THE COURT: Okay. We're on the record in State vs. Lewis, Case Number C-311294. We're outside the presence of the venire panel, and the defendant is not present as well specifically because of -- because of the sensitive nature of this issue.

So one of the jurors, Angela Snoreen, and she is badge number 062, gave the Marshal a note to give to me. She wanted to disclose something, but not in front of the other prospective jurors. And she probably didn't know that there might be a concern for disclosing it in front of the defendant, but that's my -- more -- even more my concern.

But basically, she indicated that her brother,
Michael Snoreen, is in protective custody in CCDC. And given
the charges against him at CCDC, which basically are child
porn charges, that's why I said protective custody, and so she
didn't want to disclose that in front of everybody else
because he is in protective custody.

So counsel agreed -- all counsel agreed with the Court as well that we should just allow her to be excused, and nobody had any problem with that; is that correct?

MR. SHETLER: Your Honor, in light of the facts and circumstances that have come up in this case, I -- I

understand. I don't believe there's any grounds to object and 1 2 I think it's the proper decision. MS. DeMONTE: Agreed, Your Honor. 3 THE COURT: Plus, I don't want to there to be an 4 5 issue as well -- there could be a problem -- if she has 6 communication with her brother at the jail, and he knows 7 potentially that your client is in jail, you know, that -that also is --8 9 MS. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 252: No, it's not an issue. 4 5 MR. SHETLER: Okay. We talked a little bit about 6 family involved in law enforcement; is that correct? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 252: Yes. 8 MR. SHETLER: Could you tell that again to me, 9 please? I missed it. 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 252: My sister was a 11 corrections officer. She's retired. My brother-in-law worked 12 for Metro as a motorcycle police officer, and he's retired 13 also. 14 MR. could not be a fair and impartial juror in this case? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: The overall answer is 3 no, but I'm not going to lie to you, there was one thing when I heard the charges yesterday that had me a little concerned. 4 5 THE COURT: Okay. 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: But it doesn't mean that 7 I won't be fair about it, but I just had to express that. 8 THE COURT: All right. Well, what's that? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: The fact that it was done more than once. 10 11 THE COURT: Well, there are allegations, of course. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yeah, that's what I'm saying, you know. 13 14 THE COURT: Right. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: But -- so --16 THE COURT: So --17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: But other than that, I 18 mean, it doesn't mean I won't be fair, I won't be impartial or 19 anything like that, but I did want to --20 THE COURT: Okay, so let me ask you this. 21 there are -- anytime there are multiple charges, the jury's 22 instructed that they have to consider each of the charges 23 separately, and they have to come to a conclusion as to each 24 separate charge as to whether the State has met the burden of 25 proof.

So then, do you have any problem with, if you were 1 2 selected on the jury, going in and going through each 3 individual charge, and deliberating with your fellow jurors as to whether you felt that the State had reached a burden --4 5 their burden of proof and proved the case as to every single 6 charge and each element of that charge? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yeah, it won't be a 8 problem. 9 THE COURT: Okay. All right, thank you. Would the State like to inquire further? 10 11 MS. DeMONTE: No, Your Honor. Pass for cause. 12 THE COURT: Would the defense like to inquire further? 13 MR. SHETLER: Yes, Your Honor. Mr. Macklin, how are 14 15 you doing? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: I'm good. How are you 17 doing? 18 MR. SHETLER: I'm all right. Thank you. I want to 19 follow up, obviously, on what you just said. Can you 20 elaborate a little bit as to why the fact that there were a 21 number of charges, in addition to what the Judge just asked you, why that -- you just paused? 22 23 And I appreciate your honesty. This is not -- this 24 is not fun, I know, for anyone sitting on that side of this 25 podium, but this unfortunately is what we've got to go

through. And the Constitution is not always just stars, and 1 stripes, and drums; it's a little bit messy too. So bear with 2 me, please. Can you elaborate a little bit more on what 3 you're talking about, why that gave you pause? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Just -- I mean, well, just the fact -- I mean, it's not -- just like the Judge was 6 7 saying yesterday, it's not evidence, but it is one of the 8 charges and one of the allegations. And you know, I do take into consideration that it 10 is an allegation right now, but also at the same time, you 11 know, if it was -- if this is an allegation -- or almost the 12 same allegation that was done more than once, then it would 13 give me concern. Like I said, it just -- it wouldn't mean --14 it wouldn't mean I wouldn't be fair and impartial once I heard 15 the evidence or once everything comes out, you know what I 16 mean? 17 If -- if you heard that -- well, let MR. SHETLER: 18 me strike that because that's going to get messy. How long 19 have you -- you drive a school bus -- CCSD school bus? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yes. 21 MR. SHETLER: How long have you been doing that? 22 Since you got here? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Since I got here. 24 MR. SHETLER: Four years? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yes.

