ORDER CONCERNING ACCESS TO APPELLATE COURT FACTETIESCLE

On March 13, 2020, this court issued AO-0008, restricting access to appellate court facilities due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This order extends the restrictions imposed by AO-0008. Consistent with the guidelines issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and in order to protect public and employee health and safety, it is hereby ORDERED as follows:

The following persons shall not enter the appellate courthouses in Carson City and Las Vegas:

- Persons who in the last 14 days have traveled outside the United States;
- Persons who reside or have close contact with someone who has traveled outside the United States within the last 14 days;
- Persons who have been asked to self-quarantine by any doctor, hospital, or health agency;
- Persons who have been diagnosed with coronavirus or who have had contact in the past 14 days with anyone who has been diagnosed with COVID-19;
- · Persons with unexplained fever, cough, or shortness of breath; or
- Persons without a need to enter the facility on essential court-related business.

Tours of the appellate courthouses will remain suspended until further notice.
