Let's go ahead and call the 4 State of Nevada versus Maurice Moore, Case No. C324525. 5 6 Counsel, please note your formal appearances, for 7 the record. MR. DRASKOVICH: Robert Draskovich and Michael 8 Horvath on behalf of Mr. Moore, who is present. 9 10 MS. KOLLINS: Stacey Kollins, Jake Merback on 11 behalf of the State. THE COURT: Okay. You've indicated you've worked 12 13 out a lot. Do I still need to do a ruling in reference to the -- her comments as far as having previously had sex to 14 the police officer versus the SANE nurse? 15 16 MR. DRASKOVICH: Yes, Your Honor. 17 THE COURT: Okay. I have looked at it. And while 18 I follow the argument, I do think there is a distinction 19 that's provided under the statute as it relates to motive and proof of motive. 20 21 As the more I look at the acts that are described 22 here, what we're talking about is an example of the underlying motive, which is the fear of the mother, rather 23 than actual evidence much the motive. 24 25 And so I -- you've got it in the evidence that

you're going to be relying on in terms of the motive of this 1 2 case, and so this is essentially just a separate act relating to that motive, which I see is more as propensity that she 3 would act this way in one instance and she would in another. 4 And while it does, I think, arguably have some 5 6 relevance, I think the probative value is outweighed, 7 especially when you look at the statutory prohibition. 8 won't allow you to get into the -- her comment to police that she did not have sex previously, versus her comment to the 9 SANE nurse that she did have --10 11 MR. A Yes, along with my information.

A Yes. The -- the next item that I impounded, item number three was a penile swab. And I collected that from the defendant's penis using the same technique, it was a sterile cotton swab with distilled water, and I instructed him on how to collect it. He did it in my presence under my instruction, and then I impounded that in an envelope, and impounded that item.

I also collected what we call a buccal swab, which is --

- Q I'm sorry, ma'am, let me go back to that specific penis swab. Is that labeled as item number three?
  - A Yes, it was.

- A Yes. A buccal swab is a known standard. It's a -it's -- if we needed to get a known DNA profile from someone,

Yes. 3 Α And then you circled all of these potential stains, 4 5 correct? 6 Α Yes. 7 You'd agree with me that you are unable to give Q 8 testimony as to how long those stains have been there? 9 That is correct. Α You'd agree with me they could have been there for 10 Q 11 hours or years? I -- I do not how long those stains were there. 12 Α And you can't -- and you can't give testimony --13 Q I cannot. 14 Α 15 -- (indecipherable)? Okay. Q 16 This was a 2003 Aston Martin or was it a 2004 Aston Martin? 17 18 Α It was a 2003 Aston Martin. 19 Okay. And these photographs were taken in 2016, Q correct? 20 21 Α 117. I'm sorry. 26, February 26, 2017, correct? 22 23 Α Yes. 24 In reference to these circles that you made, you 25 can't say with any degree of certainty that those were, in

1 fact, semen stains? 2 I cannot. Just presumptive stains, or we don't know, do we? 3 The two that I circled and put a positive sign next Α 4 5 to, those are the only two that I can say presumptively 6 tested positive --7 Q Okay. 8 -- but with certainty, I cannot. 9 And you can't give any testimony concerning who --Q assuming those were even semen stains, who those stains 10 belonged to, correct? 11 12 That is correct. And I'm required by International Association of 2 3 Forensic Nursing to maintain that certification and continuing education units. 4 I've also taught the 40-hour training course to 5 6 teach other nurses how to become sexual assault nurse 7 examiners, and then I participate -- now I teach them with 8 the hands-on portion of the -- how to perform the exams. 9 How long have you been doing sexual assault nurse 0 examinations for? 10 11 Approximately 12 years. Do you know approximately how many examinations 12 0 13 you've done? I'm going to estimate, probably around 9,000. 14 15 I want to call your attention to February 26th of 16 2017. Were you working as the sexual assault nurse examiner at UMC on that day? 17 18 Α Yes. 19 Did you have an occasion to perform an exam on an 0 individual by the name of Alexia Martinez? 20 21 Α I did. 22 I'm going to show you State's Exhibit 1. Do you Q recognize that? 23 24 Α Yes. 25 Who is that in that photograph?

