She seemed to be — she had a prior history as a domestic violence victim, but we did strike her because she's a retired teacher. That was the same reason why we struck Ms. Hopkins and that concern is even more salient with her because she's dealing with high risk, and she's doing a special project for that, so it indicates she has some special passion for that, and in her line of work we just think she's going to be more predisposed to look to —

MR. BURNS: Well, it's one of the main — it's the main reason that we struck these two jurors, No. 11 and No. 17.

MR. BURNS: Okay. And in that process that person was intruding into the home, and according to the juror, being killed and his view is that — is that was a legitimate use of — that he was killed based on like self defense or something, so it kind of mirrors this situation as well. So our concern with him is that that incident is so fresh that he's going to be more predisposed to empathize with the Defendant's situation because the Defendant — our theory of the case, the evidence will be, that he intruded like this person into his estranged wife's house and the Defendant is going to claim that, you know, it was self defense and that there were multiple people in the house and the victim in this case took the weapon against him.

Just there's such an uncanny parallel and because of his emotional connection to his best friend that we just

wanted -- that's the reason we excluded him. It has nothing 1 to do with him being of a different race. 2 Okay. That's all of two. THE COURT: 3 MR. Myself, the parties, the attorneys, the staff in Department 12, with the exception of the court marshal, are not permitted to have any communication with you whatsoever outside of the courtroom. That means that if we see you in the hallway, the elevator, coming in and out of the

courthouse, we're not going to talk to you, okay? We won't even acknowledge you or say hello.

please do not be offended by this. Again we are all just maintaining our ethical obligation to maintain the integrity of the jury system. So if there is something you need to communicate to the Court, you do so inside the courtroom in the presence of both sides. It is your primary responsibility as jurors to find and determine the facts. Under our system of criminal procedure, you are the sole judge of the facts.

charging document by proof beyond a reasonable doubt.

You are to determine the facts and the testimony you hear and the other evidence, including exhibits introduced in Court. It is up to you to determine the inferences which you feel may be properly drawn from the evidence. The parties may sometimes present objections to some of the testimony or other evidence.

It is the duty of a lawyer to object to evidence which he or she believes may not properly be offered and you should not be prejudiced in any way against a lawyer who makes objections on behalf of the party he or she represents. times I may sustain objections or direct that you disregard

certain testimony or exhibits. You must not consider any evidence to which an objection has been sustained and in which I have instructed you to disregard.

Anything you may have seen or heard outside the courtroom is not evidence and must also be disregarded. Remember, statements, arguments, and opinions of counsel are not evidence in the case. However, if the attorneys stipulate as to the existence of a fact, you must accept the stipulation as evidence and regard that fact as proved.

You must not speculate to be true any insinuations suggested by a question asked the witness. A question is not evidence and it may be considered only as it supplies meaning to the answer. You must not be influenced in any degree by any personal feeling or sympathy for or prejudice against the State or the Defendant. Both sides are entitled to the same fair and impartial consideration.

In considering the weight and value of the testimony of any witness you may take into consideration the appearance, attitude and behavior of the witness, the interest of the witness in the outcome of the case, if any. The relation of the witness to the defendant or the State, the inclination of the witness to speak truthfully or not and the probability or improbability of the witnesses' statements and all the facts and circumstances in evidence.

Thus, you may give the testimony of any witness just

such weight and value as you believe the testimony of that witness is entitled to receive. There are two kinds of evidence: Direct and circumstantial. Direct evidence is testimony by a witness about what that witness personally saw or heard or did.

2.

Circumstantial evidence is testimony or exhibits which are proof of a particular fact from which, if proven, you may infer the existence of a second fact. You may consider both direct and circumstantial evidence in deciding this case. The law permits you to give equal weight to both, but it is for you to decide how much weight to give to any evidence.

Opening statements and closing arguments of the attorneys are intended to help you in understanding evidence and applying the law, but they are not evidence. No statement, ruling, remark or comment which I make during the course of this trial is intended to indicate my opinion as to how you should decide this case or to influence you in any way in your determination of the facts.

At times, I may even ask questions of the witnesses. If I do so, it's for the purpose of bringing out matters I feel should be brought out and not in any way to indicate my opinion about the facts or indicate the weight I feel you should give the testimony of that particular witness. I may also find it necessary to admonish the attorneys, and if I do,

you should not so prejudice against a lawyer or his or her client because I found it necessary to admonish him or her.

