8	understanding it was all in the same conversation. But I don't have any way to test
9	that in their presence.
10	THE COURT: I know you don't. I know you don't.
11	MS. KOLLINS: Okay. I'll ask her if

14	THE COURT: the rest of your objection is
15	MR. WESTBROOK: Actually, I have two things. Number one, I think
16	allowing her to clarify when this happened in front of the jury is prejudicial,
17	particularly if it didn't happen.
18	THE COURT: When what happened?
19	MR. WESTBROOK: When whatever she's describing right now.
20	THE COURT: Well, how could it be prejudicial if we don't know what

2	THE COURT: We don't know what she's going to describe.
3	MR. WESTBROOK: The question, how did he move his penis has
4	never been asked before and it's never been answered before. I don't think it's
5	subject to 51.385, Your Honor. The evidence suggests that she is now going to say
6	something she's never said before. It will be in front of the jury. It shouldn't be.
7	That's prejudicial, number one.
8	THE COURT: And I'm not going to I already told you you've got to
9	listen to what I'm saying. Okay. I already told you it's not coming in until we find
10	out when.
11	MR. WESTBROOK: I understand, Your Honor.
12	THE COURT: Okay. So so
13	MR. WESTBROOK: But it should be voir dired outside the presence,

9	A	No, I'm not documented. You know, I don't have papers.
10	Q	When when you were referred to Hermandad Mexicana, did they help
11	you fill out an application for a U visa?	
12	A	Yes.
13	Q	And who helped you fill that out?
14	A	At the Hermandad Mexicana, it was Janet.
15	Q	Okay. And is that application currently pending?

17		MS. KOLLINS: May I approach the witness, Your Honor?
18		THE COURT: Yes.
19	BY MS. KC	DLLINS:
20	Q	Showing you admitted State's 21; does that look like a copy of your
21	U visa application?	
22	A	No.
23	Q	Is that your name at the top?
24	A	Yeah. But this paper was not given to me.
25	Q	Did you look at the whole application or did you just have to submit

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gentlemen, 15-minute recess.

You are admonished not to communicate among yourselves or with anybody else about the trial; don't talk to the parties, attorneys, or witnesses; don't seek any information about the case from my source; don't read anything about the case; don't form or express any opinions connected with the trial; don't do any research or investigations.

You are instructed to return outside this courtroom at -- at 11:12. All right. See you back then. Thank you.

Yes, sir?

JUROR NO. 14: Our schedule for this week, if I -- because I might have to go to work, well, could we come in later? It's -- what's -- what's our schedule this week?

THE COURT: Our schedule for this week?

JUROR NO. 14: Yes.

THE COURT: Well, today until 5:00, and then tomorrow, 1:00 to 5:00. Wednesday, probably starting at 11:00 to 5:00. And then Thursday 1:00 to 5:00. And then Friday 9:00 to 5:00. Okay. Probably. And I'll let you know day-to-day. But that's the most likely schedule.

Thank you. One moment.

[Jury recessed at 10:56 a.m.]

THE COURT: Okay. We're outside the presence of the jury.

Ms. Barajas, you may step down. I need you back here in 15 minutes. You'll wait right outside the door until you're called. Please do not discuss your testimony with anybody while on break. Thank you.

THE WITNESS: That's fine. Thank you.

THE COURT: Mr. Westbrook, what did you need to put on the record about the testimony that I struck?

MR. WESTBROOK: The other thing I needed to put on the record is there's not a separate standard in the law for translators and the use of translators. They've been getting a ton of leading and a ton of latitude. They've been completely nonresponsive to certain questions. I mean, she was orating up there.

But whenever I try to object, the translation finishes, and I -- I find that prejudicial, because stuff is getting in front of the jury that shouldn't be getting in front of the jury, and you can't unring the bell.

This chorizo should never have come in front of the jury. The second -- the thing that happened after that shouldn't have come in front of the jury. And I was correct, it was not something that was said prior to the 51.385. I think it's prejudicial.

And also there's been just too much latitude given to the -- the State because of the fact that we have translators. There's not a separate standard. They still have to be clear and -- and they have to be on point with their answers.

THE COURT: Well, actually, I have done some research in this area, and -- and there are supreme court -- there are cases throughout all the jurisdictions that discuss the need for latitude when necessary in order to draw out the testimony. You have to balance the need to draw out the testimony with the importance of providing protection to the defendant.

