1 LAS VEGAS, NEVADA, TUESDAY, JULY 23, 2013; 2 10:35 A.M. 3 4 PROCEEDINGS 5 6 7 THE COURT: We're on the record in Case 8 No. 636515. We're outside the presence of the jury. 9 Mr. Jaffe has made a request to do a jury 10 view of the defendant's vehicle tomorrow. 11 MR. JAFFE: That's correct, Your Honor. 12 THE COURT: Here's the concern. Whenever you do a jury view of anything, the concern is not 13 14 necessarily as much with, at least in my mind, the 15 prejudice to the other party for not being able to see 16 her car, but the risk of contaminating the jury by 17 something that might be said by someone on the way 18 down, on the way up, or during the view. 19 MR. JAFFE: What we would do, if the Court is 20 okay with it, is have Mr. Khoury park the vehicle maybe 21 like in the back by that loading dock area because I 22 think that's probably sort of an area that there's not 23 going to be a risk of traffic. Walk away. The Court 24 can bring them down. We won't stand anywhere near 25 them. They can take a look at it.

1 If the Court would like to inspect it and counsel beforehand so that they just look at the front 3 and then go back up, we won't -- we can stand 50 feet We'll stand back by the stairway, if you want. 5 This way it's simply there for them to take a look at and that eliminates the risk of anybody at the scene 6 7 saying or doing anything. And if the Court, and 8 certainly the marshal, monitors them on the way down and on the way up and we limit it to ten minutes for 10 them to take a look at it, whatever it may very well 11 be, that's fine. 12 THE COURT: Do we have pictures of the front 13 of the vehicle? 14 MR. JAFFE: Yes. They're in evidence. 15 THE COURT: Is there something about the 16 pictures that makes them inaccurate? 17 MR. JAFFE: I don't know that it's 18 necessarily inaccurate, but the point is the hook is 19 difficult to actually understand and see the 20 perspective of how it sits vis-a-vis the bumper, you 21 know, from the photographs. And since the experts had 22 the opportunity to have inspected and seen that hook, 23 and the car is in the exact condition as it was when 24 the experts saw it, the exact same -- and it's the same 25 situation, in fact, for the plaintiff, her vehicle is

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in the exact same condition as it was when the experts saw it, at least as we know — there's nothing of any particular prejudice.

THE COURT: Let me think about it and then I'll let you know by the end of the day. I understand your argument is that it's prejudicial because your client's vehicle has been repaired and we can't look at it in its unrepaired state.

MR. CLOWARD: Correct. And the important thing that — counsel indicated that, you know, that the experts have looked at it so what's the difference of letting the jurors. Well, there's a reason why experts are hired for this specific issue. It's because it requires specialized knowledge to realize that you can't equate property damage to injury. They have specialized knowledge and background and studies and, you know, education to help formulate their opinions. So to allow the jury to go down there and examine it, it would be overly prejudicial to

Ms. Seastrand specifically because her vehicle is — we can't show the damage to her vehicle. It's only the damage to his vehicle and so it would definitely be prejudicial to her.

MR. JAFFE: My response to that, Your Honor, is this: Obviously, they would be seeing exactly what

the experts saw. And if they want to show her vehicle now, which is exactly what the experts saw, I'm fine with that.

By the same token, with respect to that's why we have experts, well, if you've got a case where a kitchen appliance catches fire and causes damage and burns down a house, does it mean that the kitchen appliance in its ended final state, charred state, whatever, doesn't necessarily get admitted as evidence? Of course not. The jury may have that and see that even though experts are going to talk about how the fire started, why the fire started, what the defect was, things of that nature. So the simple fact that you have experts dealing with it, I don't think is in any way a dispositive argument with respect to that issue.

MR. CLOWARD: Judge, one last thing. It will be really, really short. This has not been identified as an exhibit either at any point during the course of litigation. That's another reason why it's prejudicial to us.

MR. JAFFE: Well, then if that's the case, why did the experts inspect it if it wasn't identified?

I think it's certainly presumed that the vehicles are evidence in the case without having to be specifically

And then I went to BYU in Provo, Utah, and studied vocal performance and education.

Then I transferred down to UNLV, and I was on a full vocal performance scholarship there, and I studied education and vocal performance there.

- Q. And you married your husband, Doug, in 1985; is that right?
- A. I did.

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- Q. What does Doug do for a living?
- A. Doug works for a company called National Securities Technologies, which is a company that supports the Department of Defense and he works in the Counter Terrorism Unit for Homeland Security.
- 19 Q. Where do you work now?
- 20 A. I'm sorry?
  - Q. What do you do now? Where do you work?
- A. I own a children's theater called Hollywood
  Kids Academy, and it is place where we teach musical
  theater and dance and voice to children 3 to 19 years
  old. We do plays and all that wonderful stuff.

Q. What did you do for work before you started Hollywood Kids?

A. Well, I had always been kind of a stay-at-home mom before then, but I did have — when we were first married, my husband — I put him through school. I had a tutoring company called the Tutoring Center from 1985 to 1987, and then he graduated and I came home and had my babies.

And then I went — in 1993, I think January of '93, I started at — I became a distributor for a children's book company called Dorling Kindersley Family Learning. And we sold educational books that have real pictures and just really beautiful, so. For the kids.

