Or are you saying, I can't pay my bills, I run the risk of being thrown out on the street, having my phone -- PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 053: I don't know if it's going to get that extreme.

MR. BROWN: Okay.

THE COURT: All right. We are on the record. The jurors are being brought upstairs and gathered to go ahead

and come in for our jury selection. We have pulled 75 potential jurors for this trial.

What we're going to do is, we ultimately want to

seat 14 jurors to have two alternates for the week. We do not select our alternates -- I don't know if I've told you this already. We don't select our alternates until the end of the trial, and we do it randomly with the bingo balls at that point. So we'll be selecting 14.

You each have, I believe, nine peremptories on So we will be qualifying 32 jurors for cause and this case. then you'll do your peremptories on a piece of paper that you'll pass back and forth at the end.

So when we seat the folks, we're going to, I guess I'll be asking some questions that, the general questions that I will ask of the entire group. And then I'll start going through one by one and asking each juror some questions, and followed by each of you having the opportunity to question each of those potential jurors. And you'll either pass each for cause, or you'll let me know if there's a challenge and we can take up those matters at the bench.

Our bench conferences are on the record, just so

you know that. We'll put on the white noise so others can't hear, but it will be on the record.

So, what we've tried to do, we've got not only the rows of people inside the jury box, but we've got a front row here and some here behind you, and I think still the first three in the first row will be among that -- the 32 group that we'll be focusing on, although obviously, as people are excused for cause, we'll bring up, then, other jurors in order to replace any that are excused at that particular time.

During the course of the jury selection, early on when I have you introduce yourselves and any witnesses, you obviously don't need to disclose what witnesses you wish to call. That will be your call at that point.

But I'm going to need you to give a brief description of the nature of the case so I can ask them if there's anything about the nature of the case that would be a problem for them in hearing the case. I expect it to be a very brief, neutral description of this is what the case is about rather than an opening statement or a closing argument. So, try to keep it brief at that point.

Anything else I need to mention. Obviously, among my questions to them will be if they, you know, have heard anything about this case or know anything about it and we'll follow up on that if they think that they have.

Any questions about that process? We're going to

have a pretty full courtroom, bringing 75 in here, so.

MS. LUZAICH: Judge, one thing that we have agreed on, if it's okay with the Court, we've discussed prior to coming in and the defense had discussed with their client, we would like to -- if there's a first degree murder conviction, we would like to waive jury sentencing and have the Court sentence.

THE COURT: Oh.

MS. LUZAICH: I believe that will speed things up, for one, but it will also speed up jury selection because we don't have to ask them about that.

THE COURT: Ah, okay. Yeah, that is new because I was anticipating --

MR. BROWN: And Your Honor will not have to voir dire the panel on the penalty issues either, if that was in your notes.

THE COURT: Yes, and I had some research going on about the penalty phase, so I can stop that.

MS. LUZAICH: I figured that would cut quite a bit of time off the trial and that would make everybody a little more comfortable.

THE COURT: Right. We'll just focus on the guilt phase. Okay. And so -- and the defense agrees to do it as well?

Now, I know there is a lot of folks in here and especially those of you that I can't even hardly see back in the corner, it may be a little hard for you to pay attention during the course of the process, but I'm going to ask you to do that. of the case and you're going to be asked questions about that after that happens. So I need you all to pay attention to what's going on and what's being said.

Ms. Luzaich or co-counsel, please introduce yourself, tell the prospective jurors the names of the witnesses that you intend to call and a very brief description of the nature of the case.

MS. LUZAICH: Thank you. Good morning, Ladies and Gentlemen. My name is Lisa Luzaich. With me is Josh Tomshack. We represent the State of Nevada.

Over the next week, we are going to be presenting to you evidence of a murder that occurred back in early June of 2000. You're going to hear about Gyaltso Lungtok, a gentleman from Tibet, so if I brutalize his name, I apologize, who was found dead in his apartment on June 10th of 2000 by his friend.

You're going to hear from friends and neighbors of the victim. You're going to hear from a bunch of police officers from the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. You're going to hear about a trip to Chicago. You're going to hear about friends of the defendant's as well. The defendant, Justin Porter, was ultimately charged in this case with burglary with a weapon, murder with use of a deadly weapon and attempt robbery with the use of a deadly weapon.

I'm going to read a bunch of names to you. I

promise I am not going to call all of the names that I'm going to read, but if you don't hear from these people particularly, you're going to hear about them. And we basically want to know, do you know any of the people involved in the case because that way you could know something about the case and you're not suppose to do that.

So over the course of the next week, you're going to hear from or about a bunch of officers from the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. And in no particular order, Officer Mark Misuraca, Detective Barry Jensen, Detective Thomas Thowsen, Detective Teresa Kyger, Detective Michael Thompson, Detective Ken Hefner, Detective James LaRochelle, Detective Laura Anderson, Detective Michael Casteneda, Detective Deborah Love.

You're going to hear from and about some people from the Crime Lab at Metro as well. Excuse me, David Welch, Joel Geller, Richard Good.

You're going to hear from some crime scene analysts from Metro; David Lamaster, Jeff Smink, Maria Thomas who is now Maria Lopez, Gary Reed.

You're going to hear from or about some detectives from the Chicago Police Department; Sam Cirone, Kriston Kato and Ed Cunningham.

You're going to hear from and about some medical examiners at the Clark County Coroner's office; Alane Olson

and Sheldon Green.

And then you're going to hear from some people who have no affiliation whatsoever with any police department. As I indicated, Gyaltso Lungtok is the victim in this case and then you'll hear from or about Jay Cleveland, Derrick Sterling, Alemayehu Awalom, who also goes by Al, Nan Winters, Angela Smith-Porter, George Porter, Dina Regalado-Ordonez, Rebeca Regalado-Gonzalez, Kristopher Deloney, Maria Schwinof, Chanel or Nel Matthews, Kurtis Richards and Antwoyne Wilson. Thank you.

TOMSHECK: Anything about the fact that you 7 dealt with the cops before and haven't been in a good mood 8 when you did, that would it impact your ability to be fair and 9 impartial here? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 096: No, I don't think so. 11 MR. TOMSHECK: When the police come in and 12 testify, and Ms. Luzaich told you we're going to hear from some police in this trial, you'll listen to their testimony 13 14 and evaluate it like everybody else's? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 096: Yeah. 16 MR. TOMSHECK: Okay. You said you've been here 17 in Clark County for two years; is that right? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 096: Yeah, correct. 18 19 MR. TOMSHECK: And where did you come from? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 096: Florida. 20 21 MR. TOMSHECK: I imagine it was the good job 22 market which brought you to Vegas, huh? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 096: Correct. 24 MR. TOMSHECK: Okay. ABOOD: Thank you, Your Honor. 4 5 THE COURT: Go ahead. 6 MR. ABOOD: Mr. Anderson? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 096: 8 MR. ABOOD: Okay. Sir, let me get straight to 9 the point. You're going to try to.
