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MR. BUNIN: He says this is not normal. He normally would be able to sleep.

THE COURT: Right. Well, I mean, I think that's something pretty much anybody would experience if they're in the middle of a murder trial. I mean, I can't imagine anything more stressful than that.

Now, you know, if there's a physician or something at the jail he can see about a sleeping pill, you know, he has to request that through the detention center or you have to request that through the detention center. But all I'm saying is I don't know what -- I mean, I think that's natural. And any time we do this trial, I think Mr. Carroll is going to be suffering from stress and probably have trouble sleeping.

MR. BUNIN: I'm sure it's true.

THE COURT: I just think that's natural.

MR. BUNIN: I just hope he gets some sleep at some point. From a defense perspective, we just want him to be able to listen and give us input when that's necessary.

THE COURT: Obviously. As I said, I mean, if he wants to request -- I don't know how the procedure is -- through the detention center that he sees somebody, that might be something you want to look into. I don't know how it that

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COURT OFFICER: Yeah, he'll just have to submit a KIT through either -- you know, some sort of mental anguish through our mental section or medical and they'll try to evaluate, but I'm not sure if they'll give him any type of sleeping pill or not.

MR. BUNIN: I don't even know if they'll evaluate him before the trial is done, frankly, even if we request it.

THE COURT: Yeah. Like I said, I mean, I think that that's -- whenever you do the trial, I mean, that's something that, to me, is totally natural and anybody's going to be experiencing that.

MR. BUNIN: I appreciate that. I just don't know if the complete lack of sleep is normal and hopefully he'll get some sleep tonight. And I guess I will just tell Your Honor, if he gets to a point where he's saying he's absolutely not able to listen or if he's falling asleep -- I don't want him falling asleep in front of the jury.

THE COURT: Clearly.

MR. BUNIN: I don't want the jury to think he's disinterested.

THE COURT: Right.

MR. BUNIN: So I just wanted to make that record.

THE COURT: If that's an issue, you can bring it

to --

MR. BUNIN: Thank you.

THE COURT: -- my attention and at that point in time we can take a break and he can consult. But all I'm saying is if you think it's going to be an issue, then what he needs to do is do the KIT to see if somebody can see him to give him, I don't know, Xanax. See, the other problem is that the detention center -- obviously, a lot of these psychological narcotic type drugs they're not going to give the inmates.

MR. BUNIN: Right.

THE COURT: So I don't know even what the possibilities are of what they can get.

MR. BUNIN: And I don't know. I just know that doing the KIT can take a lot of time, but I'm going to tell them to do that today and hopefully we'll get some resolution.

THE COURT: Right. Or you can even expedite it.

But, like I said, I know that some drugs they won't give at
the detention center.

MR. BUNIN: Yes.

THE COURT: I mean, a shot of whiskey would take care of the problem, but obviously they can't give him that either.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Just briefly, Judge, I know we ciscussed this, the State has decided at least in the case in chief we do not intend to call Anabel or Jayson.

THE COURT: Okay.

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MR. DiGIACOMO: Also -- well, I don't think that either counsel would do that. They obviously are aware that any conversations we've had with any defendant including Mr. Carroll since his arrest through his counsel is not relevant in this proceeding.

MR. BUNIN: I'm sorry. Can you repeat that?

MR. DiGIACOMO: Any conversations we've had with Mr. Carroll through his counsel are not relevant in this proceed. Any discussion of any possible plea deals or anything else is not relevant in the jury trial.

THE COURT: Right. I agree.

MR. BUNIN: So just so we're clear, so they're not calling Anabel and Jay Jay in their case in chief, so it's not something we'll talk about in the opening.

THE COURT: In your opening, right.

MR. BUNIN: I'm still going to make an argument when they try to admit the tape that they're not going to be able to lay the foundation without Anabel. I know that Your Honor is inclined to rule a certain way, but you'll wait to hear the arguments, but I know — I'm certain they're going to reference it in their opening, so I want to make it clear that I still intend to try to argue that it's not admissible based on —

THE COURT: And we had a preliminary discussion

about the ability of a police officer to authenticate the voices on the tape having subsequently spoken with the individuals involved.

MR. DiGIACOMO: And the Court has previously ruled in other cases it was admissible based on the same argument and so I would imagine we have a pretty good faith basis to believe that it will come in.

MR. BUNIN: I just wanted to make sure it was clear before the opening. That's all.

THE COURT: Okay. Where's Jeff? All right. We can start.

(Jury reconvened at 11:33 a.m.)

THE COURT: All right. Court is now back in session. The record will reflect the presence of the State through the deputy district attorneys, the presence of Mr. Carroll and his counsel, the officers of the Court and the members of the jury.

Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. At the outset I'd like to apologize for our tardy, very tardy start this morning. Our morning calendar ran much longer than what was anticipated. The maybe good news is tomorrow I have found another judge to hear my calendar so we will be getting an earlier start and we'll be able to start right at 9:00 o'clock tomorrow morning because we won't have any calendar to be held over because I know it's very frustrating for jurors to have

to sit around and wait in the hall and for that I apologize.

As I told you yesterday, we're going to begin today with the Court reading some introductory comments and then the attorneys will have the attorney to make their opening statements. But before we do that -- thank you, Ms. Husted -- the clerk needs to administer the oath to the members of the jury. If all 15 of you will please rise and raise your right hands.

(Jurors sworn.)

THE COURT: All right. Ladies and gentlemen, I'm now going to take a few minutes to talk to you about what to expect in this case. My comments are intended to serve as an introduction to the trial. At the end of the trial I will give you more detailed instructions in writing and those instructions will control your deliberations.

This is a criminal case brought by the State of Nevada against the defendant. The case is based on an indictment. The clerk will now read that and state the plea of the defendant.

THE CLERK: Yes, Your Honor.

Department XXI. Information.

David Roger, District Attorney within and for the County of Clark, State of Nevada, in the name and by the authority of the State of Nevada, informs the Court:

That Kenneth Counts, aka, Kenneth Jay Counts II,
Luis Alonso Hidalgo, aka, Luis Alonso Hidalgo, III, Anabel
Espindola, and Deangelo Reshawn Carroll, the defendants above
named, having committed the crimes of conspiracy to commit
murder, felony; murder with use of a deadly weapon, felony,
and on or between May 19, 2005, and May 24, 2005, within the
County of Clark, State of Nevada, contrary to the form, force,
and effect of statutes in such cases made and provided, and
against the peace and dignity of the State of Nevada.

Count 1, conspiracy to commit murder. Defendants
Kenneth Jay Counts, aka, Kenneth Jay Counts II, and Luis
Alonso Hidalgo, aka, Luis Alonso Hidalgo, III, Anabel
Espindola, Deangelo Reshawn Carroll, and Jayson Taoipu did, on
or between May 19, and May 24, 2005, then and there meet with
each other and/or Luis Hidalgo, Jr. and between themselves,
and each of them with the other, wilfully, unlawfully, and
feloniously conspire and agree to commit a crime, to-wit:
Murder, and in furtherance of said conspiracy, defendants
and/or their coconspirators, did commit such acts as set forth
in Counts 1 and 2, said acts being incorporated by this
reference as though fully set forth herein.

Count 2, murder with use of a deadly weapon.
Defendants Kenneth Jay Counts, aka, Kenneth Jay Counts II, and
Luis Alonso Hidalgo, aka, Luis Alonso Hidalgo, III, Anabel
Espindola, Deangelo Reshawn Carroll and Jayson Taoipu did, on
or about May 19, 2005, then and there wilfully, feloniously,
without authority of law, and with premeditation and
deliberation and with malice aforethought, kill Timothy Jay
Hadland, a human being, by shooting at or into the body and/or
head of said Timothy Jay Hadland, with a deadly weapon.
To-wit: A firearm, the defendants being liable under one or
more of the following theories of criminal liability, to-wit:
One, by directly or indirectly committing the acts with
premeditation and deliberation and/or lying in wait; and/or
two, by aiding and abetting the commission of the crime by,
directly or indirectly, counseling, encouraging, hiring,
commanding, inducing or otherwise procuring each other to
commit the crime, to-wit: By defendant Anabel Espindola
and/or defendant Luis Hidalgo, III and/or Luis Luis
Hidalgo, Jr., procuring defendant Deangelo Carroll to beat
and/or kill Timothy Jay Counts Timothy Jay Hadland, I'm
sorry; therefore defendant Deangelo Carroll procuring Kenneth
Counts and/or Jayson Taoipu to shoot Timothy Hadland;
thereafter, defendant Deangelo Carroll and Kenneth Counts and
Jayson Taoipu did drive to the location in the same vehicle;
thereafter, defendant Deangelo Carroll calling victim Timothy

Jay Hadland to the scene; thereafter, by Kenneth Counts shooting Timothy Jay Hadland; and/or, three, by conspiring to commit the crime of battery and/or battery with use of a deadly weapon and/or to kill Timothy Jay Hadland whereby each and every coconspirator is responsible for the foreseeable acts of each and every coconspirator during the course and in furtherance of the conspiracy to which the defendant has entered a plea of not quilty.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you, Ms. Husted.

Ladies and gentlemen, you should distinctly understand that the Information just read to you is simply a description of the charges made by the State against the defendant. It is not evidence of anything. It does not prove anything. The defendant starts out with a clean slate. The defendant has pled not guilty and is presumed innocent.

This is a criminal case and there are two basic rules you must keep in mind. First, the defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proved guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. The defendant is not required to present any evidence or prove his innocence. The law never imposes upon a defendant in a criminal case the burden of calling any witnesses or introducing any evidence.

Second, to convict, the State must prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the crime is committed and the defendant

is the person who committed the crime.

It will be your duty to decide from the evidence to be presented whether the defendant is guilty or not guilty.

You are the sole judges of the facts. You will decide what the facts are from the evidence which will be presented.

The evidence will consist of testimony of witnesses and documents and other things received into evidence as exhibits. You must apply the facts to the law which I shall give you and in that way reach your verdict.