And was she brought there by the police? 1 Q 2 Α The triage nurse notes say that she came by private vehicle, but I believe she came by transport by Las Vegas 3 Metropolitan Police. 4 Okay. The exam takes place in the sexual assault exam 8 Α room, but generally the patient is taken to an area called 9 10 the quiet room where they wait, and that's where the 11 introductions are done. Q When you speak with Alexia, do you talk to her 1 2 about why she's there or what occurred? 3 Α Yes. Now, just briefly, you talked about the options. 12 13 There's different options in regards to the level of exam that the individual or the patient can select; is that 14 15 correct? 16 Α Yes. And which level of exam did Ms. Martinez select? 17 18 She took option three for an adolescent, which is 19 the full sexual assault kit examination. 20 So the most intrusive exam that you can perform; is 21 that correct? 22 Α Yes. 23 You said you conduct -- once the mother leaves, you 24 conduct an interview or you talk with -- you talk with Alexia 25 in regards to why she was there, what had occurred. Page 90

Why is that important in your preparation for performing the exam?

A I ask them to give me a narrative of what occurred so that I can determine what additional potential evidence collection that may be necessary, as well as correlate her medical history to potential injury patterns that I've seen or may find, and be able to speak as to how the injury patterns may be attributed to a medical condition or if it's attributed to a form of like blunt force trauma.

- Q Is the patient informed prior to this discussion that the questions you're asking her, her answers are important in regards to the medical treatment you're going to give her?
  - A Yes.

- Q What specifically -- and just specifically and briefly did Alexia tell you in regards to what had occurred?
- A She stated that she had a conversation on Tinder. She indicated that she had agreed to meet and go out without her parents knowing that she left the house to meet a male.

She indicated that she entered into a car and that there was oral fellatio, penis to vagina intercourse and then penis to rectal intercourse. And she described oral fellatio as being against her will. She described that penis to vagina as causing pain and asking the male to stop. And then she described the rectal intercourse as being the most

painful, even though she gave a pain scale on the penis to 1 2 vagina and the penis to rectum as ten out of ten for each one of those. 3 And did she indicate anything about whether or not 5 the penis to rectum was consensual? 6 She indicated that she asked the male to stop, and 7 he told her it would be okay. So once you've conducted that interview, what do 8 Q 9 you do to gun the exam itself? Describe the head-to-toe assessment, and normally 10 Α 11 the patient is moved to the exam table itself, and then the superior digital forensics imaging photographs would be 12 13 initiated, the head-to-toe photos are taken, and the sexual assault kit collection is -- takes place at the same time the 14 15 head-to-toe assessment is initiated. 16 Now, you said the sexual assault collection. you describe what that is? 17 Sexual assault kit has collection DNA swabs that 18 19 are taken generally orally first, and then buccal swabs are taken from the cheeks. Nail swabs would be taken generally 20 21 next. In this specific case, the patient indicated that 22 there was potential DNA on the breasts, so breasts swabs were 23 taken. 24 And then she indicated during the assessment of the

neck that the neck may have been -- had DNA on it, so a neck

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swab was taken also and placed in the sexual assault kit.

Once the head-to-toe where you look, listen, and feel is completed, then the pelvic exam was initiated. So the patient is in a paper gown at this point, and the crime light has already been utilized when the patient was standing naked with the lights turned off. The crime light would have been used and was used on her head to toe, and that was negative. The --

- Q Could you describe what that light is that -- you said the crime light; is that correct?
- A Yeah, it's an alternating light source that looks for potential bruising that may not be present or showing evidently initially. It also helps me find potential fluids. In this evaluation I would be looking possibly for semen or sperm specifically.
- Q Could you continue with your description of the exam?
- A Once the head-to-toe was completed, the pelvic exam would be initiated, and the patient is put in what's called a lithotomy position where they're on a -- their on their backs in a supine position and then they're feet are put into stirrups and the speculum exam and the external genitalia exam is initiated.
- Ms. Martinez was on her menstrual period, and so when evaluating the external genitalia, she had the

appearance of menstrual blood on the external genitalia region, so a four by four, which is a four inch by four inch cotton swab was use today wipe off that area so I could ascertain whether she had any injuries present on that -- in that region.

