THE COURT: On the record in State of Nevada vs.

Lesean Collins. Noting the presence of counsel for the

State, counsel for the defense. The Defendant,

Mr. Collins is not present. We will make a record of that
in a moment. Jurors are not present.

The discussion that the court had immediately prior to going on the record was with Officer Razo from the Detention Center indicating that he spoke directly to Mr. Collins who refused to come to court today indicating that he needed his medication and had not gotten it.

Until he gets the medications that he believes he is entitled to, the court had confirmed yesterday and Officer Razo again confirmed today that the order of the CCDC medical staff is that he is to obtain Ibuprofen 2 times a day. I don't know if it was as needed or it's 2 times a day, or possibly less as needed, not necessarily more as needed. But you can clarify, maybe, Officer Razo. But then he did, over the weekend, was getting doses morning and evening.

Again would note last week when Mr. Collins complained about not having his medications then he was

given an opportunity to return to CCDC. He opted to stay and work through and was able to continue to be present. To my knowledge from what I observed he was able to participate in the process of jury selection. As of yesterday he absented himself when his medication was not forthcoming and today he's not present at all for the court, indicating he wished to have more medication.

I don't know what efforts he is undertaking to try to obtain his medication, but the court is unable to do what it has already done, which is to ensure that he is obtaining what it is he has been prescribed. And that appears to be the case.

The question the court had, Officer, can you clarify if you know with regard to the 2 times a day Ibuprofen as needed, is that more or less if needed, or is it possible he can obtain more as needed.

THE OFFICER: From my understanding it was just as needed.

THE COURT: Is that just two times a day.

THE OFFICER: Exactly.

efforts to work that our with medical staff there, that's up to him. To our knowledge he was assessed by the medical staff and determined that the most he would need is 2 times a day. He is, in fact, getting that 2 times a

day. He's indicating that's not sufficient. That's something for him to resolve.

My question for counsel then is last week -- and I would just remind in the record today -- that the court had extensive discussions with Mr. Collins when he was present about his options, in terms of whatever the circumstances were that would cause him possibly not to be It was his election to not be present and not be present. compelled to be present. The court could compel but would not choose to compel his presence. That was his choice not to be present. And that the court would certainly inform the jurors if that choice was made at any point during the trial and to ensure that the jurors were instructed not to consider it. The court gave that admonishment vesterday afternoon when Mr. Collins refused to return and will give that admonishment again today.

The question I have for counsel is has Mr. Collins indicated a desire to return to NDOC, or does he wish us to keep him housed here at Clark County Detention Center.

MR. SCHIECK: Your Honor, for the record, we did not go see Mr. Collins yesterday evening. Both Mr. Hyte and I felt it was better to continue to work on the case then to go see him late at night last night. There was a phone call this morning. Mr. Hyte initially spoke to him

on the phone, then he called back and I spoke with him briefly over the phone. He did express consistent with what's been place on the record now, his situation with his perceived need to receive the additional medication that he felt he was going to be getting based on the conversation from last week.

And he did indicate to Mr. Hyte that it was his desire to return to High Desert State Prison and not be kept at the Detention Center, pending the remainder of this case.

THE COURT: All right.

I appreciate that clarification. Honestly, I'm not really sure what the circumstances would be to effectuate that. I don't know that the court signed anything technically that would force him to be here during the course of the trial once NDOC transports him here and assumes he would stay here for duration of trial. I'll think about that. If anybody has any ideas or suggestions on how to address that.

MS. LUZAICH: My only concern is if he goes back to NDOC and decides he wants to come, it will just take extra time.

THE COURT: That would be that much more difficult to get him back.

MS. LUZAICH: Otherwise I don't have a dog in

this fight. Whatever they want to do. That's my only concern.

THE COURT: The court shares that concern. Again, it's possible -- he has I guess up to this point, he certainly has stated certain things then the next day acted in a different way, in terms of the court having the impression that perhaps he could or would change his mind. That certainly occurred with regard to the desire first not to dress out but then ultimately dressing out. need for medications, the desire to stay. At one point, without the medication, now the desire not to be present without the medications, since it appears to be something that could change from day-to-day at this point, the court will take no further action or in any way facilitate anything that would occasion his return to High Desert State Prison. But if something else is requested, and is put in the record, the court will address it in due course.

Anything else we need to discuss.

MR. SCHIECK: Yes, your Honor.

Without going into the details of my discussion with Mr. Collins this morning when he called, he did request that we come over to see him. However, he was locking down at that moment and it was, in fact, at the latter end of the morning visitation schedule and Mr. Hyte and I

didn't feel we could get there before visitation was completely locked down.

We do plan to see him this evening, if he is still at the Detention Center, to address some questions he had this morning when he talked with us on the phone.

THE COURT: So you'll keep us posted again if anything -- need the court's assistance on any matters.

Anything from the State's perspective.

MS. LUZAICH: This has been incidental, just because we are here. As far as the schedule for tomorrow, would it be possible to start at 1:00 o'clock instead of 1:30. We just have two witnesses that we need to get on because they are both leaving town for weeks.

THE COURT: We can do that. The only reason the court would do 1:30 is because we didn't appear to be pressed for time to complete in the time frame we qualified the jurors. It just gives a reasonable opportunity for a lunch in the event that morning goes long. Based on what I know of what's on calendar tomorrow, I don't anticipate a problem with us getting a full lunch hour if we start at 1:00 o'clock. So we can start at 1:00 o'clock.