It is important you perform your duty of determining the facts diligently and conscientiously for ordinarily there is no way of correcting an erroneous determination of facts by the jury.

You should not take anything I may say or do during the trial as indicating my opinion as to how you should decide the case or to influence you in any way in your determination of the facts. At times I may even ask questions of witnesses. If I do so, it is for the purpose of bringing out matters which should be brought out and not in any way to indicate my opinion about the facts or to indicate the weight or value you should give to the testimony of a witness.

There are two kinds of evidence, direct and circumstantial. Direct evidence is testimony about what the witness personally saw, heard or did.

Circumstantial evidence is indirect evidence. It is

proof of one or more facts from which one can find another fact. By way of example: If you wake up in the morning and see the ground, the sidewalks and the streets are all wet and water is running down the gutters, you may find from those facts that it rained during the night. It is proof of one or more facts from which you can find another fact.

Conversely, if you are awake during the night and saw the rainfall, that would be direct evidence, which is something you personally saw. You may consider both direct and circumstantial evidence in deciding this case. The law permits you to give equal weight or value to both, but it is for you to decide how much consideration to give to any evidence.

Certain things are not evidence and you must not consider them as evidence in deciding the facts of this case. They include: Statements and arguments by the attorneys, questions and objections of the attorneys, testimony I instruct you to disregard, and anything you may see or hear if the Court is not in decision, even if what you see or hear is done or said by one of the parties or one of the witnesses.

Remember, evidence is sworn testimony from the witness stand by a witness while court is in session and documents and other things received into evidence as exhibits.

There are rules of law which control what can be received into evidence. When a lawyer asks a question or

offers an exhibit into evidence and the lawyer on the other sides thinks that it is not permitted by the rules, that lawyer may object. If I overrule the objection, the question may be answered or the exhibit received. If I sustain the objection, the question cannot be answered and the exhibit cannot be received.

Whenever I sustain an objection to a question, ignore the question and do not guess what the answer might have been. Sometimes I may order evidence stricken from the record and tell you to disregard or ignore such evidence. This means when you are deciding the case you must not consider the evidence which I have told you to disregard.

It is the duty of a lawyer to object to evidence which the lawyer believes may not be permitted under the rules. You should not be prejudice in any way against the lawyer who makes objections on behalf of the party the lawyer represents. Also, I may find it necessary to admonish a lawyer. If I do, you should not be prejudice towards the lawyer or client because I found it necessary to admonish him.

Only if you find the defendant guilty of first-degree murder will the jury decide the sentence the defendant may receive.

At the end of the trial, you'll have to make your decision based on what you recall of the evidence. You will not have a written transcript to consult and it is difficult

and time consuming for the Court recorder to play back lengthy testimony. Therefore, I urge you to pay close attention to the testimony as it is given. If you wish, you may take notes to help you remember what witnesses said. If you do take notes, please keep them to yourself until you and your fellow jurors go to the jury room to decide the case. Do not let note taking distract you so that you do not hear other answers by witnesses. You should rely upon your own memory of what was said and not be overly influenced by the notes of other jurors.

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Do not make up your mind about what the verdict should be until after you've gone to the jury room to decide the case and you and your fellow jurors have discussed the evidence. It is important that you keep an open mind.

A juror may not declare to a fellow juror any fact relating to this case of which the juror has knowledge. If any juror discovers during trial or after the jury has retired that that juror or any other juror has personal knowledge of any fact in controversy in this case, that juror shall disclose that situation to me in the absence of the other jurors.

This means that if you learn during the course of the trial that you have personal knowledge of any fact which is not presented by the evidence in this case, you must declare that fact to me. Once again, you communicate to the

Court through the bailiff.

During the course of this trial the attorneys for both sides and all court personnel other than the bailiff are not permitted to converse with members of the jury. These individuals are not being antisocial. They are bound by ethics and the law not to talk to you. To do so might contaminate your verdict.

The trial will proceed in the following manner. The deputy district attorney will make an opening statement which is an outline to help you understand what the State expects to prove. Next, the defendant's attorney may but does not have to make an opening statement.

Opening statements serve as an introduction to the evidence which the party making the statement intends to prove. The State will then present its evidence and counsel for the defendant may cross-examine the witnesses. Following the State's case, the defendant may present evidence and the deputy district attorney may cross-examine those witnesses. However, as I have already said, the defendant is not required or obligated to present any evidence or to call any witnesses.

After all the evidence has been presented, I will instruct you on the law. After the instructions on the law have been read to you, each side has the opportunity to present oral argument. What is said in closing argument is not evidence. The arguments are designed to summarize and

interpret the evidence. Since the State has the burden of proving the defendant guilty beyond a reasonable doubt, the State has the right to open and close the arguments.

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After the arguments have been completed, you will retire to deliberate on your verdict.

Jurors are now permitted to ask questions of witnesses. If you have a question for a witness, I ask that you write it down using a full sheet of your notebook paper and then wait until the attorneys for both sides have had an opportunity to question the witness, because very often one of the lawyers will ask your questions. Then, if not, please get my attention or the bailiff's attention and he will retrieve your question. The questions from the jurors are governed by the same rules of evidence which control the questions that are admissible that the lawyers ask. So please don't be offended if I don't ask one of your questions. That does not mean it's not a good question or an interesting question, but it could call for hearsay or some other type of inadmissible evidence, and for that reason I may not be asking your question.

That concludes my introductory remarks.

Is the State prepared to go forward with their opening statements?

MR. DiGIACOMO: Your Honor, if we could just let the school children out before.

THE COURT: Thank you.

STATE'S OPENING STATEMENT

MR. DiGIACOMO: Someone once said half told truths are half mended. The whole truth in this case is that that man, Deangelo Carroll, was asked by the owner of the Palomino, an individual by the name of Luis Hidalgo or Mr. H, to -- first he says meet, but then he makes it clear, I want you to kill Timothy J. Hadland.

Timothy Hadland is a friend of Deangelo Carroll's. He's an individual that he worked with for other six months and he was a former employee of the Palomino who left under some argument as to whether or not TJ was doing something wrong at the Palomino Club or not. But Mr. Carroll and what the evidence will show is that TJ was bad mouthing the club to cab drivers and causing the club to lose money. The Palomino Club, as you've heard before, is a topless -- actually, it's a fully nude bar that actually serves alcohol, the only one here in the valley that does both of those things.

The truth of this case is that five years ago today, Mr. Carroll goes and finds a hit man that he knows by the name of Kenneth Counts. He loads up his van with both himself and a juvenile by the name of Jayson Taoipu, an individual by the name of Rontae Zone and Mr. Counts.

He lures TJ out to a dark area, because TJ was out by the lake. He lures him off to North Shore Road, and when

he gets there and Kenneth Counts — that's Mr. Hadland. Two shots from a 357 to the side of the head, one entering in his cheek, one entering in his ear, immediately killing Mr. Hadland, leaving him dead on the side of the road.

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He lays there for a few minutes. It's 11:00 o'clock, 11:30-ish at night when an individual who's driving home from the lake or driving around the lake sees his body, stops, calls, 9-1-1. The police arrive and obviously the detectives show up.

They find TJ's girlfriend car lying — on the road some distance from where he's lying, several feet — more than that — it's 100 feet or so. They find a pneumatic tube. Any of you have ever been to the bank or at least the old style of the bank where you could utilize this tube or sometimes when you use — you go to the pharmacy and they have these tubes. They find a cell phone in Mr. Hadland's vehicle. It's TJ's cell phone, which is important in the case. On the side of the road they find a whole bunch of fliers from the Palomino club.

The officers look into the cell phone and the last phone call was an individual by the name of Deangelo on the phone. Cops at this point don't know what happened.

Eventually they realize that Mr. Hadland's girlfriend, a woman by the name of Paijik who is actually the owner of the car, is still down at the campground at the lake, and they locate

Paijik down at the lake and she says TJ left last night to meet Deangelo to smoke some marijuana. He hasn't come back.

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The police think it might be really important to find Mr. Carroll. They learn that Mr. Carroll was an employee of the Palomino Club. They learn that the owner of the Palomino Club is Mr. H. They make a phone call to Mr. H. They have Mr. H respond down there. They have a conversation with Mr. H and learn that Deangelo Carroll is, in fact, an employee of the Palomino Club and they learn that he's supposed to be on duty that night, the night of the 20th, at the Palomino Club and the cops decide they're going to come back to the scene.

Luis Hidalgo, Jr., Mr. H, he has two managers of his club. He has his son, Luis Hidalgo, III, also known as Little Lou, and Anabel Espindola. You will hear her referred to as a manager and handles all the sheets and the paperwork for the Palomino. You'll hear her referred to as the manager, but she's also the long-time girlfriend of Luis Hidalgo, Jr., Mr. H. There's Mr. Carroll back in 2005.

Mr. Carroll's job at the Palomino is kind of a rover. He does kind of everything. He'll work the front door, he'll DJ for a period of time, and then he'll do what's known as promotions. What you'll learn is that cab drivers get paid when they bring employees to the Palomino Club that are — sorry, when they bring customers to the Palomino Club.

They get paid money, the cab drivers do, for bringing the business up there. If the person who's coming to the club doesn't have a VIP card, they pay more money, the cab driver gets paid more money. If the person has a VIP card, they can get through the door for either a reduced rate or for free.

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And that all will becomes important, but what happens is Mr. Carroll's job is to go out and tell the cab companies as well as go down the Strip and hand out information, VIP cards to potential customers in order to get business up to North Las Vegas because business is very dependent up there on the cab rides that come there as well as the people who will go there, the customers going traveling out of their way, because it's not in the normal area of town where most of the strip clubs are.