She was noted to have a red arrhythmic contusion on an area called the vestibule or the vestibular band, which is next to the urethra where you urinate. And then proceeding from there, the area, technical area, called the posterior fourchette and fossa navicularis area was assessed. There was no signs of blunt force trauma to that region.

So toluidine blue dye was applied to the posterior fourchette and the fossa navicularis, and that dye is used to try and ascertain whether there's an injury pattern that may not be present to my direct eye, and that when the dye adheres to that area, then generally, there sometimes is pain associated with the dye being applied or sensation of pain.

And then if the dye adheres to that region, then that's telling me that area has an abrasion to it, and that the dye is sticking to it.

That was not present on Ms. Martinez's exam.

Secured digital forensics imaging would have been taken before and after the dye was applied. Patient was prepared for a speculum exam. So the speculum is shown to Ms.

Martinez, it's indicated that sterile normal saline will be

used as a lubricant to place inside the vagina, the speculum, which was done.

And then the speculum is opened. The vaginal walls are assessed, and she was on her menstrual cycle, so there was something called a fox swab, which is a large Q-tip that is about eight inches long and about a half a inch of cotton swab on the end of that Q-tip was placed after her vaginal swabs and cervical os swab was placed.

I used the fox swab to clear the cervix off so that I could find out where the blood was coming from. And the blood was emitted from her cervical os of the uterus, which was consistent with her telling me that she had started her menstrual cycle.

There was no signs of blunt force trauma to the cervix or the vaginal walls, the front, top, bottom, right, and left.

Once photos were taken, the speculum was removed, and then the patient was asked to sit up, and sit and recover for a minute.

This patient had never had a speculum exam done before, so it took a little while to talk to her about what is a speculum and what the job of the speculum is and what it may feel like when it's placed in the vagina.

Once she was recovered, then I asked her to stand up and turn around. She was put into a knee/chest position

to assess the anus and the rectum. The perianal folds were assessed, and the patient was noted to have lacerations in the perianal folds.

So a technique called separation in traction is used to separate the perianal folds, and she had approximately ten lacerations noted from starting at a clock position from the 5:30 position until the 2:30 position of a clock. She had ten lacerations noted there, with the largest one being at the, I called it 14:30, which would be 2:30 position for people that read clocks with a normal clock reading.

The anal scope was placed into her rectum next.

And the patient had swabs taken from her rectum, and on the swabs taken from her rectum, there was the appearance of blood on the swabs. And the patient did have pain when I separated her perianal folds before I inserted the anal scope.

The swabs were taken, the photographs were taken of the rectum, and then the anal scope is removed. And the patient is given time to recover. And then once that is completed, antibiotic discussion occurs, morning after medication discussion occurs, and then labs for HIV, Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, syphilis would be drawn and sent to the lab. Urine pregnancy and a urine drug screen was sent to the lab.

And when I did the exam for the cervical os of the uterus, I took -- after the swabs were all taken for the kit, I took a gonorrhea and a chlamydia swab.

In addition to that, I didn't mention this, but when I took the swab from the gonorrhea and the chlamydia, after that swab in the cervix, I then take a swab looking for sperm on a slide. I put that material on a slide and then I look on the slide with a microscope for sperm. And in Ms. Martinez's case, there was no sperm noted on that slide.

The antibiotics were administered to her. She took the Azithromycin, which is to prevent chlamydia. She took the injection of Rocephin, 250 milligrams of Ceftriaxone to prevent gonorrhea, and then she did take the Levonorgestrel or Plan B, which is the emergency contraceptive medicine to prevent an egg and a sperm from uniting.

The patient was given discharge instructions with her mom present, and during the discharge instruction process, the mom was -- mom cried, and then the daughter became upset and started crying. At that point in time, the rape crisis advocate and the patient and her family was told that this sexual assault can affect the entire team.

So the rape crisis advocates will help them with the counseling and trying to get to the healing process.

