MR. WESTBROOK: And, Your Honor, as an alternate suggestion --

THE COURT: Pardon me?

MR. WESTBROOK: As an alternate suggestion, this might take 15 minutes, but it might save more time later regarding the stipulations, what if we excuse the jury for about 15 minutes, I'm not sure exactly how long it will take, but it shouldn't be much more than that, and have her transcript of the conversation that she had with Detective Campbell read to her in Spanish? That way, I can then ask her the contents of the transcript.

THE COURT: I'm -- I'm not going to do that. You should have had it translated before trial started. So I reject that.

Let's continue. Do -- do it my way.

The second citation, which is also down the page on 200, I e -- yeah -- is:

To harmonize NRS 51.385 and its laudable purpose with the seemingly conflicting provisions of Nevada law, the receipt of hearsay statements pursuant to the statute should not be completely open-ended.

And I think what we're seeing here is open-ended admission of

MS. KOLLINS: Well --

And then you have the mother, who speaks to them and is trying to elicit enough information so that she knows what happened, so she can protect her kids and make a decision to go to law enforcement.

If we had 20 people coming in here and discussing and articulating everything these kids have disclosed from, you know, counselors to detectives to little friends to other neighbors, I might agree with his cumulative analysis.

But to argue that it's cumulative on the second witness, that's -that's not what this was designed for, and I don't think that gives a fair analysis to
what we've seen in here.

Again, if we had 10, 15 people walking in here and discussing what these children have spoke about, then I might say, You know, the State's got enough. But that's -- we haven't even broached that in here. We're talking about the very inception of -- of disclosures and outcries by small kids. You know, and we have to take into consideration their age.

And the rest of the analysis, you know, while what's been highlighted here is the cumulative nature, the rest of the analysis talks about prohibiting witnesses from vouching for the testimony of one another in how 51.385 interfaces with hearsay evidence in general.

And I'm looking at the same paragraph Mr. Westbrook was reading from. It looks to be in the middle of page 199, and it's under the head note Cumulative Error. So if you read that whole paragraph, there still does have to be a

weighing of probative versus prejudicial, if -- but I think the court's already done that in its ruling yesterday. Plus, the kids are testifying.

Moreover, Your Honor, subject to connecting up -- similar to the issue we had with Yusnay, these are going to also be prior consistent and prior inconsistent statements, because if you note, defense counsel's entire opening was, All you have is words, All you have is words, and all the reasons that everyone was disingenuous. So subject to connecting up as prior consistent and inconsistent statements, they would also come in as to other hearsay exceptions.

So I think cumulative objection at this juncture is premature. I don't think we've gotten there.

Is there anything else I can cover?

THE COURT: No. I'm not prepared to say it's cumulative at this point, but I think Mr. Westbrook was suggesting it's going to become cumulative, because -- well, I think he said it's already cumulative. But -- but he's anticipating more of the same hearsay statements based upon the evidence you're hearing on 51.385. He knows where you're going. You're going to have four different witnesses that are all going to talk about, you know, the same things.

MS. KOLLINS: Well, and -- and I understand from a defense perspective why the label cumulative would be laid out there. But what you have to understand is when -- not you, just a proverbial you, I'm not being condescending.

THE COURT: That's fine.

MS. KOLLINS: What needs to be understood is that -- that these are children that are going to be attacked on their consistency. And it's also our burden of proof.

So to show that these kids have been able to relay through --

from their initial disclosure through their interviews some at least salient, detailed consistency with their bigger details, that's an important part of our burden of proof.

THE COURT: So -- yeah. So, I mean, basically, one of the reasons why I determined that you had met your burden under 51.385 is because there was, I guess the word is corroborating evidence from several witnesses about what the children said, which in my view enhanced the probable reliability of their testimony.

And I think it's important for the jury to hear what it is that these children reported to more than one -- one person in order to better assess the credibility of the statements.

I don't think that it's unduly cumulative by having two, three, or maybe even four people that are reporting the hearsay statements of the children and different combinations of children and at different periods of times and different statements made to them. I just don't see that as being cumulative. All right.

So I'm not prepared at this point to -- to grant your motion. You can certainly renew it at a later point in time.

MR. WESTBROOK: Fine, Your Honor.

THE COURT: But I do think -- and I did consider this -- I do think that the, you know, the probative value of some of this cumulative corroborating testimony outweighs the prejudicial impact.
