## LAS VEGAS, NEVADA, MONDAY, APRIL 7, 2014, 1:40 P.M.

(Outside the presence of prospective jurors)

MS. PIEPER: Good morning, Your Honor. Danielle Pieper and Barbara Schifalacqua on behalf of the State.

THE COURT: Good afternoon.

MS. PIEPER: This afternoon the State filed an amended criminal -- or an Amended Information.

THE COURT: Okay.

MS. PIEPER: Essentially what we did is in the caption portion, it says State of Nevada v. Matthew Washington.

THE COURT: Um-hum.

MS. PIEPER: The body of the Information has Martell Moten and an unidentified co-conspirator. The State also took off the last two counts which I think were 18 and 19 and those were ex-felon possession of a firearm or ex-felon -- yeah, possession of a firearm for both Martell Moten as well as Matthew Washington.

THE COURT: All right.

MS. PIEPER: I know that this Court knows that obviously we need to sever those counts, at least the count in regard to Matthew Washington. In the event that -- whether Matthew Washington gets convicted or not in regard to this case, the State will still proceed on the ex-felon possession of a firearm.

THE COURT: All right.

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MS. SCHIFALACQUA: As well as --

MS. PIEPER: Judge, we also wanted to make a record that on January 29th, 2014, we made an offer to this defendant. The offer was second with use of a deadly weapon. The State took off the -- the only sentencing range in that case would be a 10 to 25 for the second degree murder and we took off the life tail as well as we would argue for the deadly weapon.

The State also offered a conspiracy to commit murder. Those counts would be running concurrent.

MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Both were rejected.

MS. PIEPER: And that was rejected on January 29, 2014. We also have, under <u>Brady</u>, continued our obligation to give the defense attorney in this case, Mr. Otto, discovery.

THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Otto.

MR. OTTO: Good afternoon, Your Honor. David Otto on behalf of Mr. Washington. I'm here with my co-counsel, Roberta Ohlinger, O-h-l-i-n-g-e-r, who will be assisting me with this case. That record sounds fine. I have not yet received a copy of the amended, but I'm sure I will as I see your Clerk marking them.

THE COURT: Indeed. All right. Also I understand that the parties have talked and they -- they've agreed that they would like the Court to inquire of the venire regarding

their ability to consider all three forms of punishment that are available in this case? 2 MS. PIEPER: In the event that the defendant is 3 convicted of -- of a first degree murder. 4 THE COURT: Okay. 5 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Right, Judge. OTTO: 12 THE COURT: So we'll have a couple minutes slack 13 time here. 14 THE CLERK: Off the record? 15 THE COURT: Off the record. 16 (Off the record at 1:47 p.m. until 2:28 p.m.) 17 (In the presence of the prospective jurors) 18 THE COURT: -- to serve as trial jurors on a case 19 that is going to trial. The first thing that I want to do is 20 to thank you all for being here. We are well aware that it 21 doesn't exactly make your day when you get your jury summons 22 in the mail that says come on down, it's your turn to serve. 23 The thing about getting your -- your jury summons in 24 the mail for jury service is that it is, of course, a duty

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which we accept as Americans. It is part and parcel of the right to a jury trial, that is a trial by a jury of our peers. That's one of our -- the bundle of rights that's mixed up in the -- in our constitutional rights. It's one that we value highly. In fact, it's one that we've actually gone to war over before in order to preserve.

The other side of that wonderful right is that if you're going to have a right to a trial by jury, you have to have a jury. And so we make it a duty of everyone to come down and to serve.

Now, having said that, we are also very aware that it represents a sacrifice for each and every one of you to be here. We know that -- that people come down and serve even though they may be the only person in the home that's earning any money. And so if they're not working because they're down here serving on a jury, then nobody in the household is earning any money, and yet they come and they serve.

We also know that there are other reasons why it may be difficult for people. Generally speaking, people aren't earning money or making money while they're down here serving on a jury except for those wonderful jury fees that we pay. I don't remember what it is, but it's usually not enough to entice people to come down here.

