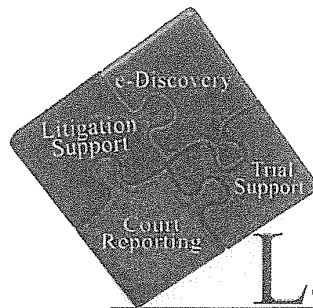

SEMENZA:</p> <p>12 Q. Good morning, Ms. O'Connell.</p> <p>13 A. Good morning.</p> <p>14 Q. My name is L.J. Semenza, and I represent the</p> <p>15 Wynn here today. Also with me is Chris Kircher, who</p> <p>16 works with me in my office.</p> <p>17 Have you ever had your deposition taken</p> <p>18 before?</p> <p>19 A. Yes.</p> <p>20 Q. When was that?</p> <p>21 A. In the '90s.</p> <p>22 Q. How many times have you had your deposition</p> <p>23 taken?</p> <p>24 A. Several times.</p> <p>25 Q. Okay. Can you tell me what instances that</p>



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<p>1 you were deposed previously?</p> <p>2 A. Yes. Some related to a business that I</p> <p>3 had.</p> <p>4 Q. Okay. Any others?</p> <p>5 A. And an insurance -- Acme's Insurance suit.</p> <p>6 Q. Tell me about the business depositions.</p> <p>7 What was that deposition relating to?</p> <p>8 A. I bought a franchise store. I paid for</p> <p>9 three, only got one, and it failed, and the franchisor</p> <p>10 left the country. So there were lawsuits from the</p> <p>11 mall, the equipment company, and several stemming from</p> <p>12 that. They were suing the franchisor, but in</p> <p>13 addition, they were also suing me. Were there any other plaintiffs along with</p> <p>17 you in that particular case?</p> <p>18 A. No.</p> <p>19 Q. Who was your counsel in that particular</p> <p>20 case?</p> <p>21 A. I'm sorry. I don't recall.</p> <p>22 Q. That's fine.</p> <p>23 So notwithstanding the fact that you've been</p> <p>24 deposed a number of times, you sort of have a general</p> <p>25 familiarity with the process; is that correct?</p>

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<p>1 A. I'm sorry. Which process are you talking 2 about? 3 Q. Of the deposition. 4 A. It's been a long time. 5 Q. I'll go over some ground rules for you here 6 this morning. 7 The oath you just took is the same oath you 8 would take in a court of law and carries with it the 9 same punishment, I guess, or penalties for not telling 10 the truth. 11 Do you understand that? 12 A. Yes. 13 Q. I don't want you to guess today. This is 14 not a knowledge test, so if there's a question that I 15 pose to you and you don't know the answer to it, just 16 let me know and I'll rephrase it. 17 Do you understand that? 18 A. Yes. 19 Q. If you answer a question, I'm going to 20 assume that you understood it and that -- is that fair 21 as well? 22 A. Yes. 23 Q. If you need to take a break at any -- 24 A. Excuse me. 25 Q. Go ahead.</p>	<p>1 Q. Tell me -- these were handwritten documents 2 of yours? 3 A. No. 4 Q. What documents did you review prior to your 5 deposition here today? 6 A. Part of my complaint. 7 Q. Any other documents other than part of your 8 complaint? 9 A. Well, I reviewed the things that were sent 10 to you -- one thing that was sent to you. 11 Q. What was that? 12 A. What Mr. Dilbeck sent me. 13 Q. Okay. And I can help it along, I think. 14 Did you review any medical records in 15 preparation for your deposition today? 16 A. A few. 17 Q. Okay. What medical records did you review, 18 to the extent you can recall? 19 A. What time frame are you going back? Are you 20 saying -- 21 Q. Just to the extent you know and can recall. 22 It doesn't matter the time frame how far back. 23 Did you -- let me ask it this way: Did you 24 review any medical records prior to the fall at the 25 Wynn on February 8th of 2010?</p>
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<p>1 A. I'm so sorry. 2 Q. No, you're fine. 3 A. If I don't understand something and I answer 4 it, I don't know that I didn't understand it. If I'm 5 misunderstanding your question, then -- 6 Q. That's fair. If I pose a question to you 7 and you respond to it and answer it, then I'm going to 8 assume that you understood it. If for any reason you 9 don't understand one of my questions, please let me 10 know and I'll rephrase it. 11 A. Okay. 12 Q. Is that fair? 13 A. Yes. 14 Q. There may be times at which your counsel 15 objects to some of my questions. Unless she instructs 16 you otherwise, notwithstanding the objections I'd ask 17 you to answer my particular question. 18 Fair enough? 19 A. Yes. 20 Q. Did you do anything to prepare for your 21 deposition today? 22 A. Yes. 23 Q. What did you do? 24 A. I went through things that I had written 25 before.</p>	<p>1 A. I don't recall. 2 Q. Okay. Did you review any medical records 3 after February 8, 2010? 4 A. Yes. 5 Q. And do you have any recollection as to what 6 those documents were or what treatment those documents 7 related to? 8 A. I think there were some from the GI 9 doctors. 10 Q. Okay. Any other ones you can recall besides 11 those from the GI doctors? 12 A. That's what I recall right now. 13 Q. Okay. And did you also have occasion to 14 review what are called interrogatory responses, your 15 answers to certain questions that the Wynn had posed 16 to you? 17 A. Is that the same thing that -- is that what 18 Mr. Dilbeck submitted? 19 Q. I believe so. 20 A. Some time ago, yes, I reviewed those. 21 Q. Okay. 22 A. Not -- 23 Q. Not recently? 24 A. Not in detail. I just. . . 25 Q. Okay. And, again, one of the other rules,</p>

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1 and I forgot to mention this, and I'm guilty of this  
2 myself, is that because the court reporter is taking  
3 down everything that is said, it's important that you  
4 let me finish my question, and it's equally important  
5 for me to let you finish your answer, which I didn't  
6 do right now, so I will try to work on that as well.

7 Are you on any medication today?  
8 A. No.  
9 Q. Did you meet with your counsel prior to your  
10 deposition today?  
11 A. Yes.  
12 Q. When did you do that?  
13 A. Yesterday.  
14 Q. How long did you meet with her?  
15 A. I didn't time it.  
16 Q. Can you approximate for me?  
17 A. A couple hours.  
18 Q. And have you consumed any alcohol within the  
19 past 24 hours?  
20 A. No.  
21 Q. And you, of course, haven't used any illegal  
22 drugs or anything like that; fair enough?  
23 A. Fair enough.  
24 Q. Okay. How did you arrive here today?  
25 A. By car.

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1 Q. And did you drive yourself?  
2 A. Yes.  
3 Q. Did anyone accompany you?  
4 A. No.  
5 Q. Did anyone assist you in driving --  
6 A. In driving?  
7 Q. -- here today?  
8 Yes.  
9 A. No.  
10 Q. And I noticed you have an assistive device.  
11 What is this called?  
12 A. Walker.  
13 Q. Okay. How long have you been utilizing the  
14 walker?  
15 A. I believe since a month after -- since  
16 sometime March 2010.  
17 Q. And was it prescribed or did you purchase it  
18 separately? How --  
19 A. Prescribed.  
20 Q. What doctor prescribed it?  
21 A. Dr. Cash.  
22 Q. Okay. Do you have any other assistive  
23 devices that help you with your mobility other than  
24 the walker with you here today?  
25 A. I have another walker.

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1 Q. Is there any particular reason you use one  
2 or the other or just to make sure you have one handy?  
3 A. I keep one in my home and one in the car.  
4 Q. Okay. Are you in pain currently?  
5 A. Yes.  
6 Q. Okay. What is your -- well, where are you  
7 currently experiencing pain right now?  
8 A. In my neck.  
9 Q. Just your neck?  
10 A. My right buttocks hurts a little.  
11 Q. Any other locations you're currently  
12 experiencing right now?  
13 A. Not right now.  
14 Q. What is your pain level on a scale of 1 to  
15 10?  
16 A. It just hurts.  
17 Q. Can you identify what level it is on a scale  
18 of 1 to 10?  
19 A. Not really. It just hurts, and it's  
20 starting to make my -- it's going up my head.  
21 Q. Okay. And if there are points in the  
22 deposition that you need to stand up, sit down, take a  
23 break, that's obviously fine. You just need to let us  
24 know, okay?  
25 A. Thank you.

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1 Q. Does the pain you're experiencing now, is  
2 that going to in any way affect your ability to answer  
3 my questions here today?  
4 A. It just makes it harder, but I will answer  
5 them.  
6 Q. Okay. And is there any particular reason  
7 why I can't have your most accurate answers during the  
8 deposition today? I know it's a strange question.  
9 A. I will make them as accurate as possible.  
10 Q. Perfect.  
11 The pain in your neck and the pain in your  
12 right buttocks that you had described, has that been  
13 persistent or is that just today?  
14 A. It's persistent.  
15 Q. And how long have you had the neck and the  
16 buttocks pain?  
17 A. Since the fall.  
18 Q. It has been constant all the way since  
19 February 8th of 2010 to now?  
20 A. I'm sorry. What do you mean by --  
21 Q. The pain you're experiencing here today  
22 you've identified you've had consistently throughout  
23 time since the fall at the Wynn; is that correct?  
24 A. Not the same level.  
25 Q. Okay.

1 A. Depending on how I move or my position, it  
2 will come and go from that.  
3 Q. Overall has the pain in your neck and your  
4 right buttocks decreased over time or increased over  
5 time since the fall?  
6 A. Increased. Excuse me. That's not exactly  
7 accurate. The pain in my neck has increased, and the  
8 pain in my buttocks is about the same.  
9 Q. The pain in your buttocks, is it sciatica?  
10 A. I've been told that it's sciatica.  
11 Q. And, I'm sorry, the pain in your neck has  
12 increased and the pain in your buttocks has decreased;  
13 is that correct?  
14 A. No, that's about the same.  
15 Q. It's about the same. Okay. I'm sorry.  
16 Do you have an understanding as to why your  
17 neck hurts?  
18 A. A general understanding.  
19 Q. What is that understanding?  
20 A. My discs are damaged and I have nerve  
21 compression.  
22 Q. Are you currently under any treatment  
23 relating to your neck?  
24 A. I need to see other doctors and then I'm  
25 going to get the surgery on my neck.

1 Q. And what do you understand that surgery to  
2 be on your neck? Is it going to be a fusion or --  
3 A. Three discs.  
4 Q. And they're going to fuse three discs?  
5 A. Well, they're going to -- I can't tell you  
6 specifically, but they're going to work on three  
7 discs.  
8 Q. Okay. And the pain in your neck, do you  
9 contribute that to the fall at the Wynn on February  
10 8th of 2010?  
11 A. Yes.  
12 Q. And with regard to pain in your buttocks,  
13 are you currently seeking treatment for that?  
14 A. That -- with the same doctor after the neck  
15 surgery, then he'll do the back surgery.  
16 Q. Your understanding is that the pain you're  
17 experiencing relates to your back but travels down  
18 into your buttocks?  
19 A. Yes.  
20 Q. And that's Dr. Cash as well?  
21 A. No.  
22 Q. Who is that doctor?  
23 A. Dr. Dunn.  
24 Q. And would Dr. Dunn be the one performing the  
25 surgery both on your neck and your back?

1 A. Yes.  
2 Q. And what do you understand the surgery on  
3 your back to involve?  
4 A. He says I have three flat discs. I mean, he  
5 says they're like flat tires.  
6 Q. Okay. And do you have any specific  
7 understanding as to what the surgical procedure would  
8 be to resolve that issue or to fix those discs?  
9 A. Only that it's even harder than the neck.  
10 Q. Do you have the neck surgery scheduled as of  
11 now?  
12 A. I can't. He said for me to get an eye  
13 clearance first.  
14 Q. What is an eye clearance?  
15 A. After the MRIs my eyes started detaching --  
16 the left eye started detaching, and so now both of  
17 them are detaching.  
18 Q. Okay. So before you can schedule the neck  
19 surgery, the doctor wants to make sure your eyes  
20 are --  
21 A. That has to stop detaching.  
22 Q. Okay. And by "detaching" do you have an  
23 understanding what that means just from a layman's  
24 perspective so I understand it?  
25 A. There's a risk of the retina detaching.

1 Q. And have either of your retinas in your eyes  
2 detached?  
3 A. I need to go back and get it checked again  
4 because, you know, they're monitoring it for that.  
5 Q. Okay. But as of now are they normal? Are  
6 there issues with your --  
7 A. They're not normal.  
8 Q. Okay. When did you begin having issues with  
9 your eyes?  
10 A. The issue we're talking about?  
11 Q. Yes.  
12 A. After the MRIs in June.  
13 Q. June of 2014?  
14 A. Yes.  
15 Q. Okay. Do you attribute the current issues  
16 with your eyes to the fall that took place on February  
17 8th of 2010 at the Wynn?  
18 A. Maybe to the treatment that was necessary  
19 after that.  
20 Q. The treatment on your eyes after that?  
21 A. Like X-rays and MRIs.  
22 Q. Okay. But that doesn't specifically relate  
23 to your eyes, does it?  
24 A. I'm sorry?  
25 Q. Well, and backing up, so do you know what

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<p>1 your diagnosis is currently, relating to your eyes? 2 A. They're detaching. 3 Q. Okay. The retinas are detaching in both 4 eyes? 5 A. Hopefully not the retinas. The vitreous -- 6 the way I understand it, the vitreous is detaching 7 from the retina which could make the retinas detach, 8 and I'm supposed to watch them. 9 Q. Okay. And that first -- you first started 10 experiencing issues relating to this in June of 2014? 11 A. Yes. 12 Q. Okay. Who's your eye doctor currently? 13 A. I have three. 14 Q. Okay. Can you tell me who those are? 15 A. The retina specialist, Dr. Yepremyan, and he 16 referred me to the ophthalmologist, Dr. Perozek, who 17 referred me to the neuro-ophthalmologist, 18 Dr. Houchin. 19 Q. So are you currently seeing Dr. Houchin 20 relating to your eyes or are you still seeing all 21 three of them? 22 A. Dr. Houchin was going to monitor this, but 23 my primary doctor told me that I have to go get my -- 24 go back to the cardiologist first before I go back to 25 Dr. Houchin.</p>	<p>1 with your eyes? 2 A. It's that in addition to the fact that after 3 I fell and hit my head, I had symptoms on the left 4 side of my face, including my left eye. 5 Q. Okay. We'll get to that. Okay. 6 A. Oh, and also that when they took the first 7 neck MRI -- 8 Q. Yes. 9 A. -- in 2010, they couldn't finish. They had 10 to get me out because I had extreme pain in my head. 11 Q. Okay. That triangle part. 17 <b>Q. Okay. Why don't you put a triangle on that.</b> 18 <b>And we're looking at page 473.</b> 19 A. You want a triangle in the box? 20 <b>Q. Yeah.</b> 21 A. (Writing.) 22 <b>Q. Okay. All right. What else do you recall</b> 23 <b>hitting or contacting your body?</b> 24 A. Well, I had a bruise on my leg also, and I 25 know I was completely on the ground, and I was in so</p>

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1 much pain in other parts of my body, so I could have  
2 even hit the drain.  
3 Q. Okay. You don't know if you hit the drain  
4 or not?  
5 A. I know I hit things, and other than -- I'm  
6 positive that's where my -- the triangle part is where  
7 that bruise came from, but I don't know what else I  
8 hit other than I was completely on the ground.  
9 Q. Okay. You don't know if you hit your head  
10 or not?  
11 A. Well, I must have hit my head.  
12 Q. Why do you say that?  
13 A. Because I was completely on the ground.  
14 Q. Okay. Where -- well, okay. You don't  
15 specifically recall hitting your head, do you?  
16 A. Oh, it happened suddenly, and I just know  
17 that I was on the ground and people woke me up.  
18 Q. Okay. Oh, they woke you up?  
19 A. Yes.  
20 Q. Did you lose consciousness?  
21 A. Well, people woke me up, so --  
22 Q. And how do you know people woke you up? Do  
23 you recall losing consciousness?  
24 MS. MORRIS: Object to foundation.  
25 THE WITNESS: I recall people waking up -- I

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1 recall people waking me up. I recall that's why -- it  
2 was like people were waking me up, talking to me.  
3 BY MR. SEMENZA:  
4 Q. Did you have any bumps or bruises on your  
5 head anywhere?  
6 A. I don't know.  
7 Q. Okay. And you had mentioned a bruise on  
8 your leg. Where was the bruise?  
9 A. The thigh.  
10 Q. On your right thigh?  
11 A. Yes.  
12 Q. Okay. Any other bruises that you can  
13 recall?  
14 A. I wasn't in a position to see them. The  
15 doctor's the one who told me I had them.  
16 Q. Okay. To your knowledge, though, you didn't  
17 see any other bruises other than the one on your  
18 buttocks and one on your thigh?  
19 A. I wasn't able to look. I could have had  
20 more, but I wasn't able to look.  
21 Q. Okay. And you do recall falling into the  
22 plants, though?  
23 A. I think part of me was in the plants.  
24 Q. Okay. And you were just pointing to your  
25 shoulder. You think --

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1 A. I think part of my shoulder was in the  
2 plants.  
3 Q. And that tends to indicate that your head  
4 was also in the plants?  
5 A. Probably. If my shoulder was, I assume my  
6 head was.  
7 Q. Okay. And is it your belief, then, that you  
8 hit something with your head in the planter or do you  
9 not know?  
10 A. I don't know what I hit, but now I believe  
11 that maybe I -- parts of my body hit the drain also  
12 just because I -- I don't know what else I hit.  
13 Q. Give me one second.  
14 Who do you recall first coming to your  
15 assistance?  
16 A. Terry.  
17 Q. No one assisted you prior to Terry's arrival  
18 to the scene?  
19 A. Oh, I'm sorry. The people who picked me up,  
20 is that what you mean?  
21 Q. Who were the people that picked you up,  
22 yeah.  
23 A. I don't know who they were.  
24 Q. How long were they on the scene with you?  
25 A. I don't know how long they were there before

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1 they woke me up and I don't -- I know they were there  
2 long enough to pick me up and leave me standing  
3 there.  
4 Q. You don't know who they were or where they  
5 went?  
6 A. No. I didn't see.  
7 Q. Do you recall communicating with them at  
8 all?  
9 A. Only they asked me if I could get up, and I  
10 couldn't.  
11 Q. Okay.  
12 A. So I believe that was the only  
13 communication. They picked me up, and they were  
14 gone.  
15 Q. How many people were there?  
16 A. I'm not sure.  
17 Q. Can you describe any of them?  
18 A. No.  
19 Q. Male or female?  
20 A. No. I mean, I believe they were men that  
21 picked me up, but there could have been some females  
22 there.  
23 Q. Okay. And did they -- they physically  
24 picked you up?  
25 A. Physically.

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<p>1 Q. How did they do that?</p> <p>2 A. I'm not sure. I just -- I couldn't get up,</p> <p>3 and they lifted me up and left me standing.</p> <p>4 Q. Okay. And you said you couldn't get up.</p> <p>5 What was the reason as to why you couldn't get up at</p> <p>6 that point in time?</p> <p>7 A. I was in excruciating pain.</p> <p>8 Q. And was that pain on a 10 out of 10 scale?</p> <p>9 A. It was off the charts.</p> <p>10 Q. The most excruciating pain you've ever</p> <p>11 experienced?</p> <p>12 A. Well, I -- it was just immediate pain.</p> <p>13 Q. Okay. What at that point in time do you</p> <p>14 recall hurting?</p> <p>15 A. My shoulder.</p> <p>16 Q. Which shoulder?</p> <p>17 A. The right one.</p> <p>18 Q. Okay.</p> <p>19 A. My arms and hands.</p> <p>20 Q. Both arms, both hands?</p> <p>21 A. Yes. My buttocks.</p> <p>22 At what time specifically are you asking?</p> <p>23 Q. Immediately after the fall.</p> <p>24 A. Are you asking -- okay. Are you asking when</p> <p>25 I was standing?</p>	<p>1 lot of pain.</p> <p>2 Q. Okay. So at that point in time you didn't</p> <p>3 know where you were hurting?</p> <p>4 A. I hadn't broken it down.</p> <p>5 Q. Okay.</p> <p>6 A. I just hurt.</p> <p>7 Q. What was the time frame that we -- that you</p> <p>8 identified specific areas that hurt? What was the</p> <p>9 time frame after the fall that you were able to</p> <p>10 identify or that you were referring to in your prior</p> <p>11 answer?</p> <p>12 A. Then after some of the employees came and I</p> <p>13 had to sit, I had to limp to a -- the closest place to</p> <p>14 sit, and so at that time I knew my foot was hurting</p> <p>15 and my leg was hurting. And when I was sitting, I</p> <p>16 knew my buttocks was hurting, so that's my foot and my</p> <p>17 buttocks, and my back was hurting. And -- oh, also</p> <p>18 when I was standing, I wanted to take pictures, but I</p> <p>19 couldn't. I couldn't get my camera or my phone out of</p> <p>20 my purse, so I knew that my arms and hands were</p> <p>21 hurting.</p> <p>22 Q. Okay. Why did you think it was important to</p> <p>23 take photographs or why did you want to take</p> <p>24 photographs?</p> <p>25 A. Well, because I was standing there, and I</p>
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<p>1 Q. Well, did your pain change during that</p> <p>2 period of time from when you were on the ground to</p> <p>3 when you were standing?</p> <p>4 A. I think I was more aware of specifically</p> <p>5 where it was hurting once I was standing and later,</p> <p>6 sitting.</p> <p>7 Q. Okay. So let's take it from there.</p> <p>8 So when you were standing, when the</p> <p>9 individuals assisted you up, you said your right</p> <p>10 shoulder, both arms, both hands and your buttocks.</p> <p>11 Anything else?</p> <p>12 A. I'm so sorry.</p> <p>13 Q. That's okay.</p> <p>14 A. I think you're being specific, so I've got</p> <p>15 to listen closer. I'm sorry. What specifically --</p> <p>16 you're talking about a specific time and --</p> <p>17 Q. Right.</p> <p>18 A. -- you're breaking it down so --</p> <p>19 Q. Immediately after the fall, after you've</p> <p>20 been assisted to stand up --</p> <p>21 A. Okay.</p> <p>22 Q. -- you have identified that you had pain in</p> <p>23 your right shoulder, both arms, both hands and your</p> <p>24 buttocks. Was there anything else?</p> <p>25 A. Okay. At that time I just knew I was in a</p>	<p>1 had just fallen, and I was in pain, and I know you're</p> <p>2 supposed to take pictures.</p> <p>3 Q. Did you actually take any pictures?</p> <p>4 A. I wasn't physically able to.</p> <p>5 Q. Did you ask anyone --</p> <p>6 A. Yes.</p> <p>7 Q. -- to take photographs?</p> <p>8 A. Yes.</p> <p>9 Q. Who did you ask?</p> <p>10 A. The Wynn employees.</p> <p>11 Q. So as you were stood up, you walked with a</p> <p>12 limp, as you characterized it, to a location where you</p> <p>13 sat down. Where was that?</p> <p>14 A. Okay. I was standing; it was off to the</p> <p>15 left.</p> <p>16 Q. In the casino or some private area?</p> <p>17 A. No, in the casino. It was a machine, the</p> <p>18 closest machine.</p> <p>19 Q. Okay. At a slot machine?</p> <p>20 A. Yes.</p> <p>21 Q. You sat down?</p> <p>22 A. Yes.</p> <p>23 Q. Okay. And was Terry still there?</p> <p>24 A. Terry, he had -- once he came to me he had</p> <p>25 moved to my left in the back of me. So when I limped</p>

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1 to the machine, I believe he was still there.  
2 Q. Okay. Who else was present with you when  
3 you sat down at a machine?  
4 A. At any time that I was sitting at the  
5 machine do you mean?  
6 Q. Yes.  
7 A. Okay. Then a short time later the security  
8 guard, Corey, he came, and then the lady -- I believe  
9 her name is -- I think there's a report in there, that  
10 must have been her -- Yanet Elias, I believe.  
11 Q. Okay.  
12 A. And then they -- when I was sitting there,  
13 they're the two that came, and then -- and then Terry  
14 came with his report.  
15 Q. Let me have you turn to 475 on the exhibit,  
16 please. All right. Do you know what this picture  
17 depicts?  
18 A. Yes.  
19 Q. Okay. What does it depict?  
20 A. Corey, the security guard, asked me where I  
21 was hurting, and I told him, and I also told him my  
22 foot was hurting; so he asked if he could take a  
23 picture, and so he did.  
24 Q. Okay. And what foot was hurting? The right  
25 foot?

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1 A. The right foot.  
2 Q. Okay. And was this a picture that was taken  
3 while you were sitting at the slot machine?  
4 A. Yes.  
5 Q. Were any of your clothes wet?  
6 A. I don't recall.  
7 Q. Okay. So security arrived at the location  
8 where you were sitting at the slot machine?  
9 A. Yes.  
10 Q. Did you go somewhere else or did your  
11 interaction with security occur at the slot machine?  
12 A. With him just there.  
13 Q. At any point in time prior to exiting the  
14 Wynn, did you go anywhere else? Did they take you  
15 into a security office? Did they --  
16 A. Oh, did they take me?  
17 Q. Yeah.  
18 A. No.  
19 Q. Let me have you turn to page 476. Have you  
20 seen this document before?  
21 A. Yes.  
22 Q. When did you last see it?  
23 A. Just recently.  
24 Q. Do you recall declining any medical  
25 assistance?

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1 A. Yes.  
2 Q. Why did you do that?  
3 A. Because I was alone and afraid and nobody  
4 knew I was there.  
5 Q. Nobody knew you were at the Wynn, is that  
6 what you're referring to?  
7 A. Yes. I mean, of course my cousins knew I  
8 was there, but they were out of the picture.  
9 Q. But were they out of the picture? You  
10 didn't attempt to try to contact them at that point in  
11 time, did you?  
12 A. They wouldn't be anybody that I would  
13 contact for that.  
14 Q. Just so I'm clear, you declined medical  
15 attention at that point in time because you were alone  
16 and afraid?  
17 A. Yes.  
18 Q. Okay. What were you afraid of?  
19 A. I was just -- I was dazed and I didn't -- I  
20 was alone. I didn't know what to do. I was just  
21 dazed and afraid.  
22 Q. Okay. You don't dispute that you declined  
23 medical attention from Wynn, do you?  
24 A. Well, to clarify, I told them -- I told  
25 security that if I couldn't get back to my car on my

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1 own, then -- because I didn't really know to the  
2 extent that I was injured. If I couldn't get back  
3 there, then I might have to call them.  
4 Q. And how would you have done that at that  
5 point in time? If you were attempting to get back to  
6 your car at that point in time and believed that you  
7 were unable to do so, what would you have done? What  
8 was your plan if that was the case?  
9 A. I don't know. I would have contacted  
10 somebody if I couldn't go by myself.  
11 Q. And again my question is: How would you  
12 have done that? What would you have done in order to  
13 contact someone?  
14 A. Then I would have followed up at the Wynn.  
15 Q. Right. If you're on your way out and you  
16 don't believe that you're capable of either driving at  
17 that point in time or of getting to your car in the  
18 first place, did you have an idea as to how you were  
19 going to make contact with anyone at Wynn to assist  
20 you?  
21 A. Oh, I was still there.  
22 Q. Right.  
23 A. And there's -- all the employees are there.  
24 Q. So you would have -- your plan was that you  
25 would have --

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1 A. I would just tell them. It's easy to  
2 contact any employee there.  
3 Q. Okay. How long were you sitting at the slot  
4 machine, dealing with security and Terry, before you  
5 decided that you were going to go and leave?  
6 A. I'm not sure how long they kept me there,  
7 sitting there. It was -- I wasn't aware of the time  
8 other than Miss Elias had given a time and I  
9 believe -- because I had written it down; it was 2:30.  
10 So after they finished up, I don't know how long I was  
11 with them.  
12 Q. Was it longer than an hour? Less than --  
13 A. Oh, no, no. It was just long enough for him  
14 to fill out his report and, you know, for them to  
15 question me, and he took his picture. And so I'm not  
16 really sure how long that all took.  
17 Q. Okay. You had a chance to review Terry's  
18 statement; is that correct?  
19 A. Yes.  
20 Q. Is there anything in Terry's statement you  
21 dispute?  
22 A. Oh, I -- I didn't review it close enough to  
23 dispute anything. I mean, his statement is his  
24 statement.  
25 Q. And did you have a chance to review the

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1 statement from Miss Elias?  
2 A. I read it.  
3 Q. Again, is there anything in there that you  
4 read that you dispute at this point in time?  
5 A. I didn't read it with the intention of  
6 disputing anything so --  
7 Q. So no?  
8 A. So no.  
9 Q. Let me have you turn to 479 of Exhibit 1.  
10 Okay. Do you recognize this document?  
11 A. Well, I've seen it recently.  
12 Q. Okay. What is it?  
13 A. It says, "Guest Accident or Illness Report."  
14 Q. Did you fill out this document or somebody  
15 else?  
16 A. Somebody else.  
17 Q. Who?  
18 A. The security officer. Is that Corey?  
19 Q. I don't know who it is offhand, so -- okay.  
20 But you didn't handwrite this out at all?  
21 A. No. He did. I wasn't able to.  
22 Q. Is there anything on this document that you  
23 don't believe is accurate?  
24 A. Well, you want me to read it?  
25 Q. Have you not -- when was the last time you

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1 looked at this?  
2 A. Well, I first saw it about a month ago. So  
3 probably not -- a month or two, so at that time.  
4 Q. Yeah, go ahead and read it.  
5 A. It's been a month at least.  
6 Q. Let me know if there's anything inaccurate  
7 that you believe is contained within that document.  
8 A. Oh, probably not. It's probably okay.  
9 Q. Okay. Did you sign this document?  
10 A. Yes.  
11 Q. And you read it before you signed it?  
12 A. No, I was dazed. I wasn't able to. I was  
13 dazed and I just signed it.  
14 Q. By "dazed" were you able to speak?  
15 A. I was able to speak.  
16 Q. And you were able to listen?  
17 A. Not -- not clearly, but --  
18 Q. Okay. Were you able to ambulate, walk at  
19 this point in time?  
20 A. I was able to limp.  
21 Q. Okay. And so you identified to the security  
22 officers that you didn't want any medical attention.  
23 Did you tell the security officers that you were going  
24 to be leaving the premises?  
25 A. Well, I told them I would try.