But there are cases dealing with people that are incompetent, people that are -- with minors, with people that are afraid to testify. There's -- there's various contexts in which the court has allowed the -- the appellate courts

1	have allowed district court judges latitude in order to facilitate the testimony coming
2	out in in the least offensive way possible while still trying to balance the parties'
3	rights.
4	That's what I'm trying to do.
5	That the comment about chorizo, I don't know what you want to
6	do with it. I don't think that that's prejudicial. It you know, the context in which it
7	came out, if you want me to say something to the jury to disregard that, I will.
8	MR. WESTBROOK: Well
9	THE COURT: But that that just would tend to emphasize the the
10	testimony, so I don't I don't
11	MR. WESTBROOK: Correct.
12	THE COURT: I wouldn't recommend that.
13	MR. WESTBROOK: Right.
14	THE COURT: You know, I once once the witness has spoken, I
15	think I have to allow the translation to complete, and then and then you're left with
16	moving to strike. I would employ that remedy some more, if you want to.
17	MS. KOLLINS: May I be heard, just very briefly?
18	THE COURT: Yes, you may. Yes.
19	MS. KOLLINS: In terms of the chorizo comment and the other
20	movement
21	THE COURT: Yeah.
22	MS. KOLLINS: of the penis comment, I had never heard the chorizo
23	before.
24	THE COURT: Okay.
25	MS. KOLLINS: And the the movement of the penis I just thought was
	1

more descriptive and internal to that conversation that was subject to 51.385.

I just want the court to know that she was pretrialed and told that we were only going to talk about that -- this one specific conversation that we had the hearing on.

THE COURT: All right.

MS. KOLLINS: I don't want anybody to assume that any of this was done in any bad faith in making that record. I -- I tried to control her as best as I could.

THE COURT: I -- I think you're doing fine in that way -- in that regard. I really do. And, you know, it certainly didn't come out as -- as any kind of intentional attempt to bring something out beyond the 51.385 hearing.

I can't see how that would be prejudicial, her starting -- she was at the just the very beginning, I guess, to talk about how the defendant was going to show that he was -- that -- how he would move his hand. But we've heard that already in -- in other contexts. So I --

Well, what do you want? I mean, what could I possibly do to mitigate any prejudice that you perceive at this point as to that? I already struck it. I told you I struck that testimony.

MR. WESTBROOK: I understand, Your Honor.

THE COURT: What more could I do, without drawing attention to it?

MR. WESTBROOK: My movement would be for a mistrial, because I don't think there is anything that we can do to unring the bell.

THE COURT: Yeah. And I don't -- you know, I don't blame you for making that motion. You've got to do that to protect your client. I just don't think that it was so prejudicial that it would warrant a mistrial here on -- on that -- that

point.

MR. WESTBROOK: And the second thing is the 51.385 -- is my understanding -- was in regards to October 16th, 2016, I've heard a lot of testimony today about conversations that took place the next morning, on October 17th, which also should never have been allowed in. I mean, I had a continuing objection on 51.385 that covers that.

THE COURT: You do.

MR. WESTBROOK: But the vast majority of what she just testified to happened after that initial conversation.

THE COURT: Do you want to respond to that, Ms. Kollins?

MS. KOLLINS: Your Honor, I pointed her to October 16th and the morning she learned about this, and pointed her to that conversation. I -- you know, these kind of, you know, vague and vast objections, the conversations I've heard over the course of testimony, you know, there was no contemporaneous objection to the timeframe. There was no contemporaneous objection to the inception of what was already admitted by this court as 51.385.

So when he says conversations, you know, we've discussed this chorizo thing and the hand movement. You know, that could be the same hand movement that take -- that he needs to get his penis out of his pants. I mean, she never got to a, you know, a masturbation motion up there.

THE COURT: No. She didn't -- she didn't do that.

MS. KOLLINS: So I don't think --

THE COURT: So --

MS. KOLLINS: I don't think that's prejudicial. But...

THE COURT: And I -- I don't -- specifically, look -- thinking back over

1	what she said on the stand, I I haven't heard anything that although there
2	there are you listening?
3	MR. WESTBROOK: We are.
4	MS. KIERNY: Yes.
5	THE COURT: There are some differences, obviously, between what
6	she said now and what she said at the 51.385. But I don't think she was describing
7	any events that she didn't already describe at the 51.385. I'll leave that up to cross.
8	I'm not ready to, you know, to grant any motion for a mistrial based upon her
9	testimony here in court.
10	MR. WESTBROOK: Two responses.
11	THE COURT: You may.
12	MR. WESTBROOK: Number number one
13	THE COURT: All right.
14	MR. WESTBROOK: My objections are contemporaneous.
15	The court instructed me that I shouldn't object to every single
16	thing that she says, that my 51.385 objections would be preserved. I've been doing
17	it per witness and putting it out there, so I'm not interrupting the flow and I'm not,
18	you know, seen to be challenging the court's original order.
19	THE COURT: Well, I still want you to to make a specific objection if
20	you believe she's gone beyond like you did at the bench.
21	MR. WESTBROOK: Right.
22	THE COURT: If you believe that she's gone beyond the scope of
23	51.385
24	MR. WESTBROOK: Okay.
25	THE COURT: then you should you should object.