For the first 4-and-a-half years I worked as a Α. 1 electronics surveillance technician. And for the last 2 4-and-a-half years now as a custodian of records. 3 What does electronics surveillance technician 0. 4 5 Explain the job duties. do. We're responsible for working with law 6 enforcement to locate people in emergency circumstances. 7 Whether it be someone calling 911 and hang up for them to be located, kidnappings, anything where someone needed to 9 10 b found. Additionally we are also set up for real time 11 tracking, wire taps and things of that nature. 12 So after working at 4-and-a-half years in that 13 Q. position you moved into your current position? 14 15 Α. Correct. What are you job duties in your current 16 0. 17 position? I'm responsible for maintaining as well as 18 Α. retrieving documents produced in response to search 19 warrants, court orders and subpoenas. As well as coming 20 to trials and hearing to help identify and explain those 21 same documents. 22 If a crime occurs and law enforcement asks 23 0. 24 Sprint for records and then need someone to come into

court and testify to those records as a custodian, you'd

be that guy?

- A. That's correct.
- Q. I'm sure there's more than one of you since Sprint is a rather large company?
- A. Yes. I'm one of a group of people that do this.
- Q. What is the training and experience you went through in order to obtain that position you are currently in?
- A. Specifically I was trained to become an electronics surveillance technician. Through that process we had to become familiar with all different records, the record keeping processes, as well as how to read and interpret those records. I was being qualified in that position as first a full technician after the training period and then to become a trainer who trained the other technicians, then on to be a lead technician. At that point Sprint asked me if I was interested in this knew position because of my knowledge of the records.
- Q. Now when -- excuse me. Have you testified in other trials previous to coming here?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. How many approximately have you testified in?
- 25 A. In excess of 450.

1	Q. In those 450 times you have testified have any
2	of those been as an expert?
3	A. Yes, 29 of them.
4	Q. What jurisdiction have you testified as an
5	expert?
6	A. They've been both in criminal and in civil
7	trials Federal, State, and local. In California,
8	Louisiana, Maryland, New York, Florida, Texas. I believe
9	that Main, I think Massachusetts.
10	Q. Multiple places across the country?
11	A. Yes.
12	Q. Now, when you come to testify you were
13	obviously subpoenaed by the Clark County District
14	Attorney's office?
15	A. Yes.
16	Q. Does the Clark County District Attorney's
17	office pay you to be here?
18	A. No. They are covering my expenses for being
19	here, but my salary is covered by Sprint.
20	Q. When you say expenses, what does that mean?
21	A. They paid for my flight, my hotel. They
22	provide me a per diem for food. That's the expenses. My
23	actual salary comes from Sprint.
24	Q. So I would like to turn now to some questions
25	about Sprint records.

When law enforcement sends out what's called an admin subpoena or an order to Sprint what kind of records will they receive?

- A. With that kind of order we provide information pertaining to the subscriber. Information about the phone calls and text messages that were made, as well as any cell site used in that process.
- Q. You just used the term cell sites. Explain to the jury what a cell site is and what information we receive from those?
- A. Cell sites can be cell towers. They can also be the tops of buildings or funny looking palm trees, depending on where there at in the city. They are locations where we have antennas that are used to send and receive signals to connect cell phones or hand sets to the network to allow to make and receive calls as well as information.

The information from those cell sites is important for us because it helps tell us where our customers are at at the time they're using our network. And from the information from a cell site, because a cell site is a specific location, we can determine that the person using that cell site would have to be in the general area of that cell site for it to be able to be used.

Q. If I'm a Sprint user and I get my cell phone

and I start making a phone call, will then my cell phone -- a lot of people use the term ping, connect, transmit to a tower that may be even in this building or antenna on this building or near it?

A. Yes, it will. It's going to be communicating all the time, not just when you make a phone call. Cause prior to a call being made or received that phone is in communication to determine what cell site it wants to use in the event a call is made or received. It's measuring for the strongest signal.

Now, if everything was equal, the closest cell site would always have the strongest signal. But networks aren't perfect and cities aren't perfectly flat. There are obstacles that block a signal. Because of that, the network sometimes has to connect a phone by the strongest signal and it may be the second closest, but still one in the general area of where the person is at.

The way that's done is cell phones have ranges or general areas where they cover. They cross a network anywhere from a 2 mile range up to maybe a 10 mile range. Those are averages. The 2 mile range really would apply more to an urban environment, or 10 miles to our most rural environments. But even in our most urban and rural we still have some exceptions to that.

For instance, if you went down on the Strip, you

might find things are measured in fractions of a mile, as far as the range, because of the number of people, and as you get out to really open areas, that 10 miles may by 15 miles but narrowly covering a long a road. It just depends on what the purpose is and how many people might be in the area to how we set up the network.

- Q. Just so I understand clearly in urban areas that are highly populated, the range of 2 to 10 will be -- could be much more narrow, due to the amount of people in that area?
  - A. Yes.

- Q. Sprint wants to provide their customers with good cell coverage?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. With -- are cell towers numbered or how are they configured so you know where a cell tower is and the cell tower that a phone is transmitting off of?
- A. For record keeping purposes we do have a numeric system. It's broken down by switch, which is the computed that controls the cell site in a particular area. Then within it they are numbered.

On our records that number shows up along with which switch is being used. The term for that is repolled. We just have to look at the correct list and then find the correct number of the cell site. Then it

1 will tell us the address as well as the latitude/longitude 2 of where that cell site is at. Then from that we make the 3 deduction of where we find the cell tower. 4 May I approach, your Honor. MS. BLUTH: 5 THE COURT: You may. 6 BY MS. BLUTH: 7 Showing you what's been marked for purposes of 0. 8 identification is State's Proposed Exhibit 105. 9 You were just talking about repole numbers. 10 Yes. Α. 11 0. Do you recognize the document I've put in front of you? 12 13 Α. I do. What do you recognize this to be? 14 0. 15 This is repole 353. Which is the list of cell Α. sites that covers the Las Vegas metropolitan and 16 17 surrounding areas. 18 0. Are these records kept in the normal and 19 ordinary course of Sprints business so you know which 20 numbers are matching which towers? In fact this list is one that covers a 21 Α. Yes. 22 specific set of dates pertaining to 2008, since we 23 maintained them and update them since this information 24 changes.