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1 Q. Okay. Explain to me or tell me what the  
2 conversation you had with the security officers was.  
3 A. Okay. He asked me if I had had any  
4 injuries, if I hurt and where I hurt.  
5 Q. And what did you say in response?  
6 A. And I said it was hurting to sit, my foot  
7 was hurting, my hands and arms hurt, and I couldn't --  
8 so that's why he filled out the form, and I was  
9 dazed.  
10 Q. You told him you were dazed?  
11 A. I told him that I wasn't able to -- I  
12 believe I told him I wasn't really able to -- well,  
13 fill out the forms or -- so he did things for me. So  
14 he did that for me.  
15 Q. Okay. Then what happened with the  
16 discussion between you and the security guards? Was  
17 there one or just two -- or was it two or was there  
18 just one security guard?  
19 A. I believe there was one.  
20 Q. Okay. Go ahead and continue as far as what  
21 your communications were with the security guard.  
22 A. Okay. So I told him it hurt to sit, my foot  
23 was hurting, hands and arms were hurting and -- you  
24 know, my shoulder, my hands and arms.  
25 So he took the picture of my foot, and then

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1 he talked to Miss Elias, and then Terry give him his  
2 report. And I think Corey asked -- oh, Corey asked me  
3 if I wanted a wheelchair, and I told him that -- at  
4 that time I said, "Well, I'm going to try to get back  
5 to my car. I don't know if I'm going to be able to go  
6 on my own. And if I can't, then I'll call you."

7 Q. Okay.  
8 A. So I didn't want a wheelchair because then I  
9 wouldn't know how -- how injured I was --

10 Q. Okay.  
11 A. -- or if I would be able to -- how far I'd  
12 be able to walk.

13 Q. Okay. So you declined a wheelchair. And  
14 was there anything else that you recall talking with  
15 the security guard about?

16 A. Right now at this time I don't recall. I  
17 wrote things down, and so right now that's what I  
18 remember.

19 Q. Okay. Where did you write things down?  
20 A. Well, I mean, since then --

21 Q. Okay. Where --  
22 A. -- I have things down.

23 Q. By having things written down, are these  
24 handwritten notes of yours? Are they on computer?  
25 A. Not anymore. Handwritten would have gone

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1 into the -- you know, the papers that went to the  
2 lawyers.

3 Q. Okay. So you provided to your counsel  
4 handwritten notes?

5 A. Yes, or from my handwritten notes I turned  
6 them into typed notes.

7 Q. And you provided those to your counsel?  
8 A. Yes.

9 Q. Your prior counsel?  
10 A. Yes.

11 Q. Okay. Have you provided any of those notes,  
12 whether in handwritten form or typewritten form, to  
13 your current counsel?

14 A. I believe they have everything.

15 Q. Okay. And these were notes that you  
16 prepared for what purpose?

17 A. For the lawyer, notes I gave to the  
18 lawyer.

19 Q. Okay. Were these notes prepared for the  
20 lawyers or were they prepared for your own benefit  
21 that you gave to the lawyers?

22 A. I had a few things written because Corey --  
23 like, for example, Corey gave me his card with his  
24 number to call him. Oh, that's right. That's how I  
25 was going -- he gave me his card with his number to

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1 call him.

2 Q. Okay. Okay. And you still have that card  
3 somewhere?

4 A. Might be -- I assume it's in the papers.

5 Q. Okay. Is that something that you provided  
6 to your counsel?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Okay. Not your current counsel, but your  
9 prior counsel?

10 A. I'm not sure. I assume she got everything.  
11 That I don't -- I'm not sure if it's in there or  
12 not.

13 Q. Okay. And these handwritten notes, these  
14 were notes that you crafted to recall events that took  
15 place?

16 A. Yeah, just a few little things like that.

17 Q. Okay. Okay. So was there anything else  
18 that we haven't talked about or you haven't identified  
19 for me that related to the conversation that you had  
20 with the security guard?

21 A. At this time that's what I remember. Could  
22 have left something out that I'll remember later, but  
23 right now that's what I remember.

24 Q. And then you departed from the location.  
25 Did Corey, as you identified him, the security

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1 guard -- did Corey offer to walk you out or follow you  
2 out?

3 A. I don't recall.

4 Q. Is that something that he offered and you  
5 declined?

6 A. No.

7 Q. But he did not accompany you, or any Wynn  
8 employee, to your vehicle?

9 A. No one accompanied me.

10 Q. Okay. And did you -- so at that point in  
11 time does Corey depart, or do you depart at the same  
12 time?

13 A. I don't recall.

14 Q. You don't recall sitting at the slot machine  
15 for a period of time, being alone at that same slot  
16 machine where you were sitting the first time?

17 A. I'm not sure.

18 Q. Is it fair to say that you made your way to  
19 the parking garage and then to your vehicle?

20 A. Eventually I made it there.

21 Q. When you say "eventually," what do you mean  
22 by that?

23 A. It took me a couple hours to get there.

24 Q. And during this period of time you didn't  
25 think that you needed any assistance, and so you

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1 didn't call the security guard?  
2 A. I was hoping I didn't need assistance. I  
3 was trying to figure out if I should -- what I should  
4 do. I didn't know.  
5 Q. And during this two-hour period, did you  
6 explain to me where you were -- where you were going  
7 and what were the obstacles to you getting there in  
8 sort of a more efficient manner?  
9 A. First I went to the bathroom, and I stayed  
10 there for at least a half hour because I was -- I was  
11 really trying to figure out who I would call -- who I  
12 could call or what I should do, and I didn't know if I  
13 was -- it was going to be foolish to try to drive. I  
14 didn't know what I was going to do. So then I finally  
15 got up, left the bathroom, limped to a machine and  
16 sat, and then I kind of went from machine to machine,  
17 from one end of the casino towards the other end,  
18 towards my car, and then I felt that I would try to  
19 get to the wall. So I limped to the wall, and then I  
20 limped, got to my car. I made it, and then I thought,  
21 well, if I made it to my car, then I could probably  
22 drive.  
23 Q. Okay. And you did drive home?  
24 A. Yes.  
25 Q. Did you stop anywhere before you went home?

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1 A. Yes.  
2 Q. Where did you go?  
3 A. I went to the Rampart Casino.  
4 Q. Okay. And what did you do at the Rampart  
5 Casino?  
6 A. I sat at machines.  
7 Q. Okay. How long were you there at the  
8 Rampart Casino?  
9 A. I'm not sure.  
10 Q. A couple hours?  
11 A. I'm not sure.  
12 Q. Okay. Did you gamble?  
13 A. Probably.  
14 Q. Okay. While you were in the bathroom, did  
15 you call anyone?  
16 A. I was trying to think of who I could call.  
17 I couldn't think of anybody I could call. The only  
18 people would be -- my boyfriend was out of town, and I  
19 couldn't think of anybody to call --  
20 Q. Okay.  
21 A. -- other than I thought, well, maybe I'd  
22 have to call back Corey. He gave me his number --  
23 Q. Okay. So --  
24 A. -- and he was there.  
25 Q. So from the time that the security guard --

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1 you end your interaction with the security guard to  
2 the time that you leave the Rampart Casino, did you  
3 call anyone during that period of time?  
4 A. No.  
5 Q. Okay. So after the Rampart Casino, where  
6 did you go?  
7 A. Home.  
8 Q. Do you recall whether it was light out or  
9 dark?  
10 A. Dark.  
11 Q. Did you eat anything there at the Rampart  
12 Casino?  
13 A. I doubt it.  
14 Q. Okay. Did you drink anything?  
15 A. I'm just guessing; if I did, it would have  
16 been water.  
17 Q. You don't recall having any alcoholic  
18 beverages while you were at the Rampart Casino?  
19 A. Oh, I -- no. It would have been water if I  
20 drank anything.  
21 Q. Do you recall how much you gambled at the  
22 Rampart Casino?  
23 A. No.  
24 Q. And it's your recollection that you believe  
25 you might have gambled at Wynn after your fall but --

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1 A. Oh --  
2 Q. -- before you departed?  
3 A. -- I did at those machines when I was  
4 sitting there.  
5 Q. Okay.  
6 A. As I sat there, I had my card in and I did a  
7 little bit, but not machines that I --  
8 Q. Normally play?  
9 A. -- normally gamble.  
10 Q. That evening did you do -- did you go  
11 anywhere else?  
12 A. No.  
13 Q. When you got home, what did you do?  
14 A. Went to bed.  
15 Q. Immediately when you got home?  
16 A. Probably.  
17 Q. What time do you normally go to bed in the  
18 evenings?  
19 A. Well, it depends.  
20 Q. You don't have sort of a normal --  
21 A. You mean now?  
22 Q. No, back in 2010.  
23 A. Back in 2010 I had a different routine. So  
24 you're asking what time I normally went to bed in  
25 2010?



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<p>1 Q. Um-hmm.</p> <p>2 A. It would depend on the night.</p> <p>3 Q. Okay. Your boyfriend at the time was</p> <p>4 Sal Risco?</p> <p>5 A. So that's what they said, well, 18 it's just the -- they're limber or hypermobile. 19 <b>Q. Did you seek medical treatment relating to 20 hypermobility syndrome?</b> 21 A. Treatment? No. 22 <b>Q. But you were diagnosed with having 23 hypermobility syndrome?</b> 24 A. No. 25 <b>Q. Is that just something you -- is that</b></p>	<p>1 A. Yeah. I was told, "Well, you're limber. 2 Maybe you have that." But those two things, those are 3 hypermobility syndromes. That's, you know -- they 4 said "You're limber. Maybe that's". . . 5 <b>Q. Okay. And at some point in time prior to 6 the fall on February 8, 2010, did you develop some 7 sort of drug intolerance?</b> 8 A. Only in that I don't take drugs. 9 <b>Q. It's just a conscious decision on your part 10 not to take --</b> 11 A. Conscious decision. I try to do the best 12 way possible. If I need an antibiotic, I need an 13 antibiotic, but. . . 14 <b>Q. So your reluctance to take pharmaceutical 15 medications, that's purely your choice? There's no 16 medical reason for it?</b> 17 A. Well, if it's something that will help me, 18 I'll take it. 19 <b>Q. When you're prescribed medication by medical 20 professionals, does that mean that medication is 21 needed by you?</b> 22 <b>MS. MORRIS:</b> Object to foundation. 23 <b>BY MR. SEMENZA:</b> 24 <b>Q. And that's a poor question. I apologize. 25 So do you take the medications that are</b></p>

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1 prescribed to you by medical professionals or does it  
2 depend on what you personally feel as to whether  
3 they're going to benefit you or not?  
4 A. It depends on if they tell me they'll  
5 benefit me.  
6 Q. If they're prescribing you a medication,  
7 wouldn't you assume that they're doing so because they  
8 have a belief that it's going to assist in helping --  
9 A. No. I would ask them.  
10 Q. Okay. And is that your practice, to ask  
11 whatever medication you're being prescribed --  
12 A. Yes.  
13 Q. -- as to whether it's going to --  
14 A. Yes.  
15 Q. -- help you or not?  
16 MS. MORRIS: You have to let him finish the  
17 question, too, just because it makes for an unclear  
18 transcript.  
19 BY MR. SEMENZA:  
20 Q. Prior to the fall on February 8, 2010, did  
21 you ever have any chest pain?  
22 MS. MORRIS: Object to form.  
23 THE WITNESS: Prior to the fall?  
24 BY MR. SEMENZA:  
25 Q. Yes.

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1 A. Ever in my life?  
2 Q. Yes.  
3 A. Not that I recall.  
4 Q. Did you ever have, prior to the fall on  
5 February 8, 2010, any dizzy spells?  
6 MS. MORRIS: Object to form.  
7 THE WITNESS: Not that I recall.  
8 BY MR. SEMENZA:  
9 Q. Prior to the fall did you ever experience  
10 any chills?  
11 MS. MORRIS: Object to form. Are we asking  
12 for her entire 60-something years of life?  
13 MR. SEMENZA: Yes.  
14 THE WITNESS: You are asking for my  
15 entire --  
16 BY MR. SEMENZA:  
17 Q. Yes.  
18 A. Well, I'm sure. That's something that  
19 everybody has in their lifetime.  
20 Q. Have you ever been diagnosed, prior to the  
21 fall, with any thyroid issues?  
22 A. No. Excuse me. I'm so sorry. But if I  
23 answered some of those questions and you meant my  
24 entire lifetime, you know, whatever normal people  
25 have. Like chills, I'm not going to tell you that in

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1 60 years I didn't have chills. I'm a normal person.  
2 Q. Okay. No, I appreciate that.  
3 Other than what we've talked about over the  
4 last 20 minutes or so, are you aware of any other  
5 medical conditions that you experienced prior to the  
6 fall on February 8, 2010?  
7 A. Not that I -- not that I recall.  
8 Q. Okay. Prior to the fall on February 8,  
9 2010, did you experience any psychological issues of  
10 any sort?  
11 MS. MORRIS: Object to form.  
12 THE WITNESS: In my lifetime?  
13 MS. MORRIS: And foundation.  
14 BY MR. SEMENZA:  
15 Q. Yes.  
16 A. Well, like I said before, when I was going  
17 through my -- the time with my ex-husband, I had to go  
18 through the -- I went to this psychologist, who sent  
19 me to the biofeedback therapy, and that was that.  
20 Q. And what did the biofeedback -- what was it  
21 intended to do for you?  
22 A. To train -- to teach me how to go through a  
23 stressful period like that and try not to be affected  
24 by it.  
25 Q. Okay. Did you experience depression during

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1 this period of time?  
2 A. When I was going through my divorce, yes.  
3 Q. Other than the biofeedback, did you have any  
4 other mental health care I guess I'd put it?  
5 A. No.  
6 Q. Okay. After the fall after -- and I'll  
7 jump ahead now. After your visit to UMC, I believe,  
8 on February 10, 2010, when do you recall the next  
9 medical appointment you had?  
10 A. I recall in February that I went to a  
11 Dr. Thompson.  
12 Q. Okay. And what did Dr. Thompson do for you?  
13 A. He examined me and told me to get an  
14 abdominal ultrasound.  
15 Q. What kind of doctor is Dr. Thompson? Is he  
16 a gastroenterologist?  
17 A. No. No, no. I think he's a D.O.  
18 Q. Oh, okay. Was he your general care  
19 physician?  
20 A. No. I didn't have one.  
21 Q. So explain to me what you saw him for.  
22 A. Because I still had all this pain.  
23 Q. Okay. Where was your pain located at when  
24 you went to see Dr. Thompson?  
25 A. In my neck, back, knees, hands, and still

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<p>1 the pain from my back going down to my foot. 2 <b>Q. And what did he do for you?</b> 3 A. He just examined me. 4 <b>Q. Did he have any diagnoses for you?</b> 5 A. Yes. 6 <b>Q. What were those?</b> 7 A. Told me that the fall caused a pain 8 syndrome. 9 <b>Q. Do you know the medical term for it?</b> 10 A. Some kind of muscle syndrome. I forgot. 11 Muscle pain something. 12 <b>Q. Is the syndrome physiologically based or is</b> 13 <b>it a psychological issue? And, again, I don't mean</b> 14 <b>any disrespect. I'm just trying to understand.</b> 15 <b>MS. MORRIS:</b> Object to form and foundation. 16 <b>THE WITNESS:</b> Well, what I believe is it's 17 definitely not a psychological issue. 18 <b>BY MR. SEMENZA:</b> 19 <b>Q. 15 A. He has been seeing me on a regular basis.  
16 He's been giving me the referrals and kind of like --  
17 well, you know, kind of like the director of all the  
18 treatment. I mean, not of the treatment, but where I  
19 go and what I should do.  
20 Q. Has he made a specific diagnosis, to your  
21 knowledge, of what conditions you have as a result --  
22 or after the fall on February 8, 2010?  
23 A. The way I believe it, because I think that  
24 he said so much in certain -- other terms, but I  
25 believe that he said that he'd leave all that up to

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1 the specialist. He would just refer me and the

6 physical therapy. I was referred to therapy, but not  
7 by him.  
8 Q. Who referred you to physical therapy?  
9 A. Dr. Cash and Dr. Trainor.  
10 Q. Okay. Now, Dr. Cash is one of your  
11 orthopedic surgeons?  
12 A. He was.  
13 Q. Okay. You no longer see him?  
14 A. Right.  
15 Q. And is Dr. Trainor also an orthopedic  
16 surgeon?  
17 A. Yes.  
18 Q. Do you still see him?  
19 A. No.  
20 Q. Why do you not see Dr. Cash anymore?  
21 A. He dropped Tricare.  
22 Q. Is that the only reason?  
23 A. Yes.  
24 Q. Why do you not see Dr. Trainor anymore?  
25 A. He dropped Tricare.

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1 Q. Okay. Are there other orthopedic surgeons  
2 that you've seen, or orthopedic doctors, other than  
3 Dr. Cash and Dr. Trainor?  
4 A. Yes.  
5 Q. Who?  
6 A. Dr. Thomas Dunn and Dr. Martin.  
7 Q. Are you still seeing Dr. Martin?  
8 A. I made several appointments with him, and he  
9 was unavailable to keep them. So I believe he left  
10 that -- he was in Dr. Dunn's group. I believe he's  
11 gone now. So I want to stay with that group, so I  
12 want to --  
13 MS. MORRIS: Is Dr. Martin the orthopedic  
14 surgeon?  
15 THE WITNESS: He's the one that I went --  
16 MR. SEMENZA: That we talked about  
17 earlier.  
18 MS. MORRIS: The one who just had the  
19 article in the paper, is that the one?  
20 MR. SEMENZA: Oh.  
21 MS. MORRIS: I think it might be.  
22 MR. KIRCHER: What's his name?  
23 MS. MORRIS: Last name's Martin.  
24 Is he a younger fellow, Dr. Martin?  
25 THE WITNESS: Yeah.

9 the floor, though, do you?  
10 A. No. What I remember is when I woke up, when  
11 they woke me up and I was on the ground, on the  
12 floor.  
13 Q. Okay. And with regard to your cardiologist,  
14 have you seen the same doctor from the date of the  
15 fall forward, or have you moved around with doctors  
16 relating to your heart care?  
17 A. I've seen two cardiologists.  
18 Q. Who are they?  
19 A. Dr. Wesley, Dr. Fotedar. It's either d-o-r,  
20 d-a-r.  
21 Q. Are they with the same group?  
22 A. No.  
23 Q. Who are you currently seeing?  
24 A. I'm going -- my next appointment I have to  
25 see Dr. Wesley. I go back to him.

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1 Q. When was the last time you've seen  
2 Dr. Fotedar?  
3 A. Around September 2012.  
4 Q. How many appointments did you have with  
5 Dr. Fotedar?  
6 A. I believe just one.  
7 Q. Is there a particular reason you just had  
8 one with him?  
9 A. I just went for a second opinion.  
10 Q. What was the second opinion?  
11 A. The echocardiograms showed -- you know, I  
12 had two echocardiograms, and so I wanted to know what  
13 his opinion was about the valves.  
14 Q. Did he provide you with an opinion?  
15 A. What he said is that I needed a follow-up

2 Q. So are you planning on going back to see  
3 Dr. Fotedar at all?  
4 A. No. I'm going back to Dr. Wesley.  
5 Q. When did you -- well, approximately how many  
6 times have you seen Dr. Wesley?  
7 A. I saw him in 2010 maybe one or two times, I  
8 believe. 2012, then I went to see him, and to his  
9 office several times because he did a series of heart  
10 tests.  
11 Q. Okay. And what did those tests reveal, to  
12 your knowledge?  
13 A. Well, the echocardiograms, the valves; and I  
14 believe everything else was normal.  
15 Q. So from 2010 to 2012 your echocardiograms  
16 were normal, to your knowledge?  
17 A. Echocardiograms?  
18 Q. Yes.  
19 A. No.  
20 Q. Okay. What did you -- and I apologize.  
21 Maybe I missed it. What did you say was normal?  
22 A. All the other tests.  
23 Q. All the other tests.

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1 Q. Late in the day we start getting tired.  
2 A. Yes.

ORDER OF AFFIRMANCE

This is an appeal from a district court summary judgment in a tort action. Eighth Judicial District Court, Clark County; Michelle Leavitt, Judge.

After appellant Scott Mostad slipped and fell, allegedly having stepped on an unknown foreign substance in the buffet area at Bally's Hotel and Casino, Mostad filed a complaint against respondents Park Place Entertainment Corporation, Parball Corporation, and Bally's-Las Vegas (collectively, "Bally's"), alleging that Bally's had negligently maintained its premises.

Bally's filed a summary judgment motion, arguing that Mostad's negligence claim failed as a matter of law because Mostad had failed to demonstrate any factual issues with respect to whether Bally's was responsible for the foreign substance on the property or had any actual or constructive notice of its existence. Bally's noted that Mostad failed to present any deposition testimony, affidavits, or other evidence demonstrating how the substance got on the floor or that Bally's had actual or constructive notice of the substance's presence.

Mostad opposed the motion, arguing that he would present evidence and witness testimony supporting his claims at trial.

On December 7, 2005, based on Bally's arguments, the district court granted Bally's motion for summary judgment. Mostad's timely appeal followed.

This court reviews orders granting summary judgment de novo.<sup>1</sup> Summary judgment was appropriate here if the pleadings and other evidence on file, viewed in the light most favorable to Mostad, demonstrate that no genuine issue of material fact remained in dispute and that Bally's was entitled to judgment as a matter of law.<sup>2</sup> To withstand summary judgment, Mostad could not rely solely on the general allegations and conclusions set forth in his complaint, but must instead have presented specific facts demonstrating the existence of a genuine factual issue supporting his claims.<sup>3</sup>

Upon our review of the record and consideration of the parties' appellate arguments,<sup>4</sup> we perceive no error in the district court's summary judgment. Although the presence of a foreign substance on the floor may be contrary to ordinary care,<sup>5</sup> liability for any injuries Mostad sustained

after slipping in the substance and falling may be found only if Bally's employees created the condition or had actual or constructive notice of its existence.<sup>6</sup> Thus, in order to defeat Bally's summary judgment motion, Mostad was required to offer evidence suggesting that the employees had spilled or otherwise deposited the substance on the floor, or that they had constructive notice of its existence.<sup>7</sup> Accordingly, because Mostad failed to do so, he failed to demonstrate any material factual issues with regard to Bally's negligence, and we

ORDER the judgment of the district court AFFIRMED.<sup>8</sup>

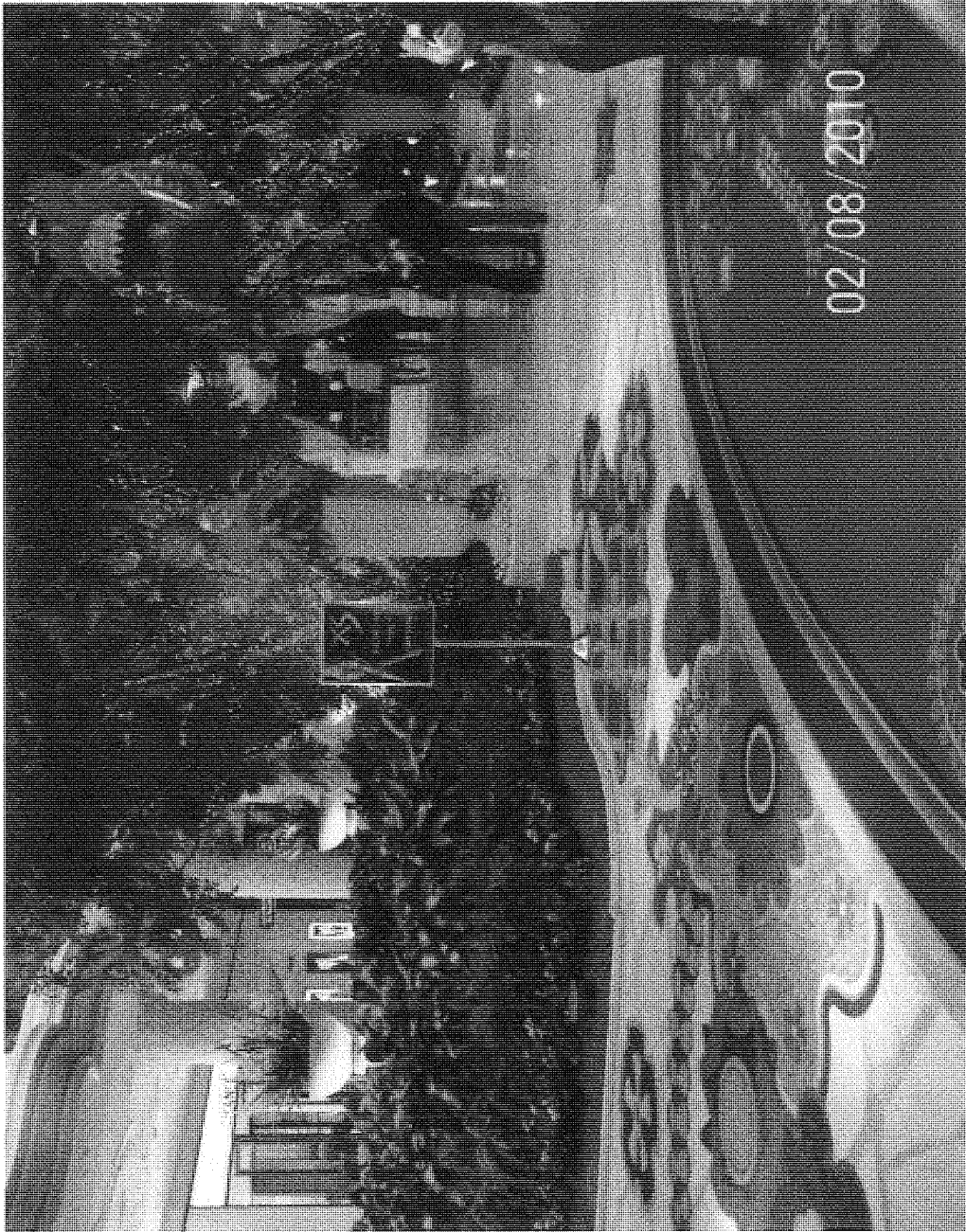
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



At your request, I analyzed the site of an incident wherein your client, Yvonne O'Connell, slipped, fell, and sustained significant injuries. Pursuant to this assignment, I reviewed data provided by your office in addition to technical publications contained within my professional library. I also inspected the site of this event wherein I tested for the traction on the walkway where this incident occurred. This letter shall serve as my report.

#### **INCIDENT**

On February 8, 2010, Yvonne O'Connell was a patron at WYNN LAS VEGAS (hotel and casino) located at 3131 Las Vegas Boulevard South, Las Vegas, (Clark County), Nevada. At approximately 2:30 in the afternoon she slipped and fell into a landscape display within the foyer adjacent to the south valet. Ms. O'Connell reported a "large liquid substance on the floor" which, according to the Incident Data (Incident File #IN20100002152), was verified by "Manager (Yanet) Elias who, according to Security Officer Corey Prowell, "stated upon her arrival, she noticed the liquid substance on the floor; she immediately assigned an attendant to clean up the area in order to prevent further incidents. . . ."

Reportedly, security video cameras failed to capture this event.

#### **ANALYSIS**

I inspected the site of Ms. O'Connell's slip and fall on April 1, 2015, at which time I photographed and measured critical site elements. I also measured for the walkway's slip-resistance in the area of her fall.

I tested for the slip-resistance or traction qualities in two areas of the walkway, within close proximity to each other. Both areas tested were within the building, near the south valet entrance, and close to a curbed landscaped feature. One area tested was along a decorative mosaic tiled surface. The second area tested was along a smooth marble surfaced section of walkway. Both walkways were found to be clean and were located slightly beyond and to the west of a carpeted oval along the walkway entrance.

### Inspection/Slip-resistance.

I tested the floor surface for the static coefficient of friction (SCOF) which is a determination of the relative slipperiness or quality of traction along a walkway. A Horizontal Pull Slipmeter (HPS) was used in accordance with strict test protocol as established by the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) in accordance with ASTM Stnd. F609 which requires the use of neolite as a test specimen. I also tested with ASTM mandated leather for specification testing as established by ASTM Stnd. D-2047.

