THE COURT: All right. State versus Jason Jones.

THE DEFENDANT: Good morning, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Good morning. Mr. Jones is present in custody, and we have Mr. Cano and Mr. Pike and Ms. Christensen for the State. And this is the time for calendar call.

THE DEFENDANT: I'd request, for the record, you know, my transcript from every court appearance in this courtroom.

THE COURT: We'll get to that in a minute.

MR. PIKE: Your Honor, this situation, the State has made an offer. The defense -- the defendant has indicated what he wanted to plea. I think that because of the -- the manner in which the Court has -- the Court has had to deal with the proper person statements of the client, we were able to discuss all of this with his father. His father came up here. We've managed to get a visit set for his father to talk with him tonight.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. PIKE: If we could continue the calendar call till tomorrow --

THE COURT: Mr. Jones.

THE DEFENDANT: I apologize.

THE COURT: You don't just interrupt.

THE DEFENDANT: Yes, ma'am.

THE COURT: Mr. Pike, so you've spoken with Mr. Jones in the detention center about the offer, correct?

MR. PIKE: That's correct. We did have a written plea agreement. I actually provided him a copy of that, went over that with him a couple of weeks ago. We were able to secure an additional consideration by the State in reference to that. So we've done that.

THE COURT: Okay. And then -- the reason I'm asking, the only reason I'm interested one way or the other is because I'm trying to set up trials and figure out what's likely to go. This would be in the number-one position.

What are -- I mean, do you feel like it's probable that the negotiation will be accepted, or do you think it's unlikely the negotiation will be accepted?

MR. PIKE: Your Honor, I'm hopeful because it would be in his best interests, I believe, but he -- he has had some misunderstandings, and we've had difficulties as the Court has seen. We wanted --

THE COURT: Right, and --

MR. PIKE: So it comes down to -- the question -- if this goes to trial and if he's --

THE COURT: -- feel like there's some -- just to clarify -- I feel like there's some distrust on the part of Mr. Jones toward his attorneys, meaning you and Mr. Cano.

MR. PIKE: That's correct, Your Honor. And so we've been consistently

meeting with him, going over all possible defenses, and because of the recent Supreme Court case involving ineffective assistance of counsel claims, as far as plea negotiation, now we have to make a record in reference to where we're at with the plea negotiations. And Mr. Jones is facing an open-murder charge. If he's convicted of First Degree Murder, he under -- with the use of a deadly weapon, he has to do at least 21 years before he's eligible to even get out.

THE COURT: Right.

MR. PIKE: The terms of negotiation --

THE DEFENDANT: I thought I was convicted of First Degree Murder, Your Honor -- not convicted, charged with First Degree Murder.

THE COURT: Well, it's open murder. That includes First Degree Murder, it includes Second --

THE DEFENDANT: I put in NRS 200, dash, 030, dash, 1, that's First Degree Murder.

THE COURT: All right. Mr. Jones, first of all, like I told you last time, Mr. Cano and Mr. Pike are very experienced attorneys. Murder cases are pretty much all they do. So if they tell you something, if I were you, I would be inclined to trust their representations rather than your own reading or your chitchat with other inmates in the law library or whatever the case may be in terms of why you think you understand things better than Mr. Cano and Mr. Pike understand things.

So don't interrupt me again. Don't interrupt Mr. Pike again, and when Ms. Christensen speaks, don't interrupt her again. I'm not speaking to you at this point. I'm speaking to your attorneys.

So, Mr. Pike, you feel that the State has made a favorable negotiation; is that correct?

MR. PIKE: Favorable offer of negotiation, that is correct.

THE COURT: And what is the offer?

MR. PIKE: The offer at this time is to reduce it down to a voluntary with the use of a deadly weapon. It would be a stipulated sentence. It would be a conditional plea, Alford, based upon the sentence of 2 and a half to 7 and a half, plus a consecutive 2 and a half to 7 and a half, and that would resolve all possible potential other charges. It gets rid of the potential of a habitual criminal charge. It gets rid of potential ex-felon in possession of a firearm. That resolves every case that he has. He has no other holds that would take him out of state or anything in reference to that.

