And mom gets The analysis on the phone because in most middle schools you can't talk on your cellular phone, you can't text or you'll get your phone taken away. But when mom gets her child on the phone, her child is crying. And she makes her child give the phone to the teacher and get her to the principal's office or to somewhere where she can get some help and her mom can come get her.

So her mother comes to get her at school. She's upset, she's crying. Metro is called. Patrol comes out to the home. Detectives come out to the home. The child is taken by a patrol officer with her mother to Sunrise Hospital where she is seen by a nurse practitioner and by Dr. Vergara. And Dr. Vergara does a – kind of a three stage exam, if you will. They take a history to find out why the child is there. They do a triage to make sure there is no acute injury, bleeding, broken bones, something that needs immediate attention, take her respiration, then ultimately they do a sexual assault examination on this child. And when they look at her genitalia, there is swelling at the introitus of her vagina, her genital opening, which we anticipate Dr. Vergara will tell you is consistent with some penetrating trauma, penetrating – not necessarily an injury because there was not bleeding, but there was swelling and redness.

Thereafter Detectives Tomaino and Hatchett are contacted. They contact Table a in the E.R. They take her statement. Detective Tomaino eventually makes contact with Mr. James, who corroborates the fact that he was at the house and he was there and he did drive the child to the school. So he admits his presence in that home at that time, at that location with that child. And she's a teenager, and she'll tell you that when he was with mom she didn't like him.

One of the details I did not recount for you – excuse me, it's late in the day – is when she notices him that day when he's putting his fingers in her vagina, he has gloves on his hands, the kind of gloves that you would see in a medical office or the kind of gloves that some people might use to clean the house. About seven or eight days after this incident, mom is cleaning house. She looks under the bed and there's an Air Jordan shoe box that's filled with rubber gloves, something foreign to that location. I mean, there might have been rubber gloves in the house under the sink, but not under the bed in a shoe box, and she turns those over to the detectives.

You're going to hear about another girl in this case, and her name is

Notice: Case. Notice: so name does not appear in the Information as offenses
for which this defendant stands charged before you today. But her testimony is
relevant to you in a very limited way, as ruled on by this Court. You may look at
what this other young woman has to tell you to measure this defendant's intent,
motive, opportunity and lack of mistake or accident in the immediate offense.

In 2005 the defendant was married to Tahisha James. She had a stepdaughter, Name Color. The defendant shared two children with Tahisha James. They shared a residence here in Las Vegas. And in March of 2005, the first time Mr. James successfully got his hands on Name Color, he entered her bedroom, took her to a vacant room in that home, said he needed to check her vagina and proceeded to digitally penetrate that girl. At that time Name Colors was twelve years old. The second occasion Mr. James perpetrated on Name was later in March of 2005. He woke her up, took her clothes off, attempted to get his penis in her vagina, and inartfully ended up putting it in her anal opening.

She was twelve years old.

The third time Mr. James got his hands on National County, he wrestled her until he got her clothes off. She successfully got away from him, got to the bathroom. She locked the door. He picked the door lock. And against this child's will, put his penis in her vagina. The last and final time, before she told, he crawled into bed with her, she began to scream and hit on him. Again, in the middle of the night, she was asleep on this occasion and he tried to ger her underwear off, and her grandmother caught them and the conduct stopped. Those acts against National County that the State will present to you, again, are for your consideration as to Mr. James' intent, his opportunity, his motive in touching and sexually assaulting Tables, as well as that that sexual assault was not the product of some type of mistake or accident.

That is the substance of the evidence that you will hear in this case.

And again, on behalf of the Clark County District Attorney's Office, the Special

Victim's Unit and myself and Mr. Pandelis, we thank you for your attention.

OPENING STATEMENT

BY MR. PAGE:

Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. I thank you for bearing with us for a few more minutes of your attention. This is a case – this is a case where the State is trying to prove zero plus zero equals one, but the evidence will show that zero plus zero still equals zero.

On May 14th, Tyrone James had his day all planned out for him. He

was going to run an errand for a good friend of his, Theresa Allen, and then he was going to go fishing with his grandma. The errand consisted of dropping off a dog and getting some food, and then also picking up a bill, a power bill so he could go and pay it for her. Then after that he was going to go pick up his grandma and they were going to go fishing at Sunset Park the remainder of the day.

He arrived at the home of Theresa Allen, 207 North Lamb, and not expecting anybody to be there, Mr. James planned to quickly run in, drop of the dog, feed it, grab the bill and get out. However, upon entering the apartment, Mr. James is surprised to find Theresa Heresa there at home, the 15-year-old daughter of his friend, Theresa. He first takes care of his business, feeds the dog, grabs the bill, and as he arrived it was 9:40. He asked her why she wasn't at school and did she need a ride to go to school. She said yes. She (sic) picked him (sic) up and he took her to school.

Mr. James drops off Table a at school and continues his day as he planned, to go pick up his grandma. He goes home and gets ready for the fishing day, and then he receives a call. He receives a call from Theresa. And this is when Theresa makes him aware of the allegation that Table a is making against him, sexual assault. He then agrees to immediately turn around, and he goes back and meets with Theresa. At that point he explained exactly what he did and he denies the allegation.

He then begins again to go on the fishing trip with his grandma. While he goes out, he's en route to go to Sunset Park, he receives another phone call, this time from Metro, from the Las Vegas Police Department, and they are asking him if they can speak with him. And immediately he turns -- he stops, turns around,

 drops off his grandma and goes and meets with Metro.

The evidence will show that Mr. James did not commit sexual assault on Table 18. There are several things to – the evidence will show. First of all, the evidence will show that Mr. James fully cooperated. He stopped what he was doing and immediately when down there and spoke with the officers. He offered to give them any help that they needed. He offered to give them DNA. The evidence will show that his behavior was consistent with that of an innocent man.

You will also hear that Table a openly -- (sorry for my writing) -- openly disliked Mr. James prior to making this allegation. You will also not hear a shred of evidence – physical evidence against Mr. James. You will see no scratches, no bruises, no abrasions or any marks that would be consistent to what Table a testified to, or will testify to. You will not hear of any medical findings or DNA. You will not hearing anything that will corroborate her story and her allegations. And you will also hear that her story changes. The evidence you will hear will show that the State's case is weak. In an attempt to hide the weaknesses of these cases, the State will have National Openion in the state's testify.

MS. KOLLINS: I'm going to object as to argument.

