- Q Okay. Is there anybody else in the kitchen when it happens?
- A No.
 - Q And can you tell us exactly what happens?
- A I was in the kitchen. I was -- I think I was looking for something to eat because I -- I have a console that I play video games on, and at that time, I was -- excuse me -- I was -- I had my console in my sister's room with -- which I was in. And I just went outside to grab something to eat, and then he just came by and just gripped me.
- Q Now, when you were in the kitchen and this happened, was there anybody else in the kitchen?
- 17 A No.
- Q Okay. And you said that he touched your body; is that right?
- 20 A Yes.
- Q What part of your body did he touch?
- 22 A My butt.
- Q Okay. And what part of his body did he use to touch that?
- 25 A His hand.

Q Okay. And when his hand touched your butt, can you 1 2 describe what happened? Did it just stop there on your butt 3 or did it move at all or what happened? 4 He just like --5 Now, you made a motion of your hand of sort of 6 going back and forth; is that right? 7 Α Yes. 8 Is that how his hand touched your butt at that time? 10 Yes. Α 11 Okay. Now, after -- now, at the time that that 12 happened, how long had it been since he -- he hadn't been 13 sexually touching you? 14 Α For -- for --15 Had it been --16 -- it was months. 17 -- a long time? 18 Months. 19 Months? Okay. Q 20 And when he did touch you, what did that make you think, 21 if anything? 22 It was going to happen again. 23 All right. Now, I want to go to that time right 24 then about the time that the police came to your residence, I

think you said that that was April 16th of 2016; is that

1 right? 2 Α Yes. 3 Now, at that time, who was living that residence that you were living at the police came to? 4 5 Me, him, my mother, my sister, my sister's boyfriend, my brother, his wife, pregnant, and my youngest 6 7 nephew. 8 Okay. So there was a lot of people living at the residence --10 Α Yes. -- at that time; is that right? 11 12 Did you know whether or not that some of those people 13 were going to be moving out of the residence any time? 14 Α Yes. 15 Could you tell us about that. 16 Α My sister started getting into a very serious 17 relationship with her now husband, and they wanted to move to a new place because at that time, she was -- she was 18 19 pregnant. 20 0 Okay. 21 But an incident happened that we got in a car accident and she lost the baby, but she wanted to move -- she 22 23 wanted to move out and like start a family. 24 Okay. And did they --25 My brother --Α

Q -- have plans to move out at some point? 1 2 Yes. Α Did you know when they were going to move out? 3 They said like in two to three months they were --Α 4 5 they were -- they were already looking for a place. 6 Okay. And what about your brother, Mael? 7 My brother wanted his own privacy because his -his wife was pregnant with his second child, and he wanted to move for they could have a bigger place for themselves and for the -- and for the babies. 10 Okay. So did you believe that they were going to 11 12 be moving out soon? 13 Α Yes. 14 Okay. Now, I want to go to April 16th of 2016. 15 That's the day that the police arrived, right? 16 Α Yes. 17 Do you remember a time when the police came Okav. to your residence? 18 19 Α Yes. 20 Did you know where the police were there at the 0 21 time? 22 Α Yes. 23 How did you know why the police were there? 0 24 Because Armando didn't want to give the rent money, Α 25 but that happened because my sister and my brother-in-law,

they used one of his tools, and I guess, it wasn't working properly, and he got angry. And then he grabbed the rent money and said that it was his, that he wasn't going to give it to us. So I believe my mother called the police, and that's when the police came so he could return the money.

- Q Were you involved in any of the discussions between your mom and the defendant or your sister and her husband?
 Were you involved in any of that?
 - A No.
 - Q Okay. Do you remember seeing the police arrive?
- 11 A Yes.

- Q Now, when the police arrived at the residence, what were you thinking?
- A That I wanted to be free from everything. And I was scared of being alone with him and my mother.
- Q Okay. Let's talk about that for a minute. You said you were afraid of being alone with him and your mother. What do you mean by that?
- A I was afraid that he was going to start sexually abusing me again.
- Q And you said that you were afraid that you were only going to be there with him and your mother. So you did believe that there weren't going to be other people around to potentially protect you?
- 25 A Yes.