You are the custodian of those records?

1 Α. Yes. 2 MS. BLUTH: I'd move into evidence State's 3 Proposed Exhibit 105. MR. SCHIECK: No objection, your Honor. 4 THE COURT: State's 105 will be admitted. 5 may publish. 6 7 MS. BLUTH: Thank you. 8 BY MS. BLUTH: 9 To give the jury an idea what we are Q. 10 discussing, I'll put on the monitor -- do you see it? 11 Α. I do. 12 I'll go in here. So like you said earlier Q. 13 this is a Las Vegas cell site repole 353? Α. Yes. 14 These are from the 2008 time period? 15 Q. 16 These are from September 2008. Α. Yes. 17 Q. Thank you. So I'd just like to move from the left side of the 18 document to the right, if that's okay with you. 19 So we have here on the left -- the furthest left a 20 21 cell number. Then it states 1. What are we looking at. What is that information? 22 23 Α. That indicates it's cell site No. 1. On the 24 corresponding call detail that would be 001. Prior to the 25 zeros would be a sector. We won't go into that yet.

That's the first cell site in numerical order we look for if we saw that repole 353 on a call detail list and we saw cell site No. 1.

- Q. We talked about towers and antennas. It's the same thing as a cell site?
  - A. Yes.

- Q. So if cell site 1 where on top of this building that would be the antenna with the cell No. 1?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. But actually it's not at this building. Where is it located?
  - A. It shows it's in a sight that says Kyle
    Canyon. The address is 10695 Moccasin Road, Las Vegas.
  - Q. As we get to the right of the document it has the physical address of the antenna or cell site. Then on the furthest right hand of the document it also lists both its latitude and longitude so you know its precise location?
    - A. Correct.
  - Q. So when you look at cell phone records and you see -- for instance if you received records and you saw that the phone was transmitting off of a cell site or cell tower 1, you would then go to this list and see the exact location of cell site No. 1. Is that a fair depiction of how it's done?

1 Α. Yes. 2 0. So now I would like to ask a few questions. I would like phone number. 3 MS. BLUTH: Permission to approach. 4 THE COURT: You may. 5 BY MS. BLUTH: 6 Showing you, for purposes of identification, 7 8 State's 107. Do you recognize these records? Α. I do. 9 What do you recognize them to be? 10 0. I recognize this to be a Sprint call detail 11 Α. 12 record. The call detail record you previously referred 13 0. it to as a CVR? 14 15 Yes. Α. The call detail record is what we were 16 17 discussing earlier when an admin subpoena is issued or an order is issued to Sprint. Then you turn over these 18 records that then has incoming phone calls, outgoing phone 19 calls, text messages, cell site information, et cetera? 20 21 Α. Correct. Are these records also kept in the normal and 22 Q. ordinary scope of business? 23 24 Α. Yes. 25 And are you the custodian of these records? Q.

Α. Yes. 1 MS. BLUTH: I'd move into evidence State's 2 3 Proposed 107. MR. SCHIECK: No objection. 4 THE COURT: State's 107 is admitted. You may 5 6 publish. MS. BLUTH: Court's indulgence one second. 7 8 BY MS. BLUTH: MS. BLUTH: To save me from walking back and 9 forth Mr. Schieck has graciously allowed me to leave the 10 record up with the expert and use my own as we're going 11 12 through that. THE COURT: All right. We appreciate that. 13 BY MS. BLUTH: 14 Let's go back out to the left again, if we 15 0. 16 can. 17 We're now looking at the call detail record for No. (323) 706-5164, correct? 18 19 Α. Correct. So just like we did previously I would like to 20 go to the second -- go to the second list, just because 21 the second number on the list it looks like every box is 22 filled. So we can explain to the jurors what the numbers 23 24 mean. Okay. Fine. 25 Α.

Q. So on the second phone call -- first of all, to the left we have calling number. What does that mean?

- A. Calling number indicates the phone number that is either making the phone call or sending the text message. In this case (702) 503-6118.
  - O. The next column we have called number.
- A. This ultimately shows the phone number that is receiving the call or text message. In this case it's (323) 706-5164.
  - Q. Then the next section would be dialed digits.
- A. This pertains only to phone calls. If it was a text message we'd expect to see this go be blank. But what this indicates is what was dialed by the hand set making the phone call. So we may or may not see the 1 before the area code. In this case we see that (323) 706-5164 was what was dialed.
- Q. Above -- under -- sorry. On the top of the paper is says call records for (323) 706-5164. So would it make sense that this individual is calling their own number?
- A. It's not them calling their own number. It's the phone number (702) 503-6118 is calling in the phone number of whose record this is. That's what they dialed and where the phone call went to.

- Q. The next column you see incoming?
- A. Yes.

- Q. Would that mean an incoming phone call?
- A. Exactly. In that column with the MR and the pound sign, stands for mobile role. What is the role of the phone whose record it is is in the call. So in this case incoming mean received.

If it was an outbound call you'd see outgoing.

Then we see routed call. Routed means one or two things. Meaning sent to voice mail. Or routed is part of the incoming call process.

In this record this is a phone number with a California phone number assigned to it, but it's located outside of the State of California. It's located in Las Vegas. For practicality purposes every phone has to have a starting place for an incoming call so it doesn't get sent across the planet. In this case it is one assigned to Los Angeles.

So every incoming call first has to go to Los

Angeles and routed to where the phone is at. In this case
that incoming call line would show it being in Las

Vegas.

The prior line to it, the routing line is part of the process of getting to here.

O. How do we know the difference between a routed

call going to voice mail and a routed call go to os Angeles?

- A. If we go down on the page a few more lines.
- Q. You want to tell me how many lines.
- A. 2 more, if you could.

See on that very last line listed there you have a 1/1 prior to the (323) 706-5164. That 1/1 indicates it's going to voice mail. If you see a routed call and you see that 1/1 prior to the phone number, that is how we tell the difference if it's a routed call to voice mail versus if it's not there it's part of the incoming call process.