- Q. All right. You mentioned your kids. Tell us how many kids you have, how old they are.
- A. I have four kids. My daughter Beth, who you saw yesterday. She is 26. And then my son Daniel is 24. And then I lost two kids. And then I had another one, Melissa. She's going to be 21 next month. And then my daughter Melanie. She's 19.
- Q. And give the jury a little bit of an idea of what kinds of things you like to do with your family before this crash happened. What were some activities you guys used to do together?

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- A. We're just a normal family who likes to be together so we would go to the beach and we would go to our cabin up in Strawberry Point, Utah, and we would go hiking and my husband likes to get the family together and go do stuff, so we would go do whatever whatever, you know. Rappelling and we loved to do Sea—Doos, go to the lake. Just any of that kind of stuff. I'm sorry.
  - Q. That's okay. Take a deep breath.
  - A. Okay.
- Q. All right. Tell us before this crash, what kinds of -- did you do any community service or service for any organizations?
- A. I did. My father-in-law is -- well, was the mayor of North Las Vegas for 16 years. He was elected four terms. He was also a city councilman before that. And he died in 1997. And so when he died, some of his friends formed -- because he was such a service-oriented man, he and my mother-in-law. They named -- they started one in North Las Vegas, a branch of the Helping Hands organization, and they call it the James Seastrand Helping Hands.

And so when my father-in-law died in '97, my mother-in-law started to do plays and direct to earn money for them because that organization organizes

volunteers to help old people and gets paper products and grocery store -- you know, volunteers to help take them to the grocery store and all that.

So when she died in 2002, then I took over in 2004, I think it was, 2003, '4, and started directing for them to earn money and I directed up in Summerlin theater and — you know, just to help them earn money for the cause.

- Q. Have you done any volunteer work for your church?
- A. I do. I'm a member of what's called Relief Society for my church. And it's an organization where we go and we help people who are in our we're divided into wards or boundaries and we go and help keep track of each other. And if somebody gets sick or somebody dies or if there's something that somebody needs, we're there for each other and to help. So we would take in meals and we'd plan funerals and we would be there to support one another. It's awesome.
- Q. And tell us a little bit about how Hollywood Kids progressed into the business that it is today.
- A. Well, I wasn't really happy with the values that I've seen in Las Vegas for children. Like the modesty and things. Kids were asked to be in, you know, midriffs and things like that, and I felt like

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this was just not appropriate and so — and I have three daughters. And so what I decided was I was going to start doing plays in my own, you know, home for them and so we started doing Annie. That was our first play in the fall of 2006, and I directed it.

And my friend Jackie was there with me and we had 26 kids. And then the next semester in January, we had 82 kids in my garage, so it was a little bit crazy. And, I mean, it was a real compliment to us because they loved it and the children loved it.

And so a friend of mine asked me to start
Hollywood Kids in the northwest. And I said, well, if
we're going to do that, then we're going to do our own
stage and we're going to do it right. We're going to
have a dance room and a vocal room and a theater. So
we kind of probably overdid it but it's awesome. It
even has a balcony for those little kids. It's great.

- Q. When did you move into that building that was outside of your garage?
- A. Oh, into Hollywood Kids over there on Rancho and Craig?
  - O. Yeah.
- A. Well, we took the lease in December of '07, and we moved in officially after it was done in May of '07. But we were practicing Annie -- we started doing

Annie. I had a couple of classes doing Annie because every child at Hollywood Kids performs. I had like two or three classes doing their own production of Annie over there.

Q. You said you moved in May 2007.

Did you mean 2008?

- A. I'm sorry. Yes. 2008.
- Q. Okay.
  - A. Right. Yes.
- Q. During that time when you first moved into the new building and you're starting Hollywood Kids, what kind of activities were you doing to get the place ready for the kids and get the business going?
- A. Well, Hollywood Kids has a theater. And then in front of the theater we have a dance room. We have mirrors. So we convert the dance room during the shows into we put up chairs and then that becomes the audience space. But the floors are dance floors and we laid them. I think they're like 8-by-8. So we laid them and we put them on foam so that they give for the dance for the kids so they don't hurt themselves as much. So we all laid that and we all did all it's a 17-foot building. No. Maybe 20. I don't know. We all painted and cleaned.

I had to do all of the advertising and talk

to all the parents and hire all the teachers and go and get all the stuff for Hollywood Kids. I had to decorate it. I had to lay the floors and paint and paint the stage and put on the productions. I was also teaching and directing two classes — three classes of Annie and, you know, little kids, so I was very busy.

Q. During that time any — it sounds like you had a real busy active schedule.

Did you ever have neck or back pain from doing all these activities you just told us about?

- A. I would, you know, because it was a lot of physical labor, so I would have some occasionally. You know, but it didn't bother me. Nothing to go to the doctor for.
- Q. Would you notice anything that would trigger your neck or your back to bug you?
- A. Well, when we were laying floors or if we're, you know, doing the extender rods and I was up on the big, tall ladder painting. And I hung a star above the stage so I was up just stuff anything that required too much exertion maybe lifting that was then my back would hurt some, but I never went to the doctor for it or anything like that.
  - Q. You didn't go to the doctor.