Mr. Carroll has a couple of younger friends. Rontae Zone here is, I think, 18 years old on the day of the murder. Jayson Taoipu is actually 17 years old. They're two kids. They're not employees of the Palomino, but they -- Mr. Carroll provides a couple of dollars, 20, \$30 a day for Jayson and Rontae to help go around and pass out these fliers and pass out this information to the cab companies. And on May 19 of 2005 both Jayson and Rontae are with Mr. Carroll during the daytime promoting.

Another player you need to know about is Kenneth Counts, KC. Mr. Counts lives across the street from Deangelo

Carroll and catercornered from his mother's house.

Mr. Carroll has known Mr. Counts for a period of time and he knows that Kenneth Counts is the type of guy who would kill somebody for money. And he confirms it with him that he'll kill somebody for money. And you'll learn that Mr. Carroll actually utilizes Mr. Counts to commit the killing because Mr. Carroll doesn't actually want to pull the trigger.

What's the story of what happened on May 19th?

Mr. Carroll's using the white van to promote the club. He has

Jayson and Rontae with him. And he tells Jayson and Rontae

that Mr. H wants somebody -- and the term he used is "dealt

with." You will hear Rontae tell you that he knew that meant

to kill him. You will hear that Jayson says, Yeah, I'm

willing to do that. You'll also hear that Rontae says, No, I

don't want any part of this.

You'll hear that Mr. Carroll gives Jayson a .22 caliber firearm and then he tries to give Rontae the bullets to go with the firearm and you'll hear kind of a discussion about what happens with these bullets.

You will hear that Little Lou, the son right here --my pointer's not working, but the second one in -- calls
Mr. Carroll. There is a discussion in this case about whether
it's on a walkie-talkie or whether or not it's over a real
phone. The phone records establish that Little Lou calls
Mr. Carroll at home. Little Lou tells Mr. Carroll to bring

baseball bats and garbage bags because there's something that has to be done, and then Mr. Carroll loads up Rontae and Jayson and they drive over to the club.

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You'll hear that Mr. Carroll winds up going into the office and Little Lou is not there yet. You'll hear that Mr. H is there. You'll hear that Mr. H says that he wants TJ taken care of. You'll hear that he initially said, I want him beat, and then he said, No, you know what, I want him killed.

You'll hear that after this conversation, because Mr. Carroll didn't want to do it himself, he drives over with Rontae and Jayson and he goes over and he gets Mr. Counts and goes -- gets out of the car leaving Rontae and Jayson inside. Mr. Carroll enters the house. KC then leaves with Mr. Carroll dressed all in black and wearing black gloves and at this point Kenneth Counts has a 357 firearm.

They leave E Street and begin driving towards Lake Mead. Now, some of you might think Lake Mead -- anyone who's lived here a long time and Lake Mead and how to get up to Lake Mead, you'll know that there's really two -- well, there used to be two Lake Meads and now there's kind of one. They're on the north Lake Mead so up by Hollywood and Lake Mead, the north side of town, not on the south side by Henderson.

As they're doing that, Carroll -- Mr. Carroll's calling TJ and his ruse to TJ is that he wants to get some marijuana and he wants to know whether or not TJ has some

marijuana. And you'll hear about this trip. You'll hear that Mr. Carroll drives by a kiosk to get into Lake Mead, he loses cell phone reception, he has to come back out to get reception again. He goes back in again to make several phone calls to both TJ and to Anabel Espindola.

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Now, the subject of the conference with Anabel Espindola may be slightly in dispute. One of two things happens: Either Anabel Espindola specifically tells

Mr. Carroll if he's alone, kill him; if he's by himself -- or if he's with somebody, beat him, beat him really badly; or she merely says the words, Mr. Carroll, go to Plan B, either way implying there's a Plan A. When they arrive at the location, Mr. Counts does what he's been hired to do.

back through the southern part of the valley, the old Lake
Mead, which is now St. Rose that turns into 215, that old road
down there. But they come back through by the old Fiesta down
there. They come back up 95. There's some concern there may
be blood on the tires. They get back to the Palomino.
Mr. Carroll enters the Palomino with KC. KC waits downstairs,
outside the office. Mr. Carroll goes inside the office.
Mr. Carroll tells Mr. H the deed has been done. Mr. H orders
Anabel to go to the back, get some money. Mr. Counts gets
paid several thousand dollars for his killing.

During this time period Jayson and Rontae are

sitting outside of the club in a van -- in the van when KC comes out and he's kind of upset because Deangelo's still inside talking to Mr. H. KC's been paid. He just wants to leave. And eventually instead of waiting for Mr. Carroll to drive him home, he jumps in a yellow cab.

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Mr. Carroll and Jayson remove the tires from the van. They cut the tires. They throw the tires away in dumpsters and get four new tires for this van. They also go to the carwash. They wash the van. Mr. Carroll's so upset about the death of his son [sic] he takes them all out to breakfast at I-Hop and he pays with cash that he receives from committing the killing.

But this story isn't just the story you're going to hear from Rontae Zone. This isn't the story you're going to see from the cell phone records. This isn't even the story that you're solely going to see from the physical evidence or the other items of evidence that can be put in front of you. This isn't our story. It's his.

See, what happens is the police officers, when they realize Deangelo's the last phone call, Mr. Hadland left to go see Deangelo. Deangelo works at the Palomino. There's Palomino cards on the ground. They think to themselves, Hey, perhaps we should have a conversation with this guy Deangelo who works at the Palomino. They go down to the Palomino and you will learn that Mr. H has already tipped off Deangelo the

cops are coming and so Deangelo decides it would be a good idea to have a conversation with the police. So he walks right up to the police officers, introduces himself. I'm Deangelo Carroll. TJ was my friend. Yeah, I had a phone call with him. Absolutely I will go down to the police station and have a conversation with you.

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He goes down to the police station. He gets to the police station and obviously his first story isn't, it was a paid hit. His first story was, oh, absolutely, I called TJ that night. I smoked marijuana with TJ every day. TJ's my friend. Yeah, I left the Palomino. I was at my house. I was on my balcony. I made a couple phone calls to him. We were going to meet up for weed but then I couldn't get a hold of him anymore and so nothing ever happened.

The police not really believing that story suggests to him, hey, you're on a cell phone. Cell phone's hit cell towers. We've got a little problem with that story because your cell phone's hitting all the cell towers out by Lake Mead. That's a problem for you, Deangelo. Deangelo goes, Well, I didn't say I wasn't out there -- driving out there looking for where TJ was. Okay. Fine. Me and Rontae and Jayson, we drove out there looking to hook up with TJ for some marijuana, but you know what, we just couldn't find him. And, you know, I tried to get contact with him, couldn't get contact with him. I wasn't there anymore.

Police -- now he's changed his story. They kind of understand. They hit him again, you know, maybe something else happened out there. And Mr. Carroll says, okay, fine, I had this guy I didn't really know. He was the fourth guy. He's in the car. His name's K, but I don't really know who he is. He went out there and he just went crazy. He was going to rob TJ and he shot him and we're all scared and that's why I didn't say anything. And the police say, okay. Well, let us leave the room and we'll talk about this a little bit and we'll come back and talk to you in a moment.

They leave the room, they talk about it, they think obviously Mr. Carroll still hasn't fully provided them the truth. And they walk back in the room to try to flush out, you know, whether or not he brought KC to do the robbery or anything like that, and Mr. Carroll stops them and this is what happens from that point forward. And I'm not going to play — obviously it's two hours and 34 minutes. You'll have a chance through the trial, but these are little segments of what Mr. Carroll says from there.

MR. ERICSSON: Your Honor, may we approach before this --

THE COURT: Sure.

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(Off-record bench conference)

THE COURT: Go on, Mr. DiGiacomo.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Thank you.

23	MR. DiGIACOMO: Obviously, it's not every day that
24	an individual walks in and gives this type of confession, but
25	the nature of the story is somewhat sensational in the sense
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that here's a club owner hiring a guy to kill a former employee and the manner in which it was done. So the detectives went and they got the acting sergeant, an individual by the name of James Vaccaro, who at the time was the most senior homicide detective at the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, and he goes in the room and he gets somewhat confrontational with Mr. Carroll. This is part of what's talked about.

(Audio videotape played.)

MR. DiGIACOMO: Before I get to that point -- this is before that. He had a little bit to add to the description of what happened during the payout.

(Audio videotape played.)

MR. DiGIACOMO: Shortly after this, the detectives take a break and that's when they bring in Detective Vaccaro. And when you actually watch this video during the trial itself you will see the tone and nature of the interview changes as opposed to this nice calm conversation. Detective Vaccaro starts asking the tough questions. He starts saying, Let me get this straight. You drove a guy that you knew was going to kill somebody up to kill one of your friends? And at that point Mr. Carroll starts backing off the story. Well, it was just meant to be a beating. I never told KC that it was going to be a killing. And he begins to back off the story.

And Detective Vaccaro asks him, How are we going to

prove this? How do we prove this story? What do we do? Do we just drag Mr. H down here and ask him, did you pay somebody to kill somebody? What do we do to prove your version of the story? And Mr. Carroll comes up with it. He says, I'll wear a wire.

And so several days later, they take Mr. Carroll up on his offer. Mr. Carroll puts on a recording device supplied by the FBI and he enters what's known as Simone's auto club. Simone's auto club is another business. This one's down by the airport. It's off of Bermuda and Sunset-ish, in that area of town. It is an auto club. It's the original business that Mr. H had here in town before he bought the Palomino Club.

Mr. H's son, Little Lou, lives in the back area of this auto club in Room 6. And Anabel is actually the manager down there, works days down there, and at night works -- at night is the manager at the Palomino.

So on day one, May 23rd, Mr. Carroll goes inside the Palomino Club -- I'm sorry, inside Simone's in an effort to confirm the information that he had ratted to police. When he gets inside the room there, there's a discussion and he gets sent back to Room 6, which is Little Lou's room, and there's a conversation between Little Lou that's eventually joined by Anabel. You'll hear that during the testimony before you.