Q. Thank you.

Obviously the next two categories are somewhat self explanatory. Start date and end date. Is that the beginning of the phone call and the end of the phone call?

- A. Yes. From the time the network receives the call till it ends. I should note that that time stamp is going to be local to where the phone call switch was taking place. So in this case in Las Vegas it would be Pacific time.
- Q. So it's relative to the period in which the phone is in. I'm sorry. In which -- Pacific standard time?

- A. Yes. It does adjust if it's Daylight Savings or Standard time, it would be in the Pacific time zone since the Las Vegas switch is in the Pacific time zone.
- Q. The duration which is the next line. What is that?
- A. That's the number of seconds that the network had the call.
  - Q. The next is repole number?

A. Repole is going to indicate the switch. For ease of convenience it could also be able to determine if it was a text message or if it is a phone call. On this record we see the number 639353 a lot. Those are indicative of phone calls. The 639 being the home switch. So we see that when a call is being routed to voice mail or the incoming process.

Any time you see the number 291 through 298 or a 506 through 533, that is inclusive. Then those are text messages. In fact, we see on the fifth line down, one that has 292 as an example.

There's a zero second duration. Text messages don't take any duration or any time, but that would be an indicator that that is a text message versus an actual phone call.

Q. The last two on the list are first cell and last cell. Does that have to do with the cell site or

cell tower you were talking about previously?

A. Yes, it does. They are the very first cell site being used and the last one being used in a call.

You see a four digit number there. The last three digits 305 and then 349, that is the cell site number. That's what we look up in that list we looked at earlier to determine its location.

The first digit refers to a sector. To briefly explain. Cell sites have more than one side to them.

Sometimes there are only one side, but most of them on Sprint are configured with three sides. To label them we label as sides 2, 3, and 4 for the equipment in this area.

That particular side then tells us which antenna is being used. In 2008 we didn't record information about where it's specifically facing, so we just know that one side of the tower is being used. And what we determine from that is from the cell site itself that the phone is in the general area of that cell site.

- Q. So if we look at the last cell here we see 349, so the tower or cell site that this phone is transmitting off of is cell tower 349?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. That would be the third sector on that tower?

- A. Correct. Once again remember there is no side

  1. It starts with 2, then 3 or 4.
  - Q. So our options would be 2, 3, or 4?
  - A. Yes.

- Q. Just to be clear. Like you said before if someone is receiving text messages you would see zeros across the board because text messages don't take any time?
- A. As well as see a zero for cell site because we don't record what cell site is being used for text messaging.
- Q. If someone is on the phone and then receives another call and answers it, does that register? Will that show on the call detail record?
  - A. It will.
- Q. And what happens if the phone is turned off or runs out of batteries?
- A. Once you see the phone is off the network, being powered down, runs out of battery, been disabled, we'll see that calls go straight to voice mail which means there will be no cell site information. We'll see that routing call with that 1/1 prior to it in the called number field, you'll see that continually until it's powered back up again or somehow is able to connect to the network.

1 I'd like to ask you some specific questions 0. about the 323 number on the records you have in front of 2 3 you. First of all, what time frame, the date range do 4 those records start and end at. 5 They start on the 31st of August 2008 and 6 7 continue on through the early morning hours of the 7th of 8 September 2008. 9 For the next range of questions I'd ask you to 0. 10 turn your attention to September 2nd of 2008. 11 portions of the records, please. 12 Α. Okay. 13 0. Now let me know when you are there. 14 I'm there. Α. What page are you starting at, for counsel, so 15 0. 16 he can also look. 17 I'm looking at the beginning of the calls for Α. 18 the 2nd of September, which is on page 11 of 18. 19 0. Now during the morning and early afternoon 20 hours is there significant cell activity going on? When I say significant cell activity I mean 21 22 incoming/outgoing phone calls, text messages, et cetera. 23 Α. Yes, there are. 24 In preparation for your testimony, were you Ο. 25 given the address location of 1519 Laguna Palms, North Las

1 Vegas? 2 Α. Yes. 3 Were you also aided in creating maps of 1519 4 Laguna Palms in showing the areas towers that were 5 closest? 6 Α. Yes. 7 MS. BLUTH: May I approach. 8 THE COURT: You may. BY MS. BLUTH: 9 10 Showing you State's Proposed Exhibit 109. 0. 11 you recognize this? 12 Α. I do. Is this the map created by my office to help 13 show the jury where 1519 Laguna Palms is located and the 14 15 towers closest to it? 16 Α. Yes. 17 Is that a fair and accurate depiction to your 0. 1.8 knowledge as custodian of records and your knowledge of where the sites are located? 19 2.0 Α. Yes. MS. BLUTH: Move to admit into evidence State's 21 22 Proposed Exhibit 109. 23 THE COURT: Any objection. 24 MR. SCHIECK: May I voir dire briefly, your 25 Honor.

1 THE COURT: You may. 2 BY MR. SCHIECK: 3 0. You indicated that the repolling sheet we have is from 2008? 4 5 Α. Yes. 6 Q. That showed the cell towers in 2008? 7 Α. Yes. 8 0. The map you created today, within the last 9 couple of days, does that show the 2008 tower sites or 10 cell tower sites now? 11 It was using the date from 2008. It indicates 12 13 they answered or connected using call waiting. 14 0. Now, at that end of that phone call, which may I please have the approximate time or end time of that 15 16 phone call. The 1:51 start time phone call. 17 It ends at 2:43 p.m. and 38 seconds. Α. 1.8 listed as 14:43 and 38 seconds. It's listed in military 19 time. 20 At that point when she ends that phone call, 0. what cell tower is she transmitting off of? 21 Cell tower 239. 22 Α. 23 Showing you now State's 109, which was just 24 put into evidence. 25 Explain to the jury what we're looking at here.