THE COURT: Sustained. The jury is to disregard that last comment. BY MR. PAGE:

will talk about allegations that she made against Mr. James approximately five years ago. That these allegations -- immediately upon making these allegations that she became uncooperative and no longer wanted to pursue these allegations against Mr. James. The testimony that you will hear as to National is also that you will not

hear a single shred of evidence as to any of the testimony that Name brings against Mr. James. Furthermore, her testimony changes from the time that she makes her initial report to the report that she makes now five years later. These — This is what you will hear, is what you will hear testify from the two girls that the State would put on for evidence.

Now, you heard in the jury – when we were selecting the jury there were numerous questions that you can – if you believe the testimony of a witness, you can find guilt just by believing the testimony of that witness. We ask you to listen to the testimonies that are provided with an open mind. We ask you to hold the State to their burden. And that these are the reasons why we ask you to demand more than just uncorroborated testimony because, ladies and gentlemen, zero plus zero does not equal one, it equals zero. And accordingly, we ask you to return a verdict of not guilty against our client, Mr. James.

THE COURT: Thank you. Mr. Page, would you mind just moving the white board out of the way.

MR. PAGE: Of course.

THE COURT: And State, call your first witness.

MS. KOLLINS: He asked about lubrication.

MR. COX: Actually I did ask about lubricant briefly. And the reality is is that that was testified by –

So I'm going to probably be asking for permission – I don't know if I can do it through the kid or not, but I may re-call the detective at this point.

MR. COX: That's fine.

MR. COX: Your Honor, I do have a base for the question. It is supported by what was reported during the exam at the hospital, that she had been sexually –

THE COURT: Okay. What's your case?

MR. COX: Excuse me?

THE COURT: You said you have a case.

MR. COX: No. It's my understanding of the Rape Shield Law, I'm precluded from going into any sexual history. However, if the State is making an allegation

that there is a penetrating injury or a sexual injury caused by my client, I do have the opportunity to ask and see if in fact there is an explanation, provide an explanation for the injury they're arguing. In this case, reading the SANE exam, she does report that she had been sexually active with her boyfriend. So I'm not – It's not a fishing expedition, it's something that was reported during the SANE exam.

MS. KOLLINS: Well, but not sexually active within the 72 hour period. So you can't –

MR. COX: Well --

MS. KOLLINS: I mean, that's pure Rape Shield.

THE COURT: Do you know – Anybody know the statute number off-hand?

MR. COX: Judge, you know, I've read it. I've read it, I've read it. I don't have it with me. Honestly I didn't think it was going to be an issue, especially when the State is claiming that there's a penetrating injury.

MS. KOLLINS: Well, again, the subject of a pretrial motion or a hearing.

That should have been answered before cross-examination.

MR. COX: Well, so then if I'm surprised during trial, I would be precluded? I don't think so.

THE COURT: Mr. Cox, what part of her testimony was a surprise?

MR. COX: Well, I was surprised in opening, Judge. It was my understanding they weren't claiming that there was a specific finding of a penetrating injury. Ms. Kollins in opening – Because the SANE exam indicates a non-specific finding. In opening statement Ms. Kollins argued that there was swelling at the introitus, which is the opening of the vagina. Now, granted, there's a myriad of reasons why a young woman has that during an exam, but she argued it was caused by my client. So,

you know, when that happens, you know, I need to react and defend my client.

MS. KOLLINS: Well, and I don't know how Mr. Cox thinks that he's going to stand up in opening statement and say there was absolutely no evidence, when contained within the report is swelling and redness to the opening of the genital area. Am I supposed to just gloss over that? It is consistent with a penetrating injury or blunt force trauma. So I don't know why this comes as a surprise. If he wants to cross-examine the nurse, the doctor is going to say not after 72 hours. She's going to say that that is within the acute period. So –

MR. PANDELIS: And Your Honor, it's Chapter 50.090.

MS. KOLLINS: Yeah.

THE COURT: Thank you. Okay, so this is what it says: "In any prosecution for sexual assault the accused may not present evidence of any previous sexual conduct of the victim of the crime to challenge the victim's credibility as a witness unless the prosecutor has presented evidence or the victim has testified concerning such conduct or the absence of such conduct, in which case the scope of the accused's cross-examination of the victim or rebuttal must be limited to the evidence presented by the prosecutor or victim."

MS. KOLLINS: And obviously our position is we have not opened the door on that. I mean, if what Mr. Cox said was the state of the law, every time we had any type of finding you'd be able to go into sexual history of a victim. And that's just not the way it is.

MR. COX: Well, if it was qualified – I would submit if it was qualified with there was redness, it's non-specific. You know, you look at the report –

MS. KOLLINS: But that's – that's what it is.

MR. COX: I'm sorry, let me say what I want to say. Let me say what I want to say real quick. You limit it to what, you know, the report says, a non-specific finding. In other words, there's other reasons that cause this. But she specifically argued to the jury that it was caused by my client. So I believe, Judge, that completely opens the door. Now, I'm not fishing because in the SANE report she reports being sexually active with her boyfriend. And in all honesty, Judge, I don't intend to question beyond, you know, probably one or two very simple questions along those lines.

THE COURT: Okay. But it says: "The prosecutor has presented evidence or the victim has testified concerning such conduct." I mean, at this point I don't think there's –

MR. COX: Well, what's going to happen, Judge, is that, you know, I guess there's – we have to make a decision because, you know, based on the order of the witnesses. Then what's going to happen is they're going to call the SANE nurse or Dr. Vergara to say, well, you know -- Dr. Vergara, she may deviate beyond – may now say, well, now it's not a non-specific finding, now I think it's a specific finding; I disagree with the report here. And now I don't have an opportunity to ask her if she's been sexually active. And they're going to argue that my client inflicted a penetrating injury on Table 1.

MS. KOLLINS: First of all, the doctor is not going to come in here and change her testimony from what is contained within her report. Second of all, this is all cross-examination. Dr. Vergara, there are other explanations for this non-specific finding, is that correct? Can you tell me what they are? They can be a myriad of reasons. They can be something – a piece of clothing that was irritating. They

can be a-it could be from other sexual activity. She may even say that. But what she can say is it's not inconsistent with what's alleged here. So that's all for cross-examination. That doesn't mean we get into this kid's background about being sexually active. And there's certainly nothing in that report that indicates that she was sexually active within an acute period wherein the redness is attributable to other sexual contact or conduct.

MR. COX: Well, Judge, that's up to them to argue.

THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Cox, do you have any authority, though, for what – MR. COX: I'm arguing based on the statutes. My position, Judge, the State has opened the door arguing a penetrating injury. Also, Judge, it's not – you know, we're aware that she did make such a report to the SANE nurse that she had been sexually active. I intend to ask The had been sexually active with her boyfriend, and that's the extent really of what I want to ask. Do I have a specific allegation or incident of multiple liaisons and all? No. Judge, she reported to the SANE nurse that she had been sexually active.

THE COURT: You know, I think if Talenta had gotten up here and said – MR. KOLLINS: I've never had sex before.

THE COURT: Exactly. I think the cases support your position, but I think absent something to that effect I just am not seeing it.

MR. COX: But the problem is is that the jury will be left with that impression that she'd never had sex before because I won't be able to ask the question. That is the problem. They are left with the opinion that, well, there has to be something because she's red and she's never had sex before. I cannot –

MS. KOLLINS: That's -

MR. COX: I cannot ask one question, have you had sex before?

THE COURT: Right, I mean, that's what -

MR. COX: And they're left with the opinion that she is a virgin, and that is not the case.

THE COURT: That's what the Rape Shield Law is, is that we don't go into the prior sexual activities of people in these cases unless there are some very limited exceptions, one of which is when there's some testimony by the victim that – about prior activity, which there wasn't. So –

MR. COX: Which prior activity? I'm sorry?

THE COURT: There wasn't. That's what I'm saying. There wasn't any testimony about that. And the statute really requires that there is something to open the door, which I don't think –

MS. KOLLINS: And again -

MR. COX: I think that interpretation, I would never be allowed to ask – When somebody is alleging a penetrating injury, I'll never be allowed to ask the question.

THE COURT: Well, I mean, Mr. Cox, by your – by your interpretation there frankly would be no Rape Shield Law.

MR. COX: Well, there would, Judge, because I have had cases where they're not claiming there's a penetrating injury, they're not claiming they have specific findings indicating my client obviously sexually assaulted her because, look, his penis caused that mark, okay.

That's what they're claiming here. They're claiming my client did make that mark. And now if I'm precluded from asking that question, that she's been sexually active, the jury will be left with the impression that she is a virgin –

1	THE COURT: Okay. Well –

3	else's penis could have been there. That's the problem.

And she's still scared, she's still upset by it, which is obvious by her reaction that her mom's described. So I mean, it's our position she's still under the influence of the excited event and she should be able to tell her mom what happened.

THE COURT: Mr. Cox?

MR. COX: (Indiscernible) -- conversations. I think it would just be telling the same -- I think it's telling Table a's story again through somebody else.

MS. KOLLINS: I don't believe there's been any conversations because the first disclosure from her is in a text message to a 14-year-old who can do absolutely nothing about it. So then she gets on the phone with her mom, Tyrone tried to hurt me, and she's precluded by her teacher from finishing the events, nor does she want to because I'm sure she's going to stand in her eighth grade class and say my mom's boyfriend put his finger and his penis inside her. She said I couldn't say that there. She's going to wait until she gets a moment of privacy. But it doesn't mean that the trauma or the excitement of the event is concluded.

MR. PANDELIS: Chris Pandelis for the State. If you'll recall Taleacas's testimony, too, there was really no one she could talk to. She didn't want to talk to the police officer, the teacher --

THE COURT: I'm going to allow it, but -

MS. KOLLINS: I'm not going to go over it -- (inaudible).

22	Q	And when you say "we," who are you talking about?

24	Q	And how did you get to the hospital?

1	Α	The officer drove us.
2	Q	A Metro police officer?
3	Α	Yes.
4	Q	In a uniform?
5	Α	Yes.
6	Q	In a patrol car?
7	A	Yes.
8	Q	Okay. And what happened when you got to the hospital?
)	Α	We were waiting for them to examine T
10	Q	Did some other police officers show up?
11	Α	Yes.
12	Q	Not somebody in uniform, somebody in plain clothes?
13	Α	Yes.
14	Q	Okay. And did they talk to Talk there?
15	Α	The CPS lady talked to Talked and Detective Tomaino talked to

17	Q	And you were not present for that conversation?
18	Α	No. I was in the room where they were going to examine her.
19	Q	How long – Which hospital did you go to?
20	А	Sunrise Hospital.
21	Q	How long were you there?
22	Α	Oh, for some hours. I don't remember how long.

4	Q	Is that someplace where - I mean, do you use those type of gloves
5	in your hous	e for anything?
6	Α	Not in my house.
7	Q	Are those gloves that you had seen in your home before?
8	Α	Yes. Tyrone had them – had the gloves.
9	Q	When did he have them before?
10	Α	When he was working at Caesars Palace in December.
11	Q	As part of his job?

13	Q	But those are nothing you purchased and brought into your home?

17	Q	What caused you to be looking under the bed such that you found

19	Α	We were – I went back to the house to get us some clothes and shoes
20	because we	- Tallian a didn't want to stay at the house. So I went to go get our
21	clothes and	everything, and that's when I saw the box.
22	Q	So from the day you left the hospital, did you all stay at your house
23	that night?	
24	A	Yes.

1	Q	When did you first learn that Tales a didn't want to stay at the
2	house?	
3	А	She didn't want to stay there that night.
4	Q	Did you make her?
5	A	We – we were there, yes.
6	Q	Where did she sleep that night?
7	А	In my bed.
8	Q	Is that something she routinely did?
9	A	No.
10	Q	Something that was not routine for her at 15?
11	Α	No.
12	Q	What finally made you make the decision to not make her stay in the
13	house?.	
14	Α	When we got up that morning, because all through the night she
15	wouldn't sle	ep. She was crying.
16	Q	So where did you take her?
17	А	We went to my mother-in-law's house.
18	Q	And your mother-in-law's name is?
19	A	Helen Jones.
20	Q	How long did you stay there?
21	A	We stayed there for a couple of weeks.
22	Q	Okay. Now, when you went back to get some clothes and you said
23	you were lo	oking for some shoes is when you came across these rubber gloves?
24	A	Yes.

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1	Q	Do you remember how many days after May 14th that was?
2	Α	It was probably a week after.
3	Q	And what did you do when you found them?
4	Α	I called Detective Tomaino.

8	Α	Adult.
9	Q	Adult male or female?