Until this case is submitted to you, you must not discuss it with anyone, even with your fellow jurors. After it is submitted to you, you must discuss it only in the jury room with your fellow jurors. It is important you keep an open mind and not decide any issue in the case until the entire case has been submitted to you under instructions from the Court.

The trial will proceed in the following manner. The Deputy DA will make an opening statement, which is an outline to help you understand what the State expects to prove in their case in chief. Next, the Defense attorney may, but does not have to make an opening statement. Opening statements serve as an introduction of the evidence which the party making the statement intends to prove.

The State will then present its evidence and counsel for the Defense may cross-examine the witnesses. Following the State's case, the Defendant may present evidence and the Deputy District Attorney may cross-examine the witnesses; however as I said, the Defendant is not obligated to present any evidence.

After all the evidence has been presented, I will instruct you on the law. After the instructions on the law have been read to you, each side has the opportunity to

present closing arguments. What is said in closing argument is not evidence. Their arguments are designed to summarize and interpret the evidence.

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Defendant guilty by proof beyond a reasonable doubt, the State has the right to open and close the arguments. After the arguments have been completed, you will then retire to deliberate upon your verdict. Again we remind you that until this case is submitted to you, do not talk to each other about it or about anyone that has anything to do with it until the end of the case when you go to the jury room to decide upon your verdict.

Do not talk with anyone else about this case or about anyone that has anything to do with it until the trial has ended and you've been discharged as jurors. Anyone else includes members of your family and your friends. Do not let anyone talk to you about the case or about anyone that has anything to do with it. If someone should try to talk to you, please report it to me immediately by informing the court marshal. Do not read any news stories or articles or listen to any radio or television reports about the case or about anyone who has anything to do with it.

As members of the jury, you will be given the opportunity to ask questions of any of the witnesses who are called to testify in this case. You are not encouraged to ask large numbers of questions because that is the primary responsibility of counsel. Questions may be asked but only in the following manner: After both lawyers have finished questioning the witness and only at this time.

ask that witness, you may then seek permission from the Court to ask that witness a written question. If you do want to ask a written question, write your question down with your juror number on a full sheet of clean paper and raise your hand. All questions from jurors must be factual in nature and designed to clarify information already presented.

In addition, jurors must not place undue weight on the responses to their questions. The court marshal will pick your question up and present it to the Court. All questions must be directed to the witness and not to the lawyers or to myself. After consulting with the lawyers, I will then determine if your question is legally proper.

If I determine that your question may be properly asked, I will ask the witness your question. No adverse inference should be drawn if the Court does not allow a particular question.

OPENING STATEMENT

MS. BOTELHO: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen of the jury. The fact that Aneka Grimes was alive on July 22nd, 2011 at approximately 7:04 p.m. is nothing short of a miracle. At that time, Aneka was pressed against her mother's chest, bleeding from several parts of her body. Her mother was desperately trying to use a towel to stop the bleeding from what she -- what appeared to be the most serious wounds that Aneka had, primarily on her head and on her neck.

Let's rewind 20 to 30 minutes before. That's Aneka Grimes. Twenty to 30 minutes before that incident, Aneka and

her mother were returning to Aneka's apartment located at 9325 West Desert Inn Road, Apartment Number 174. They had just gone car shopping; Aneka had just gotten a brand new car. Return to this apartment, Aneka entered first, her mother followed. As the door — as her mom had already gotten into the apartment and was about to shut the door behind her, she noticed the defendant coming up towards her.

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The defendant — she tried to shut the door, called for Aneka, Aneka ran over. And as the defendant pushed the door from the outside, Aneka and her mother tried to use their combined strength to keep the door shut. They lost. He was too strong and he was able to bust through this door. Inside of Aneka's apartment the defendant made his way to the entryway right here. Aneka backed up, kind of towards that counter area in her apartment. Her mother stayed kind of between the two of them in this particular area. They tried to get the defendant to leave. They both pleaded with him, get out of here Bennett, get out of here, you're not supposed to be here.

Why wasn't he supposed to be here? Well, Aneka had gotten a temporary protective order that banned the defendant from being in that apartment or anywhere near Aneka. They told him to leave, he refused. So Aneka's mom, Stephanie, called Aneka's father, told him what was going on. Mr. Newman, Aneka's father, in turn called the Las Vegas Police.