After he leaves that room, Mr. Carroll, the police have a chance to listen to what is a poor recording, but

]. nonetheless -- poor quality recording. They have a couple 2 more questions they'd like to ask, particularly, What about 3 Mr. H? How come Mr. H isn't on this recording? So on May 24th, Mr. Carroll goes back into Simone's Auto Plaza. 4 5 goes back into Room 6. There's another conversation. 6 while I'm not going to play that whole conversation for you, 7 on May 24th, this is a conversation between Anabel Espindola 8 and Deangelo Carroll. 9 (Audio videotape played.) 10 MR. DiGIACOMO: At the end of this case some things 11 are going to be just uncontroverted. Plan A. Plan A's 12 clearly the killing of Timothy Hadland. 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half days of this, and I want to start out by expressing our appreciation on behalf of us as Deangelo's attorneys and on behalf of Deangelo for the candor and patience that each of you had in getting through the jury selection.

You've been told several times and just again this morning by the judge that what is presented in opening statement is not evidence. You're hearing small sections of very long conversations and very detailed information that was provided to the police by Deangelo.

You are going to hear evidence related to the motives of these other individuals who were involved in the killing of Timothy Hadland. At the outset I would hope that you understand we are in no way justifying the shooting of Timothy Hadland. It clearly was a homicide. It clearly was a killing.

What you folks are going to be asked to determine after you hear all of the evidence and listen carefully to each of the witnesses and details from these recordings is what was the state of mind of Deangelo Carroll at the time of that shooting. And that — again, you'll find that we probably do not dispute 90 percent of what the prosecution is going to present to you, but there's 10 percent of this case that is crucial in determining criminal liability that the State is trying to prove against Deangelo.

We ask you to continue to be open minded and fair

minded, and one of the difficult things that all of us as humans have is holding off judgment until we hear all of the evidence. The State, because they have the burden of proof, they get to present their evidence first. Will you please hold off in coming to any conclusions until you have heard from everyone, heard all of the evidence and been able to compare the motivations and what was going on behind other people besides these few snippets that you've heard of Deangelo's voluntary statements to the police officers.

We believe that after you have heard all of the evidence and considered it carefully, you will conclude that Deangelo is not guilty of first-degree murder.

Thank you very much.

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THE COURT: All right. Thank you, Mr. Ericsson.

I guess we should probably take our lunch break now.

Ladies and gentlemen, we'll go ahead and take our lunch break. We'll be in recess for an hour until 1:25.

Once again, you are reminded that during the lunch break you're not the discuss this case or anything relating to the case with each other or with anyone else. Do not read, watch, listen to any reports of or commentaries in any matter related to the case. Don't do any independent research on any subject connected with the trial. Don't visit the location at — the locations at issue. And please do not form or express an opinion on the case until you begin deliberating

1 with one another.

If you would all please place your notepads in your chairs and follow Officer Wooten through the double doors, we'll begin with the presentation of evidence at 1:25.

(Jury recessed at 12:27 p.m.)

MR. ERICSSON: Your Honor, we would like to make a record. We had a --

THE COURT: Hang on one second. The door just opened.

THE COURT: It's just argument, if they want to stay here because the Court's not closed yet.

Yes, go ahead.

MR. ERICSSON: Thank you, Your Honor. We wanted to put on the record our objection that we brought to the Court's attention up at the bench prior to the State playing short segments of the interviews with the police and Deangelo Carroll.

The position that we indicated was that that information should have come out in its entirety during the

introduction of evidence. We -- most of us in here have probably taken trial advocacy courses that have talked about the importance of early information being provided to jurors and how many people form very strong opinions as to a case at opening statements. And it was our position that because they weren't playing the entirety of the statements which have some very favorable things that were said by Deangelo, that the State should not have been able to just play very small sections.

And it was based on that that we asked that they be precluded from playing just portions at this point and wait until the entire tape was played during the -- their trial.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Absolutely no legal basis. We had a five-minute discussion at the bench. There's no legal basis for the objection. The Court has previously ruled on the admissibility of this item which means I had a good-faith basis to believe that it was admissible.

The statute says that if I do not play a portion that they think is appropriate, they're free to play whatever portion that they want to after my opening. They clearly knew we were putting in Deangelo Carroll's statement, so they were free to put in whatever section that they wanted to put in, and they chose not to do so.

Even prior to the opening they made a record about the two wire recordings and they knew -- because I told them

yesterday that I was going to play certain portions of his statement. They could have waited — they could have done it beforehand. To do it in the middle of the opening with no legal basis — well, I guess there's nothing you can do about that, but — I'm not even going to —

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THE COURT: Yeah, I would just say that, you know, clearly Mr. DiGiacomo would have been able to highlight portions of the statement, the confession that he thought was germane, you know, by saying Deangelo Carroll admitted this or that or the other thing. I think that the fact that it was a tape that was played -- I understand your argument that that's more prejudicial, but it's really the same thing as the State highlighting portions of the confession that they consider to be more beneficial to their case. I mean, that's what you do in opening statements. So I would just say with that that that's -- I don't find that the playing the snippets were objectionable. The Court reminded the jurors that it's not in evidence yet. It's just opening statements so whatever, you know, harm I think what is rectified certainly by -- and I'm reluctant to use the word harm because that suggests that there's something improper about it, and again, I don't think it was improper. I think it's totally analogous to the old fashion way of doing things of Mr. DiGiacomo just saying, you know, you're going to hear from the detectives that Deangelo Carroll, you know, admitted this and said that and, you know,

9	Q Did TJ tell you why he was going to see

11	A Yes.
12	Q For what reason?
13	A Go get marijuana.
14	Q Go get marijuana?

16	MR. PESCI: Thank you. Nothing further.
17	THE COURT: Mr. Bunin.
18	MR. BUNIN: No, I have no followup. Thank you.
19	THE COURT: Ma'am, thank you for your testimony.
20	Please don't talk about your testimony with anyone else who
21	may be a witness in this matter.
22	THE WITNESS: Yes.
23	THE COURT: Next witness.
24	MR. PESCI: Kristin Grammas.
25	THE COURT: All right.
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1	Ma'am, just remain standing, facing our court clerk.
2	KRISTIN GRAMMAS, STATE'S WITNESS, SWORN
3	THE CLERK: Thank you. Please be seated. And
4	please state and spell your name.
5	THE WITNESS: Kristin Grammas; K-R-I-S-T-I-N
6	G-R-A-M-M-A-S.
7	THE COURT: Thank you.
8	Mr. Pesci.
9	MR. PESCI: Thank you, Judge.
10	DIRECT EXAMINATION
11	BY MR. PESCI:
12	Q Ma'am, what do you do for a living?
13	A I am a senior crime scene analyst for the Las
14	Vegas Metropolitan Police Department.
L5	Q How long have you been with Metro?
16	A Approximately eight years.
L7	Q And have you been a crime scene analyst the
18	whole time you've been with Metro?
L9	A Yes, I have.
20	Q All right. And you say senior crime scene
21	analyst. Is that you kind of moved up with experience and
22	time?
23	A Yes, I have.
24	Q Okay. Back on May the 19th, maybe it was even
25	into May the 20th of 2005, were you working that night?
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1	A Yes, I was.
2	Q Did you respond out to the area of North Shore
3	Road?
4	A Yes, I did.
5	Q Who did you respond there with?
6	A Senior crime scene analyst Stephanie Smith, and
7	supervisor crime scene supervisor Dave Rafino.
8	Q Did you three kind of work as a team?
9	A Yes, we did.
10	Q Predominantly was it you and Stephanie working
11	Stephanie Smith working together?
12	A Yes. I did the evidence and diagram, and she
13	did the photos and report.
14	Q Okay. When you say that, the evidence and the
15	diagram, what do you mean by that?
16	A I she does all the photography first, and
17	then I identify what items of evidence I'm going to collect.
18	And then I will put placards on them After she's photoed
19	them, I'll put the placards up. She'll photo them again. And
20	then I'll recover those items after I have sketched them into
21	a diagram.
22	Q When you say recovered, what do you do to
23	recover some piece of evidence at a scene?
24	A Depending on the type of evidence, what it is,
25	but usually it's put in a bag or an envelope. If it's in a
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1	bag we fold the top down so that we make sure no other
2	evidence gets into it. We don't want any cross contamination
3	of trace evidence. If it's biological, meaning it has blood
4	on it, it has to go into a paper item, a paper bag or item so
5	that it can breathe.
6	Q All right. And you talked about a distinction
7	based on what the evidence is. Did you receive training and

experience in this are to be able to perform this job?

A Yes, I did.

Q Could you briefly tell the ladies and gentlemen of the jury about that training and experience?

A I attended the University of Nevada Las Vegas and the Community College of Southern Nevada with major course work in criminal justice, and minor course work in anthropology. I've also gone to numerous blood schools, homicide investigation schools, latent print processing schools, photography classes.

I've also completed the American Institute of Applied Science forensic science course, which is all aspects of forensic science as far as crime scene documentation, fingerprints. I am also the current secretary of the Nevada State Division of the International Association of Identification, which is a section that is only allowed for forensic science community members.

Q Now, ma'am, had you done some of this training KARR REPORTING, INC.