1519 Laguna Palms is in the middle region of the 1 2 photograph, correct? 3 Yes. Indicated by the red push pin. 4 And there is a Sprint tower listed 144. Q. Ιs that the yellow push pin? 5 6 Α. Yes. 7 Now there is also a Sprint tower 239, which is 0. in the general area too; is that correct? 8 9 Α. Correct. Now, when this telephone conversation ends, 10 0. 11 the cell tower or cell site that the phone is pinging off 12 of or transmitting from is Sprint's 239? 13 Α. Yes. 14 So if someone was located at the 1519 Laguna 0. 15 Palms would or could they be pinging or transmitting off 16 Sprint's 239 tower? 17 Α. That is one of the possible towers that Yes. 18 could cover that location. Now Sprint 144 is closest in proximity to 1519 19 0. 20 Laguna Palms, correct? 21 Α. Yes. 22 Just because, like you spoke about earlier, Q. just because someone is located closest to Sprint 144, it 23 24 does not necessarily mean they wouldn't ping off a closest

25

tower?

A. Correct. It's going to look for the strongest signal. And even though the two different points between that address and Laguna Palms and Sprint tower 144 are very close together -- because we don't know how that tower is configured, we don't know how that tower is even broadcasting directing at that home location or near it, or there may be something that has to do with the construction in that area or buildings that potentially could interfere with it.

But taking into account we usually I have multiple cell sites in areas of a city, that way even if one would go down you still have coverage. So 239 is the second closest in proximity and still within the range we'd expect in an urban or densely populated environment so we'd still expect that that could cover that area.

- Q. During that 52 minute phone call, that 323 number is using, does that number during the phone call also hit multiple times off of the Sprint 144 tower?
- A. It does of one of the calls, hits the tower 144.
- Q. During that 52 minute phone call in the afternoon of September 2 of 2008, the 323 number is transmitting both off of Sprint 144 and Sprint 239, correct?
  - A. Yes.

After a certain point in the afternoon the 1 Ο. 2 phone activity is completely shut off, right? 3 Α. After a certain point we see all the phone calls going to voice mail. 4 When does that occur? What time? 5 Q. 6 Α. The first call goes straight the voice mail. 7 It happens at 3:52 p.m. and 49 seconds. At that point in 8 time we know that the phone is going to voice mail and it continues thereafter going to voice mail. 10 So between that time and the previous call which was received at 3:38, somewhere between that time frame 11 12 the phone either was powered off or the battery died or 13 was disabled in some way. 14 Q. What is the timing on the last incoming 15 call? The last incoming call starts at 3:38 and 1 16 Α. 17 second and ends at 3:38 and 25 seconds. 18 Q. The last outgoing call -- I think you already testified to this -- was the 52 minute call we spoke of? 19 20 Yes that's the last time there was an outbound Α. call. 21 22 Q. So right before this phone is turned off and 23 never turned back on, it is pinging off of the towers 24 located closest to 1519 Laguna Palms?

It's hitting off that tower 239.

- A. A prepaid phone are ones where you come in and you give the money up front. By doing that you get a set number of minutes, based upon how much money you put up front, or you pay for an unlimited number minutes or use during a 30 day period of time. There is no verification or credit check done, so if you want to continue using the phone after the funds run out you have to come back in and put additional funds. Because of that we do not verify name or address. We take whatever the customers gives to us and enter it into the system as is.

The second type of postpaid account is the one where we provide you credit. You use that service and at the end of the month we send you the bill for that service that we provided to you.

In that case we verify name, address because we're sending out credit to you and we need to verify to make sure you are who you say you are.

- Q. So the type of phone that (702) 884-1539 number, what type of phone is that?
  - A. It's a prepaid phone.

1 0. Now, in looking at the record that are in 2 front of you, are these in the same -- looking at the call 3 detail records -- are these in the same format as the 4 (323) number? 5 Α. Yes. 6 When I say format I mean moving from left to Q. 7 right of the calling number? 8 Α. We'd expect to see same columns. 9 the same rules would apply as far as if you seed a routed 10 call you check for the 1/1 prior to the number in the 11 called number field to see if it's going to voice mail or 12 not. 13 0. Look at the records and tell the jury the time 14 frame from which these records cover. 15 They cover from the first of September 2008 on 16 through the morning of the 6th of September 2008. 1.7 Q. I would like to turn your attention to 18 September 2, 2008. Yes. 13 In between 7:42 and 8:56 p.m. there are 0. 14 several, several phone calls made during that time period, correct? 15 16 Α. Yes. 17 Q. During that time period is the phone 18 traveling, like you said, up the 95 area and transmitting off of the 3 towers we see? 19 20 Α. We do see that. During that process it 21 appears to reverse itself. It appears after going north 22 the phone is coming back towards Las Vegas. 23 On the map do you see state Route 156 area? Q. 24 I do. Α. 25 Now the towers that are closest to that state Q.

Route 156 area, are those the same towers you have marked with the 3 yellow pins?

- A. They are the 3 closest. The one is closer then the others. That is tower 389.
- Q. So if an individual traveled from the 1519

  Laguna Palms area up the 95 and was on state Route 156,

  would it be appropriate for him to be transmitting off of

  Sprint 389 tower?
  - A. Yes.

- Q. So during the time period of which we have been discussing -- the 7:42 to 8:56 time frame -- do you have an opinion if someone was at the state Route 156 location which tower they would be transmitting off of?
- A. If they were on state Route 156, I would expect that they would use the tower 389. And depending on where along that route would depend on which sector of the tower they would use. But based on the fact during that time frame they are using Sector 3, which is side two, I would say they were somewhat generally going to be east versus more of the western part of that route.
- Q. Now, do you agree or disagree with the opinion it would not be possible for this cell phone to be anywhere near 156 during the period of 8:05 to 8:28?
  - A. I disagree with that.
  - Q. You believe if someone was in that area they

would be hitting off of the 389 tower?

