25 in. So I didn't know if Mr. Sprowson wants us to read it now,

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like, yesterday you heard evidence of this. So whatever the
 Court wants and whatever Mr. Sprowson wants.

3 THE COURT: I agree. Ordinarily my practice would 4 be to give it twice, to give a limiting instruction at the 5 time that the evidence is presented and, then, also at the 6 end, but some defense attorneys don't want to draw attention 7 to certain things so they only want it at the end. The choice 8 is really up to you. Have you shown Mr. Sprowson the proposed 9 instruction which basically says you can only consider the 10 evidence for certain things and not for others? Which we also 11 talked about having an instruction, limiting instruction on 12 one other item. 13 MR. SPROWSON: Now, does this have to do anything 14 with the California stuff? Is that going to be introduced? 15 MS. BLUTH: No, no, no, no. 16 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. 17 So, basically, yesterday we brought in MS. BLUTH:

I know since this has been an issue before, I've spoken to Ms. Davis. Ms. Davis does not know anything about the prior incidents. What she does know is that Jaysenia has had therapy treatments before and those therapy treatments dealt with anxiety and fear of abandonment, but she doesn't know anything about that therapy or anything about what caused that therapy.

And, so, I will be bringing that up that she is aware that even before any of this happened, Jaysenia also -she had gone to therapy beforehand and that was due to anxiety and fear of abandonment issues and so -- because I understand, you know, Mr. Sprowson keeps thinking we're laying it all on

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1 his doorstep, like, with what he says and, no, that's not 2 true. 3 We are, obviously, recognizing that she had received 4 treatment before for different therapeutic uses. So Ms. Davis 5 will talk about that. She doesn't know any of the specifics 6 and she'll explain what her treatment is about. It's about 7 moving forward. So I just want to put that out there on the 8 record. 9 MR. SPROWSON: Does she know the -- the time period 10 of how long that therapy was? 11 MS. BLUTH: No. 12 MR. SPROWSON: Is the other doctor, the one from 13 Montevista going to be testifying today? MS. BLUTH: Who? Oh. Nwapa [phonetic]? Nwapa will 14 15 not respond to subpoenas, no.

16 MR. SPROWSON: So he's probably the one that knows 17 all the information, so, nice and tidy.

18 THE COURT: Have you subpoended him?
19 MS. BLUTH: Excuse me?
20 THE COURT: Has he been subpoended?

MS. BLUTH: The problem is is he isn't working at that -- he doesn't work there anymore and, so, he doesn't have access to all of the records and, so, it's -- it's been pretty difficult for us and for our investigator. He just started getting back to us. I think last week was the first time --

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1 might have even been this week that our investigator Ruth had 2 the opportunity. So the doctor that we heard from is the 3 doctor that still works there that we were able to talk about 4 the assessment; but Dr. Nwapa, no.

THE COURT: Okay.

5

6 MR. SPROWSON: There is another issue because if we 7 get to my -- beginning of my case-in-chief today and I get an 8 opportunity to present my side of the story, part of it 9 involves her disclosure to me about this therapy and a prior 10 incident, and I just kind of wanted to hammer little bit of 11 that out with the State because I don't plan on getting into a 12 detailed account of it. I just want to mention the fact that 13 she had mentioned to me that she was involved in a prior 14 incident and that she was receiving therapy as a result of 15 that. That's the information she gave me.

I'm not going to get into, hey, there was an individual named such-and-such and it was because of this, but I think it's fair for me because it was, you know, a part of the conversations that we had that she did receive therapy and that it was a result and she was having nightmares. She disclosed to me that she was having nightmares. She disclosed to me that it was a direct result of this particular incident.

23 So I think it's only fair and I don't plan on going 24 beyond that, but just to mention the fact that she had 25 mentioned to me she was receiving therapy, there was a

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previous incident that had happened to her, and she was having
 nightmares as a result of that.

So, and, I think that directly impacts the charge of child abuse of substantial mental harm because, obviously, if she's having nightmares as a direct result of this, there's, obviously, something going on there and I -- I should be able to disclose it that there was some other cause besides myself.

8 MS. BLUTH: And I -- and the State's position is is 9 that anything that Jaysenia said to the Defendant is hearsay, 10 so their conversations can't come in unless he meets the 11 hearsay exception, such as an inconsistent statement, 12 something like that. And Jaysenia and her mother both stated 13 that she had received therapy before and that she felt better 14 and she was doing better, she was back to a normal life and, 15 then, this happened.

16 So any of those questions should have been towards 17 Ms. Torres and so my objection is two-fold. I guess, number 18 one, I think that that's in direct violation of the motion in 19 limine and, number two, it would be hearsay. Now, I don't 20 have any problem with him saying that they had spoken about 21 the fact, you know, that she had received therapy before and 2.2 sometimes she had trouble sleeping or something like that, but 23 the whole thing there's been a prior incident, like, we keep 24 going over this and I just don't know what else to say. 25 MR. SPROWSON: Your Honor, I'm not offering it as --

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for its truth value, I'm offering it as the content of our conversation. This is something that she told me and -- and I believe, you know, I can't tell my story. Basically, I just have to stand there and say, well, what happened when she was with you? Well, I can't say anything.

6 That's what pretty much I'm getting from the State 7 because a lot of the stuff when -- when we were having our 8 conversations -- I mean, it's already been on -- we texted 9 each other. We had conversations for a period of time. 10 Obviously, we talked about something and I think it's only 11 fair that the jury hear what was -- and, like, I said, I'm 12 going to be fair with the State, what they're asking, and try 13 to adhere to their motion in limine. But this is the 14 psychological aspect of it because I think the jury has a 15 right -- they're going to be highly prejudiced against me if 16 they don't hear the fact -- I'm not getting into what the 17 incident was.

18 They don't even have to know what the incident was, 19 but the fact is that there was an incident. She was receiving 20 therapy as a direct result of this incident and it was causing 21 her to have nightmares, and that's all the extent of what I 2.2 want to get into because she, obviously, discloses to me --23 and I'm not offering it for its truth value, I'm offering it 24 as the content of the conversations that we had, which I think 25 I'm -- I can't tell my story if I'm just to sit there and say,

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1 well, you can't say anything about what you guys talked about, 2 you know? I mean, Jaysenia talked about -- I mean, the State 3 talked a great many things about what I talked to Jaysenia 4 about and I allowed it, I didn't object to it because --5 That's not hearsay. MS. BLUTH: 6 MR. SPROWSON: Well, it's not hearsay what I'm 7 offering either. It's the content of our conversation. I'm 8 not offering it for truth value. 9 Judge, he's absolutely offering it for MS. BLUTH: 10 truth value because what he's offering it to say is she talked 11 to me about this incident and because of what she said, I'm 12 proving to the jury that the substantial mental harm is caused 13 from someone else. I mean, that's absolutely offered for the truth of the matter. 14 15 THE COURT: Is Mr. Yohay going to lead you through 16 the questions? 17 MR. SPROWSON: Say again? 18 THE COURT: Is Mr. Yohay going to lead you through 19 the questions? 20 MR. SPROWSON: No, I'm going to do a narrative. 21 THE COURT: Or, he uses it to show why he did what 2.2 he did, it's not offered for the truth, but it's used to show why he -- I don't know -- didn't take her back to her mother's 23 24 house. I mean --25 MS. BLUTH: Well, but how could that be -- that was UNCERTIFIED ROUGH DRAFT

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1	a stranger, had nothing to do with her mother's house. That
2	guy was in jail.
3	MR. SPROWSON: Well, I'm not going to get into those
4	details.
5	THE COURT: More of what I was thinking of I'm
6	trying to think.
7	MR. SPROWSON: I mean, all I'm giving a very
8	naked naked statement. It's like she had a prior incident.
9	THE COURT: I I don't really so much I mean,
10	it's hard because you're doing it yourself. So Ms. Bluth is
11	right. I don't want to bring up the prior incident, however,
12	I do, again it's just about how he gets it out I do
13	think it's relevant, the fact she was receiving
14	MS. BLUTH: Absolutely.
15	THE COURT: she was receiving treatment prior to
16	him. She was having nightmares prior to him and all that
17	because that would go to whether or not there's psychological
18	damage
19	MS. BLUTH: I agree.
20	THE COURT: $$ to the victim that pre-existed Mr.
21	Sprowson.
22	MS. BLUTH: That's why I was thinking if
23	THE COURT: I don't really know. I'm trying to
24	think of how to get it in other than being hearsay because
25	that would be offered for the truth of the matter asserted,
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but --

MS. BLUTH: But, I guess what I'm saying, I'll --I'll allow that. What you're saying right now, I don't have a problem with him saying --

THE COURT: Okay.

6 MS. BLUTH: -- you know, she had expressed to him 7 that she received therapy before and she had -- when she was 8 with him sometimes, you know, she had nightmares. I'm not 9 making it seem like the nightmares are about him, but that she 10 had trouble sleeping in regard to some of the things that she 11 had talked about or something like that, but the whole thing 12 there was a prior incident, no, that's exactly what the motion 13 was about.

14THE COURT: Trying to think of another way to say15it.

16 MR. SPROWSON: You know, and the bottom line, Your 17 Honor, if there has -- and we're talking about the emotional 18 aspect now, the psychological aspect now. There has been a 19 previous injury. I mean, I'm being charged with an injury --20 this is the bottom line. I'm being charged with an injury 21 and, as far as what I understand, if there is someone else who 2.2 is a direct result or could have been a direct result of that 23 injury other than myself, I'm allowed to introduce that into 24 evidence.

25

THE COURT: What do you want to say? That she just

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1 -- there was an event that occurred in her life, that she told 2 you that there was an event that occurred in her life that 3 caused her to have nightmares and other issues and resulted in 4 her having to attend treatment, is that basically it? 5 MR. SPROWSON: It could be -- I could frame it that 6 way. 7 THE COURT: I don't really have a problem with that. 8 MS. BLUTH: Can you say it one more time, Your 9 Honor? That there was an event in her life --10 THE COURT: Yeah, I think -- is this fair to say? 11 There was -- she told that there was an event in her life that 12 caused her -- I don't know the sequence -- to have nightmares 13 or whatever else and that she had to attend therapy as a 14 result of it or she was attending therapy, whatever it was? 15 Is that -- is that -- I don't know what she told you. I'm 16 trying to figure out --17 MR. SPROWSON: I mean, that's why I'm trying --18 THE COURT: Tell me what you want to say. 19 MR. SPROWSON: If the State would have their way, 20 Your Honor, I'd sit up there and stare with a blank --21 MS. BLUTH: Oh my gosh. 2.2 MR. SPROWSON: I mean, honestly. 23 MS. BLUTH: I just stipulated to him being able to 24 get in this. 25 MR. SPROWSON: Well, what I'm trying to say is --UNCERTIFIED ROUGH DRAFT

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1 THE COURT: I understand. 2 MR. SPROWSON: I'm not trying -- I am -- I am 3 bending over backwards not to just --4 THE COURT: Mr. Sprowson, please. 5 MR. SPROWSON: -- not say anything about anything. 6 It's just --7 THE COURT: No, no, no -- okay. 8 MR. SPROWSON: I mean, I want to know how much --9 THE COURT: All I'm asking is what you want to say 10 because sometimes it's just a matter of how you say it. So 11 please tell me what you want to say. 12 MR. SPROWSON: Well, I do want to be able to mention 13 the fact that she was receiving -- you know, I can't say --14 THE COURT: I agree with you on that. 15 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. So she was receiving therapy, 16 but the way that they're trying to -- to make it seem is that it was over anxiety. I mean, a lot of people have therapy 17 18 over anxiety. There was a specific incident that caused this -- that was a result -- you know, that she was having therapy 19 20 not just because of anxiety, but there was something that 21 caused that anxiety is what I'm trying to get at. 2.2 THE COURT: You want the specifics of the detail or 23 do you want to say that there was an event in her life that 24 occurred, she told me that an event occurred in her life that

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was causing -- I don't know whether she had the therapy and

25

then the nightmares or the nightmares and the therapy, but whatever, that there's an event that occurred in her life that caused her to have nightmares or whatever other manifestations and as a result she was seeking therapy. Is that basically what you want to say?

Something to that effect, but I -- I 6 MR. SPROWSON: 7 think that I'm being at a great disadvantage because it just 8 wasn't an event, it was an individual involved in this event. 9 I mean, it doesn't have to say what the -- what the -- all I'm 10 trying to get at is that I'm not the only person that -- if 11 she has some kind of emotional damage done to her, that there 12 is another cause, there is a possible other cause. I'll give 13 you an example. Like, if ---

14 THE COURT: Just tell me -- instead of giving me 15 examples, just tell me specifically what you want to say.

16 MR. SPROWSON: Well, I want to be able to get into 17 the fact that there was another individual that actually was 18 involved in this incident and that's it, and that as a result 19 of that she had therapy. I don't need to go beyond that.

20

MS. BLUTH: That's in direct --

21 MR. SPROWSON: It caused -- it caused -- it caused 22 nightmares.

23 MS. BLUTH: That's in direct violation of rape 24 shield.

25 MR. SPROWSON: I didn't say anything about rape or

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1 any kind of sexual assault. I said there was an incident.

2 MS. BLUTH: That incident was a -- a rape, a brutal 3 rape.

MR. SPROWSON: Well, I'm not getting into that. 4 I'm 5 not getting into the rape. They don't know what the incident 6 was. How would they even know? They don't know, oh --7 they're not going to go from there was an incident to rape. 8 MS. BLUTH: Judge --9 MR. SPROWSON: Could have been a burglary. Could 10 have been --11 MS. BLUTH: This -- this --12 MR. SPROWSON: -- she was -- how can I say, robbed? 13 She could -- you know, like I said, she could have been home, 14 somebody broke in the house. It could have been any kind of 15 scenario. There's all kinds of scenarios --16 MS. BLUTH: May I address the Court --17 MR. SPROWSON: -- that they could come to. 18 MS. BLUTH: -- Mr. Sprowson? The State's position 19 is that the Defendant should be able to say I -- I don't think that event or incident, that he should be able to say prior to 20 21 even meeting him she received therapy for certain issues in 2.2 her life, those caused her anxiety and those also caused her 23 to have bad dreams. I don't think that you should 24 specifically say "incident" or "event". I mean, that's in 25 direct violation of, a, my motion in limine, but, b, more

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importantly, rape shield. I mean, she can't control that she
 was raped. I understand what he's saying --

3

MR. SPROWSON: I'm not talking about rape.

4 MS. BLUTH: -- that we can't -- it's rape. I -- I 5 understand that we can't lay it all at his doorstep. We're 6 not doing that. We have -- we have talked to Jaysenia that 7 she sought a counselor way before him. We've talked to her 8 mother that she saw a counselor. This counselor is going to 9 say she saw and she has anxiety issues and uncontrollable 10 emotions and fear of abandonment. I mean, we're doing that. 11 We're saying that. And, obviously, his argument is to the 12 jury, how can you say it's caused from me? Everybody says 13 that she saw a therapist long before ever meeting me. So I --14 that would be left up to the jury.

15 THE COURT: Okay. So I agree. I agree with the 16 State. I agree with both of you, okay? I agree with the 17 State that no matter how you want to get around it, I mean, 18 there are laws that protect being able to go into the victim's 19 past sexual history. I don't know that you need to get into 20 the fact that she was raped or violated or anything else by 21 any particular person.

I think it's -- I agree with the Defendant that it's absolutely relevant to your case based upon how you're being charged that she did have psychological issues before, that she was receiving treatment for the psychological issues, that

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perhaps she was having psychological and physical
 manifestations because of that psychological trauma.

