

Solander, Janet  
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Ms. Solander reported that the girls were in therapy from June 2010 through summer 2013. The two younger children were on psychiatric medications prescribed by a psychiatrist. Ms. Solander reported that the girls tend to lie about a variety of things. Ms. Solander reported when she was at church the girls acted out and in time her church friends informed her to return the children to the state. She reported she did not want to do this because she thought it would be more traumatic for the children. Ms. Solander reported that the issues became so intense that in November 2013 they sent them to an out of state behavioral school. That is where the children were until the Solanders were charged and incarcerated.

Ms. Solander was asked why she went to trial. She reported that a lot of the dynamics were exaggerated and she wanted to clarify the allegations at trial. She stated that some of the events happened but they were not as extreme. Pertaining to the children being hit with paint sticks, she reported that she did not want to use her hand and her husband dulled the paint stick so the children were not cut. The girls came from a prior family whereby they were hit with a belt. Regarding the cold showers, she reported she never did that to the children. They were homeschooled because one of the daughters lied and told other people that they were mistreated. The girls began to be homeschooled in 2011. She reported that she did not throw ice on them. She reported historically she washes her face with ice water for beauty reasons. She denied that she put them in cold showers or dumped pitchers of ice water on them. She reported Anastasia deliberately defecated on herself. She would take Anastasia upstairs and into the shower and the smell was horrendous. The girls all had their own color coordinated towels and she reported that they could dry off with towels and they were not dried off by a fan.

Ms. Solander reported the girls slept on a \$99.00 dollar twin bed that she had purchased from KMart. When the foster children arrived, the foster children had to have their own rooms, so the girls slept in the loft and they purchased twin size cots for them. They had a sheet that covered the cot as well as a blanket and two sets of pajamas. She denied the children ever slept on a board. There was a big board in the loft for a Wii game.

Ms. Solander reported that Anastasia did sit on a bucket. Initially she would sit on the toilet to go to the bathroom but she would hold it in. There was not three buckets. She denied that she had any child place soiled underwear in the their mouth until their mouth bled. She also denied that if the children had bathroom accidents they were denied food. She reported that the children always ate. Ms. Solander reported that she did blend food because at times they had constipation and that was the time they received blended food. The children consistently ate regular food.

Ms. Solander reported that one time she took Amaya to a dental appointment and they ran into an old CPS case worker. Amaya had a scratch on her face and the worker asked how she got the scratch and Amaya cried and stated that she will be beat. The lady contacted CPS, CPS investigated and it was unsubstantiated. The other two girls stated that their sister tends to lie and she got the scratch from a fall. She reported that Amaya was also in an after school program and she was being fed a meal. Amaya wanted more food and they told her she could not have any more food. She informed them not to tell her mother because her mother would beat her. This was investigated and also unsubstantiated. Ms. Solander reported that she did not use a catheter on the children. She did not sexually abuse the children in any manner. Ms. Solander

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was asked why her daughter stated that the abuse events happened? Ms. Solander reported that her daughter was on Xanax and may have been influenced taking Xanax.

### **PSYCHOLOGICAL TESTING OF MS. JANET SOLANDER**

#### **Personality Assessment Inventory (PAI)**

The Personality Assessment Inventory (PAI) is a self-report, objective test of personality designed to provide information on client variables. The PAI is designed for the clinical assessment of adult ages 18 and older. The PAI contains 344 items, which comprise 22 scales. Each item is answered with four possible answer choices: false, slightly true, mainly true, and very true. The scales are presented as T-Scores that have a mean of 50 and a standard deviation of 10. The T-score allows comparison of the individual's score to the national standardization sample, and the clinical standardization sample.

The Personality Assessment Inventory was administered to Ms. Solander on May 30, 2018. Analysis of the validity and reliability subscales revealed that she responded consistently and did not endorse any pathology. The positive impression management subscale had a t-score of 64, which indicates that she exhibited a defensive test taking approach which likely submerged her clinical scales.

The full scale profile was assessed within normal limits with the exception of a subclinical elevation on the somatization subscale. Ms. Solander has significant medical problems and this elevation appears to be within normal limits. There is no evidence of an emotional disorder or psychosis. As noted, the clinical subscales were submerged due to defensive test taking approach. Ms. Solander's self esteem appears to be within normal limits. Interpersonally, Ms. Solander has strong needs for affiliation. She may be perceived as friendly and social and somewhat overbearing towards others. She exhibits an above average amount of emotional warmth.

### **RISK ASSESSMENT**

#### **The HCR-20, Third Edition**

The HCR-20, Third Edition is a checklist of risk factors for violent behavior. The HCR-20, Third Edition consists of 20 risk factors organized around ten historical factors, five clinical or present factors, and five risk management factors.

#### **I. Historical factors**

**H1) History of problems with violence:** Ms. Solander has no history of problems with violence that preceded the crime.

**H2) History of problems with other antisocial behavior:** According to the Presentence Investigation Report, Ms. Solander has no history of problems with antisocial behavior as she has never been arrested.

**H3) History of problems with relationships:** This is Ms. Solander's second marriage. She appears to have a stable marriage. There is no significant history of problems in relationships.

**H4) History of problems with employment:** Ms. Solander has always been gainfully employed.

**H5) History of problems with substance use:** Ms. Solander has no history of problems with substance abuse.

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H6) History of problems with major mental disorder: Ms. Solander has no history of problems with a major mental disorder.

H7) History of problems with personality disorder: Ms. Solander has does not appear as if she has a personality disorder.

H8) History of problems with traumatic experiences: Ms. Solander has no history of problems with traumatic experiences.

H9) History of problems with violent attitudes: Ms. Solander does not demonstrate a known history of problems with violent attitudes.

H10) History of problems with treatment or supervision response: There is no history of problems with treatment or supervision.

## II. Clinical factors:

C1) Recent problems with insight: Insight appears adequate.

C2) Recent problems with violent ideation or intent: No recent problems with violent ideation or intent.

C3) Recent problems with symptoms of major mental disorder: No recent problems with symptoms of major mental disorder.

C4) Recent problems with instability: No recent problems with behavioral or psychological instability.

C5) Recent problems with treatment or supervision response: Ms. Solander had complied with pretrial release. She has no problems with current treatment or supervision.

## III. Risk management factors:

R1) Future problems with professional services and plans: There is no anticipated future problems with professional services and plans.

R2) Future problems with living situation: Ms. Solander is incarcerated in jail and likely will serve a lengthy prison sentence.

R3) Future problems with personal support: Ms. Solander has a good family support system.

R4) Future problems with treatment or supervision response: There is no future problems with treatment or supervision response.

R5) Future problems with stress or coping: Coping is adequate.

## ANALYSIS OF THE CASE

Ms. Solander is a 58-year old female who was convicted at trial for approximately 47 counts of child abuse, child abuse with substantial bodily harm and sexual abuse. Attorney McAmis requested a risk assessment with a mitigation focus. Ms. Solander is accused of physically and sexually abusing her three adoptive children. CPS investigated and contacted LVMPD. Ms. Solander reported that she was incarcerated on March 20, 2014 for seven months and bailed out on October 28, 2014. She was on bail for three and a half years without incident. She had a court trial and was convicted on March 13, 2018 and remanded into custody. Please see the body of this report for her psychosocial history. Suffice to say, Ms. Solander was raised in a military family and had multiple geographic moves throughout her childhood and adolescence. Her parents separated when she was 17-years of age. Ms. Solander joined the United States Army and was employed with the army for a few years until she was medically discharged under honorable conditions. Ms. Solander has a history of gainful employment. She completed a bachelor's degree with an A average via an online school. She has no history of drug or alcohol

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problems, no prior criminal history, and she is psychologically stable. She raised four children exceptionally well. She has been married for a second time for numerous years and reported a stable marriage. There are no pre-existing risk factors. In fact she exhibits historical protective/resiliency factors.

Ms. Solander admitted that she hit the children with a paint stick that was dulled. She denied that the children were hit to the point they bled. She denied that she forced the children into cold showers, she denied that she refused to feed the children, she denied that the children slept on a board, and she also denied that she would have any child hold soiled pants in their mouth. In addition, she denied that she ever used a catheter on any child and also denied that she sexually offended any child. Ms. Solander reported a lot of the dynamics have been extremely exaggerated. Psychological testing was naturally defensive.

Aspects of mitigation to consider:

- a) Ms. Solander has no previous criminal history. There is no evidence of an antisocial personality disorder. The Presentence Investigation Report of Ms. Solander revealed no prior criminal arrests or convictions.
- b) Ms. Solander has no substance abuse history.
- c) Ms. Solander is psychologically stable and has no prior serious psychological history.
- d) Three of her four daughters were interviewed. Her daughter's reported that she always has been a very good mother, very involved, strict and protective. There was no history of emotional abuse, physical abuse or neglect. Her daughters described how their mother worked full time, and provided good care for them. Her daughters stated that the current conviction is not reflective of who their mother is and they do not believe their mother committed the crimes.
- e) No prior CPS convictions.
- f) Ms. Solander was on bail for three and a half years without incident.
- g) The HCR 20 - 3<sup>rd</sup> Edition, a violent risk assessment was utilized. Ms. Solander has no known previous risk factors.

The allegations are serious whereby she is accused of physically and sexually abusing three adoptive children and also utilizing harsh punitive parenting techniques. Ms. Solander was convicted of numerous charges. Ms. Solander is minimally receiving 35 years in prison. As such, if this is true she would potentially be released at approximately 94 years of age. This evaluator opines that Ms. Solander is not in the pure high risk range. She has no prior risk factors, yet considering the severity of the crime this would elevate her into a moderate-high risk range. Ms. Solander is not in a pure high risk range. Ms. Solander will serve a lengthy prison sentence. She will likely be a compliant and non combative prisoner. As noted, mitigation is presented for the courts consideration at the time of her sentencing.

Hello, my name is Kimberly Hinton. I am 35 years of age and the second oldest daughter of Janet Solander. Out of all of my sibling's I am considered the child that is closest to my mother. Although that is the case, I'm also the child whom swore I would raise my kids completely different than how I was raised, but that all changed once I too became a mother.

Both my parents were in the military so we grew up being army brats. That meant we traveled frequently and home was not the house we lived in, but always a place that we would gather in temporarily. It was hard to really ever refer to any place as my home because as soon as I got used to the home it was time to relocate again. My military parents ran a tight ship. Beds were made before school, clothes were ironed the night before, and "yes ma'am" or "yes sir" were the two phrases that were spoken more than "please" and "thank you." With that level of responsibility and order I viewed my younger life as that of an adult experience. It seemed like there were always things to do before we could just be kids. It wasn't until I had my first child and my own home that I realized the way I was raised was the best thing that could have happened to me. Yes, in my younger years I thought everything was strict, but I've realized that without that type of order I would not be the woman I am today. I am responsible, respectful, and a great mother because the direction of my parents. I credit my mom even more because of her consistent pursuit to womanly excellence. Although the consistent pursuit could be mistaken as being strict with my sisters and me, she always meant well.

She became divorced when I was in middle school and it was almost as if our lives didn't skip a beat. She worked full time taking care of four kids. She managed to cook home cooked meals every night while ensuring we were honor roll students in school. As draining and stressful as that life came to be for mom, I have only seen her shed tears a few times in my 35 years of existence. She is strong, caring, and hardworking. She has always been the type of mother to do whatever she needs to do to provide for her kids. We had nice clothes but nothing too fancy. We didn't go out to eat often because home cooked meals around the table were our family time. We grew up in Ohio living only a couple of miles from our grandma once mom got divorced. We stayed with our grandma before and after school. Mom and grandma were very close. They talked everyday sometimes about her little sister who also lived with grandma and her older sister who live about 25 minutes away. Our family was close knit. We spent a lot of time together. Grandma and grandpa divorced early on and I always only knew them to be separated. I have never experienced them in the same home, but that still did not keep us from being a close knit family. In 2006, grandma became ill and passed away. My mother and I were living in Arizona at the time. Mom was able to secure a ticket while grandma was still in the hospital alive and able to speak before she passed. No one expected her to pass. She was the glue of the family. She was my mother's very best friend. They talked every single day and even though mom had remarried and we lived far away she still spoke to grandma every day. Losing grandma took a toll on everyone in the family, especially mom. My mom, the woman that only showed but few emotions of the effect of hard times would start to randomly cry all the time. She never discussed the pain with me, she would just get emotional and leave the room to compose herself. It was hard for me to see my mom in that condition. She seemed broken down, hurt, and unattached to life. It seemed that she was a different person. I have never known her to be this person. I was used to mom being strong and although breaking down does not make you weak it did for my mother. I wondered how life would be moving forward without the one person she dialogued with every day. The next few years were hard. Living without grandma really changed

my mom. The day we buried grandma I truly believe a part of mom went with her. It took a few years before mom started to be more like herself and showing the emotions caused by trying times became less frequent.

In June 2010 my mother and step father fostered Ava, Amaya, and Anastasia. I remember meeting them for the first time in Ohio at a family reunion. I had lived in Pennsylvania at that time but also traveled to Ohio for the reunion. The girls were so happy to meet us. They smiled they laughed they played. My mother had talked about adopting because my step father and her had no children together. It was beautiful to see them as a family so happy. They were Hispanic decent but that didn't matter to us our entire family is mixed race so they fit right in. I couldn't wait to get to know the girls. My parents adopted them in Jan 2011 and our first family trip was to Disney world. The girls had so much fun. We rented a house with character theme bedrooms and we had our very own pool. Seeing the girls light up made my heart so full and happy. Knowing they came from the foster system to now seeing them smiling everyday was so delightful to witness. I grew to love these girls and I still love them unconditionally. I am so thankful these girls came into my mother's life to return the smile she once had before grandma passed.

As time started to pass the girls became problematic for mom. At the time she had to hire a nanny for them because she worked full time on base. The girls would begin to urinate on themselves and sometimes even defecate. Mom was very neat and tidy with her home. She would spend countless amount of hours washing clothes and cleaning the girls rooms. I remember one time she called me to tell me that one of the girls had defecated herself and wiped the poop all over the new 800.00 bed she had bought for two of the girls. Although something like this would cause anyone to be upset mom was more frustrated. She began to reach out to the girls previous foster parents and even the agency because this sort of behavior was new to her. The previous foster mom did offer mom some advice but the girls continued to have their issues. They began to lie on each other sometimes becoming physical with each other, however this was nothing new to mom because raising four girls of her own the fighting and lying was common. Mom was able to find a nanny Andrea. Andrea was kind she was in church and she loved god. It made things easier for mom because she also was in church and what better person to care for the girls then someone who attended church and loved god. Unfortunately the girls acted out with Andrea as well. It seemed as though they didn't care about their lives. They even had issues in school. They would go to school and steal food from other people's lunch. One of the girls would not be social at all. It was just a very difficult time for mom and Dwight. I think things started out good but just like a marriage after that honeymoon period if there are any problems they will surface, and that they did.

Mom lost her nanny Andrea because Andrea told my mom that she could no longer deal with the girls. She especially could not deal with Amaya. Amaya tested her the most. In fact one time she pooped on herself and put her hand in it to show Andrea. Things that were just not normal for their ages. Mom had to quit her job to care for the girls. It took a toll on her and her marriage. Days that used to be spent doing fun things and spending family time together turned into timeouts, cleaning up urine or poop, and reaching out to different professionals to help the girls. I felt bad for my parents. They just knew that information regarding the girls was not fully released to them before adoption. I agreed with them, because a child will not just randomly act

out in these ways without ever having done it before. I prayed that my parents would get the answers to their questions and get the girls the help that they needed.

Mom didn't get answers to their behavioral issues but the girls began to also show signs of unhealthiness and became diagnosed with different health issues. My parents did whatever they could to make sure they followed up with doctors and gave the girls whatever medications that they needed. Although they still continued to have issues at least they were in a position to be treated. As time passed things got worse. Dwight had committed to more jobs that would require he go out of town. It definitely took a toll on mom. She would take pictures of anything that the girls did wrong and send them to Dwight so that he could see just how bad things were still. Like most kids the girls seemed to take advantage of not listening when Dwight was out of town because she was by herself. Mom begged Dwight to just work solely local so that she could have more help with the girls. By the time Dwight would return from out of town a few days would have went by and trying to punish the girls from something they did 3 days ago just was not working out. At this point I don't think it mattered the girls were used to Dwight being gone at least 2 days out of the week.

Eventually my mother called me to tell me about a boarding school for the girls. I did not like this decision because that meant whenever we would get together we would not see the girls. My step father had accepted a job offer in Florida where the boarding school was so throughout that first year Dwight would see them the most while he was in town for work and then the following year both my parents would move there. I asked her about visiting them and she told me that for the first 3 months I believe you could not visit them. The rules of the boarding school seemed too strict. Obviously being away from your family in a different state and not getting to see them for at least 3 months would be hard. I didn't know if the girls would be ok. I don't know if they realized how bad their behavior was at home and why it was adamant to send them away to get the help that they needed. I just wanted them to be ok. I didn't want them to feel abandoned like they did when they were put into the foster system. My parents gave them everything. They gave them a life that I know they did not have before being fostered and adopted from my parents. In fact they grew up to have things that only my sisters and I wished we would have had. But sending them away made me sad. I didn't want them to think that my parents gave up on them because they didn't, they just wanted to get them the help that they needed in order to be a better person and then get back on track in life. Mom said when the girls first went to the boarding school they cried but slowly conversations got better in fact Amaya said that she found God. It was great to see that things were finally looking up again.

My mom also had three siblings, two sisters (Krissi and Cheryl) and one brother (Tony). Her siblings were all she had. As sibling typically do, they always haven't seen eye to eye, but they always maintained their bond. In 2012, my mom's oldest sister (Cheryl) while driving her vehicle suffered a heart attack. Her heart attack led to an open heart surgery that would leave her paralyzed from and with a speech impediment. Once again, my mom had to figure out how to cope with this and move forward. Mom was the second oldest and so with the oldest sister being ill, mom was looked to for guidance from her other siblings. Mom had a hard time seeing her sister who was once vibrant and full of life now struggle to respond and simply communicate. This was their reality, first their mom passed unexpectedly and now a disabled sister. Mom's youngest sister (Krissi) became the main caretaker for her older sister because she was the only sibling that lived in proximity. Her younger sister was hardly ever responsible so this setup would lead to many breakdowns for mom. She always worried about her sister and could not stand the thought of not being closer to help. Not 2 years later Krissi also suffered a heart attack

and passed away 24 hours later. Mom lived in Las Vegas and at this time she was only able to attend the funeral. I was the child that had to deliver the news to mom about Krissi passing away. The brokenness, the crying, the hollering I heard on the other end of the phone just added to what I was already feeling. I just delivered my mother the news that any child should never have to experience communicating. Mom was not the same she had lost too much too soon. Three years after Krissi's funeral, news was given that Grandpa suddenly passed away. Of course this death took life out of mom. Her father had memory loss for two years before he passed and he stop remembering all of us. It's hard to lose a father that was already gone on the inside. My mother endured so much in such a small amount of time. I learned more about my mother in these deaths that I did my whole life. I learned about what pain can do to a person. I learned about the type of love that my mother had for us. Her goal in life was to always make us better, for us to be strong educated woman, for us to be respectful members of society. More importantly she would do anything to make sure we had good lives. I'm not sure why God took away so much of my family in such a short amount of time, but I am grateful that mom got to experienced life with them.

This case has really made me view life much differently. The fact of the matter is everyone in our family is losing too. We lost three little sisters we grew to love and from the looks of the mandatory sentence expectation, we'll lose a mother too. I watched the media turn my mother into a monster, with no regard to her existence as a human being. Our families and our commitments to our jobs left us without a way to fly to be there for her every day of her trial. I talked to her every day, I told her I loved her every day. I made a point to let my mother know we are there for her and that same love and support will not change no matter the outcome. As you can imagine losing three little sisters whom we love and our mother to the jail system is a great loss. I am writing this letter to not only defend my mother's character but more importantly to allow you to see the value of her life. I feel that her trial and the media's views on her took away her true value. She is a great mother and a mother I know who wanted only the best for her daughters and her adopted daughters (our baby sisters) . Our lives meant something to her. Everything she has done has always been out of love and protection for us and my adopted sisters. She will leave behind two living siblings one who is disabled and another who lives out of state. She is also leaving behind four children and eight grandchildren. One whom is not yet born. Our hearts are torn to pieces. There is great loss in this case for both parties and in the end pain will exist for all involved. I love those three little girls and my mother with all of my heart. I pray that God remains the center of this case and prevails.

Thank you for taking the time to read my letter but more importantly allowing this letter to be submitted. I understand the value of your time and I truly from the bottom of my heart thank you for allowing me to speak on my mother's behalf.

## Re: Janet Solander

Janet Solander is my mother. I am her oldest child. I am just turned 37 years old this year. I love my mother very much. She has taught me many valuable lessons over the years... lessons in parenting, in loving, in responsibility, respect and how to be a strong independent woman. She raised four girls majority of our years as a single mother. She never showed any signs of weakness, even when we knew there were moments of discouragement. She always kept us encouraged and focused. She loved us very much, and did everything in her power to make sure we were always taken care of. She was a good mother; she was never violent toward us. Our mother raised us well, and being strict came with that territory, by doing so it allowed us to make smarter choices growing up. Due to our upbringing we are all very happy women who lead successful and God led lives. We are all Christ followers, and remain praying unit through all situations and encounters we endure.

My mom was a hard worker, she wanted to help whenever and wherever she could, she was supportive, and courageous in many ways. As a family we have faced many trials and tribulations over the past several years. Within the trials I started to notice for the first time in my life they took a piece of my mom along with them. When my Grandmother (my mother's mom) passed away twelve years ago (2006), it affected her deeply. She was very close to my Grandmother and had spent many, many years aiding to my Grandmothers needs financially, and physically.

In 2013, seven years later My Aunt (my Mother's oldest sister) had a massive stroke, leaving her completely disabled and needing someone to take care of her for the rest of her life. It was a long road to recovering for my Aunt, we were scared she wasn't going to make it. My mother aided in her recovery. Making trips to Ohio every time she went into surgery, making many phone calls to her doctors to stay on top of everything going on, as she understood the medical jargon better than anyone else in the family.

In 2015, two years later my other Aunt (my Mother's youngest sister) was hit with an unexpected stroke, causing swelling to her brain and killing her within a couple days. She was in her early 40's leaving behind three children (two of which are minors), and my disabled Aunt. This weighed extreme on all of us, and even more so, on my mother who now has lost her mom, her youngest sister, and needing to find care for a disabled sister. My Mother and my Uncle being the only two siblings left worked hard to help out with this tragic loss, all while grieving themselves.

Two years after my Aunt's death, my Grandfather (my Mother's Father) unexpectedly passed away due to unexplained internal bleeding. When we received the phone call that he was in the hospital we went there and right away called my Mother so that she could fly in. She was unable to make it in as he passed several hours later. A week before Thanksgiving and my Mother has now lost her Mother, Father, youngest Sister, and her oldest sister is disabled and unable to function at the full capacity of the average adult.

