITNESS: Yes, ma'am. I actually, in my personal opinion, I'm watching Andrew Young in this video, and I completely believe he's smooth at this. He's been doing this for a long time. He's good.

## BY MR. BROOKS:

- Q Yeah, but you -- well, you have no information he's been doing this a long time.
  - A Right.
  - Q Your opinion on that is just that he's smooth, correct?
  - A Right.
- Q Okay. Now, is there something about this video and the entirety of the elevator ride that makes you think that it's a team?
  - A Yes. So --
- Q What is is about the ending of this elevator ride that makes you think it's a team?
- A So what comes to mine and it's a concern of mine, is that it doesn't appear that they have any sort of business in the elevator. They've not going to a room. I later come to find that they're not registered to the hotel. They follow the victims up to their

particular floor, they become involved in the distract theft. They handle the distract theft. They get what they want. They leave, they go back down to the casino floor and leave the casino. There is no purpose for them to be in that elevator.

Q So it was the round-trip ride, essentially, now that we're back at the casino and one --

A Correct, Correct,

MR. FISCHER: Judge, I object to the extent that it was a narrative, and I got -- quite frankly, I got lost. And then there was some reference, I believe a hearsay reference I'll make an objection to as to whether somebody was checked into a room.

THE COURT: So I'm going to overrule in regards to narrative. Mr. Brooks, your response into the information regards to the room.

MR. BROOKS: Sure. I'll ask it. I'll ask that question.

THE COURT: Are you going to lay foundation or --

25	Q	Mr. Mello, when you watch that video, have you seen this

because there was suspicious activity on my debit card.

- Q And, obviously, after hearing that, you had some concerns about kind of those accounts?
- A Yes. First thing -- that's when I first noticed I didn't have my wallet, of course, because -- and I told them that it was fraudulent activity. And so after they -- we went through the process of putting a stop on the -- I'm sorry, they actually went through the process of telling me what activity, what was being on my card.
  - Q To kind of confirm with you --
  - A Yeah.
  - Q -- whether or not these were --
- A Yeah.
  - O -- proved or non-authorized transactions.
  - A Right. They went through a list of transactions.
  - Q And do you recall any of those, as you sit here today?
- A Yes. The first transaction was a taxi fare. And then the next four was with Target, where Target had processed one and they denied the other three.
- O Okay. Let me go back to the taxicab. Do you recall what the dollar amount of that cab fare was?
- A Approximately \$18 and change. I can't remember the change.
- Q Okay. Your memory's very good. Would the amount 18.75 be consistent with what -- or close to what you recall?

A Yes.

Q And how about the approved transaction at Target; do you remember the dollar amount of that?

A My best recollection on the one that got accepted was \$412. And then there were three on the high amounts, I can't tell you the amounts on those.

- O They were all high-dollar --
- A I think they were -- yeah.
- Q And they were all declined, as your financial institution told you?
  - A They told me it was declined, those three.
- Q Okay. 18	July 29t	h, 2020, that brings us here to court today?
19	A	Yes, I do.
20	Q	Tell me just briefly, I guess, how you got involved initially
21	with this	s incident; how did it get assigned to you?
22	A	It was a patrol officer took a report from a larceny from
23	a persor	n, and it was generated from the Flamingo Hotel. And it
24	was ger	erated to my to me to investigate the case.
25	Q	So what was would be your first steps with the

the hotel. Briefly stated that possibly he thought -- he felt uncomfortable on the -- in the elevator and it possibly could have been an issue in the elevator. That's when I went back through video surveillance and went through that.

- O Are you also given information from that victim about possibly fraudulent charges that he was notified about?
  - A Yes, I was.
  - One of which was -- do you recall what they were?
- A Yeah. There was -- I believe there was two of them. One was for a cab ride and one was at a store, a charge -- a multiple charges at stores, attempts or charges.
- O The cab ride, what did you do, if anything, to try to follow up on that?
- A I followed up a cab company to try to obtain video from the gentleman getting into the cab. I had video surveillance from the hotel, the cab number and the company. But, unfortunately, cab companies only carry, like, 24 hours. If I can't get within 24 hours of that, the video's gone.
  - Q So you did try to go to the cab company?
  - A Yes.
  - Q The video was gone?
  - A Yes.
- Q What were you just referring to, though, with regard to you had a cab number?
  - A I have a video picture from the -- on the video surveillance