The minimum permissible SCOF value for a *slip-resistant* walkway as defined by ASTM Stnd. D-2047 is 0.5 (read, "zero, point five"). Greater values indicate higher degrees of slip-resistance while values lower than 0.5 indicate slippery surfaces, the lower the value, the less traction. Note, while other sources may reference the requirement of a "slip-resistant" walkway without definition or minimum acceptable value, ASTM Stnd. D2047 is the only credible source where the 0.5 standard for slip-resistance can be found.

I tested in an "in situ" or "as found" condition for both neolite and leather. Following the initial utilization of neolite as a test material, I tested both areas with the Federally designated leather (Federal standard KK-L-165C). Neolite was used because that material is referenced in the current F609 standard and is also used by some other testing devices; however, there is no credible standard of slip-resistance for neolite or any test material other than the Federally designated leather. There is, however, an acceptable standard for leather (Federal standard KK-L-165C) as described in ASTM Stnd. D2047.

Note the tests for the mosaic tile are available but unreliable due to the small tile sizes (3/4" square +/-) which results in higher than realistic readings due to the tile edges "catching" the test feet thus yielding inconsistent readings. The following indicates the results of my tests on the smooth marble section of walkway.

The low test values obtained on the clean dry surface (i.e., less than 0.50), indicate a slippery surface in the best of conditions (i.e., clean and dry). As a result of my tests and technical evaluation, the subject floor should be considered potentially hazardous to pedestrians.

In the event a floor is wet as reported, I have found the SCOF of a walkway wetted with distilled water is typically about 70% that of the tested dry value; however, I did not test for a wet surface at the site of this event since (1) the referenced ASTM test standards do not permit testing on any debris covered or wetted surface for specification determination (2), the quantity and quality of the contaminant and other unknown variables are often unknown and (3), there is no acceptable standard of slip-resistance for a wet surface. Tests for any wet or contaminated surface would be speculative at best and not expected to provide

scientifically credible and reliable results except, by analogy, to relate a wet walkway to roadway surface conditions following a Las Vegas area rain. I suggest most everyone would recognize the increased degree of slipperiness and hazard on a rain-surfaced local street as should also exist for a wet walkway.

To reiterate, the actual precise referenced 0.5 value for slip-resistance is contained in only one credible source as a standard for a "slip-resistant" walkway surface. In ASTM Standard D2047 which contains the test protocol for a "James Machine," sections 3, 4, & 5 contain detailed reference to 0.5 as an acceptable value of "slip-resistance" and defines "leather, conforming to Federal Specification KK-L-165C" as the only material to be used for "specification testing" (such as the 0.5 specification).

I am critical of test devices with support the use of neolite as a test specimen particularly since there is no reliable standard for neolite. One of these devices, still in use by some, was withdrawn by the ASTM in 2006 as an approved test protocol. Within the ASTM D2047 standard there is also found the following critical caution:

Note 3—The static coefficient of friction measured with elastomeric compositions are frequently as much as 0.3 to 0.5 higher than leather.

Elastomeric compositions include neolite and rubber and are not suited for specification testing.

Although the purpose of ASTM Standard D 2047 is for the James Machine (a laboratory device), it is critical to emphasize that this standard is the only credible standard which dictates a minimum acceptable value for the determination of the static coefficient of friction. Furthermore, this standard mandates a single test material (i.e., Federal standard KK-L-165C leather) for determination of a value of "specification." Any other test material (such as neolite) is not supported by any recognized and credible entity for "specification" testing.

The excessively smooth floor found in the area of Ms. O'Connell's slip, fall, and injuries, provides only minimal traction and is hazardous to pedestrians especially when wet. It has also been my experience that most slips and falls occur on relatively smooth walkway surfaces as found at the site of this event although additives which are virtually undetected can be added to a potentially slippery floor surface and significantly increase the safety of a smooth walkway.

## **OPINION**

It is therefore my opinion, as a licensed professional engineer in the State of Nevada and other states, and as one proficient in the analysis and evaluation of safe pedestrian walkways, that the marble walkway where Yvonne O'Connell slipped, fell, and sustained significant injuries should be considered hazardous to pedestrians especially when wet as evidenced and verified by Wynn employees. Finally, the evidence does not indicate that Ms. O'Connell contributed to this event in any way except to have walked in an area she expected to be free of unexpected hazards..

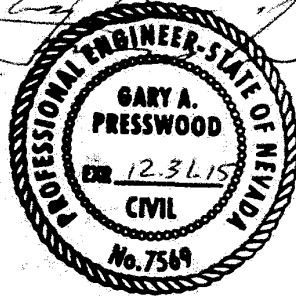

**MEMORANDUM OF POINTS AND AUTHORITIES**

**I. INTRODUCTION**

This is a simple slip and fall case. Plaintiff alleges she sustained injuries when she slipped on an unidentified liquid ("foreign substance") on the mosaic tile in the atrium of Wynn's property in February 2010 (the "Incident"). Plaintiff has brought a claim for Negligence against Wynn.

Presswood, Plaintiff's purported expert witness, should be precluded from testifying at trial in this case because he cannot meet the "Assistance Requirement" of NRS 50.275. Specifically, 1) Presswood's purported expert opinion is irrelevant because he failed to analyze the area where Plaintiff unequivocally claims she slipped in Wynn's atrium; 2) his test results are completely unreliable because Presswood failed to properly prepare and calibrate the device that he utilized to conduct his slip-resistance testing at Wynn's property; 3) Presswood concedes there is no acceptable standard of slip-resistance for a wet surface, making his testing entirely speculative; and 4) his alleged laboratory testing, which he bases his opinion, is not the product of reliable methodology.

Therefore, Presswood should be precluded from testifying as an expert witness because he cannot meet the stringent requirements of *Hallmark v. Eldridge*, 124 Nev. 492, 189 P.3d 646, 650 (2008).

**II. PERTINENT FACTUAL BACKGROUND**

On February 8, 2010, at approximately 2:30 p.m., Plaintiff was allegedly walking through the atrium of Wynn's property. As she was walking and not particularly paying attention where she was walking, Plaintiff allegedly slipped on the foreign substance in Wynn's atrium. (Deposition of Yvonne O'Connell, 60:12-62:2, pertinent portions attached hereto as **Exhibit 2**.) Plaintiff claims the foreign substance was green in color and sticky. (*Id.* at 62:10-15, 65:19-21.) Plaintiff alleges she slipped on the flower mosaic tile in Wynn's atrium as opposed to the other marble surface:

Q: Where you slipped and fell.

A: Where I started -- where I --

Q: Where you started, that's fine.

1 A. -- started to slip.  
2 Q. Let's start there. On the flowers or on the --  
3 A. Oh, on the flowers.  
4 Q. Okay. On the mosaic flowers.  
5 A. Yes.  
6 ...  
7 Q. Okay. Just so I'm clear and that the record is clear, you started  
8 slipping on the portion of the floor that contained the mosaic which  
9 includes the flowers, right?  
10 A. Yes.  
11 (*Id.* at 61:2-10, 61:23-24:2; *see also* Pictures of Wynn's Atrium Bates Nos. WYNN-  
12 O'CONNELL00470-473, attached hereto as **Exhibit 3**.)  
13 On April 1, 2015, Presswood conducted a site inspection of Wynn's property in the area  
14 that Plaintiff allegedly slipped and fell. (Presswood's Expert Report, attached hereto as **Exhibit**  
15 **4**.) According to his purported expert report, Presswood photographed and measured "site  
16 elements" and "measured for the walkway's slip-resistance in the area of [Plaintiff's] fall." (*Id.*)  
17 Specifically, Presswood measured the slip-resistance of two areas of the walkway in Wynn's  
18 atrium: 1) the flower tile mosaic where Plaintiff unequivocally claims she slipped and 2) the  
19 smooth marble surface in the walkway. (*Id.*)  
20 Presswood utilized a Horizontal Pull Slipmeter (hereinafter "HPS") to test these areas for  
21 the static coefficient of friction. (*Id.*) However, Presswood's expert report only provides his  
22 purported test results for the smooth marble surface in the walkway, which is not where Plaintiff  
23 alleges she slipped. (*Id.*) Again, Plaintiff alleges she slipped on the tile flower mosaic tile in  
24 Wynn's atrium. (Ex. 2, 60:12-62:2.)  
25 For the reasons set forth below, the Court should not permit Presswood to testify at trial.

1 **III. EXPERT WITNESS STANDARD**

2 "[I]n Nevada, NRS 50.275 is the blueprint for the admissibility of expert witness  
3 testimony." *Higgs v. State*, 222 P.3d 648, 658 (Nev. 2010). "To testify as an expert witness  
4 under NRS 50.275, the witness must satisfy the following three requirements:"

5 (1) He or she must be qualified in an area of "scientific, technical or other specialized  
6 knowledge" (the qualification requirement);

7 (2) **His or her specialized knowledge must "assist the trier of fact to understand the  
8 evidence or to determine a fact in issue" (the assistance requirement); and**

9 (3) His or her testimony must be limited "to matters within the scope of [his or her]  
10 specialized knowledge" (the limited scope requirement).

11 *Hallmark*, 124 Nev. at 498, 189 P.3d at 650 (emphasis added). An expert's testimony will assist  
12 the trier of fact only when it is relevant and the product of reliable methodology." *Id.* at 651.  
13 "Just because a witness may be qualified as an expert does not automatically qualify him to give  
14 an opinion necessarily based on facts beyond his knowledge." *Choat v. McDorman*, 86 Nev. 332,  
15 335 (1970).

16 Expert testimony may be considered unless it consists of a "legal conclusion." *U.S. v.*  
17 *Scholl*, 166 F.3d 964, 973 (9th Cir. 1999); *Aguilar v. International Longshoremen's Union*, 966  
18 F.2d 443, 447 (9th Cir. 1992) (noting matters of law are for the court's determination, not that of  
19 an expert witness); see also *Marx & Co. v. Diners' Club, Inc.*, 550 F.2d 505, 509-10 (2d Cir.  
20 1977) (expert testimony consisting of legal conclusions inadmissible). "[A]n expert witness  
21 cannot give an opinion as to her legal conclusion, i.e., an opinion on an ultimate issue of law.  
22 Similarly, instructing the jury as to the applicable law is the distinct and exclusive province of the  
23 court." *Hangarter v. Provident Life and Accident Ins. Co.*, 373 F.3d 998, 1016 (9th Cir. 2004)  
(internal quotation and citation omitted).

24 Moreover, for a witness specifically retained to provide expert testimony, the expert is  
25 required to provide a written report containing, among other things, "a complete statement of all  
26 opinions to be expressed and the basis and reasons therefor" and "the data or other information  
27 considered by the witness in forming the opinions[.]" Nev. R. Civ. P. 16.1(a)(2)(B). An expert  
28

1 witness cannot testify to information and opinions outside the expert report. *FCHI, LLC v.*  
2 *Rodriguez*, 326 P.3d 440 (Nev. 2014).

3 Based on this standard, Presswood should be precluded from testifying as an expert  
4 witness because he cannot meet the requirements under Nevada law.

5 **IV. ARGUMENT**

6 **A. Presswood Cannot Meet the Assistance Requirement Because He Fails to**  
7 **Analyze the Tile Flower Mosaic Where Plaintiff Alleges She Slipped, Making**  
8 **His Opinions Irrelevant and Inadmissible for Any Purpose**

9 Presswood's purported expert opinion is completely irrelevant because his expert report is  
10 based entirely on his testing of the marble walkway in Wynn's atrium, which is not where Plaintiff  
11 alleges she slipped.<sup>1</sup> (See Ex. 3.) Plaintiff unambiguously claims she slipped on the flower  
12 mosaic tile in Wynn's atrium. (Ex. 2, 60:12-62:2.) Yet, Presswood does not provide test results  
13 for the tile flower mosaic. (Ex. 3, pg. 2.) Therefore, Presswood's purported expert opinion is  
14 irrelevant and will not assist the jury because he fails to analyze the area where Plaintiff alleges  
15 she slipped in Wynn's atrium.

16 **B. Presswood's Purported Results Are Entirely Unreliable Because His Testing**  
17 **Device Was Not Calibrated and He Failed to Properly Sand the Test Foots**  
18 **Before Conducting His Testing**

19 Prior to conducting his tests at Wynn's property, Presswood failed to calibrate the  
20 Chatillon gage of the HPS that he utilized to conduct his purported slip-resistance testing. (Ex. 5,  
21 pg. 3; Picture of Presswood's Chatillon Gage from Rebuttal Expert Report, attached hereto as  
22 **Exhibit 6.**) The standard procedure is to calibrate the Chatillon gage annually by sending the unit  
23 to the factory or service center. (Ex. 5, pg. 3.) After re-calibration, an updated label is affixed to  
24 the unit by the factory or service center. (*Id.*)

25  
26 <sup>1</sup> Presswood asserts that "the tests for the mosaic tile are available but unreliable due to the small tile sizes  
27 (3/4" square +/-) which results in higher than realistic readings due to the tile edges 'catching' the test feet  
28 thus yielding inconsistent readings." (Ex. 3, p. 2.) Put differently, Presswood's testing of the tile flower  
mosaic found it to be slip-resistant, obviously something he did not want to disclose. (Wynn's Rebuttal  
Expert Report of N. Opfer, pgs. 3-4, attached hereto as **Exhibit 5.**)

1 Incredibly, Presswood has not calibrated his device for over 18 years. (*Id.*) According to  
2 his device, it was last calibrated on August 1, 1995, and was due for re-calibration on August 1,  
3 1996. (Ex. 6.) For this reason, his test results obviously cannot be reliable if he has failed to  
4 calibrate his device for 18 years. Therefore, the Court should preclude Presswood from testifying  
5 since his measurements are erroneous.

6 More reason exists to seriously doubt the accuracy of Presswood's measurements. Before  
7 conducting his floor tests, it appears Presswood failed to adhere to the ATSM F-609 standards  
8 when preparing the test foot of the HPS. (Ex. 5, pg. 3.) ASTM F-609 states the "sanding  
9 procedure [of the test foot] should consist of five strokes of 5 to 6 in. in length, parallel to the  
10 friction measurement direction, followed by five strokes of 5 to 6 in. in length, perpendicular to  
11 the friction measurement direction." Wynn's expert witness, Neil Opfer, did not observe  
12 Presswood conduct the second set of sanding perpendicular to the friction measurement direction.  
13 (*Id.*) Consequently, Presswood's test results are invalid and the Court should preclude Presswood  
14 from testifying at trial.

15 C. **Presswood's Opinions Are Irrelevant and Inadmissible Because There Is No**  
16 **Applicable Standard Upon Which He Can Reply to Support His Conclusions**

17 Presswood concedes "there is no acceptable standard of slip-resistance for a wet surface."  
18 (Ex. 3, pg. 2.) Further, Presswood "did not test for a wet surface at the site of this event since (1)  
19 the referenced ASTM test standards do not permit testing on any debris covered or wetted surface  
20 for specification determination (2), the quantity and quality of the contaminant and other  
21 unknown variable are often unknown . . . ." (*Id.*) Therefore, Presswood's conclusions cannot  
22 assist the jury since there is no mandatory standard for wet floor test results.

23 Tellingly, Presswood seemingly tries to overcome the irrelevance of his testimony/expert  
24 report by creating his own standard. Presswood states: "In the event a floor is wet as reported, I  
25 have found the SCOF of a walkway wetted with distilled water is typically about 70% that of the  
26 tested dry value . . . ." (*Id.*) However, Presswood failed to produce a copy of his alleged tests or  
27 provide any other information relating to his alleged tests, making his tests unverifiable. Because  
28

1 Presswood's conclusions are based on unverifiable tests, his purported expert opinions should be  
2 excluded.

3 **D. Presswood's Alleged Laboratory Tests Will Not Assist the Jury Because It Is**  
4 **Not Based on Reliable Methodology and Is Irrelevant**

5 To determine whether an expert's opinion is based upon reliable methodology, the Nevada  
6 Supreme Court has instructed a district court to consider whether the opinion is:

7 (1) within a recognized field of expertise; (2) testable and has been tested;  
8 (3) published and subjected to peer review; (4) generally accepted in the  
9 scientific community (not always determinative); and (5) based more on  
10 particularized facts rather than assumption, conjecture, or generalization.  
11 **If the expert formed his or her opinion based upon the results of a**  
12 **technique, experiment, or calculation, then a district court should also**  
13 **consider whether** (1) the technique, experiment, or calculation was  
14 controlled by known standards; (2) the testing conditions were similar to  
15 the conditions at the time of the incident; (3) the technique, experiment, or  
16 calculation had a known error rate; and (4) it was developed by the  
17 proffered expert for purposes of the present dispute.

18 *Hallmark*, 124 Nev. at 500-502, 189 P.3d at 651-652 (citations omitted) (emphasis added). These  
19 factors are not exhaustive and may be accorded varying weights depending on the case. *Id.*

20 Here, Presswood's testimony will not assist the jury because it is clearly not the product of  
21 reliable methodology. First, Wynn could not locate any cases that have recognized the HPS's use  
22 as a recognized field of expertise. Assuming *arguendo* that HPS testing is a recognized field of  
23 expertise, there is no evidence that Presswood's alleged laboratory results are testable and have in  
24 fact been tested. As such, Presswood undoubtedly fails to meet the first two factors in  
25 considering whether his testing is the product of reliable methodology.

26 Second, Presswood's laboratory tests have not been published or subjected to peer review  
27 based on the information disclosed to Wynn. For example, his Curriculum Vitae does not list  
28 laboratory testing for wet SCOFF or peer review of the same.

29 Third, it is very clear that Presswood's conclusions are not accepted in the scientific  
30 community. As stated previously, Presswood admits "there is no acceptable standard of slip-  
31 resistance for a wet surface." (Ex. 3, pg. 2.) Quite tellingly, Presswood fails to include a copy of  
32 the F-609 Standard for HPS testing despite stating the HPS "was used in accordance with strict

1 test protocol as established by the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) in  
2 accordance with ASTM Std. F609 which requires the use of neolite as a test specimen." (*Id.*)  
3 The reason Presswood did not include a copy of the F-609 Standard with his report, despite  
4 "strictly" complying with it, is as follows:

5           The [HPS] is a laboratory and field instrument designed to provide  
6 information about the slip index characteristics between walkway surfaces  
7 and a test foot material under dry conditions. **The HPS cannot be used  
8 on wet surfaces.**

9           Slip index, as determined by the HPS, most likely will not give useful  
10 information for evaluating liquid contaminated surfaces, and therefore,  
11 **will not provide an effective assessment of a potential slipping hazard  
12 on a walkway surface under these conditions.**

13 (Emphasis added). Therefore, it is clear Presswood did not "strictly" comply with the test  
14 protocol in accordance with the F-609 Standard or follow the conclusions accepted by the  
15 scientific community by using the HPS to test the SCOF of a wet floor.

16           Fourth, because Presswood's opinions are based upon the results of an experiment or  
17 calculation, he has to prove that the experiment, *i.e.*, his laboratory testing, was controlled by  
18 known standards. *See Hallmark*, 124 Nev. at 502, 189 P.3d at 652. Yet, he could not do that.  
19 The F-609 Standard specifically states the HPS will not provide an effective assessment of a  
20 potential slipping hazard on a wet floor.

21           Fifth, Presswood's testing conditions were not remotely similar to those at the time of the  
22 Incident. Plaintiff testified the foreign substance was green in color and sticky. (Ex. 2 at 62:10-  
23 15, 65:19-21.) A Wynn employee wrote in her statement that it was "syrupy." Presswood's  
24 alleged laboratory testing, however, utilized "distilled water." (Ex. 3, pg. 2.) Besides being sticky  
25 and syrupy, it is highly unlikely that a tourist (or whoever spilled the alleged substance) spilled  
26 distilled water. Further, Presswood fails to state what type of flooring he utilized in his laboratory  
27 testing, let alone whether it was the same type of flooring in this case, *i.e.*, marble mosaic tiling.  
28 Even more importantly is Presswood's admission that "the quantity and quality of the contaminant  
and other unknown variables are often unknown" and "[t]ests for any wet or contaminated surface  
would be speculative at best and not expected to provide scientifically credible and reliable results



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1 . . . ." *Id.* Thus, it is clear Presswood's testing cannot assist the jury since the conditions were not  
2 remotely comparable to those at the time of the Incident.

3 Sixth, there is no evidence to suggest that Presswood's laboratory testing had a known  
4 error rate and, since there is no standard for the HPS on wet floors, it is impossible for Presswood  
5 to have an accepted base rate upon which to test an error rate. *Hallmark*, 124 Nev. at 502, 189  
6 P.3d at 652.

7 Seventh, Presswood clearly did not design his alleged laboratory testing for the present  
8 lawsuit. *See id.* He specifically states that he did not test for a wet surface at the site of the  
9 Incident.

10 Finally, Presswood conclusion that the "marble walkway where [Plaintiff] slipped . . .  
11 should be considered hazardous to pedestrians especially when wet" is highly speculative, not  
12 based on specialized, technical or scientific knowledge and will not assist the jury in  
13 understanding the evidence or in determining a fact issue. *Hallmark*, 124 Nev. at 502, 189 P.3d at  
14 652. For these reasons, Presswood's testimony will not assist the jury because it is clearly not the  
15 product of reliable methodology.

16 **V. CONCLUSION**

17 Based on the foregoing, the Court should grant Wynn's Motion in Limine [#1] and  
18 preclude Presswood from testifying at trial in this case.

1. My law firm represents Defendant Wynn Las Vegas, LLC d/b/a Wynn Las Vegas ("Wynn") in its lawsuit against Plaintiff Yvonne O'Connell ("Plaintiff"). I make this Declaration in support of Plaintiff's Motion in Limine (#1) to Exclude Purported Expert Witness Gary Presswood ("Motion"). 4. At this time, the parties are unable to resolve the pending issues relating to Wynn's Motion and the other motions in limine. As such, Wynn is filing the instant Motion and its other motions in limine. Wynn's Motion is not brought for any proper purpose or to delay these proceedings.

I declare under the penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of Nevada that the foregoing is true and correct.

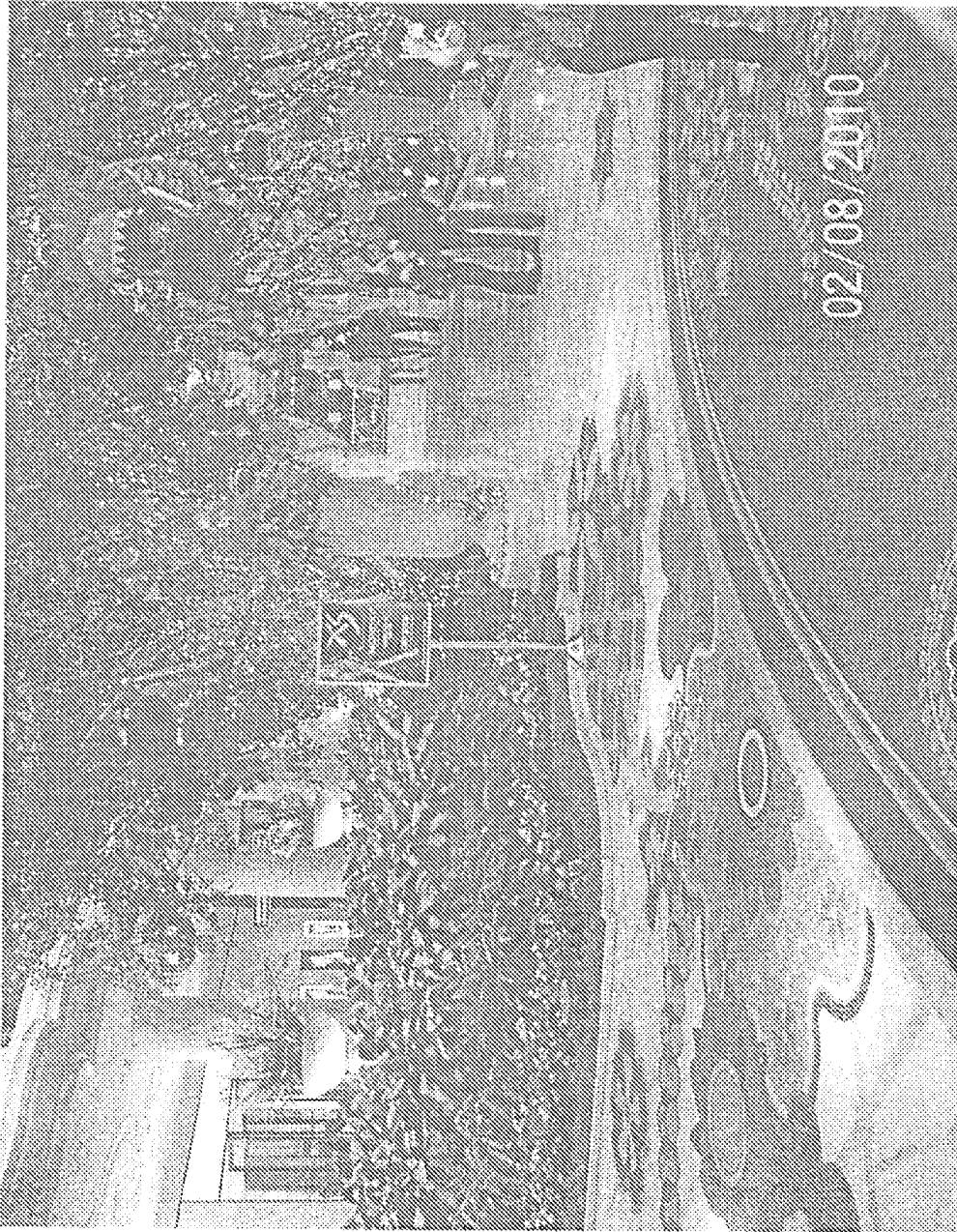

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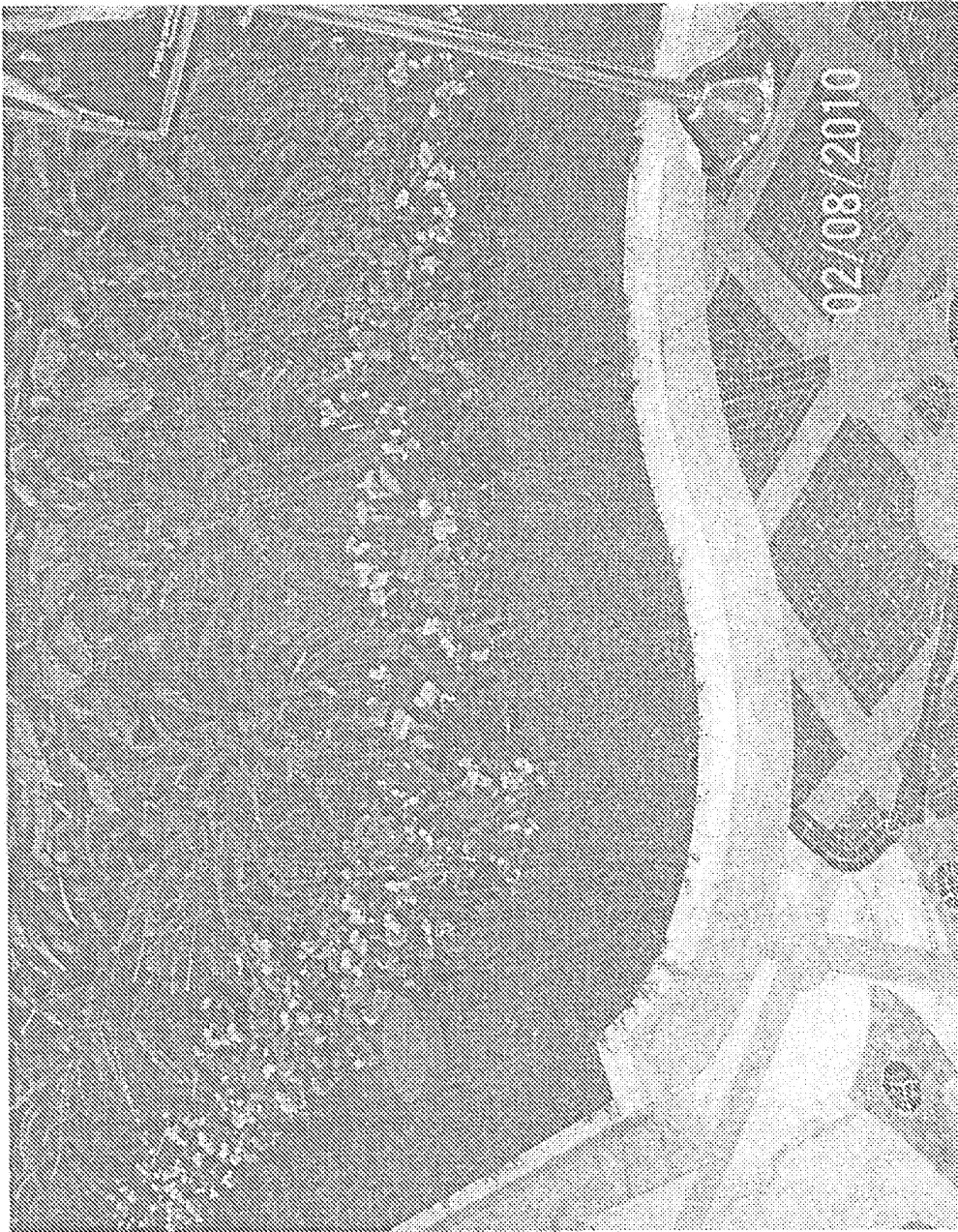

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**MEMORANDUM OF POINTS AND AUTHORITIES**

**I.**

**STATEMENT OF FACTS**

The present case arises out of a an incident on or about February 8, 2010, where Plaintiff Yvonne O'Connell was a customer and invited guest of Defendant Wynn Las Vegas at their hotel and casino located at 3131 Las Vegas Boulevard South, Las Vegas, Nevada. Plaintiff was at the location on this day for purposes of gambling and dining. When Plaintiff was walking near the south entrance of the casino through the Atrium Walkway, on the shadowed, multi-colored floor, she suddenly and unexpectedly slipped and fell in a large pool of liquid substance present on the floor. As a result of the fall the Plaintiff sustained injuries.