11	Q	At that time, was there any other adult male that had access to your

7	Metro Sexua	al Assault detective?
8	Α	Yes, I was.
9	Q	Do you know a Detective Tomaino?
10	Α	Yes, I do.
11	Q	Do you routinely work cases with detectives when it's their case
12	primarily? Y	ou guys help each other out, I guess is the question.
13	Α	Yes, we do.
4	Q	Did you help Detective Tomaino out back in May of 2010 on this
5	case?	
6	Α	Yes, I did.
7	Q	What is the first thing you learned about the case involving T
8	on May 14th	, 2005 (sic)?
9	Α	As far as the first – I don't know what I first learned about it. I can't
20	recall exactly	what I first learned about it.
21	Q	All right. Well, let's try it like this. How did you first come to be
22	involved in it	?
3	Α	The way we have it is we have a primary person each and every day
4	who takes ca	alls for service in regards to priority call outs. He had received a call

12	Q	What was your next involvement in this case?
13	A	My next involvement was to advise the patrol officers to take him down
14	to Clark Coเ	inty Detention Center and to wait for contact with the detective.
15	Q	Okay. Were you asked by Detective Tomaino to go to the residence
16	where this o	ccurred?
17	А	I believe we discussed it and I said that it would be a good idea if
18	I went and n	nade contact at the residence.
19	Q	So the answer to my question is yes, you went to the residence?

21	Q	And what did you do when you got there?
22	А	The number one thing is there had been some time elapsed, so I just

MS. KOLLINS: Okay. I'll pass the witness, Judge.

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CROSS-EXAMINATION

2 BY MR. PAGE:

- Q Officer Hatchett, you testified that Mr. James agreed to come meet with you, correct?
 - A Correct.
 - Q And so he was cooperative?
 - A Yes, he was.
- Q And you also testified that you went around and you started to look in the house for gloves?
- A Not per se the gloves. I was just looking to I hadn't determined nobody had made contact with the house, so I was trying to determine if, A) anybody had even been there, and 2) once I noticed that were numerous children in the household, the scene kind of had been compromised at that time. I did a quick check in the child's room and just kind of made follow-up with the detective to kind of determine where he wanted me to go from there.
- Q When you say nobody had been at the house, wasn't there another officer that went before you?
- A I don't believe so. I believe that the victim was directed to go to Sunrise Hospital and that at that time nobody had been at the residence.
 - Q When you went to the residence, you didn't meet with T
 - A No, I did not.
- Q And when you do a search for Well, let me backtrack. You said that the detective called you and he made mention of gloves?
 - A I don't know if he called me. I knew that I knew gloves were

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somehow involved. I don't recall if that was reported before we even got there or not. I searched the van, so I'm believing – I'm assuming that it was, but I can't be for sure how I was made aware of that.

Q And the family members that were there present, they gave you permission to search the entire house?

A Like I said, I did not search the entire house. It was basically I had gone to the house because nobody had been there. Once I observed that there were numerous children in the household and, you know, nobody in relation to the house there really when this occurred, I just did a real – you know, a little bit of scan of it to see if there was anything just observable, and made contact with the detective to see where I should go from there. I definitely would not call it a search.

MR. PAGE: No further questions.

MS. KOLLINS: No redirect, Judge.

THE COURT: Okay. Anything from the jury? No? Okay.

Sir, you're free to go.

THE WITNESS: And just as a correction I'd like to make real quickly.

THE COURT: There is no question. Sir -

MS. KOLLINS: No. There's no question pending, Detective. I'm sorry, you can't speak.

THE COURT: There is no question in front of you. You're free to go.

THE WITNESS: Okay.

THE COURT: Thank you.

THE WITNESS: All right.

THE COURT: We're going to go ahead and take a break - take a break

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until three o'clock.

During this recess you are admonished not to talk or converse among yourselves or with anyone else on any subject connected with this trial, or read, watch or listen to any report of or commentary on the trial or any person connected with this trial by any medium of information, including without limitation newspapers, television, the Internet and radio, or form or express any opinion on any subject connected with the trial until the case is finally submitted to you.

We'll see you folks back at 3:00. Thank you.

(Court recessed from 2:41:30 p.m. until 2:57:35 p.m.)

(Whereupon the following proceedings were held

outside the presence of the jury)

THE COURT: Which juror, Rick?

THE MARSHAL: I think it's juror number five. The one in the purple.

MS. KOLLINS: Judge, may we approach?

THE COURT: Sure. You're approaching? There's nobody -

MS. KOLLINS: Well, I just -

THE COURT: You just want to get like - up here.

(Bench conference begins)

MS. KOLLINS: All right. Well, that was a train wreck. I don't know. What are you guys looking for?

MR. PAGE: The reason why we're deciding is we're going to have to put it on the record of what was brought up, that Tomaino told him to talk to the guy that has prior felony arrests, and that that came out.

MS. KOLLINS: So you're going to move for a mistrial?

MR. PAGE: So, yeah.

MS. KOLLINS: And I mean, our response is, you know, I cut him off. I don't think it was clear what he was talking about. I obviously could tell where he was going, but I don't think he finished his sentence, so I don't know that it was prejudicial. I think a limiting instruction could cure it. But it's their option whether they want that instruction, as it calls attention to what was said and perhaps, I mean, it wasn't as clear to the jury as it was to the rest of us that routinely play in the sandbox. I mean, he's a seven year cop. Why would I ever think he would do that?

MR. PAGE: I don't doubt that they admonished him, but obviously he had his own –

THE COURT: I understand that. Here's the thing. I think -

MS. KOLLINS: I think the warrant thing probably wasn't clear, because warrant and probable cause to arrest him immediately, I don't think that's clear.

THE COURT: I certainly think that wasn't clear with respect to the other thing, since we've already got a ruling that the prior act is coming in. He said the word felony arrest.

MS. KOLLINS: He was arrested for that.

THE COURT: I don't think that there is enough prejudice to warrant a mistrial at this point. It certainly would have been better if he hadn't said that. So I'm going to deny the motion for a mistrial. You know, the defense did not make a contemporaneous objection. I certainly could have instructed the jury to disregard the comments at the time. I obviously still can offer a limiting instruction if the defense would like that, but that's entirely up to you.

MR. PAGE: The reason no contemporaneous objection was made is we

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didn't want to highlight the fact -

THE COURT: I know. I understand. I mean, obviously that's your -

MS. KOLLINS: That was Dan Page.

MR. PAGE: Oh. Is it we're still on the record? Yeah, that was Dan Page for the Public Defender's Office.

THE COURT: Yeah, I don't know why we're up here. But certainly that's the defense's option. So if you do not want a limiting instruction, I will not give it. The motion for a mistrial obviously is on the record. I'm denying it for those reasons.

Is there anything else with respect to that that you want on the record?

MS. KOLLINS: No. There's one juror that recognizes the other bad acts victim that we might need to –

THE COURT: Right.

MR. COX: What was that?

MS. KOLLINS: One of the jurors recognizes Nationals from school.