Watching my Mother go through all this death, pain, and heartache along with her own personal health issues, has completely torn my heart apart. She was unable to tell her Sister and her Father bye, by the time she made it in town for my Grandmother she was unable to speak. It has been challenging and I have seen this change my Mother. She had gone into what I would believe is a state of depression, and every time our family took another hit another piece of her went with it.

When I first met the girls they came to Ohio for our Family Reunion. I remember watching my Mom try her best to make sure the girls were comfortable and welcomed by all of us. My Mother would make sure that we were always well aware if one of the girls became ill, and made sure they had the chance to speak with us when they were, as we felt it lifted their spirits up.

My Mother is a good woman. Like everyone she is flawed and has made mistakes, but I know that my Mother is not capable of the things she has been accused of. She has been through so much pain, and loss, and continues to lose more and more of herself with every hit she takes. Facing these charges she has missed my sister Kim's wedding, and now will miss my wedding this year. She will also miss the birth of her newest grandchild, and the high school graduation of her first born grandson. I ask that you please see my mother for who she really is. She is not an abuser, nor is she capable of these horrid accusations placed upon her. She is a God fearing woman who saw that these three young girls needed a loving home away from the life they were previously given. This is a hard hit for our whole family.

I love my Mother so deeply, and would vouch for her in a heartbeat. Prison is not where she should be.

My name is Dominique and I am Janet's third daughter and I am 29 years old. My mother has been an extremely influential person in my life. She has taught me to push for my dreams even when the going gets tough. I remember sitting with my mom before I entered my undergraduate degree and she told me you are going to have to make sacrifices and take a few steps back to be able to leap forward but you can do it I know you can. She said your strong and determined and I never doubted you ever. I carry that with me to this day I will be graduating with my Bachelors in Nursing this December and I attribute much of my drive and determination to my mom. She has always been encouraging and pushed my sisters and I to be successful. Throughout my life my mom has also taught me many other life lessons. She taught me to be loving, respectful, disciplined, a loving mother, a strong independent woman and a lover of Christ. She is an amazing mother and I look up to her for everything. Although she was a single mother for a good majority of my younger years she definitely didn't let us feel that there was a deficit. She did everything for us and she made sure our life was fulfilled regardless of our situation. My mom was not a violent person by any means she was strict but that made us who we are today. In my previous jobs that I held before pursuing my career I was always complimented by management on how well disciplined I was for someone so young and the common statement that would be made is your parents raised you well and it shows in your discipline and work ethic. These people would say these things not realizing that it was all my mom's doing and the way that she raised us. I myself owe it all to my mom for being the woman that I am today.

I have always seen my mom as a hard worker and she was always willing to sacrifice her needs for ours and her family. Despite doing so much for others she remained positive and genuinely happy to be taking care of others. Now we all experience tough times and heartache at some points in life but my family went through what seemed to be a series of unfortunate events. Despite the distance between us we have a pretty close knit family so when bad things happen it hurts a lot. My mom was very close to her mom so when my grandma passed away in 2006 for the first time in my life I saw my mom broken. My grandma meant everything to my mom and her death took away so many things. Now every year when we visited our hometown my grandma wasn't there and that was devastating for my mom.

A few years later in 2013 my mom's older sister unexpectedly had a stroke that almost took her life but it left her incapacitated. Again I noticed another piece of my mom broken. My aunt was still alive and we were all very grateful for that but it was still a loss of the aunt we once knew. My mom was with my aunt every step of the way in the recovery process but that was hard on her.

A couple years after that event my mom's younger sister unexpectedly had a stroke as well. Unfortunately my aunt did not make it and my mom was now burying her baby sister who barely made it to her early 40's.

Unfortunately it didn't end there two years after my youngest aunt passed we lost my grandpa unexpectedly as well. My mom tried to be strong through all of this but I could tell that it was constant defeat for her every time something happened and it changed her.

My mom really gave everything she could for her family and her children and that is including Anastasia, Amaya, and Ava. My mom took the girls in as her own and I watched her care and love those girls with everything she had just like she did for us growing up. My mom wanted the best for them and she wanted to give them a second chance at life. A chance to have a big family that was close knit and that loved them, a chance to beat the odds of the foster care system and just a chance to finally have a future to be excited about. Choosing to put the girls in boarding school was a difficult decision for my mom. I saw the pain that it brought her to have to make such a difficult decision because she loved them so dearly and she wasn't going to give up on them. Seeing the girls deal with the inner demons that they had was heartbreaking. Yet despite my mom walking into to such a situation she wanted to fight for them and give them a life that they never knew they could have and that meant making the hard decisions like boarding school.

Through it all I watched my mom experience all of this pain and heartache along with dealing with her own health issues. My mom is not perfect but she isn't the monster that she has been made out to be. My mom is far from a monster. My mom touches the lives of everyone she encounters in a way that leaves you feeling like a better version of yourself. I know very deeply that my mom is not guilty of the crimes in which she is being accused of. It is so very easy for someone to paint a picture but if they don't know my mom then how can they accurately paint that picture. I pray that you read this letter as well as the letters from my sisters and really see who my mom is. She may not be the same person because of life taking a toll on her but she is still a loving, kind, and generous person inside.

My mom means the world to me and the thought of her going to prison is hard for me swallow. I would vouch for my mom on any given day because I know she doesn't belong behind bars.

4 Solander case or is everybody ready to go forward?

5 MS. BLUTH: The State is ready.

6 THE COURT: State versus Dwight Solander. Mr. Solander is  
7 present out of custody with Mr. Mueller. Danielle Hinton.

8 MR. RUE: She's present.

9 THE COURT: Ms. Hinton is present out of custody with Mr.  
10 Rue, and Janet Solander who is present in custody with Ms. Wildeveld  
11 and Ms. McAmis. And we have Ms. Bluth and Mr. Hamner for the State.  
12 This is the time set for the rendition of sentence. Are all sides -- both  
13 sides ready to go forward?

14 MS. BLUTH: Yes, Your Honor, on behalf of the State.

15 MS. MCAMIS: Yes, Your Honor, on behalf of Ms. Solander.

16 THE COURT: Mr. Mueller.

17 MR. MUELLER: Your Honor, I want to ask that Mr. Solander's  
18 sentencing be trailed until after the -- or Mrs. Solander. This was a three  
19 week trial. I was not present for a lot of the testimony. If something  
20 comes out during sentencing that I don't know about, I want to be able to

23 THE COURT: I understand what you're saying. My concern

1 MS. BLUTH: Yes, Your Honor.

2 THE COURT: All right. My concern is, as you know, they  
3 have a statutory right to speak last, and I only -- I don't want them to  
4 have to speak over and over again. I think that was the State's wish  
5 with moving the dates and everything like that. So, that would be my  
6 concern. I'm assuming the State would have a similar concern and they  
7 may have other concerns that I'm not aware of. State.

8 MS. BLUTH: I don't have any -- obviously this is Your Honor's  
9 courtroom. So, I know that you'll make a decision. I don't have any  
10 problem with Mr. Solander going last. That way he -- you know, Mr.  
11 Mueller has the opportunity to hear everything that I have to say.

12 THE COURT: You mean going last in terms of arguing last  
13 among the lawyers?

14 MS. BLUTH: Yes. Because then he'll have the opportunity to  
15 hear everything that we've all spoken about, but other than that --

16 THE COURT: You want him to have an opportunity to have  
17 heard the victim speakers.

18 MR. MUELLER: Okay. What I propose, Judge, to protect Mr.  
19 Solander's right and for the ends of justice, I'd ask that he and I just sit  
20 right there in the front row and watch the -- see what [indiscernible] and  
21 then we'll call the case and sentence him. So, we can include the  
22 testimony by reference.

23 MS. BLUTH: Well, no, the girls are going to -- I mean, the  
24 girls have a statutory right to go last so --

25 THE COURT: They do. Here's what I would propose. The

1 State is going to argue as to -- I'm assuming -- well let me ask this. Ms.  
2 Bluth, how do you wish to argue this? Do you wish to argue first as to  
3 addressing your argument as to, you know, Mrs. Solander and then  
4 hearing from defense counsel and Ms. Solander and then arguing as to  
5 either Ms. Hinton or Mr. Solander, and then hearing from that counsel  
6 and then hearing from the girls at the end or did the State want to  
7 address all three Defendants at once? It makes sense to the Court that  
8 because the facts are different, because one Defendant was tried, one  
9 Defendant cooperated, one Defendant pled and didn't cooperate; that  
10 you address each Defendant separately; that we hear from counsel.  
11 And then because they do have a statutory right to speak last, then we'll  
12 hear from the victim speakers at the very end.

13 MS. BLUTH: I'm prepared to do it either way, Judge. So, it  
14 doesn't matter. Whatever the Court and Defense would agree.

15 THE COURT: Okay. That makes more sense to the Court.  
16 And, counsel, any preference -- that makes more sense to me to handle  
17 each one individually.

18 MR. MUELLER: I understand, Judge. There's no perfect way  
19 of doing this, but they are -- they are not similarly situated, and I'm at a  
20 distinct disadvantage not having sat through a three week trial.

21 THE COURT: Well I think truthfully, Mr. Mueller, that should  
22 have been brought up ahead of time that you were going to be  
23 requesting a continuance and you have requested, I think, in May a prior  
24 continuance.

25 MR. MUELLER: I didn't request a continuance. I just asked

1 that be -- or that we go last. I'm ready to go to sentencing.

2 THE COURT: Oh, you can go last. That's fine.

3 MR. MUELLER: Thank you. That's all I'm asking.

4 THE COURT: That's fine. Absolutely. So, you can sit there --  
5 down and then they can address Mrs. Solander and Ms. Hinton and then  
6 you can go last.

7 MR. MUELLER: All right. Thank you, Judge.

8 THE COURT: I thought you meant you wanted to --

9 MR. MUELLER: No, I wasn't seeking to --

10 THE COURT: -- but initially you had asked to move it to  
11 another day.

12 MR. MUELLER: No, no. I've signed us both in.

13 THE COURT: All right. No, that's absolutely fine. And then,  
14 Mr. Rue, as to Ms. Hinton, are you ready to go forward?

15 MR. RUE: Yes, Judge.

16 THE COURT: All right. So, State, would you like to address  
17 Mrs. Solander or Ms. Hinton first?

18 MS. BLUTH: If we could just do Ms. Solander first, Your  
19 Honor.

20 THE COURT: All right.

21 MS. BLUTH: Thank you.

22 THE COURT: This being a jury verdict, obviously you have  
23 the right to argue.

24 MS. BLUTH: And, Judge, I apologize. I forgot my glasses.  
25 Would it be okay if I used the stand --

1 THE COURT: Sure.

2 MS. BLUTH: -- so I don't have to --

3 So, the one thing that I think does apply to all three and I don't  
4 want to repeat it over and over, I do want to tell you a little bit about each  
5 of the girls because I didn't really have that opportunity. I'm not going to  
6 go through all of the facts because we all heard them for four to six  
7 weeks. But I do want to let you know the things that you don't know  
8 about them.

9 Ava, the oldest, Ava is --she's very quiet, she's much more  
10 withdrawn. And the amount of pain that she keeps inside, honestly,  
11 Judge, is intolerable but it's nothing compared to the guilt that she holds  
12 no matter how many times I can tell her that this isn't her fault, no matter  
13 how many times her therapist can tell her that this isn't her fault, no  
14 matter how many times Ms. Debbie can tell her that this isn't her fault, it  
15 just -- it doesn't sink in. She will forever feel like it was her job to protect  
16 her two little sisters and that she failed. And just to remind the Court, I  
17 mean, this is a nine, ten, eleven, twelve year old child who thinks this is  
18 my fault because I couldn't protect my little sisters.

19 It's one of those situations -- it's so weird because the three of  
20 them, they do argue and they hold feelings against one another, well,  
21 you got treated better and you got treated better, and I got treated  
22 worse, but then they also have this real protective mechanism between  
23 one another. So, it's like, you know, it's that situation where you can talk  
24 crap about your sister but nobody else can talk crap about your sister,  
25 and that's kind of how they are.

1 But I'll never forget when, you know, both Amaya and Ava  
2 saw the pictures of Anastasia's burns, and I -- these were introduced in  
3 the trial, but I know the Court remembers these burns to Anastasia. And  
4 both girls broke down. In fact, I think we had to take a break once or  
5 twice with them because that was little sister and this is the person that  
6 they felt that they should protect most and they watched this day in and  
7 day out. And I said to Ava, I said, when you were in that situation and  
8 that was your life every single day, every single day it was get up, go do  
9 your school work, have accidents, get beaten for having accidents, go  
10 back, sit on a bucket until you went to bed; cold showers, ice being  
11 dumped every single day, and I said did you ever think it was going to  
12 stop. Ever. And she said I thought that that was going to be my life for  
13 the rest of my life until she killed us. And that was what she thought  
14 every single day.

15 And the last thing I want to say about Ava is when she was  
16 expressing some of the hardships, I said to her, you know, now you're  
17 with Ms. Debbie and Ms. Debbie loves you, and she said please don't  
18 use that word. And I said, I'm sorry, I don't mean to offend you. What  
19 word are you talking about? And she said I don't want you to use the  
20 word love. And I said why. And she said because I don't know what  
21 that word means. I don't know. I know that I don't think I've ever loved  
22 anybody and I know for sure that nobody's ever loved me. And that kind  
23 of really encompasses how she feels.

24 Amaya is the one who wants to be loved and accepted the  
25 most. She is much more verbal about her pain. She does act out and



1 lash out, but the love that she has form Ms. Debbie and the love that Ms.  
2 Debbie has for her is pretty inspiring and she's finally gotten what she  
3 has been seeking for so many years. She told me many times that she  
4 was so confused that she didn't understand what was happening in the  
5 home because she felt like Janet was creating these issues, and then  
6 they were getting trouble for the issues that Janet was creating.

7 And so she was in this constant cyclical thing where she  
8 couldn't break the cycle. And she said I had to sit and watch as she  
9 beat my sisters, as she burned Anastasia, as she banged Ava's eye into  
10 the counter over and over and over again. The pain she also carries  
11 and the guilt for not protecting her sisters even though she's the middle  
12 one is something that she's explained to me many times.

13 And then there's Anastasia who, you know, is the baby of the  
14 family, and I think she carries a little bit of guilt not as much as the  
15 others because I'm not sure she understood the gravity of the situation  
16 as much. She's much more outgoing and fun loving, but she's also  
17 angry, angry about what happened to her. And we've explained to  
18 them, and I know this is something Ms. Debbie says to them all the time,  
19 is that they are not victims, that they are survivors, but the road that they  
20 have is long, and they have a long way to go to where they're not angry  
21 anymore and they're not in a lot of pain.

22 I was pretty upset when I read the defense sentencing memo  
23 as well as the evaluation where it states: The defense position is that  
24 the girls exaggerated the more serious of the allegations. I have never  
25 and I probably never will again have a case that has this amount of

1 evidence. Some pictures of the burns to the pictures that we found on  
2 the emails between Defendants -- the Defendant Solanders of the  
3 picture of Amaya that you saw during the trial, Judge, with the marks to  
4 her face, and these things were very real and they happened and we  
5 have pictures of them all.

6 And when I -- when you look at -- you have the testimony from  
7 the children themselves. Then you have the testimony from the nanny,  
8 then you have the testimony from the other children, then you have the  
9 statements from Danielle Hinton, and it's the still the Defendants'  
10 position that these little girls are liars and that they're exaggerators. And  
11 in Janet's evaluation, the girls are liars, they have mental issues. She  
12 had to quit her job because the nanny quit because she couldn't handle  
13 the children. But you heard from that nanny and you heard that the  
14 reason why she quit was because she couldn't handle what was going  
15 on in that house anymore. She says that the children never received  
16 cold showers. The other children in the home came in and said that  
17 they received cold showers.

18 MS. MCAMIS: Objection; misstates the testimony.

19 MS. BLUTH: No, I doesn't.

20 MS. MCAMIS: It does.

21 MS. BLUTH: Actually, it doesn't because the other children in  
22 the home heard the buckets --

23 THE COURT: Right. I think they said they heard of the ice,  
24 and I don't know that they knew the temperature of the water coming out  
25 of the shower, but as I recall the testimony -- well my recollection might

1 be incorrect, but there was testimony about the buckets of the ice or  
2 cups of ice, whatever it was, not the actual temperature of the faucet.  
3 That's how I recall it. Does that comport with your recollection, Ms.  
4 Bluth?

5 MS. BLUTH: Yes. And Ms. Hinton also discussed in either  
6 her testimony or her statement to the police about the cold showers.  
7 She denies the fact that they were hit to the point that they bled yet they  
8 have linear scars all over their bottoms and their legs. Her daughter,  
9 Danielle Hinton, said that she knew about that, and the Defendant's  
10 answer for that is, oh, well, Danielle was on Xanax and that might have  
11 affected what she said.

12 She denies that the children sat on buckets, but the -- Mr.  
13 Solander admits to buying the buckets and the toilet seats. And on the  
14 picture that we have you can see two out of the three photos. The  
15 catheter, she denied that that was ever used yet we have pictures of a  
16 used catheter from her phone to the Defendant. I mean, I -- there are so  
17 many times in cases where I can't understand why and this is one. I  
18 don't understand. I read the letters from her daughters. They seem to  
19 all be wonderful human beings in successful lives that talk about a great  
20 childhood and that their mom was strict but that she needed to be.

21 That's why I can't understand why now. Why adopt these  
22 children and then treat them like that? It doesn't make sense to me. But  
23 a lot doesn't make sense to me. It doesn't make sense to me about all  
24 of the untruths, all of the lies that she talks about. Her own husband in  
25 his sentencing eval or in his psych eval says that she told her husband

1 that she was a nurse and that she was a lieutenant colonel in the Army.  
2 And it wasn't until all of this came out that he realized that none of that  
3 was true. And there's just so much that I don't understand about Mrs.  
4 Solander.

5 I really can't tell you how much it would have meant to those  
6 three girls if Janet would have just said I'm sorry. It got out of control, it  
7 escalated, and I'm sorry. But in her last attempt to be able to do that  
8 besides today, she called -- tells them they're lying, that they have  
9 mental issues. Not one I'm sorry, not an I'm sorry from giving her  
10 scalding burns, not a I'm sorry for burning her face, not one time, and  
11 that's all they could have needed. Do you have any idea what that  
12 would have done for those three little girls?

13 At the end of the day, you know, I know and the Court knows  
14 and everybody in here knows that the minimum is a 35 to life; right? I  
15 mean, it -- and so I was thinking about, you know, how do -- how do I  
16 explain why I want a child abuse with substantial ran consecutive to that  
17 because timing, it doesn't matter. It's not about the time. We all  
18 recognize that 35 to life -- and I don't mean this disrespectfully -- but,  
19 you know, I think in the sentencing memo they said it's akin to a death  
20 sentence. This is, you know, she would be something like 94 years old  
21 or something like that. But because this went on for so long and  
22 because there was sex assault and because there were day in and day  
23 out beatings, I believe that a message has to be sent, and that is that  
24 you cannot do this to multiple children on multiple days for multiple years  
25 and get the minimum.

1           So, I'm asking that she be found or, excuse me, that she be  
2 sentenced to the sex assault on Anastasia with a paint stick. And  
3 forgive me, Your Honor, I don't know what number it is. I forgot to look it  
4 up, I think it's like 38 or 39, and the child abuse with substantial for the  
5 burn on Anastasia and that those two be run consecutively. And so --

6           THE COURT: Which count is that?

7           MS. BLUTH: I'll have to go back to my Indictment. I  
8 apologize. And I look and I'll let you know. And I'm asking that those  
9 two run consecutively. So, it would be a 35 to life and a consecutive  
10 eight to 20. There's nothing more that I can say. I think the best people  
11 should really give Your Honor an understanding of what they went  
12 through are the girls. And so I just ask that you take what they have to  
13 say into account. I know Ms. McClain, who's really kind of the unsung  
14 hero in this entire thing and I have so much respect for her, she's also  
15 noticed and she would like to speak -- the girls would like to speak first  
16 and she'd like to speak last, and I'll submit it with that. And I'll look at  
17 the Indictment.

18           THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Ms. Solander, your  
19 lawyer will have an opportunity to speak on your behalf and the Court  
20 understands that, obviously, this matter is going to be appealed after the  
21 rendition of sentence today and the JOC is signed. But what, if  
22 anything, would you like to say to the Court before the Court pronounces  
23 sentence again you?

24           DEFENDANT JANET SOLANDER: I would like to say that,  
25 you know, speaking with the psychologist and everything, I did not



1 actually -- some of the things were brought out the way they were  
2 brought out was not always correct.

3           What I had said to him and what I had, you know, basically  
4 had said was I am not innocent of all of this, I definitely am not. I mean,  
5 I agree with that. But the thing is, is that I feel like the prosecutors took  
6 a lot of it and blew it out of proportion. This is what I feel what  
7 happened. I, you know, I was facing 46 counts, I was facing 46 counts,  
8 was in custody for seven months and got out. For three and a half  
9 years, and I was out for three and a half years on bail. I am not a  
10 danger, I never was a danger. I'm not a sexual offender. I'm not, you  
11 know, this is not what I do, this is not what I do. I would give my shirt to  
12 somebody. I have gone with my own children 365 days at least, not  
13 consecutively, I've gone to bed hungry so my own children would have.  
14 All right. And these girls, I still love them. It's, you know, it is not what  
15 was said that I did to them was not what we -- what was done to them.

16           Now I tried to get help. I wrote a book in regards to the issues  
17 that, you know, we were having with the system, the foster care system  
18 because of the fact that the behaviors that they had, you know, we were  
19 not getting the help that we needed. So, what I did was -- my husband  
20 traveled. We decided that we would try putting them in the school which  
21 they ended up with marvelous grades, and then we were going to move  
22 there. So, this is the reason why.

23           In the testimony that was stated that were taking hammers  
24 down and hiding them because we knew -- that's not the case. Two  
25 weeks from the week that we were arrested, my husband was offered a

1 position in Florida, and that position kept him from traveling. This is  
2 what our plan was. This is the reason why we sent our girls to Florida.  
3 The minimum for them to go to school is 12 months -- for a year. So,  
4 they went to school, it would have been for a year. We would have  
5 gotten them out and we would have been able to visit them because we  
6 were right there. We would have gotten them out, and the plan was to  
7 have them to go back to regular school. Either the issues, the  
8 behavioral issues would have either been resolved or they would have  
9 been at least minimized. But this is what the plan was. We were  
10 moving. We had a set appointment for a moving truck to come and pack  
11 up our household goods. We were moving.

12 I don't claim to be a perfect mom by no means. I don't claim  
13 to say I did spank these girls with a paint stick that my husband had, you  
14 know, had sawed off the corners so that they wouldn't get cut. But I also  
15 know that the -- there were belts used on these girls prior to, you know,  
16 when they were in foster care -- when they were in their biological  
17 homes. Okay. I know there's other issues. All right. I'm not saying that  
18 I didn't do any of these things, okay, but to the extent that it's being said,  
19 is absolutely not true.