The pool of liquid which caused the fall had been present on the floor for such a long period of time that it had footprints in it and had begun to dry. All evidence presented shows the pool of liquid substance was approximately seven (7) feet long. The substance on the floor was witnessed by multiple employees of Wynn as well as the Plaintiff.

The area where Plaintiff fell is a beautiful walkway which leads to the shops and casino, and is surrounded by trees, plants and flowers. Wynn employees admit they were tasked with monitoring the area to ensure there were no dangerous conditions; however, there was no set

1 schedule and they were only required to walk through the area every "hour or two." Wynn has  
2 been unable to identify the individuals responsible for maintaining the area at the time Plaintiff  
3 fell. Wynn also admits that there was a substance on the floor and the substance had been on the  
4 floor long enough to dry in certain areas and become sticky. Wynn's Porter Supervisor, Yanet  
5 Elias, also admits that there was an employee in the direct vicinity of Plaintiff when she fell.

6 The instant Motion for Summary Judgment alleges that Yvonne has failed to present  
7 triable issues of fact on the claims of liability. Despite the allegations contained in Defendant's  
8 Motion for Summary Judgment, there are multiple issues of triable fact showing that Defendant  
9 was negligent and that negligence caused injury to Plaintiff.

11 **CONCISE STATEMENTS / UNDISPUTED FACTS**

12 **The Liquid Substance Was Approximately Seven (7) Feet Long and so Large that a**  
13 **Sweeper Machine Was Unable to Cover the Entire Area:**

11 A. Well, it – the liquid covered a large area, **at least 7 feet**. And the part that I  
12 slipped on in the walkway towards the back of me was still really slippery. And  
13 the part – once the people picked me up, the part over here in the open, two  
14 different pathways because it was – it was like a diagonal. So that part in the  
15 open under the lights, it had like – at least a 3-foot part of it had almost dried  
16 already. And so I was standing on the part, it wasn't slippery anymore. Little bit  
17 sticky and some footprints around it.”

18 **Wynn Admits Employees Should Have Monitored the Area Where Plaintiff Fell;**  
19 **But Can't Identify the Employees:**

Wynn Failed to Maintain a Sweep Log of the Area Where Plaintiff Fell:

See, March 24, 2015, deposition transcript of Yanet Elias at pg. 51, ll. 1-11 and pg. 52,

ll. 5-17, Exhibit 2.

Q: Do you know if the porters have to maintain something called like a sweep log to show that they've been to a certain area and that it's clean or that there was something there?

A: They don't have -- they don't have a log. They have to walk in the area, check the area, make sure the area is clear before they can move to the other area.

Q. How do you know or ensure, as an assistant manager and now as a shift manager, that that porter has actually gone to a certain area and ensured it's clean?

A. Because our responsibility is to walk in these areas, in different locations, like walk in the retail, pass by the gardens, check the areas of the casino, and then they go back in the -- I cannot say an hour or two hours. It all depend how long they take to go around the casino to go back to these areas.

Q. Any other way that you are ensured that they have gone to the areas that they need to go to?

A. This is the only way for right now. They don't have a schedule to, like, you have to be in the garden every hour, it's like --

Q. There's not that, right?

A. No.

Q. Okay. Is there any kind of documentation to show what areas have been essentially checked for safety purposes?

A. When I know, no.

III.

ARGUMENT

Standard of Review

Summary judgment is only appropriate when, after reviewing the record in a light most favorable to the non-moving party, there remain no issues of material fact and the moving party

1 is entitled to judgment as a matter of law. Nev. R. Civ. P. 56(c); *Rockwell v. Sue Harbor Budget*  
2 *Suites*, 112 Nev. 1217, 1222, 925 P.2d 1175, 1179 (1996). “In determining whether summary  
3 judgment is proper, *the nonmoving party is entitled to have the evidence and all reasonable*  
4 *inferences accepted as true.*” *Id.* (emphasis added). The court shall accept as true the  
5 allegations and affirmations favorable to the position of the plaintiff. *Parman v. Petricciani*, 70  
6 Nev. 427, 430, 272 P.2d 492, 493 (1954). Summary judgment under NRCP 56 may not be used  
7 as a shortcut to resolution of disputes upon facts material to a determination of the legal rights of  
8 a party. *Id.* at 436, 272 P.2d at 496. A genuine issue of material fact exists where the evidence is  
9 such that a reasonable jury could return a verdict for the non-moving party. *Valley Bank v.*  
10 *Marble*, 105 Nev. 366, 367, 775 P.2d 1278, 1279 (1989).

11 In *Tolan v. Cotton*, the Court broke from its normal routine of refusing to hear summary  
12 judgment appeals to “correct a clear misapprehension of summary judgment standards.” 134 S.  
13 Ct. 1861, 1867–1868 (May 5, 2014) (per curiam) (vacating grant of summary judgment to  
14 defendant in civil rights action).<sup>1</sup> The Court’s decision in *Tolan* clarifies the degree to which  
15 reasonable inferences must be drawn in favor of the non-moving party and competent evidence,  
16 even when circumstantial, is enough to survive summary judgment. *Id.* at 1868.

17 Additionally, the Nevada Supreme Court sought strong preference for the evidence of a  
18 party opposing summary judgment in *Angel v. Cruse*, 130 Nev. Adv. Op. 25, 7, (2014) (vacating  
19 summary judgment for defendant). Explaining its decision to vacate in *Angel*, the Court  
20 repeatedly emphasized the need to construe evidence in favor of the non-moving party. *Id.* at 7,  
21 8, 10. Together, *Tolan* and *Angel* stand as efforts by the Courts to strengthen the preference  
22 district courts give to non-moving party’s evidence so that disputes may be “resolved by juries.”  
23 *Tolan* 134 S.Ct. at 1868.

24 In a negligence action, summary judgment should be considered with caution. *Id.*  
25 “[C]ourts are reluctant to grant summary judgment in negligence cases because foreseeability,

26

28 <sup>1</sup> Admittedly, the issues here are unrelated to *Tolan*’s civil rights issues. Nevertheless, *Tolan* supports this  
Opposition to the extent it steers lower courts toward a more non-moving-party friendly application of the summary  
judgment standard.



1 duty, proximate cause and reasonableness usually are questions of fact for the jury.”<sup>2</sup> *Lee v.*  
2 *GNLV Corp.*, 117 Nev. 291, 295-96, 22 P.3d 209, 212 (2001). Summary judgment is only  
3 appropriate when a plaintiff, as a matter of law, cannot recover. *Id.* Moreover, in the recent case  
4 of *Rios v. Wal-Mart Stores, Inc.*, the Plaintiff slipped and fell in spilled yogurt; Wal-Mart filed a  
5 Motion for Summary Judgment to which the Court denied stating “the evidence of constructive  
6 notice provided by Rios isn’t strong, but it is enough to establish a genuine issue of dispute for  
7 trial.” 2014 WL 1413639 at \*1 (noting a Nevada district court judge’s earlier ruling).

8 The deposition testimonies demonstrate there are genuine issues of material fact that  
9 preclude summary judgment as a matter of law, and the cited case law supports Plaintiff’s  
10 position, not the Defendant’s. The cited case law emphasizes that the issues presented, notice  
11 and breach of duty, are issues of fact for the jury, not matters of law. The cases have holdings  
12 that support Defendants’ liability for Yvonne’s slip and fall because the law, as applied to this  
13 case, indicates that Defendants indeed had actual or constructive notice of the dangerous  
14 condition on the floor. Also, there is indeed evidence of both notice and breach of duty caused  
15 by the subject incident. Because genuine issues of material fact exist regarding Defendants’  
16 constructive or actual notice of the substance on the floor on which Yvonne fell, summary  
17 judgment should not be granted as a matter of law and Defendants’ Motion for Summary  
18 Judgment should be denied.

19 **A. Genuine Issues of Material Fact Exist Regarding Defendant’s Notice of the**  
20 **Dangerous Condition, Thus Summary Judgment Should Not Be Granted as a**  
21 **Matter of Law**

22 The four elements of a negligence claim are: (1) duty, (2) breach, (3) proximate  
23 causation, and (4) damages. *Doud v. Las Vegas Hilton Corp.*, 109 Nev. 1096, 1100, 864 P.2d  
24 796, 798 (1993). A proprietor owes an invitee a duty to use reasonable care to keep the premises  
25 in a reasonably safe condition for use. *Doud v. Las Vegas Hilton Corp.*, 109 Nev. 1096, 1101,  
26 864 P.2d 796, 799 (1993). The proprietor has a duty to an invitee to inspect the premises to  
27 discover dangerous conditions not known to him and to “take reasonable precautions to protect

28 <sup>2</sup> The four elements a plaintiff must establish to succeed on a negligence claim for liability are: (1) duty, (2) breach,  
(3) proximate causation, and (4) damages. *Doud v. Las Vegas Hilton Corp.*, 109 Nev. 1096, 1100, 864 P.2d 796,  
798 (1993).

1 the invitee from dangers which are foreseeable from the arrangement or use.” *Twardowski v.*  
2 *Westward Ho Motels*, 86 Nev. 784, 787, 476 P.2d 946, 947-48 (1970).

3 “The presence of a foreign substance on a floor generally is not compatible with the  
4 standard of ordinary care.” *Asmussen v. New Golden Hotel Co.*, 80 Nev. 260, 262, 392 P.2d 49,  
5 50 (1964). If one slips and falls because of a foreign substance, liability may be found if the  
6 condition was created by the proprietor or his agent or, if created by another, the proprietor had  
7 actual or constructive notice of its existence. *Id.* If a peril is hidden or latent, such as water on  
8 the floor, ordinary care requires a proprietor with actual or constructive knowledge of the peril to  
9 warn the invited guest who is without such knowledge. *Worth v. Reed*, 79 Nev. 351, 354, 384  
10 P.2d 1017, 1018 (1963).

11 “*Whether [a defendant] was under constructive notice of the hazardous condition is, in*  
12 *accordance with the general rule, a question of fact properly left for the jury.*” *Sprague v.*  
13 *Lucky Stores*, 109 Nev. 247, 250, 849 P.2d 320, 323 (1993) (emphasis added). None of the cases  
14 cited by Defendants regarding slip and falls and summary judgment rule that notice is a subject  
15 appropriate for summary judgment. The Supreme Court of Nevada in *Sprague*, 109 Nev. 247,  
16 849 P.2d 320, reversed the district court’s grant of summary judgment, and the U.S. District  
17 Court of Nevada in *Linnell v. Carrabba's Italian Grill, LLC*, 833 F. Supp. 2d 1235 (D. Nev.  
18 2011) denied summary judgment. In their motion, Defendants cite an unpublished Order in an  
19 attempt to draw comparisons to the case at hand. *See, Exhibit 4.* Contrary to the Defendant’s  
20 motion, this Order is not binding authority, nor is it comparable to the instant case. Unlike  
21 *Mostad*, Plaintiff has proactively produced evidence that includes depositions, affidavits, and a  
22 retained expert to show that Defendant had notice. Considering there is no law to support  
23 Defendant’s argument that Plaintiff’s claims should be summarily adjudicated *as a matter of*  
24 *law*, Defendant’s Motion should be denied.

25 Although there is no law to support Defendant’s request, in an abundance of caution  
26 Plaintiff will also address the issues of material fact showing that Defendant indeed had notice of  
27 the foreign substance on the floor on which Plaintiff slipped and fell.

28 Contrary to Defendant’s representation, the Nevada Supreme Court has not “defined”  
constructive notice as whether Defendant “could have known 1) that the hazard in question was

frequently on the floor in the subject area, 2) that the presence of this condition was a hazard to customers, and 3) that sweeping (or mopping) could not wholly keep the floor free of debris.” *See*, Defendants’ Motion, at p. 11:1-7 (citing *Sprague*, 109 Nev. at 251, 849 P.2d at 323). The Court ruled that evidence presented by the plaintiff supported the denial of summary judgment because “a reasonable jury could have found that Lucky knew that produce was frequently on the floor, that this produce created a hazard to shoppers, and that sweeping the floor could not wholly keep the floor free of debris.” *Sprague*, 109 Nev. at 251, 849 P.2d at 323. The Court held that the district court erred in granting summary judgment because “material issues of fact exist[ed] as to whether: (1) there was a continual build-up of debris on Lucky’s produce department floor; (2) Lucky, because of the debris, had constructive notice that a hazardous condition might exist at any given time; and (3) Lucky failed to exercise reasonable care in not providing skid mats to counter the continuous spillage of produce.” *Id.* *Sprague* thus does not define constructive notice or provide elements that must be satisfied, as Defendant represents and argues in it’s Motion, thus the law and argument does not support summary judgment. Rather, *Sprague* sets forth factors that evidence genuine issues of material facts that preclude summary judgment. *Sprague*, 109 Nev. at 251, 849 P.2d at 323. They are not elements that *must* be met in a case in order to prove constructive notice and/or present claims of negligence to a jury, nor are they an exhaustive or exclusive list of factors that may indicate a defendant had constructive notice of a dangerous condition.

In this case, there is a multitude of evidence that indicates Defendant had constructive notice of the foreign substance on which Plaintiff slipped and fell. Defendant highlights the Plaintiff’s misidentification of an audio speaker as a lack of evidence of the foreign substance’s source. However, *where* the substance came from is not the issue; the issue is whether Defendant had actual or constructive notice of it. The substance may have come from a guest or an employee. It does not matter as long as Plaintiff provides evidence that Defendant knew (actual notice) or should have known (constructive notice), of the dangerous condition.

**B. Plaintiff Slipped In A “Continuous Risk” Or “Recurrent Risk” Area Located On A “Special Use” Walkway That Wynn Created To Attract Guests To Walk Through Their Indoor Garden.**

1 The recurrent risk approach was laid out in *Sprague v. Lucky Stores, Inc.* In *Sprague*, the  
2 Nevada Supreme Court held that whether the property owner had knowledge of “chronic hazard”  
3 of debris on floor in produce department, was an **issue for the jury to decide**.

4 In considering whether reasonable care was taken, the fact-finder must also take into  
5 account the surrounding circumstances, such as whether nearby [store] displays were distracting  
6 and whether the landowner had reason to suspect that the entrant would proceed despite a known  
7 or obvious danger.” *Foster v. Costco Wholesale Corp.*, 291 P.3d 150, 156, 2012 Nev. LEXIS  
8 123, \*7-8, 128 Nev. Adv. Rep. 71, 2012 WL 6754112 (Nev. 2012).

9 In this case, Wynn created a “special use” walkway through their indoor gardens to  
10 attract customers to walk through and under their trees and view their decorations and plants.  
11 The walkway was dark and the trees cast shadows on the slippery, multi-colored tile. *See*  
12 *Photographs of Atrium area attached hereto as Exhibit 5*. The walkway leads to the shops, the  
13 casino, the south entrance and the Parasol Up Bar. There is deposition testimony the indoor  
14 atrium was watered regularly by the horticulture department, and there was a multitude of guests  
15 attracted to the area to view the flower displays and access the bar, casino and shops. All of  
16 these factors create a “continuous risk” or “recurrent risk” area. The risk of there being a liquid  
17 substance in the area where Plaintiff fell is continuous.

18 Wynn specifically created an attraction to draw the public to walk through the Atrium  
19 area. The area is designed for people to look at the flowers and the trees and not on the ground.  
20 Moreover, the mosaic tiled floor with its multiple colors and designs masks liquid or debris on  
21 the floor, making it difficult for patrons to determine whether there is something on the floor that  
22 can create a hazard.

23 Based on the foregoing, it is clear that this Atrium Area Walkway was a special use  
24 walkway. Additionally, Plaintiff has testified that the liquid substance was starting to dry and  
25 had footprints in it. This is solid evidence that the liquid had been there for quite some time. In  
26 an area, like this Atrium, which attracts guests and is subject to watering of plants the likelihood  
27 of recurrent hazardous conditions is extremely high; therefore, there must be a defined sweep log  
28 schedule to ensure the area is hazard free. The failure of Wynn to implement a sweep schedule,

1 and simply allow the employees to walk through “every hour or two” was insufficient, and rises  
2 to the level of negligence.

3 ***The Large Liquid Substance was Located in the Atrium Area Walkway Designed to***  
4 ***Attract Guests***

5 In considering the *Sprague* factors of constructive notice, **first**, the substance in this case  
6 was located within the atrium area, on a tiled marble floor adjacent to the botanical landscape.  
7 Public Area Department Shift Manager, Yanet Elias, testified that the Horticulture Department  
8 would “work in the gardens” taking care of all the plants and water them by using a cart and little  
9 container with water. She further testified that they would have a container with a stick, and the  
10 stick would have water coming out of it. *See, Exhibit 2 at pg. 39, ll. 18-20.* Thus, it is  
11 foreseeable based on the location of the walkway where Plaintiff fell to the Atrium that requires  
12 watering, that there may be liquid on the floor and therefore it must be carefully monitored.

13 Also, it is foreseeable that the Defendant had notice in the atrium area because of its  
14 likelihood to attract many visiting guests, as well as proximity to the entrance/exit of the  
15 premises, the casino, and various retail shops. The Atrium area is beautiful with different floral  
16 designs changed out often to continue to attract guests to that area. Additionally, the atrium itself  
17 serves as a walkway for navigating through the premises. Similar to *Sprague*, where the Court  
18 found that a reasonable jury could conclude that the produce section of a store would frequently  
19 result in produce on the floor just by virtue of the environment, a reasonable jury in the instant  
20 case could find that the nature and position of the atrium guests frequently walk through the  
21 atrium, and liquid spills might occur.

22 ***It is Undisputed that a Seven (7) Foot Pool of a Liquid Substance in a Walkway***  
23 ***Constitutes a Hazard***

24 **Second**, liquid spills on the floor are slip or trip hazards to invitees. This is evidenced by  
25 the fact Defendant hires employees to clean the premises to prevent any such incidents from  
26 occurring. Similar to *Sprague*, where the Court found that a reasonable jury could conclude that  
27 produce on the floor was a slip hazard, a reasonable jury in the instant case could find that liquid  
28 on the tiled floor is a slip/trip hazard. In every case that Plaintiff found, there was no question

1 that water or any liquid on the floor was a hazardous condition; the question was whether the  
2 substance was obvious to the plaintiff or a hidden/latent condition. *See, e.g., Worth v. Reed*, 79  
3 Nev. 351, 354, 384 P.2d 1017, 1018 (1963) (concerning water on the floor and stating that "If a  
4 peril is hidden, latent or concealed, ordinary care requires an owner, with actual or constructive  
5 knowledge of the peril, to warn the invited guest who is without such knowledge"). Thus, it is  
6 clear that the foreign substance on the floor would be hazardous, or at the very least, a question  
7 to submit to the jury. It is unreasonable to argue that this Court should rule, as a matter of law,  
8 that the foreign substance on the floor in this case was not hazardous. *Worth*, 79 Nev. at 354,  
9 384 P.2d at 1018-19 ("the peril (water on a tiled floor) cannot, in good sense, be deemed  
10 'obvious' as a matter of law").

11 ***Sweep Logs Are Required to Ensure the Walkway through the Atrium was Free from***  
12 ***Hazardous Conditions***

13 **Third**, it is evident in this case that merely sweeping or mopping was insufficient to  
14 prevent spills on the floor and thus prevent hazards because deponent Yanet Elias testified that  
15 the staff has no sweep logs, no inspection schedule; nothing maintained by the janitorial staff to  
16 evidence any such inspections were completed by Wynn Employees.

17 Q: Do you know if the porters have to maintain something called like a sweep log to  
18 show that they've been to a certain area and that it's clean or that there was  
19 something there?

20 A: They don't have -- they don't have a log. They have to walk in the area, check the  
21 area, make sure the area is clear before they can move to the other area."

22 ***See, March 24, 2015, deposition transcript of Yanet Elias at pg. 50, ll. 18-25, Exhibit 2.***

23 ***Checking the Atrium Walkway Area Every Couple of Hours in Insufficient***

24 When asked what is done to ensure that the Atrium Walkway area is cleaned and free  
25 from hazards, the individual in charge of the porters on the casino floor stated that there is no set  
26 schedule and they just walk through every hour or two hours.

27 ***See, March 24, 2015, deposition transcript of Yanet Elias at pg. 51, ll. 5-11, Exhibit 2.***

28 A: Because our responsibility is to walk in these areas, in different locations, like  
walk in the retail, pass by the gardens, check the areas of the casino, and then they

1 go back in the – I cannot say an hour or two hours. It all depend how long they  
2 take to go around the casino to go back to these areas.

3 This shows that the Defendant did not provide evidence to show they checked the area in  
4 question to clear any spill. It is their burden to prove that there are undisputed facts that they  
5 indeed performed such duties. Here, the Defendant did not meet this burden. Similar to *Sprague*,  
6 where the Court found that a reasonable jury could conclude that the defendant knew their  
7 cleaning policy was not sufficient to prevent hazards and it should have taken additional  
8 precautions, a reasonable jury in the instant case could find that Defendant did not clean the spill,  
9 and/or that Defendant's cleaning was insufficient to prevent slip/trip hazards and they should  
10 have taken additional precautionary measures, such as cleaning more frequently.

11 Defendant's duty of care to Plaintiff and their other convention guests is dictated by law.  
12 Plaintiff provides extensive case law above that supports denying summary judgment as to  
13 Defendant's liability and notice of a hazardous condition because they are issues of material facts  
14 proper for the jury, and not matters of law. Defendant provides no law that states notice of a  
15 hazardous condition is a matter of law appropriate for summary judgment. Rather, Defendant  
16 referred to unbinding Orders that do not reflect the instant case. For example, the unpublished  
17 Order found that the Plaintiff did not present any evidence demonstrating how the Defendant was  
18 negligent for their slip and fall in a buffet. Here, Plaintiff completed several depositions,  
19 affidavits, and produced an expert witness. Defendant must exercise reasonable care to keep  
20 their premises in a reasonably safe condition for their guests' use, including Plaintiff's, and  
21 Defendant must inspect the premises to discover dangerous conditions, as well as take reasonable  
22 precautions to protect Plaintiff and other invited guests from such conditions. A foreign  
23 substance on the floor indicates that Defendant *did not* meet its standard of care towards  
24 Plaintiff, and evidence in this case shows that they did not inspect the premises adequately and  
25 they should have known of the substance on which Plaintiff slipped. The exact factors and  
26 evidence that show Defendant had (or did not have) constructive notice of the dangerous  
27 condition, and whether its actions satisfied its duties to maintain and inspect the premises, are  
28 specifically for the jury to determine. They are not matters of law appropriate for summary  
judgment. There is enough evidence in this case indicating that Defendant did not comply with

1 the applicable standards of care and create genuine issues of fact that should be presented to the  
2 jury. Therefore, summary judgment should not be granted as a matter of law and Defendant's  
3 Motion should be denied.

4 The Nevada Supreme Court repeatedly rules that the courts' preference is to resolve cases  
5 upon the merits rather than dispositive motions. *See, e.g. Intermountain Lumber and Builders*  
6 *Supply, Inc. v. Glen Falls Ins. Co.*, 83 Nev. 126, 130, 525 P.2d 884, 886 (1967). The issues  
7 presented in Defendant's Motion may be appropriate for cross-examination or motions *in limine*,  
8 but they are not proper subjects for summary judgment. Defendant does not provide law with  
9 binding authority to support its request for summary judgment. Because there are genuine issues  
10 of material fact regarding liability in this case and the law does not support Defendant's request,  
11 summary judgment should not be granted as a matter of law and Defendant's Motion should be  
12 denied.

13 IV.

14 CONCLUSION

15 Based on the foregoing law, facts, and analysis, Plaintiff respectfully requests this Court  
16 to DENY Defendant's Motion for Summary Judgment.

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

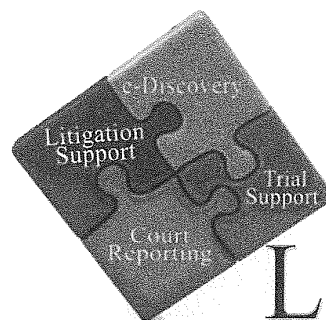

22       A. Other than -- than I fell, I don't think so.  
23       **Q.** Have you told him anything about your medical  
24 treatment that you received since then?  
25       A. Only that I need surgeries.

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1 Q. Okay. Did you tell him the specific  
2 surgeries that you need?  
3 A. I doubt it. I don't know how specific I got.  
4 I basically don't get specific with him. I just told  
5 him I need surgeries.  
6 Q. And then looking at No. 22, it's Holly  
7 Valdez.  
8 Is that his wife?  
9 A. Yes.  
10 Q. And you mentioned that they've come twice,  
11 his whole family, since the incident at Wynn Las Vegas?  
12 A. Since the incident, the whole family came I  
13 believe twice.  
14 Q. Okay. And you consider yourself close with  
15 his wife?  
16 A. Yes.  
17 Q. Okay. How long have you known her for?  
18 A. Well, he first brought her here to meet me in  
19 July of 2009.  
20 Q. How long have they been married for?  
21 A. They got married in October 2009.  
22 Q. And are the children, they have those two  
23 children together?  
24 A. One is theirs together, and the other one  
25 Holly had when they got married.

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1 Q. And have you discussed with her the incident  
2 at Wynn Las Vegas?  
3 A. The -- basically the same thing I told my  
4 brother.  
5 Q. Have you discussed your medical treatment  
6 with her?  
7 A. The same things that I told my brother.  
8 Q. And then going to 23, it looks like Dave  
9 Brobeck, Holly's father?  
10 A. Yes.  
11 Q. Okay. How long have you known him for?  
12 A. I met him at their wedding in October, and I  
13 went to their house the same time. October of 2009  
14 when they got married.  
15 Q. Okay. And how many times have you seen him  
16 since -- after the wedding?  
17 A. I haven't been able to go. So I haven't seen  
18 him.  
19 Q. Do you talk to him on the phone?  
20 A. I talked to him once.  
21 Q. I'm sorry. You said once?  
22 A. Once since the wedding.  
23 Q. Okay. When was that?  
24 A. I believe it was in February of 2010.  
25 Q. Okay. Do you remember if it was before or

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1 after the incident at Wynn Las Vegas?  
2 A. It was after.  
3 Q. Do you remember the substance of your  
4 conversation?  
5 A. Excuse me?  
6 Q. What did you talk about?  
7 A. What did we talk about? Oh, I told him about  
8 the accident.  
9 Q. Okay. Okay. And since that time you haven't  
10 talked to him?  
11 A. Correct.  
12 Q. Okay. And then going to 24 is Gaye Brobeck?  
13 A. Yes.  
14 Q. Holly's mother?  
15 A. Yes.  
16 Q. I'm assuming you met her at the wedding in  
17 October of 2009 as well?  
18 A. At the wedding and at her home for dinner the  
19 night before.  
20 Q. Okay. And how many times have you talked to  
21 her since the wedding?  
22 A. Since the wedding, I haven't talked to her.  
23 Q. And then 25, David Brobeck, Holly's brother?  
24 A. Yes.  
25 Q. When was the first time you met him?

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1 A. We met at the wedding.  
2 Q. And have you talked to him since the wedding?  
3 A. No.  
4 Q. And I'm turning the page to 213, and is it  
5 Mele Brobeck? Did I pronounce it --  
6 A. Mele.  
7 Q. Mele. And that's Holly's sister-in-law?  
8 A. Yes.  
9 Q. So is that David's wife?  
10 A. Yes.  
11 Q. Okay. Did you meet her at the wedding as  
12 well?  
13 A. Yes.  
14 Q. Have you talked to her since the wedding?  
15 A. No.  
16 Q. And next is Larry Muro?  
17 A. Yes.  
18 Q. M-u-r-o. And this is Troy Valdez's friend?  
19 A. Yes.  
20 Q. Okay. And how long have you known him for?  
21 A. Well, he's -- he's Troy's childhood friend,  
22 so many years.  
23 Q. How old is your brother, Troy?  
24 A. He's around 53.  
25 Q. So you're pretty close in age?

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1 A. Thank you.  
2 Q. So the childhood friend.  
3 So you've known him for quite some time?  
4 A. Yes.  
5 Q. Okay. And when was the last time you saw  
6 him?  
7 A. Troy's wedding.  
8 Q. When was that? Oh, that was the --  
9 A. October of 2009.  
10 Q. Okay. And have you talked to him since then?  
11 A. No.  
12 Q. Okay. If you haven't talked to him, I guess  
13 you haven't seen him since then either.  
14 A. Right.  
15 Q. And then Janine Muro, and that's Troy's --  
16 another friend of Troy's.  
17 A. Yes, Larry's wife.  
18 Q. Okay. How long have you known her for?  
19 A. I've known of her since she married Larry. I  
20 saw her at the wedding.  
21 Q. Was that the last time you saw her?  
22 A. Yes.  
23 Q. And have you talked to her since the wedding?  
24 A. No.  
25 Q. And then Jim Holloway?