MR. SHETLER: All grades on that bus, or just --1 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: All of them. 2 3 MR. SHETLER: All right. You ever have an opportunity where children on that bus get in a dispute as to 4 5 something that happened and you have two different versions? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: All the time. 6 7 MR. SHETLER: Yeah. You ever have a day where that 8 doesn't happen? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yeah, I have days where 10 it doesn't happen. Yes. 11 MR. SHETLER: What you're talking about basically 12 is, look, I've got to -- you've got to resolve those disputes 13 in some fashion, right? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yes. 15 MR. SHETLER: Some of them get passed onto admin, 16 some other things happen, but generally, what happens on the bus is going to get taken care of one way or another on the 17 18 bus, right? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: 20 MR. SHETLER: If -- if I ride your bus, and I've 21 done something I'm not supposed to do on that bus ten times, 22 and something comes up with me and Jimmy Little, and Jimmy 23 Little's never in trouble, are you more likely to think I had 24 something to do with it this time? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: If you did it ten times?

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Once again, I would -- I mean, as of right now, I would say 1 2 yes because I haven't heard anything, but -- because I've had -- I've had incidents where that's happened more than once, 3 and when I hear the story, you know, I have to change it 4 5 around a little bit --6 MR. SHETLER: Right. 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: -- compare it, you know, 8 according to what I hear. 9 MR. SHETLER: Mr. Macklin, you've already anticipated where I'm going, right? Because right now, 10 11 nobody's got on there and said anything yet. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Right. 13 MR. SHETLER: Right? You've heard a recitation of 14 allegations by the State, which is not just -- it's not Jimmy 15 Little calling me names on the playground, but it's in writing 16 and it's all done properly, but just allegations, right? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Right. Correct. 18 MR. SHETLER: You don't have anything else to base 19 it on other than you've heard that they're alleging there was 20 more than one event, and that gives you pause? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Right. 22 MR. SHETLER: Human. 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Basically. MR. SHETLER: Makes sense. 24 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yes.

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MR. SHETLER: On the bus, you talk to me and you 1 2 talk to Jimmy Little, you figure out what do you think about 3 who, and you make your decision then when you've got information, right? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: That's right. 6 MR. SHETLER: Well, in this case, Mr. Lewis doesn't 7 have to get on the stand; you understand that? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: I understand. 9 MR. SHETLER: The Constitution says you have the 10 right to remain silent and you don't have to do anything. 11 you might only hear from Jimmy Little. You're not going to 12 hear my side of the story. 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Right. 14 MR. SHETLER: And then you've got to make your 15 decision. 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yes. Also, with that 17 being said as well, also have other witnesses. 18 MR. SHETLER: Right. 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: So I understand that as 20 well. So if I'm selected for jury, I understand that however 21 many of those witnesses that were named yesterday, however 22 many that come in, I will be hearing their side of the story 23 as well. So, you know, to answer your -- you know. 24 MR. SHETLER: Yeah, you're doing perfect. But my --25 what you're -- what you're telling us in all honesty is that

your concern is that if I've got ten events, I've got some propensity maybe to be causing more problems if you don't have any other information?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Right Well as far as

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Right. Well, as far as -- I mean, like I said, it was just -- it was a pause for concern, and I did want to express that.

MR. SHETLER: I appreciate it, I assure you Mr. Lewis appreciates it, I assure you both the ladies at this table appreciate that. That's what this is all about.

And would you be comfortable in a similar situation — not that it would ever happen, but if you were in a similar situation, would you be comfortable sitting where Mr. Lewis is sitting and having somebody who thinks, acts, feels, and has lived the life you've lived and experiences you have sit in judgment on your guilt or innocence?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Would I be comfortable with it? I would -- I would have to be. I would have to be comfortable with it.

MR. SHETLER: Because?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Because if they -- or could you -- I'm sorry, could you repeat the question?