20 I could have ran if I wanted to run. My family is in my  
21 courtroom right now -- is in this courtroom right now. My family's here,  
22 my children. Okay. I am here -- that's what -- that's my life is my  
23 children. I have never had as much as a traffic ticket, you know. The  
24 only thing I wanted to do was to make a better life for these girls. I'm not  
25 saying that I did the best thing that I could have done. I'm not even

1 saying that with my own children. But, you know, the thing is, is that  
2 what my children are saying about me is probably the way it is. If my  
3 children and my family that's in the courtroom now could have come  
4 here and seen -- actually been able to watch the trial, they would have  
5 been horrified to hear what was said.

6 And I am not going to go into the whole details of everything,  
7 but I know things that were not said, like, me going to their school and  
8 sitting there watching them eat. I was working full time, I was working  
9 full time. I worked at Nellis Air Force Base. I was working -- I lived.  
10 Nellis Air Force Base is in North Las Vegas. We lived in northwest.  
11 There is -- I only got an hour lunch. There was no way I could have  
12 came and sat with them at lunch every day as what's stated. There is  
13 no way.

14 These are the things that have been said about me that are  
15 just -- what I mean by being blown out of proportion. I did not come and  
16 sit every day with these girls. And as far as the nanny that Ms. Bluth  
17 was referring to, that is not the nanny that we were talking about. We  
18 had a nanny that worked with us -- her name was Andrea -- for a whole  
19 year. This is the nanny that should have been called to the stand to  
20 testify because she -- every one of the nannies, this was the only one  
21 that knew behaviors of these girls. That's the reason why she quit. The  
22 nanny that testified worked for three weeks and testified that each day of  
23 the three weeks she worked that these kids were abused and they  
24 should have, you know, it was horrifying and all this, but then we  
25 terminated her, and four days after we terminated her she called CPS.

1                   So, the whole thing is is that it's not about, you know, there  
2 were a lot of things that were misstated, a lot of things that were  
3 incorrectly stated. I am not saying that I was perfect and I'm not saying  
4 that, you know, hey, I didn't do, you know, all this stuff, but to the  
5 extreme that it was, I didn't. And I feel like the prosecutors have set up  
6 a set, you know, like a smoke screen to make me look as if, okay, I'm  
7 obsessive. I'm not obsessive. Because here is the deal with that.  
8 When you have six children coming up here stating I have -- I only had  
9 three squares of toilet paper, that is very detailed information. So --  
10 when you're telling three -- six kids and then maybe five or six adults to  
11 say that I gave them only three squares of toilet paper, that's very  
12 detailed. All that does is just clarify that they can corroborate each  
13 other's story so that makes them credible when they're making other  
14 statements.

15                   Okay. When I had to sit here, and I'm sure you looked at me  
16 many times when I would listen to witnesses testify and truly not be  
17 honest, just blatantly not be honest about what they said. I would go  
18 home, I'd call my children. Okay. This looks like maybe a good day  
19 because this, you know, their stories weren't -- definitely was not, you  
20 know, working out.

21                   It doesn't matter, you know, like I said, I am here to fight my  
22 sentence. I'm here to fight my guilty -- that I was found guilty of. I'm  
23 here to fight my charges. You know, I am not a threat because I'm not  
24 going to run. You know, I have children. I've missed enough. I've lost  
25 family members, you know. This is in the four years, the four and a half

1 years that this whole ordeal has started, I have lost many family  
2 members. And I am very sorry that this has gone the way it has, but it  
3 has been, you know, for me, it has been, you know, this has been -- it's  
4 been a horrible experience.

5 And I am trying to -- my whole point is, is that I want to, you  
6 know, I would like to, you know, continue to, you know, fight and work  
7 my appeals until I've exhausted them all, you know. But I am sorry for,  
8 you know, just to the point of bringing the situation the way it was, for  
9 what I did. What I was accused of, what I was found guilty of, it was  
10 over the top, but I am not, by no means, perfect and I am not, by no  
11 means, going to say that I didn't do any of that stuff. But to the extreme  
12 that it has been presented, absolutely not. But the ones that I did do,  
13 yes, I am sorry, you know. I have no intention of hurting these girls. My  
14 own children, my own family, are sitting here. This is hard for us too.  
15 We loved these children regardless of that. This is the way I am, this is  
16 the person I am. And what they had, you know, the letters they wrote,  
17 it's true to my character regardless. This is how I am. But I am sorry, I  
18 am sorry to these girls. They -- I still love them no matter what.

19 THE COURT: Thank you. Ms. McAmis.

20 MS. MCAMIS: Thank you, Your Honor. You sat through  
21 almost a four week trial and so I'm not going to, you know, rehash any of  
22 those facts. You paid attention, you had a very good assessment of all  
23 of the defense's points in our arguments, and all of the things that we  
24 pointed out and why we presented different kinds of inconsistencies and  
25 why we, in good faith, argued that a lot of these claims were

1 exaggerated, and we pointed to things like the inconsistency in the  
2 testimony. You saw that at trial. Ava recanted the urine licking  
3 allegation. That's inconsistent with what she testified to previously.  
4 Both were under oath.

5           So, we used those and then the example what Ms. Solander  
6 has spoken about today, as examples about why these allegations were  
7 so basically overly over the top. Mrs. Solander did say that she  
8 apologized for what she had actually done, and the defense did talk  
9 about, look, there were some of the simple child abuse and neglect  
10 charges that, realistically, if the jury determined that conduct to not be  
11 appropriate, the defense could see those kinds of convictions and then  
12 all of the convictions did occur. Mrs. Solander has accepted some  
13 responsibility today and that's something that you had not heard  
14 previously.

15           I would point out part of the State's argument was that they've  
16 never been able to -- not their words -- but basically understand where  
17 the defense is coming from as far as our defense. Your Honor, you sat  
18 through a multiple week trial where you saw what happens to children in  
19 the foster care system and then what happens when those foster care  
20 children are then adopted and the parents are looking to adopt and then  
21 do adopt are not given adequate resources to be able to handle the  
22 behaviors.

23           Mrs. Solander had never -- she didn't raise foster children very  
24 extensively before she adopted these children. And you heard  
25 significant testimony, particularly on cross-examination, about different



1 behaviors and diagnoses that the girls all exhibited before coming to the  
2 Solander home.

3           So, in short, my point is is this isn't as simple as Mrs. Solander  
4 adopted out of the goodness of her heart and then decided to be a  
5 monster afterwards. This was someone who was, by all accounts and  
6 by some of the testimony, the word was overwhelmed. And so when  
7 she was overwhelmed and did not react properly, that's when a lot of  
8 this started to happen. It's not offered as an excuse; I'm just  
9 summarizing the testimony.

10           While we spent multiple weeks sitting through just that specific  
11 period and about these individual adopted girls, and so my sentencing  
12 memorandum set forth more of a background, and as far as Dr. Paglini's  
13 report as well, more of a background in support of mitigation. So, that  
14 way you saw the kind of person Janet was. She was a thoughtful  
15 mother, she was a strict mother. And as Dr. Paglini pointed out, Mrs.  
16 Solander is a person who exhibited an above average emotional  
17 warmth. So, she demonstrated, you know, an ability to actually care.

18           So, while the Court and the jury may not appreciate or  
19 understand the kind of conduct and discipline that was actually imposed  
20 on these girls, it did come from a place of she was trying to correct  
21 behaviors that where she -- that were not appropriate for her, for the  
22 home, or for their future wellbeing. If you'll recall, Mrs. Solander wrote  
23 the foster care book that became at issue at trial, and she wrote about a  
24 genuine desire to help the foster care children because she didn't want  
25 to see them recidivating, she didn't want to see them coming back into

1 the system or having their own kind of problems. She wanted to try to  
2 bring more awareness to the issue to help the foster children. So, she is  
3 a person who absolutely has a warm heart, a genuine heart, but she's  
4 not a perfect person and she did admit to that today.

5 So, for all of the reasons set forth in, you know, in my  
6 argument and Mrs. Solander's comments as well as in her sentencing  
7 memorandum and all of, basically, like the resiliency type factors set  
8 forth in Dr. Paglini's report, she's likely to be compliant in prison. She's  
9 likely to, unfortunately, die in prison because of the length of even just  
10 the most minimum of sentences. We are asking that you do the most  
11 minimum, but making a record that the mandatory minimum sentence in  
12 this case really removes your sentencing discretion as a judiciary. And  
13 we're submitting that it's unconstitutional as applied to the facts and  
14 circumstances of Mrs. Solander's case and denies her due process of  
15 law because she's being denied an individual sentence because of this  
16 basically first time use of the sexual assault charged in this way.

17 So, we are submitting that it is unconstitutional, but to the  
18 extent that you are going to rely on that mandatory minimum. We're  
19 asking that you just do the 35 to life. It serves no additional purpose to  
20 do a whole bunch of consecutive or even one consecutive sentence  
21 based on her advance age and based on her advanced medical issues.  
22 Realistically, she's just not looking at being released during her lifetime.

23 And I did want to point out that her three biological daughters,  
24 the eldest ones, are present in Court. They are in this second row. And  
25 you can obviously see the family resemblance. They flew in from out of

1 state for this. They actually flew in on the May10th date as well in  
2 support of their mother, and they have been -- they're here in support,  
3 and that's why they wrote the letters. So, with that I'm submitting and  
4 asking for the 35 to life although we did argue that it denies her due  
5 process of law.

6 THE COURT: All right. Thank you, Ms. McAmis. Let's turn to  
7 Ms. Hinton. State.

8 MS. BLUTH: In regard to Ms. Hinton, Your Honor, as the  
9 Court knows, this is a gross misdemeanor, and we were here last week  
10 discussing whether or not Ms. Hinton should be here. So, Mr. Rue  
11 talked about he'd be asking the Court for credit for time served and I told  
12 Your Honor I'd be asking for supervision.

13 We came to a point at trial -- and, look, it's not --

14 THE COURT: I'm sorry to interrupt you. Did anyone find out  
15 whether -- and Mr. Rue may have looked into this -- whether or not she  
16 would be able to be supervised in Arizona --

17 MR. RUE: I did not, Your Honor.

18 THE COURT: -- based on her residence at the time, the fact  
19 that she was in school in Arizona when the crimes were committed? I  
20 know that there are various factors that go into when somebody can be  
21 supervised in another state on a gross misdemeanor. Were you able to  
22 look into that, Ms. Bluth?

23 MS. BLUTH: No, I apologize, Your Honor.

24 THE COURT: And you didn't either?

25 MR. RUE: No, Your Honor. My understanding has always

1 been though that states that don't observe gross misdemeanors are  
2 reluctant to supervise on gross misdemeanors. That's why there's  
3 generally a felony. I -- I did not research the law on that, Your Honor.

4 THE COURT: And do we know whether they have gross  
5 misdemeanors in Arizona?

6 MR. RUE: I don't know, Judge.

7 THE COURT: All right.

8 MR. RUE: I apologize.

9 THE COURT: Ms. Bluth, continue.

10 MS. BLUTH: So, in regard -- I do think supervision is  
11 appropriate. I recognize Ms. Hinton was put in a incredibly difficult  
12 position in choosing to testify for the State, and I don't want either Ms.  
13 Hinton or the Court to think that we take that lightly because I think that  
14 that was a very difficult thing to do. Now, do I think she testified  
15 honestly? No. I mean, she changed her story compared to her  
16 interview pretty much every which way and then said that it was  
17 because she was on Xanax.

18 During the trial, I thought, okay, now we're going to have to go  
19 back and withdraw the deal because she didn't hold up her end of it.  
20 We've let that go because at the end of the day she's served, I think,  
21 enough internal punishment because of this. That doesn't mean that I  
22 think that, okay, we should just walk away and she should get to go on  
23 with her life. I do think that the fact that she should be able to go to  
24 Arizona and either be supervised or unsupervised, however Your Honor  
25 deemed fit. I can go back and research it. I apologize.

1 But I do think that there's a period of supervision which should  
2 have the underlying of 12 months because, you know, most importantly,  
3 I know now that's a mom and from the letters that everybody writes, it  
4 seems like they did have a good childhood and that they -- there was no  
5 abuse. But I just want to make sure that that child is also safe and in the  
6 best environment because when you hear the girls talk, we didn't talk  
7 about it in trial because Ms. Hinton wasn't part of the trial, but Ms. Hinton  
8 knew -- not only did she know what was going on -- and there were  
9 times where she had to come in and stop her mom, but she also actively  
10 did hit with sticks and was there when buckets were being used, and  
11 she talked about the ice showers and the buckets being dumped on the  
12 kids and then sleeping on boards and then having fans blown on them.  
13 Was she young? Yeah, she was like 19, 20, 21 years old, but there's  
14 still some responsibility.

15 And so I think that she got a benefit of negotiations by getting  
16 a gross misdemeanor, but I do think that that should be supervised.  
17 There should be some supervision, whether it be formally or informal,  
18 and I do think that some parenting classes should be a part of that, the  
19 long term ones, not just the one class.

20 THE COURT: Right.

21 MS. BLUTH: And so I'll submit it with that.

22 THE COURT: All right. Ms. Hinton, your lawyer, Mr. Rue, will  
23 have an opportunity to speak on your behalf. What, if anything, would  
24 you like to say before the Court pronounces sentence against you?

25 DEFENDANT HINTON: First, I would like to say thank you for

1 the opportunity to speak. I'd like to say thank you for the opportunity to  
2 speak.

3 I would say for the past four years it's been equally the best  
4 time and worse time of my life. I, you know, gave birth to a son who has  
5 made me believe what it's like to be a mom, and at the same time within  
6 a year later, I had to testify against my own. And it's just -- I was a good  
7 kid before this. And the same day I was arrested I was going to go into  
8 the military. I had nothing, not even a parking ticket on my name, and  
9 even till today I still kept out of trouble.

10 I am not a bad kid. I'm not a bad person, I was not. Around  
11 the time that there were these accusations, the timeline, I was minding  
12 myself. I -- it shocked me. There was a lot of things that -- there was -- I  
13 can't -- I'm not going to blame whatever happened that day because  
14 there was a lot of that happened that day. But I just don't -- I don't want  
15 what happened to determine my fate because I'm still a mom and I'm  
16 still trying my hardest to be a good mom, and I feel like I've succeeded  
17 that. I went back to school and after got a job interview. This is not  
18 where I want in my life still. I'm only 25 years old. I've done everything  
19 I've can to just be a good kid and I got wrapped up in a situation that I  
20 had no control over.

21 At the end of the day if you asked me two years ago what I  
22 would have done, I would have just taken the trial and said whatever,  
23 but now that I have my little guy to look after, I got to do what I have to  
24 do and I really just want to be out there, be able to get a job, and  
25 maintain getting my own place, and that's why I took the gross



1 misdemeanor, conspiracy for disorderly conduct, because I did my  
2 research and I knew I could still -- it would still be okay without  
3 probation. And I just wanted -- and I know the ultimate decision is up to  
4 you, but I just never wanted it to be like this. I'm not the type of person  
5 that the media made me out to be, that the Court made me out to be.

6           At one time during -- one of the -- one of the -- when the girls  
7 had the opportunity to speak, Ava, she sat there and admitted that I  
8 didn't do anything. That's why her charge was dropped because I -- I  
9 wasn't -- what I may have known I could be at fault in that, but I couldn't  
10 imagine. I used to be a camp counselor. Like, I love kids. I would  
11 never, whether it be my own or girl that I once called my sister, I would  
12 never. I'm the youngest, I just -- I just wanted to move on with my life  
13 and just be a good mom. I didn't know about the parenting classes, but I  
14 don't -- I have my sisters, I have the support of my child's father. I don't  
15 need that.

16           THE COURT: Thank you, Ms. Hinton. Mr. Rue.

17           MR. RUE: Judge, from my perspective, there's a lot of  
18 frustration with this case. When all this was going on, this is not about  
19 poop buckets or ice showers or anything like that with Danielle. When  
20 all that was going on, Danielle was at Shadow Ridge High School  
21 graduating from honors -- graduating with honors. She then went to  
22 ASU with all this craziness going on. She came back. And she got a  
23 job at Kohl's, she was living at home, and she was applying to the  
24 military when she flew back. That's when this all came about.

25           On March 20, 2013 she was interviewed for two and a half

1 hours and then ultimately arrested. During that two and a half hour  
2 interview, she did not say she did anything wrong; she denied doing  
3 anything wrong, but admitted to the things that had been going on in the  
4 household. She was arrested for abusing Ava, Amaya, and Anastasia,  
5 and this is where it gets frustrating because Ava told detectives Danielle  
6 never did anything to her yet she was still charged with that. It wasn't  
7 until preliminary hearing where Ava got on the stand, under oath, and  
8 said no, I'm telling you again like I told detectives she didn't do anything  
9 to me. It was only at that point that that charge was ultimately  
10 dismissed, Judge.

11           The investigation and the prosecution, I think, was a little  
12 broader than need be, and Ms. Hinton got caught up in it. And there's  
13 sort of a theme, a suggested theme, although not stated that the sins of  
14 the mother are going to be visited upon Danielle because she was there.  
15 But that's not why she's here, that's not what she was charged with.  
16 Indulge me for a second. She is charged with child abuse resulting in  
17 substantial bodily harm against Anastasia where, at testimony,  
18 Anastasia testified that Danielle hit her one time with a paint stick on the  
19 wrist that brought no blood but brought no medical attention, no nothing.  
20 She even, I believe, showed a scar to us at the preliminary hearing  
21 showing this is what had happened. The irony of that is is that Dr. Cetl  
22 had previously assessed her and never found a scar on her left wrist.

23           Amaya is the other charge. The child abuse on Amaya is one  
24 hit with a paint stick on the elbow that caused two or three marks that  
25 drew no blood. Again, there was no medical treatment required and no

1 mention of this to Dr. Cetl. They didn't mention Danielle as the being the  
2 abuser at all yet here she is.

3 And you know the facts. They got sent off to Marvelous Grace  
4 in Florida, and then they got pulled from Marvelous Grace to come back  
5 here. When they were interviewed by CPS in Florida, they didn't  
6 mention Danielle at all. They didn't mention any abuse whatsoever.  
7 They mentioned their poop buckets and the ice showers and all the  
8 craziness with the catheters, but nothing with regard to Danielle.

9 Judge, when she was interviewed she was arrested and she  
10 served 90 days. She's not ever been in trouble ever, has not been since  
11 the very start of this case which is over five years old, Judge. She's  
12 stayed out of trouble for five years. She's gone on with her life. The  
13 father of her child is here in the audience as a sign of support as well as  
14 well as her sisters.

15 Enough is enough. She's had to endure a very emotional plea  
16 that Your Honor took. She's enduring this today where she knows she  
17 has had to testify and send her mom away for life. That scar will never  
18 be undone no matter what happens here. And I don't think we can  
19 underestimate the power of her statement to the police, Your Honor.  
20 This was a statement that was used at the preliminary hearing. The  
21 State talks about how there was all this evidence against Janet and  
22 Dwight, but the reality of it is is they used her statement at preliminary  
23 hearing, they used it at trial, and it was not inconsistent, Judge. It was  
24 not -- she didn't say I didn't say it, she may have said I didn't remember,  
25 and it was only on cross-examination where this whole excuse about

1 Xanax got brought up, and that was explained away by the fact that she  
2 was flying and she has a nerve with flying and so that day she had  
3 Xanax. But it's not like she said any of that was untrue. It was in the  
4 statement.

5 She's going to school now online through CSN. She has a job  
6 interview Thursday with American Express. I'm asking just let her go  
7 about her life and live. There's no -- there's nothing more to be  
8 accomplished by putting her on supervision. There is nothing more that  
9 she is deserved other than the 90 days that she's done, and the five  
10 years of hell that this has put her through. I'm asking for credit for time  
11 served, Your Honor, and that's my request.

12 THE COURT: All right. Thank you, Mr. Rue. All right. We'll  
13 move on to Dwight Solander.

14 MS. BLUTH: Okay. Thank you, Your Honor.

15 I read Mr. Solander's psych evaluation and I need to clear up  
16 something that is not true. It's stated in the psych evaluation that he  
17 was offered two counts of child abuse with substantial bodily harm and  
18 to -- and part of that negotiation was to testify against his wife but he  
19 refused. That is absolutely not true. He was offered two counts of child  
20 abuse with substantial bodily harm with the opportunity or, excuse me,  
21 with the added condition of testifying against his wife. He came not  
22 once but twice. We found him to be untruthful to a great degree both  
23 times and told him we could no longer use him as a witness because we  
24 found him to be untruthful. We then stated the deal is now three counts  
25 of child abuse with substantial bodily harm, right to argue, and you no

1 longer have the opportunity of testifying against your wife. So, this idea  
2 that he didn't take the deal because he had to testify against wife, that's  
3 not true, that's not true at all. He proffered not once but twice and was  
4 untruthful both times.

5 I don't think -- if you look -- if we were to go back and look  
6 through every single email that went between Mr. and Mrs. Solander,  
7 this idea that he was gone and he was working and he didn't know what  
8 was going on is absolutely false. He was there when some of this stuff  
9 was going on and when he wasn't there, they were writing about it back  
10 and forth.

11 I think the most telling email is when Janet sends pictures of  
12 the girls with an accident and it says: Anastasia pissed her pants. And  
13 Mr. Solander's response is: She is going to hate life tonight. Have her  
14 start crawling with Ava. He was every bit a part of this problem. What is  
15 the point of that, having those kids crawl around acting like babies with  
16 soiled underwear in their mouth in front of other kids? It just to terrorize,  
17 to be mean. And this idea that we're making it up or we're lying, it's their  
18 own words in black and white.

19 So, I don't think I could say it any better than what Mr. -- or Dr.  
20 Paccult states when he says: There is little else to state aside from the  
21 fact that these girls were being seriously mentally, emotionally and  
22 physically abused and a trained -- by a trained foster parent and an  
23 adult. He not only failed to protect these girls, he knowingly left them in  
24 harm's way. This is one of the more extreme cases of child abuse and  
25 neglect this evaluator has been involved in, and as a foster parent the

1 culpability is even higher in my opinion.

2           The benefit that he received was by taking a negotiation and  
3 not going -- having to go to trial. There was testimony that he not only  
4 bought the catheters but that he stood outside during one of the times  
5 that they were being inserted and he also received an email from Janet  
6 with one of the catheters full of urine. So, this idea that he didn't know  
7 what was going on is absolutely false. Ms. Solander, at a minimum, is  
8 going away for 35 years. He was every bit a part of this every step of  
9 the way.

10           So, I believe, the State believes, the girls will tell you what  
11 they believe, he should receive consecutive for all three of those counts  
12 of eight to 20 because he's receiving a benefit of not having to do a 35  
13 to life because he chose to take an negotiation and not have to put  
14 those children through a trial, which would have been his right. But for  
15 her to have to do 35 and him to do anything less than the 24 to 60 on  
16 one count each of the child abuse with substantial, is a disservice and  
17 an injustice because he was every bit a part of it, part of the catheters, a  
18 part of the beatings, and he knew what was going on in this house. And  
19 the girls will be the better one to explain to you. Again, we didn't get into  
20 this into the trial because it was more about Janet. But they will tell you  
21 he was there when the beatings happened. Not only did he beat but he  
22 was there when Janet beat them. He's the one who bought the buckets.  
23 He's the one who would check their underwear. He was a part of this  
24 just as much as she would -- she was. The only difference is he  
25 chose to take a negotiation.