MR. WESTBROOK:	And the second thing, by way of example
THE COURT: Yes.	

MR. WESTBROOK: -- she has a problem with rashes in her private part, and I put cream on it to take -- deal with that problem and that's when she told me X, Y, and Z? That has never been a subject of the 51.385 hearing. That's the first time I've ever heard anything about her having rashes in her private parts.

THE COURT: Well --

MR. WESTBROOK: The jury's going to assume that it's because of that event and --

THE COURT: But that's not -- for the -- for Ms. Barajas to testify as to what she did, all right, that doesn't require a 51.385. That would only require a 51.385 if her daughter told her something. The hearsay has to be subject, but her act of putting the cream, which prompted the statement by the minor about he used to touch me there, you know, that's not something that requires a 51.385. Do you see the distinction?

MR. WESTBROOK: The quote is, Yezline said that's how Don David touched me.

THE COURT: That's how he touched me. Yeah. That's how he touched me.

MR. WESTBROOK: That is a quote from -- that is a hearsay quote from her daughter that was not subject to 51.385.

MS. KOLLINS: Actually, I think --

MR. WESTBROOK: And it was a direct question to a State's question.

MS. KOLLINS: I did ask her that question during the 51.385.

MR. WESTBROOK: And she said nothing.

1	MS. KOLLINS: Well, I I asked her. And I understand
2	MR. WESTBROOK: And she said nothing. Now she's saying
3	something new.
4	THE COURT: Let let her finish her sentence.
5	What what were you going to say?
6	MS. KOLLINS: I asked her
7	THE COURT: I'm just going to take a break.
8	MS. KOLLINS: I asked her the question during the 51.385, but I
9	couldn't get her pointed to the right spot in the conversation, and and I think we
10	moved on. I don't know that she gave the full response. But I know I asked her the
11	question, because I have it in my notes, and I went over it.
12	THE COURT: Well, I know that she said, at the 51.385, that she was
13	touched by his fingers, you know, down there. I don't know what prompted that
14	response.
15	It is new to hear today that what prompted it is the putting the
16	cream. But the fact of putting the cream is not something that needed the 51.385.
17	That's how I see it. I know you disagree. We'll just have to disagree on that point.
18	MR. WESTBROOK: Because the question was asked and answered
19	differently, completely differently
20	THE COURT: Okay.
21	MR. WESTBROOK: at the 51.385 hearing, and because we don't
22	have a transcript ready
23	THE COURT: No.
24	MR. WESTBROOK: while we're on recess, I would like, if it was
25	possible for your staff to forward to her testimony?

THE COURT: I'm not -- my staff needs a recess -- MR. WESTBROOK: After, yeah.

THE COURT: -- for themselves. They're not going to do any work during the recess.

MR. WESTBROOK: Okay.

THE COURT: All right.

MR. WESTBROOK: I mean, when everyone is back from whatever break they need. I need a break, too.

THE COURT: All right. Well --

MR. WESTBROOK: So I understand.

THE COURT: Well, with all due respect, you know, I don't want to be rude to you. I wish you were, like, especially the bench conferences, a little more succinct. I know you've got to make your record. But it's really tough in this case where you have interpreters and it gets frustrating how long this trial is going to be. I just wish we all could be a little more succinct.

As to asking my staff to do work when they're entitled to a break, they're going to go take their break.

MR. WESTBROOK: Sure.

THE COURT: Then we're going to move on with the testimony.

If you want her to -- you can put in a request for her to -- to get the 51.385 testimony regarding the touching of -- of Yezline when Ms. Barajas was describing that on the stand, she could burn you a CD of that, all right. You're going to have to find specific references to what you want, and then if you want to make a separate Motion to Dismiss at another time, we could do that.