And so we really do thank you. And I promise you that the Court and the attorneys and everyone involved here

will do everything that we can to make sure that your time's not wasted. In other words, that you don't wind around -- wind up having to sit around and cool your heels a lot of time while we go through other matters that the Court must go through.

There are some things that we have to do outside the presence of the jury and there's no way to avoid that. But I can assure you we'll be doing everything that we can to make sure that that's held to a minimum so that your time down here is not wasted.

This is the time set for a jury trial in Case No. C-294695, State of Nevada v. Matthew Washington. Are the parties ready to proceed?

MS. PIEPER: We are, Your Honor.

MR. OTTO: We are, Your Honor.

THE COURT: All right. The record will reflect the presence of the defendant with counsel and counsel for the State. I'm going to -- in order to give you an idea of what this case is about, what this trial may be about, I'm going to ask our attorneys to speak to you for a moment just to introduce themselves and introduce, perhaps, their client to you and to indicate to you what kind of a case this is. And then also to tell you the names of any witnesses that they expect to call.

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I'll ask you all to please pay particular attention to the names of the witnesses that are read off to you as well. At a later point in time, I'll be asking you if any of you know any of those people whose names are mentioned. So we'll begin on behalf of the state, Ms. Pieper.

MS. PIEPER: Thank you, Your Honor.

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Good afternoon. My name is Danielle Pieper and this is Barbara Schifalacqua.

MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Good afternoon.

MS. PIEPER: We are Chief Deputy District Attorneys. We have been assigned to prosecute the case of the State of Nevada v. Matthew Washington. We have alleged that on or about November 5th, 2013, at approximately 4:30 in the morning, the defendant along with Martell and an unidentified co-conspirator, went to 2655 Sherwood. Once they got there, they shot into the apartment number 18, thirteen times. One person was killed in that incident and two people were injured and another person was in the home.

We have charged the defendant with 17 counts; one count of conspiracy to commit murder, one count of murder with use of a deadly weapon, three counts of attempt murder with use of a deadly weapon, one count of battery with use of a deadly weapon resulting in substantial bodily harm, one count of battery with use of a deadly weapon and ten counts of discharging a firearm.

I'm going to read a list of our potential witnesses in this case. Just listen for the names. If you recognize any of the names, the Judge will ask you at a later time if you know any of them.

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The first series of witnesses that I'm going to name are from the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department.

They're either in the crime scene analysis division, they're either forensic people or they're police offices.

We also will be calling potentially, Dr. Larry Simms of the Clark County Medical Examiners Office, Jerome Rubbles (phonetic) of the Clark County District Attorney's Office.

Ashley Scott is a lay witness, Darren DeSoto and Lorraine DeSoto are lay witnesses, Elizabeth Shell, Salvator Martin who works with Sunrise, James Lively (phonetic), Jeff Darbrunski

(phonetic) and James Figaro (phonetic). Thank you.

THE COURT: All right, thank you. Now on behalf of the defense, Mr. Otto?

MR. OTTO: Good afternoon, everyone. My name is David Otto and I'm proud to be here on behalf of my client, Matthew Washington, with my co-counsel Roberta Ohlinger.

The State has read the list of witnesses to you and I will let the Judge take it from here.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you, Mr. Otto. At this time, would all of the potential jurors in the courtroom please stand and raise your right hand to be sworn as potential jurors.

(Prospective jurors are sworn)

THE CLERK: Thank you, please be seated.

THE COURT: Thank you, ladies and gentlemen. Now we're about to begin the jury selection process. During this part of the process, you will be asked questions that bear upon your ability to sit as fair and impartial jurors. In order to accomplish this, questions will be asked of you by myself as well as some questions by the attorneys.

On occasion, some of these questions may seem to you to be somewhat personal. We want to assure you that we're not interested in prying into people's personal lives except we must ask some questions in order for the Court and for counsel to be able to know that you would be able to sit as a fair and

an unbaised juror in this case.