3 I don't so much have a problem with that because I 4 think it's relevant since you're being charged with causing 5 her emotional and mental harm, but I don't think that the 6 specific occurrence is really relevant because you -- Ms. 7 Bluth is right. You can get up to the jury and argue, hey, 8 I'm not the cause of all these psychological issues she had. 9 She told you she was in counseling before, she was having 10 nightmares before, she was doing whatever. I even let you get 11 into the run-away issue, she had run away before. I mean, I 12 don't see how you're being precluded from putting on a defense 13 because you can't ---

14

MR. SPROWSON: I like the way --

15 THE COURT: -- say that -- you can't blame it on the 16 other sexual event.

17 MR. SPROWSON: I like the way you said psychological 18 trauma, that -- that's what I'm looking for. I want to --

THE COURT: That's argument at closing.

20 MR. SPROWSON: Well, you said psychological --21 there's some kind of psychological trauma. We're not saying 22 what that psychological trauma is.

THE COURT: Well --

24 MR. SPROWSON: Because if we're being specific that 25 -- what I'm trying to avoid is they're saying there's anxiety

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1 issues. You know, kind of seems to downplay the whole thing. 2 Substantial mental harm compared to, oh, well, she was seeing therapy for anxiety. This is what I'm trying to avoid. 3 You 4 just mentioned psychological trauma. There was some 5 psychological trauma. 6 If I [inaudible] able to frame it that way to where 7 it's not, like, specific, well, she was receiving this for 8 anxiety. I mean, she was actually receiving therapy for 9 psychological trauma. That's -- that would be perfect. I 10 would have no -- that -- that would satisfy me. 11 MS. BLUTH: I've read over -- literally a thousand 12 pages of medical records and I know Your Honor wasn't quoting 13 medical records. 14 THE COURT: I wasn't. 15 MS. BLUTH: That word has never been used, 16 "psychological trauma" has never been used. 17 THE COURT: Hold on. Again, that was just -- I 18 don't --19 I know. I know. MS. BLUTH: 20 If that came up at all it would be the THE COURT: 21 sake of argument and, you know, it sounds like there's going 2.2 to be -- the jury's going to have to weigh the testimony 23 between the victim and the Defendant, since he's probably 24 going to take the stand, and weigh the testimony of the 25 providers that are going to say, oh, she received counseling,

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1 but it was for anxiety and this.

Davis, D-A-V-I-S. 17 THE COURT: Whenever you're ready. 18 MS. BLUTH: Thank you. 19 DIRECT EXAMINATION 20 BY MS. BLUTH: 21 Good afternoon, ma'am. What is your profession? Q 2.2 I am a licensed clinical social worker. Α 23 0 Okay. And can you explain to us what someone 24 working in your capacity does? 25 А Yes, so being an LCSW that allows me to work with

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individuals in a therapeutic setting, providing psychotherapy,
 mental health treatment.

Q Okay. And how would that -- how would it be that a patient comes to you for treatment? Like, how do they end up getting to you?

A A variety of ways. Usually referral. In my profession, working at Mojave Mental Health, we would get referrals from a DFS worker if a child is in foster care or it could be a direct parental placement if a parent calls Mojave, if they have the insurance that we take. So it's typically referral based.

12 Q And, then, you used the term "DFS," which would be 13 the Department of Family Services?

14 A Correct.

Q Okay. And, then, you also talked about Mojave Mental Health. Can you just explain to the ladies and gentlemen of the jury what that is?

A Absolutely. So Mojave Mental Health is a out-patient mental health agency in town that provides individual and family therapy to children, teenagers and adults.

22 Q So what is the age -- the general age range when 23 you're working in connection with Mojave of patients that you 24 see?

25

A So at Mojave Mental Health I'm able to work with

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children as young as six, up to the age of 18 and, on
 occasion, some adults, depending upon the circumstances.

Q Okay. And can you explain to us kind of the - the range of either, you know, issues, mental health issues or problems that clients that you see or patients that you see have?

7 Α So, typically, when I'm working with a client Yeah. it can be because they've been placed in foster care and 8 9 having some -- just working through the trauma of that. Also, 10 just having a general traumatic experience, whether it be 11 sexual abuse, physical abuse, emotional abuse. Also, I'm 12 working with folks who have engaged in self-harming behaviors, 13 having overwhelming emotions. So it's really a very broad 14 amount of folks that I can see.

15 Q And can you describe the education and training that 16 you received for you -- in order for you to do the work that 17 you do?

A Absolutely. So I received a bachelor's degree in social work; thereafter, I received a master's degree in social work. I completed 3,000 hours of training in the clinical setting and then I took my licensure test to be able to practice clinical social work in the state of Nevada.

23 Q Okay. And sometimes in certain situations because 24 of your employment do you also have to come to court and 25 testify?

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A Yes.

2 Q So I'd like to turn your attention to July of 2015. 3 Did you begin treating an individual by the name of Jaysenia 4 Torres?

A I did.

Q Now, before coming to see you, had Jaysenia
previously been treated at an in-patient program called Willow
Spring?

A Yes.

Q And can you explain to us what Willow Springs is? A So to the best of my knowledge, and I've referred a few clients there, Willow Springs is located in Reno, Nevada, and it is a facility that's in-patient. They have a variety of programs there and one of those programs is entitled Dialectical Behavior Therapy Treatment.

Q

Okay.

17 A It's for adolescents, typically, and I'm not sure if 18 they see children younger than 13. I'm not clear on that.

19 Q Okay. Now, but after -- so after getting out of 20 Willow Springs, did Jaysenia see a doctor? I think her --21 Robin Donaldson?

22 A Yes.

Q And, then, after treatment with Robin Donaldson, did
-- did Jaysenia come to you?

25 A She did, yes.

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1 And she first started treatment with you in July of 0 2 2015 and, then, did you treat her all the way up until her 3 departure for college? 4 А Yes. 5 Now, before -- even before Montevista and Willow Ο 6 Springs, the case that we're here before today, is it your 7 understanding that Jaysenia had received therapy in the past? 8 А Yes. 9 And what were -- what were some of the symptoms that 0 10 she was having that required therapy? 11 А So, to my knowledge, it was some heightened anxiety, 12 the experience of overwhelming emotions, things of that 13 nature. 14 And did -- do your notes also notate that she had a 0 15 fear of abandonment? 16 Yes, and a history of abandonment. А 17 Now, when Ms. Torres gets to you, do you do what's Q 18 referred to as an assessment and go through kind of, like, 19 family history and things like that? 20 Α Yes. 21 And were any of her family members active in making Q 2.2 sure she came to treatments or doing treatments with her? 23 А Yes. 24 And who was that? 0 25 А Her mother, Kathryn Smith. UNCERTIFIED ROUGH DRAFT

Q And as part of your assessment, did Jaysenia's
 father have an active life -- excuse me -- an active part in
 her life?

A No.

5

4

0 And did she discuss kind of issues with that?

A Yes, we had spoken about his leaving the family home
at a very young age. I believe it was under the age -- like,
probably between the age of five or six and, then, just never
really having a consistent ongoing relationship after his
leaving the family.

11 Q Okay. Now, I'd like to talk to you a little bit --12 when Jaysenia gets to you in July of 2015, what were her 13 present issues? Like, what was she coming to you for?

14 So, to my remembrance, Jaysenia was having Α 15 heightened anxiety. I'm not really clear on when her 16 discharge date was from Willow Springs. There may have been 17 this anticipation about school starting up and the stress 18 associated with that and some anxiety surrounding, you know, some things that have occurred in her past, and then, also, 19 20 having some occasional discord with mom and, also, her desire 21 to begin to be more skillful as she had been when she 2.2 discharged from Willow Springs.

Q Okay. And I want to ask you about some terms that I'm not familiar with that were in your notations. You stated that Jaysenia struggled with self-identified tendency to

- self-invalidate?
- A Yes.

3

4

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Q Which lead to self-judgment and avalanche thinking?A Yes.

5

Q Can you explain what that means to me, please?

A So, then, because Jaysenia has -- not because. Jaysenia has amplified anxiety. So what would tend to happen would be she would have a lot of judgmental thoughts, things that were very negative, self-statements about herself, a lot of self-judgment that ended up creating a lot of shame and heightened -- more heightened anxiety, which could, then, lead to just experiencing really painful emotions.

Q So can you give us an example of maybe, like, a statement -- not -- I'm not saying one that she used, but to give us an example of what, like, self-invalidation or self-judgment is and, then, how you would work with her through it?

18 Yes, absolutely. So just a really innocuous Α 19 statement. Let's say, for example, I drop my bracelet on the 20 I would have this judgment in my head, like, I'm so around. 21 stupid I can't believe that, everybody thinks I'm a moron, 2.2 whatever, and then I would feel more shame and, then, that 23 would trigger other moments of me thinking some really 24 unpleasant, painful thoughts about myself, which then 25 transfers into avalanche thinking, one thought leads to many

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other thoughts that are painful. So, then, how I would work
 with her on that, even though this is not specific to her --

Q Sure.

3

A -- would be let's be descriptive. What happened? I dropped my bracelet on the floor and it made a noise. Okay. And you felt embarrassed? Yes. So I dropped my bracelet on the floor and I felt embarrassed because it made a noise, which is far more different than I'm so stupid, I'm such a moron because blah-blah.

10 Q Okay.

11 A Yeah.

12 Q So pretty hard on herself?

13 A Exactly.

14 Q And you stated that one of her goals was -- you 15 weren't sure of the discharge date, but one of her goals was 16 to get back to the point where she was after she left the 17 Willow Springs treatment center and that she was more skillful 18 then?

19 A Yes.

20 Q And skillful just in -- in dealing with the anxiety 21 or -- is that what you mean?

A Yes. So Ms. Torres would -- a lot of the work that we did was for her to practice noticing what her emotions are, the sensations in her body so, then, that way she would be able to practice behavior skills to manage any urges or

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1 impulse just to -- to reduce the likelihood of her getting 2 more anxious or feeling more shame.

So after meeting with her and assessing her 0 Okav. 4 issues, your treatment modality that you recommended was what?

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Dialectical behavior therapy informed treatment.

Can you explain to us what that is?

7 Absolutely. So dialectical behavior therapy is a А 8 treatment modality that was created by Dr. Marsha Linehan some time in the '80s, specifically at that time for women who had 9 10 overwhelming emotions, amplified reactivity to their emotions 11 and so return to baseline or their emotional baseline of 12 feeling better. Because of those three things, there could be 13 a tendency to engage in harmful behavior, heightened shame, 14 different things like that.

15 So DBT informed treatment, there are five modes and 16 functions that go along with DBT, and any time all five of 17 those things are not going at the same time for treatment, 18 it's then informed. So because Jaysenia received such 19 intensive DBT training and she was fairly skilled up, I was of 20 -- excuse me -- of support to her in re-enforcing her use of 21 skillful needs and practicing those things that had helped her previously upon her discharge from the RTC, which is a 2.2 23 residential treatment center.

24

Ο So Willow Springs?

25 Α Correct.

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1QOkay. Now, when you were working with her and2providing her with this DBT, how often would you see her?

A I would see her in the very beginning -- I can't say three to six months or more -- I don't know -- every week.

Q Okay.

A Or every other week, just depending upon what was7 going on in terms of scheduling.

Q Now, how was Kathryn during that time? Would you -9 would she come? Was she supportive? How would you
10 characterize it?

A Kathryn was very, in my opinion, very supportive. She would participate in treatment in the very beginning and then, thereafter, as needed, allowing Jaysenia and I to do more work on the individual aspects of her experience, and I would speak to Kathryn quite often and, to me, she was very engaged in the therapeutic process.

Q While you were treating Jaysenia, did she discuss that there had been a period of time or a period in time where she had no contact with others besides one human being for a period of about two months?

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A Yes.

22 Q And because of that, did you try to work with her in 23 developing skills?

A In the sense of whatever emotions she experienced during that moment in her life, when she may have had

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intrusive thoughts or memories about that event, helping her
 manage those emotions in the context of practicing different
 behaviors to manage them.

Q Did she have apprehension or fears about kind of
completely being re-integrated into, like, a school setting or
something like that?

A Yes.

7

8 Q And because of those fears or anxiety, what types of 9 things did you discuss or what types of things did you work 10 with her on, you know, her ultimate goal of being able to feel 11 comfortable in that setting?

12 Right. So because she had a lot of anxiety, we Α 13 would discuss different strategies that would help her reduce 14 the intensity of anxiety. So it could be a self-soothe kit, 15 different -- her five senses and doing something that is 16 soothing for that. Also, engaging in different body movements 17 to help reduce the sense of urgency or the intensity of 18 anxiety that she experienced. So a variety of skills along those lines. 19

20 Q Could -- a self-soothing kit, can you give me an 21 example of something that someone might put in that kit or 22 use?

A Yes. So we have five senses, plus one, which is movement. So, you know, for sight, is there photographs that you could look at and put in a box. For hearing, what's your

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favorite piece of music or what's a sound that you really enjoy. Sense of touch, same thing, is there, like, a blanket or something that is soothing against the skin that you like. Movement is something that you can do with your body, whether that be running or swimming or something like that. And, then, the other two senses, smelling, taste, things of that nature, so that would be a self-soothe kit.

8 Q Have you ever recommended to a child -- do some of 9 the children you see, unfortunately, do they have to go to 10 court?

11 A Yes.

12 Q And testify?

13 A Yes.

14 Q Have you ever recommended a child bring in something 15 like Play-do or something like that to court to kind of get 16 through that?

A Absolutely, and even something called a confidence stone, just something they can fiddle with, as I'm doing right now, to act as a grounding anchor during stressful situations.

20 Q Okay. Now, did Jaysenia express fear or concerns 21 about people knowing what happened to her?

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Yes.

2.2

Q How would you get -- like, would you say that that was a minute concern or would you say that -- I mean, that's a pretty big concern that she's expressing?

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A It was pretty significant for her. I -- I remember, to the best of my memory, during that summer when I met her she was very anxious about going back to school and kind of concerned that people may know about her trauma history, and I do remember discussing that with her. I just had to kind of manage that.

Q What -- was she aware that it had been in the news?
A To my knowledge, it's kind of -- it's difficult to
pinpoint the exact time frame. I do know that she had said
something about the court proceeding being in the news and
because she was a minor, her face being blurred out, and still
worried that people could tell by her image that it was her.

Q Okay. Now, did you work with her in regards to -well, let me ask you this first before I go to that second question. Did she express to you that there was still a court case going on?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And did she have fears or anxiety about that?19 A Yes.

20 Q And what did you -- you know, explain how that made 21 her feel and what you did to work through that with her, 22 please?

A Really, it made her feel extremely anxious, so I would -- I would kind of shift away from the behavioral piece to do more process work, find out how her sleeping was, was

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1 her appetite affected, how was her mood, did that affect her 2 relationships with her family members, and then checking in 3 with her on, you know, kind of where she felt that in her body 4 to enhance the mind body connected, checking in to find out 5 the quality of her thoughts, and then what skills have 6 historically been helpful in her managing all the symptoms 7 that she had experienced during that time. 8 Did she discuss with you a specific aspect of the Ο 9 case that made her particularly upset? 10 А Yes. 11 And what was that? 0 12 Two things, people knowing that, you know, she was Α 13 the victim and, then, also, being cross-examined. 14 Did she express anxiety about the fact that she felt 0 15 that the -- the Defendant was blaming her? 16 Α Yes. 17 While you were -- you're mindful that, you know, a Q 18 court process is going on, do you talk about the incidents 19 that lead to the court process or is DPT -- DBT a 20 forward-thinking type therapy? 21 That's a good question. So, typically, you know, we А 2.2 do gather a portion of the history to kind of get the context 23 of the situation and -- and usually with using DBT or DBT 24 informed treatment we focus mostly on the present moment and 25 how to apply skills for the present moment in whatever

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circumstances are surrounding that.