His 9-1-1 call set the next set of events, miraculous events, into motion.

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was actually in the problem-solving unit that particular day, July 22nd, 2011. She was in plainclothes, meaning she was not in a uniform. She was in an armed — unmarked police car. Something made her pay attention to that call triggered by Mr. Newman's 9-1-1 call. It came through dispatch and as Officer Tavarez kind of looked around, she realized I just passed that apartment complex, I'll just stop by. She makes a U-turn, tries to locate the subject apartment, apartment number 173 and she parks her vehicle right there. She's sitting in her car waiting for backup to arrive, she has the window slightly rolled down and what does she hear? She hears yelling coming from apartment number 173. It sounds like an argument, a loud argument. She waits for backup, she updates dispatch and she tells fellow officers how to get to her location.

What's going on inside the apartment? Well, by this point there's arguing in the apartment and it will not leave — the defendant will not leave. Aneka and her mother are still telling him just get out of here, we'll talk to you outside, but please leave. The defendant is pleading with Aneka and her mother, let me stay, I need to talk to you, take me back, please let me back into this apartment, take me back, take me back. He's not taking no for an answer.

Aneka at some point kind of moves towards the middle of this bar area. There's still an argument, that same argument being heard by Officer Tavarez. At some point, because they can't get the defendant to leave, 9-1-1 calls Stephanie Newman, Aneka's mom, asking what's going on, okay, we'll send officers. At this point this was not a priority call because there had been no physical contact. This was, you know, an argument. What's going on Mrs. Newman? Oh, yes, he won't leave, we'll send officers. Aneka upset that now the defendant hasn't left also calls 9-1-1, so there are two calls that you're going to hear. The 9-1-1 call placed by Aneka and also the 9-1-1 call recorded after dispatch called Mrs. Newman, her mother.

So what's going on on the police side? Well, that patio that you see right here is the patio to apartment number 173. Officer Tavarez is joined by two other officers, Officer Hoffman and Officer Gallup. Sorry, I don't have a picture of Officer Gallup. They meet in this small little cement walkway right outside of apartment number 173. They hear the argument. They're just, you know, hi, hey, what's going on, this is what we're going to do. They're not there for very long before they're met by Stephanie Newman, Aneka's mother, right at that balcony. She's like hey, I'm the one who called the police, one of you watch the balcony, you know, and the other try to make contact at the front door. Because

remember, the defendant's right against that front door from the inside.

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Stephanie's out there. What's going on inside the apartment as Stephanie is talking to the police? I'll tell you. Aneka's right here kind of towards — between the two chairs on that balcony and the defendant is not getting what she's saying, get out of here, I don't want to be with you anymore, it's over. At one point, without any kind of warning, the defendant says okay. And before it can register to Aneka what he's doing, the defendant is already in front of her in this balcony — inside this bar area and he reaches — you can't really see it from this angle, I have a different picture but there's a dish rack located right next to the sink on the opposite end of that bar. He reaches into that dish racks and pulls out a steak knife. He grabs Aneka, brings her towards the front door and repeatedly stabs her as he holds her close to him.

There's Aneka's flip-flops. Those are the flip-flops that she will tell you she was wearing that day when she came back home from buying the brand new car with her mother. There's a plate of fruit that was knocked over when the defendant went to grab that knife. Here's a close-up. You see that — where that arrow is that just popped up? That's a — the back of a plate or a pan from that dish rack. This is the knife that the defendant grabbed from that dish rack and

used to repeatedly stab Aneka as he dragged her towards the front of — the front door area of this apartment. The defendant held her and stabbed her 21 times.

What happens — what happens next? Well, Mrs.

Newman, Aneka's mother, is hearing — is still on the balcony talking to the police and suddenly she hears mom, mom, he's stabbing me. This frantic call from her daughter. So she comes running back in and she kind of stops right there to see what's going on, only to see the defendant holding her daughter down and stabbing her. She runs to her daughter's aide. Officer Hoffman, who's on that opposite side of that balcony just kind of hanging out waiting for things to happen, hears Aneka's frantic calls and he jumps those rails and he makes it through that balcony and through that door, he runs into this living room area. By that point, Mrs. Newman had already gone to her daughter's aide. She was trying to pull Aneka away from the defendant.