MR. SHETLER: Yeah. Just if -- if things were reversed, you were on trial, and somebody who thinks, acts, feels, lived the life you've lived is sitting on the jury, are you comfortable with somebody who thinks, acts, lives life

probably be -- it could be bias. You know, it could be bias where, oh, this man didn't do anything. I mean, that's just like now, if -- if I was the one that was living that type of life right now, or if I was that person that lived that type of life, and then heard those same allegations, you know, I could turn around and say, you know what, I don't care what he did, he didn't -- you know, he didn't do it, you know? You know, there's a reason -- there's a reason. There's a method to the madness, is what I would probably be thinking if I was in that position.

MR. SHETLER: And when you say there's a method to the madness, you're -- I want to be real careful with the words I use. I'd rather have your answer. But method to the madness, there -- there -- where there's smoke, there's fire; that kind of method to the madness? Or things went down the way they did because maybe there's some things we don't understand? Or --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: There you go.

MR. SHETLER: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: That right there.

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MR. SHETLER: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: So you know, it's -- and you know, only reason why I say that, because there is -- you know, you have situations where people have done things, but it was for -- it was for a reason, you know? You know, it was for a reason. But yeah, in that case, I wouldn't -- you know, I wouldn't be comfortable, because yeah, if I did something, I would want a fair juror.

THE COURT: Okay, I think he didn't understand the question, so let me see if I can restate the question. It's a little -- before we get too far in.

So what Mr. -- what defense counsel's trying to say here is we're looking for 12 people who can be fair and impartial to both sides. And so one of the questions that's commonly asked is, okay, if you were on trial, you would want -- you moved the wrong way.

MR. SHETLER: Sorry, Judge.

THE COURT: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Shetler. All right. So if you had -- if you were on trial, you'd want 12 people who could be fair and impartial, listen to all the evidence, and decide fairly, okay? That's what he's asking you. Are you that kind of person?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: Yeah, that's -- before I elaborated and went off that tangent like I did, but the answer's yes.

1	THE COURT: Okay.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 063: The answer's yes.
3	THE COURT: So you would want if you were on
4	trial, you'd want 12 people just like you because you could be

So we have been working on selecting a jury in this case for the last couple of days, and we are almost there, but ran out of additional jurors, and we had to have you summoned up here for that purpose. So we are looking to find a couple of more people who may or may not end up ultimately getting selected, but that's where we are. So as I said, we've already been at this a couple of days.

I just want to give you first a little synopsis of what our expected schedule is. So this case is expected to probably last no longer than next Wednesday. Our schedule is pretty benign for you all.

In other words, because of my docket, I have criminal calendars in the mornings on Mondays and Wednesdays, and on Tuesdays and Thursdays, I do the drug court all morning, which means that Monday through Thursday, I can only have half-days for jury trials, and then Fridays is a whole day. So it's already Wednesday, so tomorrow, the schedule would be 1:30 to 5:00.

(Court/Clerk conferring)

THE COURT: My court recorder was just telling me about all the scheduling things that we have -- additional scheduling. But basically, that's our schedule.

Friday will be full day, 9:00 o'clock in the morning until 5:00; lunch break for an hour in the middle of the day. If we go all day, a break in the morning for 15 minutes, break in the afternoon for 15 minutes. If it's just half-day, break in the afternoon for 15 minutes. And as I say, the case may not take until next Wednesday. That would include deliberations.

So let me just -- that's just trying to give you an idea of what the schedule is so when ultimately I ask you about whether you can serve on that type of schedule you can keep that in mind.

Now, this process where we select jurors is called the voir dire, and what it is is a questioning. And I question -- ask you questions, and the lawyers get to ask you questions, and by that questioning process, we determine if you're suitable.

In other words, can you be a fair and impartial juror and make your decision on the evidence that you hear in this case and not based upon something that is extraneous or because you're not a fair person. You know, we don't -- we need 12 people who are fair and impartial. That's what we're looking for.

So this questioning process is done under oath, so I'm going to have you all stand now and the clerk is going to swear you in.