A. Yes.

- Q. Which is the tower closest to state Route 156?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. Now, you stated in 2008 you didn't keep records of exactly where a satellite was facing, correct?
- A. Correct. We did not make it part of our standard record, what is known as an ASMIS, which is literally the direction that the antennas are facing on a cell site. We didn't start doing that as common practice until 2011.
- Q. If I were to use Google and try to research this information, would that give me accurate information during that time period of where a cell tower was located and the sector's directionality?
- A. If you are able to get a capture from Goggle Earth that would indicate 2008, at best it would show the physical location of the cell site. You might have some information as far as how the structure is set up, but it would not tell you the specifically the direction the antennas are facing.
- Q. Now in 2015 does Sprint keep records of exactly where the cell site antennas are facing?

A. Yes. Since 2011 through the present we do keep that information.

- Q. How does one receive that type of information to know which way the antenna are facing?
- A. We provide it on a similar cell site list, like the repole 353 we have been discussing. We happen to have newer versions of it with a slightly different name. But that information is still out there and available. It's often available through our website for people that have access to it.
- Q. In last time that these sites were done was in 2011?
- A. Very first time that that site -- we recorded that information was in 2011.
- Q. In 2015 have you done the research and checked the site to show which way the antenna is facing off of Sprint 389?
- A. I looked at both periods of time and found the information from both periods of time are the same. In this case the side 3 of the tower, which is the beta side was facing 30 degrees. I know this is going go back to our geometry lessons back in school, but a circle is 360 degrees in a circle. If we imagine zero degrees being due north and 180 being due south, 90 is due east and 270 is due west.

1 So 30 degrees means that sector is facing north, 2 northeast or slightly past north more of an easterly fashion is where it's facing. 3 4 Did you make a map to show the cell site 0. 5 location and the way they were facing both in 2011 and 2015? 6 7 We created a -- had a map created with a triangle put out showing the idea where we'd expect that 8 9 side 3 to cover. Showing with a 30 degree ASMIS that it would face that way. There is limitations that because it faces one particular direction, it's not going to face in the opposite direction. That sector limits the scope as far as the area that would be covered by that cell site and that sector.

BLUTH: I'll pass 17 the witness. 18 THE COURT: I think we should take a brief 19 recess before we reassume questioning with Mr. Clark. 20 I will remind jurors on this 10 minute recess --21 JURY ADMONITION 22 During the recess, ladies and gentlemen, you are 23 admonished not to converse among yourselves or with anyone 24 else, including, without limitation, the lawyers, parties and witnesses, on any subject connected with this trial, 25

I have one matter to bring to counsel's attention. I observed a significant period of time during the course of the testimony of Mr. Clark when it appears that one of the jurors was sleeping. That is Juror No. 13, Mr. Harry. I would like to, after the break and before we bring all the jurors back, ask my marshal to bring Mr. Harry back in, I'd like to inquire of him with regard to the circumstances.

I watched. It was at least in excess of a 10 minute period to see if there was any -- some people listen with their eyes closed. Some listen with their head in a certain position. While he did shift positions once during that 10 minute period I saw no effort on his part to view any exhibits that were being posted, watch the movement of Ms. Bluth through the room, or in any other

1 way listen to the testimony. So I want to, at least, if 2 nothing, inquire and further admonish him if need be. 3 MS. BLUTH: Thank you, your Honor. 4 MR. SCHIECK: Thank you. 5 THE COURT: Anybody make these observations as I 6 did. MR. HYTE: 7 I did not. MS. LUZAICH: I did not. 8 9 THE COURT: All right. See you back in 10 10 minutes. 11 (Brief recess taken.) 12 THE COURT: There was a request by Ms. Payton 13 after her testimony she could come back into the courtroom. We're ready for Mr. Harry.

IMPANELED JUROR: Hi.

THE COURT: Can you remind me what you do for work or school.

IMPANELED JUROR: LVNPD.

THE COURT: That is your occupation. I remember you had that experience.

The court observed for what the court would consider to be a significant period of time during testimony of this witness you with your head in hand with your eyes closed in two different positions, but with zero reaction to or effort to view any of the evidence shown to the jury or keep track of any of the conversations involving

counsel and the witness.

Are you sleeping in here Mr. Harry.

IMPANELED JUROR: No, ma'am. I was not
sleeping.

THE COURT: Can you help me understand why it appears to the contrary. It appeared you were sleeping in here.

IMPANELED JUROR: I was trying to basically wake myself up. There is many -- sometimes I was going to doze off, but I was trying to keep myself up.

THE COURT: All right. We didn't reassume trial here until about 1:30 today, maybe 1:40. We went for just over an hour half we broke. Is there some reason why you're having difficulty staying awake.

IMPANELED JUROR: I woke up around 5:24 this morning. I took my sister to camp. I had to do a couple of other things, so I was up all day today.

THE COURT: I saw you in here with Jim Jones food and drink while I don't have a problem with drinks don't bring food. Finish your lunch before you come here please. And endeavor to remain all appears of being attentive to the evidence and I'll take your representation at face value that you were not in fact sleeping although you had moments of being.

Either counsel have any questions.

MS. LUZAICH: Not by the State.

MR. SCHIECK: No, your Honor.

THE COURT: You may return to your fellow jurors, Mr. Harry.

THE WITNESS: Thank you, ma'am.

MR. SCHIECK: Your Honor, I did not personally observe Mr. Harry sleeping nor did Mr. Hyte. However, I accept the court's representation that it went on for a period of 10 minutes.

At first he denied he was sleeping at all, then recanted that and said, well, he was trying to keep himself awake and he was dozing. Given the court's observations and his concession that he was dozing during testimony, I would, in an abundance of caution, ask that we remove Mr. Harry.