    What would you do when you would have this

1 neck or back pain before the crash? 2 I would just take some ibuprofen or Tylenol 3 and march on. Lots of things to do. We've heard about some accidents that you've had in the 1980s. 5 6 You were involved in one in 1981, 1985; is 7 that right? Α. Right. 9 0. Let's talk about the 1981 accident. 10 What kind of injuries did you have from that 11 accident? 12 Α. That was a rollover, and I was a passenger. 13 And I was very blessed. We landed on our heads. I got 14 a whiplash in my neck and a puncture wound in my knee. 15 Q. What did you do for treatment after that 16 accident? 17 Well, they took us by ambulance. I and my roommate, we were on our way to another roommate's 19 wedding. They took us to some hospital up there in 20 Idaho Falls, I think, or something. And then my aunt 21 came and got me. She lived in Pocatello. And she was the sweetest farm wife and she took me to a holistic 22 23 doctor who did colonics on me and that was it. 2.4 Q. Did you have anything else besides that 25 treatment?

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Q. After you stopped your physical therapy from

babies and doing all the things I've done.

1 the 1985 accident, did you ever go to a doctor again because of neck or back pain before this crash? Before this crash? 3 Α. 0. Uh-huh. 4 5 You mean complaining of neck and back pain Α. 6 seeking treatment for that? 7 Q. Okay. Not seeking treatment, no. Other than what you just told us about when Q. 10 you were getting ready for Hollywood Kids and doing some manual labor, were there any other activities that 11 12 you'd notice before this crash that would either 13 trigger your neck or your back to start bothering you? 14 Well, the thing I noticed was a stiff neck. 15 I would wake up with a stiff neck and also back pain. 16 Sometimes I would wake up with back pain. And so we 17 actually bought an adjustable bed and that was nice. 18 But it wasn't every day and it wasn't hardly anything, 19 SO. 20 Nothing you ever went to the doctor for? Q. 21 Α. No. It was occasional. 22 Q. During this time from 1985 until the time of 23 this crash, about 24 years, did you go to the doctor for other things? 2.4

- Q. Without getting into too much detail, can you just kind of tell us what other things you went to the doctor for during that time?
  - A. From 1985 to I'm sorry?
  - Q. Yes. Besides pregnancies, of course.
- A. Right. I lost two babies so I had to go in and get, you know, those taken care of. And then I also had I'm trying to chronologically here.

I had my hysterectomy in 2003 because I have polycystic ovarian syndrome and then I had -- I also had a couple of surgeries before that because I had cysts and tumors and things like that.

And then in 2004 I hit my head and -twice -- and so I went to the hospital for that twice
because I had a concussion and had a terrible headache
for over a year.

And then I had my feet operated on because I had bone spurs in my heels because I was walking everyday four to six miles. I developed bone spurs and I also had bunions. So they did all that surgery at once because I was -- and I think that was in 2006. I can't remember. I don't know what year.

And then I also had — in 2008 I thought I was having a heart attack, and I had taken care of my mother for 12 years and she died in open-heart surgery.

1 So my husband and I were very concerned about that. And so I went to see my GP about that because I was having, you know, chest pain and pain down my arm and 4 numbness and -- down my arms, so I was very worried 5 about that. 6 0. During that time was -- did you ever hesitate 7 to go to the doctor if something was wrong? 8 No. We have great insurance. Α. 9 0. We've seen a lot of medical records that indicate -- where you've indicated that you had chronic 10 11 neck or back pain or a history of neck or back pain. 12 What did you mean when you gave your doctors 13 that history? 14 Well, what I meant was it didn't go away. 15 thought I understood what chronic meant because I thought, you know, I'm still having neck and back pain 16 17 occasionally so, therefore, that must be what chronic is. Now that I've had chronic pain, I know it's 24/7 18 19 and it's tough. And if I had to go back, I would say 20 that was occasional. This is chronic. And I 21 understand and I have great compassion for people who 22 have that, who have chronic pain now. 23 Are you okay? There's some tissues right Q.

Q. You told us you had two incidents where you hit your head and they were in 2004.

Can you give us the months that those happened?

A. Labor Day weekend. We had just come back from the beach and we were Boogie Boarding with our kids, and we were dropping off my son's best friend and his driveway was on an incline. So our Preve hatchback — 11:30 at night — we lifted it up, and I was getting his stuff out and I came up and whacked my head right there. And it was like, oh, gosh.

And then in -- then the second time was in --

- Q. Well, let's talk about this one.
- A. You want to keep going on that one. Okay.

And then I went the next — Sunday morning — I just kind of had a headache all week and then it got worse by Thursday and Friday and Saturday. Sunday morning I woke up and I had a stiff neck and my head was just pounding.

I said to my husband, I think I might be having an aneurysm or something because it hurt so bad and I had never had a headache like that before. So I — my husband called an ambulance because we were worried, you know, that it could be something like that, and then I went to the hospital and they did

1 that. Ο. All right. Let's talk a little bit about 3 that. 4 MS. BRASIER: Judge, can I have the ELMO? 5 THE BAILIFF: You probably have to turn the 6 TV on. 7 MR. CLOWARD: I got it. 8 BY MS. BRASIER: For the record, this is Defendant's Exhibit M006, and this is the record from when you went to 10 11 Summerlin Hospital following that visit. 12 What was the main reason why you decided to 13 go to the hospital that day? 14 I just had this excruciating headache and I 15 had a stiff neck but the headache was incredible. 16 It also indicates besides headache that you were having numbness and tingling down your left arm 17 18 and fingers; is that accurate? 19 I'm sure it was, but I don't remember that. 20 I just remember the headache because it was so long 21 ago. It was just a long time ago. 22 And also circled under some complaints are 23 visual disturbance, blurred vision, nausea, and neck discomfort. 24 25 Were you also having those symptoms when you

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went to the hospital?