2 Q So in -- in your treatment of Jaysenia, when she was 3 in the in-patient treatment at Willow Springs, was it your 4 understanding that she had missed that year of school?

A Yes.

Ο

Q And, so, was one of the goals being -- did you work with her on a major goal of going back to school and hopefully eventually being able to go to college?

9 A I worked with her in the context of her 10 transitioning from high school to the college atmosphere, not 11 so much the point that you had just made.

12

From Willow Springs to high school?

A Right, right. I mean, it came up in the sense of her being anxious about going to school because she was worried that people would identify her based upon what was going on. And the transitional piece, we discussed that a bit, and it was more so discussion about behavioral skills for her emotions and kind of what was going on in that moment.

19 Q And before -- before you're even able to discuss, 20 you know, a thing about, you know, thoughts of actually going 21 into school, did -- did you work with verbalizing with her the 22 ability to even just kind of re-integrate and be around other 23 people, not necessarily just school kids, but just in general 24 in society?

25 A Sure, yeah.

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1 MS. BLUTH: Thank you so much, Ms. Davis. Your 2 Honor, that concludes my direct examination. I'll pass the 3 witness. 4 THE COURT: Mr. Sprowson? 5 MR. SPROWSON: I have no questions, Your Honor. 6 THE COURT: No. All right. Thank you, ma'am, for 7 your time. You're free to go. 8 MS. BLUTH: Thank you. 9 THE COURT: Next witness by the State. 10 MS. BLUTH: May we approach the clerk, Your Honor? 11 THE COURT: You may. 12 Thank you. MS. BLUTH: 13 (Pause in proceedings.) 14 Your Honor, at this time the State has MS. BLUTH: 15 no further witnesses and, so, the State would rest. Thank 16 you. 17 THE COURT: Mr. Sprowson, would you like to present 18 your case? 19 MR. SPROWSON: Are they going to do a closing 20 argument? 21 THE COURT: The closing would be at the very end of 2.2 the case after you've rested, sir, and then after we give the 23 jury instructions. 24 MR. SPROWSON: I probably need, like, a five-minute 25 break.

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1 THE COURT: You can take a five-minute break. 2 Actually, we'll do a ten-minute break for you. So come back, 3 ladies and gentlemen of the jury, at 2:20. Do not talk about 4 the case. Don't research the case. Do not form or express an 5 opinion. We'll see you back shortly. Thank you. 6 (The jury recessed at 2:08 p.m.) 7 THE COURT: Anything we need for the record before 8 we go on? 9 MS. BLUTH: Not on behalf of the State, Your Honor. 10 MR. SPROWSON: I just want to be clear on I'm going 11 to do a narrative in my defense in chief. I'm just going to 12 go ahead from point A till the end and just give a narrative. 13 I'm going to try to adhere to what the State has requested in 14 their motion in limine. I believe that I'm allowed to, if I'm 15 correct, I just want to make sure because I want to be able to 16 do a flow on this. I don't want to have to stop and, you 17 know, have the State object. Just the fact that I'm going to 18 get into there was previous counseling, therapy and nightmares 19 prior to me, is that fine? 20 MS. BLUTH: Yes. 21 MR. SPROWSON: I'm not going to get -- just, you

21 MR. SPROWSON: I'm not going to get -- just, you
22 know, that she expressed this to me. I'm not going to get
23 into the individual incident, whatever. I just -- I just want
24 to lay the record that there was prior instances and if I
25 would have known a lot of this stuff that was going on with

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this young lady prior to, it probably would have been a lot different, but I think this is actually very good that I've heard all of this and a little bit more of what probably was going on prior to meeting me. But, so, I will try to adhere to that and that's fine.

6 MS. BLUTH: But, I'm sorry, can you just state what 7 it is your understanding that you can say?

8 MR. SPROWSON: I'm just going to leave it blank. 9 Counseling, there were nightmares and therapy. The 10 nightmares, I'm going to get into just a little bit about that 11 she was just -- she was having, like, nightmares and it would 12 scare her about -- I don't even know how I'm going to express 13 that, but I'll just leave it at nightmares, that she was 14 having nightmares. I won't get into any detail.

MS. BLUTH: Okay. And not -- but you're not going to say -- because just right now you said "prior incident," you're not going to say --

18 MR. SPROWSON: I know, I'll try to avoid that as19 much as possible.

20 MS. BLUTH: Well, if you don't avoid it I'm going to 21 move for a mistrial. Just so you know.

22 MR. SPROWSON: Well, that's fine, but, like I said, 23 I will try to avoid anything that, you know, that -- that you 24 feel is inappropriate. Nightmares is a blank statement. I'll 25 stick it at nightmares because -- when she had different types

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of nightmares. Can I say that?

2	There was there was certain types of nightmares
3	because I'll give you an example. She had mentioned she
4	had a nightmare at the end right prior to the police coming to
5	get her. She said she had a nightmare that the police would
6	find her. This is a very different type of nightmare compared
7	to the nightmare she was having about the individual and going
8	to it was also related to trial, as well. She was anxious
9	about going to trial. So there were different types so can
10	I is it fair to say that they were different types of
11	nightmares
12	MS. BLUTH: Sure.
13	MR. SPROWSON: without going into detail?
14	MS. BLUTH: That's fine with me.
15	MR. SPROWSON: The last one I think is fair for me
16	to mention, the content of it because it's directly related to
17	my case.
18	MS. BLUTH: Which one?
19	MR. SPROWSON: The last one where she she had a
20	nightmare about the police were going to find her. I don't
21	see any problem with that, do you?
22	THE COURT: I don't see as long as it has to do
23	with you.
24	MR. SPROWSON: That's fine. I'll stick to that.
25	That's fine.
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1 MS. BLUTH: Okay. 2 MR. SPROWSON: I need to use a restroom break and 3 I'll probably be ready to go after. 4 MS. BLUTH: Sounds good. 5 (The Court recessed at 2:12 p.m. until 2:24 p.m.) 6 (In the presence of the jury.) 7 THE COURT: Welcome back, ladies and gentlemen of 8 the jury. When we left off the State had rested. Mr. 9 Sprowson, would you like to present your case, sir? 10 MR. SPROWSON: Yes, I would. And can you explain 11 how we're going to do this because I am defending myself and 12 it's going to be in a narrative format? 13 Yeah. So, ladies and gentlemen of the THE COURT: 14 jury, I mean, it's a little bit different because Mr. 15 Sprowson's representing himself, so it's anticipated he's 16 going to get up there and he's going to give a narrative and 17 when he's finished he'll, obviously, be subject to 18 cross-examination by the District Attorney. So you want to 19 come up, Mr. Sprowson? 20 MR. SPROWSON: Yes. 21 THE COURT: You will have to be sworn in, sir, for 2.2 your testimony. 23 MR. SPROWSON: Yes.

24THE MARSHAL: Remain standing. Raise your right25hand and be sworn in by our clerk.

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MELVYN SPROWSON, DEFENDANT'S WITNESS, SWORN

2 THE CLERK: Please be seated. Would you please 3 state and spell your first and last name for the record?

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4 MR. SPROWSON: Melvyn Sprowson, M-E-L-V-Y-N. Last 5 name, S-P-R-O-W-S-O-N.

6 THE COURT: Mr. Sprowson, would you like to begin 7 and you can speak to the jury.

DIRECT EXAMINATION

9 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. I'm going to begin with 10 starting with I first moved here from California to Las Vegas 11 for a job, a teaching job, and was already testified, I moved 12 to a townhome. And, so, I moved here, it was during the 13 summer, and I was getting ready to start a job teaching. So 14 this is the summer time. I wasn't working.

15 I was getting ready to start a job and I had invited 16 my brother to visit with me for a couple days and he, at the 17 time, was retiring from the military and he had brought with 18 him some ROTC clothing that he was bringing to give to me. 19 And, you know, it was different sizes. It was sweaters. 20 There were baseball caps. There were different shorts and 21 things like this. So he left this with me and they're all 2.2. different sizes. And the reason why I'm bringing that up is 23 because later on I'm going to disclose some things about that, 24 so I'm just trying to lay a little bit of a foundation about 25 that clothing.

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So my brother had visited with me. I think this was about -- I moved out there to Las Vegas, I believe it was June, and school wasn't going to start until about, I believe, like maybe late -- early, early August or something like that. Maybe the middle of August. They had changed the -- changed the -- instead of from a later date to an earlier date, so I do believe it was around August, early August.

8 So after my brother had left from visiting me and 9 leaving all of this ROTC clothing, sweaters, stuff -- it was 10 all brand new stuff -- I was getting ready for work as a 11 teacher. As I said, I wasn't working at the time because, you 12 know, teachers, for those of you that don't teach, we have the 13 summers off. You know, it's the time period where we have 14 vacation.

Most of the time if you're a salaried teacher you -you get your pay kind of broken up into 12 segments some times. So I had previous employment, I had a retirement, I had funding, so I had enough money to support myself during this time while I was making the transition from California to Las Vegas.

And, you know, as I was buying furniture, I went out, I bought furniture for my apartment. As you've seen in the pictures, there was -- I started furnishing my apartment. I had three bedrooms upstairs. I had an air mattress because I had not purchased any bedroom furniture. Most of the money

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that I spent was on the living room, the dining room, buying dishes, things like that. Trying to furnish just the downstairs. You know, slowly -- you know, I was living by myself, slowly trying to furnish my apartment and start my new job.

And, so, how everything began was one night I was --I was extremely bored and sometimes, you know, I would put up a Craigslist ad. It was a fake ad, just for kicks. And the ad that particularly started this whole scenario to where -why we are here tody was an ad that I had posted on Craigslist, and this was for fun.

12 It was a joke. It was never meant to target 13 anybody. It was never meant to address -- it was simply an 14 issue of being bored. I wanted to have fun, just bantering 15 back and forth with different people. I got many responses. 16 And the title of the ad was "lonely millionaire seeks gold 17 digging slut." Now, sounds kind of odd, but, again, like I 18 said, it was -- it was meant to be a joke.

And I did put the age 34. It was a random age. I wasn't trying, like I said, it wasn't meant to target anybody. It wasn't meant to do anything. Just a random ad to see what kind of responses I would get. Now, at the time I didn't realize it would get me in so much trouble, but, nonetheless, that's the ad I put.

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Some of the responses I got, I got from people, "are

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you really a millionaire?" You know, "It's not nice to tease people about being a millionaire." And, then, I got many ads about, hey, yeah, you know, I'm a so-and-so because the ad was in regard to gold-digging slut. It was just a joke, keep in mind. And, so, I got various different responses.

One of the responses that I got was from Jaysenia. And, so, she -- she sent an ad, I was reading it, and we started talking, and at some point her age came up. She said, "I'm 16." And I started thinking to myself, I said, "well, you know what, you're kind of young, you're 16, you know, I really don't want to talk to you unless it's okay with your parents."

I said, "if you want to just talk, again, like I said, just bantering back and forth, you know, if you want to have a conversation with me through the emails" -- I mean, I wasn't having issues with that as long as it was okay with her -- her parents, and I did state this to her. She responded to me, "well, 16 is the age of consent." I said, "okay."

I thought that was kind of odd at first, but why would you be saying 16 is the age of consent? So, well, I started thinking about, well, the ad was, you know, lonely millionaire seeks gold-digging slut. I'm not trying to imply anything, but the topic came up. So, and I don't remember what my response was to that.

25

We just were having conversations -- like I said,

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this has been three years ago, so I have notes and I had to sit down and think about -- through some of these. So some of these times I might stop and look and see, you know, just to keep on in a -- in a regular chronological sequence of how things happened.

So as -- as time went by, we -- you know, I don't remember the entire conversation, but, you know, we were talking back and forth. We were becoming familiar with each other. And, again, I actually looked up and I said, "16, 16 is the age of consent, what does she mean by that?"

11 So I looked that up because, you know, it wasn't 12 like we were back and forth. You know, I'd send an email. 13 Maybe a little while later she would send an email. Little 14 while later I'd send an email back. It wasn't like, oh, this 15 is like a whole two, three hours straight in one day. This ---16 this was over a couple of days, you know, our conversation 17 getting to know each other.

18 At some point we started becoming familiar with each 19 other. It's, like, okay, you know, we're still talking. 20 We're still going back and forth on the emails and, then, she 21 suggested, hey, you know, why don't we switch to KIK? I said, 2.2 "what is KIK?" I didn't even know what KIK was. And as -- I 23 believe she explained in her testimony it's an application where you can -- it's kind of, like, text messaging kind of. 24 25 And, so, I said, "okay, sure." You know, and you

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1 use your -- you use your phone. You can use your cell phone 2 to do this as long as you have, like, I believe an Internet 3 connection or something. So we switched to KIK and she had 4 actually sent me some face photos. I said, "okay," you know. 5 You know, I looked at her photographs and, like I said, these 6 were face photos. They were nothing more, nothing -- as we'll 7 get into later on, the other photographs. These were just 8 simply face photographs. I said, "okay."

9 So we started talking and, then, one of the things 10 that came up was, she goes, "hey, you know, I work at the 11 Omelet House." I said, "oh, really?" Because the Omelet 12 House was not too far from where I lived and I went there a 13 couple times T.O.O. because I like catfish. The Omelet House 14 actually has this little dish, they put catfish and stuff, 15 [inaudible] cause, you know, I just like catfish. So this is 16 one of the places that actually they cook it and actually 17 tastes pretty good, so I would frequent there a couple times.

And I said, "oh, you work at the Omelet House? And, so, you know what? I may have seen you." And, so, we talked about that, and I said, "okay." You know, as time went on, we had more and more conversations and we started discussing more and more things and, at some point, she wanted to see me face to face and this is where I believe the skating rink situation came in.

25

She had talked about she was going to be at the

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skating rink with her friend, Jessica. I said, "okay." You 1 2 know, she's, like, I want to see you face to face. And I want 3 to first say something. I know there's been a lot about that, 4 oh, well, you know, she's worried about me trying to put all 5 the blame on her. I'm not trying to blame her for anything, 6 okay? I'm willing to take full responsibility for whatever 7 happened, but I have to tell you what happened according to 8 the way I perceived it.

9 And she had asked me to come and see her face to 10 face. I was very reluctant to do this. As I stated before in 11 my opening statement, you know, this is a young lady, I wasn't 12 too sure how this was going to end up. My experience, being 13 an older man, that women, in particular, have a tendency to be 14 very fickle. In my dating relationships women had been very 15 fickle.

So, you know, we're going back and forth and online, are you sure? You know, you want to move it up to the next level, whatever. I really wanted to kind of keep a distance as I didn't -- I didn't want to have any problems with getting ready to start a job teaching. You know, so, anyways, bottom line, I ended up going to the skating rink. We saw each other face to face. Okay.

23 She introduced me to her friend, Jessica. She told 24 her friend, Jessica, "oh, this is an older teacher of mine." 25 I said, "okay." You know, I went along with it. I don't know

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1 if she felt embarrassed, you know, and she kind of expressed 2 that, you know, because of I was an older man. You know, at 3 that time, and I do have to stop and say, the ad said 34. Now 4 that was never meant to deceive anybody. Like I said, that 5 was a random thing I did, but I believe that she probably 6 thought that I was 34. I never presented that to her, to lie 7 to anybody, to be deceptive, okay?