1	prior to starti	ng your job?
2	A A	Yes, I did.
3	Q	And have you had training while you're still on
4	the job?	
5	А	Yes, I have.
6	Q	Do you continue to receive and go to training?
7	А	Absolutely. Yes.
8	Q	Okay. And you talked a minute ago about
9	photographs; correct?	
10	А	Yes.
11 '	Q	And I think, if I understood correctly,
12	Stephanie Smith, the other crime scene analyst, was the	
13	individual who	took the photographs.
14	А	Yes, she was.
15	Q	Even though she took the photographs, were you
16	there physicall	y with her when they were taken?
17	A	Yes, I was.
18	Q	Was she there physically with you when you were
19	recovering evidence?	
20	A	Yes, she was.
21	Q	And that's how you were in essence working as a
22	team?	
23	A	Yes.
24	Q	If I understood correctly, you said that you
25	did the diagram	n in this case?
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1	A Yes, I did.
2	Q All right.
3	MR. PESCI: May I approach the witness, Your Honor?
4	THE COURT: Yes.
5	BY MR. PESCI:
6	Q Showing you State's proposed Exhibit 148, I
7	believe.
8	A 148, yes.
9	Q Okay. Do you recognize that?
10	A Yes, I do.
11	Q And what is that?
12	A This is the computer generated version of the
13	diagram that I sketched at the crime scene.
14	Q Okay. And when you do this, it doesn't does
15	it come out like this out at the scene?
16	A No, I am not an artist.
17	Q So what do you do to convert what you do at the
18	scene into what we see here?
19	A We have a lot of measurements for each item of
20	evidence, the placement of the body, and other items that are
21	at our scene. And then I can put those into our computer
22	program, and it'll put them in the accurate positions.
23	Q Okay. And this is an accurate representation
24	of what that program produced based on your entry of the
25	information?

1	A Yes, it is.
2	MR. PESCI: Move for the admission of State's 148,
3	Your Honor.
4	THE COURT: Any objection?
5	MR. ERICSSON: Submit it, Your Honor.
6	THE COURT: It's admitted.
7	(State's Exhibit 148 admitted.)
8	BY MR. PESCI:
9	Q All right. Now, do you have kind of a legend
10	that explains what we're looking at?
11	A Can we turn it?
12	Q Thank you.
13	A Yes, we do.
14	Q All right. I got thrown off by the N sign
15	pointing this way. So is that north?
16	A That's north down. Yes.
17	Q So north is at the bottom?
18	A Yes.
19	Q The way we're looking at this.
20	A Yes.
21	Q Okay. So is this representative of what you
22	saw out at the scene?
23	A Yes, it is.
24	Q Okay. Now, you said that originally the scene
25	is photographed.

1	A Uh-huh. Yes, it is.		
2	Q And then after the photographs you put down		
3	placards, I think you said?		
4	A Yes. After the first rounds of photographs are		
5	taken, we put down placards and then I would measure in the		
6	items of evidence. She will take more photos showing the		
7	placards with the numbers, and then I will recover those items		
8	after we're done.		
9	Q All right. You just said you measured in.		
10	What do you mean by that?		
11	A Well, we found a reference point, which in this		
12	case was a long ways from the actual scene because there		
13	wasn't something close. So we went for the intersection which		
14	is 1700 feet east of of the intersection with Lake Mead		
15	Boulevard for North Scenic Shore Drive.		
16	Q Why would you go that far for a reference?		
17	A Because it was the closest thing out there.		
18	It's in the middle of nowhere. There is no light poles which		
19	we would normally use or any type of signs out there. That		
20	was the nearest thing.		
21	Q Do you need something that's somewhat		
22	permanent?		
23	A Yes, we want something permanent, especially in		
24	Las Vegas. Because, not in this general area, but a lot of		
25	times I'll go to crime scenes and then five years later		

1	testify and it's now a development and it was an empty lot
2	area. So
3	Q And then the items that you saw around the
4	body, did you you and Stephanie, or Stephanie Smith
5	photographed that?
6	A She did, yes.
7	Q Okay. Showing you State's proposed Exhibits
8	13, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20. Take a look at those and tell me if
9	you recognize them.
.0	A Yes, I do.
.1	Q Okay. And are those the various items that
.2	were found in the road near the body?
.3	A Yes, they were.
4	Q And are those fair and accurate depictions of
L 5	those pieces of evidence?
.6	A Yes, they are.
L7	Q Move for the admission, Judge, of 20, 19, 18,
L8	17, 16, and 13.
L9	THE COURT: Submit it?
20	MR. ERICSSON: Submit it, Your Honor.
21	THE COURT: All right. Those will all be admitted.
22	(State's Exhibit 13, 16 through 20 admitted.)
23	BY MR. PESCI:
24	Q Okay. Looking at 13. What are we looking at
25	here?

1	A This is a pair of eyeglasses that was near the
2	body, and it had apparent blood on one of the lenses.
3	Q And going back to State's 148, where would that
4	be referenced in your diagram of the scene?
5	A It's over here. You can see No. 1 is the
6	eyeglasses, so No. 1 is this item right here.
7	Q All right. And then as you look at 13, do you,
8	in fact, have the placard No. 1 next to it?
9	A Yes, I do.
10	Q And is this how you can associate these items
1	to the actual diagram?
.2	A Yes, it is.
.3	Q Okay. And looking at what you list as No. 2,
.4	what are those?
L5	A These are Palomino cards.
L6	Q And do you recall how many were out at the
ا 7	scene on the ground?
L8	A 33.
.9	Q All right. And these 33 Palomino cards that
20	you put at placard No. 2, where are those on your State's 148,
21	the diagram? Do you want to take that off for a second? Let
22	me let me go to that.
23	A There we go. Thank you. That would be No. 2.
24	Q All right. So let's keep that one up, and
25	we'll look at No. 3, which is State's 17. Do you recognize
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1	that?	
2	A	Yes, I do. It's a pneumatic bank tube.
3	Q	All right. Have you ever heard the word
4	pneumatic befo	re this?
5	A	No, I didn't. I actually had to call Wells
6	Fargo and find	out what to call it.
7	Q	And that's the information that you got from
8	them?	
9	A	Yes.
10	Q	All right. Looking at State's 18, which is
11	corresponding to placard No. 4; what is that?	
12	A	That is a cigarette butt.
13	Q	And was that in the area around the body?
14	A	Yes, it was.
15	Q	State's 19, which is placard five.
16	A	That's another cigarette butt.
17	Q	And then State's let's see, State's 20,
18	which is placard No. 6.	
19	A	Yes, that's a beer can.
20	Q	Now, you've indicated that items of evidence
21	were recovered?	
22	A	Yes.
23	Q	And the items that we just looked at, were
24	those recovered?	
25	A	Yes, they were.
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1	Q All right. We'll physically go through those
2	in a minute. Let's just look at some more of the photos. And
3	before we go back to that, just overall, do you see State's
4	159?
5	A Yes, I do.
6	Q And what is that?
7	A It appears to be an aerial view of the area
8	that we were in.
9	Q Okay.
10	MR. PESCI: Move for the admission of State's 159.
11	THE COURT: Submit it?
12	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.
13	THE COURT: All right. That'll be admitted.
14	(State's Exhibit 159 admitted.)
15	BY MR. PESCI:
16	Q Now, on the left hand side, is that the area of
17	Las Vegas?
18	A Yes, it is.
19	Q Okay. North Shore Road, if you take Lake Mead,
20	would you eventually work your way over to North Shore Road?
21	A Yes, you would.
22	Q So this is just to kind of orient the ladies
23	and gentlemen of the jury to where this is in relation to Las
24	Vegas.
25	A Okay. Yes.
1	

1	Q Those were the physical items of evidence found	
2	near the body. Was there also a car in the area?	
3	A Yes, there was. There was a Kia Sportage.	
4	Q And the Kia Sportage, did did you and Ms.	
5	Smith photograph and document that there?	
6	A Yes, it was photographed, documented, and we	
7	did a cursory search as to what was in the vehicle, and then	
8	we sealed it and I followed it back to our crime lab.	
9	Q What do you mean by seal it?	
10	A We put physical seals on it, they're normally	
11	orange or red, that say do not enter, police. And we seal it	
12	so that nobody can open them, and if they are opened, we can	
13	tell.	
14	Q All right. Showing you State's 21 through 29;	
15	do you recognize those?	
16	A Yes, I do.	
17	Q Are those fair and accurate depictions of the	
18	Kia Sportage and the items that you saw during that	
19	processing?	
20	A Yes, they are.	
21	MR. PESCI: Move for the admission, Your Honor, of 21	
22	through 29.	
23	THE COURT: Submit it?	
24	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.	
25	THE COURT: All right. 21 through 29 are admitted.	
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1	(State's Exhibit 21 through 29 admitted.)	
2	BY MR. PESCI:	
3	Q Did you take, you and Ms. Smith take pictures	
4 :	of the car at different angles out at the scene?	
5	A Yes, she did.	
6	Q I'm showing you 21 and 22. Are those showing	
7	the car?	
8	A Yes, they are.	
9	Q And you talked about looking inside the car; is	
10	that accurate?	
11	A Yes, we did.	
12	Q Specifically State's 23, what did you find in	
13	the area of the floorboard on the driver's front seat?	
14	A On the floorboard there is a cell phone right	
15	there.	
16	Q And, in fact, State's 24, is that a close up of	
17	that cell phone?	
18	A Yes, it is.	
19	Q Now, besides the cell phone, did you find other	
20	items inside the car?	
21	A Yes, we did.	
22	Q Showing you State's 25. What is that?	
23	A It's a cooler in the backseat.	
24	Q 26?	
25	A It's a black bag in the front passenger seat.	
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1		Q	And did you look inside of that bag?
2		A	Yes, I did.
3		Q	And eventually did you find some items inside
4	that bag	and re	ecover them?
5		A	Yes. Yes, I did.
6	<u> </u>	Q	Okay. Do you recall what, specifically, you
7	recovered	d from	that bag?
8		Α	Multiple items, but the most noted one is