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1 A. Yes.  
2 Q. And another friend of Troy's?  
3 A. Yes.  
4 Q. Okay. And did you see him at the wedding as  
5 well?  
6 A. Yes.  
7 Q. Okay. And have you talked to him since the  
8 wedding?  
9 A. I don't think I did. No.  
10 Q. Okay.  
11 A. I mean, we've -- Troy talks about him all the  
12 time, but I don't think I -- I don't believe I spoke to  
13 him.  
14 Q. Okay. And Renee Holloway, is that Jim  
15 Holloway's wife?  
16 A. Yes.  
17 Q. And did you see her at the wedding as well?  
18 A. Yes.  
19 Q. Have you talked to her since the wedding?  
20 A. No.  
21 Q. And 31, is ^Allen Stroub, S-t-r-o-u-b?  
22 A. Yes.  
23 Q. And that's your cousin?  
24 A. Yes.  
25 Q. How old is Allen?

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1 A. Oh, he's probably around maybe 66.  
2 Q. Okay. And mother's or father's side?  
3 A. Oh, no. He's married to my cousin Helen.  
4 Q. Okay. And when was the last time you saw  
5 Allen?  
6 A. Last time I saw Allen was February of this  
7 year.  
8 Q. Okay. Did you see Helen as well at that  
9 time?  
10 A. Yes.  
11 Q. And how often do you see them?  
12 A. Well, they usually come for the Super Bowl.  
13 I saw them this year, last year. But then after the  
14 incident, I didn't see them for three years, so not  
15 every year.  
16 Q. Okay. So in 2010, you did not see them? You  
17 did not see Allen and Helen in 2010, the year of the  
18 incident?  
19 A. I saw them on the day of the incident.  
20 Q. Oh, these are the cousins you were visiting  
21 at the Wynn buffet?  
22 A. We met at the buffet.  
23 Q. Okay. And after the day of the incident, I  
24 think, if I recall correctly, you didn't talk to them  
25 that day after you allegedly slipped and fell; correct?

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1 A. Correct.  
2 Q. Okay. When was the next time you talked to  
3 them after the incident, if you remember?  
4 A. I know I saw them three years later. And  
5 they didn't come in between that -- or they may have  
6 come, but we didn't speak. There may have been some  
7 e-mails in between about -- you know, because once a  
8 year, I send them an e-mail and ask if they're coming.  
9 But we don't speak.  
10 Q. And these e-mails, did you talk about what  
11 happened that day after you ate at the buffet with  
12 them?  
13 A. Never.  
14 Q. Okay. Okay.  
15 A. They still don't know.  
16 Q. They still don't know about the incident?  
17 A. Right. I've never told them.  
18 Q. So they obviously don't know about this  
19 lawsuit?  
20 A. Right.  
21 Q. Okay. And have you talked anything about any  
22 of your medical conditions?  
23 A. To them?  
24 Q. To them specifically.  
25 A. Only this year in February, I met them, and



1 of course they saw me with my walker. And I may have  
2 mentioned that I need surgery because they said that  
3 they had gone through some kind of knee surgery or  
4 something.  
5 **Q. Were they surprised about the issues you've**  
6 **been having?**  
7 **A. Well, I didn't go into detail. I just said,**  
8 **well, I need a surgery on my knee too.**  
9 **Q. Okay.**  
10 **MR. KIRCHER:** Let's mark this -- I'm sorry.  
11 I'm going to show these pictures that were produced. I  
12 guess mark this as Exhibit 4.  
13 (Defendant's Exhibit 4 was marked.)  
14 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**  
15 **Q. I apologize. This is embarrassing at all. I**  
16 **will say that Christian and I were -- had the privilege**  
17 **of meeting Sal Risko, and he's a very nice man. So we**  
18 **kind of talked about these, and the way understand**  
19 **it -- do you remember when these pictures were taken?**  
20 **A. Yes.**  
21 **Q. When were they taken?**  
22 **A. Well, I believe this was on Valentine's Day,**  
23 **this one up here, and Sal took it. That's in his --**  
24 **it's in his bathroom, and he took that. I believe it**  
25 **was Valentine's Day.**

1 **Q. Of 2010?**  
2 **A. Yes.**  
3 **Q. And I guess take a step back.**  
4 **You recognize these pictures?**  
5 **A. Excuse me. I'm so sorry. I'm counting to**  
6 **give you a more accurate answer. Yeah, I think that is**  
7 **accurate. I'm sorry.**  
8 **Q. Okay. And you recognize these -- these -- I**  
9 **think there's four pictures.**  
10 **A. Yes.**  
11 **Q. Okay.**  
12 **A. Okay. That -- you asked me -- I was telling**  
13 **you about when he took that one (witness indicating).**  
14 **Q. Right now you're looking at PLTF000720?**  
15 **A. Yes.**  
16 **Q. And the top picture was taken on Valentine's**  
17 **Day?**  
18 **A. Yes.**  
19 **Q. And this picture was taken in Mr. Risko's**  
20 **bathroom?**  
21 **A. Yes.**  
22 **Q. And is it -- on the left, is that a picture**  
23 **of you?**  
24 **A. Yes. Well -- yes.**  
25 **Q. You from behind I should say.**

1 **A. Yes.**  
2 **Q. Was he taking this picture to take pictures**  
3 **of the -- it looks like there's a bruise on your**  
4 **buttocks?**  
5 **MS. MORRIS:** Object to foundation.  
6 **MR. KIRCHER:** Let me strike that question.  
7 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**  
8 **Q. Why did Sal Risko take these pictures?**  
9 **MS. MORRIS:** Object to foundation.  
10 **THE WITNESS:** The doctor told me I had  
11 bruises there. So I asked him to take pictures.  
12 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**  
13 **Q. What doctor told you that?**  
14 **A. The doctor at UMC.**  
15 **Q. So this was after the fall at the Wynn**  
16 **Las Vegas?**  
17 **A. Couple of days after.**  
18 **Q. And then after you saw the first doctor, you**  
19 **took these pictures?**  
20 **A. Yeah. I saw the first doctor couple of days**  
21 **later, the 10th. And then when Sal got back -- he was**  
22 **gone. So when he came back, then he took those.**  
23 **Q. Okay. And the bottom picture on PLTF000720,**  
24 **what does that picture depict?**  
25 **A. That's the bruise on my leg, my right leg.**

1 **Q. Okay. What part of your leg is this?**  
2 **A. The thigh. And close to the knee, I guess.**  
3 **Q. And is the bruise depicted in the middle of**  
4 **this picture?**  
5 **A. Yes.**  
6 **Q. Okay. Roughly how big do you think that**  
7 **bruise is? Is it the size of a quarter?**  
8 **A. Oh, I'm sorry. I can't tell.**  
9 **Q. Do you remember how big that bruise was?**  
10 **A. I couldn't really see it. I mean, I -- I**  
11 **couldn't. The doctor's the one who told me, and I**  
12 **couldn't really position myself to see this.**  
13 **Q. Was it on the back of your thigh?**  
14 **A. No. This was on the side.**  
15 **Q. Side. And then going to the next page, 721,**  
16 **and what does the top picture depict?**  
17 **A. It's the bruise.**  
18 **Q. And --**  
19 **A. Bruises.**  
20 **Q. Okay. Can you, I guess, circle the bruises**  
21 **on the -- give you a pen -- that are on the picture.**  
22 **A. That are on this picture that --**  
23 **Q. Yes.**  
24 **A. -- I see here?**  
25 **Q. Yes.**

1 A. Okay. The ones that are on here -- well, it  
2 looks like it's this whole area. And I am not sure if  
3 it was bruised up here.  
4 Q. And then you can do the same thing for the  
5 bottom picture on 721.  
6 A. (Witness complies.)  
7 Is that what you wanted?  
8 Q. Yes. Wherever you think that you were  
9 bruised and what that picture depicts that bruise?  
10 A. This doesn't go down far enough. Okay.  
11 Q. Okay. And so it looks like you circled  
12 almost all of the picture; is that correct?  
13 A. Yes.  
14 Q. So it was a pretty substantial bruise?  
15 A. Well, it wasn't one. It covered pretty much  
16 the whole substantial space.  
17 Q. Okay. And this is your whole behind, the  
18 whole buttocks?  
19 A. Pretty much.  
20 Q. And would you say it's just on the right side  
21 or was it on the left side as well?  
22 A. It looks like it goes into the left side.  
23 Q. Was it more on the right side than the left  
24 side?  
25 A. It was more on the right side.

1 Q. Okay. And did you have them take these  
2 pictures because you couldn't see them and you wanted  
3 to see what was going on back there and how badly you  
4 were injured?  
5 A. Yes.  
6 Q. Okay. Okay. And at that time, when -- do  
7 you remember when Mr. Risko got back from the cruise  
8 that he was on?  
9 A. I believe it was that day.  
10 Q. So he came back on Valentine's Day 2010?  
11 A. I'm pretty sure.  
12 Q. And do you remember, did he arrive back to  
13 Vegas by plane, car? Do you remember?  
14 A. Plane.  
15 Q. Okay. Did you pick him up from the airport?  
16 A. Yes.  
17 Q. And did you drive to the airport to pick him  
18 up?  
19 A. Yes.  
20 Q. And did you drive him -- where did you take  
21 him after you picked him up from the airport?  
22 A. I believe we went to his house.  
23 Q. Okay. And when did you first tell him about  
24 your slip and fall at the Wynn Las Vegas?  
25 A. I believe that when he saw me limping -- when

1 I picked him up and I was limping, I think -- I think  
2 that's the first he knew about it. I -- he may have  
3 called that day before. I'm not sure. But I think it  
4 was just that day.  
5 Q. Okay. And after you picked him up at the  
6 airport, did you drive back to his house or did you --  
7 did he drive back to your house?  
8 A. I probably drove back.  
9 Q. Okay. Were you in any pain while you were  
10 driving?  
11 A. Very much.  
12 Q. Try to quickly go through some of these  
13 medical records.  
14 MR. KIRCHER: Have this one marked next  
15 exhibit.  
16 (Defendant's Exhibit 5 was marked.)  
17 BY MR. KIRCHER:  
18 Q. Keep all these separate.  
19 What's in front of you is marked as  
20 Exhibit 5.  
21 Do you recognize this document?  
22 A. Sorry. Yes.  
23 Q. Okay. What is this document?  
24 A. It's a letter to Dr. Trainor for -- from a --  
25 from a physical therapist at S.P.O.R.T.S.

1 Q. Okay. And who is Dr. Trainor again? Was he  
2 your primary care physician?  
3 A. No. He's the orthopedic surgeon that I was  
4 sent to for my hip and knee.  
5 Q. And it looks like this letter's dated  
6 September 18th, 2012?  
7 A. Yes.  
8 Q. So this is roughly 2 1/2 years after the  
9 incident at the Wynn?  
10 A. Yes.  
11 Q. Okay. Do you remember how many times you  
12 went to S.P.O.R.T.S. Physical Therapy?  
13 A. Yes.  
14 Q. How many times did you go?  
15 A. Once.  
16 Q. And did you just go for an evaluation?  
17 A. Well, I wanted him to help me.  
18 Q. Okay. Why did you only go once?  
19 A. Because he said he couldn't help me, and I  
20 needed to start -- he believed that I needed to start  
21 with pool therapy.  
22 Q. What's pool therapy?  
23 A. You walk in a pool and do exercises in a  
24 pool.  
25 Q. Okay. And they didn't do pool therapy at

1 S.P.O.R.T.S.?  
2 A. I guess not.  
3 Q. Okay. And then turning to page 2 of this  
4 letter, which is Bates labeled Wynn O'Connell 526, and  
5 at the very top, it says "Consultations." The  
6 patient -- "The patient has seen several physicians  
7 with no direction, she states. Patient's replied every  
8 doctor she has seen has not helped her or does not know  
9 how to treat this."  
10 Do you remember telling the therapist these  
11 statements?  
12 A. Well, I'm sure I told him that -- that I had  
13 been to several physicians, and I'm sure I told him  
14 that I was still in pain, I still had these problems,  
15 and so I'm sure I told him that.  
16 Q. Do you remember what his response was?  
17 A. Well, other than he didn't believe that he  
18 could help me, and he thought that maybe the pool  
19 therapy would help me, that I would have to start with  
20 that.  
21 Q. Do you remember what kind of evaluation they  
22 gave you at S.P.O.R.T.S. Physical Therapy?  
23 A. I'm sorry. What do you mean?  
24 Q. Did they have you do any exercises?  
25 A. Oh, no. He examined me.

1 doing that, the pain will subside.  
2 Q. And in September of 2012, when you met with  
3 S.P.O.R.T.S. Physical Therapy, do you remember what  
4 positions caused you this Level 10 pain?  
5 A. The positions he was putting me in, I don't  
6 specifically know, or I don't remember what positions  
7 or where he was touching me. I don't remember that.  
8 Q. And then going down the pain scale, it says,  
9 On a scale of 0 to 10, with 10 being the worst and 0  
10 being the best, currently is 10 100 percent of the  
11 time, the patient states.  
12 So was it in certain positions you were at a  
13 Level 10, or is it all the time you were at a Level 10  
14 in September of 2012?  
15 A. For sure, in certain ways that I move, in  
16 certain positions that I am in can increase the pain.  
17 And -- and also, when I get the -- the pain at my neck  
18 into my head, if I don't do what I need to do to make  
19 that subside, it will turn into a pain that doesn't  
20 stop for a couple of days. And that -- that pain is  
21 unbearable.  
22 Q. And is that still the case today?  
23 A. If I do the moves and put myself in those  
24 positions that -- that cause that, yes, it gets there.  
25 But I have learned how to make it subside.

1 Q. Okay. So he did a physical examination of  
2 you?  
3 A. Well, he moved me around and ...  
4 Q. Did he ask where it hurt?  
5 A. Yes.  
6 Q. Okay. And as he moved you around, did he ask  
7 you if this hurt if you moved your leg this way?  
8 A. Yes.  
9 Q. Okay. And then looking at this, it's about  
10 halfway in the middle of the page, it says, Increases  
11 pain at this time with everything. I am always in  
12 pain, a 10, everywhere on my body.  
13 Do you see that?  
14 A. Yes, I see it.  
15 Q. Okay. Is this something that you told him?  
16 A. Well, I'm sure I told him that when I move,  
17 certain ways that I move, certain positions I'm in,  
18 cause extreme pain.  
19 Q. And you -- it's caused to a Level 10 out 10?  
20 A. If I move wrong, if I move in certain  
21 positions -- I mean, move certain ways or if I'm in a  
22 certain position, it will cause that. I mean, I'm  
23 not -- I don't know what a 10 is. But -- but certain  
24 movements, certain positions cause more pain. And --  
25 and if I -- if I get out of those positions and stop

1 Q. What do you do to make it subside?  
2 A. Well, I have to stop moving. I have to lie  
3 down, rest my neck, put it -- you know, the special  
4 pillows, put it in a certain position, and I have to  
5 just keep all the pressure off it, stop the movement,  
6 until it subsides.  
7 Q. And --  
8 A. If I -- if I catch it early. But then if I  
9 don't, if I don't take care of it -- and which I didn't  
10 know at the time, but if I don't catch it on time and  
11 let it go into -- then it's just out of control for too  
12 long. But I've learned.  
13 Q. When did you learn that if you did that, that  
14 your pain would subside?  
15 A. Well, there are certain things that physical  
16 therapists told me to do, certain moves, and so of  
17 course I did them. And then I would get that extreme  
18 pain going up my neck into my head. First time I  
19 didn't know where that came from. But then I went to  
20 another physical therapist, they told me to do the same  
21 thing. Of course, I did it. The pain into the head, I  
22 got that again. So then I figured it out. I can't --  
23 I can't move my arms like that.  
24 Q. How many physical therapists have you seen  
25 since the incident at the Wynn?

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1 A. Well, I've been to four physical therapy  
2 offices, but then of course when you go there,  
3 sometimes you see more than one physical therapist.  
4 **Q. Okay. And roughly how many physical therapy**  
5 **sessions have you completed since?**  
6 A. Around 45.  
7 **Q. Do you still attend any physical therapy**  
8 **sessions?**  
9 A. Not right now.  
10 **Q. When was the last time you went to a physical**  
11 **therapy?**  
12 A. When I went to the pool therapy, I believe.  
13 I mean, I exercise every day. I spend a lot of time  
14 exercising every day. But actually going to the  
15 physical therapist, the pool session was the last.  
16 **Q. Do you roughly remember when that was?**  
17 A. Yes.  
18 **Q. When was that?**  
19 A. Sometime around the end or beginning of --  
20 end of 2012, beginning of 2013.  
21 **Q. How many pool therapy sessions did you do?**  
22 A. I believe 20, around there.  
23 **Q. Do you believe they helped with your pain?**  
24 A. Then again, there were certain movements I  
25 could not do. Otherwise, that would cause pain. And,

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1 so I was very careful with the movements I did. In  
2 general, pool therapy, you know, makes you stronger in  
3 general, but -- but I had certain moves that I could  
4 not do because that would cause the pain.  
5 **Q. And did you tell the therapist that you**  
6 **couldn't do certain moves when they asked you to do**  
7 **them?**  
8 A. I tried them. And then I would tell them,  
9 well, I'm doing this, and I'm getting more pain  
10 wherever. So then -- so then they'd say, well, then  
11 try it this way and don't do this, and ...  
12 **Q. You mentioned you exercised daily.**  
13 **What do you do to exercise every day? What**  
14 **kind of exercises do you do?**  
15 A. Oh, well, I do -- I spend hours throughout  
16 the day. I -- I can't -- like, in the middle of the  
17 night, I wake up in pain, so I have to sit up for at  
18 least a half hour. And it's stretching over, and --  
19 and so it's a lot of stretching until the pain  
20 subsides. And then when I get up, I can't -- you know,  
21 get up for the day, I can't stand up straight, and I  
22 wake up and my back and my leg are hurting. So I have  
23 to sit up again, and I do the stretches and -- over and  
24 up. So it takes me at least an hour to stretch and to  
25 where I'm able to stand up straight.

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1 Then -- then I try -- there's other  
2 exercises. Then I do Qi Gong.  
3 **Q. How do you spell that?**  
4 A. I believe it's Q-i G-o-n-g. I do that almost  
5 every day. And then I -- I do a little bit of stepping  
6 very carefully. You know, in the way that I can do it.  
7 And so just several hours throughout the whole day.  
8 Otherwise, I wouldn't be able to stand up straight.  
9 **Q. Okay. Going to the -- talking about the**  
10 **stretching, what part of -- what parts of your body do**  
11 **you stretch? You kind of leaned forward. It looked**  
12 **like you were stretching your neck. Do you stretch**  
13 **your neck?**  
14 A. Well, it's all the way down, you know, to --  
15 it eventually gets my back. That stretch pretty much  
16 gets your whole body. The Qi Gong pretty much gets  
17 your whole body. It's the arms and it's everything.  
18 It's a deep breathing.  
19 **Q. And can you explain to me what Qi Gong is?**  
20 **I'm sorry.**  
21 A. It's -- I think it's kind of, like, a form of  
22 Tai Chi. You know, it's the slow movements a certain  
23 way and the deep breathing.  
24 **Q. And then stepping, what is stepping?**  
25 A. Well, you know, I try to lift my feet and --

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1 and, you know, step.  
2 **Q. Are you standing or sitting when you're doing**  
3 **this stepping?**  
4 A. Oh, well, that one, I'm standing, and then --  
5 then there's the one where I'm sitting, and I put my  
6 legs -- you know, my leg up to try to strengthen my  
7 knees. I do that every day.  
8 And I have to do my back exercises. I have  
9 to do that every day, you know, the knees to the chest.  
10 And then one knee to the chest and back and forth like  
11 that with your legs up (witness indicating). I -- I  
12 work on every part of my body that I can.  
13 **Q. And do you do those exercises to help you**  
14 **become more active, or is it because you're in pain and**  
15 **that's the only thing that alleviates the pain?**  
16 A. The most important thing is it alleviates the  
17 pain, and I have no choice but to do them. However, I  
18 was always very physically active, and I always  
19 exercised. And so in addition to I have to do them, it  
20 makes me feel good to be able to do them.  
21 **Q. I think you mentioned that other physical**  
22 **therapists have hurt you with some of their exercises**  
23 **or some of the exercises they told you to do were**  
24 **painful; is that correct?**  
25 A. Yes.

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1 Q. Okay. And do you remember specifically what  
2 exercises or what part of the body you were exercising  
3 that was giving you pain?  
4 A. Yes.  
5 Q. What -- what are -- what parts of the body  
6 was that?  
7 A. Well, I didn't realize that it affected my  
8 neck. But what they were giving me -- they had me do  
9 arm exercises and pulling on, you know, the -- the  
10 bands, and -- and pulling on, you know a towel and  
11 doing the -- what do you call it? But pulling on  
12 things with your arms up in -- and that -- you know,  
13 with the arms straight up and -- and pulling a certain  
14 way. And that -- that gave me an extreme pain in my  
15 neck and it popped. And -- and -- and the pain just  
16 got all the way up my head, and so that's -- that's an  
17 exercise I can't do.  
18 Q. Was there any other exercise that you can't  
19 do?  
20 A. Well, then a physical therapist -- I let him  
21 do everything he needed to do to evaluate me, you know,  
22 move me every which way he wanted to. And when my leg  
23 or my arms are moved a certain way, it gives me a  
24 stabbing pain in my chest.  
25 Q. Was it a sudden pain or was it a constant

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1 pain in your chest?  
2 A. Stabbing and then it took some time for it to  
3 subside. So then they sent me to the heart doctor.  
4 Q. And what did the heart doctor say?  
5 A. He took tests.  
6 Q. What kind of tests did he take, if you  
7 remember?  
8 A. Well, there was quite a few.  
9 Q. Did he -- did any of the tests come back and  
10 say there was any medical issues or health issues you  
11 had?  
12 A. I believe just the echocardiograms.  
13 Q. And do you remember what they stated?  
14 A. Something to do with my valves, first one,  
15 and then -- then it progressed to two.  
16 Q. I guess generally speaking, did you think any  
17 of the physical therapy you went through helped with  
18 your pain that you were experiencing?  
19 A. Well, generally I -- I know that exercising  
20 is good for me. I have always loved to exercise. But  
21 unfortunately, now I know that there's some moves that  
22 I cannot do. And -- and like one doctor told me that  
23 he wouldn't -- wouldn't even send me to physical  
24 therapy because of the nerves.  
25 Q. Okay.

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1 MR. KIRCHER: Mark this as Exhibit 6, please.  
2 (Defendant's Exhibit 6 was marked.)  
3 BY MR. KIRCHER:  
4 Q. Okay. What's in front of you has been marked  
5 as Exhibit 6.  
6 Do you recognize this?  
7 A. Okay. I -- it's my handwriting, so yes.  
8 Q. Okay. So this is a document you completed?  
9 A. Yes.  
10 Q. And in the upper left, it looks like The Hand  
11 Institute; is that correct?  
12 A. Yes.  
13 Q. I don't see a date when it was completed.  
14 Do you remember when you completed this  
15 document?  
16 A. There's no date?  
17 Q. I'm not seeing one.  
18 A. Well, oh, okay. I know with my hand surgeon,  
19 Dr. Sorelle, and I saw him in 2012. So it would be  
20 when I was -- you know, around the time I saw him.  
21 Q. So this was completed probably sometime in  
22 2012?  
23 A. Yes.  
24 Q. Okay. And looking at the first page, Bates  
25 Wynn O'Connell 1110, under Patient Medical History, do

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1 you see that?  
2 A. Yes.  
3 Q. And then it says Major Events,  
4 Hospitalizations, and Surgeries.  
5 Do you see that?  
6 A. Yes.  
7 Q. Okay. And then it says -- and correct me if  
8 I misstate this at all -- Slip and fall, February 8th,  
9 2010. 2/8/10, healthy, exercised daily, swing danced  
10 four to six hours a week, controlled LBS or IBS?  
11 A. IBS.  
12 Q. And controlled stress disorder.  
13 Is that correct?  
14 A. Yes.  
15 Q. Okay. And what's the stress disorder that  
16 you're talking about right here?  
17 A. I -- when I lost my husband around 2002 and  
18 he was sick a year before that, I was very stressed.  
19 And -- and I went to Nellis, and they told me, well --  
20 I just had like constipation and I was just stressed.  
21 So -- so I was referring pretty much to that. And now  
22 I'm -- I was faced with a very life changing -- another  
23 life-changing problem here, and I was letting them  
24 know, like, I'm stressed over this.  
25 Q. You said you went to Nellis.

1       **Was that Nellis Air Force Base?**  
2       A. Yes.  
3       **Q. Do you remember where you went?**  
4       A. Well, you know, for the -- they took X rays  
5 of -- you know, told me I had the IBS constipation.  
6 They told me that's all it was.  
7       **Q. Okay. And it's just from the stresses of why**  
8 **you were there?**  
9       A. Yeah, I was losing my husband.  
10      **Q. Of course. I'm sorry.**  
11      **And so you considered this, the event,**  
12 **another life-changing event; is that correct?**  
13      A. Yes. It ruined my life.  
14      **Q. Why do you say it ruined your life?**  
15      A. Well, it had -- I had -- why do I say it  
16 ruined my life?  
17      **Q. Yes.**  
18      A. Oh, okay. Well, I was a lucky woman. I had  
19 a great life and I loved it. I was happy. It robbed  
20 me of that life. It changed the way that I plan on  
21 living the rest of my life. I couldn't do anything to  
22 the level I could do before the accident. I -- I had a  
23 great -- you know, I had -- my late husband and I, we  
24 went on long walks. We traveled. We had a lot of fun,  
25 and then I was lucky enough to find another man. We

1 went on long walks. We traveled. And we had a lot of  
2 fun, but we also swing danced several hours a week for  
3 years.  
4       Now I use a walker and I'm afraid to travel  
5 because it causes more pain and it bothers my head.  
6 And we had a great physical relationship. Now I don't  
7 want him to touch me because I'm in pain. My boyfriend  
8 and I, we were always around people, on the go. Now  
9 it's difficult for me to leave my house. It's  
10 difficult for me to get around, and I should be able to  
11 do it. So -- so my boyfriend and I broke up four years  
12 ago.  
13       I used to be able to drive for hours. We  
14 traveled all over. I drive all over. And now I'm  
15 afraid to drive. It -- it hurts my neck when I turn my  
16 head, and my neck will pop and the pain will go all the  
17 way up my head into my eye and I get dizzy, and then  
18 the pain goes from neck down my arms into my hands. My  
19 back hurts all the way down to my foot. And I used to  
20 run up and down -- I loved running up and down my  
21 stairs. Now I can barely get around in my own house.  
22 I used to sleep well. Now I don't. I could breathe  
23 easily through my nose. Now I breathe through my  
24 mouth. I could type really fast and play the piano.  
25 And now I am losing the use of my left hand. And I --

1 I could easily take care of myself. Now everything I  
2 do is difficult.  
3       So it changed my life. It robbed me of it.  
4       **Q. And you attribute -- attribute all of that to**  
5 **the fall at the Wynn?**  
6       A. I was a totally different person. I was  
7 happy. I was completely different. And after I fell,  
8 I had there immediate pain, and my life has never been  
9 the same. So I didn't have all of this. I didn't even  
10 have a doctor. I didn't go to doctors.  
11      **Q. And have you had a doctor tell you what's**  
12 **causing you all this pain over the last four or five**  
13 **years, like why you have so much pain from this?**  
14      A. Well, I've been to different specialists for  
15 different parts of the body.  
16      **Q. Okay. And you say you are losing the use of**  
17 **your left hand.**  
18      **Do you know why that's occurring?**  
19      A. Well, I know that ever since I fell, a few  
20 days later, I had -- I had symptoms on the left side of  
21 my face and my left arm went numb, and I know that  
22 certain positions, when I move my neck a certain way,  
23 put them in different movement, different positions,  
24 then the pain will start going down my arm into my  
25 hands. My -- they'll go numb. I know that.

1       **Q. And has a doctor told you why you're having**  
2 **this pain on the left side of your body?**  
3       A. Well, I have it on the right side too, but I  
4 was specifically talking about that. Well, I need  
5 surgery on the hands, both of them.  
6       **Q. And why do you need surgery on the hands?**  
7       A. Well -- okay. One is trigger finger in the  
8 left.  
9       **Q. You were diagnosed with trigger finger?**  
10      A. Yes.  
11      **Q. Were you diagnosed with anything else?**  
12      A. Carpal tunnel on both. And also I was told  
13 that the neck -- because the -- the neck is -- there's  
14 severe damage in my neck that causes -- it's causing  
15 my -- the numbness.  
16      **Q. Have you had a doctor tell you that your fall**  
17 **at the Wynn Las Vegas caused the carpal tunnel?**  
18      A. Well, I know that I didn't have this symptom  
19 before. I was a swing dancer. And then there, at the  
20 Wynn when I was there, then all of a sudden after --  
21 after -- immediately after the accident, my arms and  
22 hands, shoulder hurt so much. I couldn't even take my  
23 camera out of my purse and take pictures. And I  
24 couldn't fill out the form. The security guard wanted  
25 me to fill out his forms. I couldn't even do that.