Meanwhile — so this is where the defendant and Aneka are, he's stabbing her. Mrs. Newman rushes to her daughter's aide. Officer Hoffman is running into this house. He kind of stops short, but prior to doing that it looks as though the defendant had Aneka — held Aneka with his left hand and what the officer could see before he got very close was what appeared to be the defendant punching Aneka, making punching motions, just repeated punching motions. So he's thinking,

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I've got to stop this. He runs over and he's about one to two feet away before he realizes the defendant's not punching her, he's stabbing her.

So what does Officer Hoffman do? He rushes and just — he'll tell you what caused him to do this, to have such reflexes. Takes his left hand, he lunges at the defendant, uses his left hand to grab that knife mid-22nd stab, tackles him to the ground and while he's doing that he's able to pull his weapon. He tackles the defendant to the ground, holds him down, he's yelling drop the knife, drop the knife. By that point he has his gun, his work gun, pressed against the defendant's neck and he's telling him drop the knife, don't you move. If you move I will shoot you.

Officer Gallup hears the commotion. Remember, he's kind of in that cement walkway. He's trying to decide, should I go that way to the door, should I — he jumps that balcony. He makes it in there just in time to help Officer Hoffman bring the defendant down to the ground.

What about Officer Tavarez? Well, Officer Tavarez actually made her way to the front door. And what Officer Tavarez was doing was trying to break the door down to make entry through the front door. But she let that go after she heard the commotion that was directly behind her. So what does she do realizing that now there's the weight of two officers and the defendant wrestling behind that very small

area? She makes her way back to the balcony and assists Officers Gallup and Hoffman in taking the defendant into custody.

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Meanwhile, Mrs. Newman had pulled Aneka off to the side and was trying to help her daughter. So they — the three officers take the defendant into custody, they secure him, they handcuff him. Who's left in the apartment? Aneka and her mother. Aneka is bleeding, 21 stab wounds, one — several to the neck, she's bleeding. Officer Tavarez, after the defendant is secure, comes back into the apartment, sees what appears to her to be very serious injuries on Aneka and she grabs a towel from the linen closet and she orders Aneka's mother who's sitting there with her daughter against her chest to put pressure on the wound to her neck and the wound to her head and to not let go until help came. And that's exactly what Stephanie Newman did. She held that towel there until paramedics arrived.

This is what the defendant's hand looked like after this incident. This is the only injury he suffered. This is what Stephanie Newman, Aneka's mother looked like after the incident.

It took less than two minutes for the defendant to stab Aneka 21 times. It took him less than 20 — or less than two minutes to cause her that much harm. This is what Aneka looked like after those brief two minutes. The fact that

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Aneka Grimes was alive on July 22nd at 7:04 pm is nothing but Thank you. a miracle.

THE COURT: You can call your first witness. Oh, I'm Go ahead. I apologize. I got ahead of myself. sorry. Sorry.

> Thank you. MS. HOJJAT:

The defense can now address the panel on THE COURT: their opening statement. Sorry.

> Thank you, Your Honor. MS. HOJJAT:

OPENING STATEMENT

MS. HOJJAT: Your Honor, may I turn this screen off?

THE COURT: Of course.

MS. HOJJAT: Ladies and gentlemen, on July 22nd, 2011, Bennett Grimes and his wife Aneka were separated. There was a temporary protective order against him. Aneka wanted to leave him, she told him that their marriage was over, but Bennett loved Aneka. Bennett wanted Aneka back. He had just recently gotten a job at the Wal-Mart and he thought this might be the thing that changes it. Maybe she'll take me back if she knows I'm getting my life together. So he went over to her apartment hoping to convince her that they could give it one more try, that this relationship wasn't over yet.

Aneka and her mother had just returned home, he followed them into the house. They told him he couldn't be there and he didn't listen. He did push his way into that

house. But ladies and gentlemen, the evidence will be very, very clear that after entering the house and crossing the threshold, he stood right there at that entryway. He didn't make a threat against Aneka; he didn't make a threat against her mother. Everybody who gets up there on the stand will testify he didn't say I'm going to hurt you, he didn't say I'm going to kill you. Aneka will tell you he didn't bring a weapon, he didn't bring a knife, he didn't bring a gun.

He stood a foot inside of her apartment telling her he loved her, telling her he wanted her back, telling her please, let's try to make this work. The evidence will show that he didn't move from that entryway. Aneka was standing five feet away, next to the kitchen bar. The knife that the State showed you in its opening, was in the kitchen in the dish rack area. The evidence will be very clear on this, ladies and gentlemen. Aneka was standing next to the knife. Bennett was standing five feet away at the entryway.