8 So, at some point, I started thinking to myself, 9 well, I'm going to have to tell her my age because at that 10 time I was 44 and she's 16. You know, a lot of people say, 11 wow, you know, you're 44, she's 16. You know, that's not 12 really a smart thing to do, you know and, so, you know, I'm 13 trying to be cautious.

You know, I mean, I'm beginning to become attracted to her. She's highly intellectual, young lady. Our conversations, I was, like, wow. You know, I'm a teacher and she's keeping up with my conversations. She's going to ATECH. She's getting very, very good grades, you know. And this is one of the things that I started becoming attracted to her was the fact that she was very intellectual.

Now, as you saw in some of the pictures, I'm just --I'm going to stick to the chronology. I'll get into it. I was going to mention something about the games and how she used to win most of the time when we played the games and -and, you know, actually I felt pretty bad a lot of times cause

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here it is someone is just really, really -- and this is what
 really, really attracted me to her was her intelligence.

3 So let me just kind of go back to the time line. So 4 we're at the skating rink. We meet, you know. She's cute. 5 She's looking at me. She's attracted to me. So, you know, I 6 leave. It was nothing special. It was just a face-to-face 7 meeting. Nothing serious.

8 So, you know, I go back home. She goes back home. I 9 -- I don't know what happens after that. We -- we continue 10 our conversations, texting, and communicating on Kix or KIK. 11 KIK is what it is, KIK, KIK. And let me see. Some of our 12 conversations -- and I kind of just jotted down what were some 13 of the topics and some of the things that we discussed in our 14 conversations because, keep in mind, this was not like, you 15 know, where we were 24/7 talking to each other.

I mean, I had things that I had to do during the day. She, you know, she was living with her mother, with her two sisters, her grandmother. She had her day-to-day things and -- and, you know, like I said, we both had our business to take care of so we weren't always in conversations. You know, she would text me, I would text her. We'd talk.

And at this time, she was not the only one that I was talking to. You know, I had just moved to Las Vegas and, you know, I'm a lonely guy. I'm seeking someone to -- to occupy my time with, whether it's going to develop a

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relationship or not, you know, it's hard to say, you know,
but, nonetheless, I was seeking to -- to familiarize myself.
I'm new in town. I don't know anybody here. You know, my
closest family is in California. After that, my brother's in
Oklahoma. So, you know, I'm the only one in Las Vegas. I'm
all by myself, starting a new job, got my own place.

So long story short, one of the things that we talked about was emancipation. Now, I don't remember how the conversation came up. I think she was telling me -- we started talking about some of the issues that she was having with her mother. She said there was some conflicts. I said, 'okay." You know, I mean, I tried to explain to her, well, you know, that's normal.

14 You know -- you know, sometimes, you know, people 15 your age are going to have conflicts with their parents. I 16 know I had conflicts with my parents when I was that age. I 17 think most people when they're at that age, they have 18 conflicts. So, you know, she was talking about, well, you 19 know, I have a job, and I want to live on my own, and I'm 20 getting tired of living with my mother. And I said, you know, 21 "come on, this is" ---

MS. BLUTH: Judge, I apologize -- I apologize, Mr. Sprowson. I'm going to object to anything that Jaysenia said because that would be hearsay unless there's an applicable exception.

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1 MR. SPROWSON: Well, okay, there was just a conflict 2 she made me aware of. Is that fair?

3 THE COURT: I'll allow a little bit of leeway, but. 4 MR. SPROWSON: Just -- just a conflict. Well, 5 anyways, what I was trying to lead into the conversation 6 because the conversation's a result of -- well, the whole 7 conversation about the emancipation was a result of the 8 conflict she was having. That's what she mentioned. Is that 9 fair?

10

THE COURT: That's fine.

11 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. All right. So, anyways, we 12 started talking about emancipation. So I said, well, you 13 know, I said, "if a person, what I know, when a person wants 14 to become emancipated, a lot of times what they do is they 15 have to go to a judge and they have to prove to a judge that, 16 number one, you got a job, that you can support yourself." Ι 17 said, you know, "you have to -- a lot of times you have to see 18 an attorney. You know, an attorney will probably go ahead and 19 they'll start the process."

And I was just familiarizing her with what I knew about emancipation. In no way was I suggesting it to her. And, like I said, I can't speak for Jaysenia. I can't speak how she took that, but what I understood was she was asking me for advice on it. I gave her advice, this is how it works. And she said, "well, you know, I want to see if I can" --

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1 well, again, I'm not going to get into what she said. But at 2 some point what I did was, I said, "well, if you want me to, 3 if you need to and if you can, I will take you to an attorney 4 and we'll see what they say and see what you have to do." 5 Because she had told me, "well, I'm working at the Omelet 6 House" --7 MS. BLUTH: Objection, still for hearsay. 8 MR. SPROWSON: Well, she already stated she was 9 working at the Omelet House. 10 THE COURT: I'll give you a little bit of leeway. 11 MR. SPROWSON: I mean, she did say, it's on the 12 record she was working at the Omelet House. 13 THE COURT: Just --14 MR. SPROWSON: Right? 15 THE COURT: Continue. 16 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. So, anyways, let me get back 17 to where I was. Anyways, long story short, I had kind of gave 18 her the gist and the summary of what involved emancipation. 19 Okay. And, again, I never intended to suggest to her that she 20 should become emancipated. I was trying to advise her on what 21 I thought she wanted to know. 2.2 And, so, let's see -- oh. Fast approaching was the 23 school season. School season was coming up and school 24 shopping. Most parents buy school clothes for their kids, I

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think, at this time. And we had a conversation and she --

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well, I can't get into what she told me, but, at some point, I
 offered to give her \$150 to help her with the school clothes
 so she wouldn't have to share the money with her sisters.

Now, keep in mind, I gave her this money to buy for
school clothes. Now, I'm going to talk about this topic a
little bit later and why that story changed a little bit, but,
at this point in time, I wired directly into her account
knowing full well that my name would be attached to that \$150.
It's very important.

I knew full well that the recipient would know my name and I knew full well that her mother was attached to that account, okay? I did this knowing that her mother would know that that money would be attached and in that account. Now, at that point -- that concludes the whole issue of the \$150 and that was my intention was for her to buy school clothes.

This was someone I was becoming interested in. This was someone I was becoming attracted to. This was someone that I wanted to go to school and do well. And, so, part of that is buying her -- or not buying her, but providing her funds to buy school clothes. So I will kind of close with the school clothes.

Let's see. And I'm just going to back up a little bit. Like I said, there's a lot of things that happened during this two-month period of time, so I'm going to try to go as much in order as possible, but some of this stuff is

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kind of -- like I said, it was three years ago.

2 So one of the incidents that came up -- and I believe this incident -- I can't remember if it was during 3 4 when she was going to school, if it was prior to her going to 5 school because school had started. She started going to school. I started working. I was, you know, brand new 6 7 teacher at Wengert Elementary and there came an issue with a 8 time where she said, "hey, I'm going to spend the night" --9 well, again, I can't get into what she said.

How can I frame this? There came a time where she spent the night at my house and I had picked her up from this place called Bocca Park. I didn't even know where it was. Like I said, I'm not from Las Vegas. I don't know this area. I don't know where anything is at. But there came a time when I had picked her up and she was supposed to spend the night with her friend, Jessica.

Somehow she suggested that I spend the night -- that 17 18 she wanted to spend the night with me. So I said, "okay, is 19 that all right with your mom and you're not going to get in 20 trouble?" And she said, "no, I'm not going to get into 21 trouble." I don't know what the response was about the mom. 2.2 She just said -- I think my main focus was, you're not going 23 to get into trouble, are you? She said, "no." So I said, 24 "okav."

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Again, I was kind of reluctant at first, but, you

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1 know, she kept insisting and she said, "come on, you know, I
2 want to spend the night" -- well, again, I can't get into what
3 she said, but, anyways, she came to -- I went, I picked her up
4 from there, from this place called Bocca Park. I think it's
5 over by where Jessica lives. I'm not exactly sure because I
6 got the directions from Jaysenia. That's how I even knew
7 where it was.

8 So once I pick her up, I bring her back to my house 9 and she's going to spend the night. That was the plan, she 10 was going to spend the night. And, you know, the relationship 11 is starting to develop and we kiss for the first time. So we 12 had our first kiss and, you know, things start settling down. 13 We watched a little TV. We started having more of a 14 conversation, getting to know each other more. You know, we 15 became really, really attracted to each other.

And, so, during that night we made love because I knew I was not doing anything unlawful. In the State of Nevada, 16 is the age of sexual consent, so it wasn't, like, oh, you know, I'm doing something wrong. This was something that I legally did. This is someone that I was attracted to. Someone that I had -- I can't -- I think it was prior to that I had asked her, you know, do you want to be my girlfriend?

I can't remember if it was online or if it was this very night, but, at some point, she was my girlfriend and we had consummated the relationship. We made love that night.

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And, then, the next day came and she wanted to spend the night
 again. I said, "well, you're going to have to call your mom."
 So she calls her mom and she said her mom said it was okay.

I didn't hear the conversation so I don't know if -like I said, I can't speak for Jaysenia, but all I know is that "I told you, you got to call your mom." She called her mom. She said it was okay. I was, like, okay, fine. All right. So she spends the night again. You know, kind of the same old thing, you know.

We're having conversations, watching TV, you know, getting to know each other. We're boyfriend-girlfriend. We're enjoying each other's company. Eventually, the next day I take her home to her house, I drop her off in front of her house. This was day time. It's not at night. Not in secret. I drop her off in front of her house, day time. She gets out, she goes to her house, she goes in. I go back home. Okay.

17 So, of course, we continue our conversations, you 18 know, texting and something came up. Again, Jaysenia -- well, 19 I got to be careful when I say this. When I called Jaysenia, 20 she would give me times when she would want me to call her. 21 Now, I can't, like I said, I can't get into the conversations 2.2 and say what she said, but there were -- you know, I was 23 instructed to call her during this time or during this time or 24 during this time.

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You know, like I said, I can't get into whether

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there were issues or whatever with her mom or stuff like that, but, like I said, I was instructed when she wanted me to call her. So I said, "okay, it's not a problem." You know, I don't mind. You know, you want me to call you at this time. I'll call you at this time. Okay. Let's see.

6 Oh. Let me back up a little bit. I forgot. Okay. 7 Prior to me taking her back home when she spent the night, 8 there was the issue of the diamond ring. Now, when I was in 9 California I bought this ring. I was actually engaged to be 10 married in California and I had bought an engagement ring. 11 That relationship did not work out, so I had this engagement 12 ring that I bought. It cost me a great deal of money.

And it wasn't something that I was flippant about. You know, this was something that I highly valued and I had it -- I had it in my closet. I had it with me. You know, and, so, here it is I have this young lady as my girlfriend and, you know, I had her try it on and actually fit her finger. I said, "okay. You know what? I'm going to go ahead and give this to you as a promise ring," you know?

I mean, at some point, you know, you really don't know if a relationship is going to work out or not, but, you know, you give it your best shot and I'm -- I'm kind of a romantic, you know. Forgive me, but I am kind of a romantic and, you know, I like to try to be romantic about things. Now, I thought it was a very sweet gesture to her.

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1 It wasn't meant to try to do anything other than 2 just to say, hey, you know what? If things work out, you 3 know, then, why don't we -- because one of the things with the 4 ring is -- for the ladies here in the jury that know about 5 rings -- sometimes you have that soft metal. It was kind of 6 white gold and it's kind of soft. So on the bottom of it 7 because it had been worn before, it had, like, some chip 8 marks, like, little scratches and stuff on it. 9 So I said, you know, "hey, if things work out in our 10 relationship, what we're going to do is I'm going to take 11 that" -- the diamond -- cause the diamond's worth -- really 12 was worth the money. You know, it had -- I think they call it an ICG or something. There's a number that goes on it. 13 Т 14 bought it from -- I don't know if you're familiar with it. 15 It's called the Jewelry Exchange in California. I don't know 16 if you ever heard of it. Here in Vegas I don't know if they 17 have commercials for it. It's called the Jewelry Exchange. 18 That's where I bought it in Tustin, California.

And, so, what I told her was -- well, you know, because of these chips on here, I -- I don't think it would be fair. I mean, would you want somebody to give you a ring that's got chips on it? You know, I said, "look, you know what? Why don't you go ahead and wear it. Later on if things work out, what we'll do is we'll take the diamond out, we'll put it into another band and, you know, we'll use it as an

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engagement ring, if we get that far."

Like I said, you know, I'm a romantic, so it was --I thought it was a sweet gesture. Well, come to find out this -- this ring created a lot of problems because she put it on a necklace and she brought it home and, at some point, her mom had discovered it and, wow, it created -- from -- from what I found out, it created a lot f problems.

8 And, you know, let's see. I have to be careful how 9 I kind of navigate through the next things here because there 10 are certain things I can say and certain things I can't say.

MS. BLUTH: Judge, I'm going to object to thenarrative in regards to court rulings.

MR. SPROWSON: Well, I mean, I just -MS. BLUTH: Can we approach?
MR. SPROWSON: Can I say I navigate as best I can.
THE COURT: Hold on. She's not the one you ask,
number one.

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MR. SPROWSON: Okay.

19 THE COURT: But as far as just -- give your
20 testimony.

21 MR. SPROWSON: Okay.

22THE COURT: But just don't have all the little23comments --

24MR. SPROWSON: Okay. I won't. I'll try not to.25THE COURT: -- about, oh, I can't go into this or I

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can't go into that.

2 MR. SPROWSON: All right. All right. Well, okay, 3 so let's see. Well, at some point, I found out that she had 4 been grounded for two years and her computer and phone was 5 taken away. I'm going to kind of leave it at that. She had 6 expressed to me -- well, let's see, how can I say this?

I found out that -- that her mom would not have approved of our relationship. Now, and maybe a lot of people would not approve of our relationship. I'm a 44-year-old man, at this time she's 16. A lot of people say, well, you know, that's a big age difference. Don't you think you can find someone your own age, you know?

I've dated -- I've dated eight women my age, older
than me, younger than me, various ages, you know? For me,
it's an issue of love, attraction and, you know, I always kind
of like to test the waters, you know. And at some point, I
was developing a relationship with Jaysenia.

So I found out this information and -- about her being grounded. Okay. Now, at some point her computer and her phone get taken away from her again and, so, there is, like, a time period, I think probably like a day or two -- I can't remember how much time it was -- where there was no communication.

And we communicated through email. We communicated through KIK. And at some point, I get an email -- I was

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starting to get concerned because I had not -- I had not heard from her. I was wondering what had happened. And, so, I get an email from her and she was telling me -- well, again, I can't get into -- I get an email from her and -- how can I say this? She's not allowed to -- she's grounded. She's not allowed to talk to me and I don't know -- let's see.

7 I'm trying to figure out a way to phrase this. 8 Forgive me. So, at some point, she's grounded. She's not 9 allowed to talk to me and this is of concern for her. So, at 10 some point, I start getting more emails from her and we're 11 going back and forth, and what I'm getting from her is that 12 she's concerned that we're not going to be able to talk 13 anymore, that the relationship is going to be ended. We're 14 not going to be able to continue. This is what I'm getting 15 from the conversation.

And, so, I expressed to Jaysenia, you know, why don't you just let things calm down? If there's an issue with your mother, I'm sure it will -- it will calm down, you know. Let's wait till -- you know, Thanksgiving is going to come up in November. I think this time we had just started school. It was August, September. It was probably August time.

I said, you know what? The concern was that she would never be able to talk to me again. This is what the concern was, so it was kind of -- I felt it was -- it was urgent. It was kind of an urgent thing for her because she

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1 was -- there -- the feeling I was getting from her is that she 2 was very concerned and very worried about that.