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1 So -- so I'm perfectly capable and healthy,  
2 and then I fall right there and I can't do that?  
3 **Q. But have you had a doctor tell you that your**  
4 **carpal tunnel was caused by the fall?**  
5 A. I was told that the injury causes that.  
6 **Q. The -- what injury are you talking about**  
7 **right now? The fall?**  
8 A. That was my understanding.  
9 **Q. Okay. Do you remember which doctor told you**  
10 **that?**  
11 A. I believe Dr. Sorelle said that.  
12 **Q. And did a doctor tell you that the trigger**  
13 **finger issue was caused by the fall at the Wynn**  
14 **Las Vegas?**  
15 A. Oh, yeah, that -- that happened right then.  
16 **Q. Which doctor?**  
17 A. It was hurting right then.  
18 **Q. What doctor told you that the fall caused the**  
19 **trigger finger?**  
20 A. Well, that's my hand doctor. The injury  
21 caused that.  
22 **Q. So Dr. Sorelle told you that?**  
23 A. I believe he did.  
24 **Q. Do you remember if he specifically told you**  
25 **that or not?**

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1 A. I believe he did. That was my under -- it  
2 was my understanding, and I -- and I told -- I know I  
3 told him I never had that, and then immediately after I  
4 fell, I -- I had all this pain.  
5 **Q. And you said you had severe damage in your**  
6 **neck; is that correct?**  
7 A. Yes.  
8 **Q. And did a doctor ever tell you that that was**  
9 **caused by the slip and fall at Wynn Las Vegas?**  
10 A. I'm positive that I didn't have the pain or  
11 the symptoms or any of that when I went there to the  
12 Wynn.  
13 **Q. But a doctor hasn't told you that that's what**  
14 **caused the pain; is that correct?**  
15 A. It was my understanding that -- that I --  
16 that's what they said. It's my understanding that  
17 that's what they said.  
18 **Q. Who said that for the neck pain?**  
19 A. Well, I believe Dr. Cash said that the  
20 injury -- an injury causes this.  
21 **Q. Did he specifically say that the fall is what**  
22 **caused this?**  
23 A. Well, I specifically told him I was perfectly  
24 healthy. I didn't have any of this when I was -- when  
25 I went to the Wynn, and then immediately when I was

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1 there, immediately after -- after the fall, I had all  
2 these symptoms.  
3 **MR. KIRCHER:** Exhibit 7, please.  
4 (Defendant's Exhibit 7 was marked.)  
5 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**  
6 **Q. What's in front of you is marked as**  
7 **Exhibit 7. It's Bates numbered PLTF000005 through 10.**  
8 **Have you seen this document before?**  
9 A. Yes.  
10 **Q. What is this document? Or documents I should**  
11 **say.**  
12 A. It looks like it's from my hand surgeon.  
13 **Q. Okay. And then turning to the second page,**  
14 **Plaintiff's 6, so this is your hand surgeon, Minimally**  
15 **Invasive Hand Institute; is that correct?**  
16 A. Yes.  
17 **Q. Okay. In the upper right, it looks like you**  
18 **were seen by Jonathan Sorrelle?**  
19 A. Yes.  
20 **Q. On -- this is February 14th, 2012; is that**  
21 **correct?**  
22 A. I'm sorry. I missed it. Oh, yeah. Okay.  
23 Up on top?  
24 **Q. Yes.**  
25 A. Yes.

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1 **Q. Okay. At one point, it says, The patient had**  
2 **a life-altering fall on 2/8/2010. The fall was from**  
3 **standing height. The patient is very tangential with a**  
4 **number of her symptoms.**  
5 Do you know what he's talking about when he  
6 said the patient is very tangential with a number of  
7 her symptoms?  
8 A. No.  
9 **Q. Okay. And then looking at the, I guess,**  
10 **second-to-last paragraph, at one point, it says, The**  
11 **patient has not tried NSAIDS for this problem, and**  
12 **she's deathly afraid of all medical treatments and/or**  
13 **diagnostic studies.**  
14 Are you afraid of all medical treatments  
15 and -- and -- and/or diagnostic studies?  
16 A. If they're going to help me and heal me, I  
17 need them. If they're going to hurt me, I don't want  
18 them or, you know, if we are -- they're going to do --  
19 injure me, of course I don't want them. I don't want  
20 to take drugs just to take drugs.  
21 **Q. Did you ever tell them that, that you were**  
22 **deathly afraid of medical treatments?**  
23 A. I'm not sure.  
24 **Q. You just don't remember whether or not you**  
25 **told him that?**

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1 A. Apparently he got that impression.  
2 **Q. And I guess February, 14th, 2012, do you**  
3 **remember what kind of medical treatment Dr. Sorelle**  
4 **wanted to give you?**  
5 A. Well, Dr. Sorelle, I just went to him for my  
6 hands, and -- and what he said what I needed is surgery  
7 on both hands.  
8 **Q. Okay. And then I'm looking at Plaintiff's 8.**  
9 A. Page 8.  
10 **Q. Page 8, yes. Actually, can you turn to**  
11 **page 9.**  
12 A. (Witness complies.)  
13 **Q. At the very top, it says -- it was cut off on**  
14 **page 8 -- The patient has the above symptoms which have**  
15 **not improved. The patient now mentions she has fallen**  
16 **on her right shoulder a while back, and she has never**  
17 **had X rays performed. The patient has not tried**  
18 **NSAIDS.**  
19 **What -- what fall are they talking about on**  
20 **the right shoulder?**  
21 A. Well, the fall at Wynn on February 8th, 2010.  
22 **Q. He's talking about that fall?**  
23 A. Yes.  
24 **Q. Have you --**  
25 A. That was -- that was an immediate injury and

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1 pain there.  
2 **Q. Have you fell since that time?**  
3 A. No. I -- I -- my leg and my knees give out  
4 on me, but I haven't had complete falls. So I use my  
5 walker so I don't fall.  
6 **Q. Okay. That was all the questions I had on**  
7 **that one.**  
8 **And after the fall at Wynn, do you remember**  
9 **going through numerous tests by Steinberg Diagnostics?**  
10 A. Yes.  
11 **Q. Okay. Do you remember what those tests were?**  
12 A. Yes. Well, you know, most of them.  
13 **Q. Can you list those for me.**  
14 A. Steinberg?  
15 **Q. Yes.**  
16 A. Yeah, I've had -- specifically Steinberg?  
17 **Q. Yes.**  
18 A. Well, MRIs. They did an MRI on my back, and  
19 they tried to do an MRI on my neck, but they couldn't.  
20 They had to get me out because it caused extreme pain,  
21 and they had to get me out. My head was -- I couldn't  
22 stand it. So -- so they weren't able to finish that  
23 one.  
24 **Then they took a lot of X rays. They took --**  
25 **in 2010, they took X rays of my knee, my chest, my**

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1 neck. And then 2011, they took more X rays. And so  
2 basically the MRI and a lot of X rays. Right now,  
3 that's what I remember.  
4 **Q. Okay. And the pain that you had with your**  
5 **neck MRI, that was pain in your head? Is that that**  
6 **pain that you were having during the MRI?**  
7 A. Yes.  
8 **Q. Like headache kind of pain or ...**  
9 A. Well, it wasn't merely a headache. It was a  
10 lot of pain in my head.  
11 **Q. Felt pressure in your head?**  
12 A. Well, just a lot of pain, and they had to get  
13 me out.  
14 **Q. Have you had a neck MRI done since then?**  
15 A. Oh, yes.  
16 **Q. Okay. Do you remember what the results were?**  
17 A. Yes.  
18 **Q. What were those results?**  
19 A. A lot of damage to the disks, and I think the  
20 nerves.  
21 **Q. I guess talking about the test you did in**  
22 **2010, do you remember what the tests revealed?**  
23 A. Oh, also they did X rays of my hip.  
24 **Q. In 2010?**  
25 A. Yes.

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1 **Q. Okay. So let's talk about the hip X ray.**  
2 **Was there anything wrong with your hip**  
3 **from --**  
4 A. In the X ray, not in my hip.  
5 **Q. What about the knee?**  
6 A. In the X ray, not in my knee. In the --  
7 excuse me in 2010, right.  
8 **Q. Yeah, we're talking 2010 right now.**  
9 A. Yeah.  
10 **Q. And then the chest X ray they did?**  
11 A. Just something about the thoracic thing, just  
12 a little something. I forget what it said.  
13 **Q. Okay. And neck X ray, was there anything**  
14 **wrong?**  
15 A. Yes.  
16 **Q. What was that?**  
17 A. Damage to my disks and nerves.  
18 **Q. Have you received treatment for the damage to**  
19 **your disks?**  
20 A. Not yet. I mean -- I mean, I went to  
21 physical therapy a lot, but I haven't had any treatment  
22 yet.  
23 **Q. Okay. Are you planning on receiving**  
24 **treatment in the future?**  
25 A. Yes.



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1 Q. What kind of treatment have you been told you  
2 need?  
3 A. I need surgery on three of my disks in my  
4 neck, three of my disks in my back -- you know, I'm  
5 really sorry. What was your question?  
6 Q. What kind of treatment do you need for your  
7 neck?  
8 A. Oh, for my neck? Yeah, three of my disks in  
9 my neck.  
10 Q. Okay. And what's the issue with the neck?  
11 Was it an injury that was attributed to the fall at the  
12 Wynn Las Vegas?  
13 A. Yes.  
14 Q. Well, and --  
15 A. I had -- I hadn't -- okay. I had no issue  
16 with my neck at all. I was a swing dancer. When I  
17 went there to the Wynn, I was perfectly healthy. After  
18 the fall, immediately there, I had all this pain and --  
19 and symptoms.  
20 Q. But has a doctor told you that your neck  
21 problems are from the fall at the Wynn?  
22 A. Well, I told him that I had no symptoms  
23 and -- and how healthy I was and that I had,  
24 immediately right there, the -- the symptoms and the  
25 pain.

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1 Q. I guess I'm -- in some of these records, and  
2 we'll get to them, I guess, but one of them I think I  
3 remember seeing that there was a degenerative problem  
4 with either your lumbar spine or neck.  
5 Do you know anything about that?  
6 A. I'm sorry?  
7 Q. You have some kind of degenerative -- let's  
8 see if I can find -- with your disks. I believe in --  
9 MR. KIRCHER: I'll have this marked as  
10 Exhibit 8, next exhibit.  
11 (Defendant's Exhibit 8 was marked.)  
12 BY MR. KIRCHER:  
13 Q. Okay. I'm looking at -- this is Exhibit 8,  
14 and this is Plaintiff 25.  
15 Do you recognize this document?  
16 A. Yes.  
17 Q. And it looks like it's from Steinberg  
18 Diagnostic Medical Imaging Centers; is that correct?  
19 A. Yes.  
20 Q. Do you remember having a service done on  
21 March 19th, 2010?  
22 A. Well, I know that that's one of the X rays I  
23 had.  
24 Q. Okay. And the one I'm looking at, it says  
25 cervical spine, plain film?

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1 A. Yes.  
2 Q. Okay. Clinical history: Pain?  
3 A. Yes.  
4 Q. So you were having pain at this time?  
5 A. Yes.  
6 Q. Okay. And the impression -- on the  
7 Impression part, it says, Straightening of the normal  
8 cervical lordosis and nonspecific major positional or  
9 due to muscle spasm. And No. 2, he says, Moderate mid  
10 cervical degeneration.  
11 Do you know what No. 2 means?  
12 A. Not really.  
13 Q. Has a doctor ever discussed this with you,  
14 the mid cervical degeneration?  
15 A. I'm sorry?  
16 Q. Have you ever talked to a -- has a doctor  
17 discussed the mid cervical degeneration with you?  
18 A. Are you talking about this thing -- this --  
19 this -- did they discuss this document with me? Is  
20 that what you're saying?  
21 Q. Yes. It looks like one of your doctors  
22 requested that you have some tests done; is that  
23 correct?  
24 A. Yes.  
25 Q. And then you went to Steinberg and had some

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1 tests done?  
2 A. Oh, yeah. Okay. The -- it says right here  
3 that Dr. Subramanyam requested this. This is my  
4 primary doctor, and he sent me for this X ray. And  
5 then when the X ray came back, then he said that I  
6 needed to go see the orthopedic surgeon.  
7 Q. And who did he refer you to?  
8 A. Dr. Cash.  
9 Q. Dr. Cash. Okay.  
10 Then turning to 29. Are you there?  
11 A. Yes.  
12 Q. And on the top, it looks like it says,  
13 Physician Andrew Cash.  
14 Do you see that?  
15 A. Yes.  
16 Q. Okay. And so did Dr. Cash have you do an MRI  
17 of the lumbar spine -- lumbar spine it looks like?  
18 A. Yes.  
19 Q. Okay. And it says, Date of service:  
20 4/8/2010.  
21 Does that sound about right?  
22 A. Yes.  
23 Q. Okay. And says Clinical History: Right  
24 buttock and right leg pain; is that correct?  
25 A. Yes.

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1 Q. Okay. And then on the Impression, it has  
2 this Degenerative disk disease greatest at L3 through  
3 L4 with involvement of L4 through L5 and L5 through S1.  
4 Do you see that?  
5 A. Yes.  
6 Q. Okay. Did you have a discussion with  
7 Dr. Cash about what this meant?  
8 A. Oh, he just told me that my disks and nerves  
9 were damaged.  
10 Q. Did he tell you how they became damaged?  
11 A. Well, like I said before, I was perfectly  
12 healthy and didn't have any problems with my -- this is  
13 my back, didn't have any problems with my back. I was  
14 a swing dancer and I told him I had no symptoms. And I  
15 told them that when I fell -- immediately right then,  
16 when I fell, then I started getting all -- I had all  
17 this -- these symptoms and the pain. So I told him  
18 that.  
19 Q. Did he ever say that the -- that the  
20 degenerative disk disease was caused by your fall at  
21 the Wynn?  
22 A. I don't know if those were his words.  
23 Q. What were his words?  
24 A. I'm sorry. I don't know his exact words, but  
25 I didn't have any of these symptoms. I was a swing

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1 dancer. I went to the Wynn, fell, and then that's --  
2 immediately there, I had all these symptoms. So I told  
3 him that. And -- and he told me, Well, your disk and  
4 your nerves are damaged.  
5 But I'm sorry, his exact words, I can't tell  
6 you, but that was the gist of it.  
7 MR. KIRCHER: Let's take a quick break.  
8 (Whereupon a short recess was taken.)  
9 MR. KIRCHER: Okay. We're back on the  
10 record.  
11 BY MR. KIRCHER:  
12 Q. We're looking at PLTF29. We just talked  
13 about the degenerative disk disease under the  
14 Impression, and then underneath that, it says, Left  
15 paracentral disk bulge at L3-L4 with 2-millimeter disk  
16 protrusions at L2-L3, L4-L5, and L5-S1. No canal  
17 stenosis or neural foraminal narrowing.  
18 Do you know what that means?  
19 A. Well, I just told you that my nerves were  
20 affected by now.  
21 Q. So this relates to your nerve in your spine?  
22 A. The disk and the nerves. That's my  
23 understanding.  
24 Q. What did Dr. Cash tell you specifically?  
25 A. Well, my general understanding is that my

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1 disk and my nerves are damaged.  
2 Q. Did he tell you how they became damaged?  
3 A. Well, I told him that I had no symptoms. I  
4 was a swing dancer, I was perfectly healthy that day,  
5 and then I fell and immediately, I had all these  
6 symptoms and pain.  
7 Q. Do you remember what his response was?  
8 A. Well, that -- that my disks and my nerves are  
9 damaged. Now, those aren't his exact words, but that  
10 was my general understanding.  
11 Q. Okay. Did he ever talk to you about whether  
12 your fall at the Wynn caused these disk issues or if  
13 the fall at the Wynn could have contributed to these  
14 disk issues at all?  
15 A. I don't think he went into that detail.  
16 Q. Okay. Did you ever ask him the question?  
17 Like, why is this occurring to me or ...  
18 A. Well, I knew why it was occurring to me. To  
19 me, I was perfectly healthy. I didn't have any of  
20 this. A swing dancer -- in fact, I swing danced  
21 several hours just before that. I mean, I was  
22 perfectly healthy, and then I -- then I go there, and  
23 all of a sudden, I'm not.  
24 Q. Okay. I'm going to jump around a little bit  
25 with your medical records.

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1 (Defendant's Exhibit 9 was marked.)  
2 MR. KIRCHER: Okay. I'm going to clean some  
3 of these up in front of you.  
4 BY MR. KIRCHER:  
5 Q. What's in front of you has been marked as  
6 Exhibit 9.  
7 Do you recognize this letter?  
8 A. Yes.  
9 Q. And what -- who sent this letter?  
10 A. Excuse me. It says Dr. Fotedar.  
11 Q. And who is Dr. Fotedar and is he one of your  
12 physicians?  
13 A. Yes. He was a -- well, he's a cardiologist  
14 that I went to for a second opinion.  
15 Q. When did you go to him for a second opinion?  
16 A. On this day that -- what does he say?  
17 Well --  
18 Q. September 7th, 2012, on the top or --  
19 A. Well -- well, that's when he wrote the  
20 letter. So around then when I went. I just saw him  
21 the once.  
22 Q. Okay. And what did he give you a second  
23 opinion regarding?  
24 A. I told him about the fall and the symptoms  
25 that I had and that I still was having the chest pain,

1 and that the first echocardiogram had showed damage to  
2 my valve. And then the second echocardiogram showed  
3 that it had damage -- that the -- that the damage went  
4 from one valve into two valves now. So I needed to  
5 know what was going on.

6 **Q. Do you remember when you had the first**  
7 **echocardiogram?**

8 A. I know that Dr. Subramanyam, when he first  
9 saw me, he took a heart test. That may not have been  
10 the echocardiogram, but then he referred me to the  
11 cardiologist, Dr. Wesley. So this was, you know,  
12 after -- shortly after the accident because I had the  
13 chest pains. I believe that's when Dr. Wesley had the  
14 echocardiogram done, you know, shortly after the  
15 accident.

16 **Q. And when and how far --**

17 A. I'm sorry. I'm sorry. I forgot your  
18 question, but that was the first echocardiogram.

19 **Q. Correct?**

20 A. Okay.

21 **Q. And then when did you have the second one**  
22 **taken? Was it shortly after that?**

23 A. I believe after I -- after I went to the  
24 physical therapist and Dr. Suarez, and, you know, the  
25 movement triggered the pain in the chest, and he said

1 that I needed to go to a cardiologist before he did --  
2 touched me. And I -- that's when I went back to  
3 Dr. Wesley. And that was, you know, 2012. And that's  
4 when Dr. Wesley did a lot of tests. So I believe that  
5 that's when the second echocardiogram was done.

6 **Q. Okay. And have you ever read this Exhibit 9?**  
7 **Have you read this letter before?**

8 A. Yes, I have.

9 **Q. Okay. Have you read it recently?**

10 A. No.

11 **Q. I guess turning to the second page,**  
12 **Plaintiff's 77. On the Recommendations, No. 1, just**  
13 **want to read that real quick just to refresh your**  
14 **memory before I start asking you a few questions.**

15 A. Oh, you want me to read the whole thing? Can  
16 you just ask me specific questions?

17 **Q. Okay. That's fine. Well, it says he had a**  
18 **long discussion with the patient. I basically tried to**  
19 **assure her that she had a normal echocardiogram and her**  
20 **mitral and tricuspid regurgitation described on that**  
21 **echocardiogram were qualified and physiological. The**  
22 **patient was not very happy with this and thought that I**  
23 **was not paying a lot of attention to her echocardi**  
24 **symptoms and signs. The way I'm reading this is he's**  
25 **saying that your echocardiogram was fine.**

1 **Is that the way that you remember the**  
2 **conversation you had with him?**

3 A. No.

4 **Q. So what did he tell you about it?**

5 A. Well, first of all, the first echocardiogram  
6 only had one valve. So if he's talking about the  
7 second echocardiogram, which now has two valves,  
8 that -- that isn't fine. I mean, it -- if it  
9 progresses from one valve being affected to the second  
10 valve being affected, that's not fine.

11 **Q. What -- what did he describe to you on that**  
12 **date on what was wrong with you, for lack of a better**  
13 **word?**

14 A. Well, he said, yes, the first valve, when  
15 that's affected -- I mean, these aren't his exact  
16 words -- when that is affected, yes, that can start  
17 affecting the second valve. And he said that I needed  
18 to have a follow-up -- follow-up echocardiogram and  
19 also a stress test or something like that. So  
20 basically that's what he said.

21 **Q. So do you disagree with his statement that he**  
22 **wrote that said "she had a normal echocardiogram" --**  
23 **echocardiogram? Sorry, mispronouncing that.**

24 A. I think you're reading it -- you're reading  
25 it differently than I am.

1 **Q. How are you reading it?**

2 A. I'm reading it that -- well, this -- this is  
3 what I got from what he told me. He wasn't alarmed.  
4 That yes, it was progressing, but he wasn't alarmed.  
5 And just to get another follow-up echocardiogram and  
6 get the stress test.

7 **Q. And he wrote that you were unhappy with the**  
8 **way that he reviewed your echocardiogram.**

9 **Do you remember not being happy with his**  
10 **recommendations?**

11 A. Well, I remember that the reason he spent  
12 time with me talking is because in the beginning, he  
13 didn't address the echocardiogram. Then I had to tell  
14 him, Well, Doctor, if the first one just has one and  
15 the second one shows now it's progressed to two, why is  
16 this? And so then -- then he did. He was very nice  
17 and then he did take the time. And then he explained  
18 to me, and explained to me, well, you need to have  
19 another follow-up. But -- but he wasn't alarmed.  
20 So -- so he was very nice and -- and calmed me down.

21 **Q. Then, I guess, keep going. He says, I spent**  
22 **more than 30 minutes with her trying to explain to her**  
23 **that she does not have significant valvular heart**  
24 **disease at this point in time based on the -- based on**  
25 **echocardiogram from April and on clinical examination**

1 and maybe her symptoms cannot be explained from that.  
2 Do you remember talking -- him talking to you  
3 about that?

4 A. Yes. He told -- told me he wasn't alarmed,  
5 and that the chest pain maybe wasn't from this.

6 Q. I guess you keep talking about how it went  
7 from one valve to two valves; is that correct?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. And I guess I'm seeing in here where he's  
10 mentioning that there was some kind of progression from  
11 one valve to two valves or any problem that you had at  
12 that time just reading this.

13 A. You just read that to me.

14 Q. I had a long discussion with the patient, and  
15 I basically tried to assure her that she had a normal  
16 echocardiogram and her mitral and tricuspid  
17 regurgitation described on that echocardiogram was  
18 qualified physiological.

19 I guess just confusion there. I just -- it  
20 doesn't sound like he's saying what you're saying.

21 A. I think he addressed it there. Well, he  
22 knew -- I think it's in there. I can't see it right  
23 now. But the whole point was, I asked him, well, the  
24 first one showed one, now the second one is showing  
25 it's progressed to two, and -- and that was what I was

1 asking him about. And that's what he was -- that's why  
2 he took the time so that -- and telling me that he  
3 wasn't alarmed by it, but just to have the follow-up  
4 echocardiogram and get -- and follow it.

5 Q. And you only saw him that once?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. Why did you not go back to him again?

8 A. Oh, because I only went to him for a second  
9 opinion, and I'm going to go back to Dr. Wesley.

10 Q. In your mind, did he give the same -- did he  
11 have the same opinion as Dr. Wesley?

12 A. I don't know what Dr. Wesley's opinion is.

13 Q. And do you attribute these valve issues to  
14 the fall at the Wynn?

15 A. I'm positive that I didn't have chest pains  
16 before I -- I fell at the Wynn.

17 Q. So you do, then?

18 A. I'm sorry?

19 Q. So you do attribute the chest pains you're  
20 having to the fall at the Wynn?

21 A. I'm -- I'm positive that I didn't have the  
22 chest pains before. And I'm -- and then after I fell,  
23 and -- and I had the immediate pain and injuries right  
24 there. I had the pain in the shoulder which is, you  
25 know, where my chest is.

1 Q. Did Dr. Wesley ever tell you that these kind  
2 of problems could happen from a fall like you had at  
3 the Wynn?

4 A. I'm sorry. I don't -- I don't recall him  
5 saying -- I don't recall what he said about that.

6 Q. Okay. Did Dr. Fotedar ever tell you that?

7 A. Well, I saw him the one time, and I don't --  
8 I just know that I told him the same. I didn't have  
9 the -- these issues -- these heart issues or any  
10 symptoms before. And then after I did, immediately I  
11 did.

12 Q. Okay.

13 MR. KIRCHER: Have this marked as Exhibit 10,  
14 please.

15 (Defendant's Exhibit 10 was marked.)

16 BY MR. KIRCHER:

17 Q. What's in front of you has been marked as  
18 Exhibit 10. First page is Plaintiff's 392.

19 Do you recognize these -- this document or  
20 documents?

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. And it looks like it's from Advanced  
23 Orthopedics & Sports Medicine; is that correct?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. Do you remember who -- what doctor you saw at

1 this --

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. Who was that?

4 A. Dr. Trainor.

5 Q. This is Dr. Trainor. Okay.

6 And then turning to the second page, 393. On  
7 the top, it's kind of cut off, but I think it says  
8 today's date is 2/10/12.

9 Do you see that?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. Do you remember going to visit them on  
12 February 10th, 2012?

13 A. I remember seeing Dr. Trainor.

14 Q. Okay. I believe you circled it as well. All  
15 right. And then turning to 395.

16 A. (Witness complies.)

17 Q. Do you remember why you went to Dr. Trainor  
18 on that date?

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. Why did you go?

21 A. Because Dr. Subramanyam referred him -- me to  
22 him because my hip and my knees were still hurting.

23 Q. Which knees and which -- right knee?

24 A. Well, both of my knees were hurting. But  
25 specifically he was just looking at my hip and my right

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1 knee that day.  
2 **Q. Okay. And then looking at these, did you**  
3 **fill out this document that's marked 395?**  
4 A. Yes.  
5 **Q. So this is your handwriting?**  
6 A. Yes.  
7 **Q. And -- and just looking at this document, it**  
8 **looks like there's a bunch of times you wrote slip and**  
9 **fall.**  
10 **Do you see that? Like, just all over the**  
11 **place?**  
12 A. All over the place? Okay. I believe you. I  
13 mean, yes. Okay.  
14 **Q. I presume you're referring to the -- your**  
15 **fall at the Wynn?**  
16 A. Yes.  
17 **Q. And there's parts where you wrote and**  
18 **circled -- you know, they're asking you, Have you ever**  
19 **had any of these symptoms? If no, mark none. And**  
20 **there's parts where you circled them, and wrote slip**  
21 **and fall -- or squared them.**  
22 **Do you see that?**  
23 A. Yes.  
24 **Q. So under No. 1, GI, you wrote -- there's**  
25 **blood in stool and you had slip and fall above it and**

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1 **nausea.**  
2 A. Yes.  
3 **Q. What does that mean?**  
4 A. I meant that -- that when I had the slip and  
5 fall, after I slipped and fell, that I had nausea,  
6 and -- and I had, you know, a problem with my -- my  
7 system.  
8 **Q. Okay. And then --**  
9 A. Specifically, I was completely constipated.  
10 I had a problem. It's like it stopped working.  
11 **Q. And then under No. 4I, it says -- it looks**  
12 **like you squared blurred vision?**  
13 A. Yes.  
14 **Q. And that started happening after this fall at**  
15 **the Wynn?**  
16 A. After I fell and I hit my head and I was  
17 dazed right there.  
18 **Q. Where? I'm sorry?**  
19 A. Immediately there at the Wynn, that was one  
20 of the things that I had the immediate thing. I had --  
21 I was dazed. And my -- my eyes were blurry. And when  
22 they -- he gave me the form to fill out, I wasn't able  
23 to, and when he had me sign it, I was -- it was blurry,  
24 so I had that problem right then.  
25 **Q. And this was filled out on February 10th,**

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1 **2012.**  
2 **This is two years after the fall at the Wynn;**  
3 **is that correct?**  
4 A. Yes.  
5 **Q. Okay. And you still have blurred vision?**  
6 A. Well -- well --  
7 **Q. Or do you still --**  
8 A. I still get it. I get it -- it comes and  
9 goes. You know, with the neck pain, the certain  
10 movements, and if I don't -- if I don't lie down and  
11 let it subside, it starts going up my neck and then  
12 affecting into my head, and then it affects my eyes.  
13 So I still get it. So what I was saying is since the  
14 slip and fall I was getting these symptoms in my head.  
15 **Q. So this isn't something that's constant.**  
16 **It's something that comes on --**  
17 A. It comes -- it comes and goes. I mean, now I  
18 know how to make it subside. I didn't know at the  
19 time. I mean, when it happened, I didn't know what was  
20 going on.  
21 **Q. The next one, No. 5, trouble swallowing, and**  
22 **I think it says sinus growth?**  
23 A. Yes.  
24 **Q. Can you explain that for me?**  
25 A. Yes. Before that date -- when I went there

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1 that day, I was healthy. I was a swing dancer. I had  
2 no issues, no symptoms. I had no issues with my head,  
3 no problems with my eyes or my head. And when I fell,  
4 I immediately had these symptoms and pain and I was  
5 dazed, and I had this -- my head, had problems with my  
6 head and neck and the rest.  
7 **Q. Okay. What does sinus growth mean?**  
8 A. The doctor said that I have eight, like, a --  
9 I don't remember his exact words, but it's like a -- a  
10 balloon that swells up and goes back down, something  
11 like that.  
12 **Q. Have you received any treatment for that?**  
13 A. No.  
14 **Q. How often does it blow up or swell up?**  
15 A. On a regular basis. I mean, it's always  
16 there, but just comes and goes.  
17 **Q. Okay. I guess -- I think I skipped some of**  
18 **these. When I look on the right, it says "Year," and I**  
19 **think you marked some of these. It says slip and fall**  
20 **caused -- kind of look right here, just so we're on the**  
21 **same --**  
22 A. Okay.  
23 **Q. So slip and fall caused internal injuries,**  
24 **hernia and/or ulcers.**  
25 **Do you see what I'm --**

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1 A. Yes.  
2 Q. And you wrote that?  
3 A. Yes.  
4 Q. So you had a hernia?  
5 A. Well, what I'm referring to is that after I  
6 slipped and fell and had pain inside and out, my system  
7 stopped working. I had the constipation. I had the  
8 chest pain and the pain around my ribs, and up here  
9 by -- by the ribs. Okay. Those are internal. So  
10 that's what I'm referring to. So when I went to  
11 doctor -- the GI doctors, I told them about that. They  
12 just said, well, maybe you got a hernia. Maybe it  
13 caused an ulcer. Maybe, you know, it's this and this,  
14 but we can't tell. You need these tests.  
15 Q. Did you have those tests conducted?  
16 A. No.  
17 Q. Okay. You never had a colonoscopy?  
18 A. No.  
19 Q. Why didn't you have those tests conducted?  
20 A. Well, because -- because they said it could  
21 perforate my tissues and because I was having those  
22 problems and it felt like they were -- the tissues were  
23 had a problem already, for them -- to let them go there  
24 and perforate my tissues, I don't -- I don't need any  
25 more problems.