1           So, I believe that the 24 to 60 consecutive on the three counts  
2 is appropriate. And, Judge, just to answer your question in regards to --  
3 you could ask me what specific counts for Ms. Solander. Count 25 is  
4 the burn and count 37 is the sexual assault that I was discussing. And  
5 in regards to the child abuse and neglect with substantials for Mr.  
6 Solander, that would be -- so I would be asking an eight to 20 on count  
7 1.

8           THE COURT: You said a 24 to 60 and then you said an eight  
9 to 20.

10          MS. BLUTH: Right. So, eight to 20 on each child would be 24  
11 years to 60 years.

12          THE COURT: Oh, I see.

13          MS. BLUTH: Yeah. I was just --

14          THE COURT: Okay. It's confusing as to whether you meant  
15 months or years. Okay.

16          MS. BLUTH: No, I did, yeah. And so I'll submit with that,  
17 Your Honor.

18          THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Mr. Solander, your  
19 lawyer, Mr. Mueller, will obviously have an opportunity to speak on your  
20 behalf, but what, if anything, would you like to say before the Court  
21 pronounces sentence against you?

22          DEFENDANT DWIGHT SOLANDER: Just the only thing,  
23 Your Honor, is that I do apologize and I'm sorry that all this had to  
24 happen. I guess I should have been a lot more proactive once I saw  
25 what was going on and some of the issues. But I'm sorry that this all



1 had to happen this way.

2 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Mr. Mueller.

3 MR. MUELLER: Your Honor, there's many troubling things  
4 about this case. Several of them come to mind. Number one, Mr.  
5 Solander was -- the Court had this case right. The use of a catheter is  
6 not a sexual assault. I just fundamentally disagree with that. I believe  
7 that's just plain error. As applied to Mr. Solander, it deprived him of his  
8 right to a fair trial. If you have a constitutional right under the state and  
9 the federal constitution to a right to a trial, the State does not have the  
10 right to advance a theory that only the functionally insane would invoke  
11 the right to go to trial. As you saw, it forced Mr. Solander into  
12 negotiations and he did.

13 Now having said that, the other thing that's very troubling to  
14 me is not having sat here through all the evidence, is this investigation  
15 begins after Ms. Solander writes a book and then suddenly -- all the  
16 sudden the Solanders are under a microscope.

17 Now here's what I see in this case; number one, Mr. Solander  
18 was out of town 25 to 30 days a month. He's supporting the family.  
19 He's such a poor father that he was actually ponying up and paying for  
20 private school for three girls that he was not biologically related to.

21 Let's put a little context into Mr. Soldander's life. He's in his  
22 mid-fifties. He's marrying a woman for the first time who tells him that  
23 she's got some medical training. He's raised no children; zero  
24 experience with children. None. His wife says after a few years of  
25 marriage I'd like to be a foster parent. Well, okay, dear, if that's what

1 you want, sure. So, Mr. Solander takes the children, including the girls,  
2 to Disneyland, to Knotts Berry Farm, acts like a parent, and is out of the  
3 house most of the time.

4 Now buying a catheter, buying a couple of paint buckets for a  
5 woman who says that she's a nurse and has experience in this matters  
6 and has successfully raised a family previously, is his case. Now I don't  
7 see anything other here than probation is appropriate. He's got zero  
8 prior criminal record, zero involvement with the law. He's gainfully  
9 employed and was dutifully and rather good spiritly paying for a lot of  
10 children he had no biological connection to including adopting or -- and  
11 actually adopting these children.

12 So, respectfully, Judge, I just fundamentally do not see this  
13 case the way the State does. I do not believe there's any need for  
14 public policy or need for retribution served by this case and by putting  
15 Mr. Solander in prison. He's a low risk to reoffend which is the -- per the  
16 report, which is the nexus, and I strongly suspect Mr. Solander will have  
17 no involvement with children the rest of his life, and I don't see any  
18 public policy in putting him in prison. He's a industrious, capable  
19 individual, he runs his own business, and on occasion frequently has  
20 three and four and five people working for him. He's -- can be an  
21 economic credit to the community and I ask the Court for probation.

22 THE COURT: All right. Thank you, Mr. Mueller. We'll hear  
23 from the speakers.

24 MS. BLUTH: Court's indulgence. Your Honor, the State calls  
25 Anastasia Solander.

1 THE COURT: And then just please remain standing and face  
2 that lady right there and she'll administer the oath to you. Okay.

3 **ANASTASIA MCCLAIN**

4 [having been called as a speaker and being first duly sworn, testified as  
5 follows:]

6 THE COURT CLERK: Please state your name and spell for  
7 the record, please.

8 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Anastasia McClain,  
9 A-N-A-S-T-A-S-I-A M-C-C-L-A-I-N.

10 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Go ahead and have a  
11 seat. And what you like to say to me?

12 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: All right. So, first off, you're not a  
13 mom to me. Please don't ever say that you're my mom. You don't get  
14 the right to say that because a mom would never do that.

15 MS. MCAMIS: Well, Your Honor --

16 THE COURT: Okay. I don't know if the DA's has talked to  
17 you ahead of time, but the rules says that you have to talk to me. Okay.  
18 Ms. Bluth, Mr. Hamner, did you go over the protocol for victim speakers  
19 with the speakers?

20 MS. BLUTH: Yes, Judge. We just discussed that to talk  
21 about the impact that this has had on you and your sisters.

22 THE COURT: Right. But you have to address the Court. And  
23 then tell us how this has impacted you and your sisters and what you  
24 feel about what happened to you and what would you -- and just take  
25 your time. Okay. Do you need a tissue? Is there any up there? And

1 what you'd like to see happen today. Okay. Just take your time. It's  
2 just common for people to want to talk directly to the Defendants, but the  
3 rules say you have to talk to me. But you can tell us how you feel about  
4 what happened to you. Okay.

5 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: All right. So, it's not so much that  
6 the physical abuse that hurts me because that's like, that's in the past,  
7 like, I can get over that. But it's more like the mental because, like,  
8 there's just certain things I can't even do without thinking of what  
9 happened. I can't even listen to certain songs 'cause that -- it brings me  
10 back to those wounds. I can't listen to people say certain things without  
11 thinking that it's gonna happen again. Like, it just -- it's not so much the  
12 physical, it's been more of mental abuse that hurts the most because  
13 mental is like it's hard to get rid of physical abuse. It's just only for a little  
14 bit, it's for a certain amount of time. You can get over that. But it's  
15 mental that hurts me the most.

16 And, I don't know what I -- like, I don't know what I ever did to  
17 have to do this, like, we don't have any problems and we were just kids.  
18 I just wanted to be a kid, literally, is all I wanted to do.

19 THE COURT: You can never blame for a child for being  
20 abused.

21 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: And --

22 THE COURT: You just take your time. Okay.

23 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: It's more of like if I see -- she just  
24 put so much anger on me, like, I would never see anybody as my  
25 mother again because, you know, I've never had that. Like Ms. Debbie,

1 she's -- I just can't have a relationship like that again because she  
2 ruined it for me because I don't know how it would be to have something  
3 like that because I'm scared that it's going to happen all over. I'm  
4 scared that this whole thing is going happen all over again, and I just  
5 can't call anybody my mother again because I can't trust anybody 'cause  
6 as soon as I let them in, they're -- I don't know what their intentions are.  
7 And hearing -- and just seeing my sisters -- just seeing my sisters get  
8 upset over something like this, is just -- it hurts me too because I love  
9 my sisters to death; like, those -- they actually know how it feels. I don't  
10 like it when people say that -- I just don't feel like people have the right to  
11 say stuff to me about it, like, you don't know it felt.

12 Nobody understands unless you were with me, like, feeling  
13 the pain that I went through, and my sisters understand that. And in a  
14 way she kind of brung [sic] us together, but took us apart at the same  
15 time because she basically told us that -- she had us argue with each  
16 other, she had a fight -- she had us fight for -- it was either I get  
17 whopped or my sister get whooped. It was like we were basically  
18 fighting for either me or her, and it was hard for us. So, in a way she  
19 also brought us together but took us apart.

20 THE COURT: Is there anything else you'd like to say?

21 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: [The speaker shakes her head in  
22 the negative]. No audible response.

23 THE COURT: Okay. Any questions?

24 MS. MCAMIS: No, Your Honor.

25 THE COURT: Thank you for coming in. And my bailiff is

1 going to escort you back to your seat.

2 MS. BLUTH: The State would call Ava McClain.

3 THE COURT: And, Ava, my bailiff is just going to walk you up  
4 here by me. Okay. And just remain standing, facing this lady right here  
5 who will administer the oath to you -- you're right hand.

6 **AVA MCCLAIN**

7 [having been called as a speaker and being first duly sworn,  
8 testified as follows:]

9 THE COURT CLERK: Please state your name and spell it for  
10 the record, please.

11 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Ava McClain, A-V-A M-C-C-L-A-I-N.

12 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Go ahead and have a  
13 seat and just take your time.

14 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Okay.

15 THE COURT: Take your time. What would you like to say  
16 today?

17 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: So, I don't know how to say it. I'm  
18 going to take a deep breath real quick. I don't care so much as for what  
19 I've been through. I can deal with it, but it's more my sisters. I  
20 understand I was just a kid, but at the same time I felt like I could have  
21 done something. We had CPS come to the house, they asked us  
22 questions, and obviously I lied for Janet, which wasn't right on my half.  
23 And I just don't understand -- like, I look at the whole foster care system.  
24 If you don't want the child, if you know you have no good intentions with  
25 the children, then don't take them in at all.

1           It doesn't matter. There's so many kids in the system that  
2 have been through worse. I'm not going to say I've been through, you  
3 know, the worst of everything because I know there's kids that didn't  
4 even survive. I just don't understand why she had to put my sisters  
5 through that. My sisters were little kids. I know more, I've seen more;  
6 I'm older, they're younger. And they opened up their doors, they let  
7 down their walls because all we wanted was a family, they wanted a  
8 mother and a father. Obviously we didn't get that from my biological  
9 parents. And I just don't understand why she had to do that to them. If  
10 she didn't want them, all she had to say was no, I don't want them, I  
11 can't do it. It wasn't that hard. It wouldn't have hurt us. What hurt us  
12 was the fact that she said yes and then did this.

13           Another thing is I'm in a place right now where I have to hear  
14 other people tell me oh, well, that's why your birth parents gave you up  
15 or that's why they did this to you and not. I have to learn how to deal  
16 with that. I can't talk to therapists about it. I go to sleep; I dream about  
17 what's happened to me. I have anger in me. I can't let go of it,  
18 obviously. I fight with my middle sister all the time or I used to, and it's  
19 because I was so used to the patterns that were happening at the  
20 Solanders' home that I started to have some of that too which kind of  
21 scared me.

22           But the main thing that bothers me the most is that I can't  
23 even call someone my mother. Ms. Debbie, she's done a lot for me.  
24 She's a strict parent, you know, I have to go school; can't be doing stuff  
25 like smoking and drinking, obviously. With me, I don't like going to

1 school because I was so used to going to school, I wasn't even in  
2 school. So, I don't like going to school. I like doing things I shouldn't be  
3 doing. And I want to call her a mother and I want to thank her but I can't  
4 because I feel like if I call her mother -- if I call him my father, that is just  
5 going to happen again. I'm going to let my walls down. I'm not doing it  
6 again.

7           And as far as Danielle, I will say she never did hurt me, didn't  
8 lay one hand on me. She actually tried to help several times. And I'm  
9 happy that she's going to school, keeping up with her life, and has a  
10 child. And I'm not going to speak for my sisters, but I know for me I want  
11 to see her move on with her life. I mean, she could have done  
12 something. I don't remember how old she was; she was a teen, almost  
13 an adult. It would have been nice if she had said something, but  
14 obviously that's not how it -- she was a teen too. She didn't want to see  
15 her mother go away. But sometimes you have to do that if you want to  
16 move on with your life. It's one or the other. I don't --

17           THE COURT: How do you feel about Dwight?

18           THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Dwight. Me personally, I didn't  
19 necessarily call out for his name when things were happening in the  
20 home, but my sisters called out for his name, especially Amaya. And  
21 the fact that he's saying that he wasn't there all the time and he didn't  
22 know about it, he did know about it. I'm not a stupid child. He knew  
23 about it. He could have least told somebody or he could have talked to  
24 his wife and told 'em to stop, but he decided not to. That's his fault. But  
25 what Janet did wasn't his fault, that was Janet's decisions. But his



1 decision not to say anything was his fault. He could have said  
2 something.

3 I don't know how to feel about him. I don't know what to say  
4 about him. I mean, he could have just simply said something to  
5 someone instead of letting it happen because he knew about it. It's just  
6 not that hard to figure out.

7 With Janet, the last thing is, the things that she did to me I  
8 have to deal with. Some of my behaviors that I do now, and I'm 16, I'm  
9 about to be 17 this year, I have one more year. I need to have my life  
10 together. I'm doing stupid stuff. I have no credits for high school,  
11 nothing. I do stuff to myself because I have memories of what she's  
12 done to my sisters. I don't care what she's done to me, but it's to my  
13 sisters. The fact that I had to sit there and watch that, the fact that she  
14 told me my parents didn't want me, and that we were just animals and  
15 whatnot. I have to deal with that. I want my biological family so bad, but  
16 what she told me about them, I don't feel like I want them even though I  
17 know it's not true. Just hearing it, it makes me feel like I actually have  
18 no one.

19 Now I have to set the example for my sisters and it's hard. I'm  
20 over here doing stupid stuff and they want to stupid stuff too. I'm  
21 obviously not going to change until I decide to change. But I just don't  
22 understand why she had to do that. All she could have said was no.  
23 So, basically, she could have done -- I wouldn't have hated her for that, I  
24 wouldn't of not liked her for that. All she had to say was no. That's it.  
25 And the fact that she's still sitting here today saying that we're over

1 exaggerating, I'm not over exaggerating about anything. It's right there,  
2 it's laid out. Either way, I know what happened and she knows what  
3 happened. You know, she's claiming a Christian or whatever. She  
4 believes in God. He knows what happens. So, either way you're going  
5 to have to pay for what you did one way or the other.

6 And now all this stuff that I've been through, I actually do have  
7 problems in the head and I have to learn how to deal with it, and before I  
8 was just fine. I was just a kid. I want to do certain stuff but I can't do it  
9 because of my actual mental problems now. You should have just  
10 treated us like we wanted to, just a family. I'm pretty sure she would  
11 have been a lot happier.

12 THE COURT: Thank you for coming in. And just take your  
13 time. It takes a lot of courage.

14 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: And I hope the best for Danielle.  
15 Obviously, she already said she has a kid, and I don't hate her. I don't  
16 want to see her go away for life. She already apologized and whatnot.  
17 So, I just hope she can move on with her life. I'm done.

18 THE COURT: Thank you. Like I said, it takes a lot courage to  
19 come in and talk about these things. For an adult it's hard and  
20 especially for a young person. Anything else you'd like to say? All right.  
21 Just follow the bailiff and he'll take you back to your seat in the  
22 audience. And we'll hear from the next speaker.

23 MS. BLUTH: Judge, if I could just make one clarification.

24 THE COURT: Sure.

25 MS. BLUTH: When Ava started, she talks with saying where

1 she is now, she gets told certain things. I just want to make clear for the  
2 record, she's not with Ms. McClain right now. She's in a treatment  
3 center.

4 THE COURT: All right.

5 MS. BLUTH: I just didn't want the Court to think --

6 THE COURT: And I'm hoping -- I was going to make a  
7 comment. I'm sure no adult and I certainly hope no adult would ever say  
8 that to a young person or really any person to blame them for the  
9 actions of an adoptive parent, a foster parent, or a biological parent. I'm  
10 assuming that those comments are being made by other young people  
11 in treatment because certainly if an adult is making those kinds of  
12 horrible statements, they shouldn't be working in that capacity because,  
13 as I said, you can never blame a child for being abandoned by a  
14 biological parent or any kind of mistreatment.

15 MS. BLUTH: It will be looked into.

16 THE COURT: And if you could just stand up and face this  
17 lady right here. She'll administer the oath to you.

18 **AMAYA MCCLAIN**

19 [having been called as a speaker and being first duly sworn,  
20 testified as follows:]

21 THE COURT CLERK: Please state your name and spell it for  
22 the record, please.

23 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Amaya McClain, A-M-A-Y-A  
24 M-C-C-L-A-I-N.

25 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. And what you like to say

1 today? And, again, just take a deep breath and take your time.

2 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: I'm trying to figure out how to put,  
3 like, my words together. It makes me sad that I couldn't help my sisters.  
4 As much as I really wanted to, I couldn't.

5 We argue all the time. Me and Stastia got into an argument  
6 over Cane's the other day but, I mean, like, I'd do anything for them.  
7 Janet, she hurt me a lot. Sometimes I look in the mirror and I see what  
8 she did to me and myself because I'm so angry. I don't know why she  
9 did it. I just --- I just wanted a family. That's it. And I don't think she  
10 understood that, I guess. I can't trust no one. Every time, like, I meet  
11 someone I'll talk to them. My heart tells me, like, you could trust them,  
12 but I don't let myself go there 'cause when I try and trust someone all  
13 they do is hurt me. I can't let them see [indiscernible].

14 I have like -- I have plans for my life, like, we joke about it now  
15 and then, but, I mean, I'm not completely over it. Sometimes I -- when I  
16 can't sleep I just lay in my bed and I just think about it and I just start  
17 crying. Sometimes I close my eyes and I think I'm there and then I  
18 realize I'm not there; like, my worse fear is being like her because I  
19 didn't like what she did to me. I hated it and I wouldn't wish that on  
20 anyone no matter what they did. No one deserves that.

21 I wonder when I have kids what am I going to tell them about  
22 my childhood. What am I going to tell them where I went to school, who  
23 was my best friend in kindergarten or second grade. I guess I'm just  
24 going to have to tell them I didn't have no childhood. She took it from  
25 me.

1                   And for Dwight, I trusted you, but you weren't there for me.  
2 I remember I used to lay on my board and I would hear him come in and  
3 I would get happy because it wasn't as bad when he was there. And  
4 then he stopped caring. I got so angry with him 'cause I thought he was  
5 going to save me and my sisters. I trusted him and he wasn't there.  
6 Every time I needed him he wasn't there for me.

7                   I won't call anyone my mom, my dad, nothing. Period. I don't  
8 care. I can't trust no one. I tried to trust him. He didn't do nothing for  
9 me. I tried to trust her. She didn't do nothing for me. Just sit there and  
10 cry thinking it was my fault. They had me feeling like it was -- I was the  
11 problem. I would just lay there telling myself why are you even here.  
12 Why -- I remember lying on my board and just wanting to die at times  
13 because I thought I was the problem, and I didn't want my sisters to  
14 wake up in the morning and get kicked downstairs. I'll get over that  
15 soon -- sooner or later, but it's all up here forever.

16                  And for Danielle, I get it. You're young. Me and her didn't  
17 necessarily get along, but I wasn't so perfect. Like, yeah, I acted out  
18 but, you know, I was a baby at the time, basically. And I can't imagine  
19 not having my mom there because I did have my mom there, and I want  
20 her kid to know that no matter how many mistakes she had made that  
21 she's going to be there for him because I know what it's like to not have  
22 someone and I don't want her son to ever feel that way. I want her to  
23 just forget about it. You were in a position where it was either your or  
24 your mom. That's your mom. I get it. But at the same time it's not right.  
25 I wish her the best. I wish Kim, Tara, and Dominique the best. I never

1 forgot about them. I always think about them and wonder what they're  
2 doing now. I remember we went to Ohio; we went swimming with Malik  
3 [phonetic] and Sean.

4 I hate this. I think you're never going to see my cry like this no  
5 more. I want her -- Janet to know, yeah, she took years away from me,  
6 she took my life, basically. But she didn't take my future because I'm  
7 going to be something no matter how many times she told me I was  
8 stupid. No one's ever told me that and we thought that you could talk to  
9 me about that.

10 THE COURT: You want some water?

11 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: I'm good.

12 THE COURT: You okay? Thank you for coming in. Like I  
13 said, it takes a lot of courage. There are about 10, 15 other people in  
14 the room crying so don't feel embarrassed about that. And we'll hear  
15 from Ms. McClain who, I think, is our fourth speaker.

16 MS. BLUTH: Yeah, sure. And I think --

17 THE COURT: Come on up. Ms. McClain, please just remain  
18 standing facing our court clerk who will administer the oath to you.

19 **DEBORAH MCCLAIN**

20 [having been called as a speaker and being first duly sworn,  
21 testified as follows:]

22 THE COURT CLERK: Please state your name and spell it for  
23 the record, please.

24 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Deborah McClain,  
25 D-E-B-O-R-A-H M-C-C-L-A-I-N.

1 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Please be seated. And,  
2 McClain, what would you like to say?

3 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Okay. I just want to let Janet know  
4 -- can I read my --

5 THE COURT: Sure. And you prepared a statement to read?

6 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Yes.

7 THE COURT: Go ahead and just read that.

8 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Janet, when you adopted our girls --

9 THE COURT: And just take your time. It's okay. Just take  
10 your time. It's obviously very emotional.

11 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Janet, when you adopted our girls,  
12 they were just three loving and trusting kids. You called them defective;  
13 I called them children. You called them unhealthy; I called them  
14 carefree and innocent. You've called them mentally challenged; I called  
15 them children. I called them children and had high expectations of an  
16 adopted mom who promised them a forever home, but instead gave  
17 grief and trauma that will mostly likely last forever. I guess we will never  
18 know the true reason you chose to be an adoptive mom. Maybe your  
19 intentions started out good, but a dark side took control of you.

20 When I offered you help I truly meant that and my service was  
21 free of charge because I truly wanted to stay in our girls' lives. Now you  
22 have given us the job to clean up the mess you have made of our girls'  
23 future. You have made it difficult for our girls to be -- ever 00 to ever  
24 believe -- to even believe they deserve a good life. Their self- worth for  
25 themselves is almost next to nothin'. To tell our girls how great they can

1 be makes them feel unworthy.

2 We have been working with the fallout of the horrific child  
3 abuse with our girls four years plus and it breaks your heart to see how  
4 little our daughters think of themselves thanks to you. We pray daily that  
5 our girls can learn that their self-worth is far greater than what you have  
6 done to them.

7 My husband and I have seen first hand on how adults can ruin  
8 the future of our young generation. We have been through nervous  
9 break downs, hatred of each other, always feeling less worthy of our  
10 love, lack of trust, blame game. We have seen our girls physically fight  
11 over who was treated the worst out of the three of them. We have to  
12 constantly remind our girls that when you have an individual whose  
13 mindset is to [indiscernible] and abuse the most vulnerable, neither one  
14 of them would have been spared the wrath of Janet.

15 It does not matter how good -- it does not matter how good  
16 they tried to be -- to please Janet, it would never have been enough.  
17 Every day our girls would wake up it was never a happy moment. For  
18 them, if Janet wasn't beating, kicking, punching, degrading them,  
19 starving and reminding them how stupid they were, placing catheters  
20 inside of them for her own pleasure, for her that was the height of her  
21 day. So, the flavor of her day was the first child which spoke I have to  
22 [indiscernible] this constantly. This would start the chain of events for  
23 our girls.