Please raise your right hand. THE CLERK: 1 THE CLERK SWEARS THE VENIRE PANEL 2 THE CLERK: Thank you. 3 THE COURT: Be seated. 4 5 THE CLERK: Be seated. 6 THE COURT: All right. And so, also, you need to 7 know something about the case, and so I'm going to have the District Attorney just basically tell you what the charges 8 are, and also read to you a list of the witnesses that may be 10 called in the case. 11 Now, just because they read to you a long list 12 doesn't mean that every single witness is going to be called, 13 but they may be called, so they have to ask you if -- later, 14 we have to ask you if you know any of these witnesses, and so 1.5 pay close attention when that is happening. So I'm going to have the District Attorney do that, 16 17 and then I'm going to have the defense attorney introduce 18 himself, his law partner, client, and let you know regarding the names of any witnesses that they might want to call, and 19 then we'll go from there, so. 20 21 Thank you, Your Honor. MS. MENDOZA: 22 THE COURT: Okay, thank you. 23 MS. MENDOZA: Hello. I'm Erika Mendoza. 24 Deputy District Attorney here with the Clark County District

Attorney's Office. This is Noreen DeMonte. She's also --

she's a Chief Deputy District Attorney here at the DA's office.

You're here regarding the matter of the State of Nevada vs. Isaac Lewis, and in this case, the defendant's been charged in connection with four separate events.

The first one occurred on November 2nd of 2015 at a store called Undefeated. It's an athletic wear type store on the corner of Paradise and Harmon, in that shopping center across from Hard Rock. In connection with that event, he's charged with conspiracy robbery, burglary, and robbery with a deadly weapon.

The second event with which he's charged occurred on November 22nd of 2015. It occurred at the same location, that Undefeated store, and the charges from that event are burglary with a firearm, battery with a deadly weapon resulting in substantial bodily harm, attempt murder with a deadly weapon, and dissuading a witness from testifying.

The third event with which he's charged occurred on November 26th of 2015, and that happened at Wal-Mart up in Centennial Center on Tropical Parkway, and the charges for that event is robbery with a deadly weapon.

And then the fourth event occurred on December 4th of 2015, and that was at Old Navy in the Boulevard Mall on Maryland, and he's charged with robbery with a deadly weapon in connection with that event.

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The possible witnesses the State may call include both some Metro officers and lay witnesses who are not connected with law enforcement. The possible lay witnesses we may call include Devon Norwood, Justin Condemi, Roy Pichardo, Garrett Burnett, Patrick Renaud, Theodore Mitchell, Brian Lemcke, Gale Pierce, Matthew Ehresman. I'm sorry, I have trouble with this last name. It's E-h-r-e-s-m-a-n. Christopher Tipton (phonetic), Trevor Moss, Derrick Red, Jeremy Walker (phonetic), Andrew Babcock, and Jawan Timons.

The Metro officers who we may call include Maxwell Nitzel, Brad Janecek, Shawn Ford (phonetic), and Thomas Frosch (phonetic). Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you. Mr. Shetler?

Thank you, Your Honor. Ladies and MR. SHETLER: gentlemen, my name is Travis Shetler. I'm an attorney here in With me at the table -- please stand up -- is my client Isaac Lewis. Next to him, Attorney Chris Grasso.

At this point in time, our intention is to rely on the witness list that the District Attorney's office is using, and anything that develops further from that then would come up during trial. Thank you.

Thank you. All right. So, ladies and THE COURT: gentlemen, I'm going to be asking you some questions, and I'm going to be asking for a show of hands in response to the questions.

If I need to follow up with you to have you answer a specific question further because you've raised your hand, for instance, then we need to have you hold a microphone that the Marshal is now demonstrating for you, and speak into that microphone. He's showing you how he wants you to hold that that close to your mouth so it will pick up.

The reason for that is not so you can feel like a rock star, but because we keep a record in the courtroom based upon an audio-visual system within the courtroom. And so there are cameras in the courtroom, not on the jury box, but the cameras are -- are triggered by the voice-activated microphones you see around the courtroom.

So this one on my bench, when I'm speaking the cameras would focus on me. If the lawyers speak, the camera would focus on them and the microphone would pick that up. But because we don't -- cameras never focus on the jury and there are no microphones that will pick you up. Even though there are some mounted on that front rail there, they won't pick you up, and we need to have a complete record.

So it's very important that if you're called upon to speak into the microphone each and every time you're asked to do so, that you give your full name, as well as the last three digits on your jury summons. And I think the Marshal talked to you about that, because normally that's put into a badge, but apparently you were hustled up here so quickly they didn't

give you your badges. Excuse me. It's really important that you speak into that microphone.