- A. Yeah. I remember being nauseous and not being able to see very clearly, but I don't remember that very much. I just remember the headache, but it was a long time ago.
- Q. And describe for us, if you can, what kind of neck discomfort you were having at that time.
- A. I just remember waking up with a stiff neck that day, and I just thought it was probably because I couldn't my head hurt so badly I couldn't hardly turn my head or do anything. I just was in a lot of pain.
- Q. And it also has a history. It indicates thronic neck and back pain.

Do you remember telling Summerlin Hospital that you had chronic neck and back pain?

- A. I'm sure I did, but I don't remember telling them that. Now that I understand about chronic, I would say that was occasional.
- 20 Q. Did they do any imaging of your neck that day 21 when you went to Summerlin Hospital?
- A. It was so long ago I don't remember, but I believe they did.
- Q. For the record, I'm showing Defendant's
  Exhibit M012. This is a report of some neck imaging



that they did.

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Does that refresh your recollection about whether or not they did any imaging?

- A. I'm sure that that's accurate. I just don't remember anything except for my head was terrible.
- Q. Aside from this imaging, did they recommend any other treatment for your neck?
- A. Not that I remember at all. He didn't do anything.
- Q. And do you know what your diagnosis was after that visit at Summerlin?
- A. I understood I had a concussion.
- Q. Let's talk about the 2004 -- the second time you hit your head. Tell us what happened then.
  - A. Well, I was directing a play. Once upon a no, not that one. Best Christmas pageant ever for the church for the children in the church, and we were doing this Christmas play for the church. We had about 30 kids in it. And I was doing it with my friend Victor Austin and we would go from different churches.
- 21 And we had this portable stage that we would set up and 22 we did what's called theater in the round.
- 23 Anyway so we were at this church and I didn't 24 want to leave it messy so I was checking the rooms. I 25 went into the bathroom, the girl's bathroom. There was

paper towels on the floor. So I just picked them up. As I was coming up, bam. I hit my head on the towel, 3 towel dispenser. And I went, oh, no. 4 And so that was on -- I think that was on 5 Saturday night. And then Thursday -- by Thursday, I had -- you know, I had a headache every day and it was 7 just getting worse and worse and then I blanked out and I woke up in the hospital. 9 And did you have the same kind of neck 10 stiffness that you had the first time you hit your 11 head? 12 Α. I don't remember my neck at all. All I 13 remember is this intense headache and it lasted for 14 over a year. 15 Ο. Let me back up just a little bit. 16 After the September incident, how long did 17 your neck bother you? 18 Α. It was so long ago that I just don't have 10 much of a memory of that, so I just -- you know, a few weeks maybe, but I just don't have a memory of that. 20 21 It wasn't an issue to me. My head was. 22 The jury has heard a lot about a visit that 23 you had with Dr. Kermani where you had chest pain.

Do you remember going to see Dr. Kermani for

2	Q. And had you seen Dr. Kermani before that day?
3	A. Yes. He was my GP.
4	Q. And did you give him prior medical history
5	when you went to see him?
6	A. Yes.
7	Q. And for the record, I'm showing Defendant's
8	Exhibit J009. If you can see it on your TV screen ]
9	know it might be kind of hard to see. But No. 5 it
10	says and this is from 2007.
11	It says, Motor vehicle accident per history
12	with back pain, though quite infrequent flare-ups.
13	Is that an accurate description of what your
14	low back pain was like back in 2007?
15	A. Absolutely. Yes.
16	Q. So quite infrequent flare-ups would be
17	A. Occasional, yes.
18	Q. All right. So let's talk about that visit
19	with Dr. Kermani when you had the chest pain.
20	Do you remember when that was?
21	A. I don't remember the exact date, but it was
22	fall of 2008.
23	Q. And what symptoms were you having that led
24	you to go see Dr. Kermani?
25	A Well my chest was hurting and I had chost

pains and I had pain down my arm and I had numbness down both arms. And as I said, I had taken care of my mom and my dad for 12 years and my mother-in-law also had died of heart -- open-heart surgery and a consequence of that. So we were very concerned that I too was having some problem like my mom. And so we 6 7 just -- I made an appointment and went right in, so. And his records indicate reason for visit is 9 requesting heart check. 10 Does that summarize why you were there? 11 Α. Yes. Absolutely. 12 Ο. Did Dr. Kermani send you for any x-rays or 13 perform any x-rays after that visit? 14 You know, it was a long time ago, but I 15 remember that he did do a chest x-ray and a neck x-ray 16 in his office because he has or had, you know, the 17 x-ray machines there. 18 What's your understanding of what the neck 19 x-ray showed? 20 Α. Degeneration in my neck. 21 Were you having any neck pain at that time? Q. 22 Α. No. 23 Q. Did Dr. Kermani ever send you for any more 24 follow-up or any more treatment on your neck after he 25 took the x-ray?

1 Ā. No. From the time of that visit with him in 2008 3 until this crash, did anyone ever send you for any 4 treatment on your neck? 5 Α. 2008 to the crash, did you say? 6 0. Yes. 7 Α. No. 8 0.

