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it says a splatter frame, \$160, and oak aridium. That just

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means it's got like a reflective mirror or type lens to it.

Q And do both of those slips refer to the same transaction for the same two pair — for two pair of sunglasses?

- A Yes.
- Q Do you recall that particular transaction?
- A Yes, I do.
  - Q Did it occur on February the 19th, 1992?
  - A Yes, I believe so.
  - Q Tell us what you can remember about 1t.

Paragraph six, in the event Diana Lee Hunt testifies falsely under both or knowingly misrepresents material facts under outh, this agreement will be null and void and Diana Lee Hunt Will be subject to further prosecution.

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Does that mean that you could be charged for these murders again?

A That's -- yeah.

And the next sentence, if, in the reasonable opinion of the Clark County District Attorney's Office or his deputy assigned to the case, any part of this agreement is breached by Diana Lee Hunt, this agreement shall immediately be withdrawn and declared null and void.

## Is that correct?

g If this agreement by virtue of a violation set forth above is deemed null and void, such declaration may result in the State taking any action against Diana Lee Hunt which otherwise would have been available to it, including, but not limited to, withdrawing from this agreement, proceeding with the original criminal charges pertaining to the subject matter of this agreement and filing charges of perjury.