So if you're a person that tends to gesture when you speak, that you use the hand that you're not holding the microphone in to gesture. So this way, not this way, because then I'll have to stop you and we'll have to start all over again because you won't be picked up for the record. Also, please answer in words, not "uh-huh's" or "uh-uh's," and not nods or shakes of the head. All right.

And so I'm going to pose to you the first question

-- to you and ask you to respond by a show of hands. Are

there any of you who believe that you are acquainted with the

defendant in this case, Mr. Isaac Lewis? And the record will

reflect a negative response.

Are there any of you who believe you are acquainted with the defendant's lawyers in this case, Mr. Shetler or Mr. Grasso? And the record, again, will reflect a negative response.

the windows, because he's got a badge on, I'm going with that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 939: Your Honor, I have to be completely honest with you. I mean, I've worked with law enforcement, so, before, and if they're going to come on the stand, they're not going to perjure themselves, so I guess I would have to be an impartial juror.

THE COURT: So if -- if the officer took the stand and said there's a pink elephant peeking through the window there, and just because he swore to tell the truth, you'd say, okay, well, there has -- clearly there must be a pink elephant there, even though I can't see it? You'll go with that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 939: Yes, Your Honor.

THE COURT: You're dismissed. Okay, and -- all right. Any of you -- there were no other positive responses to my inquiry as to whether you knew any of the witnesses, correct? No other hands? All right, the record will reflect there is -- there are no further hands on that question.

And is there any one of you who believe that you may have heard about from any source or read about anywhere this case before you came here today? And the record again will reflect a negative response.

All right, so I've told you how long I expect the trial to last. And I should of course say to you the courthouse is closed on the weekends, so we're not having court on Saturday and Sunday. So we're looking at Thursday,

tomorrow, from 1:30 until 5:00. Friday from 9:00 to 5:00, you'll be on break for an hour in the afternoon for lunch. And then Monday, 1:00 o'clock until 5:00. Tuesday, 1:30 to 5:00. Frankly, we think that the testimony will be wrapped up by that time, am I thinking -- okay.

And so you'd be in deliberations, and depending -if you're in deliberations, then you could come in in the
morning to begin deliberating, because it doesn't matter if
I'm on the bench doing something else, you can be in the jury
room deliberating and doing your job at that point in time.
So that's kind of the schedule we're talking about.

So -- so I'm about to ask you, and I don't want you to raise your hands yet, is there anyone who feels that they can't possibly serve for that limited amount of time? And so here are some of the things I really want to hear about, and here are some of the things I'm willing to hear you say if you really want to say them, but I'm not as concerned about.

So if you tell me that your boss can't live without you for a few hours, I'm not as concerned about that, because the -- the sad fact of the matter is that all of us can be replaced, you know? If I got hit in a bus -- hit by a bus in the crosswalk on my way into the courthouse, they would have someone here to cover my docket.

And so, while of course nobody else could do as good a job as you would, and your boss would miss you, that -- you

know, you've got a duty as a citizen to serve on a jury if you possibly can.

And the thing is, this is a very short trial relative to other trials, and you're not expected to be here as long as -- relative to other trials. So for instance, Judge Kischner is picking a jury right now for a trial that's going to last a year. There are -- it's very common for trials to last a full week, every day, all day. That's very common. Or longer. Two weeks, three weeks, months.

And so this is your opportunity to serve on a jury and get your service out of the way in a very short period of time and not have to spend a lot of time here in court. So keep that in mind, because you wouldn't want to be recycled to a jury that you may have to spend longer.

The other thing is -- these are the things I want to hear about. So if anyone here is going to have a baby between now and Wednesday, I need to know about that. If you're going to have surgery between now and Wednesday, I need to know about that. If you're not going to have surgery between now and Wednesday, but you're going to have it on Thursday, so you have to go to your pre-op appointments in the next few days, I need to know about that.

If you have a fabulous prepaid vacation that you're going to leave for this weekend or what have you -- now, I assume because you knew you were coming to jury duty that you

would have your airline tickets cued up on your phone, ready to show my Marshal, because I'll ask you to do that. And of course I will be jealous, as will the lawyers, if you have a fabulous prepaid vacation, but I want to know about that. We need to know about that.

That's not an all-exhaustive list; it's just illustrative. I don't want you to tell me either that you work for a living and won't -- can't afford to be away from work unless you know that you will not be paid for your time here in court, because many employers in Clark County pay their employees while they're on jury duty. They continue their salary.