- Were you sent for more treatment or testing for any other reason after you saw Dr. Kermani?
- 10 Α. Yes. Because he ordered a stress test on my 11 heart, and I failed.
- 12 0. And after you failed the stress test, were 13 you sent for any more evaluation?
  - Α. I was.

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- 15 Tell us about that. 0.
  - Α. On the 23rd of December, right before Christmas, that night I had to go into the hospital and get an angiogram the next morning. We were worried I wouldn't make it home for Christmas Eve with the children, with the family, but I was able to go home.
  - And then from that time of Dr. Kermani's visit until the time of the crash, just so we're clear, you didn't have any physical therapy, chiropractic, or any treatment with an orthopedic?
    - Α. No. My neck wasn't an issue.

Q. All right. Let's talk about the day of the accident.

Tell us where were you coming from, where were you going to when the accident happened.

A. Well, okay. So we did — we do this little class called Fairytale Theater for little three and four year olds. It's adorable. We dress them up in costumes and we put them on stage and we do a different fairytale every month and then they perform for their parents at the end of the month. They're absolutely adorable.

Well, my friend, whose little daughter was in the class, said — called me that morning — I was still in my exercise clothes from walking — and she said, Margie, nobody is here. The teacher is not here. And so I immediately got off with her and called the teacher, Jessica, and couldn't get in touch with her. Her phone was off. She had slept in.

So  $\overline{I}$  changed and got in my clothes or -- and got in my car from my house on Sunrise Mountain and drove over there to Hollywood Kids west.

- Q. I'm going to ask you some details about the accident. We're going to go step-by-step through it. Okay?
  - A. Yes.

1 So what intersection did the accident take Ō. 2 place? 3 Craig Road and Rancho. Α. 4 Ο. What street were you on? 5 Α. I was on Craig Road. What lane were you in on Craig? 6 Q. 7 Α. I was in the right-hand lane getting ready to 8 turn right to go to Hollywood Kids. 9 Were you moving or were you stopped before Q. 10 the accident? 11 Α. I was stopped. 12 What color was the light there? Q. 13 It was red. Α. 14 Q. Did the light ever turn to green before the 15 accident happened? 16 I don't remember that at all. Α. 17 0. And we'll talk a little bit more about this 18 later, but did you ever hear any tires screeching 19 before the impact? 20 I have no memory of tires screeching and -- I 21 just don't have any memory of that right at this time 22 at all and I haven't since then. 23 So you're waiting at the light. Tell us what Q. 24 happened from the time you stopped until the time of 25 the impact, and then I'll pick up the questions after

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1 that. 2 Well, I was looking forward and checking the -- all of the traffic and it kind of goes on a 4 diagonal. So you have to look back this way and I was 5 not looking behind me. I was looking forward. And so I was checking the traffic because I was going to make 6 7 a right-hand turn. 8 I was looking this way and the next thing I 9 knew, it was like, boom. And I, you know, whipped 10 forward and -- and I thought, what happened to me? Oh, 11 my gosh, you know. 12 And then I began to hurt really bad and I 13 began to -- my neck and my shoulder just were 14 incredibly hurt. And that's what I remember. 15 So let me just back up a little bit. 16 said you were looking at traffic. 17 Do you remember how your head was positioned 18 at the time of the impact? 19 Well, I was getting ready to make a 20 right-hand turn so I was having to look that way, but I 21 was not looking behind me. I was looking forward this

Q. And when you're indicating, just so the record is clear, you're indicating to the left?

way paying attention to the traffic.

A. Oh, yes, to the left right there because

1 that's where the traffic that I had to merge into. 2 And yesterday Mr. Jaffe pointed out that during your deposition you indicated that your head was forward at the time. So is what you're telling us 4 5 today different from what you told him during your deposition? 6 7 No. My head was forward. I wasn't looking 8 backwards at all. 9 So would it be fair to characterize that you 10 were looking forward and to the left? 11 Α. Yes. Yes. I was looking to the left. 12 MR. JAFFE: Objection. It's leading, Your 13 Honor. 14 THE COURT: Sustained. She already answered. 15 MR. JAFFE: Move to strike it. BY MS. BRASIER: 16 17 Margie, how would you characterize exactly 0. 18 how your head was turned at the time? 19 Well, I was getting ready to make a 20 right-hand turn so my head was here. I wasn't thinking 21 at all about what was going on behind me. I was 22 looking at the traffic that was coming this way. And 23 so that's how I would characterize -- I was paying 24 attention to what was going on in front of me. Looking 25 forward, so.

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- Ō. And you said you immediately felt some pain; is that right?
  - Α. I did.
- Q. Did you get out of your vehicle after the crash happened?
  - Α. No.
- Did you ever talk to the defendant after the Q. crash happened?
- Mr. Khoury came up to talk to me I remember and he was outside of my window. I looked at him. I said, I'm so sorry. I just can't talk right now. 12 said I'm hurting. You know, kind of mouthed it to him because I was hurting so badly and I was just shocked. 13 14 I just could not believe what happened to me.
  - And remind us again where were you feeling pain right when you were sitting there in your car?
  - I was feeling pain mostly that I remember right here and right here in my neck and my shoulder. That was my first feeling was, oh, my gosh, that hurt so bad.
  - And how was -- was that neck pain different from neck pain that you had felt before?
    - Α. This was intense. This was very intense.
- 24 So if you can describe what was -- what 0. 25 was -- how was it different? Besides being intense,

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was it in a different location? Describe for the jury so they can get an understanding of what the difference was.