24 When we first got our girls back, I could not believe the  
25 change in them. Every day it was chaos. Daily, for the last four years



1 plus, arguing and threatening each other was a way of life. To them,  
2 that was the norm. Janet divided Amaya, Anastasia to Ava in a way it's  
3 going to take a lot of therapy to undue all the damage she had bestowed  
4 on them. Janet, I really wish that you and your husband had never  
5 made the decision to adopt any of them kids, we would not be here  
6 today. For the Courts to decide your fate instead of you going off to jail,  
7 you would be -- you would probably be planning your vacation to return  
8 home after a week or two with a new way of thinking and able to tackle  
9 anything with a more positive frame of mind. Instead, you're going to go  
10 to prison to keep you from hurting any more children.

11 When you chose to hurt and ruin the lives of innocent children,  
12 you deserve the consequences that comes with you behavior.  
13 Hopefully, our girls can get closure after today so they can fulfill their  
14 dreams of success -- of a successful good life for their future. You, on  
15 the other hand, where you're going, you will have plenty of time to reflect  
16 on how you should have made better choices. That's it.

17 THE COURT: Thank you very much for coming in.

18 MS. MCAMIS: Your Honor, I know we have an opportunity to  
19 ask questions. This is actually -- I have very few questions.

20 THE COURT: Oh, I'm sorry. Ms. McClain. I'm sorry. I  
21 neglected to ask counsel if they had any questions.

22 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Oh.

23 THE COURT: They can ask you questions if you'd come on  
24 back up.

25 MS. MCAMIS: Ms. McClain, thank you so much. And I

1 apologize that I didn't catch you before you stopped off. I apologize for  
2 that inconvenience.

3 Ms. McClain, I was hoping to kind of elaborate on Ava's  
4 current placement, how long she's been there, and the background  
5 behind that, please.

6 MS. BLUTH: Judge, I'm going to object to that. That's not  
7 appropriate at the rendition of sentencing.

8 MS. MCAMIS: It absolutely goes to impact on the victim.  
9 There's been testimony and suggestions that these children were so  
10 damaged that because of Janet, Ava had to be placed somewhere else  
11 because of her behaviors, and she's going through therapeutic  
12 treatment because of those behaviors.

13 THE COURT: She can just briefly comment as to where the  
14 placement is and the reason for the placement, but beyond that I think  
15 it's well beyond the scope of victim impact. And so if you could just ask  
16 that limited question as to why she's in a placement and where is she  
17 currently since it was referenced. Go ahead.

18 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: She didn't never -- up up in  
19 Amorgosa in Nevada.

20 MS. MCAMIS: And my other question that the Judge  
21 approved was the reason for the placement.

22 THE VICTIM SPEAKER: Well, Ava, she said that earlier  
23 because of the fact that it's a lot going on with her what -- between her  
24 and Janet, the Solander home. So, we trying -- we're working through it.  
25 The only thing I can do is take it day by day. She's getting treatment

1 and, I don't know, she might be coming home in a month or two or  
2 maybe a week two, I don't know yet. I can't say. But we do go up -- we  
3 have family therapy with her.

4 MS. MCAMIS: So glad to hear that. Thank you for sharing  
5 that.

6 Your Honor, I understand that the State and the Court may not  
7 allow me to ask my other question, but I had one other and it was an  
8 inquiry into the status of -- we received information at trial that Ms.  
9 Debbie may have had a CPS case of her own because of her potential  
10 unwillingness to take back Ava. I was going to ask about the status of  
11 any open CPS cases involving these girls.

12 THE COURT: State, are you objecting? I don't think that  
13 that's really relevant what's going on in that. I mean, she's here to  
14 comment as to how the girls have changed since she first was parenting  
15 them as a foster parent until she got them back. So, I don't think that  
16 that's really relevant.

17 MS. MCAMIS: Understood. Okay. I have no further  
18 questions. Thank you, Ms. Debbie.

19 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Any other defense  
20 questions? And, Ms. Bluth, did you have any questions for Ms.  
21 McClain?

22 MS. BLUTH: No.

23 THE COURT: No. Thank you, Ms. McClain. Thank you for  
24 coming in and you are excused, and my bailiff will escort you back to  
25 your seat in the audience.

1                   And we'll begin with Ms. Solander. Obviously, Ms. Solander  
2 does not need to stand. I just wanted to comment. I think the real  
3 tragedy here, one of the real tragedies is these victims are blaming  
4 themselves, and that seemed to be the theme from all three speakers.  
5 And I think as humans we try to understand why did this happen to me,  
6 and I think as part of that inquiry, these victims are trying to put the  
7 blame on themselves in an effort to understand. And as I said, a child  
8 can never be blamed for being abused, number one, and, number two,  
9 from my prospective, as least, having presided over this trial, the weeks  
10 of testimony, I don't think there really is an understanding to be gleaned  
11 as to why this happened.

12                   I think Mrs. Solander did have, at some point, genuine  
13 affection for the victims and did want to parent these girls. And I think  
14 somewhere along the way, I don't know if there was a psychiatric  
15 component or what, things went horribly wrong. But I don't think we can  
16 understand why these actions occurred and I don't think it's something,  
17 as a adults, who don't understand. So, certainly children can't be asked  
18 to understand, and that's just my comment on this. There is no  
19 understanding.

20                   So, Mrs. Solander, by virtue of the jury's verdict in this case,  
21 you are hereby adjudged guilty of counts 1, 2, 14, 24 and 25, child  
22 abuse, neglect or endangerment and substantial bodily harm. Counts 3,  
23 4, 5, and 6, 9, 10, 11 and 12, 15, 16, 17, 18, 20, 21 and 22, 26, 27, 28,  
24 and 29, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44 and 45 child abuse, neglect or endangerment.  
25 Counts 7, 8, 19, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36 and 37 sexual assault with a

1 minor under 14 years of age; counts 13, 23 and 46, assault with the use  
2 of a deadly weapon, and counts 38 and 39, battery with intent to commit  
3 sexual assault.

4 In addition to the \$25 administrative assessment, the \$150  
5 DNA analysis fee, and the fact that you must submit to a test for genetic  
6 markers and the \$3.00 DNA administrative assessment, on count 1,  
7 child abuse, neglect or endangerment with substantial bodily harm,  
8 you're sentenced to a minimum term of 36 months in the Nevada  
9 Department of Corrections and a maximum term of 120 months in the  
10 Nevada Department of Corrections.

11 On Count 2, child abuse, neglect or endangerment with  
12 substantial bodily harm, you're sentenced to a minimum term of 36  
13 months in the Nevada Department of Corrections and a maximum term  
14 of 120 months. That is imposed concurrently with the time you received  
15 on Count number 1.

16 On Count 3, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you are  
17 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months in the Nevada Department  
18 of Corrections and a maximum term of 48 months. That is imposed  
19 concurrently with the time you received on Count number 3 -- I'm sorry --  
20 Count number 2.

21 On Count number 4, child abuse, neglect or endangerment,  
22 you're sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months in the Nevada  
23 Department of Corrections and a maximum term of 48 months. That is  
24 imposed concurrently with the time you received on Count number 3.

25 On Count number 5, child abuse, neglect or endangerment,

1 you're sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months and a maximum term  
2 of 48 months. That is imposed concurrently with the time you received  
3 on Count number 4.

4 On Count number 6, child abuse, neglect or endangerment,  
5 you're sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months and a maximum term  
6 of 48 months. That is imposed concurrently with the time you received  
7 on Count number 5.

8 On Count number 7, sexual assault with a minor under 14  
9 years of age, you're sentenced to life with the possibility of parole  
10 beginning after a minimum term of 35 years has been served. That is  
11 imposed concurrently with the time you received on Count number 6.

12 On Count number 8, sexual assault with a minor under 14  
13 years of age, you're sentenced to life with the possibility of parole  
14 beginning after a minimum term of 35 years has been served. That is  
15 imposed concurrently with the time you received on Count number 7.

16 On Count number 9, child abuse, neglect or endangerment,  
17 you're sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months in the Nevada  
18 Department of Corrections, a maximum term of 48 months. That is  
19 imposed concurrently with Count 8.

20 On Count number 10, child abuse, neglect or endangerment,  
21 you're sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of  
22 48 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 9.

23 On Count number 11, child abuse, neglect or endangerment,  
24 you're sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of  
25 48 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 10.

1           On Count number 12, child abuse, neglect or endangerment,  
2 you're sentenced to 12 to 48 months. That is imposed concurrently with  
3 Count 11.

4           On Count 13, assault with deadly weapon, you're sentenced  
5 to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48 months. That  
6 is imposed concurrently with the time you received on Count number 12.

7           On Count number 14, child abuse, neglect or endangerment  
8 with substantial bodily harm, you're sentenced to a minimum term of 36  
9 months, a maximum term of 120 months. That is imposed consecutively  
10 to the time you received on Count number 13.

11           On Count number -- I'm sorry -- that's Count 14. On Count  
12 15, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're sentenced to a  
13 minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48 months. That is  
14 imposed concurrently with Count 15.

15           On Count 16, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
16 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
17 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 15.

18           On Count 17, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
19 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
20 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 16.

21           On Count 17, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
22 sentenced to a minimum term of -- oh, I'm on Count 16 -- 18, I'm sorry,  
23 child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're sentenced to a minimum  
24 term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48 months. That is imposed  
25 concurrently with Count 17.

1           On Count 19, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
2 age, you're sentenced to life with a minimum possibility of parole  
3 eligibility beginning after 35 years has been served. That is imposed  
4 concurrently with Count 18.

5           On child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're sentenced to  
6 -- Count 20 -- you're sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a  
7 maximum of 48 months. That's imposed concurrently with Count 19.

8           On Count 21, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
9 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
10 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 20.

11           On Count 22, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
12 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
13 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 21.

14           On Count 23, assault with use of a deadly weapon, you're  
15 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
16 months. That's imposed concurrently with Count 22.

17           On Count 24, child abuse, neglect or endangerment with  
18 substantial bodily harm, you're sentenced to a minimum term of 36  
19 months, a maximum term of 120 months. That is imposed concurrently  
20 with Count 23.

21           On Count 25, child abuse, neglect or endangerment with  
22 substantial bodily harm, you're sentenced to a minimum term of 36  
23 months, a maximum term of 120 months. That's imposed consecutively  
24 to Count 24.

25           On Count 26, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're



1 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
2 months. That is imposed concurrently to Count 25.

3 On Count 27, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
4 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
5 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 26.

6 Count 28, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
7 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
8 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 27.

9 On Count 29, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
10 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months, a maximum term of 48  
11 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 28.

12 On Count 30, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
13 age, you're sentenced to life with your minimum parole eligibility  
14 beginning after a minimum of 35 years has been served. That is  
15 imposed concurrently with Count 29.

16 And Count 31, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
17 age, you're sentenced to a minimum term of life with your minimum  
18 parole eligibility beginning after 35 years has been served. That is  
19 imposed concurrently with the time you were given on Count 30.

20 On Count 32, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
21 age, you're sentenced to life with a minimum parole eligibility beginning  
22 after 35 years has been served. That is imposed concurrently to Count  
23 31.

24 And Count 33, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
25 age, you're sentenced to a minimum term of life with -- I'm sorry -- you're

1 sentenced to a maximum term of life, with your minimum parole eligibility  
2 beginning after 35 years has been served. This is imposed concurrently  
3 with Count 32.

4 And Count 34, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
5 age, you are sentenced to life with your minimum parole eligibility  
6 beginning after a minimum period of 35 years has been served. That is  
7 imposed concurrently with Count 33.

8 On Count 35, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
9 age, you're sentenced to life, with a minimum parole eligibility beginning  
10 after 35 years has been served. That is imposed concurrently with  
11 Count 34.

12 On Count 36, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
13 age, you are sentenced to life, with a minimum parole eligibility  
14 beginning after 35 years has been served. This is imposed concurrently  
15 with Count 35.

16 And Count 37, sexual assault with a minor under 14 years of  
17 age, you're sentenced to life, with a minimum parole eligibility beginning  
18 after 35 years has been served. This is imposed concurrently to Count  
19 36.

20 On Count 38, you are sentenced to battery with intent to  
21 commit sexual assault. You're sentenced to a maximum term of life,  
22 with parole eligibility beginning after 72 months has been served. That  
23 is imposed concurrently with Count 37.

24 Count 39, battery with intent to commit sexual assault. You're  
25 sentenced to life, with a minimum parole eligibility beginning after 72

1 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count 38.

2 On Count 40, child abuse, neglect or endangerment. You're  
3 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 months and a maximum term of 48  
4 months. That is imposed concurrently to Count 39.

5 On Count 41, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
6 sentenced to 12 to 48 months imposed concurrently with Count 40.

7 On Count 42, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
8 sentenced to a minimum of 12 months, a maximum term of 48 months.  
9 That is imposed concurrently to Count 41.

10 On Count 43, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
11 sentenced to 12 to 48 months imposed concurrently to Count 42.

12 On Count 44, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
13 sentenced to 12 to 48 months imposed concurrently with Count number  
14 43.

15 On Count 45, child abuse, neglect or endangerment, you're  
16 sentenced to 12 to 48 months. That is imposed concurrently with Count  
17 number 44.

18 On Count number 46, assault with a deadly weapon, you're  
19 sentenced to a minimum term of 12 to 72 months imposed concurrently  
20 to Count number 45. And I show that you're entitled to --

21 MS. MCAMIS: Your Honor, my count was 306 days credit  
22 time served.

23 THE COURT: Does that sound right, 306 days of credit for  
24 time served?

25 MS. BLUTH: Yes, Your Honor.

1 THE COURT: And that is a minimum sentence of 35 years in  
2 prison and a maximum sentence of life.

3 All right. Turning to Ms. Hinton --

4 MS. BLUTH: And, Judge, in regards to that, a quick question  
5 for you. So, the aggregate you're saying, the maximum is 35, but then  
6 the child abuses were consecutive, but they're consecutive to the other  
7 child abuses --

8 THE COURT: Right.

9 MS. BLUTH: -- so they're swallowed by the 35; right?

10 THE COURT: That's how I calculated it. And there are two  
11 different kinds of sexual assaults, the catheter sexual assault and the  
12 paint stick sexual assault. If, for some reason, the catheter sexual  
13 assaults are found not to constitute crimes by the Supreme Court, she  
14 still has the paint stick sexual assault. If, for some reason, they're all  
15 overturned, I calculated -- there's a series of consecutive time on that. I  
16 think it's -- and I'd I have to go through and calculate that.

17 MS. BLUTH: Three 36s.

18 THE COURT: Okay. But in any event, those are swallowed  
19 by the 35 on either -- any of the catheter sexual assaults or the paint  
20 stick sexual assaults.

21 MS. BLUTH: Understood.

22 THE COURT: All right. Now turning to Ms. Hinton, there's  
23 nothing to suggest that Ms. Hinton is anything other than a good parent.  
24 However, she's clearly been exposed to poor parenting. And, you know,  
25 whether -- what she could have done or should have done, I think is

1 questionable given her age, and the fact that it's her parents, a step  
2 parent and her mother, you know, who's doing the abusing. I still agree  
3 with the State, but I think some kind of parenting classes are appropriate  
4 just because of -- I don't know what her perception is on what's normal  
5 and what's not normal having lived in this environment. So, I think that  
6 that's appropriate.

7           So, Ms. Hinton, based upon your plea of guilty in this case,  
8 you are hereby adjudged guilty of the gross misdemeanor crime of  
9 conspiracy to commit disorderly conduct.

10           In addition to the \$25 administrative assessment, the \$150  
11 DNA analysis, the fact that you must submit to a test for genetic  
12 markers, and the \$3.00 DNA administrative assessments, you're  
13 sentenced to nine months in the Clark County Detention Center. That  
14 sentenced is suspended. You're placed on informal probation for a  
15 period of time not to exceed 18 months. You are ordered to stay out of  
16 trouble which is you can't have any arrests for anything including a  
17 reckless driving or a DUI. An ordinary traffic infraction, like speeding or  
18 something like that, would not constitute violating the staying out of  
19 trouble provision. And I also want you to complete the longer term  
20 parenting classes. I don't know what's available in the state of Arizona,  
21 but maybe you can look into that, Mr. Rue?

22           MR. RUE: Yes, Your Honor. She's a resident --

23           THE COURT: Or either way.

24           MR. RUE: Well she's as resident of the Phoenix general area

25 so --

1 THE COURT: So, there should be something --

2 MR. RUE: Maybe.

3 THE COURT: -- similar to what's offered here. And so I don't  
4 know how long that would take. We could set this for a nine month --  
5 once she finishes those classes as long as she's stayed out of trouble,  
6 we can close the case.

7 MR. RUE: Okay.

8 THE COURT: So, shall we set it for maybe a nine month  
9 status check?

10 MR. RUE: Nine months. And I'd ask to waive her  
11 appearance if I have the proof that she is done what -- she has  
12 complied.

13 THE COURT: That's fine with the Court obviously as long as  
14 she's stayed out of trouble.

15 MS. BLUTH: Yes, Judge.

16 THE COURT: Any objection to that?

17 MS. BLUTH: No, Your Honor.

18 THE COURT: All right.

19 THE COURT CLERK: The status check will be February 13<sup>th</sup>  
20 -- February 12<sup>th</sup> at 9:30, 2019.

21 MR. RUE: Thank you, Your Honor.

22 THE COURT: All right. Pertaining to Mr. Solander,  
23 determining the appropriate sentence for Mr. Solander is in, my opinion,  
24 the most difficult aspect of the case because clearly Mrs. Solander was  
25 far more culpable in this. She is clearly the instigator. It's not clear to

1 the Court, as I've already said, what was going on with Mrs. Solander,  
2 whether there was some kind of component of neurosis or mental illness  
3 at play, but Mr. Solander became a part of that and through his  
4 behavior, I think actually encouraged Mrs. Solander. So, I think it went  
5 beyond simply staying silent, but your acquiescence and  
6 communications with Mrs. Solander, I think, contributed to her belief that  
7 what she was doing was acceptable and normal.

8 And so I think that that is what your role really is to play in this  
9 whole thing even though you didn't come up with these plans. You didn't  
10 abuse the girls to the extent Mrs. Solander did. You enabled it to  
11 happen. I think by your acquiescence I think you really did convey the  
12 message to her that what she was doing was okay and not completely  
13 unacceptable. And this is a difficult determination because clearly he's  
14 far less culpable. And, you know, Mr. Solander, was -- is in his fifties  
15 and without any problem.

16 So, Mr. Solander, by virtue of your pleas of guilty, you're  
17 hereby adjudged guilty of counts 1, 2 and 3, child abuse, neglect or  
18 endangerment resulting in substantial bodily harm. In addition to the  
19 \$25 administrative assessment, the \$150 DNA analysis fee and the fact  
20 that you must submit to a test for genetic markers and the \$3.00 DNA  
21 administrative assessment, on Count 1, child abuse, neglect or  
22 endangerment resulting in substantial bodily harm, you're sentenced to  
23 a minimum term of 36 months in the Nevada Department of Corrections  
24 and a maximum term of 120 months.

25 On Count 2, child abuse, neglect or endangerment resulting in

1 substantial bodily harm, you're sentenced to 36 to 120 months imposed  
2 concurrently with the time I gave you on Count number 1.

3 And on Count number 3, child abuse, neglect or  
4 endangerment resulting in substantial bodily harm, you're sentenced to  
5 36 to 120 months imposed concurrently with the time I gave you on  
6 Count number 2. And you're entitled to 105 days of credit for time  
7 served.

8 MS. MCAMIS: Your Honor, I would have one final  
9 administrative matter. I know this has gone on long. This should be  
10 relatively quick to handle. As Your Honor was aware, we do intend to  
11 file an appeal based on --

12 THE COURT: Oh, thank you, yes.

13 MS. MCAMIS: -- based on Mrs. Solander's advanced age  
14 and her advanced medical issues, we were going to ask for bail pending  
15 appeal.

16 MR. MUELLER: I would join on that for Mr. Solander. As the  
17 Court's aware, it's a novel theory.

18 THE COURT: Well, first of all, let me address Mrs. Solander  
19 because Mr. Solander and Mrs. Solander are completely -- in completely  
20 different positions, number one. Mr. Solander doesn't have the health  
21 issues. And, number two, Mr. Solander pled guilty in this case and Mrs.  
22 -- thereby waiving many of his appellate rights which Mrs. Solander has  
23 not done.

24 So, let's address Mrs. Solander and then you can make your  
25 motion as to Mr. Solander. So, addressing Mrs. Solander, you're asking



1 for bail because of her health conditions.

2 MS. MCAMIS: That's correct. And if the Court, I would just  
3 briefly point out, when she was on out on bail before a trial, she was  
4 trouble free. She did have consistent health issues that caused trial to  
5 be continued a number of times, but she still made her Court  
6 appearances even with her fragile health and really to mobility. With  
7 that, I would submit.

8 THE COURT: State.

9 MS. BLUTH: And at this point in time I don't think bail is  
10 appropriate. She was convicted of every single one of the charges. I  
11 don't want to get into whether her health issues are legitimate or not or  
12 go down that entire road, but we did receive the medical records where,  
13 again, nothing was shown to us.

14 So, I think in -- at the jail we will have a much better  
15 understanding of exactly what's going on, we'll have better access to the  
16 medical records to see if they want to bring this back up if there  
17 becomes an issue, but at this point in time she was convicted of all 46  
18 counts, she was just sentenced to life in prison, and I don't believe bail is  
19 appropriate.

20 THE COURT: Right. I'm going to deny the request.  
21 Obviously, you know, the defense is going to seek to have her  
22 conviction overturned on all grounds. There's clearly an issue with  
23 respect to some of the counts, such as the catheter counts, but she  
24 stands convicted of everything and so, you know, is likely to going to  
25 prison, even if she's not convicted of the sexual assault counts. So, it's

1 denied.

2 Now turning to Mr. Solander --

3 MR. MUELLER: By oral motion is --

4 THE COURT: One -- I'm sorry.

5 MR. MUELLER: My oral motion is withdrawn.

6 THE COURT: Okay. And will your office be handling the  
7 appeal as to Mrs. Solander?

8 MS. MCAMIS: With the Court's permission and I believe the  
9 office of appointed counsel would also approve that request because of  
10 the -- the volume of the case --

11 THE COURT: Right.

12 MS. MCAMIS: -- familiarity with the case so, yes.

13 THE COURT: All right. Okay. I don't see why they wouldn't  
14 approve it. It makes sense to me that you would handle it. So, unless I  
15 hear otherwise, I'm going to assume that your office is proceeding on  
16 the appeal and you can contact Mr. Christensen's office just to do  
17 whatever you need to do to make sure that that's approved and verified.  
18 All right. You're withdrawing your oral request --

19 MR. MUELLER: I'll do it in writing.

20 THE COURT: -- as to Mr. Solander; is that correct?

21 MR. MUELLER: At the moment. I'll resubmit it in writing.

22 THE COURT: All right. And then, Mr. Mueller, as I said, he's  
23 waived a lot of his rights to appeal pursuant to the Guilty Plea  
24 Agreement. Obviously if he wants you to file an appeal you can still do  
25 that.