MR. COX: Really?

THE COURT: Right. So I'm going to have – Can you bring in that juror?

MS. KOLLINS: So – and I don't know if it's just –

THE COURT: Can you guys move back so we can actually make sure that this is all on the record? And you know what, while we're doing this, I just want to –

THE CLERK: She just can't get it while you guys are up there.

THE COURT: It's a lot easier if you're at your places.

And I just wanted to make a note for the record with respect to my prior ruling on the contents of the police report. The statute is NRS 47.120: "When any part of a writing or recorded statement is introduced by a party, the party may

be required at that time to introduce any other part of it which is relevant, and any party may introduce any other relevant parts." So that was the basis of my ruling to allow the State to introduce other consistent statements in the police report.

MS. KOLLINS: Thank you, Your Honor.

(Bench conference concluded)

(Juror Jennifer Mills enters the courtroom)

THE COURT: Okay. Ms. Mills.

JUROR MILLS: Yes.

THE COURT: Hi, how are you?

JUROR MILLS: I'm fine.

THE COURT: So we understand that you recognized one of the prospective witnesses who was in the hallway, and we just wanted to ask you a couple questions about that.

JUROR MILLS: Sure.

THE COURT: Do you know who the person is, or you just recognize her by sight?

JUROR MILLS: I recognize her by sight. I don't even know what her name is.

THE COURT: Okay. So it's not somebody you've ever had a conversation with?

JUROR MILLS: No.

THE COURT: Is it going to make you feel uncomfortable or like you can't do your job as a juror fairly if that person comes in and testifies as a witness?

JUROR MILLS: No. It's not going to make me – I was more concerned actually for her, if it would make her feel uncomfortable, because I know her

1	teachers.
2	THE COURT: Okay.
3	JUROR MILLS: So it's not going to make – in my job, no.
4	THE COURT: Okay. Are there any questions? State?
5	MS. KOLLINS: As long as she maintains her ability to be fair and won't give
6	any greater weight to that witness' testimony than she would any others, then we're
7	fine with that record, Judge.
8	THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Cox?
9	MR. COX: So if I understand correctly, you just recognize her from school
10	and know who her teachers are?
11	JUROR MILLS: Yeah. Correct.
12	MR. COX: What was the context of knowing who she was?
13	JUROR MILLS: She is in a special program at school for kids that are kind of
14	more college-bound, so she is within a certain group of teachers that they – it's kind
15	of like a school within a school, and that's how I recognize her.
16	MR. COX: Okay, thank you.
17	THE COURT: Okay. Just through your work?
18	JUROR MILLS: Correct.
19	THE COURT: Okay, thank you, ma'am. Thank you. I really appreciate you
20	doing that. That's exactly what you're supposed to do, so I appreciate that.
21	JUROR MILLS: Okay.
22	THE MARSHAL: Do you want me to bring them all in?
23	THE COURT: Just bring them all in.
24	THE MARSHAL: You can stay right there.

(The jury enters the courtroom)

THE COURT: We're back on the record in Case Number C265506, State of Nevada versus Tyrone James. Let the record reflect the presence of all of our jurors, Mr. James with his counsel, the representatives of the D.A.'s Office, and all of the court staff.

MS. KOLLINS: Your Honor, at this time the State would call Dr. Vergara.

DR. THERESA VERGARA

Having been called as a witness and being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

THE COURT: Afternoon, ma'am. Could you please state your name and then spell it first and last for the record.

THE WITNESS: Yes. Dr. Theresa Vergara. T-h-e-r-e-s-a Vergara, V -as in Victor -e-r-g-a-r-a.

THE COURT: Thank you, ma'am.

DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MS. KOLLINS:

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- Q Good afternoon, Dr. Vergara. Thank you for your patience today.

 Ma'am, how are you employed?
- A I'm a full-time attending physician at Sunrise Children's Hospital; the Pediatric Emergency Room.
 - Q How long have you worked at your profession at Sunrise Peds E.R.?
 - A Since 1999.
 - Q And prior to that, where were you working?
- A I was in New York; Mt. Sinai Hospital. Also a full-time attending physician at the Pediatric Emergency Room at Mt. Sinai.

Q And where did you get your education and your residency?

A At – Well, I'm double Boarded in both Pediatric and Pediatric Emergency Medicine. So after medical school in 1986, I did my pediatric residency program at St. Joseph's Hospital in Patterson, New Jersey, followed immediately by a pediatric emergency medicine fellowship at Mt. Sinai Hospital. After completing my training I worked as an attending physician. I stayed on at Mt. Sinai for about seven years until I relocated to Sunrise.

Q And tell me what a pediatric E.R. physician does on a daily basis. What kind of things do you do?

A Well, just like a pediatrician has his office, his or her office to deal with patients and take care of patients' care, my office is the pediatric emergency room, so any emergency that comes in via ambulance or any parent bringing their child in for whatever reason, fever, trauma, needs stitches, that needs medical evaluation and care.

Q Is a component of that practice within the Sunrise Pediatric E.R. to do sexual assault examinations on children?

A Yes. It's what we call a SCAN program. SCAN, S-C-A-N, Suspected Child Abuse and Neglect. It's either physical abuse or sexual abuse.

Q And what particular training do you have that qualifies you to perform a SCAN exam?

A Well, again, after a pediatric residence, you do more training and you specialize and do a pediatric emergency medicine fellowship, which is additional training, and there you do critical care in an emergent basis, as well as trauma, and of course sexual abuse or any abuse, physical abuse, abuse is trauma.

2	Α	They go directly – from triage they go directly into Room 8.
3	Q	Okay. On May 14th of 2010, who accomplished your triage regarding
4	a young lady	by the name of T
5	Α	The triage nurse and a designated nurse for T

8	Q	Do you remember her last name? No?
9	Α	She was the designated – Gosh, no, I don't recall the last name.

16	Q	Is it a full and accurate copy, the same as the District Attorney has

18	Α	It was a copy that was provided to me by our program, yes.
19	MS. F	(OLLINS: Any objection, Mr. Cox?
20	MR. 0	COX: No. No objection.
21	THE	WITNESS: Pamela Douglass.
22	BY MS. KOL	LINS:
23	Q	Now, there are a couple different locations here in Las Vegas where

kids go for sexual assault examinations, is that correct?