THE COURT: All right. Ms. Keenan, is that a correct statement of the offer that's been made by the State in this case?

MS. CHRISTENSEN: Yes, Your Honor.

THE COURT: All right. If this offer is not accepted, how long do you anticipate this matter taking if it were to proceed to trial, just in the guilt phase?

MR. PIKE: If it was to go to trial, I don't believe there are any out-of-state witnesses, it would take four days for the guilt phase. If there's a penalty phase to go, I would anticipate that maybe a day.

THE COURT: A day, okay. All right. Here's what we're going to do. We're going to set the calendar call over for tomorrow morning at 9:30 in this department to see where we are with negotiations.

MR. PIKE: Thank you, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Thank you.

Let the record reflect the presence of the State through the deputy district attorneys, Nell Christensen and Chris Pandelis, the presence of the defendant, Mr. Jones, along with his attorneys, Charles Cano and Randy Pike, the officers of the court, and the ladies and gentlemen of the prospective jury panel.

The charge is murder with use of a deadly weapon, a firearm, due to an incident that occurred on June 17, 2012, in which it's alleged that the defendant shot and killed Jaime Corona in his apartment at 1416 F Street here in Las Vegas. That apartment complex is a small complex of about 18 one-bedroom units, and you may hear from some of the other occupants of that apartment complex in this trial.

involved, and that person's name is Dr. Timothy Dutra. Thank
you.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you, Ms. Christensen.

Ladies and gentlemen, in a moment counsel for the defense will introduce themselves to you, along with their client. An accused in a criminal case is never required to present any evidence or to call any witnesses, however if there are some witnesses which may be called, they will give you those names at this time.

Mr. Pike, Mr. Cano.

MR. CANO: Good morning. My name is Charles Cano, and myself along with my co-counsel, Randall Pike, will be defending Shawn [phonetic] Jones. He's pled not guilty to the charges alleged by the State this morning.

Some potential witnesses that we may be calling are Annaleva Stewart [phonetic], Brittany Henry [phonetic], Tammy Wells [phonetic], Clifton Stewart [phonetic], Fahim Faquir

[phonetic], Dola Faquir [phonetic], and Joseph Perez. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Cano.

Ladies and gentlemen, in a moment the clerk will call the roll of the panel of prospective jurors. When your name is called, please answer present or here. Please be aware that everything that is said during these proceedings is recorded.

The lady here at the end in the orange sweater is Ms. Janie Olsen. She is our official court recorder. It is Ms. Olsen's job to make sure that everything that is said is recorded and that an accurate transcript is prepared thereafter. I tell you this because when you are speaking, please be aware that you are being recorded, and please make sure that you speak up loudly enough so that we can make sure that everything you said is taken down.

You'll see some black boxes on the bannisters throughout the courtroom. Those are the microphones.

Obviously if you're seated close to them there shouldn't be a problem, but if you're seated in one of the back rows, please be aware of the locations of the microphone so that you can make sure that you project.

The clerk will now call the roll.

(Clerk calls roll - all present.)

THE COURT: Is there anyone whose name was not

called?

All right. Ladies and gentlemen, the questioning of the jury at the beginning of the case is done under oath. If all of the members of the prospective jury panel will please rise so that the clerk can administer the oath to you.

(Prospective jurors sworn.)

THE COURT: Thank you, ladies and gentlemen. Please be seated.

MR. PIKE: Your Honor, before we begin questioning, may we approach the bench.

THE COURT: You may.

(Off-record bench conference.)

THE COURT: Ladies and gentlemen, we are about to commence examination of prospective jurors in this case. During this process you will be asked questions bearing on your ability to sit as fair and impartial jurors.

The Court, the lawyers, the defendant, and everyone involved in this case are all deeply interested in having this matter tried by a jury composed of 14 open minded people who are completely neutral, and who have no bias or prejudice toward or against either side. In order for us to accomplish this, it is necessary for me to ask you some questions. The attorneys will also be given the opportunity to ask you some questions.