And, so, what I tried to express to her was, look, you know, these things happen, let it calm down. So, again, the emails continue and I had found out that she wasn't supposed to be -- she was grounded and she wasn't supposed to be on her computer. I said, "well, what are you doing on your computer? I thought you were grounded."

9 And, let me see, she was supposed to be doing a 10 homework project. And, so, what I got from the conversation 11 was that she was wanting me to come pick her up. And I said, 12 "look, I can't come pick you up," you know what I mean? And, 13 so, it goes back and forth. I'm expressing to her my 14 reluctance.

I even tell her, "is this something that you and your mom are scooping up to, you know, try to extort money from me or something?" And I was kind of serious about that because, I don't know, just the way things kind of happened I was becoming suspicious.

So at some point, you know, she -- she continues and she -- she says this one thing in the email, she says, you know, "if you don't come get me tonight, I'm going to kill myself." I'm, like, wow. What do I do? And, so, you know, I thought about it and I thought about it and, you know, I'm getting concerned, you know, because without getting into all

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our conversations and saying what she said, you know, there were things that -- that I had perceived that there was some -- some issues going on just emotionally with this young lady and, so, I was becoming concerned.

5 And, so, at some point I gave in and I said, "okay, 6 well, what time do you want me to pick you up?" Okay. So I 7 got the time. You know, it was early in the morning. I had 8 to go to work the next day, so, I'm, like, you know. So I 9 figure if I pick her up, she'll calm down. You know, my 10 intention was never, never ever for her to stay with me. My 11 intention and my purpose of picking her up was just to get her 12 to calm down.

You know, it was never for her to stay with me long term or anything like that. And some people might say -well, I'm not going to get into what people might say. One of the things that I thought of, well, maybe I should take her to a hospital or maybe I should say something to somebody. [Inaudible] well, you know what? Maybe that's just kind of jumping the gun.

20 Why don't I just pick her up, she'll calm down. 21 I'll take her back home. We'll explain things to her mom. 22 Okay. This is what my thought process was, you know? So, 23 anyways, I pick her up and I take her back to my home and she 24 calms down. You know, she's calming down. She's relaxing. 25 And she suggests to me, "hey, why don't you change your phone

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1 number?" So I'm thinking, well, you know, this is kind of odd
2 because I had just been talking to her using this phone number
3 repeatedly.

And, so, to set her at ease, I said, "well, okay." You know, and I was going to change my phone number anyway. This is what I eventually told the police. So what I didn't tell the police was that I also wanted to set this young lady at ease because I was sensing some emotional issues going on with her and I was very concerned.

I also -- oh. Let me not forget this. There was an issue of items that she had brought with her. Now, first I want to say, I never told her, "hey, why don't you bring a big, whole backpack full of clothes and you're going to stay here for the rest of your life." I never did that.

15 What I did tell her to bring was her Social Security 16 card and her birth certificate, and I had a reason for that. 17 I didn't disclose that to her. I'm thinking, like, here's a 18 person that's attempting -- or not attempting, but is 19 threatening to kill themselves. What if they actually do that 20 at my house? Well, I need to have some kind of paperwork to 21 say who she is and just in case -- I'm not familiar with these 2.2 things.

Like I said, I didn't even know where hospitals are in Las Vegas. I -- I don't know the area and, at this point, I don't know a lot of people. So I don't -- I probably did

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not exercise the best judgment in this situation, I -- I will absolutely admit to that. But my intention, again, was her concern, her -- I mean, my concern was her safety and the whole issue of her threatening to kill herself.

5 I mean, let me just kind of stop and say something. 6 I'm a teacher. I have taught before. I'm not a brand new 7 teacher. I wasn't a brand new teacher at this time. I've had 8 students tell me before that they're going to kill themselves 9 and, you know, I say -- I'm thinking, hey, are you joking or 10 what?

And you want the teachers to kind of take this a little bit serious, you know, and the predicament that I was in is this is a young lady I'm in a relationship with. So should I rush her to the hospital or should I kind of just, you know what? We're in a relationship, maybe I can calm her down, just take her back to her mom, you know? So I figured the latter was the best thing to do.

18 So, eventually, she -- she ends up at my place. Like I said, the whole issue with the phone thing came up. 19 20 Hey, why don't you change your number? Set her at ease, I 21 decided to do that. I was going to do it anyways. It wasn't 2.2 anything more than that. You know, like I said, I had been 23 using that number repeatedly. Wasn't trying to hide, wasn't 24 trying to conceal anything, and I don't know what else to say 25 about that. It was necessary to talk about that, so let me

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move on.

Let's see, and I just want to say, you know, I did notice that when she came over she was a little bit anxious. She was a little bit nervous and, you know, I -- I wanted to kind of, just like I said, calm her down. My intention was her health, her wellbeing. You know, I -- I'd only known her for about, maybe -- let's see.

8 This was the end of August. It was August 28th, 9 2013. It could have been the 29th because it was after 12:00, 10 so it was probably more like the 29th. And I think, when did 11 we start -- we started dating, I think it was maybe about a 12 month that we had known each other and, you know, I can't 13 really -- I think it was probably within a month prior to 14 that.

So -- so, anyways, I -- I had already -- by the way, school had already started. I -- I'm not sure. Let's see, August, I think it was early August when school had started this year. I think it was in 2013, I'm not sure, but I'm just guessing on this, it could have been around August 12th, approximation. I think it was the middle of August, so this would have been, like, two weeks into school.

So she had been attending school and I had been attending work. I had been going to work. I just started my job. And, so, anyways, this night had happened, she came to stay with me. So that following morning I went to work.

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During my lunch break and stuff I'd call her and text and say, "hey, are you okay?" She had her phone. I can't remember if I texted her. I think I texted her. She said she didn't use her phone, but I believe that I texted her, might have been on the computer. I'm not sure. But I know that I had -- I inquired on whether she was okay or not. And she said everything was okay.

8 So my work day had finished. I went home and we had 9 discussed -- I said, "are you okay?" She said she's okay, 10 she's feeling [inaudible]. So I'm sensing that she's starting 11 to calm down. Again, this was never intended to be two 12 months. I mean, this lasts two months and I'm going to get 13 into that whole time period.

So now we're into the two-month time period is about ready to begin. She's -- she's now at my home. I'm concerned about her and, you know, like I said, I'm still thinking in my mind, you know, should I call somebody? Should I take her to the hospital? And I'm sensing from her that she's a very -yery sensitive person, very, very, very sensitive person.

So she's the type of person, what I perceived, as someone you don't want to force or push to do something. And, so, you know, I'm trying to navigate through this carefully. So she's staying there and she has her clothes there. Again, I just want to say -- I didn't tell her, you know, to bring a whole sack full of clothes, whatever.

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We've seen pictures of clothes and stuff. I didn't tell her to bring all those things. That was up to her. I didn't ask her to -- you know, only thing I did ask her -again, I'll state it again, to bring the Social Security card and birth certificate and that was for the purpose in case of an emergency. Let me see.

7 The other thing was -- now, the next question that 8 came up in my mind was the issue of school because school had 9 started and, like I said, it was never meant to be an intended 10 long stay. I wanted her to go to school. So I wasn't sure --11 you know, at some point, I was expecting her to go back to her 12 -- her mom, you know, so, but I wanted her to make that 13 decision.

14 I didn't want her to perceive that I'm trying to 15 force her because we had just started a relationship and as 16 she's -- she does have -- what I sense, she is a very, very, 17 very emotional, young lady. So, like I said, I didn't want to 18 -- she's already threatening to kill herself, I don't want to, 19 like, you know, push too much. I wanted her to make that 20 decision so that she felt comfortable with it. And I wanted 21 to be sensitive about it. I'm not saying I did the right 2.2 thing, but I wanted to be sensitive about it. Okay.

Now, as -- as time is going by, I asked her, I said,
"well, do you want me to take you home?" She would say, "I am
home." So I was starting to think, well, now she's starting

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1 to get a little too comfortable. And, again, I just want to 2 stop and make a comment. I'm not trying to blame Jaysenia for 3 anything in this --

MS. BLUTH: Judge, I'm going to object to him -- I understand he has to do a narrative, but it still has to be relevant and it can't be what he's trying or not trying to do.

THE COURT: I agree with the State.

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MR. SPROWSON: Okay. All right. So, anyways, at this point, so, I'm asking her, "do you want me to take you home?" She says, "I am home." Okay. Then, there are other occasions where I would drive her by her house hoping that she'd say, hey, take me home, this was my home. That she'd say, you know, I'm ready to go home. You know, driving by her house, hope she starts missing her home.

I showed her how to get home. Keep in mind, she worked at the Omelet House. She only lived 1.7 miles from where I lived. When I drove by her house, I said, "look, this is how you get home if you want to go home when I'm at work." J purposely showed her how to get home and, again, with an expectation that maybe she would go home. Again, I'm trying to be sensitive with this. Let's see.

Time is going by. Now it's starting to get into a week, two weeks, she's still there. I did not sense that she was feeling abandoned or anything like that. You know, I -- I did -- I would go shopping. I'd buy -- there was food there.

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Some of it was frozen, yeah, because from what I recollect, she -- she didn't really know how to cook too many things, so, I wanted to have things at the house that she could make. You know, I had a microwave. You put it in the microwave 30 seconds, three minutes. It's not a very hard, complex thing to do. So one of my concerns was that she was eating.

7 She had food. There were vegetables there. There 8 was fruit there. I like vegetables. I like fruit. And, you 9 know, I did cook on several occasions when I would come home. 10 I would go shopping and buy food. Again, this was not with an 11 expectation of long-term stay. This was just, look, from day 12 to day you got to have food, you got to have stuff in the 13 house. Those things were provided for myself and for the 14 young lady. Let's see.

The issue of alcohol came up. I like to drink beer. I like to have a wine cooler. Sometimes I like to have a shot of whiskey. I had these things at my house and on occasion on weekends I like to drink, I like to have a beer. Some people do. Some people don't. It's a matter of preference.

20 So, anyways, two occasions she had drank some 21 alcohol. I had some wine coolers. She drank a wine cooler. 22 This was not with my approval, okay? Another occasion she had 23 drank some whiskey. Again, this was not with my approval. 24 And both times I did get upset with her. I said, look, you 25 know, at some point, you know, I'm -- this is my thought

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process. At some point she's got to go home, but at the same time I don't want to push her, but now, you know, she's doing things that I know should not be done and not with my approval. So as far as the alcohol thing, I did admonish her, "look, you know, I don't want you drinking my alcohol," okay?

6 Now, on one of the occasions or maybe two -- now, I 7 had started this narrative with the fact that my brother came 8 to visit me. He left these -- these heavy sweaters, ROTC. 9 You know, he's in the Army. He's retired. He's teaching 10 ROTC. He brought all of this stuff with him during his visit. 11 And, so, I had given to Jaysenia a lot of these things. I 12 said, "I have them in my closet." I said, "pick what you 13 want."

14 Now, keep in mind, this time period it's starting to 15 get a little bit chilly at night. I believe it's -- I don't 16 know, it's like getting -- I don't know. Some of the nights 17 were kind of chilly from what I recollect and we were going on 18 drives at night and we were going on drives during the day. 19 So I suggested that -- you know, I had given her some of those 20 So there was a couple of times I said, "why don't sweaters. 21 you wear the sweaters?"

And, you know, also, I had baseball caps. Now, this was not intended for her to be hiding or concealing herself from anybody. This was to keep her a little bit warm. I, also, I had a jacket. I don't think she had a jacket. I

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don't think she brought a jacket with her from what I
recollect in the clothing and stuff that she brought. I don't
think there was a jacket, so -- so I had those sweaters. I
gave her some of them and on a couple of occasions she wore
those sweaters and she did wear the baseball cap. I wore the
baseball caps. They were kind of cool. They were brand new.
They said "ROTC" on them. Okay.

8 So more time is going by now. So, at this point, 9 I'm starting to get a little upset and, so, I get upset with 10 her. I said, "look," you know -- you know, "you're going to 11 have to go home at some point." And keep in mind, when she 12 was there, I have Internet access, okay? I have a TV. A lot 13 of times I would observe -- when I would come home I would be 14 tired from work, I'd watch TV. She would be on the Internet, 15 okay?

16 She played games on the Internet. I saw this. She 17 played games on the Internet. She did a few other things on 18 the Internet. Looking, shopping, different -- different web 19 sites and things like that. The reason why I'm bringing this 20 up and the relevance of this is there was one occasion where I 21 came home and she was talking with somebody on the computer.

And I said, "well, you know, who are you talking to?" So I looked over and I noticed that she's talking to an older man. So here I am. I get upset. Here I am. She's talking to an older man. She's at my house. What's going on?

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So I'm getting jealous. I'm getting upset because, you know, I'm starting to think, hey, you know, you're not wanting to kill yourself. This is a good time that I can -- you know what? Now I get really upset. You got to go home. Pack your stuff up. You're going home. Okay?

6 So she does. She packs her stuff up. She's 7 teary-eyed. I get teary-eyed. We get emotional. Bottom line 8 is, you know, we resolve -- okay, you know what? I don't want 9 to push you. I don't want you to get upset. She ended up 10 staying. Okay. Time goes by. Again, I'm trying to keep this 11 in a chronological order. Okay.

12 There -- there was one occasion where I -- I believe 13 this may have been a month into it -- I'm not exactly sure. 14 Like I said, this was three years ago -- where an investigator 15 came by the house and he knocks on the door, I answered the 16 door, and he asked for Jaysenia. Well, I'm thinking to 17 myself, you know, it's been a while, I -- I don't want to get 18 in trouble. I'm thinking, you know, I'm going to have to take 19 her back home and, you know, at some point, she's -- she's got 20 to go home.

And he asks me, he goes, "hey, have you seen Jaysenia?" So, you know, at -- at this point, I don't want to get in trouble. I'll be honest with you. I don't want to get in trouble. I'm thinking, hey, you know what? You know, this is -- this is -- if there's an investigator showing up, maybe

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there's something going on.

2	So I said you know, I don't want to get in
3	trouble, so I tell "him, no, I don't know where she's at,
4	she's not here." Okay. So he leaves, closes the door. I
5	tell Jaysenia, you know, "look, now there's an investigator
6	looking for you." And I'm I'm not sure if I have the right
7	time period on this. I know there was that came after.
8	So, anyways, so, after he leaves, I tell her, you
9	know, again again, I'm insisting that she goes home. And
10	keeping in mind just the the emotional issues with her.
11	Now, I know that at this point, you know, this is something
12	that now it's it's already a month into it, you know? And
13	this is why I'm saying that I'm thinking that, well, hey, I
14	don't want to get into trouble because she's already been here
15	a month. I've been insisting that she go home. I don't want
16	to push the issue because, you know, I I for one, I
17	don't want to get in, two and, for two, I don't want her to
18	end up hurting herself as she already threatened to do.
19	So I tell her, look, you know, an investigator
20	showed up. She had run run upstairs at this time when he
21	knocked on the door and when I answered it. And, so, I don't
22	know if she heard the conversation or not, but, again, I did
23	tell the individual, "I don't know where she's at, she's not
24	here." I didn't want to get in trouble. That was my
25	intention.

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So, again, now things are starting to get a little bit -- a little bit more, how can I say, concerning for me because now you've got an investigator coming, she's already threatened to kill herself, so what do I do? How do I handle this? I don't always make the best decisions, so I'm -- I'm trying to figure this out for myself. What am I going to do with this situation?