We have 2 other alternates that are available. There's not that many days of trial left. I just think we run a risk of -- and he's the first alternate. If something should happen to one of the other jurors, we're going to be faced with the record we have now -- that the court has now rightfully noted that we had an inattentive juror. I'm constrained because I don't have my client here to ask him his observations, but I certainly would be asking this juror be removed.

THE COURT: Ms. Luzaich or Ms. Bluth, any

response.

MS. LUZAICH: The State doesn't have a position.

I'll submit it.

THE COURT: As the court said on the record before we brought in Mr. Harry, the time I observed was approximately from 2:45 to 2:55. And I'm not sure prior to that time how long it had been that Mr. Harry -- and to try to describe for the record the first position I saw him in was with his left hand under his chin covering his mouth with his head down into his hand. His eyes were closed. I would say he sustained that position for approximately 5 minutes.

There was then a shift in position to which he switched to his right hand, on the side of his right cheek with his head, again, down, eyes closed. And both times somewhat slumped in the chair.

Again, what I was looking for was any movement That lasted 5 minutes at which point he shifted to a straight up sit up position with his eyes open and did not appear to be otherwise not paying attention.

That observation I had directly contradicts his representations that he was not sleeping. Although I can't swear that he was sleeping. What I saw was any number of times during that approximate 10 minute period in which evidence was asked to be introduced, evidence was placed

on the Elmo for display, the attorney asked to approach, and did in fact approach the witness, the attorney approaching the clerk's desk and taking exhibits. Any which movements I would assume if someone was just resting their eyes would have prompted them to be engaged. None of it occurred.

I also noticed two jurors observing the juror who was not paying attention. Most notably Juror 12 and Juror 15. I am concerned about the circumstances. I did not further inquire of the witness, but I was tempted to, if he knew who this witness was. I was refrain ed from making that inquiry, but I'm concerned what the answer to that would be.

MR. SCHIECK: Just to clarify the record. The witness on the stand was Mr. Clark. And most of his testimony related to exhibits being shown to him and describing the various columns and things of that on the repole and the phone records and on the mapping. So this was, as opposed to a witness you could just listen to, he was a visual witness with a number of items being displayed. If the juror's eyes were closed, we're pretty sure he wasn't looking at the evidence presented and described by the witness.

THE COURT: Out of an abundance of caution at this time, given the period of lack of attention and the

amount of evidence in which the Juror did not observe, as much as I hate to do so I think we need to excuse Mr. Harry at this time, and I'm going to do so.

It's not clear whether or not -- we'd have no way to know -- whether or not we'd require further service of the alternates, as we are in the first alternate position, I think it would be of concern to the court should he be called into service. So at this time we'll excuse him.

Tom, return the other jurors to the courtroom. Ask
Mr. Harry to stay behind. Ask the jurors to return to the
courtroom. Then you can tell Mr. Harry that he is
excused. You might check in with Cindy to see if there is
any additional information she needs to know, but he can
return to 3rd floor jury services and be advised he has
been excuse from this panel.

Anything else before the jurors return.

MR. SCHIECK: No, your Honor.

THE COURT: Take your seats. I invite each of you to, if you used them during the break, to mae sure your cell phones are off.

I do want to, although the court has a record, I do want to advise the jurors that we have excused Juror 13, because the court observed Juror 13 being inattentive of the trial for an extended period of time. Because the inattention began during court the court did not interrupt

the proceedings to interfere with the circumstances but observe and determine that we could not proceed out of an abundance of caution with that juror since he missed a significant portion of the visual evidence provided.

I ask all jurors please, there is not a significant period of time that we are in here so please do whatever is necessary to ensure your full attention at all times during the course of trial.

## BY MR. SCHIECK:

- Q. Good afternoon.
- A. Good afternoon.
- Q. I'll try to be brief with my questions this afternoon.

Let me clarify. You indicated on direct examination that the cell tower information is going to provide a general area where a cell phone is located?

1 Α. Yes. 2 Especially when we're talking about records Q. from 2008, which aren't as sophisticated as the records we 3 4 have now. They are more sophisticated or less 5 Α. Yes. 6 sophisticated and not as inclusive as they are now. 7 Q. They don't provide as much information? Correct. 8 Α. Some of that information would be which 9 Q. 10 direction each sector is aimed on a tower? 11 Where as in 2008 that information was Α. Yes. 12 available if requested for a tower. It wasn't part of the 13 standard record keeping process until later. 14 0. So the records you have been provided today do 15 not contain that information? 16 Α. That's correct. 17 So if we have a cell phone that is hitting off 0. 18 of a particular tower, you can't say whether or not the 19 phone is to the east, to the south, or to the north of 20 that tower? 21 We know we have sectors, but since we don't Α. 22 have the orientation we know it's within the vicinity of 2.3 the tower. 24 Each tower may have a different strength to 25 it, correct?

A. I wouldn't say they all have different strengths. Though that is likely, I'm not sure if that answer, as far as if they are all set up differently, and how it's different.

But the range, yes. They are set up by ranges.

The ranges vary according to the number of customers it's trying to serve. The more customers you want to serve, the less the range is.

- Q. That's something that Sprint could set itself on each tower?
- A. It's something we do set on each tower to meet the needs of that area.
- Q. But we don't have that information on any towers we're involved in?
- A. That's not standard record as far as the specific range on any cell tower.
- Q. The range that is set by Sprint on a cell tower in large part would be determined by the amount of use that tower gets?
- A. Or the number of potential users that tower could get.
- Q. So when we talk about the particular towers in this case, for instance, Sprint tower 239, we don't have information available to us as to the range that that tower was set at?