We're going to move on. We've got to -- I've got to keep this

2	MR. WESTBROOK: Okay.
3	THE COURT: Mr. Westbrook.
4	MR. WESTBROOK: I I understand, Your Honor. But we need to be
5	able to do a contemporaneous cross-examination of her
6	THE COURT: You you made your oh.
7	MR. WESTBROOK: with what happened at the hearing. I mean,
8	I'm the court is telling me that I'm stuck now with what she testified to, even
9	though it was outside the 51.385 responses. I need to be able to cross her with
10	what she actually said at the 51.385 hearing, which is different. It's very difficult to
11	do that without playing the tape.
12	THE COURT: Which I didn't say you're stuck with anything.
13	MR. WESTBROOK: Okay.
14	THE COURT: You can have the DVD. I thought I mentioned
15	MR. WESTBROOK: We have it.
16	THE COURT: at the start of the trial that you have the right to get the
17	DVD of the 51.385 entire 51.385 hearing, so I thought you already had it.
18	MR. WESTBROOK: We do, Your Honor.
19	THE COURT: Well
20	MR. WESTBROOK: I just need to find the correct spot so I can play it
21	for her, that's all.
22	THE COURT: All right.
23	MR. WESTBROOK: It just will take a little time. That's all I was asking
24	about.
25	THE COURT: Well, do that on your break. We're down to less than

1	10 minutes. That'll, you know, give us let's take it until 11:15.
2	MR. WESTBROOK: Thank you, Your Honor.
3	THE COURT: And
4	MR. WESTBROOK: I'll run across the street.
5	THE COURT: Or call somebody.
6	MR. WESTBROOK: I wish there was someone to call, but there's not.
7	MS. KIERNY: We don't have a lot of staff.
8	MS. KOLLINS: And I'll respond to that when we return, so everybody
9	can have a minute. I just had a couple responses.
10	THE COURT: Why don't you respond really quick now, because I don't
11	want to get into more dialogue before we start up again. So whatever you've got to
12	say, say now.
13	MS. KOLLINS: That's also admissible as circumstantial state of mind
14	and effect on the hearer, effect on the mom. Not only in 51.385.
15	Secondly, during my pretrial conference with that mother, it was
16	indicated to me that that was part of the 51.385 conversation, the same
17	conversation. There wasn't the further descriptors that we were given today.
18	So I just want that I want that clear for the record. That was
19	not elicited, certainly, to get outside this court's ruling. Okay. I just want to make
20	sure the record's clear.
21	THE COURT: Okay. No. I I believe you.
22	MS. KOLLINS: I know. I just want to make a record.
23	THE COURT: And he's doing his job. I understand that. But go take
24	your break so you can find whatever you need to find, all right.
25	MR. WESTBROOK: We'll go.

1	THE COURT INTERPRETER: Your Honor.
2	THE COURT: Yes, ma'am, what?
3	THE COURT INTERPRETER: I'm sorry if I interrupt for a minute,
4	because there was a comment made by the defense counsel
5	THE COURT: Yes.
6	THE COURT INTERPRETER: about the translation being allowed

19	THE COURT: But was it about the mom rubbing lotion, was
20	MR. WESTBROOK: No. And even the word lotion was used and not
21	cream.
22	What that means is
23	THE COURT: What does that mean?
24	MR. WESTBROOK: we got a hearsay response to a brand new
25	question about cream that wasn't ever asked before, wasn't part of the 51,385, and

1	should never have been asked. We got a hearsay response. It's prejudicial.
2	Renewing my Motion for a Mistrial.
3	THE COURT: Well, how serious is this? I not serious? Okay.
4	MR. WESTBROOK: I can explain the seriousness. It's pretty serious.
5	THE COURT: Well, you I know. But let me hear their side.
6	MR. WESTBROOK: Oh, that's on them. I thought you were pointing to
7	me. Sorry.
8	THE COURT: No. I'm asking them now, because I I want them to
9	respond.
10	MS. KOLLINS: Your Honor, the information was relayed from the
11	witness in my pretrial. And that's why I asked it the way I did at the 51.385 hearing
12	because that was my understanding. After clarification, now I understood it to be
13	she was describing that it's like when mom puts lotion on me, not that Don David
14	put lotion on her.
15	I think what because these these pretrial conferences are in
16	Spanish, as well. And my Spanish isn't that good. And so whatever translation we
17	get, that's what I was counting on. Certainly wasn't done in bad faith.

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MS. KOLLINS: So I don't think you have to admonish them. We
certainly you you can, if you like. I think it highlights it. But that's up to
Mr. Westbrook and Ms. Kierny.
THE COURT: I mean again I don't have any problems with the

THE COURT: I mean, again, I don't have any problems with the mom describing what prompted the declaration from the minor. But the question is -- the question in my mind is since that's a declaration that wasn't covered by 51.385, the jury, having heard it, is going to accept that as corroboration of the other statements that were made at the 51.385 hearing. So I'm wondering is that -- so even if it comes in as state of mind, should it have been barred because it wasn't covered in the 51.385 hearing?

MS. KOLLINS: Well, I -- I believe there's another exception.

THE COURT: Okay.