8 So more time comes by. Again, I'm -- I'm kind of 9 fast forward a little bit. There was an occasion when -- I 10 believe, I don't know if it was a Detective Gates from 11 Henderson Police? I believe that's who he was, Detective 12 Gates, but, anyway, it was an individual -- the individual 13 that was here. He also inquires about her and I lied to him. 14 I lied to him. I said, "I don't know where she's at."

And, again, I don't want to get in trouble. At this point I'm thinking, you know, now I'm going to get in trouble. She's been here a while, you know, what do I do? I'm caught between kind of a catch-22 here. I don't want her to hurt herself. At the same time, I don't want to get in trouble, you know? So what do I do?

So I lie to him. I say, "hey, you know what? I don't know where she's at," you know what I mean? He asked me, I believe -- I don't know if it was Gates or the other --I think it was Gates. He asked me about the \$150. I said, "well, you know, I gave her a loan, she was supposed to pay it

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1 back." You know, I knew she had a job. I -- I lied to him 2 about that.

So I think he goes and -- trying to remember if there was another investigator. I think after Gates, I think there was another investigator, he had called me. I can't remember if it was from Henderson. And he had, also, inquired about her. And, again, like I said, I'm -- I'm in a predicament here that I'm not sure how to get out of. I don't want her to hurt herself.

I don't want her to kill herself and at the same time, I don't want to get in trouble, but now I'm already into it. This is already a month -- probably a month and a half into the whole scenario. I'm insisting that she go home. I don't want to force her because she's a very sensitive, young lady. My concern for her is that, you know, if I do force her, you know, something may happen to her, you know?

And, so, at some point -- and, again, I'm just going to go over the police incidents and I may go back to some of the stuff. I'm just trying to recollect everything because there's a lot of stuff that happened over that two-month period of time. So I'm going to try to just discuss the police stuff.

23 So, at some point, I believe it was -- I think it 24 was Officer Abbott that came to Wengert Elementary and he 25 asked to interview me. And, again, he asked me, he's, like,

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hey, you know -- or wait a minute. Let me back up. I don't know if it was the investigator or if it was Gates that gave me -- there was a missing children's flyer that was given to me. I think it was either Gates or the investigator, I can't recollect which one it was, but, at some point, this missing -- missing flyer was given to me and I had brought it home and I showed it to her.

I said, "look, you know, your mom is looking for you." We looked on the Internet because I think there was a website or something on there. I can't remember. We looked on the Internet. I said, "look, your mom is looking" -here's -- here's -- I'm starting to get hopeful now because I'm thinking, hey, you know, maybe she's going to go home at this point. And, again, not trying to blame anybody.

So I'm getting hopeful that, you know, this is going to persuade her to go home. And now I'm going to speed it back up to when Abbott got involved. I just wanted to make sure I don't forget the missing flyer because that -- I did have that on my counter, they did find it there, I did bring it home and I did show it to her and I was hopeful that this would be the persuading factor that she would go home.

So I think Abbott -- when Abbott comes and visits me, he asks me the same thing. I'm, like, you know what? I don't want to get in trouble. I'm thinking at this point I'm going to have to take this young lady home whether she wants

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to or not. She has got to go home because now the police are
 inquiring at my work, I've got to take this young lady home.

So I lie to him. I say, "no, I don't know where she's at." And the only reason I lied to him is -- well, for two reasons. One, I didn't want to get in trouble and, for two, is you know what? This -- this is now -- this is the -the cake -- the icing on the cake. She has got to go home. She has got to go home.

9 And, so, I believe that this was on October 31st. 10 This was Halloween. And I can't remember the other officer. 11 I think -- was it -- I think it was Platt. It was Abbott and 12 Platt. I can't remember which officer it was, but it was 13 Abbott with another officer. And I came home that day, this 14 was Halloween, and I said, "look, this -- this is the final 15 straw, you have got to go home."

So we had had a discussion, and I said, "I'm going to take you home this weekend." I said, "today's Halloween, I'm going to take you home this weekend." Well, unfortunately for me, the next day was November 1st and November 1st, Officer Abbott, while I was at work, had came to my residence and through whatever means discovered Jaysenia at my residence.

Now, I'm going to back up just a little bit cause there's something very significant that has to be said because I'm almost at the tail end of my presentation. So that night

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1 before I go to work on November 1st -- and I find this in 2 retrospect very interesting -- Jaysenia tells me about a 3 nightmare. She tells me about a nightmare that she had that 4 night. And I said -- she's telling me, you know what? Don't go to work, stay here with me. I said, "why?" She said, "I 5 6 had a nightmare that the police are going to find me." I 7 said, "you know what? It's okay. I'm going to take you home 8 this weekend anyway, don't worry about it. It's going to be 9 fine," you know? I said, you know, "I'm taking you home this 10 weekend, don't worry about it."

11 And she was really adamant -- this is my impression. 12 I'm just telling my impressions. She was really adamant about 13 being found and she did not want to be discovered, and this 14 was my impression. So, like, again, I said, "don't worry 15 about it." And I just kind of -- before I go on in the rest 16 of this, I want to kind of back up a little bit. Like I said, 17 I've had to take notes because there's a whole lot of 18 information. I'm trying to compress a two-month period of 19 time in -- in a short period of time here.

One of the things that came up in our conversations -- and I'm going to be careful in this. One of the things that came up in our conversation that we had was that she had previously been attending therapy and this had been ongoing for two years. She had been receiving counseling and I don't know what exactly the reasons were. I do believe it was

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something with maybe anxiety or something like that.

2 I'm not exactly sure what she was receiving therapy 3 for, but there was already some ongoing therapy prior to 4 There was already some ongoing counseling prior meeting me. 5 to meeting me and this was one of the factors that really, 6 really lead me to not be too forceful and to compel her to go 7 home. You know, my whole intention was to calm her down, make 8 sure she's okay. I don't want her to kill herself. You know, 9 I mean, like I said, I've had people tell me that before. You 10 don't know when a person is going to actually do it.

11 And, so, like I said, another thing, you got to keep 12 in mind this is someone that I care about, this is someone 13 that I'm developing a relationship with, this is someone that 14 I'm involved with, so it's just -- it's a little bit more than 15 just a -- a passing, hey, you're going to kill yourself, not 16 kill yourself. I'm a person that is actually involved with 17 her and cares about her and wants -- I should say -- is 18 concerned about her wellbeing, okay?

Now, I'm just laying this all out before you
because, you know, ultimately I probably should have taken her
to the hospital. I probably should have brought it to
somebody's attention, but I thought that it would be a little
bit wiser just to try to calm her down myself, try to do it
myself. Since I was her boyfriend I figured she'd listen to
me, you know? And that this would be something passing.

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1	She would go back to her mom, it would be resolved
2	and, at some point, you know, I actually wanted to meet her
3	mother. But, again, think about it. I'm 44, she's 16, ah,
4	you know, some people may be not so accepting of that type of
5	situation. So, again, I was kind of reluctant, so to say, to
6	kind of I don't know say, hey, mom, you know, hey, you
7	know, I want to date your daughter, and so on and so forth.
8	So, you know, it was kind of a touchy situation I had to go
9	about that. So a lot of these things I was trying to navigate
10	through and had to deal with. But, okay, so I'm going to try
11	to go back now to I just wanted to mention that because
12	it's very important.
13	MS. BLUTH: Judge, objection, in regards to his
14	narrative about why he's mentioning certain things.
15	MR. SPROWSON: Okay. Sorry. Anyways
16	THE COURT: I agree. Sustained.
17	MR. SPROWSON: going back to November 1st. So
18	November 1st let's see. Who shows up? I believe it's
19	Officer Abbott again and I think Maciszak, Officer Abbott and
20	Maciszak show up at my work, Wengert Elementary, and, again,
21	they ask me questions about Jaysenia, you know, and he's
22	already asked me about questions about Jaysenia the day
23	before.
24	Now, you all heard that conversation, so I really
25	don't need to go into too much detail. You've already heard

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firsthand what that conversation was about. I did not tell those officers the truth. Again, I did not want to get into trouble and I was already planning on taking her home that weekend. This was Friday, by the way. Halloween was a Thursday. This was a Friday. And it was that weekend that I was going to take her home. I was not going to take no for an answer.

8 Unfortunately, we didn't get to the weekend. 9 Unfortunately, I got arrested on November 1st. And, so, I'm 10 going to get into a little bit more because there's some other 11 things that happened after that. So November 1st I get 12 arrested. I'm six months in jail. I bail out. I get out of 13 this state as fast as I can. I mean, I'm stressing because 14 this was like -- this is, like, a very, very, very stressful 15 time in my life. I was emotionally upset. I flee to my 16 brother in Oklahoma and now I'm [inaudible] because there's a 17 situation with Mr. Patel's testimony today and I'm going to 18 get into a little bit of that as much as possible.

19 So I -- I flee to Oklahoma with my brother now, and 20 I believe this was around -- see, I got arrested on November 21 1st, so six months. It was around maybe May 2nd or so. So 2.2 Judge Miley granted me a bail reduction. I bailed out. There were no conditions at this time. I had mentioned this 23 24 previously -- earlier. There were no conditions on my bail, 25 so I left the state. I paid my bail in full. Went to

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1 Oklahoma, stayed with my brother.

2	Now, my brother is a divorced parent. He has kids.
3	He has three. All of them at that time were minors, okay? So
4	when I first get there, you know, his kids are there. They're
5	visiting. You know, we eat pizza. Good time, whatever,
6	everything is fine. Well, I think about a week into it at
7	this time, I had obtained an attorney by the name of John
8	Momot and Momot was representing me. He's the one that helped
9	me get the bail reduction, he filed the paperwork, et cetera,
10	et cetera, et cetera.
11	And the reason why I'm mentioning Momot because I
12	get a phone call from John Momot probably about a week, week
13	half into it. I'm not exactly what the time period was. I'm
14	approximating here. So he calls me and says, "well, hey,
15	guess what?" I said, "what?" You got you got conditions
16	on your bail. I said, "really?" I said, "is that even
17	legal?" I said, "when I got my bail there was no conditions
18	on my bail."
19	So I'm thinking, like, well, you know, this is kind
20	of fishy, so, but, you know, I wanted to do the right thing.
21	I did the right thing. So the conditions were thus: I had to
22	surrender my passport. Well, when they went into my home, for
23	some reason, my passport came up missing. I don't know where

23 some reason, my passport came up missing. I don't know where 24 it went. I'm not even trying to find out. So I didn't have 25 to worry about that. I wrote something -- he said, "well,

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you're going to have to write something up about that." So I
 wrote a letter. I sent it to him. I don't have my passport.

3 Second condition was not to get on the Internet, 4 okav? Third condition, you're not allowed to be around minors 5 because of your charges. I said, "okay, that's great." Now 6 what am I going to do? My brother has his kids coming over 7 every other weekend. So this is where the motel thing comes 8 in. And as you see, he -- he testified. I spent a great deal 9 of time at this motel on weekends trying to adhere to those 10 conditions.

11 There were many days when I spent the weekends in my 12 car. Park it at a Walmart. Park it at a park, wherever I 13 could. Lawton is -- it's kind of -- it's not a big town. 14 It's not a small town because it's connected to a military 15 base, Fort Sill. So the area is large because the military 16 base is there. You have a lot of military families, so on and 17 so forth, that are in this area. There's parks. It's -- you 18 know, this is -- they have -- they have a lot -- a lot of 19 stuff in this particular area.

So far as -- the reason why I'm -- this is relevant is because, you know, I would go to different wilderness areas, I'd park, or I'd go to a Walmart or I'd go to Food for Less. They had, you know, big, huge parking lots, so, you know, I'd spend my time there. And I did this and the reason why I'm -- I'm bringing this up is because I did this to

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adhere to their conditions.

2 So one of the nights I'm spending -- this is --3 there was a week that I had to rent the motel for a week 4 because my kids -- my brother's kids, my nephews and niece 5 were on Christmas break. This is about the right time, 6 January. Yeah, they were on Christmas break. So my brother 7 says, well, you know, you're going to have to be out of the 8 house for a week if you're going to meet those conditions. So 9 as you've seen, I spent that week at that motel. I was not at 10 my brother's house. Adhering to the State's conditions, to 11 the bail conditions.

So during this time, you know, it's New Year's, it's Christmas, and I'm here at the motel. I don't have my family. I'm by myself. So there's -- there's a little bar down the street. I go there, drink a few drinks. I meet somebody, and this person comes back to -- to the room with me and spends some time with me, and I had disclosed to this individual everything that was going on.

I had no one to talk to. I was really, really
emotionally distraught extremely because I had no one to talk
to about these things, you know, that -- that had happened.
You know, I -- I've never been in jail my entire life and I
just spent six months in the Clark County Detention Center.
You know, it's -- it's --

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MS. BLUTH: Objection. Relevance.

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MR. SPROWSON: Well, anyways -- relevance, I'm just kind of going on to the experience. So, anyways, getting back to the motel, getting back to the motel. So, anyways, so I spill my guts to this individual and I give them a lot of details of what had happened. Now, the weekend -- the week is over. Oh, there's something I have to mention.

So one of the nights that I was with this individual because they weren't -- they weren't actually stay -- they weren't on the -- they weren't supposed to be there. They were just in the room with me spending time with me because, you know, I was there for a week so I wasn't -- so they were spending time with me. I had met this individual at the bar and I was venting, so to say.

14 So let me just kind of speed it up. So I'm -- I'm 15 telling them everything that's going on, all the information 16 that I had, and one of the limitations that I had was the 17 Internet connection. Now, you might find this kind of a 18 little farfetched, but I had actually -- since I don't have 19 Internet, I'm not allowed to get on the Internet, you know, I 20 -- I needed to access email and things like that. I had 21 important things -- my bank account was on the email -- I 2.2 mean, online. I had online everything.

23 So I had given this individual my -- my password and 24 my user name for a lot of different things and I asked them --25 and this was after I'd become acquainted, this is a couple

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days into it so I felt safe with this individual. So I gave
 them this -- only two people had this information was my
 brother and this individual.

So that day -- I should say one of the days -- and I 4 5 have to kind of describe -- Oklahoma is -- is an area where this is January, December, January time, so you get snow and 6 7 It gets very, very cold, and if you're driving on the ice. 8 road, the roads ice up. So I have a Mustang, as you saw. My 9 -- my tires on my Mustang, those are not weather tires. Those 10 are raceway tires. So when you're on the road with ice, 11 you're doing this [indicating].

12 So I believe that -- that one of the evenings I had 13 to go out and I had to -- I was wanting to get some food. We 14 were hungry, so I said, "you know what? Let me go get some 15 food, I'll come right back." So I go out, I'm in my car, I'm 16 on the ice and I end up smacking into a curb. I had to -- had 17 to replace one of the tires. I didn't have a spare tire. My 18 -- my Mustang doesn't have -- it doesn't have -- you know, 19 nowadays they don't have those regular spare tires. You got 20 those little doughnut tires and that thing was -- was not 21 functioning properly, so I had to go and try to find a tire.

So this -- the reason why I'm bringing this up because this took a long period of time to accomplish. So, anyways, I get the tire fixed and I go back to the motel to where the person that was staying with me was and they were

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kind of upset. You know, I was thinking, like, hey, you know,
 it's been a long time, you know, [inaudible] hungry, whatever.

3 So I come back. I bring the food and I explain to 4 them what happened and, you know, she's upset, so she leaves. 5 Now I'm thinking, again, you know, what is it? Because I was 6 late? Whatever. So, at this point, that's kind of the end of 7 it with the motel things. So I go back to my brother's.