A. Well, before I would just have stiff neck,

- you know, and so when you have a stiff neck you just -you know, it hurts. It hurts to move it at all. In
  this one moving, staying right here, it hurt. If I
  was -- it didn't matter whether I was trying to look at
  Mr. Khoury or I was doing this. I was crying and it
  just hurt to move at all, any movement.
- Q. And did you ever get out of your car at any time at the scene?
  - A. The paramedics helped me out.
  - Q. And why did they have to help you out?
- A. Because I couldn't get out. I couldn't move.

  And I thought, oh, my gosh, I've done something.

  What's wrong with me? I just didn't know. I didn't
- 1/ What's wrong with me? I just didn't know. I didn't know.

  18 know.
- Q. Why did you decide to take the ambulance from the scene?
- A. Well, because I didn't know what was wrong
  with me and I was in so much pain. I couldn't move. I
  couldn't -- I could hardly -- it was just awful. I
  could hardly even breathe it hurt so badly.
  - Q. Did you ever get out and look at your -- the



damage to your vehicle before you left the scene that day?

- A. No. No.
- Q. At any point later did you see the damage to your car?
  - A. I did, ves.
- Q. And what did you think when you saw that damage?
- A. Well, I thought you're kidding me. Is this possible? Could this have really happened to me? It was just like I can't this is incredible. That, you know, I could be feeling this way from that, so.
- Q. During opening statements it was pointed out that -- or indicated that your story has changed over time about how this accident happened. I want to ask you some questions about that.

Did you ever intentionally exaggerate or change the facts of the crash when you were telling things to your doctors?

- A. No.
- Q. Explain to the jury how it would typically happen. When you would see a new doctor, how they would get the history from you about what happened in the crash.
  - A. Well, we would -- you know, they would hand

1 me a form in the waiting room sometimes or they -- I would be laying there on the table, the exam table, and they would ask me questions. So some things would be written down and some 5 things you would talk to them about? 6 Α. Different doctors did it different ways. I 7 just did whatever they asked me to do. I just wanted 8 to get better. All right. Let's talk about some of the 10 records that were discussed during opening statements. 11 This is Defendant's Exhibit D003. I'll just -- I'll 12 read it for you. It says -- talking about the 13 accident -- the accident involved two vehicles and a low-impact velocity and resulted in mild damage to the 14 15 patient's vehicle. Estimated speed of the collision, 16 in parentheses, other vehicle 10 miles an hour. 17 Did you give that history to the physicians at MountainView Hospital? 18 19 Α. I don't talk like that so that's not my 20 words. No, I didn't. That was probably Doug or the 21 police officer. 22 As you read that description, is there 23 anything that's inaccurate about it or does it seem 24 about right?

It seems right to me. I -- I don't remember

there.

1 it at all and I was hurting and they gave me morphine and I didn't care. I just wanted to get better. 3 Let's look at the next record. This is from when you saw Dr. Lurie on March 12, 2009, a week after 4 the accident. And this is defendant or this is 5 6 plaintiff's exhibit -- Plaintiff's Exhibit 5. It's 7 007. This history indicates Ms. Seastrand stated 8 that she stopped at a red light and was suddenly 10 rear-ended, pushed forward more than a little. Ms. Seastrand stated she was unaware she was about to 11 12 be impacted by the other vehicle and, therefore, did 13 not try to brace herself. Ms. Seastrand stated she was 14 moderately jolted and dazed by the impact. 15 Is that what you told Dr. Lurie about the 16 accident? 17 Α. Yes. 18 Q. Anything in that statement seem inaccurate? 19 Α. No, not that I can tell. 20 Q. All right. Let's look at Plaintiff's 21 Exhibit 17. This is from when you went to see Dr. Shah 22 in December of 2009. For the record, it's 0011. And I 23 want to kind of break up this statement a little bit 24 and talk about some of the -- the information that's in

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patient did hit her head on the headrest but she did not lose consciousness.

Is that accurate?

- Q. She was shooken up and needed assistance with the paramedics to exit her vehicle.
  - A. Yes.
- Q. And she was in a lot of neck pain initially and while in the car; is that right?
- 10 A. Yes.
  - Q. Just so the jury understands kind of how things work, did your medical providers ever give you copies of those medical records after they were transcribed so that you could review them?
    - A. No.
  - Q. All right. The jury has heard a lot about your medical treatment since the crash. I don't want to go through everything. We're just going to hit the highlights but before we talk about that, I want to talk about your 1985 accident and the intermittent neck and back pain you talked about.

When you wrote 26 years, were you trying to 9 indicate that you had had back pain constantly 10 throughout that time? 11 It's just they asked the question how Α. No. 12 long did you have neck and back pain so that was how 13 long I had had that occasional pain. 14 The next one I'm going to show you is 15 Plaintiff's Exhibit 19. This is from when you saw 16 Nevada Spine Clinic on April 29, 2010. 17 Is this your handwriting on the --18 Α. Yes. 19 Ō. -- page? 20 And at the bottom there where it says list 21 previous serious injuries, what did you write? 22 Α. I wrote the 1981 and the 1985 accidents. 23 And why did you include those in the serious 24 injury section? 25 Well, the surgical history was before that, Α.