MS. KOLLINS: So I don't think -- the fact that we had a 51.385 hearing necessarily precludes every other type or form of hearsay coming in.

But I'll -- I'll submit it to the court.

THE COURT: Okay. Well, anything else that you wanted to ask? MR. WESTBROOK: Two things, Your Honor.

THE COURT: And I think you're right about that, Ms. Kollins. I think you're right. I just -- I have to balance, you know, probative value versus prejudice, too.

MR. WESTBROOK: Your Honor, I know that the -- the court informed us that we weren't to object to every single piece of hearsay that comes in, because it was admitted under 51.385. If the State is now going to say, yeah, that's not really 51.385, but there are alternate grounds, then I have to object to every single piece of hearsay as hearsay on the off chance they come up with alternate

grounds.

That is a problem, because I'll be objecting every time.

THE COURT: Well, you should object when there's a valid objection.

If -- I mean, you should object, unless it's -- unless it's an objection you've already put on the record. You've already objected to any of the evidence that came out at the 51.385 hearing from coming out in this trial.

MR. WESTBROOK: Correct.

THE COURT: You've clearly preserved that.

MR. WESTBROOK: Correct.

THE COURT: And if they try to add something new, you have to preserve your objection.

MR. WESTBROOK: Right. And -- but I have been. The problem is all this new stuff is just that, new. And it's been brought out under the auspices of 51.385, but it's not 51.385. So it -- I will go back to -- if I need to, in order to preserve the record because the State is going to change the grounds on which it is being admitted, then I will object to every piece of hearsay. I mean, it's going to make for a very slow trial, but what -- what's happening now is it's admitted under one ground, 51.385, and then when that doesn't work out, they're saying there are alternate grounds.

Okay. In order to preserve my record, I have to go back to objecting to every single piece of hearsay.

THE COURT: Well, you have to do what you have to do. Are you asking me to do something differently?

MR. WESTBROOK: No. I'm just -- I'm just saying that I was trying to abide by the court's directive, which is not to re-object to everything I've already

1	objected to. I've been doing that.
2	THE COURT: Right.
3	MR. WESTBROOK: Usually I'd be objecting to every single piece of
4	of evidence.
5	THE COURT: Yeah.
6	MR. WESTBROOK: But, you know, the court asked me not to, and I
7	understand why. However
8	THE COURT: I think hasn't this been just a limited instance of new
9	stuff coming in?
10	MR. WESTBROOK: No. It's happened constantly. And I've tried to
11	make the objection I've tried to make the records at the breaks.
12	THE COURT: All right.
13	MR. WESTBROOK: But if it's happened a lot. There's been a ton of
14	new stuff. The cream is just one obvious example.
15	THE COURT: Well
16	MR. WESTBROOK: But there's another issue, too, and that's the fact
17	that
18	THE COURT: I'll give you a chance, Ms. Kollins.
19	MS. KOLLINS: I know. That's fine.
20	MR. WESTBROOK: The the build-up to that was her talking about
21	how her daughter is prone to infections.
22	My concern is that the State is going to try to use that as medica
23	evidence, which has never been disclosed before. It's brand new evidence. I've
24	never heard that she had some problem with her vagina.
25	THE COURT: Well, yeah, but that's

1	MR. WESTBROOK: It's never been disclosed. It has to be disclosed.
2	And she and
3	THE COURT: You didn't object to to that. And that that wasn't
4	MR. WESTBROOK: Well, I did object.
5	THE COURT: Okay.
6	MR. WESTBROOK: And I'm and I'm continuing to object.
7	THE COURT: That has nothing to do with 51.385. That is completely
8	irrelevant to 51.385.
9	MR. WESTBROOK: Right. That's something that was apparently
10	disclosed in pretrial that was never told to us before, which means it's brand new
11	evidence. It's evidence that was brought out before the jury. It's prejudicial. And
12	it's it's discoverable evidence that was never brought to our discovery. So I'm
13	renewing my Motion to Dismiss based on discovery violations under 51.3 or
14	THE COURT: Well, that's a little bit different than what you said before
15	Okay.
16	MR. WESTBROOK: under the discovery statute.
17	THE COURT: So that's a new argument he's made.
18	Will you address that argument, Ms. Kollins?
19	MS. KOLLINS: Okay.
20	THE COURT: That that it was something some information that
21	you had that you didn't disclose.
22	MS. KOLLINS: I absolutely did not get any information about vaginal
23	infections during a pretrial. Today was the first day I heard it.
24	But I'd like to step back to the beginning of his argument
25	THE COURT: All right

MS. KOLLINS: -- if I might, just because of the record.

THE COURT: Go ahead.