14	number was on this case off-hand?
15	A No, I do not.
16	Q That's fine. If I show you some
17	A I know the first five.
18	Q some evidence from this, do you this you
19	could recall the event number?
20	A Yes, I would.
21	MR. PESCI: May I approach the witness?
22	THE COURT: Of course.
23	3Y MR. PESCI:
24	Q Before we actually get that, let's go back to
25	these photos. Showing you State's 30, 31, and 32; do you
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1	recognize those? Well, hold off on 32 for a minute. Do you
2	recognize 30 and 31?
3	A Yes, I do.
4	Q Are those fair and accurate depictions of the
5	evidence that was recovered from that scene?
6	A Yes, they are.
7	MR. PESCI: Move for their admission.
8	THE COURT: Submit it?
9	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.
10	THE COURT: All right. Those will all be admitted.
11	(State's Exhibit 30 and 31 admitted.)
12	MR. PESCI: Thank you, Your Honor.
13	BY MR. PESCI:
14	Q The what we just looked at here in State's
15	28 is the cell phone that was recovered at the scene. And I
16	think you testified that it was given to the detectives at the
17	scene.
18	A Yes, it was given to Detective McGrath.
19	Q Okay. The other physical evidence recovered
20	from the scene, did you give it to Detective McGrath, or did
21	you hold onto it?
22	A No, I impounded it.
23	Q Impound is a better way to say that. I
24	apologize. Looking at State's 30, what is what is that?
25	A This is a different type of lifting technique.
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1.	The tape is on smooth surfaces. We use it to lift prints.
2	But in this case the pneumatic tube was a plastic and it was
3	somewhat porous, so it's actually like a putty you put on it,
4	it hardens, and then you're able to lift it and it fills in
5	the holes in the groves of the porous item. So we lift the
6	print using this technique and then that print is photographed
7	and then this is booked into evidence, the actual white micro
8	seal.
9	Q Okay. Showing you State's 31. Is that the
10	beer can that we saw at the scene?
11	A Yes, it is.
12	Q Like State's 30, was it the pneumatic tube that
13	we saw from the scene?
14	A Yes.
15	Q And did you, like the phone at the scene, try
16	to lift prints also from this can?
17	A Yes, I did.
18	Q And you just described to us what you tried to
19	do on the pneumatic tube, and you talked about the surface
20	being different?
21	A Yes.
22	Q Tell us the different surface of a can and how
23	that can affect latent print recovery.
24	A A can is very smooth. When you touch it, it's
25	easily you're going to normally leave prints pretty easily.

1	And it doesn't have any grooves or like in a Styrofoam cup
2	it has crevices, we would use a micro seal to lift it off of
3	the Styrofoam cup because it would fill in the crevices and
4	then harden, and lift it.
5	Q Okay. So the fact that someone has touched
6	something like the cup that you just reached towards, does
7	that mean you will necessarily find a print?
8	A No, it does not.
9	Q Can you find things on certain surfaces easier
10	than others?
11	A Yes, I can.
12	Q Can the weather effect prints?
13	A Absolutely.
14	Q Can somebody's propensity for being somewhat
15	sweaty, can that effect whether you can recover a print?
16	A Yes, it can.
17	Q If if someone perspires a lot, can it make
18	it more difficult to recover?
19	A If they perspire a lot, it's normally easier.
20	Q Oh, okay. And are there other things that can
21	affect recovering a latent print?
22	A The wind, the air. Here in Vegas we have such
23	heat that it will tend to cook, we call it, our prints. So it
24	will take the water out of your prints, so it's harder to get
25	prints in the middle of summer sometimes.

1	Q And did you, in fact, try to recover latent
2	prints from these various items?
3	A Yes, I did.
4	Q Now, going to the physical evidence that we see
5	in the photographs, I'm showing you State's Proposed Exhibit
6	155. Do you recognize that?
7	A Yes, I do.
8	Q And what do you recognize that as?
9	A That is the pneumatic bank tube that we saw
10	earlier.
11	MR. PESCI: And, Your Honor, could I ask your clerk,
12	maybe, for a pair of scissors or something to open the bag?
13	THE COURT: Sure.
14	THE WITNESS: It's pretty
15	MR. DiGIACOMO: It's already open.
16	BY MR. PESCI:
17	Q Oh, it's already open?
18	A Yes, it is.
19	Q Leave that there in case something isn't.
20	A Thank you.
21	Q Can you recover what's inside of that please?
22	A Yes.
23	Q Now, is that the tube that we just saw that you
24	tried to process?
25	A Yes.
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1	Q And the tube we saw out at the in the
2	photographs at the scene?
3	A Yes, it is.
4	Q And then you talked about an event number
5	earlier. Is there an event number associated with this case?
6	A Yes, there is.
7	Q And do you see that located on the side?
8	A Yes, it is.
9	Q What is that event number?
10	A It's event 05, which is from 2005, 05 for May,
11	19 from the 19th of May, and event number 3516. So that's the
12	3,516th call of the night.
13	Q Now, this piece of evidence or the bag in your
14	hand, do you know that you're the individual that actually
15	impounded this piece of evidence?
16	A Yes, I do.
17	Q What tells you that form the bag itself?
18	A On the front it has my signature. We sign our
19	things. And on the back it has my initials, K for Kristin, G
20	for Grammas, and my P-number, which is my identification
21	number, 7808, and then the date on it.
22	Q And now is there a red seal along that?
23	A Yes, there is.
24	Q And did that seal come from you?
25	A Yes, it did.
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1	Q	Okay. Are there any other seals?
2	A	Yes, there's a blue seal.
3	Q	And where did that blue seal come from?
4	A	From the forensic lab.
5	Q	All right. Earlier you talked about how you
6	will try to li	ft latent prints and then submit it for review
7	from somebody	else?
8	A	Yes.
9	Q	Now, is that what the blue seal means?
10	A	It can mean for latent prints, it can mean for
11	firearms. Any	type of comparison
12	Q	Someone else
13	A	in forensics.
14	Q	has looked at that item?
15	A	Yes.
16	Q	Okay. Thank you. Could you put the item back
17	inside the bag	? Now, you talked about how there was some
18	items on the g	round other than the pneumatic tubes,
19	specifically 2	8 Palomino cards. Looking at State's 154, what
20	is that?	
21	A	These are the Palomino VIP cards that were
22	recovered from	the car.
23	Q	From the car?
24	A	Yes.
25	Q	All right. So 33 on the street?
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ı		
1	A	Yes.
2	Q	28 in the car?
3	A	Yes.
4	Q	All right. And we talked about it from the
5	bag	
6	A	Yes.
7	Q	inside the car?
8	A	Yes.
9	Q	Okay. Did you impound that?
10	A	Yes, I did.
11	Q	Is that one already open?
12	A	Yes, it is.
13	Q	Would you mind pulling it out?
14	A	Sure.
15	Q	So these particular items came from inside of
16	the car?	
17	A	This was from the bag on the front passenger
18	seat.	
19	Q	Okay. Thank you. Could you put those back in?
20	Looking at	State's 195; do you recognize that?
21	A	Yes, I do.
22	Q	And how do you recognize that?
23	A	It has my name and signature on it, and it is a
24	Lake Mead 1	National Recreation Area receipt.
25	Q	Okay.
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1	MR. PESCI: Judge, if I forgot, I apologize. I move
2	for admission of State's 155 and its contents, which I think
3	is 155A.
4	THE COURT: Oh, I was I thought you were going to
5	say something else.
6	Submitted?
7	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.
8	THE COURT: All right. That'll be admitted.
9	(State's Exhibit 155 and 155A admitted.)
10	MR. PESCI: And then additionally I make the same
11	motion for State's 154 and 154A, which are the cards inside
12	the bag.
13	THE COURT: Submitted?
14	MR. ERICSSON: Yes.
15	THE COURT: All right. 154 and 154A are admitted.
16	(State's Exhibit 154 and 154A admitted.)
17	BY MR. PESCI:
18	Q All right. What's in 195?
19	A It is a Lake Mead National Recreation Area
20	receipt.
21	Q Could you take that out? All right. This one
22	is not already open?
23	A No.
24	Q All right. Would you cut somewhere other than
25	the seal that you previously put on it? As you are cutting,
	KARR REPORTING, INC. 109

1	is this another piece of evidence that you personally
2	impounded?
3	A Yes, it is.
4	Q Did you put your seal on it with your P-number
5 i	and your identification of this event number?
6	A Yes, I did.
7	Q All right. And retrieved from inside of
8	State's 195, what is that?
9	A This is the Lake Mead receipt.
10	Q Where did that come from?
11	A It was on the interior windshield of the
12	driver's side.
13	Q Of the Kia Sportage?
14	A Yes.
15	MR. PESCI: Your Honor, I move for the admission of
16	State's 195 then to mark the receipt bag as 195A.
17	THE COURT: Submitted?
18	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.
19	THE COURT: All right. 195 and 195A are admitted.
20	(State's Exhibit 195 and 195A admitted.)
21	BY MR. PESCI:
22	Q And looking at State's 152, what are these?
23	A 33 Palomino Club advertisement cards.
24	Q From the street?
25	A Yes, these were from around the body.
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1	Q Okay. And did you impound those?	
2	A Yes, I did.	
3	Q And is that one that one is already open; is	
4	that correct?	
5	A Yes.	
6	Q All right. Could you recover what's inside?	
7	And is that listed as 152A?	
8	A Yes, it is.	
9	Q All right. And those are those cards?	
10	A Yes, they are.	
11	MR. PESCI: Move for the admission, Your Honor, of	
12	152 and 152A.	
13	THE COURT: All right.	
14	THE CLERK: 152?	
15	MR. PESCI: And 152A.	
16	THE COURT: That'll be admitted.	
17	(State's Exhibit 152 and 152A admitted.)	
18	BY MR. PESCI:	
19	Q Now, ma'am, you have in front of you another	
20	photograph.	
21	A Yes, I do.	
22	Q And is that State's 22 32?	
23	A Yes, it is.	
24	Q And do you recognize what that is?	
25	A Yes, that's the search warrant and return on	
	KARR REPORTING, INC. 111	

1	the white Astro van that was brought to our lab later.
2	Q All right. What is a search warrant return?
3	A A search warrant is done by detectives or
4	officers. They go to a judge and get a search warrant saying
5	that they can search the premises. In this case it was a
6	Chevy Astro van, and the return is the items that we recovered
7	from the search warrant. They're put on the return, and a
8	copy is left in the vehicle.
9	Q Okay. And when we're talking about this Astro
10	van, was this Astro van out at the scene on North Shore Road?
11	A No, it was not.
12	Q All right. After you processed the scene on
13	North Shore Road, did you then return back to your office, for
14	lack of a better term?
15	A Yes, we returned back. I followed the Kia
16	Sportage to my office. The next night we processed it. And
17	then on the 25th, this vehicle showed up.
18	Q All right. So when you say you processed the
19	Kia Sportage, is that were you retrieved some of the items you
20	just saw, particularly the cards from inside of the car?
21	A Yes, it is.
22	Q But eventually, as a part of your
23	responsibilities in this particular investigation, you also
24	processed an Astro van?
25	A Yes, I did.