The evidence is going to show, ladies and gentlemen, that it was Aneka who picked up the knife and went towards Bennett. She was sick of him, she didn't want him back, she wanted him gone and she picked up a knife and she went towards him with it. She attacked Bennett with the knife.

Now ladies and gentlemen, the State talked to you about 21 stab wounds. Aneka's doctors are going to get on the stand and they're going to tell you that her injuries were

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shallow, they were lacerations. They were so superficial that she was discharged from the hospital a day and a half later. They're going to tell you that she didn't have a single injury in a place that you and I would expect to see defensive wounds. They're going to tell you she didn't have a single injury on the palms of her hands. They're going to tell you she didn't have a single injury on her fingers, in between her fingers. They're going to tell you she didn't have a single injury on the insides of her wrists. Not a single injury that you would expect to see somebody who's holding their hands up like this, trying to deflect the knife.

Ladies and gentlemen, the evidence is going to show that Aneka's injuries were obtained during a struggle for that knife. You're going to see that Aneka picked up the knife and Aneka approached Bennett and that there was a struggle. Aneka was the one injured, but you're going to hear Bennett Grimes is a bigger guy. Who do you expect to be injured in a struggle over a knife?

Ladies and gentlemen, you're also going to hear from a DNA analyst in this case. You're going to hear that swabs were done on the knife handle in order to try to determine who was holding that knife. Swabs were done trying to pick up skin cells. Not a single one of Bennett Grimes' skin cells was found on that knife handle. The DNA analyst will tell you only Aneka's DNA was found on that knife handle. You're going

to hear that the State didn't bother to get the knife tested for fingerprints, so they're not going to present you with any evidence, any physical evidence, DNA or fingerprinting that Bennett ever held that knife.

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Ladies and gentlemen, you all raised your hands and you swore to follow the law and Judge Leavitt told you that the law says Bennett Grimes is presumed innocent. Judge Leavitt told you that the law says the State has the burden of proving beyond reasonable doubt the accusations they have leveled against Bennett. That means they have the burden. During this trial Mr. Hillman and I are not obligated to do anything. We're not obligated to ask a single question, we're not obligated to put on any evidence, we're not obligated to call a single witness. They have the burden. They must prove to you beyond a reasonable doubt what they are claiming.

And you will see, ladies and gentlemen, that they cannot meet that burden because the evidence will show you that Aneka Grimes picked up that knife, that Aneka Grimes attacked Bennett and that Bennett was acting in self-defense. The evidence will show you this was a struggle gone horribly wrong. And at the end of this case we will ask you to find Bennett Grimes not guilty of the charges against him.

THE COURT: Thank you very much. The State can call their first witness.

Gallup had made entry through the sliding glass door as well to assist me. The mother pulled the victim away from us enough to separate them. I retained control of the male's wrist. I also drew my — I also had my firearm out and I had it in the back of his soft tissue of his neck and told him that if he moved he was going to fucking die.

Q And at this point did you know where the knife was?

A No, I did not.

Q Now the — this other woman who's present, the mother, what is she doing at this time?

A At this point she was able to retain the female victim, pulled her back in to her like waist with her back — with the victim's back to her chest, holding her.

I could tell that the victim was in the care of her mother so I — well, I didn't know it was her mother at the time, but so I allowed them to stay off to the side while we attempted to put handcuffs on the suspect.

Q Eventually were you all successful in getting the suspect into handcuffs?

A Yes, ma'am. It took — we — we didn't do it immediately because we were not sure where the knife was.

Upon initial entry from me I was still hearing Officer Hoffman say, drop the knife, where's the knife. So when I made entry and I helped get in and assist them, I was able to look around and I saw the knife laying off to the side of the officers.

So I was able to tell Officer Hoffman and Gallup he doesn't

possibly — she could bleed out quickly, that we wanted to get pressure on the wounds as quickly as we could.

And as a surgeon, I'm specifically alerted because there is a high probability of need for surgery.

Q Okay. And what type of injuries did she have? She was an intermediate trauma level. What kind of injuries?

A So she was largely stab wounds and she had multiple stab wounds to her upper extremities, her upper chest, her neck, her face and her scalp.