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and I wrote that down and the medical history. This was the only place that it had asked for injuries. I was injured in both of those and so for me that's where it belonged.

- Q. All right. To your knowledge, do any of the records from either the 1981 or 1985 accidents, do any of those medical records exist any more?
- A. I have no knowledge of that. I don't think so. It's a long time ago. Long, long time ago.
- Q. Why did you tell your doctors about these prior car accidents if there was no way for them to ever find out about it?
  - A. Well, because that was the truth. I was in those accidents. Those were injuries that I had sustained and I'm honest and I, you know, wanted them to know what happened.
  - Q. And you told us before that you never went -- after 1985 you never went to the doctor because of neck or back pain; is that right?
- 20 A. Not as my primary complaint ever, no.
- Q. So why did you tell your doctors about this intermittent pain that you had had if there was no way for them to find out otherwise?
- A. Just because I'm trying to be as honest and thorough. All I cared about was getting better. And

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1 so they needed as much information as I could possibly remember at the time, and I know I was in pain so much 2 3 I just wanted to get better. Let's talk about getting better. Let's talk 4 5 about your treatment. How did your neck and back feel in those 6 7 first few weeks after the crash when you were going to 8 the chiropractor? 9 Α. Oh, it just hurt so badly. It was just so 10 intense. It was every day. Every day. Just banging 11 on me every day. 12 And tell the jury where you were feeling that 13 pain in your body. 14 I was feeling the pain in my neck. My 15 shoulder started to go away. That didn't persist at 16 all. It was just my neck and my low back and I -- just 17 it was -- I was just in so much pain. 18 Did you have any pain in either your arms or Q. 19 your legs? 20 I did. As a matter of fact, numbness just kept getting worse and it kept staying every day and I 21 never experienced that. If I woke up on the wrong side 22 23 of the bed, the numbness would just go away, but it

didn't. It just kept getting worse and worse.

Q. When you were answering, you were kind of

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indicating to your right arm. Was the right worse than the left?

- A. Yes, the right was worse than my left arm.
- Q. Yesterday when your daughter Beth was describing this time period, she used the term couch bound to describe your activities.

Do you think that's an accurate description?

- A. Yes. I even I laid down all the time to try and avoid a big surgery, and I did everything they told me to do but my couch actually had an indentation. We had to get a new couch.
- Q. And how is this pain that you were feeling in those first few weeks after the accident when you're going to the chiropractor, how is that different from any neck or back pain you had felt before?
- A. Well, as I said, you know, when you wake up with a stiff neck or something, you're hurting and you have some numbness and then it just goes away after a day or two. But, you know, this was like constant. It just would not go away. And I just you can't get free of it. You can't walk away from it. There's nothing you can do.
- Q. Did you feel like the chiropractic treatment gave any long-term benefit?
  - A. No. No. And I was hoping it would but it

didn't.

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- Q. Did you eventually get some injections with Dr. Belsky?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. And you had them both in your neck and your back, right?
  - A. Right.
- Q. Did either the injections in your neck, your back give you relief for any extended period of time?
  - A. Yes, they did. And I was very thankful.
- Q. Describe that. How long did it give you relief?
  - A. You know, the neck it seemed like it was a couple of months. My back, you know, it was a little less, but I can't say exactly how long it was. But, you know, it definitely helped.
- Q. Did Dr. Belsky ever refer you to any orthopedic surgeons?
- A. Yes. After my -- after those steroids wore
  off, then we just didn't want to give me too much, too
  much steroids. She said, Margie, I think we're going
  to have to -- she referred me to Dr. Muir.
- Q. And when you first met with Dr. Muir, did he discuss any treatment options for you for your low back?

I did.

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He did. He did. 1 Ā. What were some of those options he talked to 2 Q. 3 you about? He talked to me -- because I was getting the injections from Dr. Belsky. Then he talked to me about 5 6 the plasma disc decompression. Did you ultimately decide to get that? 7 8 Α. I did. Why did you decide to go with that treatment 9 Q. 10 option? Well, because I did not -- I did not want a 11 Α. back surgery. I had heard horror stories of back 12 surgeries. And so I felt like let's just do everything 13 we can to just get better, you know, and I did 14 everything they told me to do, to the best of my 15 16 ability. 17 Did the plasma disc decompression help your 0. 18 back pain at all? 19 Ā. No. And were you disappointed when that didn't 20 Q. 21 work? 22 Α. Yes. Later did you decide to have Dr. Muir do the 23 Q. 24 surgery on your neck?

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- Q. And what made you decide to have that surgery?
- A. Well, we discussed all the options. The pain got so bad down my arm and the tingling and the numbness down my arm and I just I was just going crazy. I was just I can't do this anymore. And Dr. Muir said, I think we should do this. My husband and I talked about it and we decided that was the right thing for me. And it was awesome. When I woke up, it was so much better. I love Dr. Muir.
  - Q. When did you have the neck surgery?
- 12 A. That was in January of '10.
  - Q. And you said you woke up and it was awesome.
    What was awesome about it?
  - A. It was just incredible. I woke up and my arm just felt like no tingling at all. I had just a little bit right here and I just I remember at a follow-up visit I just hugged him. I just hugged him and I just said, thank you so much because I got that back. It was a miracle to me.
    - Q. What was your recovery period like?
    - A. For my neck?