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1 Q. Did a doctor ever specifically diagnose you  
2 with a hernia?  
3 A. No. Specifically, they said, We can't tell  
4 what you it is without the tests.  
5 Q. And is that true with the ulcer as well?  
6 A. Yes.  
7 Q. Okay.  
8 A. They just said, well, it could be a hernia,  
9 could be this, could be that, but we need to give you  
10 the tests.  
11 Q. And below that, it says, And/or aneurysm; is  
12 that correct?  
13 A. Yes.  
14 Q. Same thing. This is something that a  
15 doctor -- did a doctor diagnose you with an aneurysm?  
16 A. No diagnosis. They just said, well, maybe  
17 could be this, that --  
18 Q. But you --  
19 A. -- but we need the test.  
20 Q. You need a test for that as well?  
21 A. Yes.  
22 Q. Is the test for the aneurysm a colonoscopy as  
23 well? If you know.  
24 A. Oh, I don't know.  
25 Q. Okay. And then going down this, it looks

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1 like you marked -- I'm looking at 6. You marked chest  
2 pain which we've talked about. Palpitations, I think  
3 we've briefly addressed that.  
4 Slip and fall caused that as well?  
5 A. Yes, the chest pain, and ...  
6 Q. Chronic cough, shortness of breath are marked  
7 on there as well?  
8 A. I'm sorry. Are you asking a question?  
9 Q. Yes. So did you mark chronic cough and  
10 shortness of breath?  
11 A. I marked it.  
12 Q. I guess I'm looking at 10, headaches,  
13 dizziness.  
14 And slip and fall caused that as well?  
15 A. Well, like I said, immediately there, I was  
16 dazed.  
17 Q. I mean, in 2012, did you still have  
18 headaches?  
19 A. I still get them, like today.  
20 Q. And dizziness?  
21 A. Yes. When I was driving over here. I -- my  
22 neck popped and it makes me dizzy.  
23 Q. And then No. 11, depression's marked.  
24 Do you see that?  
25 A. Yes.

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1 Q. Did the slip and fall cause that as well?  
2 A. Well, yes. I'm -- I'm depressed that -- that  
3 I have these -- these issues, and I -- and I'm --  
4 I'm -- I can't -- I don't have that happy life that I  
5 had.  
6 Q. Have you received treatment for that? For  
7 any sort of depression?  
8 A. No. I mean, I'm just depressed because I  
9 have to go through all this. I wish I didn't. I wish  
10 it hadn't happened.  
11 Q. Have you been prescribed any drugs for  
12 depression?  
13 A. No. I mean, doctors offer drugs. But I  
14 haven't been -- I mean, they offer them, but I haven't  
15 been prescribed them; and I'm not taking them.  
16 Q. Have you been to a psychiatrist?  
17 A. No. I mean, what, ever in my life?  
18 Q. In the last five years?  
19 A. No.  
20 Q. Okay. It looks like throughout this  
21 document, you're attributing a lot of these symptoms to  
22 the fall at the Wynn; is that correct?  
23 MS. MORRIS: Object to form.  
24 THE WITNESS: What is correct is -- what I'm  
25 trying to say here is I was healthy. I had no

1 symptoms. I was a swing dancer, very active, the day  
2 that I went there, and then I fall and I had the  
3 immediate symptoms and pain. That's -- that's my  
4 point. I didn't have it, and then all of a sudden, I  
5 have them?

6 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**

7 **Q. Okay. And then looking at, have you ever**  
8 **had -- towards the bottom of the document, it says**  
9 **heart attack, and it looks like you wrote "No?" And**  
10 **then you wrote something to the right of that.**

11 **Do you see where I'm talking about?**

12 A. Okay. What exactly -- okay. I see the area.  
13 So what are you -- exactly are you asking?

14 **Q. So do you see where it says heart attack,**  
15 **year, and you put no -- is that "No?"**

16 A. Yes. I'm -- I put -- I didn't know if after  
17 the fall, that -- that what I had was a heart attack.  
18 I didn't know if -- if that's what I had. That --  
19 that's the question.

20 **Q. But when did you have a heart attack or when**  
21 **did you think you possibly had a heart attack?**

22 A. Well, I had the chest pains. And a couple of  
23 days later, I had symptoms on the whole -- on the  
24 entire left side of my face and my arm and hand went  
25 numb.

1 **Q. And when was this?**

2 A. Couple of days after I fell.

3 **Q. Did a doctor ever tell you that you had a**  
4 **heart attack?**

5 A. No. I didn't -- I didn't ask a -- I didn't  
6 go to a doctor for it.

7 **Q. Did a -- has a doctor ever -- tell you that**  
8 **you had a stroke after the fall?**

9 A. I didn't go for those symptoms. I took the  
10 drugs and I went to bed.

11 **Q. I guess underneath there, it says, Will go**  
12 **back to the cardiologist.**

13 **Did you ever go back to the cardiologist for**  
14 **the stroke or heart attack?**

15 A. Oh, yes. Then I went -- right. That's when  
16 I went to Dr. Wesley, and he did all of those tests.

17 **Q. Did he find any -- that you had a stroke?**

18 A. What he did say is all the tests looked good  
19 and all I had was that echocardiogram with the -- with  
20 the valves.

21 **Q. So all the tests looked good for a stroke, I**  
22 **guess?**

23 A. Well, I don't know that they take -- I don't  
24 know that they take tests for the stroke there.  
25 Besides that, I think you're -- right now you're

1 talking about 2012. At the time two -- couple of days,  
2 two, three days after the accident in 2010, that's when  
3 I had the symptoms on the left side of my face and down  
4 my arm. But then those went away. It wasn't  
5 permanent. So -- and I didn't go to the doctor for  
6 that. I had already been to the doctor, and I just  
7 took the drugs.

8 **Q. What drugs did you talk?**

9 A. Well, I had been to UMC, and she gave me  
10 three drugs and, you know, prescribed other things. So  
11 I took those drugs.

12 **Q. Have you seen -- have you had a stroke in the**  
13 **last -- since 2012?**

14 A. Not that I know of.

15 **Q. Have you had a heart attack since 2012?**

16 A. Not that I know of.

17 **Q. I'm thinking somewhere in this medical record**  
18 **it's mentioned a drug intolerance.**

19 **Do you have some sort of drug intolerance?**

20 A. In that I will take drugs if the doctors tell  
21 me that they will heal me. But if the doctors tell me  
22 that they'll -- they won't heal me and they'll just  
23 cause more problems, then I won't take them. I'm not  
24 going to take drugs just to take drugs.

25 **Q. Has a doctor told you that a drug is going to**

1 **cause more problems?**

2 A. Oh, sure. It's all over their papers. It's  
3 all kinds of warnings.

4 **Q. So you're talking about the side effects?**

5 A. Right.

6 **Q. Do you have some chronic anxiety disorder?**

7 A. Only in like -- like I explained, when I was  
8 losing my husband, it is extremely emotional time. And  
9 when this happened, the fall and, you know, my system  
10 stopped working, and I didn't know what was going on,  
11 it was extremely emotional time.

12 **Q. And I know I've asked you this, and sorry,**  
13 **you lost your husband in 2002?**

14 A. Yes.

15 **Q. And so the fall, did it bring back some**  
16 **issues with the chronic anxiety disorder?**

17 A. In that I remembered that, yeah, it kind of  
18 felt like I did at that time. Like, you know, I -- I  
19 wasn't able to control what was going on.

20 **Q. Do you remember seeing Dr. Thompson shortly**  
21 **after the fall?**

22 A. Yes.

23 **Q. Okay. Who -- what kind of doctor is he?**

24 A. I believe he's a D.O.

25 **Q. And why did you go see him?**

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1 A. Because I still had all these -- all the pain  
2 and the symptoms since I -- I fell, and they hadn't  
3 gone away yet.  
4 Q. Do you remember your pain level being a  
5 Level 10 out of 10 at that time when you saw  
6 Dr. Thompson?  
7 A. I remember I had a lot of pain.  
8 Q. Do you remember how far after the fall that  
9 you saw Dr. Thompson?  
10 A. Well, I believe I saw him in that same month.  
11 Q. Okay.  
12 MR. KIRCHER: I'll just have this marked as  
13 Exhibit 11.  
14 (Defendant's Exhibit 11 was marked.)  
15 BY MR. KIRCHER:  
16 Q. What's in front of you has been marked as  
17 Exhibit 11.  
18 Do you recognize this document that starts  
19 with Bates No. PLTF398?  
20 A. Yes.  
21 Q. And are these documents from Desert Oasis  
22 clinic?  
23 A. Yes.  
24 Q. Is that Dr. Thompson's clinic?  
25 A. Yes.

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1 Q. Okay. Turning to 402.  
2 A. Yes.  
3 Q. And on the top, it says the dates,  
4 February 17, 2010.  
5 Do you see that?  
6 A. Yes.  
7 Q. Did you fill out this page?  
8 A. Yes.  
9 Q. Okay. So that's your handwriting on the top  
10 that put the date in?  
11 A. Yes.  
12 Q. Okay. And then there's a body that's marked  
13 up substantially.  
14 Do you see that? Or a frontal view and a  
15 rear view?  
16 A. Yes.  
17 Q. And you filled out this as well?  
18 A. Yes.  
19 Q. Okay. And it looks like you were having --  
20 can you describe to me what you're trying to depict  
21 right here?  
22 A. All I'm trying to depict is that I had pain  
23 and symptoms in those areas that I marked.  
24 Q. So it looked like you had pain, looking at  
25 the frontal view, on the right arm, right shoulder,

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1 right hand; is that correct?  
2 A. Yes.  
3 Q. Okay. And then the right thigh?  
4 A. Yes.  
5 Q. Okay. And right foot?  
6 A. Yes.  
7 Q. And left hand?  
8 A. Yes.  
9 Q. Okay. And your left forearm marked as well?  
10 A. Yes.  
11 Q. Okay. Do you think that's an accurate  
12 representation of the pain that you were having at that  
13 time?  
14 A. I'm sorry. I don't understand what that  
15 means.  
16 Q. Were you having pain anywhere else besides  
17 where you marked?  
18 A. Besides where I marked?  
19 Q. Yes.  
20 A. I don't remember other than the -- the neck  
21 and the head.  
22 Q. Okay.  
23 MR. KIRCHER: Have this marked as Exhibit 12.  
24 (Defendant's Exhibit 12 was marked.)  
25 /////

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1 BY MR. KIRCHER:  
2 Q. What's in front of you has been marked as  
3 Exhibit 12.  
4 Do you recognize this document?  
5 A. I'm sorry. Are you -- where is it from? I  
6 mean, it might be there in front of me, but I don't see  
7 it.  
8 Q. I'm not seeing it either. It's marked  
9 PLTF441 and 442.  
10 Is this your handwriting on it?  
11 A. It looks like it.  
12 Q. Okay. I'm not sure where this -- exactly the  
13 provider for this document was.  
14 Do you remember seeing somebody on  
15 February 21st, 2012?  
16 A. Well, I saw several around that time, so --  
17 wow.  
18 Q. We might run into it later on. If not, it's  
19 not that huge of a deal at this point.  
20 I guess what I want to ask you is: Looking  
21 at the four bodies on the Exhibit 12.  
22 A. Yes.  
23 Q. Okay. Do you remember X'g out the parts of  
24 these bodies?  
25 A. It looks like I was just trying to show that



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1 I just had pain.  
2 **Q. Okay. And I guess just looking at the two**  
3 **exhibits, 11 and 12, it looks like that you said pain**  
4 **in pretty much a lot of the same areas; is that**  
5 **correct?**  
6 A. Yes.  
7 **Q. So and not -- in almost two years, nothing**  
8 **really changed regarding where you were having pain on**  
9 **your body?**  
10 A. Basically I think about the same places.  
11 **Q. So you consider this pretty accurate?**  
12 A. Oh, I'm not saying it's accurate. It looks  
13 like I just got tired and just started crossing  
14 everything.  
15 **Q. Looking at the 2012 one, do you think there's**  
16 **somewhere that's marked that should have been marked?**  
17 A. I'm sorry. Are you still on these bodies?  
18 **Q. On -- on the 2012, on the four bodies,**  
19 **Exhibit 12.**  
20 A. I'm sorry. Could you be more specific?  
21 **Q. Sure. There's Xs on these four different**  
22 **views of the body.**  
23 A. Right.  
24 **Q. You put these Xs on the body; is that**  
25 **correct?**

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1 A. Yes. I mean, yes.  
2 **Q. And is there anywhere you put an X on any of**  
3 **these four views of the body that you think is**  
4 **incorrect? And we're still talking about 2012.**  
5 A. I'm -- okay. I -- it looks like I was just  
6 tired and I was just marking everything. And my whole  
7 point was that I have pain and basically, I just --  
8 basically it's the same areas that I had the pain in in  
9 the beginning. But right here, I'm just -- it looks  
10 like I'm just marking everything up.  
11 **Q. Okay. So do you think the Exhibit 11 body on**  
12 **PLTF402 is a more accurate representation of where you**  
13 **had pain in 2012 as well?**  
14 A. I tried to be more accurate there, but it was  
15 too much. So just basically tried to hit the -- the  
16 main areas.  
17 **Q. I guess I'm just trying to figure out in 2012**  
18 **where you were having pain. If it was the same areas**  
19 **two years later. Was -- had anything improved at all?**  
20 A. Well, basically I still have the same areas  
21 that are bothering me. When -- that day, when I fell  
22 and I had the immediate pain, and basically those are  
23 the places that hurt. Still my neck up to my head.  
24 Still my back down to my foot. Still my neck down to  
25 my hands. Basically that's it. And -- and of course

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1 my -- my chest. You know, I still get that. If I move  
2 a certain way, I get that pain, and I still get that  
3 pain in the ribs when I move a certain way.  
4 **Q. So in -- in the -- I guess, you know, between**  
5 **2010 when you had the fall and 2012, you went to**  
6 **numerous medical providers; is that correct?**  
7 A. Well, what's numerous? I mean, I went for my  
8 hands. I went for my hip and knee. I went back to  
9 the -- back to Dr. Wesley for -- for the heart tests  
10 that he wanted to do. And there was another one I  
11 think.  
12 **Q. That's fine.**  
13 **So during this time, you received some**  
14 **medical treatment; correct?**  
15 A. You're talking about the 2012?  
16 **Q. Between 2010, the fall, and 2012.**  
17 A. Oh, yeah. I went to a lot of -- I went to  
18 doctors. I went to them several times, and, you know,  
19 I got the -- I got the X rays, the MRIs. And I went  
20 for physical therapy.  
21 Is that what you're asking?  
22 **Q. Yes. Yes.**  
23 A. Yes.  
24 **Q. So did any of the physical therapy or any**  
25 **other treatments, whether it be drugs, physical**

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1 **therapy, did any of it alleviate the pain in that**  
2 **two-year period is what I'm trying to ask?**  
3 A. Oh. I still have those -- the pain when I  
4 move a certain way and in certain positions. So I  
5 still have that.  
6 **Q. So nothing's changed in between 2010 -- the**  
7 **fall of 2010 and today?**  
8 A. I still have the pain in the neck. And it --  
9 and it goes up to my head. Still have the pain in my  
10 back. Goes down to my foot. But -- but the certain  
11 moves, certain positions trigger more pain. And now I  
12 now how to make it subside. I just have to stop  
13 moving, lie down, and -- and let it subside. Because  
14 if I keep moving and keep doing -- making those moves  
15 that are triggering it and sitting or standing up in  
16 those positions, it will just keep getting worse. So  
17 now I know how to make it subside.  
18 **Q. But if you didn't do those movement or things**  
19 **that you know now, would your pain be just as bad as it**  
20 **was in 2010?**  
21 A. Yes. It will keep going.  
22 **Q. Has a doctor explained to you why you're**  
23 **experiencing so much pain?**  
24 A. My -- my general understanding is because --  
25 okay, because my disks and the nerves are damaged, my

1 knees are torn, and, you know, I have -- you know, I  
2 have a trigger finger in my hand, and the carpal  
3 tunnel.  
4 **Q. And do you attribute --**  
5 A. And I was told that those don't heal. They  
6 don't heal. The knees are not going to heal the doctor  
7 told me. My neck, the damage to the neck and the back,  
8 those aren't going to heal. My trigger finger, that's  
9 not going to heal. These are things that I was told,  
10 they don't heal. And -- and they just keep getting  
11 worse.  
12 **Q. Which -- which doctors told you that the --**  
13 **your neck wouldn't heal?**  
14 A. The orthopedic surgeons. They're not going  
15 to heal by themselves.  
16 **Q. And what about the knee?**  
17 A. Dr. Tingey said that they're not going to --  
18 they're not going to heal. My knees aren't going to  
19 heal. And he said, Well, you've had all this physical  
20 therapy, have they healed yet? No.  
21 **Q. Have they told you anything they can do for**  
22 **you?**  
23 A. Yes.  
24 **Q. What did they tell you?**  
25 A. Dr. Tingey says I need surgery on both of my

1 knees.  
2 **Q. What kind of surgery?**  
3 A. I'm sorry. He said -- said they're torn,  
4 and -- and that they have to go in there, and then from  
5 there, they'll see how -- how bad they are.  
6 **Q. What part of your knees are torn?**  
7 A. I'm sorry. He -- he wrote a report.  
8 **Q. Okay.**  
9 A. Oh, and -- and, you know, I did -- did have  
10 the MRIs on both the knees.  
11 **Q. Do you remember what the results of the**  
12 **MRI --**  
13 A. Yeah, they're torn.  
14 **Q. Was it a ligament that was torn or a**  
15 **meniscus? Do you remember?**  
16 A. I'm sorry. I just --  
17 **Q. That's fine. If you don't remember,**  
18 **that's -- we've been here for a while.**  
19 (Defendant's Exhibit 13 was marked.)  
20 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**  
21 **Q. Medical records are a little out of order.**  
22 **So what's in front of you has been marked as**  
23 **Exhibit 13.**  
24 **Do you recognize this document?**  
25 A. Yes.

1 **Q. Okay. And what exactly is this document?**  
2 A. It says it's from Dr. Cash.  
3 **Q. Okay. And he's your orthopedic?**  
4 A. He was my orthopedic surgeon for my neck and  
5 my back.  
6 **Q. Okay. What years was he your orthopedic**  
7 **surgeon for your neck and back?**  
8 A. Well, I went to him after the accident in  
9 2010, and then I went back in 2012.  
10 **Q. Okay. And it looks like this is dated**  
11 **March 23rd, 2010?**  
12 A. Yes.  
13 **Q. Do you remember seeing Dr. Cash on that date?**  
14 A. Well, I know I saw him after the accident,  
15 so ...  
16 **Q. So this is a little over a month after the**  
17 **accident?**  
18 A. Yes.  
19 **Q. Okay. And then under Prior Injuries it,**  
20 **says, Severe back and hand injury in 1989.**  
21 A. Yes.  
22 **Q. And what was that severe back injury you had?**  
23 A. I was going through a divorce. My ex-husband  
24 pushed me, and I got a muscle spasm in my back.  
25 **Q. Okay. Did that injury ever heal?**

1 A. Yes.  
2 **Q. Okay. When did it heal?**  
3 A. Shortly after that. I did some -- I went to  
4 physical therapy a couple of times. She gave me  
5 some -- back exercises, and that took care of it.  
6 Healed then.  
7 **Q. Did you ever have any back pain in January of**  
8 **2010?**  
9 A. I'm so sorry. I'm sorry. Could you repeat  
10 the question.  
11 **Q. Did you ever have any back pain in January of**  
12 **2010?**  
13 A. No.  
14 **Q. Okay.**  
15 A. No. I was a swing dancer.  
16 **Q. How about in 2009? Did you ever have any**  
17 **back pain?**  
18 A. No.  
19 **Q. And then Past Medical History, fibromyalgia.**  
20 **When were you diagnosed with that?**  
21 A. When my husband -- or not my husband. My  
22 ex-husband, way back around at the end of the 1980s,  
23 when he, you know, pushed me and I had the -- the back  
24 muscle spasm, and I went to the doctor, and they said,  
25 well, maybe you have fibromyalgia.

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1 Q. So did you have it or not?

2 A. Well, I didn't have any symptoms after that.

3 Q. Okay. Where did Dr. Cash get this medical

4 history from? Did you tell him you had fibromyalgia?

5 A. When I filled out the -- all the forms, it

6 asks for history, so I put down my tonsillectomy in the

7 1950s, and then, you know, I put down my history.

8 Q. And then looking at the bottom of it,

9 radiology lab, X ray, I think we went over the X ray

10 lumbar report previously. It looks like Dr. Cash put,

11 Marked multilevel degeneration of lumbar spine.

12 Do you remember talking about that?

13 A. I'm sorry. With you today?

14 Q. Yeah, with me today.

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. Okay. I think I asked you what the

17 conversation you had with Dr. Cash was.

18 Do you remember anything about that

19 conversation about the multilevel degeneration of the

20 lumbar spine?

21 A. Basically my understanding was he said your

22 disks and nerves are damaged.

23 MR. KIRCHER: Want this as 14, please.

24 (Defendant's Exhibit 14 was marked.)

25 /////

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1 BY MR. KIRCHER:

2 Q. What's in front of you has been marked as

3 Exhibit 14, and it's Bate -- Bates No. PLTF715 through

4 716.

5 Do you recognize this document?

6 A. It looks like it's a report from Dr. Carr.

7 Where's the date? -- to Dr. Subramanyam, my -- yeah, it

8 says a letter to Dr. Subramanyam. He's my primary

9 doctor. And it's from Dr. Carr, I believe.

10 Q. Is that C-a-r-r?

11 A. I think so.

12 Q. Okay. And what kind of doctor is he?

13 A. I think he's an ophthalmologist.

14 Q. Okay. I guess the upper right says, Exam

15 date: August 11, 2011; is that correct?

16 A. Oh, okay. Yes, I see that.

17 Q. Do you remember going to a Dr. Carr for some

18 eye issues in August of 2011?

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. Okay. What were those eye issues?

21 A. The same thing. The day of the fall, right

22 there, I was dazed. And since that time, I've had

23 that -- that pain that goes from my neck up to my head,

24 and then it starts hurting my eye. And then a few days

25 later, I had had the issues on the left side of my face

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1 that also affected my -- my eye.

2 Q. And then under Plan, in the middle of the

3 page, of PLTF715, second sentence, it says, Her eye

4 exam is essentially normal.

5 Do you remember that being the result of your

6 eye exam?

7 A. Well, I see that that's what he wrote.

8 Q. Well, do you think that's true or not?

9 A. Well, if that's what -- he's saying that he

10 did the eye exam and it was essentially normal, I

11 believe him.

12 Q. Did he do anything for your blurred vision

13 that you were having at that time?

14 A. Okay. It says that he prescribed glasses,

15 but that -- that's what it says. He prescribed

16 glasses, but I had had glasses for driving.

17 Q. So you didn't get new glasses?

18 A. Not at that time because my glasses were fine

19 for driving.

20 Q. Okay. And says, She has early cataract

21 changes.

22 Do you remember talking to him about that?

23 A. Well, I see that that's what that says.

24 Q. Do you remember talking to him about that?

25 A. Vaguely.

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1 Q. Okay. And I think in the -- in the first

2 part of your deposition, we briefly addressed you were

3 having some issues with your eyes detaching?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Okay. And when did you first go to a doctor

6 for that?

7 A. In June of last year, I had -- when I was

8 sent for the MRIs, shortly right after that, they

9 started -- I -- they started flashing. So I believe I

10 went to my -- yes, almost positive I went to my primary

11 doctor first and then he sent me to three eye

12 specialists for it. I didn't know what it was.

13 Q. So that didn't happen until last year?

14 A. Right after the MRIs last year.

15 Q. Okay. So you don't attribute whatever they

16 diagnosed you with the -- with the detaching eyes to

17 the fall at the Wynn, do you?

18 A. I'm really sorry.

19 Q. It was a bad question. I'm sorry.

20 Do you attribute the problems you're having

21 with your eyes to your fall at the Wynn?

22 A. The detaching eyes?

23 Q. Yes.

24 A. Only in that the timing. I had the MRIs, and

25 then I had the flashing. And so I don't know if the

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1 flashing was because of the MRIs. I know for a fact  
2 that in March, around there, in 2010 when I had the  
3 MRI, the neck MRI, they couldn't finish. They had to  
4 get me out because it affected my head. It was the  
5 extreme pain. So I was afraid to get more MRIs after  
6 that time.

7 So I finally did get more MRIs last year, and  
8 then this is what happens. I mean, the timing is just  
9 too close.

10 **Q. The timing is too close to what? The**  
11 **timing --**

12 A. I get the MRIs and then I have a problem with  
13 my eyes.

14 **Q. So the problems with the -- the MRIs are**  
15 **causing the problems with your eyes?**

16 A. It just -- it happened after the MRIs. And I  
17 was afraid to get the MRIs because I'd already had a  
18 problem -- the MRI had already caused that pain in my  
19 head.

20 **Q. Okay. Do you blame any of your eye issues**  
21 **with your fall at the Wynn?**

22 A. Only in that that day, I had all these head  
23 symptoms, and a few days later, I had the symptoms on  
24 my left side of my face which included the eye. And --  
25 and my whole left arm was numb.

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1 **Q. Do you remember going to Matt Smith Physical**  
2 **Therapy?**

3 A. Yes.

4 **Q. When did you go to Matt Smith Physical**  
5 **Therapy?**

6 A. Shortly after the accident, Dr. Cash sent me  
7 there. And so I went 20-some times.

8 **Q. Excuse me, how many times, 20?**

9 A. Twenty-some.

10 **Q. Twenty-some. Okay. Wasn't sure if you said**  
11 **27 or 20-some.**

12 **MR. KIRCHER:** Let's mark this as Exhibit 15,  
13 please.

14 (Defendant's Exhibit 15 was marked.)

15 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**

16 **Q. And what did Matt Smith Physical Therapy,**  
17 **what kind of exercises did they have you do? What --**  
18 **so the first time you went to Matt Smith Physical**  
19 **Therapy, what did they have you do?**

20 A. Well, I -- I think -- well, I went for the --  
21 the back and the neck.

22 **Q. Okay. Dr. Cash refers you?**

23 A. Yes.

24 **Q. Okay. You didn't go for your legs or knees**  
25 **or anything else?**

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1 A. I think -- I believe that Dr. Cash referred  
2 me for the neck and the back.

3 **Q. Okay. And you went 20-some times to Matt**  
4 **Smith?**

5 A. Yes.

6 **Q. And did the physical therapy help you at all?**

7 A. The neck exercise is the one that caused --  
8 you know, caused the pain up my head. You know, I told  
9 you you have the bands and the -- okay. So I couldn't  
10 do that anymore.

11 The other exercises, generally they  
12 strength -- make you stronger, I think. But -- but it  
13 didn't take away the pain from my back down to my foot.  
14 I still have that in my seat.

15 **Q. Did it help you in any other way?**

16 A. Well, it didn't -- it didn't take away the  
17 problem I have in my neck and my back down to my foot  
18 or my seat. It didn't take that away. But I believe  
19 that, you know, in general, exercise is good. That's  
20 why I do it all day long -- I mean, throughout the day.

21 **Q. Right. You know, you said you went there**  
22 **over 20 times. If you're going somewhere 20 times, I**  
23 **just want to know if it actually helped you or didn't**  
24 **help you.**

25 A. It didn't take away the problem. It didn't

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1 take away the cause of the pain.