1	Α	Correct.
2	Q	Sunrise being one of them?
3	Α	Yes.
4	Q	And the other one being the Child Advocacy Center?
5	А	Yes.
6	Q	Is Sunrise where acute examinations take place –
7	Α	Yes.
8	Q	- generally?
9	А	Yes, generally. Correct.
10	Q	Can you explain the difference to us between an acute examination
11	and an exam	nination that would be routinely scheduled over at the Advocacy Center?
12	А	If a child just happened to disclose, oh, I was abused but it was like
13	six months a	go, there's no – that's not acute, okay. So acute is something that
14	happened, e	specially if we could forensically collect a rape kit, so within - even up
15	to five days.	Three – ideally three days.
16	Q	So ideally seventy-two hours -
17	А	Seventy-two hours. Correct.
18	Q	– is an acute examination. Okay. Now, with regard to ☐ a
19	H arri , wha	at did you know from the triage and going into Room 8, if you will?
20	Α	It was an acute - the event was at 9:00 a.m. and the patient presented
21	around 2:00	p.m. to the emergency room.
22	Q	Okay. And what was the nature of the allegation that constituted the
23	sexual abuse	e and the purpose for the examination?
24	Α	Reportedly she was assaulted by an adult male with vaginal as well as

digital penetration.

Q When you say vaginal penetration, what do you mean?

A I mean penile and – I'm sorry. Penile and digital penetration of her vagina.

Q Okay. Now, tell us just generally what the component parts are of the sexual assault portion of the examination, and then we'll talk specifically about this examination, okay. Generally how does that work?

A Well, just like any patient, a regular emergency room chart gets generated. And then once it's identified as a sexual abuse, then additional paperwork, specifically our SCAN paperwork, another set of paperwork gets — for proper documentation. That SCAN paperwork has more pictures, so that will facilitate the doctor documenting any lesions or any findings — just to help the documentation. So it's additional paperwork because it's an abuse case.

Q Okay. Let me try to ask the question in a different way. You're documenting something with paperwork. What are the activities that are being documented within the paperwork that are a portion of the examination? I mean, what's being documented?

A Well, we do the physical examination, okay, from head to toe, and then specifically focusing on the genitalia.

Q Okay. When a patient – after the paperwork part is accomplished, you mentioned a colposcope, I believe. How and when is that used?

A The colposcope is in Room 8. So the patient – Room 8 has a bed just like a stretcher, just like any other room. The patient gets undressed into a gown, just like any other patient. Sits on the bed. Gets examined head to toe, okay, by

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1	me; by the p	hysician. And then when it's time to do the GYN exam –
2	Q	GYN being gynecological?
3	Α	Gynecological examination. They – again, a lot of this is prepped by
4	the nurses p	rior to the procedure, prior to my arrival, so they know to sort of lay on
5	the bed and	then put their legs in the stirrups to better visualize the genitalia.
6	Q	So you photograph the genitalia with the colposcope, correct?
7	A	Correct.
8	Q	And that's in gynecological stirrups in a prone position. That's the way
9	those exams	s usually go?
10	Α	In a supine position, yes.
11	Q	And then you swab the genitalia, correct?
12	Α	After digital photo documentation of the genitalia, then we proceed
13	with – in this	case like a rape kit or swabbing, yes. Swabbing for collection, yes.
14	Q	So swabbing is part of the rape kit, correct?
15	Α	Correct.
16	Q	And the rape kit comes to you in a sealed condition?
17	Α	Sealed. Yes.
18	Q	And it's a series of swabs for anywhere someone may have touched,
19	right?	
20	Α	Correct.
21	Q	And those are used on a child or an adult, right?
22	Α	Yes.
23	Q	And then you seal them up and put them away after you swab?
24	Α	Correct. To maintain the chain of evidence, correct.

1	Q	Correct. And did you do all that in this case?
2	Α	Yes, with the help of the nurse. Yes.
3	Q	With the assistance of the nurse?
4	Α	Yes.
5	Q	Pamela Douglass, who we already talked about?
6	А	(Shakes head affirmatively).
7	Q	So she filled out your checklist for you of what had transpired, gave
8	you that info	rmation, and then you begin the examination?
9	Α	Correct.
10	Q	Did you perform the same kind of gynecological examination on
11	Темпера Н	s that you just kind of described for us?
12	Α	Yes.
13	Q	Okay. What, if anything, did you see?
14	A	On inspection there was no bruising to the external genitalia. Upon
15	retraction of	the labia majora, which is the large labia, able to see some generalized
16	swelling to ti	he area and the vaginal area, yes.
17	Q	And the labia majora are the outer lips of the female vagina, right?
18	A	Yes. Outer lips.
19	Q	Outer lips of the genitalia. And so when you looked inside you saw
20	generalized	swelling where?
21	Α	To the introitus.
22	Q	What are some of the reasons that – Strike that. That could be
23	caused by a	penetration of some sort, correct?
24	A	Generalized swelling from trauma, yes.

1	Q	From trauma; trauma being penetration?
2	Α	Yes.
3	Q	Something being inserted?
4	Α	Yes.
5	Q	Something being rubbed?
6	Α	Yes.
7	Q	Okay. It could also be consistent with other things?
8	А	Yes.
9	· Q	But not inconsistent with the reason the patient was reporting,
10	correct?	
11	Α	Correct. It's consistent with the – with her chief complaint of being
12	sexually ass	aulted. Yes.
13	Q	Consistent with her chief complaint of being digitally penetrated and
14	having her v	agina penetrated by a penis?
15	А	Yes.
16	Q	Okay. Or rubbed on by a penis?
17	A	Yes.
18	MS. k	(OLLINS: Indulge me for one minute, Doctor.
19	BY MS. KOL	LINS:
20	Q	Did you notice any bruising? And I'm not talking about the genitalia,
21	I'm just talkir	ng about overall on her body.
22	А	No. There was no bruising.
23	Q	Nothing that had developed yet?
24	Α	No.

1	Q	Okay. Did you know whether or not rubber gloves were used during
2	the assault?	
3	Α	That was – It was reported.
4	Q	I mean, in terms of going into the examination, of course you weren't
5	there so you	don't know, so that was a bad question. But did you know that was

8	Q	Could some of that swelling be caused by contact with latex?
9	Α	Well, just the friction of rubber and a moist area, correct. Yes.
10	Q	The child's hymen was intact?
l 1	Α	There was no local redness or bleeding to the hymen, correct.
12	Q	And would you expect to see bleeding?
13	Α	If it was just rubbing or just – it depends on the severity of the
14	penetration.	
15	Q	Well, the female introitus and the vagina are designed to take things
16	in and stretc	h, correct?
17	Α	Yes.
18	Q	So every time you put something in a vagina, you don't necessarily
19	tear a hymer	n or cause bleeding or anything like that?
20	Α	Just like if a female uses tampons and inserts the tampon.
21	Q	So based on what you knew, was it any surprise to you that there was
22	no tears or b	eleeding or anything like that?
23	Α	That's no surprise at all.
24	Q	Okay. Now, of course there's no - Strike that. You did see swelling.