Patient was given discharge instructions and reminded with lacerations to the perianal folds it's important not to

become constipated, and that she may want to participate in the description of a sitz bath to try and help the anal folds, the lacerations heal, and they will heal fast and quickly because of the vascular nature of the vagina and the rectum.

- Q Let's go back, Ms. Dermanelian, just briefly. You indicated that you took oral swabs, vaginal swabs. Did you also take cervical swabs?
  - A Yes.
- 10 Q An anal swab, a neck swab, a breast swab --
- 11 A Yes.

- Q -- fingernail swabs, and a fox swab; is that correct?
  - A Yes. And then I used -- put the four by four in the kit also that I used to wipe where her menstrual blood.
- Q What did you do with all of those swabs after they were taken?
  - A I placed them each one of the, like the oral swabs have a box that's designed with an O on it for oral. The buccal swab has a small box where you put the buccal swabs in. Vaginal swabs have a V, so you put those swabs in the V box for vagina.
  - C is the box for cervix, and then R is the box for rectum. L is the box for left-hand nails. RH is for the right-hand nails. And then I would make -- there's -- in

each kit there's extra boxes.

So for Ms. Martinez, I made a box for her breast swab and a box for the neck swab. The four by four would have gone in the little envelope, and the fox swab would have gone into its separate box, and I would have labeled this fox swab.

And then each one of those swabs are placed into their own envelopes that are labeled vaginal, cervical, rectal. And then each one of those are sealed and placed into a sexual assault kit. And then once I'm done with the paperwork, then everything is sealed with the evidence seal where I initial and then sign, and then I store the kit in a locker in the office until the Las Vegas crime lab technicians come to pick it up.

- Q Was there anything else placed in this kit besides all of those swabs?
  - A The paperwork that I produce.
- Q I'm going to show you what's been marked and admitted as State's Exhibit 99. Do you recognize that?
- A Her underwear and her peri pad. She had indicated that she had started her menstrual period, so I noted in my dictation that she had flecks of brown and red material on the peri pad that appeared to be consistent with her menstrual flow.
  - O And were those items also placed in the sexual

1 assault kit? 2 Α Yes. And that kit is then, you said, impounded and 3 stored until it can later be used for testing by the forensic 4 5 lab; is that correct? 6 Α Yes. 7 Now, you talked about some injuries you found 8 during the course of the exam. Do you recall -- I'm going to show you State's Exhibit 100. Do you recognize that 10 photograph? 11 Α Yes. Is that Ms. Martinez? 12 13 Α Yes. Did she indicate to you how she received the mark 14 15 that's shown in that photograph? 16 Yes. 17 What did she say to you? Her mother hit her with an open hand after the 18 sexual assault had occurred, and that she sustained that 19 20 abrasion at that time. 21 Okay. Now, you talked about the -- a vaginal Q 22 contusion in a specific area outside of the vagina; is that 23 correct? 24 It was the vestibular band, yes. Α 25 What is that -- the injury you observed on the

vestibular band, is that consistent with anything?

A It was a contusion. It was red in color, and that the patient indicated that when the penis to vagina intercourse took pain -- took place, she had pain on penis to vagina intercourse, so it's possible that the penis would have hit that area and caused the contusion to occur.

- Q So a penis hitting that area would be consistent with the injury that you saw?
- A The mechanism that the patient gave me was penis to vagina. She had a pain level ten out of ten with the insertion. So it would be possible that you had a blunt force trauma from a item that caused a bruise to occur that was red in color.
- Q Now, let's move -- you talked about that you observed ten different anal lacerations. Is that the words you used?
  - A Perianal, yes, lacerations.
- Q Okay. Were those -- were those lacerations varying in their degree?
- A Yes. In depth, length. The largest one was at the 14:30 or the 2:30 position.
- Q And what are those anal injuries that you observed, those lacerations, are they consistent about anything?
- A The patient indicated with insertion of, she stated a penis to her rectum, she had the most pain occur while she

was in the -- she described it as a -- she used the quote doggy style position.

The patient also had, when I separated with the separation in traction technique we use, the patient had pain with the separation. So if you have pain when you open up and separate the skin tissue, that pain generally occurs because the airflow is hitting that open laceration, and you have nerve endings in that skin tissue area.