1	Q All right. Showing you State's proposed
2	Exhibits 32. I don't think they're all in numeric 33
3	we've got State's 33 through 59. Take a minute to look over
4	those and tell me if you recognize them.
5	A Yes, I do.
6	Q And when this was processed, was that involving
7	you and Stephanie Smith again?
8	A Yes, it was.
9	Q Was there the same division of labor in the
10	sense of photographs being done by Ms. Smith?
11	A Yes.
12	Q Were you present when those were taken?
13	A Yes, I was.
14	Q And did you and Ms. Smith participate in the
15	processing for latent prints of this van together?
16	A Yes, we did.
17	Q Did you, in fact, divide the van in half?
18	A Yes, we did. I took the passenger side, she
19	took the driver side, and we kind of met in the back.
20	Q Okay. Do you sometimes mark yours up as driver
21	side, passenger side?
22	A Yes, I do. She does right front, left front.
23	Q Okay.
24	A It drives me crazy.
25	Q All right. Are these fair and accurate
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1	depictions of yours and Ms. Smith's work on the on this
2	Astro van?
3	A Yes, it is.
4	MR. PESCI: Judge, I move for admission of State's 33
5	through 59.
6	THE COURT: Submitted?
7	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.
8	THE COURT: All right. 33 through 59 are admitted.
9	(State's Exhibit 33 through 59 admitted.)
10	BY MR. PESCI:
11	Q You spoke of seals earlier. Looking at State's
12	33. Are these the seals that you're referring to?
13	A Yes. The vehicle was sealed with those seals.
14	Q And that's the same sealing process that you
15	used on the Sportage?
16	A Yes, it would be.
17	Q And did you then look throughout this vehicle?
18	A Yes, I did.
19	Q And that's pursuant to the search warrant that
20	had been obtained?
21	A Yes.
22	Q Looking at State's 34; is that the right side
23	of the car?
24	A Yes, it is.
25	Q And State's 35; is that the left side?
	KARR REPORTING, INC.

+	A I think it's it's the right side also.
2	Q Now, ma'am, at this point in May of 2005, how
3	many cars do you think you have processed at this point if you
4	were to guess?
5	A Several hundred.
6	Q When you processed this car in relation to the
7	many cars you have processed before, how clean did this car
8	appear to you as opposed to other cars?
9	A It was extremely well kept. It was hard to
10	find evidence. We had to only we could only find evidence
11	in the ashtrays and in the glove compartment. Normally we see
12	stuff all over the floors and receipts, people chew gum and
13	leave it on the floor or you have a receipt and they wad it
14	up. That wasn't the case.
15	Q Was that the case when you processed this Astro
16	van?
17	A No, it wasn't. It was in very clean condition.
18	Q Now, when you say when we talk about
19	processing, looking at State's 36, do we have what is some
20	tape in State's 36?
21	A Yes, we do.
22	Q And is that the same procedure that you did to
23	lift latents from the pneumatic tube and from the beer can and
24	From the cell phone?
25	A Yes, it is.

1	Q Okay. And did you and Ms. Smith do that
2	together?
3	A Yes, we did.
4	Q And did you do that throughout the car?
5	A Yes, we did.
6	Q Showing you State's 37, is that some indication
7	of some of that tape?
8	A Yes, it is.
9	Q And State's 38?
10	A Yes, it is.
11	Q All right. Now, looking at State's 39 and that
12	floor area there, does it appear to have some floor
13	impressions or foot marks?
14	A Yes, those are from Ms. Smith and I as we were
15	climbing in the vehicle.
16	Q Okay. So that was not the state of this
17	vehicle when you first got to it?
18	A No, it was not.
19	Q So when you testified that it was clean and
20	tidy, that's not the way it appeared?
21	A No, it did not.
22	Q You spoke a minute ago about having to look
23	inside of ashtrays and things like that. Looking at State's
24	40, do you, in fact, have an ashtray open there that you
25	looked in?

1	A Yes, there's an ashtray and a storage
2	compartment.
3	Q And looking at State's 41, did you find some
4	items inside there?
5	A That was the storage compartment, and there was
6	a Palomino matchbook and some spoons in a Ziploc bag.
7	Q Did you recover that matchbook?
8	A Yes, I did.
9	Q Showing you State's 151. It looks like it's
10	been opened. Do you recognize that?
11	A Yes, I do.
12	Q And is that the matchbook that you impounded
13	that we're looking at?
14	A Yes, it is.
15	Q And could you recover what's in 151? Is that
16	the matchbook that we're looking at?
17	A Yes, it is.
18	Q Is that 151A?
19	A Yes, it is.
20	MR. PESCI: We move for the admission of State's 151
21	and 151A.
22	THE COURT: Submitted?
23	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.
24	THE COURT: All right. That'll be admitted.
25	(State's Exhibit 151 and 151A admitted.)
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1	BY MR. PESCI:
2	Q Did you continue, in fact, to process the
3	remainder of that car?
4	A Yes, we did.
5	Q Looking at the various ashtrays and storage
6	compartments?
7	A Yes, we did.
8	Q Looking at State's 50. Did you look inside of
9	this particular compartment?
10	A Yes, we did.
11	Q And was there something associated with the San
12	Francisco 49ers?
13	A Yes, there is.
14	Q And looking at State's 51; did you eventually
15	work your way up to the front of the vehicle?
16	A Yes, we did.
17	Q And looking at State's 53; was there a glove
18	box or a storage container?
19	A We deemed it a glove compartment because there
20	was no other one in the vehicle and it was at the front of the
21	vehicle.
22	Q And did you recover some information or some
23	evidence from that area?
24	A Yes, we did.
25	Q Looking at State's 55; what is that?
	KARR REPORTING, INC. 118

1	A That's the various paperwork and some more
2	Palomino cards that were in the glove compartment, the center
3	console thing.
4	Q So these these Palomino cards are different
5	from the one in the Kia Sportage and different from the ones
6	that were out on the street?
7	A Yes, they are.
8	Q Okay. Looking at State's 56; did you find some
9	mail?
10	A Yes, we did.
1	Q Was that inside of that van?
.2	A Yes, it was in the glove compartment.
.3	Q And who was it addressed to?
.4	A Deangelo Carroll.
.5	Q And did you impound or take into evidence some
.6	of the things that you found out in the ashtray?
.7	A Yes, I did.
.8	Q Specifically, we just looked at some Palomino
.9	cards. Looking at State's 150; do you recognize that?
20	A Yes, I do.
21	Q What is State's 150, and its contents I believe
22	should be 150A?
23	A 42 Palomino Club cards.
24	Q Are those the ones we just saw kind of
25	displayed on the chair of the Astro van that was photographed?
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l l	
1	A Yes, they are.
2	MR. PESCI: Move for the admission of 150 and 150A.
3	THE COURT: Submitted?
4	MR. ERICSSON: Submit it, Your Honor.
5	THE COURT: All right.
6	(State's Exhibit 150 and 150A admitted.)
7	BY MR. PESCI:
8 -	Q All right. Do you also recognize State's 149?
9	A Yes, I do.
10	Q What is that?
11	A Miscellaneous paperwork, including a Farmer's
12	Insurance certificate in the name of Simone's Auto Plaza, a
13	letter from the DMV in the name of Deangelo Carroll, a DMV
14	registration in the name of Anabel Espindola, an envelope with
15	Simone's Auto Plaza on the front containing DMV registration
16	in the name of Anabel Espindola, and a Bank of America
17	cashier's receipt in the name of Deangelo Carroll, and an
18	envelope from the DMV in the name of Deangelo Carroll.
19	Q And were all of these items found inside the
20	Astro van?
21	A Yes, they were in the glove compartment.
22	Q And the listing that you have on the outside of
23	149, are those the contents inside 149A?
24	A Yes, they are.
25	MR. PESCI: Move for the admission of 149 and 149A.
	KARR REPORTING, INC.

1	THE COURT: Submitted?
2	MR. ERICSSON: Submitted, Judge.
3	THE COURT: All right. That'll be admitted.
4	(State's Exhibit 149 and 149A admitted.)
5	BY MR. PESCI:
6	Q And, in fact, you just talked about a DMV
7	letter. Is that what we had looked at in a photograph a
8	minute ago?
9	A The envelope is, yes.
10	Q Envelope. Sorry. All right. Turning to
11	State's 145, what do you recognize State's 145 to be?
12	A This is a latent print card that I submitted in
13	this case from the Astro van.
14	Q All right. Now, latent print cards you told us
15	a little bit about earlier; is that correct?
16	A Yes.
17	Q Is that the actual, or is that a photocopy?
18	A This is a photocopy of it.
19	Q Okay. And how do you recognize that to be from
20	you?
21	A It has my initials on the tape and on $$ I
22	label my items, so it has it on the label also. It has my
23	name, K. Grammas, 7808, and it has the event number.
24	Q All right. And looking at State's 146; do you
25	recognize that?