Please understand that it is not our desire to pry

unnecessarily into your personal lives. Although the questioning can at times become quite personal, our only objective is to ascertain whether there is any reason why any of you cannot sit as completely fair and impartial jurors.

It is important that you understand the significance of full, complete and honest answers to all of the questions we are about to ask you. I caution you not to try to hide or withhold anything touching upon your qualifications to serve as a juror in this matter.

I am going to conduct a general examination of all of you. That's the ladies and gentlemen seated in the jury box, as well as those of you seated in the audience. Following that, I'll be conducting a more detailed examination of the ladies and gentlemen in the box.

If you wish to respond to any of the questions I'm about to ask that are directed at everyone, please raise your hand. When I call on you, if you're seated in the audience, please stand. Everyone needs to state their name and their badge number for the record.

All right. Is there anyone who believes they may be acquainted with either of the deputy district attorneys, either with Mr. Pandelis or with Ms. Christensen? Does anyone believe they may know either of the deputy district attorneys? All right. No one.

Does anyone believe they may be acquainted or know of

the defendant in this matter, Mr. Jason Jones? No one.

Does anyone believe they may know or know of Mr. Jones's attorneys, either Mr. Randall Pike or Mr. Charles Cano?

Ms. Christensen or by Mr. Cano as potential witnesses who may be called to testify in this case, does anyone think they may know or know of any of those people? All right.

Does anyone believe they may have read, seen or heard anything about this case prior to coming into the courtroom this morning?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 200: I think I've heard about it in the news.

THE COURT: And that, for the record, is Badge No. 200, Mr. Weathers.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: Yeah.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: Well, it's a very

complicated case. Two of the — three of the — ah. Two of the children, when she — the children were in custody and they wanted to send them out to the family. So we divided up — she had four, and we divided up the children amongst the family and I took one. It is a set of triplets in there.

I took one of the triplets. My son took one of the triplets and the oldest child, and the last triplet went into foster care. He's Down Syndrome, and that's the one that she lost the custody of. And I don't even know how to explain it.

THE COURT: Yeah. Do you feel like CPS could have done more to try to reunify the family, or do you --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: Yeah. They made an agreement with my son that we didn't know about for a long, long time that if he would adopt the child in foster care, the one with Down Syndrome, they would guarantee him custody of the third triplet and make sure that he got to keep her.

THE COURT: Mm-hmm.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: And they followed through with that, and we've been fighting with the court system for the last four years trying to get her back.

THE COURT: So it sounds like you and your daughter are sort of at odds with your son.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: Yeah. My son will not speak to me. He physically attacked me and I wound up having him arrested for it. Because he was beating the kids, but Child Services didn't seem to care about that and gave him two of the kids anyway.

THE COURT: So he now has one of the -- he has -- PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: He has two of the triplets.

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: And my daughter, who lives with me, has the third triplet and the oldest boy.

THE COURT: Okay. And you feel like, I guess, CPS didn't handle the situation appropriately?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: Not at all. Not at all. They did everything behind our back and just made it impossible for us to get the other one back that she didn't lose custody of.

THE COURT: Now, what about the police's involvement in all of this, was that kind of tangential, or do you feel like the police had any role in any of that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: It was very little involvement with the police except for that one incident in the parking lot the day she lost custody. And I feel if I'd

All right. Ms. Green. State, why don't we get started with the questions that you have for the other panelists, and then when Ms. Green gets back, you can follow up with any questions you may have from Ms. Green.

MR. PANDELIS: Certainly, Your Honor.

Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. As you heard, my name is Chris Pandelis. I along with Ms. Christensen will be prosecuting this case this week. And in addition to what Judge Adair asked you, I just have some follow-up questions for all of you.

Some of them are going to be addressed to you as a group as a whole, and if you have a response to any of the questions, just raise your hand, let me know, and I'll let each of you answer in order in which I see your hands. And some of them may be directed to you more specifically as follow-up questions.