It's important that you know the significance of full and complete answers to all of the questions that we're about to ask you. Please don't try to hide or withhold anything that you might say that indicate any bias or prejudice of any sort by you. Should you fail to answer truthfully or if you hide or withhold something that touches upon your qualifications to serve as a juror, then that might contaminate the verdict which is ultimately rendered in this case.

Now, for a few minutes, I'm going to concentrate my questions to those who are seated in the jury box and immediately in front of the jury box. However, I will ask all the potential jurors in the room to please listen to these questions that I give and the answers that are given because it's not only possible, it's likely that at some point, one of these jurors may be excused and one of you may be called up to take their place. If that happens, it will greatly expedite our process. If you already heard my questions, you know what your answers would be to those questions and then we can get caught up here.

Now, the first thing that I want to do is to give you some idea of how long the trial might last. Now, again, I'm -- I'm addressing these questions to those that are seated in the jury box and right in front of the jury box right here.

I have sat on some trials that have lasted for quite a while and not too long back, I sat on a trial that last three-and-a-half months. I'm sorry, we don't have any three-and-a-half month long trials for you. We think this trial could go as long as two-and-a-half weeks. In other words, we think that this trial will end by Wednesday, the 23rd of April.

So let me ask -- I'm going to ask you a question and then I'll ask you to raise your hand if anyone feels they need to answer the question. But before I ask you the question, I'm going to define a few terms for you. The question I will be asking you is there anyone who feels it would be an undue burden for them to sit on a jury for the next two-and-a-half weeks.

Now, here's what I mean by an undue burden. I've already indicated that to sit on a jury is a duty and I've already indicated that people come down here and serve. In fact, they have to come down and serve even when they're the only breadwinner in the house.

It is not really a reason for me to excuse you that -- that you might lose some money during the next two-and-a-half weeks. It's not a reason for me to excuse you that -- that you're the only breadwinner in the house and it will impose some difficulty upon you. We do understand that, but while we do understand that, we know that -- that sitting on a

jury, while it is a sacrifice, there's no question about it, it is not the kind of sacrifice that we feel at all hesitant to ask citizens of this country who enjoy the freedoms in this country to -- to contribute to the cause of freedom and justice in our country.

It is, in fact -- of course, you might expect to get a speech about it from a guy who's dedicated his life to it, but, in fact, it is an honor to be able to participate in the justice process in our country.

It is also -- I make a promise to people and I'll make the promise to you all. For anyone who does sit on the jury and who gives it their all rather than tries to figure out how to get out of it, and who just does what we ask them to do, listens to the evidence, listens to the instructions, renders a verdict based on the evidence and the instructions, at the end of the time, I will promise you that you won't be sorry that you spent the time here.

I have yet to have anybody who did that, who told me that, at the end of the process, on the way out of the jury room, this was a waste of time, I'm sorry I did this. I always have people say I'm surprised, I'm -- I didn't like it, you know, I didn't want to have to do this, but I'm glad I did it. So, I'll make the same promise to all of you.

When I say it would be an undue burden on you, here's some examples of what I mean by an undue burden.

Perhaps you have that critically important surgery scheduled for -- during the next two-and-a-half weeks and you can't reschedule it. Maybe you have those tickets -- once-in-a-3 lifetime tickets to Hawaii in your back pocket that you can show us. Maybe you have some other thing that is critically 5 important that cannot be rescheduled. Those are the kinds of 6 things that we're looking at when we look to -- to excuse 7 someone from jury service. 8 Now, is there anyone who feels that it would be an 9 undue burden on you, the way I've described it, to sit in a 10 jury trial for the next two-and-a-half weeks? If so, please 11 raise your hand. All right. If we could get our microphone. 12 We're going to ask all of you to speak into the microphone. 13 This is how we make the record in it is in the microphone. So 14 it isn't just so we can hear you in here, it's so our court 15 recorder can get everything that's said and make a record of 16 17 it. So now I'm going to look on my handy-dandy chart. 18 It looks like in seat number 13, Mr. Roark? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Yes. 20 THE COURT: Yes, what's the problem? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Could I ask for 22 clarification first? 23 THE COURT: Sure. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: When you say two-and-a-25 Verbatim Digital Reporting, LLC ♦ 303-798-0890