2 **Q. And we're looking at Exhibit 15, and the**  
3 **visit date on the top right says May 3rd, 2010.**

4 Do you remember going to Matt Smith in May of  
5 2010?

6 A. Well, I know I did go there around that time.

7 **Q. Do you remember approximately the dates you**  
8 **visited Matt Smith Physical Therapy?**

9 A. Okay. So it would be here; right? Is it --  
10 is it in this document?

11 **Q. On -- yeah, on the top. This one has the**  
12 **specific date May 3rd, 2010.**

13 A. Oh, this might be the first one? This could  
14 be the first one or beginning because I went over a  
15 period of time and -- over 20-some times, so ...

16 **Q. Was it 27 times --**

17 A. Some.

18 **Q. -- or 20-some times over a couple-month**  
19 **period?**

20 A. It was over a few months.

21 **Q. How many times a week did you go?**

22 A. I believe it was two to three times.

23 **Q. And then on the second page, Assessment, it**  
24 **says, The client tolerated today's**  
25 **treatment/therapeutic activity with severe complaints**

1 of pain and difficulty which required abbreviation of  
2 the planned course of treatment. Presentation: Pain  
3 behavior inconsistent with injury DX.

4 Do you know what "pain behavior inconsistent  
5 with injury DX" means?

6 A. No.

7 Q. Did you ever have any kind of conversation  
8 with the therapist or Matt Smith about your pain  
9 behavior being inconsistent with your injury diagnosis?

10 A. The -- I believe that in -- maybe I'm not  
11 answering your question. I'm sorry. But the  
12 conversation was the moves that he was having me do was  
13 causing more pain.

14 Q. And you told him that?

15 A. Basically. I mean, right now -- I mean, if  
16 I -- there's certain moves that I can't do because  
17 they -- they create more pain and they make my arms go  
18 numb.

19 Q. I'm talking about when you visited Matt Smith  
20 when -- when you did certain moves that caused more  
21 pain, did you tell him that?

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. And did he make you -- make you continue to  
24 do those moves?

25 A. No.

1 Q. Do you know what complex regional pain  
2 syndrome is?

3 A. Not really.

4 Q. Do you know if a doctor has ever diagnosed  
5 you with that?

6 A. I know that Dr. Trainor said that maybe I  
7 have it.

8 Q. What else did he tell you about it?

9 A. I don't recall him really telling me about  
10 it. I only went to him once.

11 Q. Okay. Did any other doctor tell you that you  
12 possibly had complex regional pain syndrome?

13 A. I don't think so.

14 Q. Okay. And you were never curious on exactly  
15 what that is?

16 A. Well, because he didn't say I do have it, not  
17 really.

18 Q. What's the status of your treatment today? I  
19 know the last -- during your deposition, you kind of  
20 had -- you had to see somebody before you saw somebody  
21 so you could get certain things done. I believe you  
22 had a -- I think you testified earlier you had three  
23 disks damaged; correct?

24 A. I need the surgery on three disks in my neck,  
25 and I need surgery three discs in my back.

1 And then since I saw you, I went to  
2 Dr. Tingey, and followed up with the knees. Because I  
3 had to -- you know, because my -- my other doctor left.  
4 And so now I know I need surgery on both of my knees.

5 Q. Who was your other doctor?

6 A. I'm sorry. The one that left?

7 Q. Yes.

8 A. Dr. Martin.

9 Q. Martin. And do you attribute your knee  
10 problems to the fall at Wynn in 2010?

11 A. Oh, absolutely. That -- that was one of the  
12 immediate injuries I had.

13 Q. Okay.

14 A. I mean, my knees were good, and then -- then  
15 I fell, and immediately, that was one of the -- the  
16 pains.

17 Q. Okay. I don't know if I asked you this: Has  
18 a doctor told you that that fall caused your knee  
19 problems?

20 A. I'm positive that when I went there, I didn't  
21 have any knee problems at all.

22 Q. My question is: Has the doctor told you  
23 that, though, that the fall at the Wynn caused your  
24 knee problems?

25 A. I'm positive that I told the doctors right

1 after the fall. I told them at UMC two days later  
2 about the knee. And all the -- several doctors  
3 throughout that time. So I don't think that I  
4 specifically asked them if a fall tore my knees because  
5 I had no problems with my knees when I went there.  
6 Then I fell, and immediately my knees are hurting?

7 Q. So doctors never told you that your knee  
8 problems were caused by the fall?

9 A. I don't believe I asked them.

10 Q. Okay. And what about your neck problems?  
11 Has a doctor ever told you that your neck disk issue  
12 was caused by the fall?

13 A. I believe that they did. I believe that  
14 because I told them I didn't have this, I didn't have  
15 the symptoms, I didn't have a doctor, I had no  
16 problems, and all of a sudden, immediately, I have all  
17 this pain? And -- and -- and my limbs are going numb,  
18 so ...

19 Q. Okay. And has a doctor ever told you the  
20 three discs in your back, the issues you're having with  
21 that was caused by the fall at Wynn?

22 A. I believe that because I told them that I  
23 didn't have these symptoms before I fell, and -- and  
24 that I had these immediate symptoms right after I fell,  
25 I believe that they didn't -- they for sure didn't tell

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1 me, oh, well -- I don't remember their exact words.  
2 But I have -- I was healthy. I didn't have it, and  
3 then immediately, I have the issues -- the pain and the  
4 symptoms there.  
5 So I know that no one ever told me that, oh,  
6 no, that wasn't caused by the fall. But specific  
7 words, I can't tell you their specific words.  
8 **Q. Has a doctor told you any of these medical**  
9 **issues you're having were caused directly by the fall**  
10 **at the Wynn?**  
11 A. My understanding is that because of the  
12 injuries, my disks and nerves are damaged. That's my  
13 understanding that -- I believe that that was what I  
14 was told. Not in those exact words.  
15 **Q. Has a doctor ever told you that some of these**  
16 **injuries or medical issues you had could have been**  
17 **caused by something else?**  
18 **MS. MORRIS:** Object to form.  
19 **THE WITNESS:** Because I told the doctors that  
20 I didn't have the symptoms before and that that day,  
21 immediately, I did have them, I don't believe any  
22 doctor told me what you just said.  
23 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**  
24 **Q. Okay. How much do you think the -- the Wynn**  
25 **should compensate you for the fall that you had at its**

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1 **property on February 8th, 2010?**  
2 **MS. MORRIS:** Object to form.  
3 **THE WITNESS:** What I want is my health back.  
4 **BY MR. KIRCHER:**  
5 **Q. What do you think you need to do to get your**  
6 **health back?**

She is in the 17 Parasol-Up cleaning because the Parasol-Up is open at 18 that time. 19 And he put the machine on top of the spill, 20 supposed to be, but she -- he don't clean, I'm sorry, 21 he don't clean. They have to wait for security to see 22 exactly how the area look like because they always 23 take pictures when they -- when it's an accident or 24 something. 25 When security approached he move the machine,</p>

20 A. In the 2010 or right now?  
21 Q. Currently that's what you do, is that  
22 correct, as a shift manager?  
23 A. In graveyard, yes. In day shift it's the  
24 manager when they working. Carlos and I is the one  
25 working in graveyard to move the schedule or put the

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1 schedule when they're working; it all depends what  
2 employees have to work every day. They have stations  
3 to work.  
4 Q. Are you in charge of scheduling these  
5 attendants for the entire casino floor?  
6 A. To the scheduling?  
7 Q. Currently, now, when you schedule people to  
8 certain areas, are you scheduling attendants for the  
9 entire casino floor or are you responsible for only  
10 certain areas, such as the gaming area, the retail  
11 area?  
12 A. No, they give us the schedule with the  
13 employees working on graveyard, and each employee have  
14 his own area to work, and our job is only to -- in the  
15 schedule, is see who is working in what area, because  
16 they almost working five days a week, and if  
17 somebody's call in, I have to replace the people when  
18 they have to work.  
19 Q. Is there a certain number of employees that  
20 have to be scheduled on the floor as attendants at all  
21 times?  
22 MR. KIRCHER: I'm going to object to the  
23 extent it calls for speculation.  
24 Go ahead.  
25 THE DEPONENT: Can you repeat?

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1 BY MS. MORRIS:  
2 Q. Sure. If you know, are you ensuring that  
3 there are a certain amount of attendants that need to  
4 be on the floor at all times?  
5 A. No.  
6 Q. Okay. Do you have a certain number that you  
7 want on the floor at all times as shift manager?  
8 A. They give us the numbers.  
9 Q. Who is "they"?  
10 A. The scheduling lady, they give the amount of  
11 employees to working in the casino.  
12 Q. When you were originally hired at Wynn, what  
13 was the position you were hired for?  
14 A. Assistant manager.  
15 Q. So you've only ever been assistant manager  
16 and shift manager during your time here; is that  
17 accurate?  
18 A. Yes.  
19 Q. Now, Wynn has stated that approximately two  
20 attendants were in the area where Miss O'Connell fell  
21 back in 2010. Is an attendant the same thing as a  
22 porter, if you know, or are those two separate  
23 positions?  
24 A. There is a porter and there is utility.  
25 Q. Say that again.

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1 A. Excuse me?  
2 Q. What did you say?  
3 A. You say the positions with the employees,  
4 they working in the area, is the porters.  
5 Q. Okay, they're porters?  
6 A. Um-hum.  
7 MR. KIRCHER: And just to clarify, you're  
8 saying the porters or attendants are the same thing;  
9 is that what you are asking her?  
10 MS. MORRIS: Yeah.  
11 THE DEPONENT: The attendants, they're called  
12 porters.  
13 MR. KIRCHER: Okay.  
14 THE DEPONENT: In our department.  
15 MS. MORRIS: Okay.  
16 MR. KIRCHER: Okay.  
17 THE DEPONENT: The porters is the people when  
18 they don't use the heavy equipment, and the utility is  
19 the employees when they use the heavy equipment.  
20 BY MS. MORRIS:  
21 Q. The sweeper machine, would that be considered  
22 heavy equipment?  
23 A. Yes.  
24 Q. So if a sweeper machine was used to clean up  
25 this area, it would have been a utilities employee; is



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1 that correct?  
2 A. Yes.  
3 (Ms. Espinosa left the room.)  
4 BY MS. MORRIS:  
5 Q. I'll show you a picture, and we will mark it  
6 as Plaintiff's Exhibit 2. In this picture that I'm  
7 showing you, do you recognize that area?  
8 A. The garden.  
9 Q. Is that the South Garden?  
10 A. The South Garden, yes.  
11 Q. When you look at that picture, can you see in  
12 that picture the area where the substance was on the  
13 floor?  
14 A. I don't remember exactly the area, but they  
15 can be around this in here, I think. Sorry.  
16 Q. No. Can you mark where you're pointing?  
17 A. Even when I don't really remember?  
18 Q. We'll understand that this is the general  
19 area where you recall it being and this is not the  
20 specific area.  
21 A. Okay, this can be around these sections.  
22 Q. Do you remember when you arrived at the area,  
23 whether that sign that we see in the photograph was  
24 there?  
25 A. I don't remember sign in the area. Don't

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1 remember if it's in there because -- because this is  
2 the XS, they tell us when they want the sign to put  
3 in.  
4 Q. Okay. You said XS, the club?  
5 A. Nightclub, um-hum.  
6 Q. Okay. They tell you when they want that sign  
7 put there?  
8 A. Sometimes they tell us where they want it,  
9 like with the special events, they tell us where the  
10 signs have to be in the casino to make sure the  
11 guests, they know about it.  
12 Q. Know where to go?  
13 A. Yes.  
14 Q. Gotcha. Do you remember if there was any  
15 damage to the landscaping or to the flower garden as a  
16 result of Miss O'Connell's fall; did you see any  
17 damage?  
18 A. I don't remember it was damaged. I don't  
19 think so because they always have people working in  
20 the gardens to make sure everything is okay.  
21 Q. What do you mean, "working in the gardens"?  
22 A. They have the department taking care of all  
23 the plants and everything.  
24 Q. Do you know the name of that department?  
25 A. Horticulture.

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1 Q. The horticulture department?  
2 A. The horticulture department.  
3 Q. Do you know if there was anyone working in  
4 the gardens at the time Miss O'Connell fell?  
5 A. I don't remember seeing nobody.  
6 Q. Have you ever seen anyone from the  
7 horticulture department watering the plants in the  
8 South Garden area?  
9 A. In the nighttime.  
10 Q. You have?  
11 A. Yes, I see the guys working in the gardens.  
12 Q. Do you ever see them watering in the garden?  
13 A. No.  
14 Q. Do you know how they water the garden?  
15 A. They have a little container, it's like a  
16 little cart and a little container with the water and  
17 they have the irrigation and they water the plants.  
18 Q. So they have a container and like a little  
19 stick on the front of the container?  
20 A. Yes.  
21 Q. And then the water comes out of the stick?  
22 A. Um-hum.  
23 Q. And you said you've seen it at night; is that  
24 right?  
25 A. Yes.

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1 Q. Is that because you think it's only done at  
2 night, or you're only working at night, so that's when  
3 you see it?  
4 A. Because I working in the night.  
5 Q. Okay.  
6 A. I work in day shift only like not too much,  
7 but I never saw the guys working in the garden. Most  
8 of the work in the garden is done in the nighttime.  
9 Q. Okay.  
10 A. Sorry. I hate to read only, my glasses.  
11 Q. Oh. Thank you. Here's a little closer up  
12 photograph that was taken, and we'll mark it as  
13 Plaintiff's Exhibit 3, appears to be a closer-up image  
14 of what was Plaintiff's Exhibit 2.  
15 In looking at this up-close photograph, does  
16 that help refresh your memory in any way as to the  
17 location of that substance that was on the floor?  
18 A. No.  
19 Q. Do you know if that, this picture here,  
20 Exhibit 3 --  
21 A. It's the same, um-hum.  
22 Q. -- do you know if it shows the area where the  
23 substance was?  
24 A. I don't remember exactly where is the spill  
25 because they cover this section in here.

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1 Q. The sweeper covered the section?  
2 A. There, in here.  
3 Q. So can you indicate on Plaintiff's Exhibit 3  
4 where the sweeper had been located?  
5 A. In this section right here.  
6 Q. And you're drawing it with that pen?  
7 A. Hmm?  
8 Q. Can you draw it a little darker so we can  
9 see?  
10 A. Oh.  
11 MR. KIRCHER: And you remember that for sure?  
12 THE DEPONENT: Hmm?  
13 MR. KIRCHER: You remember that for sure,  
14 yes?  
15 THE DEPONENT: I don't remember for sure, but  
16 they have to be in this section.  
17 MR. KIRCHER: Okay.  
18 BY MS. MORRIS:  
19 Q. The sweeper?  
20 A. Yes.  
21 Q. Okay. So you're saying that's where the  
22 sweeper was located; is that correct?  
23 A. I don't remember exactly the area, but have  
24 to be in here because I'm, like, pretty sure they have  
25 in -- have to be in this area; this is the one that

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1 have the spill.  
2 Q. So I want to be clear that I've understood  
3 your time line. You got called and you went to the  
4 scene; is that correct?  
5 A. Um-hum.  
6 Q. When you got there, the sweeper had been  
7 placed over the substance on the floor?  
8 A. Yes.  
9 Q. And Miss O'Connell was there; is that  
10 correct?  
11 A. Yes.  
12 Q. The lady who fell?  
13 A. Um-hum.  
14 Q. And then security came; is that correct?  
15 A. Yes.  
16 Q. And at that point, is that when the sweeper  
17 was removed from the substance?  
18 A. Yes.  
19 Q. So when the sweeper was removed from the  
20 substance, security was there; is that accurate?  
21 A. I don't remember if security is there because  
22 I have to call to security to come to the area.  
23 Q. Do you know, when security arrived, had the  
24 liquid been cleaned up yet or the substance been  
25 cleaned up yet?

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1 A. They not clean. They not clean. They never  
2 clean nothing till security coming and inspect the  
3 area.  
4 Q. Okay. And do you remember the name of the  
5 security officer that responded?  
6 A. I don't remember, no.  
7 Q. Do you remember if you told the security  
8 officer who showed up that you had seen a liquid  
9 substance on the floor?  
10 A. No.  
11 Q. Do you disagree with that statement?  
12 A. With my statement?  
13 Q. No, the security report says that I spoke  
14 with manager Elias -- am I saying your name right?  
15 A. Yes.  
16 Q. Okay. Who stated upon her arrival, she  
17 noticed a liquid substance on the floor.  
18 Do you disagree that you told him it was a  
19 liquid substance?  
20 A. I don't remember told him it's a liquid  
21 because when I coming, it's nothing on the floor. I  
22 not be in that area in the moment when the lady fell.  
23 I'm arrive when they call us when I coming to the  
24 casino areas when I working, and when I being there,  
25 it's no liquid. I don't see liquid in the floor

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1 myself.  
2 Q. Because you saw like a sticky substance?  
3 A. Yes.  
4 Q. Okay. Are you saying that you didn't see  
5 what she actually fell on, you just saw a substance --  
6 A. Yes.  
7 Q. -- a sticky substance on the floor?  
8 A. Because when I being there, everything is set  
9 up. Like the guy -- I don't know if the guy is around  
10 the area when they call dispatch. I don't know who  
11 called dispatch. I only know they call us, one of the  
12 managers, to go to the area because it's an accident  
13 in the garden.  
14 This is when I'm arriving there and when I  
15 see what I put in my statement. After, in the moment  
16 when the accident, I don't know exactly how the area  
17 look like till when I being there.  
18 Q. So if it's my understanding if the security  
19 report says that you noticed a liquid substance on the  
20 floor, you would disagree with that statement; is that  
21 correct?  
22 A. I don't know what the security wrote up, but  
23 this is why -- I don't know if they asked me, I don't  
24 remember if they asked me, why they called him. The  
25 only thing when I say is they called because they have

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1 water in the floor, but when I come in, I don't see no  
2 water in the floor.  
3 Q. Did you see liquid?  
4 A. No liquid.  
5 Q. Okay. I'm just going to show you -- we'll  
6 mark it as Plaintiff's Exhibit 4. Just, it's the one,  
7 two, three, fourth paragraph down, if you want to just  
8 read that paragraph.  
9 A. Okay. Okay.  
10 Q. So do you disagree with that statement that  
11 you reported seeing a liquid substance on the floor?  
12 A. The liquid is not like water. It's like I  
13 told you, it's something like sticky, because it's not  
14 something like a really, really like a water. It's  
15 like something like a syrup, like a drink, like  
16 something like that, but not like they go more than a  
17 little space.  
18 (Discussion off the record.)  
19 BY MS. MORRIS:  
20 Q. But when you say drink, I think of liquid.  
21 A. This is what they tell us when they happen,  
22 but when I been there, like I told you, I don't see  
23 exactly the scenario until I arrive to the area when  
24 they happen.  
25 When they call us, they say they have

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1 something liquid. They always call a spill something  
2 not really like a liquid or something. Sometimes it's  
3 like a food, sometimes it's like something, another  
4 kind of stuff, like they always call us because it's  
5 like spills.  
6 Q. Right. But the officer who responded said  
7 that you told him it was a liquid substance, according  
8 to his report; do you disagree with that?  
9 A. I don't disagree if they put liquid because I  
10 don't see liquid. This is my point with you guys, I  
11 don't see liquid.  
12 Q. Right.  
13 A. I don't know why he put liquid in the  
14 statement, I don't know, but --  
15 Q. So did you tell him -- did you tell him it  
16 was a liquid substance?  
17 A. When they asked me why they call him, I think  
18 I have to explain what they tell us when they call us.  
19 See, they call us because they say it's a spill in the  
20 floor, like a liquid in the floor.  
21 Q. And I understand that.  
22 A. Yes.  
23 Q. But this specifically says you reported to  
24 him a liquid substance that you saw, not that you were  
25 told about.

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1 A. I don't saw the liquid.  
2 Q. Okay, so you didn't see a liquid substance?  
3 A. No, I don't see.  
4 Q. Okay. And you didn't tell the security  
5 officer --  
6 A. No, he --  
7 Q. Wait, let me finish, sorry.  
8 A. I'm sorry.  
9 Q. No. And you didn't tell the security officer  
10 that you saw a liquid substance on the floor; is that  
11 correct?  
12 A. Um-hum.  
13 Q. Is that a yes?  
14 A. Yes.  
15 Q. Okay.  
16 A. Sorry.  
17 Q. We're falling apart at this point.  
18 A. I know, it's like . . .  
19 MR. KIRCHER: She's trying to ask you, is the  
20 statement right or wrong that the security officer  
21 wrote. Do you think that's a right statement, that  
22 you told him that, or is it a wrong statement, that  
23 you didn't tell him that?  
24 THE DEPONENT: I don't know if word he used  
25 is the same thing when I wrote in my statement,

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1 because he wrote his own statement and I wrote my  
2 statement.  
3 BY MS. MORRIS:  
4 Q. Right. But you're speaking to him at this  
5 point, according to his report.  
6 A. When they --  
7 Q. "Who stated upon her arrival, she noticed the  
8 liquid substance."  
9 A. I don't see liquid, this is what I -- I don't  
10 see the liquid in the floor.  
11 Q. Okay.  
12 MR. KIRCHER: Do you remember telling him  
13 that?  
14 THE DEPONENT: I don't remember to tell him.  
15 I remember they ask questions about what happened.  
16 BY MS. MORRIS:  
17 Q. Right, and when they asked questions about  
18 what happened, did you tell them that I arrived here  
19 and noticed liquid substance on the floor?  
20 A. No.  
21 Q. You did not tell him that?  
22 A. No.  
23 Q. Is that correct?  
24 A. It's correct.  
25 Q. Okay, too many negatives.

5 mentioned the pool and the restaurants -- were you in  
6 charge of looking to make sure they were doing their  
7 job or were you only in charge of essentially the  
8 casino floor area?  
9 A. In that time period, they let us work in the  
10 other areas in the casino.  
11 Q. And can you list those areas for me?  
12 A. All the areas?  
13 Q. That you as the assistant manager were in  
14 charge of.  
15 A. It's like two or three managers. Some  
16 managers they cover the casino, another manager cover  
17 the retail and another manager cover the basement.  
18 In the pool, they have a manager to taking  
19 care of the pool. The exterior manager, they have to  
20 taking care of the exterior.  
21 Q. How about your job duty as assistant manager  
22 back in 2010; what were you responsible for?  
23 A. I don't remember what area they covered, but  
24 if it's a manager in the casino when they call, any  
25 manager can responding to go and check the area.

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1 Q. On February 8th, 2010, do you remember what  
2 section you were responsible for covering?  
3 A. No, I don't remember.  
4 Q. Do you remember where you were when you got  
5 called about this incident?  
6 A. No.  
7 Q. Were you on the casino floor?  
8 A. I'm in the casino floor, but I don't remember  
9 the area.  
10 Q. If you were on the casino floor, would that  
11 lead you to believe you were assigned to the casino  
12 that day?  
13 A. I can be in the retail and I can go check the  
14 casino. I can go check the restrooms. I can be in  
15 the different areas of the casino.  
16 This is what I think right now, because they  
17 don't explain me yet, that make the zones, that every  
18 manager now they can be in the area when they supposed  
19 to work the night or whatever happens, these managers  
20 they can be their responsibility for him to check,  
21 make sure that area is in control.  
22 Q. I gotcha, so now it's different?  
23 A. Right now, now is different.  
24 Q. Yes.  
25 A. Every director, they have his different way

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1 to work, and they already have, till now, three  
2 directors.  
3 Q. Do you remember back in 2010, when this  
4 incident occurred, if you were the only manager,  
5 assistant manager, on shift?  
6 A. I don't remember.  
7 Q. Do you remember back in 2010 approximately  
8 how many attendants would be assigned to the casino  
9 area for the shift that you were working?  
10 A. No, I don't remember.  
11 Q. Do you know if there's any documents that  
12 would show if there was another assistant manager on  
13 at the time that you were?  
14 A. I think there can be.  
15 Q. Like a scheduling document?  
16 A. Like a scheduling document.  
17 Q. There's a scheduling office; is that correct?  
18 A. At the PAD office, they have the scheduling  
19 and everything all together.  
20 Q. And that's the one who is currently Miyra?  
21 A. I don't know if it's Miyra. I don't remember  
22 if it's Miyra because I have different ladies in the  
23 scheduling. I don't know at this time who is the  
24 ladies in there.  
25 Q. I understand. Okay. So back in 2010, you

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1 don't remember exactly what area you were assigned to  
2 be monitoring; is that correct?  
3 A. Um-hum.  
4 MR. KIRCHER: Was that a yes?  
5 MS. MORRIS: Thank you. Is that a yes?  
6 THE DEPONENT: I'm sorry, yes. I'm sorry.  
7 MR. KIRCHER: It's okay.  
8 BY MS. MORRIS:  
9 Q. But you were the one who received the call to  
10 come over to that location?  
11 A. Not the specific person that received the  
12 call.  
13 Q. Okay, they didn't specifically call you?  
14 A. No.  
15 Q. Okay.  
16 A. They call, they have a spill in the retail or  
17 in the garden, and if it's a manager close to the area  
18 or the only one in the casino to respond is when I  
19 respond.  
20 Sometimes, like say right now I'm in the  
21 ballrooms and they have a spill in baccarat or they  
22 have a spill in the Tower Suites, I can respond, I'm  
23 on my way there or I'm close to the area to check.  
24 Q. Gotcha. So you responded because you were  
25 close?

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1 A. Yes.  
2 Q. You said that there's a horticulture  
3 department that maintains the gardens; is that right?  
4 A. Yes.  
5 Q. What, if any, responsibilities do the porters  
6 have in the garden area, if you know?  
7 A. Sweep the marble, the carpets in the area,  
8 sweep, too, because in daytime they cannot use  
9 vacuums. Only in graveyard they can use vacuums.  
10 And go around the marble, clean the ashtrays.  
11 Go inside the Parasol-Up when it's open and sweep and  
12 go check the main entrance to clean the mirrors and  
13 the doors, and the same in the south entrance.  
14 (Ms. Espinosa entered the room.)  
15 BY MS. MORRIS:  
16 Q. We'll probably use this picture here; I think  
17 it's Plaintiff's Exhibit 3. There's an item over  
18 here; do you see what I'm pointing to?  
19 A. This one?  
20 Q. Yes. Do you know what that is?  
21 A. I'm not sure if it's the power or light,  
22 because they have lights around the garden. I'm not  
23 sure.  
24 Q. So it could be either one of those two; is  
25 that correct?

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1 A. Lights or power or -- I don't know.  
2 Q. Okay.  
3 A. Or the speakers, because they have speakers,  
4 too.  
5 Q. For the music?  
6 A. Yes.  
7 Q. Okay. Thank you.  
8 A. Because our porters, they not going too far  
9 on this marble. They have to clean the marble this  
10 way.  
11 Q. So they don't go past the marble?  
12 A. No.  
13 Q. Is that what you're saying?  
14 A. No.  
15 Q. So I've been given these policies and  
16 procedures, and we'll just mark this packet as  
17 Exhibit 5.  
18 Please take a look through this packet, if  
19 you wouldn't mind, before we talk about it.  
20 Flip through all the pages, make sure you're  
21 familiar -- or are you familiar with this document;  
22 have you seen it before?  
23 A. Yes.  
24 Q. Okay. There's more pages. Can you kind of  
25 give me a description of what you're looking at?

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1 A. On the hard floors?  
2 Q. Yeah, so this is policies and procedures  
3 that's been given to me by Wynn, and it appears to be,  
4 and you tell me if I'm wrong, the policies and  
5 procedures for essentially cleaning?  
6 A. Um-hum.  
7 Q. Would you agree with that?  
8 A. Yes.  
9 Q. Okay. Is this some policy and procedure that  
10 you implement or use in some fashion?  
11 A. In the areas.  
12 Q. Is this something that you use to train the  
13 porters?  
14 A. Yes.  
15 Q. The ones that work in the public area  
16 department?  
17 A. Um-hum.  
18 Q. What I'm looking for in this document that I  
19 can't see, and maybe you can help me find, is where it  
20 instructs the porters on how to roam, how to look in  
21 their department to see if there's anything, any kind  
22 of dangerous condition or debris on the floor, and I'm  
23 just wondering if there's a specific instruction  
24 somewhere in this packet that I missed.  
25 A. The instructions the way the porters when

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1 they working in the garden, you're saying the garden  
2 or in what area in the casino?  
3 Because the casino is a difference like how  
4 you working in the garden and how you working in the  
5 bathrooms, how you working in the restaurant, how you  
6 working in baccarat.  
7 Some chores you cannot do in the daytime and  
8 not in swing shift, it's only the job you can do it in  
9 graveyard when it's not too many people around there.  
10 Q. Okay.  
11 A. Like the heavy equipment, you can never use  
12 it in the daytime or in the swing shift because it's a  
13 lot of guests and it's a lot of people walking in the  
14 areas.  
15 The most of the mop is bathrooms, you can mop  
16 the bathrooms, but make sure when the employees they  
17 want to mop the floor, they have to put in the  
18 entrance to the bathrooms a Wet sign to let the guests  
19 know the floor, they can be wet or not too wet, one in  
20 the middle of the area but in the sink areas and one  
21 by the stalls.  
22 This is different within the gardens. In the  
23 gardens they don't use the mops. Only like in the  
24 cage when they call for spills, the guys they have to  
25 use dry towels to clean the spill. They have the