1 MR. MUELLER: And the Court's heard my view that the state  
2 Supreme Court coming down or the Nevada Supreme Court coming  
3 down with a novel theory that the catheters was a sexual assault took  
4 away his right to a fair trial and --

5 THE COURT: All right. So, are you filing an appeal or --

6 MS. BLUTH: He didn't plead --

7 MR. MUELLER: I was intending to file with the Court, yes.

8 THE COURT: Okay. And you're going to be handled that?

9 MR. MUELLER: Yes, I will.

10 THE COURT: Okay. And that's fine. Obviously, the Court  
11 had agreed with you, this Court, on that theory, but that was overturned  
12 by the Nevada Supreme Court. So, I think to some extent they've  
13 spoken on that issue as well but then, you know, different justices. All of  
14 the evidence is now before them. They may change their mind about  
15 that. And then I'm assuming as to Mr. Rue --

16 MR. RUE: Yes, Judge.

17 THE COURT: -- she waived her appellate rights and she's  
18 now intends to file an appeal; correct?

19 MR. RUE: No, we intend to file an appeal, Judge.

20 THE COURT: All right.

21 MS. BLUTH: And, Judge, I think Mr. Hamner just reminded  
22 me because of the conviction --

23 THE COURT: Oh, yes. Thank you. I neglected to impose  
24 some of the statutory conditions that pertain to Mrs. Solander.

25 She is subject to lifetime supervision and also I think this --

1 both are academic because given her current health condition and the  
2 length of time and the fact that people don't get help if you're in prison as  
3 a rule, it's unlikely she'll be eligible for parole. But if you are released,  
4 Mrs. Solander, you must register as a sex offender within 48 hours of  
5 your release and also you are subject to a special sentence of lifetime  
6 supervision which commences upon your release from imprisonment or  
7 upon release from parole. Did I cover everything?

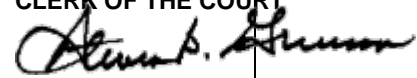
8 MR. MUELLER: Yes, Your Honor.





15 **DEFENSE'S PROPOSED JURY INSTRUCTIONS**  
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Parents have a fundamental liberty interest in the care, custody, and management of their child that does not evaporate simply because they have not been model parents. This includes adoptive parents.

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Santosky v. Kramer, 455 U.S. 745, 753, 102 S.Ct. 1388, 71 L.Ed.2d 599 (1982)  
Matter of M.M.L. Jr. 393 P.3d 1079 (Nevada Supreme Court 2017)

A person is guilty of sexual assault if he or she subjects another person to sexual penetration against the will of the victim unless the action is for medical purposes.

“Sexual penetration” means cunnilingus, fellatio, or any intrusion, however slight, of any part of a person’s body or any object manipulated or inserted by a person into the genital or anal openings of the body of another, including sexual intercourse in its ordinary meaning, but, again, if the action is for medical purposes, there is no sexual penetration and you must find the person not guilty of sexual assault.

The definition of sexual penetration is logically confined to activities which are the product of sexual behavior or libidinal gratification, not merely the product of clinical examinations or domestic, parental functions.

The general conditions of criminal liability requires not only the doing of some act by the person to be held liable, but also the existence of a guilty mind during the commission of the act.

For instance, if a person inserted or attempted to insert an object into the genital opening of another but had the intent to merely conduct a medical procedure, there is no criminal liability.

This is true even if a later analysis reveals that there was no need to conduct a medical procedure or if there was a mistake of fact about the need to conduct a medical procedure.

Since the law defining child abuse contains the term “unjustifiable” physical pain endured by a child as a result of corporal punishment or neglect, you are called on to determine whether the pain is justifiable in any way. If the pain endured was justifiable, it is not child abuse.

Something is justifiable if it is borne out of any of the following reasons:

1. Necessity;
2. A reasonable desire to aid or assist a child by one who has a legal duty of care;
3. Reasonable reliance on a government agent or actor who explicitly or implicitly approved the legality of the actions whether or not the actions resulted in abuse or neglect.

"Corporal punishment" means the intentional infliction of physical pain, including, without limitation, hitting, pinching or striking. Corporal punishment inflicted by a parent, including an adoptive parent, is lawful in the State of Nevada and makes no distinction between the means used to inflict pain. Implements such as paint sticks may be used in lawful corporal punishment.

In considering the testimony of any witness, you may take into account:

- (1) the witness's opportunity and ability to see or hear or know the things testified to;
- (2) the witness's memory;
- (3) the witness's manner while testifying;
- (4) the witness's interest in the outcome of the case, if any;
- (5) the witness's bias or prejudice, if any;
- (6) whether other evidence contradicted the witness's testimony;

A parent, including and adoptive parent, may give consent to any significant event in a minor's life irrespective of the willingness of the minor, including any medical or hygiene decisions.

Indeed, the law does not require the additional consent of a minor child in such instances.

You may have heard testimony of emotional or mental impact of acts allegedly constituting abuse or neglect. You are not to consider any potential or real emotional or mental impact on any of the alleged victims in this case in determining whether or not any crime was committed.

The defendant is not charged with committing acts resulting in emotional or mental harm or pain.

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Tavares v. State, 117 Nev. 725, 30 P.3d 1128 (2001)

The Department of Family Service (DFS) and Child Protective Services (CPS) are government agencies and its employees are government agents. A person who reasonably and in good faith relies on the government for advice or guidance cannot later be prosecuted for a crime explicitly or implicitly approved by the government.

You have heard evidence that the Department of Family Services failed to preserve any photographs of the adopted children at issue in this case. These photographs would have shown you the status of the head-to-toe of the children prior to placement in the foster care system.

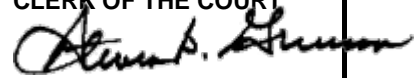
Where relevant evidence which would properly be part of this litigation is within the control of the state or county agency, whose interest it would naturally be to produce it, and they fail to do so without a satisfactory explanation, the jury may draw an inference that such evidence would have been unfavorable to the State.

As such, you may infer that there was evidence of child abuse in the photos which may be the same photographic evidence of child abuse testified to in this trial.



14 MEMBERS OF THE JURY:

15 It is now my duty as judge to instruct you in the law that applies to this case. It is  
16 your duty as jurors to follow these instructions and to apply the rules of law to the facts as  
17 you find them from the evidence.

18 You must not be concerned with the wisdom of any rule of law stated in these  
19 instructions. Regardless of any opinion you may have as to what the law ought to be, it  
20 would be a violation of your oath to base a verdict upon any other view of the law than that  
21 given in the instructions of the Court.

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Instructions to the Jury

If, in these instructions, any rule, direction or idea is repeated or stated in different ways, no emphasis thereon is intended by me and none may be inferred by you. For that reason, you are not to single out any certain sentence or any individual point or instruction and ignore the others, but you are to consider all the instructions as a whole and regard each in the light of all the others.

The order in which the instructions are given has no significance as to their relative importance.



An Information is but a formal method of accusing a person of a crime and is not of itself any evidence of her guilt.

In this case, it is charged in an Amended Information that on or between January 19, 2011 and November 11, 2013, the Defendant committed the offenses of Child Abuse, Neglect, or Endangerment With Substantial Bodily Harm; Child Abuse, Neglect, or Endangerment; Sexual Assault With a Minor Under Fourteen Years of Age; Assault With Use of a Deadly Weapon; and Battery With Intent to Commit Sexual Assault, as follows:

COUNT 1 – CHILD ABUSE, NEGLECT, OR ENDANGERMENT WITH SUBSTANTIAL BODILY HARM

8 ANASTASIA SOLANDER was mentally or physically incapable of resisting or  
9 understanding the nature of Defendant's conduct; Defendant being responsible under one or  
10 more of the following principles of criminal liability, to wit: (1) by Defendant directly  
11 committing the crime; (2) by Defendant and Dwight Solander conspiring together to commit  
12 the offense of sexual assault with a minor under fourteen years of age; and/or (3) by  
13 Defendant and Dwight Solander aiding and abetting each other in the commission of the  
14 crime by Dwight Solander purchasing the catheters and/or plastic tubes, by Defendant  
15 inserting the catheter and/or plastic tube into ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S genital opening  
16 and/or urethra, Defendant and Dwight Solander encouraging one another by actions and  
17 words and acting in concert throughout.

18 COUNT 35 – SEXUAL ASSAULT WITH A MINOR UNDER FOURTEEN YEARS OF  
19 AGE (LOFT 3)

20 Defendant and Dwight Solander did then and there willfully, unlawfully, and  
21 feloniously sexually assault and subject ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), a  
22 female child under fourteen years of age, to sexual penetration, to wit: by inserting a catheter  
23 and/or plastic tube into ANASTASIA SOLANDER genital opening and/or urethra, against  
24 her will, or under conditions in which Defendant knew, or should have known, that  
25 ANASTASIA SOLANDER was mentally or physically incapable of resisting or  
26 understanding the nature of Defendant's conduct; Defendant being responsible under one or  
27 more of the following principles of criminal liability, to wit: (1) by Defendant directly  
28 committing the crime; (2) by Defendant and Dwight Solander conspiring together to commit  
the offense of sexual assault with a minor under fourteen years of age; and/or (3) by

1 her will, or under conditions in which Defendant knew, or should have known, that  
2 ANASTASIA SOLANDER was mentally or physically incapable of resisting or  
3 understanding the nature of Defendant's conduct; Defendant being responsible under one or  
4 more of the following principles of criminal liability, to wit: (1) by Defendant directly

14 Defendant and Dwight Solander did then and there willfully, unlawfully, and  
15 feloniously sexually assault and subject ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), a  
16 female child under fourteen years of age, to sexual penetration, to wit: by inserting a catheter  
17 and/or plastic tube into ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S genital opening and/or urethra, against  
18 her will, or under conditions in which Defendants knew, or should have known, that  
19 ANASTASIA SOLANDER was mentally or physically incapable of resisting or  
20 understanding the nature of Defendant's conduct; Defendant being responsible under one or  
21 more of the following principles of criminal liability, to wit: (1) by Defendant directly  
22 committing the crime; (2) by Defendant and Dwight Solander conspiring together to commit  
23 the offense of sexual assault with a minor under fourteen years of age; and/or (3) by  
24 Defendant and Dwight Solander aiding and abetting each other in the commission of the  
25 crime by Dwight Solander purchasing the catheters and/or plastic tubes, by Defendant  
26 inserting the catheter and/or plastic tube into ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S genital opening  
27 and/or urethra, Defendant and Dwight Solander encouraging one another by actions and  
28 words and acting in concert throughout.

1 SOLANDER'S genital opening, against her will, or under conditions in which Defendant  
2 knew, or should have known, that ANASTASIA SOLANDER was mentally or physically  
3 incapable of resisting or understanding the nature of Defendant's conduct.

4 COUNT 38 – BATTERY WITH INTENT TO COMMIT SEXUAL ASSAULT

5 Defendant did then and there willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously use force or  
6 violence upon the person of another, to wit: ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04),  
7 with intent to commit sexual assault by holding ANASTASIA SOLANDER down in an  
8 effort to insert the catheter into ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S vagina.

9 COUNT 39 – BATTERY WITH INTENT TO COMMIT SEXUAL ASSAULT

10 Defendant did then and there willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously use force or  
11 violence upon the person of another, to wit: ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04),  
12 with intent to commit sexual assault, by holding ANASTASIA SOLANDER down in an  
13 effort to insert a catheter into ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S vagina.

14 COUNT 40 – CHILD ABUSE, NEGLECT, OR ENDANGERMENT

15 Defendant did willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously cause a child under the age of 18  
16 years, to wit: ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), to suffer unjustifiable physical  
17 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect, and/or cause ANASTASIA  
18 SOLANDER to be placed in a situation where she might have suffered unjustifiable physical  
19 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect defined as negligent treatment or  
20 maltreatment, by pushing and/or kicking ANASTASIA SOLANDER down and/or on the  
21 stairs.

22 COUNT 41 – CHILD ABUSE, NEGLECT, OR ENDANGERMENT

23 Defendant did willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously cause a child under the age of 18  
24 years, to wit: ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), to suffer unjustifiable physical  
25 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect, and/or cause ANASTASIA  
26 SOLANDER to be placed in a situation where she might have suffered unjustifiable physical  
27 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect defined as negligent treatment or  
28 maltreatment, by forcing ANASTASIA SOLANDER to take cold showers while pouring

1 Defendant and Dwight Solander aiding and abetting each other in the commission of the  
2 crime by Dwight Solander purchasing the catheters and/or plastic tubes, by Defendant  
3 inserting the catheter and/or plastic tube into ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S genital opening  
4 and/or urethra, Defendant and Dwight Solander encouraging one another by actions and  
5 words and acting in concert throughout.

8 COUNT 36 – SEXUAL ASSAULT WITH A MINOR UNDER FOURTEEN YEARS OF  
9 AGE (LOFT 4)

10 Defendant and Dwight Solander did then and there willfully, unlawfully, and  
11 feloniously sexually assault and subject ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), a  
12 female child under fourteen years of age, to sexual penetration, to wit: by inserting a catheter  
13 and/or plastic tube into ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S genital opening and/or urethra, against  
14 her will, or under conditions in which Defendant knew, or should have known, that  
15 ANASTASIA SOLANDER was mentally or physically incapable of resisting or  
16 understanding the nature of Defendant's conduct; Defendant being responsible under one or  
17 more of the following principles of criminal liability, to wit: (1) by Defendant directly  
18 committing the crime; (2) by Defendant and Dwight Solander conspiring together to commit  
19 the offense of sexual assault with a minor under fourteen years of age; and/or (3) by  
20 Defendant and Dwight Solander aiding and abetting each other in the commission of the  
21 crime by Dwight Solander purchasing the catheters and/or plastic tubes, by Defendant  
22 inserting the catheter and/or plastic tube into ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S genital opening

25 COUNT 37 – SEXUAL ASSAULT WITH A MINOR UNDER FOURTEEN YEARS OF  
26 AGE

27 Defendant did then and there willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously sexually assault  
28 and subject ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), a female child under fourteen  
years of age, to sexual penetration, to wit: by inserting a stick into ANASTASIA

1 pitchers of ice water on ANASTASIA SOLANDER while showering.

2 COUNT 42 – CHILD ABUSE, NEGLECT, OR ENDANGERMENT

3 Defendant did willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously cause a child under the age of 18  
4 years, to wit: ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), to suffer unjustifiable physical  
5 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect, and/or cause ANASTASIA  
6 SOLANDER to be placed in a situation where she might have suffered unjustifiable physical  
7 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect defined as negligent treatment or  
8 maltreatment, by forcing ANASTASIA SOLANDER to place soiled underwear in her  
9 mouth.

10 COUNT 43 – CHILD ABUSE, NEGLECT, OR ENDANGERMENT

11 Defendant did willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously cause a child under the age of 18  
12 years, to wit: ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), to suffer unjustifiable physical  
13 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect, and/or cause ANASTASIA  
14 SOLANDER to be placed in a situation where she might have suffered unjustifiable physical  
15 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect defined as negligent treatment or  
16 maltreatment, by forcing ANASTASIA SOLANDER'S head into the toilet.

17 COUNT 44 – CHILD ABUSE, NEGLECT, OR ENDANGERMENT

18 Defendant did willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously cause a child under the age of 18  
19 years, to wit: ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), to suffer unjustifiable physical  
20 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect, and/or cause ANASTASIA  
21 SOLANDER to be placed in a situation where she might have suffered unjustifiable physical  
22 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect defined as negligent treatment or  
23 maltreatment, by forcing ANASTASIA SOLANDER to stand in a garbage bag while she  
24 urinated and defecated on herself.

25 COUNT 45 – CHILD ABUSE, NEGLECT, OR ENDANGERMENT

26 Defendant did willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously cause a child under the age of 18  
27 years, to wit: ANASTASIA SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), to suffer unjustifiable physical  
28 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect, and/or cause ANASTASIA



1 SOLANDER to be placed in a situation where she might have suffered unjustifiable physical  
2 pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect defined as negligent treatment or  
3 maltreatment, by forcing ANASTASIA SOLANDER to stand in a garbage bag while she  
4 urinated and defecated on herself.

5 COUNT 46 – ASSAULT WITH USE OF A DEADLY WEAPON

6 Defendant did willfully, unlawfully, feloniously and intentionally place another  
7 person in reasonable apprehension of immediate bodily harm and/or did willfully and  
8 unlawfully attempt to use physical force against another person, to wit: ANASTASIA  
9 SOLANDER (DOB: 7/25/04), with use of a deadly weapon to wit: a razor blade, by  
10 displaying a razor blade and threatening ANASTASIA SOLANDER.

11  
12 It is the duty of the jury to apply the rules of law contained in these instructions to the  
13 facts of the case and determine whether or not the Defendant is guilty of one or more of the  
14 offenses charged.

15 Each charge and the evidence pertaining to it must be considered separately. The fact  
16 that you may find a defendant guilty or not as to one of the offenses charged should not  
17 control your verdict as to any other offense charged.

To constitute the crime charged, there must exist a union or joint operation of an act forbidden by law and an intent to do the act.

The intent with which an act is done is shown by the facts and circumstances surrounding the case.

Do not confuse intent with motive. Motive is what prompts a person to act. Intent refers only to the state of mind with which the act is done.

Motive is not an element of the crime charged and the State is not required to prove a motive on the part of the Defendant in order to convict. However, you may consider evidence of motive or lack of motive as a circumstance in the case.

The Defendant is presumed innocent unless the contrary is proved. This presumption places upon the State the burden of proving beyond a reasonable doubt every element of the crime charged and that the Defendant is the person who committed the offense.

A reasonable doubt is one based on reason. It is not mere possible doubt but is such a doubt as would govern or control a person in the more weighty affairs of life. If the minds of the jurors, after the entire comparison and consideration of all the evidence, are in such a condition that they can say they feel an abiding conviction of the truth of the charge, there is not a reasonable doubt. Doubt to be reasonable must be actual, not mere possibility or speculation.

If you have a reasonable doubt as to the guilt of the Defendant, she is entitled to a verdict of not guilty.

1  
2       You are here to determine the guilt or innocence of the Defendant from the evidence  
3 in the case. You are not called upon to return a verdict as to the guilt or innocence of any  
4 other person. So, if the evidence in the case convinces you beyond a reasonable doubt of the  
5 guilt of the Defendant, you should so find, even though you may believe one or more persons  
6 are also guilty.

The evidence which you are to consider in this case consists of the testimony of the witnesses, the exhibits, and any facts admitted or agreed to by counsel.

There are two types of evidence; direct and circumstantial. Direct evidence is the testimony of a person who claims to have personal knowledge of the commission of the crime which has been charged, such as an eyewitness. Circumstantial evidence is the proof of a chain of facts and circumstances which tend to show whether the Defendant is guilty or not guilty. The law makes no distinction between the weight to be given either direct or circumstantial evidence. Therefore, all of the evidence in the case, should be considered by you in arriving at your verdict.

Statements, arguments and opinions of counsel are not evidence in the case. However, if the attorneys stipulate to the existence of a fact, you must accept the stipulation as evidence and regard that fact as proved.

You must not speculate to be true any insinuations suggested by a question asked a witness. A question is not evidence and may be considered only as it supplies meaning to the answer.

You must disregard any evidence to which an objection was sustained by the court and any evidence ordered stricken by the court.

Anything you may have seen or heard outside the courtroom is not evidence and must also be disregarded.

The credibility or believability of a witness should be determined by his manner upon the stand, his relationship to the parties, his fears, motives, interests, or feelings, his opportunity to have observed the matter to which he testified, the reasonableness of his statements and the strength or weakness of his recollections.

If you believe that a witness has lied about any material fact in the case, you may disregard the entire testimony of that witness or any portion of his testimony which is not proved by other evidence.

A witness who has special knowledge, skill, experience, training or education in a particular science, profession or occupation is an expert witness. An expert witness may give his or her opinion as to any matter in which he or she is skilled.

You should consider such expert opinion and weigh the reasons, if any, given for it. You are not bound, however, by such an opinion. Give it the weight to which you deem it entitled, whether that be great or slight, and you may reject it, if, in your judgment, the reasons given for it are unsound.

A person who commits a sexual penetration upon a child under the age of 14 years or causes a child under the age of 14 years to make a sexual penetration on herself or another, against the victim's will, or under conditions in which the perpetrator knows or should know that the victim is mentally or physically incapable of resisting or understanding the nature of his/her conduct, is guilty of Sexual Assault of a Minor Under 14 Years of Age.

"Sexual penetration" means any intrusion, however slight, of any part of a person's body or any object manipulated or inserted by a person into the genital opening of the body of another, including sexual intercourse in its ordinary meaning.

Digital penetration is the placing of one or more fingers of the perpetrator on and/or into the genital or anal opening of another person.

Penetration with an object is the placing of the object on and/or into the genital or anal opening of another person.

The labia majora is part of the female genitalia.

A person is not guilty of Sexual Assault if the penetration is for a legitimate medical purpose.

A reasonable and good faith belief that the penetration is for a legitimate medical purpose is a defense to sexual assault.

If the Defendant presents any evidence that the penetration was for a medical purpose, the State must prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the penetration was not undertaken for a legitimate medical purpose.



An act done with intent to commit a crime, and tending but failing to accomplish it, is an attempt to commit that crime. The act done must be an overt act. It must go beyond mere preparation to commit the crime and tend to accomplish it. The preparation consists in devising or arranging the means or measures necessary for the commission of the offense; the attempt is the direct movement toward the commission after the preparations are made.

Physical force is not necessary in the commission of sexual assault. The crucial question is not whether a person was physically forced to engage in a sexual assault, but whether the act was committed without her consent or under conditions in which the Defendant knew or should have known, the person was incapable of giving her consent or understanding the nature of the act.

A person is not required to do more than her age, strength, surrounding facts, and attending circumstances make it reasonable for her to do to manifest opposition to a sexual assault.

INSTRUCTION NO. 14

Submission is not the equivalent of consent. While consent inevitably involves submission, submission does not inevitably involve consent. Lack of protest by a victim is simply one among the totality of circumstances to be considered by the jury.

There is no requirement that the testimony of a victim of Sexual Assault be corroborated, and her testimony standing alone, if believed beyond a reasonable doubt, is sufficient to sustain a verdict of guilty.

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2 It is a defense to the charge of sexual assault that the Defendant entertained a  
3 reasonable and good faith belief that the alleged victim consented to penetration. If you find  
4 such reasonable, good faith belief, even if mistaken, you must give the Defendant the benefit  
5 of the doubt and find her not guilty of sexual assault.

6 A belief that is based upon ambiguous conduct by the victim that is the product of  
7 force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury on the  
8 person of another is not a reasonable and good faith belief.  
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Where a child has been the alleged victim of sexual assault with a minor under the age of 14, and does not remember the exact date of the act, the State is not required prove a specific date, but may prove a time frame within which the act took place.

A person who willfully causes a child who is less than 18 years of age to suffer unjustifiable physical pain or mental suffering as a result of abuse or neglect or to be placed in a situation where the child may suffer physical pain or mental suffering as the result of abuse or neglect is guilty of Child Abuse, Neglect, or Endangerment.