And, then, again, Mr. Momot is my attorney still and he gives me a phone call. I get a phone call from him and he says, "hey, are you contacting the alleged victim?" And I'm, like, no. Why? He said, "well, someone said that you were contacting the alleged victim through Instagram." I said, "really?"

So, anyways, without getting into the conversation that my attorney at that time had with me, we -- we had talked about it. I disclosed to him and, at some point, I had to come back here to Nevada --

18 THE COURT: Mr. Sprowson, is there a place we can 19 stop for a second? Some of the jurors need to use the 20 restroom.

MR. SPROWSON: Oh. Okay. I need to, too.
THE COURT: Are you at a stopping point?
MR. SPROWSON: I'm almost ready to wrap it up. Just
can you -- well, I mean, if you need to take a break or -THE COURT: I don't want you to stop in the middle

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1 of anything.

2 MR. SPROWSON: I'm almost -- I'm almost at the end. 3 Give me, like, five, six minutes. I don't know if they want 4 to start their cross right away or --

5 MS. BLUTH: Oh, no. Whatever -- whatever everybody 6 wants. I'm here.

THE COURT: Okay. So I don't know who needs the
break. Can you wait five more minutes? Okay. Mr. Sprowson,
you want to continue.

10 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. Just five more minutes. I'm 11 going to wrap it up, so, I got to go to the bathroom, too. 12 So, anyways, so just to kind of wrap it up, so I -- it's what 13 they call a remand. So it's a remand hearing because one of 14 the conditions was you're not allowed to contact the victim. 15 So I did not contact the victim.

So, anyways, I rush back here to Nevada. I'm remanded. I have a hearing. It's a remand hearing and this may -- well, I have a remand hearing and I end up getting remanded and that means that you are now back in jail. And, so, I'm going to close it right there with that remand, and I guess we're going to take our break.

THE COURT: We're going to take our break. Ladies and gentlemen of the jury, okay, come back in about ten minutes, so come back at 3:50. Don't talk about the case. Don't research the case. Don't form or express an opinion on

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1 this case. Please we'll see you very shortly. 2 (The jury recessed at 3:38 p.m.) 3 THE COURT: Yes, sir. MR. SPROWSON: Can I just review and make sure I 4 5 have everything --6 THE COURT: Yes. 7 MR. SPROWSON: -- before they start their cross? Ι 8 want to make sure I covered everything. 9 THE COURT: Yeah. Yes. Don't go off quite yet. 10 All right. Now that the jury is out of the room, Mr. 11 Sprowson, this is for both you and the State, I received two 12 questions from jurors and they actually came up during other witnesses' questions, but it's really directed to you. 13 So I 14 need to show them to you and the State to see if there are --15 MR. SPROWSON: You want me to step down or --16 THE COURT: Yeah, you want to come over here? I can 17 show them to you. Some of it I think he kind of touched on, 18 actually. 19 MR. SPROWSON: Did you want us to answer this or --20 THE COURT: I can answer them. 21 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. THE COURT: I don't see -- I think you actually 2.2 23 touched on the subject. 24 MR. SPROWSON: Oh. Yeah, I -- I think I addressed 25 that. Was this earlier or --UNCERTIFIED ROUGH DRAFT

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1 THE COURT: No, that was actually received probably 2 after Jaysenia left the stand. 3 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. I don't know if I already 4 answered that, but I can address that again. 5 Is there any objection by the State? THE COURT: 6 MR. SPROWSON: [Inaudible] have an objection? 7 In regards to [inaudible] for the drugs. MS. BLUTH: 8 MR. SPROWSON: The age [inaudible]. 9 MS. BLUTH: I thought he talked already, but I don't 10 have any objection to him. 11 MR. SPROWSON: I can just reiterate it. 12 [Inaudible] any objection. MR. SWEETIN: 13 THE COURT: Okay. 14 MR. SPROWSON: All right. 15 THE COURT: I'll just ask you the questions, that 16 way they can make a record that they've been asked and, then, 17 they're marked because they're court exhibits. 18 MR. SPROWSON: Okay. 19 THE COURT: It means they don't go back to the jury, 20 they just stay in the court record, okay? Is there anything 21 else we need to address? 2.2 MS. BLUTH: No, Your Honor. 23 MR. SPROWSON: Just need to use the restroom, if I 24 can. 25 THE COURT: We'll see you guys in a second. UNCERTIFIED ROUGH DRAFT

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1 (The Court recessed at 3:41 p.m. until 3:53 p.m.) 2 (Outside the presence of the jury.) 3 MR. SPROWSON: Your Honor, I actually forgot, like, three or four different things. 4 5 That's fine. And, then, I'll ask you THE COURT: 6 those two questions, okay? 7 THE RECORDER: I'm on the record. 8 THE COURT: Okay. Let's bring the jury back. 9 (In the presence of the jury.) 10 THE COURT: Ms. Bluth, Mr. Sprowson had a few more 11 things on his direct. 12 MS. BLUTH: Oh. Okay. 13 THE COURT: Mr. Sprowson [inaudible]. All right. 14 Mr. Sprowson, please continue. 15 DIRECT EXAMINATION, resumed 16 MR. SPROWSON: Yeah, I had -- I had -- like I said, 17 I forgot a few things that I wanted to discuss. I was kind of 18 jumping around a little bit. I was trying to go in a 19 chronological order. Couple issues, there's two main issues 20 that I wanted to get into. There's an issue of the school 21 thing. My intentions for her were always to go to school. I 2.2 never bought her books. I bought her crayon books, I think 23 one or two. Her stay was never meant to be long term so 24 that's what I -- I always intended her to go back to her mom 25 and to actually attend school.

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I never intended for her to be missing school for that long period of time and that's why I never bought her any school supplies or anything like that because, you know, my intention was not for her to be home schooled or anything like that. I just wanted to just bring that up because that was an issue.

7 The other thing is, and I totally forgot about this, 8 there was an issue of those pictures. Now, how did that come 9 about? There was a -- during one of our communications, I 10 believe it was through KIK or -- I don't believe it was 11 through email. I do believe it was through KIK. And, again, 12 just for you that don't know what KIK is, it's an application. 13 It's kind of like a messaging application where you can talk 14 back and forth and I think you use -- it's on your phone, you 15 know, through the Internet. You just -- you -- you access 16 KIK, you have a user name, password, you go in there and, 17 then, you can communicate with different users. That's how 18 KIK operates. So this is one of the ways that we actually 19 communicated.

Now, there was an occasion that Jaysenia had brought to my attention. She asked me -- you know, this is already -we've already been familiar with each other, we've been talking for a while and she asks me if I wanted a breast picture. And, you know, at this time she was my girlfriend and I -- I said, "where did you get the breast picture?" And

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1 I -- I can't really -- let's see, how can I frame this? 2 Anyways, she -- she asked me if I wanted a breast 3 picture. I agreed to it. This was not a picture that I had 4 asked for. This is not a picture that -- how can I say it? I 5 didn't know how old this picture was. Let me just say that. 6 I don't know if she had previously taken it, but this was not 7 something at my request. This was something that she asked me 8 if I wanted. I agreed to it. She sent me the picture. It 9 was a breast picture. I said, "okay." 10 Then, our conversation continued. And as you 11 noticed in the pictures, they're not -- some of those pictures 12 you can see she's wearing different things. They were not on 13 different -- they were not all on the same day. They were on 14 different days. Some of those pictures she already had. 15 These were not pictures at my request and she testified to 16 that. 17 MS. BLUTH: Objection. 18 MR. SPROWSON: Well, she already had. She already 19 had. 20 MS. BLUTH: Objection, that misstates her testimony. 21 That was not her testimony at all. She stated she never had 2.2 those photos before him. 23 THE COURT: Your objection is sustained. I do 24 believe that misstates the testimony. 25 MR. SPROWSON: Well, what --

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THE COURT: You can testify to what you know, but I
 believe that it misstates what she --

MR. SPROWSON: Okay. Well, what I know -THE COURT: -- has already testified to.
MR. SPROWSON: Well, what I know is that those -those pictures were not at my request. I don't know if she
had them -- how old -- how can I say it? I don't know how old

9 I'm only talking about some of them, okay? Particularly, the 10 breast picture.

those pictures were. And I'm not talking about all of them.

8

Now, there came a point where she asked me, you know, what kind of poses do you like? So I told her. And, of course, she took some pictures. Now, in some of those pictures she told -- well, in some of those pictures I know they were brand new underwear and she had taken pictures of certain poses with those brand new underwear.

17 So that's how that whole scenario came about. This 18 was not something that I said, hey, you know, I want you to do 19 this for me, do that for me, do this for me. She asked me, 20 "what poses do you like?" I said, "hey, this is what I like. 21 This is what I like." And I will tell you something. There 2.2 are two nude photos. I said, "hey, you know what? Can you 23 send me two nude photos?" She sent me two nude photos. Ι 24 believe the picture where she's in the mirror. I asked for 25 those. Those nude photos I asked for.

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The rest of them, that was a question of what do you like? This is what I like. This was not some kind of direction that I gave her. This was something that I said this is the kind of pose I like. And she took pictures and, then, eventually gave them to me.

I just want to make sure that I've covered everything before I close out my direct examination of myself. I don't believe -- if I touched upon this, but, there were several occasions where I got upset at her and we got upset at each other. I touched on a few of those. They were different scenarios. They weren't all the same scenario.

I believe I've already touched upon the one when she was on the computer and she was talking with the individual on the computer. I touched on that. There was a couple times where I insisted that she go home. I believe I touched upon that.

17 And I think there was one other occasion -- this 18 only happened, like, three or four times by the way. This was 19 not something that was a regular occurrence, you know. And --20 and most of the times when these things happened, it was 21 either I was insisting she go home or it was a situation 2.2 where, like I described, where she was on the computer and 23 talking to someone else. You know, we were supposed to be in 24 a relationship, I felt, but not only that, my concern was, 25 like I already stated, that she was going to hurt herself. So

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I'm thinking, you know, you need to go home if you're going to
 be doing that kind of stuff.

And, like I said, a couple other times I did get upset at her over -- I believe there was an issue with the dishes. Now, how did the dishes come up? Well, I told her, you know, since you've been here a couple days -- I don't know if it was a week into it or something -- you know, can you help me out, at least wash dishes? You know, I'm cooking. You know, you're here. You know, you're not doing anything.

10 And, like I said, my intention was that she would be 11 going -- at some point would go home. So I said, wait, maybe 12 if I have her do dishes and have her do a few chores, maybe 13 she'll be, like, hey, going back home is not so bad. So I 14 asked her to wash the dishes. And, so, a couple times when I 15 came home, you know, I'm going through the dishes, I'm putting 16 them away and they were dirty. So I said, you know, I -- I 17 confronted her about it. I said, "hey, you know, this is not 18 the way you're supposed to wash dishes." She got upset.

You know, she's a very sensitive, young lady. She gets upset very easy. This is one of the reasons why I did not want to push her to go home. And, so, you know, I didn't think it was anything. You know, I'm an older gentleman. She's younger. You know, I'm kind of particular about eating with clean dishes. I don't know about the jury, but, I like to have clean dishes.

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1 She didn't have to do much around the house. Tt. 2 wasn't really like I -- I always told her, you don't have to 3 do this, but it would be nice if you helped me out. I think I 4 asked her to wash clothes a couple times. She said she didn't 5 know how to wash clothes. I had a washer and dryer in the 6 garage. I said, "well, you know, let me show you." 7 So I showed her how to -- you know, this is what you 8 got to do. You got to do the settings, put the clothes in 9 there. You know, put the soap in there. You know, all the 10 whole thing, you know, how you wash clothes and how you, you 11 know, put them in the dryer. It's not a very complicated 12 process. 13 She noticed that I ironed my shirts, you know? T'm 14 a teacher. I -- I wore a tie, dress shirt, dress pants. Ι 15 like to look professional. I like to look nice, whether it's 16 kindergarten or whatever grade. I like to look professional. 17 So, at some point, I even showed her how to iron. I like 18 creases. 19 MS. BLUTH: Judge, I'm going to object as to 20 relevance at this point. 21 MR. SPROWSON: I showed her how to do the creases. 2.2 Well, I'm just -- these are some of the things that she did 23 around the house. 24 THE COURT: I'll allow a little leeway because I do 25 think it has some relevance to some of the charges against

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1 him.

2 MR. SPROWSON: Just some of the things -- yeah. 3 These are some of the things that she did. These were not 4 things that I made her do. Again, she was never -- she was --5 it was never intended for her to say there long term, but 6 while she was there I wanted her to occupy her time and do 7 stuff.

And, also, there -- since this was brought up. There were a couple times we went out on the patio. This apartment complex, this was really nice. It's not a shabby place. It's very nice. It's got four apartments and each one has a patio. I have a three bedroom with a garage and I have a nice, little patio outside with neighbors around in plain view.

15 On occasion, at least two, we went out on the patio. 16 We sat out there. Just, you know, evening time. Took her on 17 drives to the lakes. We went to drive to the lakes. We 18 looked at houses and stuff. You know, I -- I did these things 19 because I noticed that she was -- she was relaxed. She was --20 she was happy. She was comfortable, you know, and she -- she 21 was just at peace. That was my perception. You know, we'd go 2.2 look at houses. You know, how does that look? You know, we'd 23 go drive by the lakes and stuff. It's very relaxing.

A couple times I took her to the store with me. I didn't bring her in. I left her in the car. She -- she --

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1 she had my phone and she was using my phone. I had Internet 2 connection. I'd go in. I'd do the shopping. Come back out 3 with the food. We'd go back to my house. What else?

A couple times, at least, we went to fast food together. El Pollo was one of them. And she had mentioned --I'm trying to remember that one restaurant. It's a Japanese, they had, like, the stir-fry stuff. She used to really like that. So we used to go there, at least, two occasions and we got some of that stuff and we'd bring it back, we'd eat.

10 And, of course, I mean, I was going to work every 11 I was going to work every day and, you know, when I day. 12 would leave, I would be kind of concerned, you know, hoping 13 that everything would be okay with her. Everything seemed 14 fine when I left. She was at peace. She wasn't upset. I ---15 I don't -- at one time at all ever sensed that she was, like, 16 emotionally upset. That's not my perception that I ever got 17 from her.

18 If I had noticed something like that -- remember, my 19 whole concern was her killing herself. You know, if there was 20 anything beyond that that I noticed that she was upset or 21 anything like that, I never noticed it. And, most certainly, 2.2 if I did, I would have done something about it. I did 23 everything that I possibly could to take care of this young lady while she was at my place and it was never intended to be 24 25 long term and it was never intended to be two months.

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I was hoping it would only last maybe that night and she'd go back to her mom and it would be done and over and she wouldn't be threatening to kill herself. You know, I mean, when somebody -- like I said, I think I covered most of it. I just want to review and make sure I've discussed everything that -- there's a lot of things that happened during that time.

8 And, you know, I did have an extensive library at my 9 home and as far as reading and stuff, she -- she did -- she 10 did read my -- I have some educational books. I have some 11 religious books. I have a variety of material at my home. 12 One of the pictures -- they showed you one of the bookcases. 13 That's just a few books. I have another one in my living 14 room. I have a huge bookcase with nothing but books and, you 15 know, several occasions she would be reading these books.

I purchased -- there was a series out that she really liked. And, again, I bought these things for her so that she would be at ease and eventually, like, finally say, you know what? It's time to go home. None of the things that I provided for her were meant to be long term. This was -obviously, she's in my care. I'm not going to neglect her. I'm not going to not feed her, you know?