MS. KOLLINS: Mr. Westbrook couches his argument in all this new stuff. The new stuff is very limited. It's the conversation that she had with her daughter while she was applying an ointment. And the other one was the chorizo. So while he's makes this record that there's all this new stuff being thrown at him by the State, that is not what's going to be depicted in this record should it ever go up.

Those conversations -- the chorizo, that wasn't responsive to the question I asked. I didn't keep asking questions about it. That was no information that I received in a pretrial conference or anywhere else.

What I did receive in the pretrial conference regarding the cream was, Mom, it's like when you rub cream on me, that's what his hand was doing. Which prompted the question and which prompted the question the other day. And if I -- if I said it incorrectly the other day, maybe that's why I didn't get the answer in the 51.385 hearing.

So in any event, I think the record is clear. The State is not trying to expand the evidence against Mr. Azucena beyond what we have turned over.

I'm trying to control this witness the best I could. Certainly there's nothing -- there's nothing else that should come out of the conversation of the -- with Yezline this court's already ruled admissible pursuant to 51.385.

There is an alternate basis for the cream conversation, but I don't think it's prejudicial.

THE COURT: All right.

MS. KOLLINS: And as far -- and I think we covered late discovery, because we didn't know that. We didn't know what she was going to say when she

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THE COURT: All right. Well, I'm not convinced that there's been any -- any prejudice to the defendant at this point from -- from what I believe are two isolated comments that didn't get addressed in the 51.385 hearing, one being the comment about the chorizo, and the other the comment about rubbing the hand like the cream is applied.

MR. WESTBROOK: The prone to infections?

THE COURT: I -- I think -- well, the -- the -- that's new evidence that came out for the first time at trial that the State wasn't aware of. So the State didn't violate any of its discovery obligations.

So the extent you're moving for a mistrial based on the discovery violations, I -- I'm finding that there was no discovery violation by the State.

MS. KOLLINS: And -- and just for the record, the State will not argue that because the child at some point had some kind of vaginal infection, that that is in some way connected to any victimization by the defendant.

We know better than to argue that.

THE COURT: If you want --

MS. KOLLINS: Mr. Westbrook should know that I would never stand up here and jump from --

THE COURT: Yeah.

MS. KOLLINS: --that statement --

THE COURT: If you want me maybe a --

MS. KOLLINS: -- to medical evidence.

THE COURT: Do you want maybe a cautionary instruction? Think of something that we can give the jury at the time that we give them the instructions,

1	unless you think that you want to tell them something now, you know, about how,
2	you know, you heard evidence of of infections. You are not you must not
3	assume that that any infections were caused by contact with the defendant.
4	Something like that. I think that's what you're getting at.
5	MR. WESTBROOK: Right.
6	MS. KIERNY: Yes.
7	THE COURT: So if you want to propose something, I will I'm free to
8	give it, after you run it by the State. All right?
9	MR. WESTBROOK: We'll work out the wording.
10	THE COURT: I think that will help mitigate some of your concerns.
11	MS. KIERNY: Okay.
12	MR. WESTBROOK: Thank you, Your Honor.
13	THE COURT: Not all of them, I know. But some of them. All right.
14	MR. WESTBROOK: Thank you, Your Honor.
15	MS. KIERNY: So when would you like to give that instruction so we
16	know the timeline as to when we should be drafting.

ou're -- it's kind of unusual to read a whole two pages of a grand jury transcript.

I understand what you're trying to do. You're trying to -- to get affirmation that Ms. Barajas never mentioned during the grand jury proceedings that Jatziri had mentioned that Nicole had been supposedly rubbed against the defendant; is that what you're trying to establish?

MR. WESTBROOK: That is correct, Your Honor.

THE COURT: All right. And so one way of doing that would be to have the witness look at the testimony to see if that refreshes her recollection.

MR. WESTBROOK: That's normally how we would do it.

THE COURT: Another way to do it would be to show a specific reference, not a whole group of two -- multiple pages.

MR. WESTBROOK: Sure.

THE COURT: Another way to do it was -- would be to seek assent from the district attorney.

Impeachment is simply a legal term to describe the process by which an attorney challenges the credibility of a witness. So if -- if an attorney believes that a witness -- if an attorney wants to challenge the credibility of a witness during cross-examination, there are techniques to try to do that. One technique is called impeachment. One method of attempting impeachment is to show a prior statement of the witness and read that to them and -- and then to try to ascertain whether the witness remembers the statement or whether they are taking a position now that's inconsistent with the statement.

You, as the jurors, have to judge everybody's credibility.

All these processes merely provide you with the evidence and the information that you can use when you're deliberating this case to determine if someone is telling the truth. All right.