As used in these instructions:

"Abuse or neglect" means physical injury of a non-accidental nature, sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, negligent treatment or maltreatment of a child under the age of 18 years, under circumstances which indicate that the child's health or welfare is harmed or threatened with harm.

"Physical injury" means:

1. Permanent or temporary disfigurement; or
2. Impairment of any bodily function or organ of the body.

Negligent treatment or maltreatment of a child occurs if a child has been abandoned, is without proper care, control and supervision or lacks the subsistence, education, shelter, medical care or other care necessary for the wellbeing of the child because of the faults or habits of the person responsible for the welfare of the child or the neglect or refusal of the person to provide them when able to do so.

A person responsible for the welfare of a child is the child's parent, guardian, a step-parent with whom the child lives, an adult person continually or regularly found in the same household as the child, a public or private home, institution or facility where the child actually resides or is receiving care outside of the home for all or a portion of the day, or a person directly responsible or serving as a volunteer for or employed by such a home, institution, or facility.



If you find beyond a reasonable doubt that the Defendant is guilty of Child Abuse, Neglect, or Endangerment, you must determine whether or not substantial bodily harm resulted from that abuse or neglect.

“Substantial bodily harm” means:

1. Bodily injury which creates a substantial risk of death or which causes serious, permanent disfigurement or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ; or,
2. Prolonged physical pain.

“Prolonged physical pain” encompasses some physical suffering or injury that lasts longer than the pain immediately resulting from the wrongful act.

Corporal punishment means the infliction of physical pain including without limitations hitting, pinching, or striking.

A parent or guardian of a child may use corporal punishment as a means of discipline. Excessive corporal punishment may constitute abuse of a child. Excessive corporal punishment goes beyond what is proper or reasonable under the circumstances.

The use of an implement in and of itself is not unlawful but must be reasonable under the circumstances.

Adoptive parents have the same rights as natural parents including care, custody, and management of their child.

As used in these instructions, a "deadly weapon" means:

- (1) Any instrument which, if used in the ordinary manner contemplated by its design and construction, will or is likely to cause substantial bodily harm or death, OR
- (2) Any weapon, device, instrument, material or substance which, under the circumstances in which it is used, attempted to be used or threatened to be used, is readily capable of causing substantial bodily harm or death.

In order to “use” a deadly weapon, there need not be conduct that actually produces harm but only conduct that produces a fear of harm or force by means or display of the deadly weapon in aiding the commission of the crime.

A person who unlawfully attempts to use physical force against the person of another or intentionally places another person in reasonable apprehension of immediate bodily harm is guilty of Assault.

To constitute an assault, it is not necessary that any actual injury be inflicted.

If you find the Defendant has committed the crime of Assault, you must also determine whether or not the Assault was committed with the use of a Deadly Weapon.

Battery means any willful and unlawful use of force or violence upon the person of another.

If that force is accomplished with the use of a deadly weapon, the person is guilty of Battery with a Deadly Weapon.

The force used by the Defendant need not be violent or severe, and need not cause bodily pain or bodily harm. Any slight touching by the Defendant upon the person of another suffices, as long as the touching was intentional and unwanted.

The word "willfully", when applied to the intent with which an act is done, implies simply a purpose or willingness to commit the act in question. It does not require in its meaning that the Defendant held any intent to violate any law, or to injure another, or to acquire any advantage.

INSTRUCTION NO. 26

Any person who commits a battery upon another with the specific intent to commit a Sexual Assault is guilty of the offense of Battery With Intent to Commit Sexual Assault.



If the State has failed to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the Assault with Use of a Deadly Weapon counts occurred between May 22, 2011 and May 22, 2014, you must find the Defendant not guilty on those counts.

If the State has failed to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the Battery with Intent to Commit Sexual Assault counts occurred between July 23, 2011 and July 23, 2014, you must find the Defendant not guilty on those counts.

The Department of Family Services (DFS) and Child Protective Services (CPS) are government agencies and its employees are government agents. A person who reasonably and in good faith relies on the government for advice or guidance cannot later be prosecuted for a crime explicitly or implicitly approved by the government.

This instruction does not apply to an individual who intentionally misleads the government to obtain approval for and/or acquiescence in his or her conduct.

Evidence that the Defendant committed offenses other than that for which she is on trial, if believed, was not received and may not be considered by you to prove that she is a person of bad character or to prove that she has a disposition to commit crimes. Such evidence was received and may be considered by you only for the limited purpose of proving the Defendant's motive, intent, common scheme or plan, knowledge, or absence of mistake or accident. You must weigh this evidence in the same manner as you do all other evidence in the case.

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2       You may have heard testimony concerning actions directions by the Defendant  
3 toward the other foster children living in their home who are not the subject(s) of these  
4 criminal charges. You are not to consider this for any purpose beyond the extent that it  
5 establishes a motive, intent, common scheme or plan, knowledge, and/or absence of mistake  
6 or accident regarding the alleged abuse and neglect of the children named in the criminal  
7 charges.

8       The mere existence of any alleged bad acts directed towards other people do not  
9 establish the guilt of the Defendant beyond a reasonable doubt.  
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It is not necessary in proving a conspiracy to show a meeting of the alleged conspirators or the making of an express or formal agreement. The formation and existence of a conspiracy may be inferred from all circumstances tending to show the common intent and may be proved in the same way as any other fact may be proved, either by direct testimony of the fact or by circumstantial evidence, or by both direct and circumstantial evidence.

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2 It is a constitutional right of a defendant in a criminal trial that she may not be  
3 compelled to testify. Thus, the decision as to whether she should testify is left to the  
4 Defendant on the advice and counsel of her attorney. You must not draw any inference of  
5 guilt from the fact that she does not testify, nor should this fact be discussed by you or enter  
6 into your deliberations in any way.  
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Although you are to consider only the evidence in the case in reaching a verdict, you must bring to the consideration of the evidence your everyday common sense and judgment as reasonable men and women. Thus, you are not limited solely to what you see and hear as the witnesses testify. You may draw reasonable inferences from the evidence which you feel are justified in the light of common experience, keeping in mind that such inferences should not be based on speculation or guess.

A verdict may never be influenced by sympathy, prejudice or public opinion. Your decision should be the product of sincere judgment and sound discretion in accordance with these rules of law.

INSTRUCTION NO. 34

In your deliberation you may not discuss or consider the subject of punishment, as that is a matter which lies solely with the court. Your duty is confined to the determination of the guilt or innocence of the Defendant.



During the course of this trial, and your deliberations, you are not to:

- (1) communicate with anyone in any way regarding this case or its merits – either by phone, text, Internet, or other means;
- (2) read, watch, or listen to any news or media accounts or commentary about the case;
- (3) do any research, such as consulting dictionaries, using the Internet, or using reference materials;
- (4) make any investigation, test a theory of the case, re-create any aspect of the case, or in any other way investigate or learn about the case on your own.

When you retire to consider your verdict, you must select one of your member to act as foreperson who will preside over your deliberation and will be your spokesperson here in court.

During your deliberation, you will have all the exhibits which were admitted into evidence, these written instructions and forms of verdict which have been prepared for your convenience.

Your verdict must be unanimous. As soon as you have agreed upon a verdict, have it signed and dated by your foreperson and then return with it to this room.

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2 If, during your deliberation, you should desire to be further informed on any point of  
3 law or hear again portions of the testimony, you must reduce your request to writing signed  
4 by the foreperson. The officer will then return you to court where the information sought  
5 will be given you in the presence of, and after notice to, the district attorney and the  
6 Defendant and her counsel.

7 Playbacks of testimony are time-consuming and are not encouraged unless you deem  
8 it a necessity. Should you require a playback, you must carefully describe the testimony to  
9 be played back so that the court recorder can arrange his/her notes. Remember, the court is  
10 not at liberty to supplement the evidence.

Now you will listen to the arguments of counsel who will endeavor to aid you to reach a proper verdict by refreshing in your minds the evidence and by showing the application thereof to the law; but, whatever counsel may say, you will bear in mind that it is your duty to be governed in your deliberation by the evidence as you understand it and remember it to be and by the law as given to you in these instructions, with the sole, fixed and steadfast purpose of doing equal and exact justice between the Defendant and the State of Nevada.

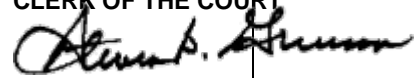

## MEMORANDUM OF POINTS AND AUTHORITIES

## I. STATEMENT OF FACTS

The Defendant, JANET SOLANDER (hereinafter “Ms. Solander”), will appear before this Court for Sentencing after having been convicted of forty-six (46) counts following a multi-week jury trial. As this Court will recall, the facts of the case are heavily contested between the parties. An extremely abbreviated factual recitation is set forth as follows:

Ms. Solander was tried by a jury and convicted of forty-six (46) various counts of Child Abuse, Neglect or Endangerment, Child Abuse, Neglect or Endangerment Resulting in Substantial Bodily Harm, Sexual Assault of Minor Under Fourteen Years of Age, among other counts, for conduct related to the Solanders' unconventional methods of disciplining her adopted children that the jury ultimately found to be unlawful. The Defense highlighted facts at trial that the adopted children were previously foster children, had a history of abandonment, physical and mental abuse by their biological family members, and experienced behavioral issues related to those prior traumas. The State countered that, and offered witness testimony that while the victims had behavioral issues during their time in foster care, those issues had been resolved prior to their placement in the Solander home. The Defense cross-examined the State's witnesses, in particular the children's DFS worker, Heather Richardson, and former foster mother/current adoptive mother, Debbie McClain, who both tried to minimize the effects that foster care had on these children and their prior trauma. Debbie McClain proved to be a poor historian, and could not recall some of the more basic medical issues or appointments that she had taken the girls to. Moreover, Heather Richardson painted a picture of well-adjusted girls in foster care on direct examination, and was impeached on cross-examination with the children's counseling records that Ms. Richardson had knowledge of, and also with Ms. Richardson's own reports submitted to the Family Court.

The State's theory was that Janet and her husband, Dwight, adopted these children and immediately after the adoption was finalized, began abusing these children. The forms of child abuse were intentional and cruel, and that the Solanders intentionally made it appear that the adopted children were ill or special needs, either for attention, out of a mental illness, or for pure greed, as DFS issues a higher stipend per child under certain criteria. The State also presented

1 the other bad acts of unconventional behavior and rules the other foster children in the Solander  
2 home that were used in the home.

3 While the Defense continues to assert that the adopted girls exaggerated the more serious  
4 allegations they made, the Defense is also mindful that these children came from abused and  
5 neglected homes. They had a history of behavior problems and demonstrated some of these  
6 behaviors in the Solander home. Ill-equipped to deal with these issues, the Solanders engaged in  
7 escalating forms of discipline. The Defense disputed that the insertion of the catheters was ever  
8 factually true, but rather, that they were used as a threat to prompt the children to void their  
9 bladders instead of withholding their urine. Based on the testimony of the girls when compared  
10 to the testimony of the State's own expert, the way the catheters were alleged to have been  
11 inserted could not have happened, with both the middle and youngest children testifying that Ms.  
12 Solander single handedly inserted catheters into them and urine "immediately" came out. As the  
13 Court will recall, the eldest child could not describe the alleged insertion of the catheter with  
14 factually reliable detail.

15 Nevertheless, the jury convicted Ms. Solander of all counts she was charged with and  
16 Sentencing now follows.

17 The Trial in this matter focused on the allegations. At Sentencing, however, this Court  
18 can consider Ms. Solander's life and history before the period of the allegations. We ask that  
19 this Court consider the following facts and materials in mitigation and support of Defense's  
20 request that this Court sentence Ms. Solander to a term of Life with the Possibility of Parole after  
21 thirty-five (35) years, running all other counts and sentences concurrently.

## 22 II. MEMORANDUM OF LAW

### 23 A. Applicable Law.

24 Nevada law provides the court with broad discretion in sentencing, so long as the penalty  
25 comports with the sentencing range delineated by NRS 176.033(1)(b). However, in utilizing this  
26 broad discretion, the court has a duty to assign penalties that are fair in order to maintain the  
27 dignity of the law. In Nevada, the court is charged with making its determination based on "the  
28 gravity of the particular offense and of the character of the individual defendant." *See* NRS  
176.033(1)(b). Persuasively, the Federal sentencing guidelines advocate considerations such as

1 the seriousness of the offense, respect for the law, just punishment, deterrence and protecting the  
2 public. 18 USC §3553(a)(2).

3 Constitutionally, the issue of fairness in sentencing is addressed by the Eighth  
4 Amendment prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment. Under this prohibition, a  
5 sentence that is within statutory limits may be unconstitutional if “it is so unreasonable or  
6 disproportionate to the crime as to shock the conscious.” *Allred v. State*, 120 Nev. 410, 420, 92  
7 P.3d 1246, 1253 (2004), *overruled on other grounds by Knipes v. State*, 124 Nev. 927, 192 P.3d  
8 1178 (2008). Furthermore, the United States Supreme Court has recognized that a sentence is  
9 excessive when the sentence imposed serves no penal purpose more effectively than a less severe  
10 punishment. *Fullman v. Georgia*, U.S. 238, 279, 92 S.Ct.2726, 2747 (1972). Finally, in addition  
11 to fairness, the United States Supreme Court has recognized “reasonableness as a component of  
12 sentencing determination. As Justice Breyer stated in *United States v. Booker*, “we think it fair  
13 to assume judicial familiarity with a reasonableness standard.” *United States v. Booker*, 543 U.S.  
14 220, 262, 125 S. Ct. 738, 160 L. Ed. 2d 621 (2005).

15 While there is not a Nevada statutory requirement of fairness or reasonableness in  
16 sentencing, it is clear that the United States Supreme Court has established a minimum  
17 constitutional threshold that must be adhered to. Accordingly, the court must balance the goals  
18 of sentencing with protecting the defendant from excess punishment.

#### 19 **B. Standard of Review.**

20 The Nevada Supreme Court affords a district court wide discretion in its sentencing  
21 decision. *Houk v. State*, 103 Nev. 659, 664, 747 P. 2d 1376, 1379 (1987). The Nevada Supreme  
22 Court will refrain from interfering with the sentence imposed “[s]o long as the record does not  
23 demonstrate prejudice resulting from consideration of information or accusations founded on  
24 facts supported only by impalpable or highly suspect evidence.” *Silks v. State*, 92 Nev. 91, 94,  
25 545 P. 2d 1159, 1161 (1976).

### 26 **III. ARGUMENTS FOR SENTENCING LENIENCY**

27 Mitigation is defined as any aspect of the defendant’s character or record, or any other  
28 circumstances of defense the defendant may offer in support of his or her request for a more  
lenient sentence. Mitigation is multifaceted.

1           **A.       Recommended Sentence.**

2           The most serious offenses that Ms. Solander was convicted of, Sexual Assault of Minor  
3 Under Fourteen (14), each carry a mandatory prison sentence of thirty-five (35) years to Life.  
4 The conduct Ms. Solander was found guilty of was severe, as is a Life consequence. If Ms.  
5 Solander is sentenced to a minimum of thirty-five (35) years in prison with all other charges  
6 running concurrent, she would be released at approximately ninety-four (94) years of age,  
7 assuming she lives that long. This Court will recall that Ms. Solander has a number of health  
8 issues and is wheelchair bound in custody because she is not undergoing any physical therapy  
9 any longer. The requested sentence would be for the minimum sentence allowed based on her  
10 lack of criminal history, advanced age, and because she is facing mandatory prison that will act  
11 in effect like a death sentence for her. Any additional time serves no additional punitive purpose  
12 under these circumstances.

13           **B.       Aberrant Behavior.**

14           Persuasively, the Federal Sentencing Guidelines authorize a downward departure for  
15 aberrant conduct of “a single criminal occurrence or single criminal transaction that was  
16 committed without significant planning, was of limited duration, and represented a marked  
17 deviation from an otherwise law abiding life.” USSG § 5K2.20(b); *see also United States v.*  
18 *Jones*, 158 F.3d 492 (10th Cir. 1998)(where the federal district court properly considered  
19 conduct to be aberrant and warranted a downward departure based upon an “isolated mistake...in  
20 the context of [the defendant’s] entire life.”)

21           Ms. Solander has no criminal history. She was born to a military family, began her own  
22 career in the military, and married a man also serving the military. She has lived a life of service  
23 and strict discipline. After she was medically discharged from the Army, she worked on the civil  
24 side of the military as a Nursing Assistant. She continued to do so until she took an early  
25 retirement. Prior to fostering and adopting, Ms. Solander raised four (4) biological daughters  
26 without incident. CPS was never involved in her life. Her adult daughters lead normal lives and  
27 all pursued higher education.

28           After Ms. Solander’s three (3) eldest biological children were raised and out of the family  
home, she re-married to Dwight Solander. They chose to expand their family, initially by

1 fostering children. They ultimately adopted a sibling group of three (3) daughters, the named  
2 victims in this case. Ms. Solander had gone through the rigorous evaluations and home studies  
3 to secure licensure to be a foster parent of multiple sibling group, but was not fully informed of  
4 the foster children's histories prior to their placement. That created problems in terms of  
5 creating discipline and structure for Ms. Solander, whose biological children did not have the  
6 same abuse and neglect background. In response, the Solander developed escalating methods of  
7 discipline, some of which were admittedly unconventional, and others which were greatly  
8 exaggerated by the adopted children.

9 Although this conduct occurred over a period of time, the Defense submits that it is  
10 analogous to aberrant behavior because it was out of character for her. All of her children wrote  
11 letters in support, confirming that Ms. Solander was a strict parent, but that she was loving and  
12 never engaged in abusive conduct towards them. Instead, they confirmed that she was a loving  
13 parent. Dr. John Paglini, who completed, Ms. Solander's Risk Assessment, confirmed that she  
14 "exhibits an above average amount of emotional warmth." (Exhibit A, p. 12.) During the time  
15 period alleged in the Amended Information, Ms. Solander's biological children confirmed that  
16 she was spread very thin, trying to help out her dying parents, her own biological children, and  
17 her adopted children. As Mr. Solander worked during weekdays away from the home, Ms.  
18 Solander was tasked with caring for a number of dependents emotionally and financially.  
19 Defense submits that the stress of these situations over time caused her to exercise poor  
20 judgment in some of her disciplinary methods, including methods like the toilet buckets in the  
21 kitchen that were observed and tacitly approved by the DFS case workers who visited the home.

22 Understanding that the jury ultimately found all of the discipline methods to be unlawful,  
23 the Defense submits that this behavior was limited to a specific period of time and when it was  
24 conceded not to be working, the Solander paid to send their daughters to a private boarding  
25 school that boasted its specialization in dealing with behavioral issues. By that time, none of the  
26 unconventional discipline methods were in use.

1           **C.     Family Support.**

2           Attached are letters of support from Ms. Solander's three (3) eldest biological daughters,  
3 who confirmed their mother to be warm, nurturing, and a big reason for their individual  
4 successes in life. They are all educated, employed, and raising their own children. They  
5 describe Ms. Solander is a good and strict parent. They offer context to the stressors Ms.  
6 Solander was experiencing at the same time that she had adopted the girls, including that she was  
7 a single parent for most of the weekdays, that she had ailing parents, including a father with  
8 advancing dementia, and that she was doing her best to meet everyone's needs.

9           **D.     Aspects of Mitigation to Consider.**

10          In the Risk Assessment, Dr. Paglini noted a number of positive aspects of mitigation for  
11 this Court to consider.

- 12           1. No prior criminal history.
- 13           2. No evidence of an antisocial personality disorder.
- 14           3. No substance abuse history.
- 15           4. No serious psychological history.
- 16           5. Positive history as a parent to biological children.
- 17           6. No prior CPS involvement.
- 18           7. Remained trouble free for three and one-half (3 ½) years while out on bail in this  
19 case.

20          Prior to the instant offense, Ms. Solander led a relatively normal life. She was gainfully  
21 employed, by all accounts a normal, loving parent who exercised appropriate, yet strict  
22 discipline. She was not found to have any previous risk factors to elevate her to a high risk. She  
23 was assessed as a moderate-high risk based on the severe nature of the conduct she was  
24 convicted of, as there were no other aggravating factors.

25          Ms. Solander submits that these mitigating factors support her request for the minimum  
26 sentence of thirty-five (35) to Life. She is likely to be a compliant, non-offending prisoner. The  
27 severity of the minimum sentence she is facing and the requirement that she register as a sex  
28 offender are sufficiently serious consequences under the circumstances of this case. These  
consequences are severe and appropriate when balancing the Court's dual duties of dispensing

1 justice to the victim and imposing a punishment commensurate with the circumstances of the  
2 crime on this defendant.

3 Based on the foregoing reasons, any punishment in excess of the minimum sentence  
4 would make no measurable contribution to the acceptable goals of punishment for Ms. Solander,  
5 who has no prior criminal history and whose advanced age and medical conditions mean that the  
6 mandatory prison sentence amounts to a sentence of dying in prison.

### CRIMINAL CHARGES

The LVMPD Arrest Report was reviewed. On March 4, 2014, LVMPD received a report from Child Protective Services detailing an extensive history of abuse and neglect to three children by their previous foster parents who became adoptive parents. The alleged perpetrators were Ms. Janet Solander, Mr. Dwight Solander and Ms. Solander's biological daughter, Ms. Danielle Hinton. The three children Ava, DOB: October 21, 2001; Amaya DOB: January 23, 2003; and Anastasia, DOB: July 25, 2004 were placed in foster care with the Solander's on June 20, 2010. The Solander's adopted the three children on January 19, 2011. Additionally, the Solander's had four foster children in the home. These children were placed in the home on March 31, 2013. On February 27, 2014, CPS removed the children due to allegations of physical risk.

Unity notes indicate that Ms. Crystal Rosas with foster care licensing stated on March 1, 2013, Mr. Dwight Solander informed her that Amaya was hospitalized and in a coma during 2012. She was diagnosed with hyperthyroidism and a twisted colon and on anti-seizure medication. Dwight also stated that Ava has Crohn's Disease and Anastasia currently was undergoing medical testing.

CPS visited her home on February 27, 2014 and the specialist asked where the adopted children were, Ms. Solander reported "Nebraska and it's none of your business." CPS called LVMPD missing person detail the following day. Mr. Dwight Solander informed the detective that the three girls were at a boarding school called Marvelous Girls Grace Academy in Pace, Florida and have been there since November 2013. This academy was contacted. The girls arrived on November 11, 2013. The girls had expressed fear about returning to Las Vegas believing they would be killed by their mother.