1	A Yes, I do. This is also a copy of a latent
2	print card recovered from the Astro van.
3	Q All right. Now, there actually seems to be two
4	pages per item; is that correct?
5	A Yes.
6	Q What is the second page?
7	A The second page is something that our latent
8	print section does once they receive our item.
9	Q Okay. But do you recognize it as being the
10	card that you had submitted?
11	A Yes, it's a copy of it.
12	Q All right. And do you recognize State's 156?
13	A Yes, I do. This is a copy of a latent print
L4	card that was given by Stephanie Smith.
L5	Q Okay. So Stephanie Smith was the woman who
16	processed the vehicle with you?
L7	A Yes, she was.
L8	Q And the two of you were together when you
L9	processed these items and recovered these latents?
20	A Yes, we were.
21	Q And submitted them to the lab?
22	A Yes.
23	Q And do these have the identifiers unique to
24	this particular case as far as the event number?
25	A Yes, they do.
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1	Q And then your personnel number and your
2	initials?
3	A Yes, they do.
4	MR. PESCI: Move for the admission of 145, 146, and
5	156.
6	THE COURT: Submitted?
7	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.
8	THE COURT: All right. They'll all be admitted.
9	(State's Exhibit 145, 146, and 156 admitted.)
10	BY MR. PESCI:
11	Q All right. Looking at 145, tell us about this
12	card, please.
13	A This is our latent print card. As you can see,
14	on top there is the event number that we talked about earlier.
15	My name, K. Grammas, 7808, which is my P-number, the date that
16	the car was processed, the 25th, the victim's name, Timothy
17	Hadland, the location, 6759 West Charleston Boulevard, which
18	is our crime scene section, and where it was located. So this
19	one is from the interior side passenger side door window of a
20	1995 Chevrolet Astro van, and that's the plate.
21	Q So 145 was from the interior side passenger
22	door?
23	A Yes.
24	Q So that would be the right side in Stephanie's?
25	A Yes, it would be the right side if Stephanie

1 '	says it. For me, it's the passenger side because it makes
2	more sense.
3	Q All right. 146, where is that one from?
4	A This is from the interior side passenger side
5	door window, same place, of the 1995 Chevrolet Astro van.
6	Q And then 156?
7	A This is from the exterior rear cargo door,
8	that's the back door, the outside of it, of the van.
9	MR. PESCI: Court's indulgence.
10	THE COURT: That's fine.
11	MR. PESCI: We'll pass the witness.
12	THE COURT: Before we do that, let's go ahead and
13	take our afternoon recess before we move into
14	cross-examination.
15	Ladies and gentlemen, we're just going to take ten
16	minutes until about ten minutes enough for everybody, until
17	3:05? And during that afternoon recess, you're reminded not
18	to discuss the case or anything related to the case or do
19	anything relating to the case. Notepads in your chairs, and
20	through the double doors.
21	(Court recessed at 2:57 p.m. until 3:11 p.m.)
22	(In the presence of the jury.)
23	THE COURT: All right. Court is now back in
24	session.
25	And, Mr. Ericsson, will you be conducting cross?
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1	MR. ERICSSON: Yes, Your Honor.
2	THE COURT: All right. You may proceed.
3	CROSS-EXAMINATION
4	BY MR. ERICSSON:
5	Q Good afternoon, ma'am.
6	A Good afternoon.
7	Q I just want to clarify a few things. Your role
8	in this investigation in this case was basically to gather
9	evidence out at the scene?
10	A Yes, it was.
11	Q As well as process or gather fingerprints to be
12	evaluated by others?
13	A Yes.
14	Q And is it accurate to say that you personally
15	didn't conduct any testing on any of the evidence that was
16	gathered?
17	A Yes, I did not do any testing.
18	MR. ERICSSON: Thank you. I have no further
19	questions.
20	THE COURT: All right.
21	Redirect.
22	MR. PESCI: Nothing.
23	THE COURT: All right. Thank you for your testimony.
24	Please don't discuss your testimony with anyone else who may
25	be a witness.

1	THE WITNESS: Okay. Thank you.
2	THE COURT: You are excused.
3	State, call your next witness.
4	MR. PESCI: The State calls Rontae Zone.
5	THE COURT: All right. Come on up here, please, to
6	the witness stand and remain standing, facing that lady right
7	there.
8	RONTAE ZONE, STATE'S WITNESS, SWORN
9	THE CLERK: Please be seated, and please state and
10	spell your name.
11	THE WITNESS: R-o-n-t-a-e, last name Zone, Z-o-n-e.
12	THE COURT: All right. Mr. Pesci.
1.3	MR. PESCI: Thank you, Judge.
14	DIRECT EXAMINATION
15	BY MR. PESCI:
16	Q Mr. Zone, I want to direct your attention back
17	to May of 2005, in fact, about a year ago five years ago
18	today. At that time were you living with a person by the name
19	of Deangelo Carroll?
20	A Yes, I was.
21	Q And when you were living with him, did you ever
22	work with him?
23	A Yes, I did.
24	Q And where was that work performed?

I mean, obviously they wanted him to say no, that he's not doing what they want, but, of course, in showing up and responding to his subpoena, he's doing what they want and there's nothing untoward about that, but he could say correct and it could be a completely innocuous answer meaning, I got a subpoena, they want me to come to court, I'm showing up in court, I'm doing what they want. That doesn't mean that they've done anything inappropriate. And I think that's what he meant. What they meant —

MR. BUNIN: But my concern is the way they follow

THE COURT: -- is are you tailoring your story because we want you to. That was what they meant. But he's hearing what I just said, which is basically you issued me a subpoena, you want me to come to court, I'm here, yes, I'm doing what you want. So --

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MR. BUNIN: That may be exactly right. My concern is the followup causes him to change his answer and the followup suggesting --

THE COURT: No, it didn't change his answer because as I just pointed out there's two different questions here. There's Mr. Pesci's question, You're doing what we want, we're manipulating your testimony. And there's what Rontae Zone is hearing, which is, I'm doing what you want, some guy came and gave me a subpoena and I showed up at 9:30 like you wanted me to and I've sat out here all day with my mother and I'm doing what you want. That's what he's saying. Mr. Pesci's saying something different. And so that was okay.

MR. PESCI: If I could just kind of make the record that we did at the bench. Defense counsel specifically went through a multitude of times in which Mr. Zone was paid and specifically followed it up with saying that he met with the prosecutors, so it's a clear connection about being paid and meeting with the prosecutors.

Then he followed it up and he talked about being charged with murder and how we, the prosecutors, hold that in

our hands, in essence, about whether he is prosecuted and tried for murder. I think the clear interpretation can be understood by the jury that we are buying his testimony. Mr. Bunin is telling you as an officer of the Court that that's not the case.

What I asked for then is for them to make a record of that to the jury, because if that's truly the situation, then there will be no problem with them telling the jury we're not insinuating that the State's buying testimony.

MR. BUNIN: I'm not going to make that record.

MR. PESCI: If they fight that argument, Judge, then it's really clear what they're doing.

THE COURT: Well --

14	MR. BUNIN: Asked and answered. He already said no,		
15	Your Honor.		
16	THE COURT: All right. Go on. He's answered he		
17	answered the question.		
18	MR. PESCI: I apologize. I didn't hear the answer.		
19	THE COURT: He said no.		
20	THE WITNESS: No.		
21	MR. PESCI: Okay.		
22	BY MR. PESCI:		
23	Q You were asked specifically by Mr. Bunin why		
24	you did not tell the police what had happened. Do you		
25	remember that?

1	A Yes.			
2	Q Why didn't you?			
3	MR. BUNIN: That's improper I mean, I'm sorry,			
4	but I didn't ask him why he didn't tell the police. I just

23		THE	COURT: Go on, Mr. Pesci.
24		MR.	PESCI: Thank you.
25	BY MR. PESCI:		

1	Q Mr. Zone, are you testifying here today based			
2	on a way that we've told you to?			
3	A No.			
4	Q Are you why are you testifying?			
5	A I'm testifying because I was ordered to by a			
6	subpoena and that's it.			
7	MR. PESCI: Pass the witness.			
8	THE COURT: Before we do that, I have one pending			
9	juror question up here.

3	Q	You don't care what you say, right?	
4	Now	we asked you some questions about money. I'm	
5	not talking a	lot of money. I asked you that on my	
6	cross-examination, right?		
7	A	Correct.	
8	Q	But part of what occurs is when you go meet the	
9	prosecutors at their offices you get paid a small fee for your		
10	time, don't you?		
11	A	I get a fee.	
12	٥	And you wanted that fee?	
13	A	No.	
14	Q	Well, you accepted the fee?	
15	А	Correct.	
16	Q	And when you testify by subpoena you get paid a	
17	small fee?		
18	A	Correct.	
19	Q	And you accept that fee when you testify?

21	Q	Okay. So at least if you've got to come here,	
22	you might as	well get some money out of it?	
23	A	Correct.	
24	Q	But the main reason for testifying is to avoid

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1	A Correct.
2	Q All right. Now, you said several times you
3	lived with Deangelo. You actually only stayed there for a
4	couple of nights total; isn't that right?
5	A About a week and a half.
6	Q And it was around the time frame this occurred?
7	A Yes.
8	Q And it was no more than a week?
9	A Correct.
10	Q Could have been a little less?
11	A About it was about a week.
12	Q About a week. When you testified a moment
13	ago you don't really want to be here, right?
L4	A Correct.
15	Q And, you know, you were friendly with Deangelo,
16	right?
17	A Correct.
18	Q But it's not your problem, whatever Deangelo's
19	problems are, right?
20	A Correct.
21	Q You actually don't care what happens to
22	Deangelo, you're here so you don't get charged with murder,
23	right?
24	A Correct.
25	MR. BUNIN: Court's indulgence.
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1	I have no other questions, Your Honor.
2	THE COURT: Mr. Pesci.
3	Any other juror questions?
4	All right. Mr. Zone, please don't discuss your
5	testimony with anyone else who may be a witness in this
6	matter. And you are excused at this time.
7	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
8	THE COURT: It's pretty early still. State, do you
9	want to start with your next witness?
10	MR. DiGIACOMO: It's up to the Court. We have a
11	witness who's present. We won't finish him, but we certainly
12	can do some of him.
13	THE COURT: Let's start.
14	MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. Detective Wildemann.