One of those follow-up questions I'd like to ask Mr. Zercher, Badge No. 208. You mentioned a case that you

2	MR. PANDELIS: And likewise, you said you had no
3	animosity towards the police in that case?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 208: Not at all.
5	MR. PANDELIS: And you recently pled guilty in that
6	case. When were you arrested in that case?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 208: I'm not sure of the exact
8	date, but it was the month of August.
9	MR. PANDELIS: Of 2012?

Adair asked you — in following up with the question I just

asked of this gentleman, Judge Adair asked you whether or not

any of you had been charged with crimes, accused of crimes,

convicted of crimes.

But I would just ask if there's just been any other contact that you've had with law enforcement, whether you've seen them on the streets or just any other type of contact that gives you a negative taste towards law enforcement? And I see no hands.

So everybody here has a positive opinion of law — not necessarily a positive opinion, but would you hold it against a police officer if a police officer came in here and testified simply because they're a police officer; is that correct?

Likewise, and Judge Adair went into this briefly, some of us have had more interaction with the court system and are more familiar with the court system than others. Some of us are frustrated by the way it works, some of us think it's slow, some of us don't think it's fair.

But because all of us, all of the attorneys in here, the judge, the court personnel are part of the court system, is there anybody here that has such a bad taste in their mouth towards the court system that they don't think they can be fair and impartial as jurors in this case?

1	So everybody agrees there's no feelings towards the
2	court system that would prevent them from serving? And that's
3	a yes from everybody.
4	Does anybody here have any friends or family members
5	who are attorneys? And the gentleman in the top row, you are

else?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: California.

MR. PANDELIS: What type of law did he practice?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: Contract law. Now he's retired and he teaches contract law.

MR. PANDELIS: At a law school or a university? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: Yeah.

MR. PANDELIS: All right. Back when you were married and he was practicing, did you talk to him about his cases?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: No --

MR. PANDELIS: Similar to Mr. Pryor, not that interested in talking about contract law?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 265: It was just -- he wrote contracts and stuff, and very boring.

MR. PANDELIS: Okay. Anybody else in the box, friends or family members or close acquaintances who are employed as attorneys?

Now, as members of -- if you're selected as a juror, one of your responsibilities at the conclusion of the trial is going to be to determine the guilt or innocence of Mr. Jones in this case. Is there anybody here who would have any reservations about sitting in judgment of another person?

And I'd remind you earlier in the day we heard from somebody in this courtroom who mentioned that their religious beliefs would prevent them from sitting in judgment of a

MR. PANDELIS: -- I didn't want to wake up and come to work today. But I know you don't want to, but is it something that you feel you could do?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 208: Yeah.

MR. PANDELIS: How do you plan on putting those feelings aside?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 208: I mean, if you guys want me to be here, I got to be here and I'll just deal with it.

MR. PANDELIS: But earlier you said, Who am I to judge. If you get back there, are you — if you're selected as a juror and you're asked to sit in judgment —

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 208: I don't ever do anything out of animosity, if that's what you're insinuating.

MR. PANDELIS: No, I'm not going there. But I just wanted to make sure that you can fulfill your role as a juror if you're selected. Are you going to be able to do that and sit in judgment?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 208: In my opinion, yes, but it's more or less your opinion, isn't it?

1	MR. PANDELIS: Well, it's in my opinion, is there
2	anything that I should be concerned about?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 208: No.
4	MR. PANDELIS: Anybody else who would have any
5	reservations about sitting in judgment of another person? I'm
6	seeing no other hands.
7	Is there anybody here who owns a firearm? All right.
8	Several hands, so I'm just going to go in order. Badge
9	No. 198, Mr. Buzzard.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 198: Yes.
11	MR. PANDELIS: And I'm just going to ask generally.
12	You own firearms?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 198: Yes.
14	MR. PANDELIS: You're familiar with firearms?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 198: Very.
16	MR. PANDELIS: Okay. And you understand how firearms
17	work?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 198: I fix them, among other
19	things.
20	MR. PANDELIS: And you understand that different
21	types of firearms function in different ways?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 198: Yes.
23	MR. PANDELIS: Okay. And the next hand I saw and
24	again, ladies and gentlemen, I just want to go in order from
25	front row to back row. And Mr. Uriarte, Badge No. 204.