So again, impeachment is simply one means. You will get further

23	THE COURT: Oh, okay. You have to tell the truth in court, right?
24	THE WITNESS: Uh-huh.
25	THE COURT: Yes? Is that a yes?
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1	THE WITNESS: Yes.
2	THE COURT: Okay. Because this is important. And you see the
3	people over here on the left, all these people, they're friendly people. They they
4	want to listen to the questions and the answers, and they want to hear the truth.
5	Okay. Do you understand that?
6	THE WITNESS: Okay.
7	THE COURT: Okay. So you're going to tell the truth, right? In
8	Spanish. Sure. Yes?
9	THE WITNESS: Yes.
10	THE COURT: Okay. So I think we can bypass the oath. The court is
11	convinced that this witness will testify truthfully based on her responses and
12	demeanor. And so I'll allow the questions to be asked.
13	MR. WESTBROOK: Your Honor, may we approach?
14	THE COURT: Yes.
15	MS. KOLLINS: Can I let Mr. Hamner take care of this? Because I'm
16	going to stay here with Scarlett.
17	THE COURT: Uh-huh.
18	[Bench conference transcribed as follows.]
19	THE COURT: She's too
20	MR. WESTBROOK: Your Honor, you just endorsed that she would
21	testify truthfully.
22	THE COURT: What's that?
23	MR. WESTBROOK: You just endorsed that she would testify truthfully
24	All you can endorse is that you believe that she agreed to tell the truth.
25	THE COURT: No. That's what I said. She needed to

1	MR. HAMNER: Thanks, Your Honor.
2	[End of bench conference.]
3	THE COURT: All right. Okay. So let me tell the jurors, normally we
4	would administer an oath, but given the age of the child, we I have authority to
5	just to excuse that. I'm convinced that it well, I'm convinced that she
6	understands the difference between the truth and a lie and she has given our
7	assurances that she will tell the truth.
8	Now, whether she actually tells the truth or not, that's up to you to
9	decide, and I don't know if she will. No one in this room knows that she will. But

20		MS. KOLLINS: May the record reflect identification of the defendant.
21		THE COURT: It does.
22		MS. KOLLINS: Thank you.
23	BY MS. KC	DLLINS:

23	Q	Do you remember writing your name on the picture?
24	Α	Yes.
25	Q	Is that your name that you wrote on the bottom of that picture that's in 145

20	MS. KIERNY: Well, I think it's prejudicial. So for the record.
21	THE COURT: Well, I'll tone it down.
22	MS. KIERNY: All right.
23	MR. WESTBROOK: We we would object to you continuing to do it,
24	to be very clear.
25	THE COURT: Lunderstand, No. Lunderstand, Liust said, L Lwant

1	them to feel comfortable. But
2	MS. KIERNY: Yes, I do understand that. But we just don't
3	THE COURT: Because because of, you know, if you if you don't
4	say anything and it's too too formalistic for the kids, then it it tends to their
5	because of their fright and fear, then we're not going to get anything out of them.

17	MS. KIERNY: Thank you.
18	THE COURT: So what do we have next? We'll bring the jurors in now
19	MR. HAMNER: Yes, Your Honor.
20	THE COURT: All right. Let's do that, marshal.
21	Ms. Kollins?
22	MS. KOLLINS: Yes, Your Honor.

25		THE COURT: Two contacts that were charged.

MR. HAMNER: I -- I don't -- I --

THE COURT: How many contacts were charged?

MR. HAMNER: Well, the -- the witness testified at the grand jury and, specifically, she said, You touched me more than once on my vagina. That's how specific she got.

THE COURT: Okay. That's --

MR. HAMNER: I'm entitled to say how often. I think it's page 78, I'm looking at it right now. I'm entitled to ask this question with multiple counts being charged. And even -- and even if it was a single time, we would still be able to allege the witness can testify it happened more than once, because sometimes with young kids, as Ms. Kollins had mentioned yesterday -- or on Friday, we can charge one count over a period of time to cover a particular type of conduct. So at this point, there's nothing improper about me asking how often this would happen.

MS. KIERNY: But if she says, you know, if she says multiple times or she says 10 times, I mean, that's uncharged. That's the definition --

THE COURT: I --

MS. KIERNY: -- of an uncharged bad act.

THE COURT: I think they're charged.

MS. KIERNY: They're not. There's -- each act is charged within one count. There's two counts for touching a front part. So if he exceeds two part -- two times touching, then we are exceeding what is charged. So that is an uncharged bad act by definition. We've not had a *Petrocelli* hearing on this issue.

MR. HAMNER: This is not an uncharged bad act.

MS. KIERNY: It is. It's the definition.