half weeks, does that include weekends and to -- about what extent --

THE COURT: That's an excellent question. I'm glad you asked that.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: And what time of day would we look to be getting out?

THE COURT: Okay. That's an excellent question.

When I say two-and-a-half weeks, I don't mean weekends and I don't even mean -- most of the days, it doesn't mean all day long. We rarely -- we try not to go after 5:00 o'clock because taxpayers have to pay people to -- to be in here and you all don't want, as taxpayers, don't want to have to pay overtime. So we try not to go after 5:00 o'clock.

Additionally, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings I have motion calendars. So we rarely will be -- will be involved on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday morning. Thursday and Friday we go all day. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, we usually go afternoons.

It might be, on occasion, maybe some occasion, if my morning calendar goes away and we can schedule it all beforehand, we might have you come in a little early on a — on a Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday, but it would be, in other words, 1:00 o'clock is what you're talking about on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday. So it's really only half a day. Then Thursday and Friday we go all day and that's the way we run.

That's typically the way our calendar runs.

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So thank you for bringing that out. And it doesn't involve weekends. The only way you would be here weekends is if the jury has retired to deliberate on a verdict at the end of the trial and they're still deliberating and it runs over into a weekend. If this all goes according to the timing that we think this trial will take, we would be ending on Wednesday, the 23rd. So I wouldn't expect you to -- to get involved with weekend work.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Based on that answer, I have no --

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: I'm --

THE COURT: Well, thank you, I'm glad you brought that up. Now someone else right there did in seat number 15, Ms. Weinberg?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 980: Yes, hi. I'm -- it's actually Passover next week. My kids are out of school. And I'm out-of-town that Wednesday after Passover through that Sunday. I don't have care for my children, so we're going out-of-town.

And it would be a violation of a juror's duty if he or she tried to render a judgment on a case based upon what they believed the law was if it was different from the instructions that the Court gave.

So the question is, would you all be able to follow the instructions on the law which the Court will give in the case? Anyone have a problem with that? Okay.

Under our system of justice, certain principles of law apply in every criminal trial. They include, number one,

that the Information or Indictment in a case is a mere accusation and is not evidence of any guilt. Also, that the defendant is presumed innocent and that the State must prove a 3 defendant is guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. Is there anyone who does not understand or believe in these basic 5 principles of American justice? Okay. 6 Does anybody know anything about this case other 7 than what's been told you so far in court today? Okay. 8 I have a few additional questions that I need to ask 9 you as well. Would you all be able to wait until that point before you make the determination? That is what we ask you to do. Thank you.

Do any of you know of any other reason why you couldn't be a completely fair and unbiased juror if you were

selected in this case? Yes, would you hand it right -- Mr. Bailey, hand it right over your shoulder there to Mr. Eslinger?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 017: Yeah. I just had a question. Is a death penalty going to be involved in this case?

THE COURT: No.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 017: No. Okay, I'm good.

Now I'm going to allow the -- well, I'm not going to, I guess. We have flat run out of time. We try to -- try to stick with our word. So it's slightly after 5:00, so we're going to stop for the day.

Now, ladies and gentlemen, you're going to all go home tonight, at least I hope you are, and when you do, somebody at home is going to ask you to tell them all about what you're doing today. Because we don't want people to make any decisions based on something that somebody else tells them, I'm going to ask you not to do that.

I'm going to ask you to only tell your family members or friends, if anybody that asks you, to tell them that you're possibly going to serve on a criminal trail and the Judge has threatened you if you say anything else. That should -- that should take care of any questions that you might get from any -- any family members.