So the laceration had not sealed itself or healed yet, and that's why when I separated the perianal folds, she was indicating she had pain from that airflow hitting the open laceration.

And then she had the blood on the swab noted from the rectum. So that was still present. And remember the vagina and the rectum and the anus are very vascular. They have a lot of, you know, small capillaries and venules and veins, and the blood was still present in her rectum, and she has no history of like constipation or hemorrhoids or having blood. She had had a bowel movement the day before with no pain and no blood. So I'm trying to ascertain why that blood would be in the rectum, and would it be possible that a energy force was touching that skin area inside the rectum that could have been irritated enough to leave that red blood on the swabs.

O The level of injuries that you observed inside

Alexia's rectum, would you expect the creation of those injuries to be accompanied by pain?

A In her case, yes, because the time that she gave that the sexual assault took place was at approximately 00:30 in the morning, and she came in soon after the sexual assault that she stated took place, and then the exam was done in a very relatively fast period of time.

So the body will heal quickly, but it won't be able to seal itself off in that four, six hour period of time.

- Q You indicated that she described that when -- that when there was anal -- when she was -- when there's anal intercourse going on, she described a pain level of ten to ten; is that -- ten out of ten; is that correct?
  - A Yes.

- Q Would that pain level of ten out of ten be consistent with the injuries that you observed?
- A Yes, even though I believe the rectal pain was more than ten because she said the rectal pain is the one that hurt the most.
- Q So it would be -- that level of pain she described would be consistent with the type of injuries you observed?
  - A Yes.
- Q Okay. Now, you can't tell in your observations or in any of your testing, you can't tell whether any of the injuries you observed were caused by consensual intercourse

We will have a fairly full afternoon tomorrow from about 12:30 until 5:00 o'clock. And then, like I said, Friday we'll be off, and then we'll start early on Monday, and we should be able get you the case on Monday.

So that's the change in the schedule based on the parties working with each other and streamlining this case in terms of its presentation to you.

So we will break for today. Like I said, we'll get started tomorrow at 12:30. If you could be here by 12:20, we'll try to get started at 12:30 as close as possible.

We will be putting in a pretty full afternoon tomorrow so that we can avoid having to come in at all on Friday.

While you're out there tonight, do not talk to each other about the case or about anyone that has anything to do with it until the end of the case when you go to the jury room to decide on your verdict. Do not talk with anyone else about this case or about anyone who has anything to do with it until the trial has ended and you've been discharged as jurors. Anyone else includes members of your family, your

employer, and your friends.

You may tell them that you are a juror in a criminal case, but don't tell them anything else about it until after you've been discharged by me. Do not let anyone talk to you about the case or about anyone that has anything to do with it. If someone should try to talk to you, please report it to me immediately by contacting the marshal.

Do not read any news stories or articles or listen to any radio or television reports about the case or about anyone who has anything to do with it. Do not visit the scene of any of events mentioned during the trial, undertake any investigation, experimentation, or research on your own, including use of social media to in any way discuss the case or use of the Internet or other reference materials to do any sort of investigation or research.

And do not begin to form or express any opinion on any subject connected with this case until it's finally submitted to you.

I just want to emphasize again, don't talk to each other about this case. I know at times even it's tempting just to make comments about, you know, why someone may have asked a question or, you know, what someone looked like, or how someone acted or anything like that. What you think is sort of innocent in that doesn't really concern the facts of this case or anything like that, but don't do it.

Just avoid talking among yourselves about this case. You'll get a chance, I think, pretty early on Monday to talk to each other about the case. So you just have to last out the next four days to not talk among yourselves in any way about the case. Not even what the attorneys are wearing or how bad my ties are or anything like that. I know this sounds sort of trivial, but it is important when people tend to sort of get lax when they think it's not that important an issue that it may be commenting to somebody else. Don't talk about the case. Everything else is I hope you guys do become friends with each other during the course of the trial. So, you know, any other conversation is wonderful. But just not about the facts or anything concerning this matter. Have a great evening. We'll see you tomorrow 12:20, and get started at 12:30.