THE COURT: It's -- is it -- have the -- they're charged or that they

1	MS. KOLLINS: You could have a bad act on the same victim with the
2	same defendant.
3	THE COURT: Uh-huh.
4	MS. KOLLINS: In other words, say, we have touching on vagina and
5	today she came in and said, He made me perform fellatio. That's something we
6	haven't charged. But everything that we're talking about is within the timeframe and
7	the charged conduct. So our position, it's not a bad act.
8	MS. KIERNY: I would analogize
9	MS. KOLLINS: Because it's it's we have touching, rubbing,
10	touching, fondling
11	THE COURT: It's not a prior bad act. If it is it is the very thing's
12	being charged?
13	MR. HAMNER: That is correct.
14	MS. KOLLINS: Yes.
15	THE COURT: And within the same timeframe
16	MS. KOLLINS: Yes. Yes, sir.
17	THE COURT: same people?
18	MS. KOLLINS: Yes, sir.
19	THE COURT: I I
20	MS. KIERNY: And and I would
21	THE COURT: kind of tend to agree to that. I understand the
22	distinction
23	MS. KIERNY: I would I would analogize that, well, let's say, you
24	know, take it out of this context. With the car burglary case. If you had a witness
25	up there saying, I know that he you're charged with one car burglary. I know that

1	he broke into my car the day before and the day before that, 10 different times;
2	those are clearly uncharged bad acts.
3	So the same act
4	THE COURT: Right.
5	MS. KIERNY: even if it's the same victim, if it's more than what is
6	charged, it's by definition uncharged bad act.
7	MS. KOLLINS: So by your analogy, you get to pick and choose which
8	counts we get to say are the ones that we're charging?
9	MS. KIERNY: You get to charge any counts you want, which you get.
10	MS. KOLLINS: Which is what we've done.
11	THE COURT: I think it's it's in these type of cases, it's it's I
12	think it's got to be different, because the kids because because the kids aren't
13	able to define specifically when everything happened and where. And so if I charge
14	two counts, but but
15	MS. KIERNY: But, for example, <i>Ledbetter</i> said
16	THE COURT: the State will have to wait until the evidence comes
17	out to see, you know, exactly where which of these where these acts happened
18	and and when they occurred.
19	MS. KIERNY: But, for example, in <i>Ledbetter</i> , they say there does need
20	to be some specificity in the acts charged.
21	THE COURT: Yeah.
22	MS. KIERNY: And so if somebody just nakedly says, Oh, this
23	happened 10 times, for example, you are getting into some bad acts that are not
24	charged
25	THE COURT: I I'm going to

1	MS. KIERNY: and that has no specificity.
2	THE COURT: I'm going to allow it, because I think this is something
3	that really needs to be covered in a pretrial motion testing the sufficiency of the
4	indictment or the information. Here in this case, I think it was sufficient to
5	encompass, you know, any of the touchings that occurred and this limited time
6	period involving, you know, the same defendant, the same victims
7	MS. KIERNY: When you say
8	THE COURT: the same types of touching. That was on
9	MS. KIERNY: Yes, it is.
10	THE COURT: No. No. And they they fixed it, so it automatically
11	goes off.
12	MS. KIERNY: All right. Okay. All right. Cool. So I lost my train of
13	thought. All right.

23	the effect on the listener. It's relevant because their entire a major part of the
24	defense is that these children are not credible, they're not telling things. And
25	they're going to get up here in their closing arguments and say these kids are

inconsistent [indiscernible]. And pursuant, to would come in as a hearsay exception to rebut a charge of fabrication, these kids are making things up. And they question Yusnay about the things they said or didn't say. And I'm entitled now to ask this witness.

Because on that cross-examination question on Yusnay, they are inferring --

THE COURT: Uh-huh.

MR. HAMNER: -- that these children are not credible. And it comes in as prior consistent statement. Because the allegation of inconsistency is already made.

THE COURT: Statement made before the motivation to fabricate would be your theory. Okay.

What's your --

MS. KIERNY: What he is asking is for what she was told by Yezline. He could get that out from Yezline. He doesn't need to get the layers of hearsay. I don't -- he's not allowed to just bolster credibility by introducing prior consistent statements. We've already had that done so many different ways in this case.

THE COURT: Uh-huh.

MS. KIERNY: I don't think it's necessary, and I think it's -- it's improper to get out what Yezline had told her that she had then told to Yusnay.

THE COURT: You are attacking the credibility of -- of -- well, all of them -- all of the minors, Jatziri. And so this would be for -- you're talking about this is what she heard from Jatziri.

MR. WESTBROOK: Right.

THE COURT: This would be a prior consistent statement of Jatziri,