While you're on this overnight recess, then -- and again, we won't come back until 1:00 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. While you're on this recess, you are admonished not to talk or converse among yourselves or with anyone else on any subject or any person connected with this trial. This includes your family member or -- family members or friends other than telling them you're -- you're being considered for a criminal trial and you can tell them the part about the threat from the Judge if you want to, if that helps you fend them off.

You're not to watch or listen to or read any account of this trial by -- or on this case by any medium of information including newspaper, television, the internet or

radio. Please do not get on the internet and Google something about this case or about any criminal case overnight. Please do not engage in that temptation to refer to the internet to get all your news about what it is you're involved with.

The jury's function in this case is the same as any other case. It's your function to act as judges, judges of the facts. And in that, we don't want you to biased or prejudiced from any reason, certainly not because you got online and Googled something about either this case or any other criminal case. So please hold off until this trial is completely over before you do anything like that.

You are admonished not to form or express any opinion on any subject connected with this trial until the case is finally submitted to you.

We will assemble again at 1:00 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Did you need me before they go or is that after? All right. Counsel, anything else that we need to before we go off the record?

MS. PIEPER: Not by the State, Your Honor.

THE COURT: All right.

MR. OTTO: Not for defense, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Thank you. Thank you again for being here, ladies and gentlemen, we appreciate your -- your service here. Court will be in recess until 1:00 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

THE MARSHAL: And for the jury panel, if you would just check in on the third floor at Jury Services, they will scan your name cards tomorrow and then just come on up here and wait outside the courtroom at 1:00 o'clock. I want to make a couple of 22 announcements and then we'll proceed ahead with the jury 23 selection process. I indicated to all of you that we would be in trial 25

from today through the 23rd and I gave the times that we would be, generally Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday we go from 1:00 in the afternoon till 5:00. And the other, Thursday and Friday, we go full day.

However, we will not be in session on Good Friday. This year, Good Friday is April the 18th. So on Friday the 18th we will not be in session. To offset that somewhat, two days before that, on Wednesday the 16th, rather than being a half-day session, it will be a full-day session. So for your calendaring purposes, Wednesday the 16th will be all day, we'll be off on Good Friday, which is the 18th this year.

Also, it's come to my attention that during the selection process, occasionally we're getting someone who's -- one or more people who are chatting a little bit. It's not so much in this group that are inside on the hot seat, but rather those who are seated in the audience.

This is an extremely important trial to everyone that's involved. It is not a time to be making comments under your breath, either when a question is asked or when an answer is given. So I will ask all of you to please, treat this process with the respect that it deserves.

The Clerk will call the name of two more jurors.

You have seen that we have excused two people that showed us that they were -- had pre-existing plans they were unable to change.

She listed a number of witnesses. We're going to be a probably two-week jury trial, if after police officer after police officer after police officer after police officer after police officer, you know, I have to know that you can say to me, hey, look, that bias, that view, I'm not going to judge before I hear the evidence.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 902: Oh, I -- I would not. No, I would not judge before I hear.

MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. But are you hesitant to be a member of this jury?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 902: No. I just -- like I say, I just -- I don't know what kind of feelings will -- will come up as far as just that situation, like -- but I don't think it should be a problem. It would be in my head, but I don't think it should be a problem.

MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. Let me ask you about a couple other things, and for some of our other jurors that have asked, this is obviously not a death penalty case, but

you are going to generally -- if the State proves its case beyond a reasonable doubt with regard to first degree murder, you will consider penalties.

And Mr. Ennis, when the Judge yesterday was reading the first penalty range, the 20 to 50 years, your first response was to shake your head "no".

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 902: Oh.

MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. Do you remember doing that.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 902: No.