1	A. No. That's why at that time at the
2	beginning I said we have the approximate ranges of 2 to 10
3	miles across that network, depending on the density of
4	people in that area.
5	Q. Likewise on Sprint 144, we don't know what
6	range that was set at?
7	A. Correct.
8	Q. Geographically speaking, Laguna Palms is
9	closer to tower 144?
10	A. Yes.
11	Q. Are there other towers I'm going to put
12	State's Exhibit 109 back up, which is the general
13	geographic area surrounding 1519 Laguna Palms. Are there
14	other cell towers not depicted on this map that if we put
15	them all on there they would show up?
16	A. I believe in this range there may have been 1
17	or 2. One that was further north and one further south
18	that aren't depicted on here.
19	Q. You don't know those numbers?
20	A. I don't recall them off the top of my head.
21	There is a couple hundred cell towers that made up the
22	whole city of Las Vegas.
23	Q. You were only pointed to these towers in
24	preparing this exhibit?

A. I was asked to look at time frames and these

1 were particular cell towers that came out through those 2 time frames. 3 0. And in order to avoid being unfair to you, you 4 are not based here in Las Vegas? 5 I'm based out of Kansas City. Α. 6 0. You don't know streets and addresses and 7 things like that? 8 Α. Correct. 9 0. Other then the information on the cell tower 10 list you have? 11 Α. And I relied on a mapping program to 12 determine where those would be at. 13 Q. If I ask you other addresses and where they 14 would be on this map, you wouldn't be able to tell me 15 where those are at? 16 Α. No. 17 Now, correct me if I'm wrong, but cell usage 0. 18 is such that when I pick up the phone and go to use the 19 phone, the phone is going to reach out to the network and 20 find me the strongest connection? 21 It's done that prior to you making the phone 22 call or attempting it. So at the time you made that 23 attempt, it's reaching out to the one it's already

determined. And as long as that one is available it will

24

connect to it.

- Q. That is the strongest signal available?
- A. Yes.

- Q. Not the closest?
- A. Strongest signal.
- Q. It's possible there could be a tower that is closer but it doesn't have as strong of a signal as the tower further away?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. It's possible that the tower that is closest to me may have a great deal of usage at one moment and the system would kick me to the next strongest tower?
- A. I want to be careful about saying a lot of usage and kicking to the next tower. If the tower you are trying to connect to is too busy, it cannot allow new traffic into it, you get that dreaded message of unable to complete the call or network not available on the phone. At that point in time when the phone goes back and takes that information then quickly determines what's the strongest signal knowing the one chosen is busy, it uses that. But the network doesn't kick anything over.

If the time it has connected to a phone call and it's already successful and the network is saying while this tower is starting to get overloaded, it can move the phone that's in progress to another tower that's still going to provide an adequate signal to help balance the

load. But that's after the call has been successfully started.

- Q. If I make a phone call and I connect to tower No. 1, and while I'm on the phone I have not moved tower No. 1 gets overloaded, has a lot of traffic coming into it, the system could kick me to tower No. 2, and I don't realize it because I'm talking consistently, correct?
- A. As long as tower No. 2 provides adequate strength to be able to complete the call, it's possible that happened and the user is not aware of it.
- Q. It can look at the records, if I hang up while still connected to tower No. 2, if we looked at the records it appeared perhaps I moved from the location of tower 1 to tower 2?
- A. The records would indicate that tower 2 was the indicator. As far as whether there is movement or not based on the duration of the call, distance between the towers, we could come up with a conclusion that the network transferred the call over, or if it's far enough apart there may have been some type of motion. But it is inclusive unless you had a lot of the data put together to make that assumption.
- Q. Okay. Likewise, I could be on a call and be hooked up to tower No. 1 and I could go somewhere else, but as long as tower No. 1 is still the strongest signal I

have I'll stay on that tower, correct?

- Α. Once the call has begun and that is the strongest signal and the network doesn't feel there's a need to transfer you and you are in range of it, you can stay on tower 1 the entire time.
  - Tower 1 may have a range of 2 miles? Q.
  - Α. Yes.

- So I could move 2 miles and still remain on 0. tower No. 1?
  - Α. Yes.
- Given all of the other variables we've talked 0. about?

- Are there other reasons why if I made a call the phone wouldn't connect to what would be the nearest tower to me?
- Once again the focus is being on the strongest Α. So if there is something else that's causing that signal not to be the strongest signal, those are the factors involved. And there are many of those. I don't know if I can name all of them. But if the signal is not being broadcast at you from the nearest tower, it's not intended to cover the area, there is no signal, so it wouldn't be the strongest. If there was something physically blocking that signal, a building or physical

structure, hill, mountain, those kinds of things, that could interfere. Extreme weather, blizzard, hurricanes, those could play a role. But the list goes on and on as far as all the factors that can play a role in it.

- Q. Now, are there situations where just glitches happen in the system and we get strange information on these reports?
- A. I guess -- could you clarify, strange information.
- Q. Right in the middle of two calls in one location for some reason the middle call hits on somewhere in a different area?
- A. I'd ask you to clarify what you mean, completely different area. Are you talking hundreds of miles away.
- Q. 10, 15 miles away. Do you have any of the exhibits in front of you?
  - A. I do have 106 in front of me.
- Q. I'm going to hand you State's Exhibit 107 and 105, which are the call records for the (323) area code and cell site repole for 353.
  - A. Okay.

Q. If I could direct your attention to on Exhibit 107, which is the (323) area code. If you could look at the entry on page 12.

1 Can you go to page 12. 2 Sure. Α. 3 Q. Page 12. I have it. 4 Α. Yes. It shows those were the beginning 11 12 and ending towers. So that we are clear. 13 Tower 040 --0. 14 Α. That's 400 West Carey, Las Vegas, Clark County, Nevada. 15 If this information is correct it indicates 16 17 that strongest tower strength for this phone between being 18 at 400 West Owens and 400 West Carey was the parking 19 garage at the Golden Nugget when it ended that call? 20 Yes, that was the strongest signal. Α. 21 There could be any number of reasons why a 0. 22 phone would jump to a different location to get the 23 strongest signal that we just talked about? 24 Α. There are a number of reasons, including 25 proximity as well a balancing by the network.