On March 1, 2014 Ms. Henry, CPS worker, interviewed the girls at the Florida CPS office. All three girls disclosed that Janet, Dwight and Danielle hit them with a tan paint stick until the bled. They were hit if they had an accident in their underwear, if they took too long going to the bathroom or if they answered homework problems incorrectly. Ava described the tan paint stick as a Home Depot stick. The girls were hit on the legs and buttocks. Janet had a timer and the girls were not allowed to use the bathroom until the timer went off. It was difficult and painful and their stomachs frequently hurt. If the girls had bathroom accidents they were not allowed to eat for three days. Ms. Solander blended the food for the girls due to their stomach problems. They had no idea what they were eating. If the girls were in trouble, Ms. Solander made them sit on a bucket that had a toilet seat on top and they sat there for hours. If they got into trouble Ms. Solander had them take cold showers and she poured ice water on them. The girls were not allowed to towel off and rather made to dry off by having a large fan blowing on them. The girls slept on boards with no sheet or blankets and they had to sleep with a fan blowing on them while only sleeping in their underwear. All three girls believed that if they returned back to their parents they would be killed by Janet. Amaya disclosed that there were cameras all over the home and Janet could see what they were doing via her cell phone. Amaya stated that she had a scar on her back from Janet pouring hot water on her. Anastasia reported that after they had many accidents Janet made them put their soiled underwear in their mouth and leave it there until their mouths would bleed and Janet stuck a paint stick in her vagina because she could not hold her bladder. Ava stated that Anastasia had scarring on her right ear and back from Janet pouring hot water on her.

According to Ms. Henry's notes, the three girls were sent by their parents to the Marvelous Girls Grace Academy due to their alleged behaviors. The director of the academy advised Ms. Henry the girls had not displayed any behaviors their parents indicated prior to being sent, and had no wetting accidents since they arrived at the academy.

The children were interviewed again in Las Vegas, Nevada on March 11, 2014. Anastasia reported Ms. Solander placed a needle (catheter) in all three girls vaginas. The needle was connected to a tube and the tube was connected to a bag. Both Ava and Anastasia knew the word catheter and were able to describe what it looked like. They further stated if urine came out of the catheter Janet hit them with a paint stick.

On March 8, 2014, one of the foster children were interviewed. This girl was able to corroborate Ava, Amaya and Anastasia's statements. The siblings were placed with the Solander's on May 31, 2013 and the girls left the home in November 2013. She recalled witnessing Janet and Danielle beat Ava, Amaya and Anastasia with a thick wooden stick. The girl reported the girls had scabs and bruises on their legs, buttocks and arms from the beatings. The girl was able to confirm that Janet, Dwight and Danielle watched the girls go to the bathroom and put them on a timer. They had one minute to urinate and two minutes to defecate. The Solander's punished the girls mainly for bathroom issues and incorrectly completing homework.

On March 13, 2014, forensic pediatrician Dr. Sandra Cetl, conducted a medical exam of the three girls. The results showed that Anastasia had scars from burns on her right ear lobe, right shoulder and right side of her neck. Anastasia had linear scar on the left buttocks and hyperpigmentation scar (prior injury of some kind) on her right buttock. Anastasia also had scars on her right elbow, upper right arm, back of her upper left leg, and lower front part of her left leg. Amaya had two scars on each knee, on top of each foot and a linear scar on her left wrist and elbow. Ava had three to four linear scars on her low right buttock, two inch raised linear scar on the inside of her left leg, five rounded scars on her mid to lower back, scars on both elbows, top right hand and second and third knuckle on her right hand. Dr. Cetl reported that the similarities and the patterns on the three girls buttocks was definitive for abuse. The scars on the elbow, arms and legs of the girls were consistent with abuse. Dr. Cetl conducted a sexual assault nurse exam of the three girls and the results were normal.

Shannon Edwards, RN for the Department of Family Services brought to the CPS' attention that Janet had authored and published a book entitled "Foster Care, How to Fix This Corrupted System." The book entails how Janet feels there are problems with the Department of Family Services raising foster children. Janet reported in the book "The easiest and most defiant way for a child event is by urinating or defecating in his or her pants on the bed, or on another object." Janet reported in the book "This is where the rage could start for foster parents."

On March 20, 2014, all three perpetrators were taken into custody. Ms. Danielle Hinton was interviewed and she is the daughter of Ms. Janet Solander. Danielle confirmed that the three girls statements regarding Dwight and Janet hitting them with a paint stick on their buttocks unclothed. Danielle stated that she had seen blood in Anastasia's underwear from the beating. Danielle corroborated Janet restricted their bathroom usage, and when they had an accident,

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Janet and Dwight hit them with a paint stick. Danielle stated that Janet and Dwight also withheld food as a punishment. Danielle confirmed Janet and Dwight would blend food for the girls which she believes was a punishment for having toilet accidents. Danielle stated that Janet and Dwight required the girls to sit on a bucket that had a toilet seat on top for extended periods of time for punishment for toilet accidents. Danielle confirmed that Janet and Dwight made the three girls take cold showers and poured pitchers of ice on them as punishment for toilet accidents. Danielle stated that Dwight and Janet checked the shower with a black light to insure the girls did not use the shower as a bathroom. Danielle further confirmed the three girls slept only in underwear and on boards in the loft area with no sheets, blankets or pillows with the fan blowing on them. That Janet and Dwight checked the girl's underwear for accidents. If there was evidence of an accident, Dwight and Janet made the girls wear diapers, suck their thumbs and chant "googoo gaga I'm a baby." Dwight and Janet would also make them wear soiled underwear on their head, and Danielle recalled at least one time where they had to put the soiled underwear in their mouth. Danielle stated Dwight and Janet purchased catheters to use as punishment for the girls holding their urine. She never saw them use the catheter.

Mr. Dwight Solander was also interviewed. He confirmed Janet used a bucket with toilet seat because the girls had toilet accidents. He denied using the buckets. He confirmed hitting the girls with a paint stick on one occasion only and denied leaving scars. Ms. Janet Solander declined the interview.

#### INFORMED CONSENT

Ms. Solander was advised that this is an attorney ordered risk assessment. Ms. Solander was advised that the report will only be submitted to her attorney and she is protected by attorney client privilege. Ms. Solander was advised that if this report is submitted to the courts there is no longer confidentiality. Ms. Solander provided verbal and written consent for this evaluation.

#### MENTAL STATUS EXAM/BEHAVIORAL OBSERVATIONS

Ms. Solander is a 57-year old married black female who was dressed in detention center clothing and was in a wheel chair. She was interviewed on her unit. She is approximately 5'4" and exhibits a moderate build. Ms. Solander was alert and oriented to today's date, day of the week, current and preceding President of the United States and city and state. Her speech quantity/speech quality was well within normal limits with no speech impairment. Her mood was neutral with a restricted range of affect. Ms. Solander's thought processes were logical and goal oriented and her thought content was appropriate to issues discussed. Ms. Solander denied suicidal/homicidal ideation, intent or plan. Ms. Solander exhibited a cooperative demeanor.

#### PSYCHOSOCIAL HISTORY

Ms. Solander was born on June 8, 1960 to Mr. Walter Curtis and Ms. Robbie Curtis. Her mother died from complications of diabetes at the age of 71 in 2006. Her father died in November 2017 at the age of 83.

Ms. Solander reported that she is the youngest of a siblingship of four. Her sister Cheryl is two years her senior. Her brother Tony is two years her junior. Her sister Christina was 10 years her junior and died of a stroke in 2015. Additionally she has an adopted sister, Maria, current age 67. Ms. Solander reported her adopted sister Maria was adopted years before she was born. Ms.

Solander was born in Spain where she resided for several years. Her father was active duty air force. Ms. Solander reported that they had a nanny who assisted her parents when they resided in Spain. Her mother was employed as a nurse and her father was United States Air Force as an assistant to a general. As such, they had a nanny that assisted them. This is when they adopted Maria.

Ms. Solander reported they resided in Spain for a few years and then the family relocated to Spokane, Washington for one or two years. They then resided in Zaragosa, Spain again from her kindergarten through 3<sup>rd</sup> grade. They moved to Madrid, Spain for a period of time as her father followed the general. The family then moved to Minot, North Dakota likely for her 5<sup>th</sup> grade year. The family then resided in Columbus, Ohio for less than a year. Then their family resided in Sturgardt, Germany for her 6<sup>th</sup> grade. They then resided once again in Columbus, Ohio as her father worked at Wright Patterson Airforce Base. Her father then retired and she finished 7<sup>th</sup> grade. The family then moved to Huber Heights, Ohio in 1973 when she was 13-years of age.

Ms. Solander reported that her parents separated when she was in the 11<sup>th</sup> or 12<sup>th</sup> grade. She resided with her mother and she frequently saw her father. She reported a good childhood. She denied sexual and physical abuse. Child Protective Services was never involved in her life. She denied any types of traumas, domestic violence nor did her parents have drug or alcohol problems.

#### EDUCATIONAL HISTORY

Ms. Solander reported she initially repeated kindergarten as she spoke Spanish. She intended to repeat kindergarten in Zaragoga, Spain but then her family moved to Madrid and Madrid did not have kindergarten so she then attended the 1<sup>st</sup> grade. Ms. Solander reported that her grades were primarily Ds and Fs with some Cs in elementary school. She learned to speak English in the 1<sup>st</sup> grade. She denied behavioral problems. Ms. Solander attended numerous elementary schools. She reported her grades improved as she went through the educational process.

Ms. Solander reported a B/C average in middle school with no behavioral problems. She attended Wayne High School and had a B/C average with no behavioral problems. She graduated high school in 1978.

Ms. Solander attended Wright State University for less than one year from 1978-1979. She dropped out after one semester due to financial reasons. In 2003, she attended University of Phoenix. She then attended Kaiser University and American Intercontinental University. She reported she earned an A average and a bachelors degree in healthcare management from American Intercontinental University.

#### EMPLOYMENT HISTORY

Ms. Solander reported she worked at Frisches Big Boy Restaurant from 1978 to 1980 as a full time waitress. She then worked a Dubbs, a company that prepared food for airlines from 1980 to 1981. Ms. Solander was then employed in the Unites States Army. Basic training was at Fort Dix in New Jersey. She was then stationed at Fort Lee, Virginia for AIT training. She then was assigned to an army base in Frankfurt, Germany for eight months. She had medical problems during her pregnancy and she was honorably discharged under a Chapter 8. She denied that her

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discharge pertained to any psychological problems. She denied behavioral problems while in the United States Army. Ms. Solander reported that she was anemic and had a medical discharge with a rank of E-2. She denied any type of disability rating.

Ms. Solander was then unemployed for a few years. She then worked at Frisches Big Boy as a manager for one year. Her husband was in the United States Army and he received orders to Germany. She worked for the DOD in the cafeteria for a period of time. She then was an OBGYN nurses assistant and then worked the primary care department. She then did not work for a year or two as she was pregnant again and had medical issues.

The family relocated to Louisiana and in time she worked at a civilian hospital as a nurses assistant. She then was once again approved to work for the Department of Defense and worked as a nurses assistant on a med-surg unit for two years. Her husband was then released from the United States Army due to medical conditions. They relocated to Ohio. In Ohio she worked at a clinic as a nurses assistant as a civilian for six months. She then was approved once again by the Department of Defense. She worked at Wright-Patterson OBGYN clinic as a medical clerk from 1991 to 1998. She also worked in medical records. The family moved to South Carolina and she worked for the DOD in military processing for health care issues for one year. Her family then moved to Phoenix and she worked for the DOD from approximately 1999 to 2006.

Ms. Solander reported they then moved to Las Vegas, Nevada. She worked for Anthem Institute as a medical assistant, a temporary position for six months. She then worked for Nevada Health Center as an office manager for one year. She was approved once again by the Department of Defense. She worked at Nellis Airforce Base initially in drug testing as an instructor manager for three years. She reported this position was transferred to a military position. She deferred her retirement and left in April 2012. She will collect retirement at the age of 60. She then took care of foster children commencing in 2010.

#### MEDICAL HISTORY

Ms. Solander reported she was born healthy and attained developmental milestones within normal limits. Ms. Solander reported at the age of 34 she had a D&C. At the age of 35 she had her gallbladder removed. At the age of 37 she had her appendix removed. At the age of 43 she had endometrial ablation. She had a hysterectomy at the age of 44. On August 21, 2017, she had a spinal fusion C3-C6, secondary to a motor vehicle accident in November 2015.

Ms. Solander was interviewed in a wheelchair. She discussed her medical difficulties. She reported that she is in chronic pain. Normally it is on a 6 level, yet when she tries to sleep it is at a 10 level. She reported that she has been incarcerated she has not been involved in physical therapy. She reported she also has a history of hypertension. She was diagnosed with diabetes in 2008 and was placed on medication in 2014. She reported that her diabetes is now stable. Currently, she is only on Tylenol.

#### PSYCHOLOGICAL HISTORY

Ms. Solander denied previous psychiatric hospitalizations, psychiatric medication usage or outpatient psychotherapy. Ms. Solander denied previous suicide attempts and all mental health



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disorders. Pertaining to traumas, she reported she was involved in a motor vehicle accident and suffered a severe neck injury. She denied any type of psychological traumas.

### SUBSTANCE USE HISTORY

Ms. Solander reported rare alcohol usage throughout her adult life. She denied alcohol problems, DUIs or alcohol related incidents. She reported she has never been drunk. Ms. Solander reported she smoked marijuana twice before the age of 20 and none since. Ms. Solander denied ever experimenting with any type of drugs. Ms. Solander denied gambling related issues.

### CRIMINAL HISTORY

Ms. Solander reported that as a juvenile she was never involved in any gangs and denied all juvenile conduct problems.

Ms. Solander reported that she was never arrested for any type of criminal offense until the current index offense. Ms. Solander reported that she was arrested for numerous charges on March 20, 2014. She was incarcerated for seven months and bailed out on October 28, 2014. She was on bail for three and a half years until she attended court in approximately February 2018. She was convicted on March 13, 2018 and remanded back to jail and she remains incarcerated at Clark County Detention Center. Ms. Solander denied prior CPS convictions. Ms. Solander denied any type of criminal problems with the exception of the current index offense.

The Presentence Investigation Report of Ms. Janet Solander was reviewed. Ms. Solander has no prior misdemeanor, gross misdemeanor or felony convictions. She has never been incarcerated in jail or prison. Hence, she has no prior criminal history.

### RELATIONSHIP HISTORY

Ms. Solander reported some dating before she married. She dated Mr. Danny Hinton while she was in the United States Army for approximately one year. They married November 16, 1982. Tara was born April 7, 1981. Kim was born February 12, 1983. Dominique was born on October 18, 1988 and Danielle was born on December 21, 1992. Ms. Solander reported they separated in the spring of 1996 as her husband was unfaithful. He also was physically abusive towards her. She reported that her ex-husband has not been in the children's lives as he never paid child support. She was assisted by her parents and she also worked.

Ms. Solander reported she dated Mr. Dwight Solander in 2003. They married in 2003. Mr. Solander has always been gainfully employed. They have no children together but have had foster children and also adopted children (child victims). They began working with foster children in 2009 and adopted in 2010. She reported a positive and stable marriage. Her husband and youngest daughter Danielle are co-defendants.

### COLLATERAL INTERVIEWS

1. Ms. Kim White: Ms. White, daughter of Ms. Janet Solander was telephonically interviewed on May 29, 2018. Ms. White currently resides in Ohio. Ms. White denied that her mother has any history of drug or alcohol problems, prior criminal history, abuse or neglect, or psychological or anger problems. Ms. White reported her parents divorced when she was nine or

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10 years of age. She resided with her mother until she was 18 years of age. She moved out and then moved back in at the age of 19 and stayed with her mother for another year. She reported she may have moved in and out again one or two more times, and permanently left at the age of 22.

Ms. White denied that her mother has ever been abusive or neglectful towards her as well as her siblings. When she was a child her mother grounded her, made her perform extra chores or restrict her from her friends. There was no corporal punishment. She stated they were fairly good kids. She was never slapped, punched or hit with a belt. She reported retrospectively the discipline was always reasonable. She acknowledges that she was always close to her mother throughout her childhood and adolescences. She described her mother was always there for her and even when she was pregnant at a young age, although her mother was upset "she was there for me." Ms. White reported that when she was a child/adolescent her mother always pushed for her to earn great grades. Her mother was in the military so they had to be courteous and use manners, such as "yes sir, no sir." She confided in her mother and her mother always requested for them to be respectful towards others. What she did not like about her mother was that her mother was protective of them and did not like them to have sleep overs at other people's homes because she was afraid something would go wrong. She understands this retrospectively.

As an adult, she is very close to her mother and her mother is very close to her three grandchildren. Ms. White resides in Ohio and her mother always visited Ohio to attend the children's meaningful events. Ms. White and her children spoke to her mother on a daily basis. As noted she is very close to not only her daughter but her three grandchildren. Ms. White denied that her mother has ever exhibited any violence towards others. Her mother was actually a victim of physical abuse by her ex-husband.

Ms. White understands the allegations which make no sense to her. She stated that her mother may be strict but she has always been a very good person and has never been abusive towards anyone. The crime is uncharacteristic of her. She does not understand the sexual assault claim nor would her mother ever hit someone until they bled. Regarding the cold showers/ice water, she stated that is not her mother. Additionally, Ms. White reported that she has visited her mother in Las Vegas on holidays. She saw the children and everything appeared normal, there were no issues. She denied that the girls were fearful of her. Her mother may have been strict, but the children were able to eat, shower when they wanted and everything seemed normal.

Ms. White denied that her mother was ever verbally abusive towards her or anyone else. There has never been any mental abuse. Ms. White was asked how her mother treated her sisters. Tara is the oldest, and she was the one that during her adolescence she snuck out a lot, therefore she was in the most trouble. Tara's discipline was being grounded or removal of privileges. Dominique was stable and compliant, Danielle acted out a little, but she was the baby and she was never in trouble.

Pertaining to her step-father, she described Mr. Solander as very nice, stable and he treated her mother well. That once Mr. Solander came into the picture they then experienced nice family vacations. Prior to Mr. Solander's presence money was tight, their mother worked full time and they did the best they could. Her mother was employed as a nurse's assistant for the



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Department of Defense. To conclude, Ms. White reported her mother is a good person and a good mother. That these accusations are not who her mother is, as her mother has always been supportive and loving.

2. Ms. Tara Taylor: Ms. Tara Taylor, daughter of Ms. Janet Solander was telephonically interviewed on May 31, 2018. Ms. Taylor is the oldest biological daughter of Ms. Janet Solander. Ms. Taylor is 37-year of age and resides in Ohio. Ms. Taylor reported as an adult she saw her mother a few times a year.

Ms. Taylor reported that her mother was strict and protective, but for good reason for her and her sister's benefit. Both her parents were military and "they kept us on the right path. My mom was very big regarding education and we had to get good grades." Ms. Taylor reported that after her parents divorced her mother raised them and lead by example, she was very strong and she constantly worked. Pertaining to discipline she stated that she was frequent grounded, she then laughed for she was the child that was grounded the most. She denied that there was any physical abuse. On rare occasions she was smacked on the hand. Her father was the one who spanked them. Her mother just grounded or restricted them. Ms. Taylor denied that her mother has any issues of physical abuse or neglect, psychological or anger problems, drug or alcohol problems or criminal propensities.

Ms. Taylor reported she was "very" loved by her mother. She was frequently raised by her grandmother as her parents were in the service and she did not want to move. She stated she was very close to her grandmother due to the fact that she spent a lot of time with her grandmother. Ms. Taylor reported her mother treated she as well as her siblings exceptionally well.

Ms. Taylor is aware of her mother's convictions which she perceives as bogus. She reported that her mother is not capable of that type behavior. She stated that her mother never created any physical harm for them nor was she ever sexually inappropriate, "That is not my mom. I never seen her in a violent way. My mom might yell, she would ground us. The charges, I can't see mom doing that." Ms. Taylor reported that her mother treated people well, and she had a lot of friends. Ms. Taylor denied that she or her sisters were ever emotionally abused. Ms. Taylor once again highlighted that she was frequently grounded "because my mom worried something would happen to us." Ms. Taylor denied that she was ever restricted from the bathroom, denied that food was withheld nor were they humiliated.

Ms. Taylor reported that she has seen the three girls on numerous occasions when they visited Ohio. The girls appeared close to her mother. Ms. Taylor reported that she respects her mother taking on the children and trying to help them. Ms. Taylor laughed and reported that she felt that her mother was too easy on the children and that she coddled them. She stated that the children appeared happy and loved by her mother. Additionally, Ms. Taylor talked to the children on the phone and they seemed happy on the phone. Ms. Taylor reported that her stepfather was always a good man who treated her mother exceptionally well.

3. Ms. Dominique DeHoyos: Ms. Dominique DeHoyos was telephonically interview on May 31, 2018. Ms. DeHoyos is 29-years of age and resides in Phoenix, Arizona. Ms. DeHoyos has a 13-month old child and is currently pregnant.

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Ms. DeHoyos reported that her mother was "a really good mom." She stated that her mother was disciplined and strict as well as very encouraging and supportive. She attributes her success to her mother's involvement in her life. Ms. DeHoyos denied any physical or emotional abuse. She reported that her mother grounded her or took her phone away. There was no physical abuse or cruelty. Her two older sisters normally were grounded. She reported her mother was always appropriate with discipline. Ms. DeHoyos denied that her mother exhibits any drug or alcohol problems, psychological or anger problems. Ms. DeHoyos reported that her mother frequently worked and was very involved. Pertaining to medical care, she stated that her mother was always concerned with any medical issue and seemed appropriate.

Ms. DeHoyos is aware of the charges and convictions. She reported it is unreal and makes no sense. It is uncharacteristic of her mother. Her mother has always been very appropriate. She reported that the three girls had a history of abuse and had numerous issues. She stated that at one time, one of the girls defecated on her hand and then showed it to the babysitter. She stated it was just very odd behavior for a child that age. She reported that the middle child tended to act out, was very controlling and mean towards other people. Her mother tried to be supportive of the children.

Ms. DeHoyos reported she saw the three girls and her mother on vacations and visits. Her mother interacted well with the children and the girls interacted well with her mother. Ms. DeHoyos reported that she had never witnessed her mother being sexually inappropriate. She reported that it is uncharacteristic of her mother.

#### DEFENDANT'S VERSION OF CRIME

Ms. Solander reported she began to care for foster children in 2009. The state requires a family to have the foster children for six months before they can adopt children. Ms. Solander stated she and her husband discussed adopting two children and were contacted by CPS who stated they had three children available. They provided foster care for these three girls in June 2010 and adopted them by January 2011. Ms. Solander reported she and her husband worked full time during this timeframe and her husband often times worked out of state. Hence she had three children and a nanny assisted her until approximately 2012. The nanny became frustrated with caring for the three children and decided to quit. Ms. Solander's position was being changed to a military position and she elected to take an early retirement also in April 2012. Ms. Solander reported her life became easier once she retired because she no longer received calls from the nanny about the girls. Ms. Solander reported that the children had a variety of issues. Ms. Solander reported that Ava frequently lied and tended to follow her younger sister Amaya. Ava did not have any problems with bed wetting. Amaya had anger issues, she and her younger sister Anastasia frequently physically fought. At times Amaya hit her. Amaya lied a lot especially about adults. Amaya did not have any urinary issues but once she saw Anastasia received attention by having urinary/bowel issues then she began to purposefully have urinary issues.

Anastasia was 9-years of age. She went to the bathroom on herself on purpose and this was a significant issue. Anastasia lied, fought with her older sister, and was somewhat devious. Regarding her devious behavior, sometimes Anastasia poked Amaya with a fork, and both Anastasia and Amaya pulled at each other's hair.