You don't have any 2 reason to believe that contact made with officers in those 3 particular cases will influence you whatsoever if you sat on this jury? 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 916: No, ma'am. Actually, I talk to the second officer on a daily basis pretty much. 7 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay, great. Well, is there 8 anything about that friendship then, if you will, that will 9 give you any pause to do anything but listen to the evidence 10 in this case? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 916: No, ma'am. 12 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. With regard to you being a 13 supervisor, let me ask you this. Do you ever have to deal 14 with disputes in your job? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 916: Yeah, pretty much on a 16 daily basis with the guys that work under me. 17 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. And what do you do -- what 18 tools do you use, if you would tell us, when you have, for 19 example, two sides of a story and you need to make a 20 determination? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 916: Well, I mean, I listen 22 to both sides of the story, you know, and then I go on track 23 history, you know. I pretty much -- I mean, it's --24 everything is different every day, you know. If I've got two 25

guys that can't get a long, you know, I will put them in 1 2 separate locations or whatever I have to do, you know. Or I'll bring them both in the room and let -- and then talk it 3 4 out, you know. A lot of times, it's somebody having a bad day, just one person having a bad day. 5 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: That's fair. 6 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 916: And when they get it out, usually it works out and, you know, and everything works 8 for the best. MS. MS. SCHIFALACQUA: And by lower end of it, do you kind of gather the information, then, to give to the general 2 manager? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 916: For the most part, yes. 4 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. Do you think you'll be 5 able to use those same type of common sense tools when you're assessing the evidence as presented in the courtroom? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 916: Yes, ma'am. 8 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay, thank you. Let me have you 9 pass the mike to Ms. -- is it Harakal? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 940: Um-hum. 11 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Hi. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: Yes. 1 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: What is your schedule like? 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: Tuesdays and Thursdays, 3 4 mostly from 8:30 to 5:00. MS. SCHIFALACQUA: 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.? 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: Yes. 6 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Are you -- if you get chosen to 7 be on this jury, are you going to be able to make up classes 8 or how is that going to work? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: I can send my work 10 online, that's not a problem. Most of what we do is pretty 11 much on the computer anyway. 1.2 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: And my -- as far as 14 finals go, my finals are the 26th, so I'm pretty much in the 15 16 clear. MS. SCHIFALACQUA: So if you got chosen -- chosen to 17 sit on this jury, is there anything with regard to your 18 scheduling of school that would be a problem for you? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: No. 20 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. Let me ask you this. 21 know you indicated that you weren't married, right? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: No. 23 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Don't have kids? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: I have twins. 25

1	MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Oh, you have twins, all right.
2	They just are not adults
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 979: No.
4	MS. SCHIFALACQUA: is that fair to say?

7	Las Vegas for 13 years. Where were you before that?

MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. Tell me if you've had 1 situations where you've had to resolve disputes? 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Every single day. 3 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Now here is what I'm talking about, okay. Describe for me kind of some of the tools you use. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: I settle disputes from 7 customers calling in about lost packages, their program is not 8 working correctly, they have complaints about our agents are rude to them. I also settle disputes between my employees who 10 report in to me. I have 42 that personally report to me and 11 we have 600 in the building. 12 Generally, I have to listen to all sides of the 13 If -- if it's with a customer and one of my agents, I 14 do check to see if the call has been recorded so I can go back 15 and review both sides, especially if the customer is saying 16 our agent was rude. Really, I do rely on other facts because 17 we do have systems that can track the package, find out where 18 it's gone, what -- what's happened to it. With the agents, 19 it's a lot of he said/she said, so it's definitely relying on 2.0 other employees around who can corroborate? 21 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Corroborate? There we go. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: That's the word. 23 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Got it. 24

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: One side or the other.