- Q All right. You also said you wanted to be free. What do you mean by that?

 A I wanted to be free of walking in my own home.
 - Q So at that time, what do you do?
- A When the police came, I went up to talk to them, and I told them that I was being raped.
 - Q Okay. And when you told them that, what happened?
- A They told me to describe what rape was, and I told them that he put his penis in my anus, and they told me to go back, and that's what they went and grabbed him to arrest him.
- Q At that time, do you remember talking to the police about when the sexual abuse might have happened?
 - A I don't understand.

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- Q At the time that you talked to the police, did they ask you anything about when the sexual abuse you described to them happened?
- A No, they just told me to go back and this, after I talked to the detective.
 - Q Okay. So at that time, you said that they told you to kind of go off some place; is that right?
 - A Yes, they told me to go back with my mom.

Yes. 17 Α Same day? 18 0 19 Α Yes. 20 0 A few hours later; does that sound about right? 21 Α Yes. 22 And when they asked you while you were there what Q 23 happened, you said they were -- police were called because of 24 the domestic disturbance, right? Not because of abuse? 25 Α Yes.

1 Q Okay. And then you said that you moved -- I 2 believe, you moved to Las Vegas when you were five or six? 3 Α Yes. Okay. And you're not -- you aren't quite sure when 4 5 the abuse started? 6 It just happened during those two apartments that I 7 first move into. Okay. So there's first apartment and then the 8 Q apartment with the --10 Pool. Α -- pool? 11 12 Α Yes. 13 But you did tell them that you weren't sure what it 14 started? 15 Yes. And it was only on Monday that we learned that the defendant actually wanted to have at that witness here, and it was at that time I was instructed by the Court that I contacted her and she attempted to make herself available for that, and was not able because of her schedule.

MR. FELICIANO: And I -- prior to Friday, I don't -- I know we talked about the availability of Dr. Cetl. I don't remember ever agreeing to it before Friday. If I did, I don't know why we'd be even talking about it on Friday. But if -- if that was the understanding when we talked about it on Monday, they've had four days to get her here. So, I

mean, a Southwest flight isn't that difficult to get and be here in a couple hours, so --

kind of downplayed.

- A Yeah, there was an argument, obviously, about it, but my main concern at that point was whether a battery had occurred between two people, if it was a domestic battery or not that had happened.
- Q You ultimately came to the conclusion that no battery had occurred, correct?

 12 especially the caller, Rosalba, the mother, spoke Spanish.

Since 2007 until 2015. 6 7 2007 until 2016? 0 8 Α '16, sorry. 9 Okay. I didn't understand. 10 Over that period of time, do you know whether or not he 11 was employed while living here in Las Vegas? 12 Yes. 13 And where was he employed? 14 He was a welder in a company named Brandon Iron. And is that his employment over that entire period 15 Q of time? 16 17 No, he got other ones, but he worked doing the same Α 18 thing. And when you say doing the same thing, would 19 Q Okay. 20 that be welding? Welder. 21 Α 22 Did he have a normal shift that he normally worked 23 over that period of time? 24 Α Yes. 25 And what would that be?

In the morning, like 6:00 or 7:00 a.m. until 2:00 1 p.m. 3 Okay. Now, you mentioned that you normally worked Q 4 at night; is that right? I'm sorry, Counsel, would you 5 THE INTERPRETER: repeat the question for the interpreter. 6 7 BY MR. SWEETIN: 8 You mentioned that you normally work at night; is Q that right? 10 Α I did. 11 So would it be fair to say that you guys worked opposite schedules? 12 13 Α Yes. 14 Now, while you were living with the defendant over that period of time, did you have discussions with him in 15 16 regards to any health issues that he might have had? 17 Α No. Okay. Did you have discussions with him about 18 19 health issues or he didn't have any health issues? 20 He didn't have any health issues until like 2014, when he was diagnosed with diabetes. 21 22 Okay. And were you aware of whether he took any 23 medication in regards to that? 24 When he was diagnosed with diabetes, he was taking 25 one pill every day for the diabetes.