So for instance, if you work for the state, the county, the city, you work for the phone company, the gas company, the power company, you work for any of the large gaming companies like MGM Resorts, any of their operating properties, you work for the Wynn, you work for any of the Sands operating companies, so the Palazzo, the Venetian, they all pay their employees, and of course you'll also be paid a stipend payment of about \$40 a day for your jury service.

So if you haven't asked your employer whether you get paid, don't tell me you're not getting paid, because I'm going to then require you to go out in the hall and call in the presence of my Marshal and find out. Okay.

Like I say, that's not an all-inclusive list, so you

can tell me anything you want to, but I just encourage you to 1 2 please not try and get out of jury duty if it's not absolutely 3 necessary, because I really need to get a jury picked today and get this trial done. 4 5 So with all that being said as a preface, now I pose 6 the question, who here feels that they could not possibly 7 serve these several days I've described to you on the schedule I've described to you? Raise your hand. 8 All right, we're going to take -- oh, and this is 10 how we do this. I'm going to take your excuses on this pad. 11 I'm going to take notes from what you tell me and what 12 questions you answer as I make some follow up inquiries, and 13 then I will meet with the lawyers and make -- we will make a 14 decision together as to who we're going to dismiss and who is 15 not going to be dismissed. And sometimes people disagree with the law think, oh, it should be something else, but it's your duty as jurors to follow the law as I instruct you. Is there anyone who would not be able to do that? And the record will reflect a negative response.

So a defendant in any criminal case that's accused of a crime is always presumed innocent until and -- unless and until the State proves otherwise, proves that they're guilty beyond a reasonable doubt, and that is what is known in our system of justice as the presumption of innocence. Is there anyone who disagrees with that? And the record will reflect a negative response.

So is there anyone who feels that they understand that the presumption of innocence -- as an intellectual matter, they understand it, but they feel like a defendant should really have to prove that they're innocent? Is there anyone who feels that way? And again, the record will reflect a negative response. All right.

Is there anyone who has a religious or moral personally held belief that would make it impossible for them to serve as a juror in the case and do the job of a juror?

And this is what the job of a juror is. The jurors are the fact-finders in a jury trial. They determine what the facts are from the evidence that they hear in the courtroom.

So witnesses testify about things, exhibits come into evidence, and from that, you have to find -- make a determination as to what the facts are.

And I give you, as the Judge, the law. And then I say, okay, you take the law that I've given to you, you use the facts, you apply the facts to the law that I've given you, and then that's how you determine what your verdict is going to be.

So you get to determine the facts. And when I say the facts, so Witness A says the light was green, Witness B says the light was red. You have to determine what color the light was because that's the fact. Then I'll give you the law, and then you apply the facts that you've determined, okay?

Is there anyone who has some belief that says, I can't do that job? And the record will reflect a negative response. All right. Okay.

So what we're going to do next -- okay. So is there anyone who's not a citizen of the United States? And the record will reflect a negative response. Okay.

Is there -- there are two exemptions that allow people to avail themselves of not serving on a jury. The first one is if you're 70 years of age or older and you don't want to serve. You can of course serve, but if you don't want to and you're 70, the statutes allow you to say, no, I'll take

a pass, thanks. It even allows you to say, please don't call me again. But if you want to serve, or you want to remain on the rolls, you most certainly are welcome to and encouraged to do so.

And this jury looks very youthful, and so I don't see anybody that obviously qualifies for that. So if you do want to avail yourself of that, you're going to have to show proof to my Marshal that you're 70 or older. Anyone wants to avail themself of that? All right, I see no hands.

The other exemption is this; if you're 65 years of age or older and you live at least 65 miles one way from the courthouse. So that would mean you'd have to live in Mesquite or Laughlin to qualify for that and still live in the county. And you have to meet both criteria; 65 or older, and 65 miles one way from the courthouse. Anybody meet that criteria and doesn't want to serve? Again, the record will reflect a negative response.

All right, so the next thing we're going to do is we are going to have you all move to the back. We're going to bring in the other folks we've already put through this process. We're going to then merge the two to try and get our jury before 5:00.

And all kinds of things happen during trial, because life happens as we progress, and things happen.

We've had -- over the years, we've had deaths in the family, illness of the jurors. We actually had one juror who got in a car accident with a bus in front of the courthouse and totaled his car, and although he was fine, he wasn't really in any shape to be a juror that day, and so we had to put in an alternate. We actually had a juror who had a nervous breakdown during deliberations.

