13	that at the preliminary hearing you had described it at one
14	point as calm. That confusion may be because at the
15	preliminary hearing you said he was calm, he was trying to
16	find out what happened, he was kind of excited. So you
17	actually said both of those things at the preliminary hearing.
18	Both those words that that were used, excited and calm.
19	A Right.
20	Q When he came and talked to you, was he
21	concerned?
22	A He was, yeah, kind of curious about it. He
23	he wanted to know did I see anybody go inside his apartment
24	the night before.
25	Q Okay. So he was concerned about what happened

1	at his house?
2	A Right. Because it had something to do with his
3	kids, he was upset about his kids' toys, so whatever, his
4	the TV or DVD player or something.
5	Q So he was upset about it?
6	A Yeah. Well, he wasn't I mean, you know, it's
7	you know, any time something happen to your kids, you get,
.8	you know, concerned. He was concerned about his kids.
9	Q Okay. Now, there was also some discussion on
10	cross-examination about the kind of medications you're taking,
11	oxycodone, and how long how often you take it. You take
12	that every day?
13	A Yes.
14	Q You took it today?
15	A Yes.
16	Q And to me you seem fine. Would would you
17	agree to me that you're understanding everything that's going
18	on?
19	A Yes.
20	Q So you can observe everything that's going on?
21	A Pretty much, yes.
22	Q Okay. It make you said it makes you a little
23	bit groggy sometimes?
24	A Yes. But I took it before I came, so I already
25	when when I was waiting to come in here, I took a little

2	Q Okay. But right now, when you're awake, would
3	this be how you would typically be on an average day?
4	A Yes.
5	Q Okay. Mr. Cano asked you about some injury that
6	Jaime had gotten the night or two before he was killed; do you

11	Q Okay. So anything you heard about it would be
12	complete hearsay?
13	A Exactly.
14	Q Okay. And then you also testified that the door
15	I just want to be clear, because several times in defense
16	questions they've asked about if it was a metal door. Are
17	those doors wooden or metal?
18	A The the okay, the screen door's like
L9	wrought iron, it's kind of heavy. And then the other door's
20	wood wood. It's wood.

1	Q Okay. So would it be fair to say that you
2	didn't sit there and watch and see what was happening? You
3	went back inside your apartment?

6	MS. CHRISTENSEN: I'll pass the witness.
7	THE COURT: Any recross?
8	MR. CANO: Very brief, Your Honor.
9	RECROSS-EXAMINATION
10	BY MR. CANO:
11	Q Despite the fact that you had taken your
12	medication earlier and you seemed to be kind of clear, would
13	it be a fair characterization that at points in times during
14	your testimony you've been confused?
15	A Well, I been taking this medication for almost
16	five years.
17	Q Okay.
18	A So my body is pretty much is getting used to
19	it.
20	Q Getting used to it
21	A Yeah.
22	Q but it still does confuse sometimes?
23	A It still it still makes me sleepy and groggy.
24	If I relax, I go to sleep on it.
25	Q Okay. And and you testified earlier that at
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1	times it can make you get confused, confusing days and events
2	when
3	A Right. I
4	Q the sequence of things of that nature.
5	A I $-$ if I go to sleep, if I take my medicine and
6	I lay down and go to sleep, I forget what day it is. When I
7	wake up, I'm confused what day it is.
8	Q Okay. Fair enough. So it does still have an
9	effect on you?
10	A It still has an effect, because it still works.
11	Q Okay.
12	MR. CANO: No further questions, Your Honor.
13	THE COURT: All right. Anything else, just based on
14	that?
15	MS. CHRISTENSEN: No, Your Honor.
16	THE COURT: Any juror questions for this witness?
17	All right, sir. Thank you for your testimony.
18	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
19	THE COURT: Please don't discuss your testimony with
20	anybody else who may be a witness in this case.
21	THE WITNESS: Okay. Thank you.
22	THE COURT: Thank you, sir. And you are excused.
23	All right.
24	Ladies and gentlemen, we're going to go ahead and
25	take our lunch break now. Let's see, we'll be in recess for

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the lunch break until 2:50.