I also do have to -- because I've worked with them for so 1 long, I can see if there's patterns and their attitudes and 2 things like that from the past as well. 3 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: And with regard to kind of some 4 of those tools, ultimately are you responsible with making a 5 decision? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: In a lot of cases, yes. 7 About 85 percent of the time, I have to make the final 8 decision, whether it's to refund stuff back to our customers, 9 whether it's to put our employees on a type of performance 10 plan if it's -- if it's found that they've done something 11 that's against the rules. There are occasions where it has to 12 go up higher through HR or my manager, but if that happens, 13 I'm always part of the process as well there. 14 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Are you comfortable, then, being 15 able to take in facts and make a determination? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Yes. Probably more 17 comfortable than most. 18 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Do you think you can use those 19 same types of tools if you're chosen to sit on this jury? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Definitely. 21 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: You'll be able to kind of weigh 2.2 the evidence as it comes before you, wait till the end and --23 to make a final determination? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Yes.

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MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. Now with regard to your non-profit, do you -- did you start that up yourself or how did that work?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Yeah. I started that up myself. I've been doing medieval recreation for going on 20 years now and it kind of spun from that. I was in some state productions and I met a group of actors who wanted to get into that kind of thing and I said, hey, I play a pirate. And it kind of started by accident with my going to my kid's school, they had a Nevada reading week.

MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Sure.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: And they asked me to --well, my son asked me to come and read for his class, I said sure. He goes, well, can you dress as your pirate? I was like, I don't know. So I had to --

MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Coolest dad in the world?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Yeah. Basically, I had
to go through the school, so the school was really excited
about that. I ended up reading for the entire school that
year. And then the next year, they asked me to come back. I
told my actor friends what I was doing. They were like, hey,
can we come along. So two of them came along as well. They
dressed like pirates. And the librarian really liked our,
quote/unquote, "act" that we literally threw together that
morning and he started passing out our contact information and

1	more and more schools kind of started getting a hold of us.
2	And just this last year is when we officially formed the non-
3	profit to actually be able to do more stuff.
4	MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Let me ask you this. Are you
5	married?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Yes, I am.
7	MS. SCHIFALACQUA: And what is it again that your
8	spouse does?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: She's a homemaker.
10	MS. SCHIFALACQUA: I want to turn your attention, I
11	know you said you had friends that were victims of a crime,
12	correct?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: Yes. They their
14	apartment was broken into and vandalized and robbed recently.
15	MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. And by robbed, were they
16	home at the time?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: They were not home at
18	the time. They came home to the apartment which they called
19	the police and pretty much all their electronics were taken
20	
21	MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Was it Metro that responded or
22	
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: I do not know. It I
24	1
25	MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay, fair. Did you know,

obviously you talk to your friends and they might have a bend 1 on kind of what happened or a view on what happened. Were 2 they satisfied with whatever jurisdiction kind of came out to 3 their house or did they come out to the house? 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 976: They did come out and 5 they said that the police were very thorough, asked them a lot б of questions, took as much information as they could. They've 7 gotten a couple of follow up calls, but it's one of those that 8 they've yet to catch the guy or recover any of the stolen electronics. 10 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Thank you. Can I have you, thank 11 you, pass the mike on down to Ms. -- is it Ayoub? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: Yes. Good morning. 13 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Good morning. Or afternoon, I 14 15 think --PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: Afternoon all ready. 16 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Let me ask you this. You -- you 17 indicated that at some point you had worked with a 18 correctional youth facility; is that right? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: Yes, I did, back in El 20 Paso, Texas. 21 22 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. Can you describe for me what it is you did there and what was the time frame? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: It was -- I worked there 24

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for almost -- about two years and my job was to teach the

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inmates their GED and make sure that they would graduate with 1 their high school diploma. 2 MS, SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. And did you leave 3 voluntarily after two years? Did you move? Did -- what 4 5 was --PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: No. What happened, I б was going through school to get my Bachelor's degree in 7 teaching and once I finished that, I went ahead and started 8 9 teaching. MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Okay. Is there anything you --10 and this was with juveniles? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: 12 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Not the --1.3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: Yes. 14 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: Right, they weren't --15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: Yes. 16 MS. SCHIFALACQUA: They were young kids, is that --17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 958: Yeah.