I did. 8 Q. Tell us what happened where you restrained 9 your back. 10 Α. Well, Hollywood Kids was suffering. We 11 opened up our theater in 2008. Right smack dab in the middle of the recession, we take on this big mortgage, 12 13 so I was working up until the time of the accident. 14 And anyway, it was suffering, Hollywood Kids was. So I 15 agreed to -- I said, okay, I'm going to come in and do 16 this little summer workshop of three weeks and we're 17 going to do the play Seven Brides for Seven Brothers. 18 And I had a bunch of assistants helping me and I had a 19 rolling chair and I said -- you know, because I 20 couldn't afford to pay another director. - Q. Did you ever have any other instance where you did try to pick up a child and you hurt your back?
  - A. Never. Not after that.
- Q. After you went back to see Dr. Khavkin in August, so about three months after your accident, did he recommend any more treatment after this incident?
- A. I'm sorry. Could you tell me -- I just tried to get the time line again. What did you say?
- Q. After this incident where you bent down to help the child, did Dr. Khavkin send you for any more treatment, or did he want to do anything else to your low back?
- A. Yes. He didn't send me for more treatment but he threatened me with the rods in my back and I begged him, please, please. I'll be really good. I won't do anything. Nothing. I won't do anything. And I was because I just couldn't go through that again. I didn't want that back surgery. And so he was very kind and patient with me and I was blessed because my bone fused and grew through and he didn't have to do

  - Q. Did you have to take them more frequently as you've been sitting here through trial than you would during a normal week?
  - A. Absolutely. Because I can't lay down and I have to get up and walk. I just can't sit a long time. I'm sorry about that. I just can't sit a long time.
  - Q. I want to help the jury understand, you know, how your activity level changed before and after the crash.

So before the crash, you know, how were your household activities divided between you and your other family members?

A. Well, excuse me, Doug works four 10s and works full-time so he pretty much takes care of the outside of the house and he does the finances. He's better than that. And he does like the garage but if he needs help organizing, I go out in the garage and help him with that. And then he repairs everything if there's something that needs to be repaired.

And then I keep a very clean house. I just like a clean house. And so before I would vacuum two or three times a week. But the kids I had them on rotating things that they had to do as well, you know, of that.

But after the accident vacuuming was terrible and bending over like to do the dishes and unload the dishwasher, you know, that became very painful. The kids they just did everything. They're such good kids. They just piled in and helped mom. That's what they did, so.

- Q. What about cooking? Did you like to cook before the accident?
- A. I love to cook. As a matter of fact, I'm famous for my cinnamon rolls and my rolls. And I

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1 actually did them as fund-raisers for the kids and for the choir and the volleyball teams. I love to do that. 3 It requires a lot of stamina to cook, as you know, and to chop and do all of that. And so I just couldn't do 5 it all. I just couldn't stand there and cook for my family. 6 7 Q. What about doing laundry? What did you used 8

- to do before and after the crash?
- I trained my kids. Since the time they were 12, they did their own laundry. Thank goodness. just -- Doug and I -- and Doug would do the laundry not extremely well, but he did the laundry while I was down a lot and so that was pretty much how we got through it.
- And you told us -- when we very first started, you told us kind of what you were doing with Hollywood Kids the year before the accident happened.

How was your -- how did your role at Hollywood Kids change right after the crash?

Well, as I just got worse and worse and Α. worse, I just had to get more helpers to help me get through that first semester when I was teaching -- I 23 mean, that semester of the accident because I had to -of course, I was the director and I had to help get them through there, but I just -- there was days I just



couldn't even go and it just got worse and worse. So I had to get help and then I had to eventually -- in the fall I didn't teach at all.

- Q. And when you say fall, fall of what year?
- A. Of 2009.
  - Q. You didn't teach any classes?
- A. I couldn't because Dr. Belsky and I were trying to see if I could just stay down and avoid surgery that maybe it would get better.
- Q. Any other areas that we haven't talked about that had some kind of change before and after?
- A. Well, I like to do Sea-Doos. That's just my favorite thing. And I after this a year after this surgery was the only time I called Dr. Khavkin because we were going with Hollywood Kids on a we have a group that performs internationally called Ovation that my daughter Beth directs and they were going to perform on a cruise ship in the Bahamas. And so I went with them and I called him. I said, can I go Sea-Dooing with my family? And he said, well, it's been a year. You should be able to try that.

So we went and did Sea-Doos and I had to take pain medication after that. So I have not been back doing that. And my family liked to go and hike, do some hiking and Boogie Boarding and I don't do that. I

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just -- careful. I'm just being cautious.

- Q. What about family vacations? Have those changed for you at all before to after?
- A. Yes. Because I used to be able to go and do everything with the kids and with Doug. Like, you know, go down and hike here and there and whatever it was, but I can't do that any more. So when we go to the beach, I stay on the beach and the kids go in the water and Doug goes in the water and they all Boogie Board but I don't.
  - Q. Why don't you?
- A. Well, because I'm -- I don't want to do
  anything that would mess up anything that anybody has
  done. I feel like I'm going to be a grandma someday so
  I don't want to mess anything up with my family. I