And bottom line is, you know, I did everything that I could to take care of this young lady. I was very concerned about her all the time. And one other thing and I think I

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will close it off, when I was arrested I had several meetings with my attorney and -- trying to see if I can even say this. Let me see. Sorry. I found out that when she got back home to her mother's that she threatened to kill herself. Not threatened to kill herself, but she -- yeah, she threatened to kill herself.

7 This is the very thing that I was hoping that she 8 would not do and this is the very first thing that she tries 9 to do when she gets back home. You know, I don't even know 10 what to say about that, you know? I mean, I think about it 11 now and it just -- I get upset, you know. She actually tried 12 to do that. You know, all I tried to do was care for her, you 13 know?

And I don't mind being in jail and I don't mind doing the pain and penalties for what I've had to pay, okay? But know one thing. I cared for this young lady and no matter what happens, I cared for her to the best of my ability and I never, never tried to keep her from her mother and I never, ever, ever wanted her to feel like she couldn't have food or anything that she needed.

I'm sorry. I just, you know, I feel bad. I start
thinking about that. I just -- I'm sorry.

THE COURT: I have two questions for Mr. Sprowsonthat were presented by the jury.

25 MR. SPROWSON: Yeah.

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1	MS. BLUTH: Yes, Your Honor.
2	THE COURT: You want to take a second? There's
3	tissue there, sir, if you need it.
4	MR. SPROWSON: Sorry.
5	THE COURT: Are you ready?
6	MR. SPROWSON: Yeah.
7	THE COURT: All right. Mr. Sprowson, this question
8	is from Juror No. 2, Doug Lentz. Why did the Defendant feel
9	the need to lie about his age of 33-year-old on Craigslist
10	from his actual age of 44?
11	MR. SPROWSON: Okay. On that I I think I
12	addressed that. It was a random ad. I just put any number on
13	there. It was a fake ad. I just put whatever. It wasn't
14	meant to be deceptive or anything. I think I addressed that.
15	I just put 34 because I just sorry.
16	THE COURT: Okay. And the next one is from Juror
17	No. 10, Joe [Inaudible]. Was there any drug usage? Did the
18	Defendant give her drugs?
19	MR. SPROWSON: No, she never had any drugs. I don't
20	take drugs. I don't use drugs. She doesn't use drugs. She
21	wasn't pimped out. She wasn't drugged. The only thing was
22	there was alcohol there that she got into and I didn't approve
23	of that. You know, that was the only thing.
24	She was, like I said, I tried to take care of her
25	the best of my ability and, you know, I wish I could have
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1	talked to the mom. I wish I could have felt comfortable and
2	talked to the mom and say, hey, you know what's going on with
3	your daughter? It just, you know, I was in an awkward
4	situation. I'm 44. She's 16, you know.
5	MS. BLUTH: Judge, I'm going to object. This is
6	non-responsive to the question you asked.
7	MR. SPROWSON: I did sorry, I kind of went off on
8	that, sorry, but, no, there were no drugs.
9	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you very much.
10	Cross-examination by the State.
11	MS. BLUTH: Yes.
12	CROSS-EXAMINATION
13	BY MS. BLUTH:
14	Q Mr. Sprowson, how long were you a teacher?
15	A Here in Nevada?
16	Q No. All together.
17	A I think probably about maybe ten years.
18	Q And what age groups did you teach?
19	A Elementary.
20	Q Always the same age or just
21	A Different ages.
22	Q Okay. So, like, tell me the grades.
23	A I've taught when I was here I taught
24	kindergarten. I taught first grade. When I first became a
25	teacher I taught second grade. I taught fourth grade. I
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1 taught fifth grade.

2	Q	Okay. And when you did your opening statement you
3	said that	your like, your expertise, your specialization is
4	in childre	en?
5	А	Well, it's not
6	Q	Did you say that?
7	А	Well, my my specialty is not in children. My
8	specialty	is in education.
9	Q	Okay. So, obviously, as a teacher you know the
10	importance	e of education?
11	A	Absolutely.
12	Q	You know do you teach your students the
13	importance	e of listening to their parents?
14	A	That's not my responsibility. I teach them
15	Q	Do you teach them that? It's yes or
16	A	No, I I don't teach them that.
17	Q	Do you teach them and educate them about the
18	importance	e of continuing to go to school?
19	A	No, I don't teach them about that.
20	Q	Do you teach them the importance of abstaining from
21	things lik	te drugs and alcohol?
22	А	No, I do not teach them about that.
23	Q	Do are there programs at your school like DARE or
24	things lik	te that that take place in your courtroom in your
25	classroom?	

1 Not in my classroom. There -- that would be outside А 2 my classroom. 3 Do your students go to those types of programs? 0 I -- you know what? I can't speak for all my 4 Α 5 They may have. students. 6 0 I'm asking in the ten years you taught students, did 7 you ever --8 А Not that I know. 9 Sorry. You have to wait until I'm done. 0 10 А Sorry. 11 In the ten years that you taught students, none of Q 12 your children that you worked with ever went through, like, 13 the DARE program? 14 Not that I know of. Α 15 Do you ever talk to children about, you know, abuse 0 16 and how to report it, who to report it to? 17 А No. 18 Are the children that you work with taught that? Q 19 I don't know. I -- there could be people there that А 20 do those types of things. Like, they have psychologists, they have counselors at the school. I don't. That's not my --21 what I do is I teach grade-level standards. 2.2 23 Ο What's a mandatory reporter? 24 А A mandatory reporter is a person that is mandated to 25 report child abuse.

1	Q Are you a mandatory reporter?
2	A Currently, no.
3	Q Were you a mandatory reporter in 2013?
4	A Yeah, at that time I was, yes.
5	Q Now, did you do you know what grooming is? Had
6	you heard about that before you became involved in this case?
7	A Not particularly, no.
8	Q What's your understanding of grooming?
9	A I couldn't really tell you what grooming is.
10	Q When you in the ten years that you were teaching,
11	did you have things like parent-teacher conferences?
12	A Yes, we did.
13	Q And would you work with parents in regards to the
14	wellbeing of their children?
15	A No. We would I would you know, the parent
16	conferences that we would have would be discussing their
17	academic progress, so it was really, more or less, along the
18	lines of the academics. I don't I don't get into the
19	behavioral aspect of it, just the academics.
20	Q So if a child is acting out or concerning to you as
21	part of your class, that's not something that you worry about
22	or speak to their parents about?
23	A That would be more of something I would bring to the
24	attention of the principal and, then, there would probably be,
25	like, a conference or something. That may or may not happen

1 at that time period, but most of the time it's an academic 2 time period. You say, look, you know what? This is the 3 progress that your students are making. This is where they 4 need to improve, such and such like that.

5 The situation that you're referring to, if I had a 6 student that was acting out or something like that or 7 misbehaving, one of the things that I would do is we would 8 probably have something in the classroom to deal with that, 9 you know, immediately. You know, like, maybe some positive 10 re-enforcement or something like that.

11 If it got out of hand and it continued, then, I 12 would bring it to the attention of maybe the assistant 13 principal or the principal, and he or she would speak to the 14 student and hopefully that would resolve it. If it went 15 beyond that, then, we would have a parent conference.

Q So let's talk about the posts. So you state that the posts that you initially placed on Craigslist said, "Lonely millionaire looking for gold-digging slut." And are you saying that you're -- are you saying that your age, the fake age of 33 was attached to that or wasn't attached to that?

A I believe it was 34, and it was part of the title,yes.

24 Q So, like, "Lonely millionaire, age 34, looking for 25 gold-digging slut"?

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1	A Yeah, because in the Craigslist
2	Q You just have to say yes or no. I'm sorry. I don't
3	need an entire answer every time. It's just these are
4	yes-or-no questions.
5	A No. Well, the way that it's filled out, no, it's
6	not attached the way that's filled out.
7	Q Okay. Now, you said that this was just a fake ad.
8	So when you say "fake ad," were you were you not expecting
9	to meet people?
10	A No, it was a joke. I was bored.
11	Q Okay. But you met Jaysenia through it?
12	A Well, that was not my expectation, but, you know,
13	eventually that happened, yeah.
14	Q So, I mean, it was fake to the extent that you
15	weren't planning on responding, but for some reason Jaysenia
16	caught your eye?
17	A We got into a conversation, extended conversation
18	and, yes, we ended up developing a relationship, yes.
19	Q Now, very soon, as in that day, the initial day you
20	guys are messaging through Craigslist, she states to you that
21	she is 16?
22	A Are you talking about the initial contact?
23	Q Yes.
24	A I believe, you know, in one of the because it
25	went back and forth with the emails and it wasn't like the
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time period was probably, like, within 30 minutes, an hour,
 two hours.

3 Right. So my question is --0 I was talking to other people. 4 Α 5 -- that day did she tell you she was 16? Q I can't remember if it's that day or if it was the 6 Α 7 -- the following day. I know, at some point, she had told me 8 she was 16. I don't know if it was the very day or the next 9 day. I was talking with several people. 10 Now, so you were -- so on this fake ad, you actually 0 11 did start several conversations with different women? 12 Α Yeah. 13 Now, in regards to the fact that you stated she said Ο 14 the age of consent is 16. Do you remember that after she 15 states to you "I'm 16," you responded with, "then what are you 16 doing on here as jail bait?" Like, meaning like to catch a 17 predator type [inaudible]? 18 You know, to be honest with you, I don't remember Α saying that. If she said that, I don't know. I never -- I --19 20 I can't recall if I said that or not. I don't even know if I 21 said that to her. Like I said, I was engaged in several 2.2 conversations. 23 So it's your testimony that she just writes you and 0 24 says 16 is the age of consent?

25

A No, I -- you know, this is three years ago. All I

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1 remember is that that part of it came up. I don't know what 2 the front end of it was. I don't know what the back end of it 3 was. I do know that she -- two things that I remember, to 4 answer your question. There was a discussion about is it okay 5 with your parents? Because she told me she was 16. I come 6 from California. There are different age limits over there as 7 far as, like, you know, when sexual consent and all that other 8 stuff.

9 Considering the nature of the ad, the first thing --10 my response was, well, if you're 16, you know, is it okay with 11 your parents, first of all? And, then, that's when she 12 responded, "well, 16 is the age of consent." And, then, 13 matter of fact, I didn't talk to her till I think it was an 14 hour or two later because I actually went and I was looking it 15 up. What you mean? Because she said in Nevada. I had just 16 moved to this state.

Q So, then, you looked up the law in Nevada when you
could have sex with someone under --

19 A Yeah, I looked up the law before I even proceeded to20 continue the conversation.

21 Q Okay. And, so, you look up the law whether or not 22 you can have sex with someone who's 16?

23 A Well, I ---

24 Q Yes or no.

25 A No.

1	Q Okay.
2	A I wanted to see what it meant.
3	Q And, sir, I apologize. And you'll have an
4	opportunity to speak to the jury again afterwards, but if we
5	if we could just get this going.
6	A I got you.
7	Q Thank you.
8	A Sure.
9	Q Now, so, you stopped in the conversation, you look
10	up the law, and at some point you ask her if she's a virgin
11	and if she likes sex?
12	A I don't remember that.
13	Q You don't remember that either?
14	A It may have came up. I don't know. This is three
15	years ago.
16	Q But you remember for sure you asked her if it was
17	okay with her parents, but you can't really remember
18	A The reason why is because the nature of the ad and
19	she told me she was 16, and that's why it sticks out.
20	Q But you don't remember asking her if she likes sex?
21	A I may have. I may have. I don't remember.
22	Q Well, you know yourself. Would that be out of the
23	ordinary for you to ask a 16-year-old if she's a virgin?
24	A I wouldn't ask a 16-year-old if she's a virgin until
25	I actually found like I said, the sequence of things, if I
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1	may, I looked it up cause I wasn't sure what she was talking
2	about. I wasn't sure she was talking about, like, in 16,
3	like, you're fully legal-legal-legal. You know, like, you
4	know, like 18 you're an adult, or, if she was talking about
5	sex. I wasn't even sure what she was referring to, so that's
6	why I looked it up and, then, I say, "oh, okay." She's
7	talking about sex. And that's probably maybe that's where
8	the conversation went afterafter I found out what she was
9	talking about.
10	Q Okay.
11	A I wasn't sure what she was talking about in the
12	first place.
13	Q Okay. So you may have asked her if she was a virgin
14	and if she liked sex?
15	A It's quite possible, yeah.
16	Q Okay. And, at some point, you guys move on to the
17	KIK app that you're talking about. And you move on to KIK
18	because she had expressed to you that her family would not
19	approve of this you talking with her?
20	A No, that's not what she told me.
21	Q She never expressed to you on Craigslist that that's
22	why you guys needed to move to KIK?
23	A She told me
24	Q Yes or no?
25	A No.
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1	
1	Q Okay. So you why did you move to KIK, then,
2	instead of just normal texting?
3	A Because it was a lot easier.
4	Q Why would it be easier to KIK rather text?
5	A I don't know. She she said this is a program
6	that she uses. She asked me to use KIK. I said, "what is
7	KIK?" I didn't even know what KIK was. She said, "hey, it's
8	an application," and and she wanted she had a KIK
9	account and she preferred to use KIK. I said, "okay."
10	Q She didn't tell you that KIK is a secret messaging
11	app that people can use?
12	A I don't know about secret. It's quite popular from
13	what I know. I know several people that have used KIK. I
14	I hadn't used it at the time.
15	Q How old are the people you know that use KIK?
16	A Different different ages.
17	Q Like what?
18	A It could be anywhere from, I would say, mid teens to
19	probably forties, fifties.
20	Q So who is it who are the mid teens that you're
21	using KIK talking to?
22	A I wasn't talking to any teens on KIK.
23	Q You just said the people you were talking to were on
24	KIK?
25	A You asked me the age range that I know. You can see
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the -- when you -- when you're on KIK you have -- there's --1 2 there's a section where you can actually see all of the users 3 and it gives their ages and information, so you can -- you can 4 actually talk to different people. You can invite them as 5 friends or things like that. So it's not like I'm talking to 6 that individual. You know, you have the information like a 7 lot of the applications today, you have access to their --8 their personal information kind of like an advertisement. 9 So it's your testimony that on your KIK app you 0 10 could look and see everybody who uses KIK and their ages? 11 А This was three years ago --12 Don't remember? Don't remember? 0 13 I probably -- I couldn't remember exactly. Α 14 Okay. Now, you -- the two of you would use KIK like 0 15 you just stated, but you would also use other forms or 16 precautions so her mother would not know that you guys were 17 speaking? Like, she would direct you when you could call her? 18 That's kind of a loaded question. I mean, can you Α 19 kind of break it down into different pieces? 20 Sure. Would you use other precautions to make sure Ο 21 that Kathryn Smith did not know you were speaking to her daughter? 2.2 23 А No. 24 So in between August 1st and August 28th there were Ο 25 42 phone calls between the two of you and 32 of them were made

A Well, if I may? Can I?

Q Sure.

That's fine. 5 Α 6 Q And you will have an opportunity [inaudible], okay? 7 That's fine. А 8 Okay. So you're being cautious. You take her to 0 9 your house. This is the first time you guys get to be alone 10 like in an area where there are no other people, correct? 11 А As far as, like, versus the skating rink? 12 0 Yes. 13 Yeah, I'd say so. А 14 Okay. And, so, that -- so that first time that Q 15 you're alone, you share your first kiss and you sleep with 16 her? 17 А Yes. 18 And you do not use condoms? Q 19 А No. 20 And the first night are you stating that you 0 21 believed her mom was aware that she was at your house and okay 2.2. with it? 23 I don't know what -- what her - her mom had told А 24 her. What -- what had happened was --25 0 Just yes or no. UNCERTIFIED ROUGH DRAFT

A No, restate the question again because it's kind of