And this is what we call zone one of the neck and a large blood vessel goes — it's called a subclavian artery. It goes to — to the arm and then there are multiple branches that go up to the neck and the brain. And so with a stab

wound like that, we really don't have any idea looking at it externally how deeply it — it went and whether any of those blood vessels or their branches were injured and whether they're actively bleeding or whether they're — could potentially bleed.

Q Okay. So are you able to conduct tests to determine whether or not it had been — it had gone deep enough to actually cut?

A Correct. So — so what we do — usually do in these cases when a patient's vital signs are what we would consider stable is we send them for a specialized CAT scan that is reconstructed to look at the blood vessels and that did find an area of active bleeding.

Q Okay. If you could, Doctor, just very briefly for the jury describe the different arteries and veins that are running around the neck area?

A Sure. So we have the subclavian vessel that runs underneath the clavicle and their branches. The jugulars, the internal and external jugulars go through the neck in this area. Then there are multiple other small vessels, one that is the internal mammary that goes off and it actually then heads down into our chest, in the anterior portion of our chest. There are other ones that go towards the back, towards our spinal cord and they're called the vertebral arteries. And where her injury was, was right

between the internal mammary artery, which then kind of goes into the chest underneath the chest bone and then a branch that goes to — to her spine.

There was an area of active bleeding that was thought to be a muscular branch of that. And as a result of that finding, I sent her for what we call angiography and embolization, which is a little like a cardiac catheterization where we put a — a long catheter into a large blood vessel. We shoot contrast and then we can actually many times stop bleeding without an operation and a radiologist does that. I do not do that.

Q Okay. And what were the results of that angio?

A So at the point where the angio was performed,

the active bleeding had stopped, so.

Q And I'm going to ask you what may seem like an obvious question. But as a physician and as a surgeon, what is your primary concern with regard to injuries around the neck?

A Bleeding, injury to the trachea, which governs our ability to breathe. And behind that lies the esophagus and if either one of those are injured, you can, you know, have inability to breathe, inability to eat, terrible infections and then to the blood vessels obviously bleeding to death is — is a concern. Or that there's a large hematoma that is underneath the skin, which you can't really evaluate

Thank you. And then you also testified to Aneka Grimes having three injuries or stab wounds to her chest.

Also, depending upon the trajectory, there can be an injury to the heart and again to the great vessels coming out of the heart. So these are potentially very lethal injuries.

them. And it's airway breathing, circulation and then whether they're neurologically impaired. We call that D for disability. And on exposures, when we start to get an idea of where the stab wounds are and so forth and we do front and back, look in hidden areas like the axilla of the perineum and between the buttocks and so forth to make sure that there aren't any hidden wounds. And then we go again head to toe.

We do any X-rays that we think are — are warranted, we draw blood, we place IVs, we start fluids and I would say, you know, all of that happens within three to five minutes. Then we determine — we get, of course, vital signs and then we determine kind of a — a course of how we're going to figure things out. If a patient's unstable, they go directly to the operating room. In her case, her vital signs were stable so we did X-rays and CAT scans on her.

Q Okay. And what did the X-rays and the CAT scans reveal?

A So she had multiple X-rays. To her extremities we were looking for whether there were foreign bodies or broken bones. And there was just a suggestion of a foreign body, I believe it was in her left upper extremity. Did a CAT scan of her chest, which would again show whether there was any air around the lungs called a pneumothorax where there was bleeding into the chest. And then we did the what we call a CTA, it's a — it's a CAT scan type of angiography to look

initially for bleeding and we can do that very quickly. And since there was thought to be some active bleeding, then my choice would be either to operate or to go to angiography.

In her area of active bleeding, it is an extremely difficult, technically difficult area, because it was actually very close to the clavicle and it was deep. And so for me to surgically get to it, I'd have to really go through a lot of muscles and potentially damage other things. So luckily, we have angiography. By then that bleeding had stopped so they did not need to do any embolization.

Q Okay. And was there any kind of air found in her lung at all or her chest area?

A There — there — there was not in her lung per se, but what happens when we get stabbed in our soft tissue, there's air introduced from the outside. So we call that subcutaneous air and that was found on her CAT scans.

Q Okay. After she was treated, is it — was she admitted to intensive care at that point?

A She was admitted to the intensive care unit.

Q And based on your review of her file, she was discharged on — on July 24th; is that correct?