1	Did you see	any other injuries, or any other sign of trauma, if you will?
2	Α	She was just – she complained of soreness to her lower – to her legs.
3	Q	How was she emotionally during the exam? If you remember.
4	Α	I just remember she was cooperative.
5	Q	Cooperative?
6	Α	Yes.
7	MS. H	(OLLINS: I will pass the witness, Judge.
8	THE COURT: Mr. Cox?	
9	MR. 0	COX: Thank you, Judge.
10		CROSS-EXAMINATION
11	BY MR. COX:	
12	Q	Good afternoon, Doctor.
13	Α	Hello.
14	Q	Sunrise Hospital is a great place, isn't it? Great people were born
15	there, werer	n't they?
16	Α	(No response).
17	Q	Now, did you have an opportunity to make a report regarding what the
18	findings wer	e regarding the redness or – was it redness or swelling?
19	Α	Swelling. Yes, the SCAN paperwork, that portion.
20	Q	I'm just going to grab it real quick. Now, when you go to document
21	the paperwork, you have the option of putting what you find in several different	
22	categories, i	s that correct? Do you have your report with you?
23	Α	Yes. I'm flipping through it right now.
24	Q	Okay. I'll refer Court, counsel and the witness to the portion where it's

1	A Yes.
2	Q And this category, if I read the label correctly: These findings may
3	occur in sexually abused children but may be from other causes. Correct?
4	A Correct.
5	Q Okay. Now, there's two other categories as well. Well, actually three.
6	The second one is: Concern for abuse or trauma. In that category, if I'm correct:
7	These findings have been noted in children with documented sexual abuse or are
8	consistent with though not conclusive of sexual abuse. Is that correct?
9	A Yes.
10	Q Okay. So that would be a finding that is very consistent with sexual
11	abuse but it's not conclusive, even unto itself?
12	MS. KOLLINS: Objection as to the characterization of very consistent.
13	MR. COX: I'll tell you what, Judge –
14	THE COURT: Mr. Cox, could you just rephrase the question. I'm sorry,
15	I didn't really even quite –
16	MR. COX: I'll strike the question. I'm sure it was a poor one.
17	THE COURT: I'm just having a hard time following it.
18	BY MR. COX:
19	Q Doctor, what type of finding is that? What type of findings would fit
20	in that category?
21	A Well, let's just say for example a female happens to fall down and
22	straddle an edge or an object, accidentally fall and sustain some bruises. So,
23	yes, there's bruises. There could be bleeding. But there is a story that the child
24	accidentally fell and sat on a pointed toy or an object and sustained the bruising

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1	Q	Okay. We have another section for: These findings have been noted
2	in children w	rith documented sexual abuse. But you didn't check that category,
3	correct?	
4	Α	Because the injuries were not that severe. Correct.
5	Q	Okay. But you didn't check – you didn't put it in that category?
6	А	Correct.
7	Q	You put it in the category where these findings may occur there, but
8	they're also	from other causes?
9	Α	Because the findings were consistent with non-specific – it was a
10	non-specific	finding; swelling.
11	Q	Right. Okay. Now, what can cause swelling or redness to introitus,
12	it's basically	the opening to the vagina, other than sexual abuse?
13	Α	A urinary tract infection.
14	Q	Okay, that's one. Now, in this case did we find urinary tract infection?
15	Α	Yes, we did.
16	Q	We did. Okay. Now, there's also something - Now, Doctor, you have
17	to forgive m	e, I'm just an attorney and I don't pronounce medical things very well,
18	so please bear with me. Strep agala–	
19	A	It's a bacteria.
20	MS. I	KOLLINS: Judge, I'm going to ask that we approach.
21	MR.	COX: Sure.
22	THE	COURT: Sure.
23	·	(Bench conference begins)
24	MS. I	KOLLINS: Are you going into (indiscernible).

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1	MR. COX: That's not a (indiscernible).

18	THE COURT: Okay.
19	MR. COX: This is Bryan Cox for the record. I'm not alleging STD.
20	THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead, Mr. Cox.
21	(Bench conference concluded)
22	BY MR. COX:
23	Q Doctor, rescue me here. Strep agalactiae.
24	A That's pretty good.

1	Q	What is it?
2	Α	It's a bacteria. Strep. Yeah.
3	Q	Now, is this something that can cause swelling or redness to the
4	introitus or t	he opening of the vagina?
5	Α	Well, we have bacteria all over in our body. And I happened to swab it
6	and it grew	- that particular swab in the medium that it was placed in grew strep.
7	Q	Okay. So that was present in Taxable Harmon vagina?
8	Α	Yes. And it can be in the normal flora of any vaginal area, yes.

17	Q	Okay. Now was Strep – I'm just going to call it Strep Group B –
18	A	Correct.
19	Q	- that's something that can cause redness at the introitus, which is the
20	opening of	the vagina?
21	A	Infection. Yes.
22	Q	And it was present – When you sent it to the lab, this came back as
23	being prese	ent with Terror a History
24	Α	Well, I only swabbed. It goes to the laboratory and it grows after like

1	three days after the fact.	
2	Q	Did you review the results on that?
3	Α	I was told, yes, it was positive.
4	Q	Positive. So she did have this condition that causes swelling at introitus
5	or the open	ing of the vagina?
6	Α	Well, I knew that just the other day.
7	Q	Okay. So that – so in this case we have two – you documented two
8	causes that	had nothing to do with sexual assault that would cause redness at
9	introitus or t	he opening of the vagina?
10	Α	At the time of the exam I only documented one –
11	Q	Okay. Well –
12	Α	- the urinary tract infection. And I collected cultures.
13	Q	And so – okay. And then later on when you got the lab results, you
14	realized the	re was a second cause, a second thing that could cause the same thing?
15	А	The chart – yes. The medical records indicated that it grew.
16	Q	Okay. Thank you very much.
17	MR.	COX: I'll pass the witness.
18	THE	COURT: Okay. Ms. Kollins?
19	,	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
20	BY MS. KO	LLINS:
21	Q	Notwithstanding that, the redness to the introitus was still consistent
22	with the his	tory, correct?
23	А	Yes.
24	Q	Okay. Mr. Cox went through a couple pages of your report with you, or