So all kinds of things can happen, and so you have to be ready to fill the breach at any time, either during the trial if something happens, or even at the point of

And so, during your overnight recess, of course, as usual, you are not to converse among yourselves or with anyone else on any subject connected with the trial, or to read, watch, or listen to any report of or commentary on the trial by any person connected with the trial, or by any medium of information, including, without limitation, newspaper, television, radio, or Internet. You are not to form or express an opinion on any subject connected with the case until it's finally submitted to you.

Additionally, don't do any research on the case.

Don't get on your computer and try and look up anything about anybody having to do with the case. Don't go by any of the scenes that were -- you know, the areas of town that were mentioned to you, like the Wal-Mart. Don't go to that Wal-Mart and look around. Now, anything that you need, you'll learn in the courtroom while court's in session.

So please -- and also, please don't discuss the case with anybody. You know, your friends and family are going to be very excited for you that you're on a jury, and they're going to want to talk to you about it, because it's natural, but please just tell them, I can't talk to you about this now. After the Judge releases me from my duty to not discuss it,

then I can talk to you about it, but until then I can't talk to you about it at all.

So, because some people like to -- you know, they want to tell you about their theories about the justice system, and how they feel, and how probably you should vote on the case. And so just stop that in its tracks and tell them, no, do not talk to me about this, I can't talk to you about it, okay?

And also, let's see, for those of you who may be new to the panel, if you see the lawyers in the courthouse, please don't try and greet them or be courteous to them by saying "hi" and wanting to have small talk, because they are not allowed to talk to you. So don't encourage that because they're going to feel bad because they have to ignore you.

And then of course if you do -- even if you do and they ignore you, they still have to report it to me, then we have to have a hearing and deal with that. So just don't -- because that -- and that will only prolong your time here, so just avoid it by trying not to talk to anybody that you see. And that would include court officers. If you saw me, same thing; if you saw any of the other officers in the court.

The person that you can talk to is the Marshal. The Marshal is your contact with me. If you need to communicate anything to the Court, you tell the Marshal about it. You're not allowed to discuss the case with him. He's just like

anybody else. You can't say, hey, Marshal, what do you think about the evidence? No, that's absolutely not allowed.

So you can also, you know, complain to him about anything in the courthouse, like the traffic, or the elevators, the temperature in the courtroom.

However, he can't do anything about the temperature in the courtroom, nor can I. Those things that look like they might be thermostats that we can control, no, we can't. So the best thing to do is to dress in layers, because if you need to -- if it gets too warm, you can always take something off; if it gets too cold, you can put a sweater back on.

So don't -- obviously, don't come to court in shorts because you're not supposed to wear shorts to court in any event, and you could get cold, because there are times when it gets quite chilly. There are -- most days, you could hang meat in my chambers. It's that cold. So just keep that in mind. And I'll see you tomorrow at 1:30.

THE MARSHAL: All rise for the jury, please.

(Jury recessed at 5:02 p.m.)

THE COURT: All right. The record will reflect that the jury and the two alternates have departed the courtroom. Since we have this kind of ambiguous written peremptory challenges document, I just want to clarify on the record.

So, on the defense side, on the peremptory challenges for the jurors on the number 4 spot, it shows a

strike through 252, seat 8, Fenton is the last name, but that was a mistake. And so that person was intended to be listed as a peremptory challenge, and was peremptory challenged and dismissed from the jury. Even though the paper indicates like there was some kind of error and a strike through that, that was inadvertent.

MR. SHETLER: That's correct, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Correct. And then on the -- also on the defense side, there are two strike-throughs on the alternates peremptory challenge. So there were -- there was one, badge number 222 in seat 19, Spilsbury; and then there was one, 228, seat 22, Pyle. Those are both strike-throughs on those, and that was intentionally to show that that was an error.

MR. SHETLER: Correct, Your Honor.

THE COURT: And the person who was actually peremptory challenged name is written below those two strike-throughs, and that person was badge number 923, seat number 21, Williams. So we'll just -- that's just a clarification of that, because we will be including this as part of the record. So, thank you very much.

MR. SHETLER: I apologize, and I thank the State for their assistance.

THE COURT: That's all right. And so tomorrow, we'll start, as I say, 1:30. I'll probably -- I'll probably be going right up to that time, so if you get here, don't be