1	a page, and what your available options are when you're documenting sexual assault
2	cases?
3	A Yes.
4	Q When you document these cases, do you document them keeping in
5	mind the history, what you've been told happened, as well as what you physically
6	observe?
7	A It's actually what the physical – medical exam findings. So it's the
8	physical findings.
9	Q Right. But like in the other category where there's a concern for abuse
10	or trauma and there's an inconsistent history, you don't attribute it to sexual abuse
11	because you haven't got that history. Do you see what I'm –
12	A Yes, yes. It requires a history and the examination.
13	MS. KOLLINS: Judge, I'm going to ask the Court for permission just to put
14	this page up that Mr. Cox went through. I think it's easier if we can see it rather
15	than –
16	THE COURT: Any objection to that, Mr. Cox?
17	MR. COX: No objection. No objection.
18	THE COURT: That's fine.
19	BY MS. KOLLINS:
20	Q Is that too small to read over there? I'm going to do it line by line.
21	Can you see that on your screen, Doctor? I'm sure you have the same one.
22	A Yes, yes.
23	Q Let me move it up. You come to your ultimate conclusion at the end
24	of an examination. You can never conclusively say that there is sexual abuse.

1	You can sa	y that there's trauma, but you can never say that it's the product of
2	sexual abus	se. Correct?
3	Α	It's only suspected. Yes.
4	Q	Okay. So category number one, a normal exam. Normal hymenal
5	tissue. And	we're just talking about a female right now. The lack of physical
6	examinatio	n findings, that does not preclude a conclusion that a child was sexually
7	abused, do	es it?
8	А	Correct.
9	Q	You can have an absolutely unmarked opening and you could still
10	have sexua	ll abuse; right?
11	А	Correct.
12	Q	Okay. And does that have something to do with the healing properties
13	of the genit	alia in general? I mean, you could have sexual abuse six months ago
14	and see no	thing today; right?
15	А	Correct.
16	Q	The vagina opening has a lot of healing properties, the same as the
17	inside of yo	our mouth; right?
18	А	Correct.
19	Q	It's a mucus membrane and it heals very quickly?
20	А	Correct. And it also depends on the severe of trauma. If someone
21	has a five-y	ear-old and an adult decides to lick and kiss and protrude – stick their
22	tongue, the	adult tongue into the five-year-old, the child's vaginal area, what
23	evidence w	ould you see from that?
24	Q	Right.

A What evidence – When I did my examination where I retracted the labia, sustained in that – while I photo documented the examination, I guess it was a little red because I kind of pinched it open for exposure. And then an hour from now if someone asks me did the doctor touch you, well, of course I touched my patient during the examination of the genitalia, but there would be no evidence of what I just did to that patient.

- Q So it depends on the nature of the abuse?
- A And the severity of the trauma. Correct.
- Q And the severity of the trauma.
- A The contact. Yes.
- Q And despite any of these findings that you went through with Mr. Cox, it still doesn't preclude the fact that a child could have been sexually abused; right?
 - A Correct.
 - Q I mean, in any of these categories?
 - A Correct.
- Q Okay. So when we talk about the non-specific findings, which could be swelling, which is what you saw here of the introitus; erythema, which is what?
 - A Erythema. Redness.
 - Q Okay. Labial adhesion, which is?
- A Well, because of the constant friction it could actually cause sort of secretions and it sort of adheres some tissue. The mucus membranes kind of get stuck together.
- Q And while those are non-specific, they could be attributable to sexual abuse or another explanation; right?

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1	Α	Correct.
2	Q	But in this case consistent with the history that you received?
3	Α	Yes.
4	Q	Despite the fact that there was a diagnosis of UTI, urinary tract
5	infection?	
6	Α	Correct.
7	Q	Okay. Now again, we're talking about levels of trauma and levels of
8	contact, righ	t, when we go through these categories. When you get down to the
9	specific phys	sical findings that are present, those are some pretty horrific acute
10	physical find	lings, are they not, in that category?
11	A	Yes.
12	Q	Okay. And we're talking about things like transected hymens, which
13	means you l	have a tear from the edge of the hymen to the base of the hymen; right?
14	Things like t	hat. Active bleeding.
15	А	Correct. Sometimes that needs to go to the O.R. for repair.
16	Q	Okay. And again, even if those – those injuries could be present for
17	reasons oth	er than sexual abuse?
18	Α	Yes. If you –
19	Q	Even if you found that category?
20	Α	Yes.
21	Q	Even if you found a specific finding, there could be an alternate
22	explanation	?
23	Α	Yes.
24	Q	So the point being, you can - despite what the level of injury, there is

1	no way to co	onclusively testify there was sexual abuse – ever. Right?
2	Α	Correct.
3	Q	Okay. And there's another page of your report that Mr. Cox I don't
4	believe spok	e about on cross-examination where you draw conclusions about
5	abuse. And	I believe that would be your page 4 of 4.
6	Α	Correct.
7	Q	Did you come to a conclusion on page 4 of 4?
8	Α,	Yes. Page 4 of 4 has the overall impression.
9	Q	And what goes into that overall impression? Before you give us that
10	conclusion.	
11	Α	The overall is based on the history and the physical examination.
12	Q	And what was your overall conclusion in this case?
13	Α	That it was probable abuse.
14	Q	And why is that?
15	Α	Because the child has given a spontaneous, clear, detailed description
16	of the events	S
17	Q	To a neutral fact-finder?
18	Α	Correct.
19	Q	And who was the neutral fact-finder in this case?

MR. COX: Judge, I asked if she was aware as to whether or not any of those 1 2 collections were for that purpose. I think she is in a position to answer that question. 3 MS. KOLLINS: Objection. The same objection. Whether some in this case, 4 some in any case ever? That's speculative. She doesn't know. 5 MR. COX: Maybe I can lay a foundation, Judge. THE COURT: Okay. 6 7 BY MR. COX: 8 Q Okay. is it a uniform kit that you use with these examinations? 9 Α Yes, it's a standard kit. 10. Q Okay. And when you're doing the collection, is there any markings or 11 indication of whether or not anything is being collected for purposes of DNA? 12 Α What specific envelopes? No, I don't know. 13 Q You don't know? Α No. 14 15 Q So it goes in – you do these swabs – 16 Α It has like seven – there's like seven envelopes with the instructions, 17 swab here, swab here. And I swab, we collect, and then it gets sealed and then 18 the police picks up the -- picks up the box and they deal with it forensically. 19 Q In what way would they deal with it forensically? Are you aware? 20 Α Like, we don't – like for example, that Strep – 21 Q Okay. Α - our lab, Sunrise labs grew that.
