THE COURT: This is case number CR17-0636, the State of Nevada versus Osbaldo Chaparro. Mr. Chaparro is present with his attorneys. I show the appearance of the attorneys for the State. I show the appearance of the jury and the alternates. Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. Thank you for being here.

Let me turn to my colleagues from the State and ask would you like to offer opening argument.

MS. NORTHINGTON: Yes, your Honor.

THE COURT: Go ahead.

MS. NORTHINGTON: Good morning. Who are they going to believe, me or you? Those are the words that the defendant, Mr. Chaparro, said to Lindsey when she threatened to call 911. Who are they going to believe, me or you? These are the words that he said as he sexually assaulted her in the early morning hours of December 17th of 2016.

On Friday, December 16th is the night before,
Lindsey and her friends, Natasha and Ashley, rented a room at
the Harrah's in downtown Reno. They did so because they
wanted a fun night out in downtown Reno. Lindsey was home
for Christmas break. She was in law school. She's from Reno

and came home to hang out with her hometown friends over Christmas break.

They go out. They start at the Eldorado and the Brew Brothers and they go to the Golden Flower for Thai food. Prior to getting Thai food, Ashley calls it a night, and goes back to the hotel in Harrah's and falls asleep. Natasha and Lindsey, they go and get Thai food and they make their way back to the Eldorado.

They're outside of Brew Brothers inside in the Eldorado at the slot machines by the entrance. At a little after 3:00 a.m. in the morning on December 17th, 2019, Brew Brothers was closing and there was a bunch of people leaving. Lindsey decided to go call it a night. So she left Natasha by the slot machines and she walked back to the Harrah's hotel room.

She left the area, she walked through the Eldorado past the fountain, past the buffet and out the doors on to Virginia Street. She walked south on Virginia Street towards the Harrah's and she crossed Virginia Street under the Reno arch and began walking down the covered breezeway outside of Harrah's.

What Lindsey didn't know was she was being followed. You see, sometime earlier in the night, the defendant noticed Lindsey. Video surveillance shows him

hanging out by the slot machines outside of Brew Brothers watching Lindsey. And surveillance video shows Lindsey walk off by herself, vulnerable.

The video shows Mr. Chaparro following her through the Eldorado, past the fountain, past the buffet, down the escalators and out the doors on to Virginia Street. He then follows her south on Virginia Street, follows her across the crosswalk under the Reno arch and under that breezeway outside of Harrah's.

Lindsey did not know she was being followed until he stepped in front of her and stopped her from walking. He gets in front of her and he cuts her off. Lindsey tries to step to the side, and at that point, he reaches out and he wraps one arm around her waist and the other one around and grabs her butt.

Lindsey starts struggling and she starts screaming, no, no, stop. The defendant takes that opportunity and he gets his hand under her dress and he shoves it violently in between her legs, penetrating her vagina with his fingers. Lindsey is screaming. You see her instantly go still as soon as that penetration occurs and then she starts struggling again to get away.

She threatens to call 911 and at that point the defendant leans over and whispers into her ear, do it. Who

are they going to believe, me or you? That's all on video surveillance.

And not only is it on video surveillance, but
Lindsey's friend Natasha saw the struggle. When Lindsey left
Natasha outside the Brew Brothers, Natasha left soon
thereafter as well and she was walking down Virginia Street
and she was crossing Virginia Street under the Reno arch when
she saw Lindsey in a physical struggle with the stranger. So
Natasha begins running and screaming, no, no, no.

As Natasha is running up and after Lindsey threatens to call 911 and he taunts her about calling 911, he lets go. He turns around and he puts that hand in his pocket and he walks right by Natasha, right by the video camera, smiling.

Lindsey is a mess. She's distraught. She's hysterical. She turns and she hurries into the Harrah's.

Doesn't wait for Natasha. She wants to get inside. She starts scrambling around Harrah's. She's lost. She can't find the elevator to get up to her room. She wants to get to Ashley who is in her room.

She goes up to a security guard and she's about to speak to that security guard when Natasha finds her and Natasha and Lindsey go upstairs, they wake up Ashley and then the three of them go to the security office of the Harrah's

and report the assault and 911 is called.

Meanwhile, the defendant walks by to the Eldorado, hand still in his pocket. He goes in the bathroom by the buffet for about 90 seconds and then goes back to gambling and hanging out with his buddies.

During this trial, you're going to hear from
Lindsey and Natasha and Ashley. You're going to see the
video surveillance. You're going to hear from Debbie
Robison, who is a sexual assault examiner. She's a forensic
nurse.

You're going to hear from Debbie that Lindsey underwent an exam two hours later and injuries were found.

You're going to hear from Lindsey that she was sore for days and it hurt when she urinated, it stung because of the cuts.

You're going to hear from a criminalist from the Washoe County Crime Lab and he's going to testify that DNA was tested in this case, but that the results were inconclusive. And he's going to say that that's not surprising whatsoever. And the reason for that is because of the brief nature of the encounter and simply the nature of the factors that were at play.

You're going to hear from a woman named Pamala, and what Pamala is going to tell in is that in 2011, this man did something shockingly similar to her. In January of 2011,

Pamala was at the Nugget HR department applying for a job.

After interviewing for a job, she goes out to her car to leave and the defendant approaches her under the guise of asking for directions. And as soon as he realizes that no one else is in that parking lot, his demeanor changes and he attacks her.

He shoved Pamala face first into the front seat of her car. Her torso is across the driver's seat, the center console and the passenger seat of her car. Her purse goes flying on to the floorboard of the passenger side. Her feet and legs are still outside of the vehicle. And he climbs on top of her. He's grinding his pelvis into her butt and he reaches his hand down into her shirt and bra causing scratches and abrasions all over her breasts and chest.

Pamala is going to testify that she was screaming and making such a scene that only after a few minutes he got scared and ran off. Pamala is also going to testify that because of what he did to her on January 17th of 2011, he was convicted of battery with intent to commit sexual assault.

We are here today for what he did in 2016 to Lindsey. We are here today for what he did in the early morning hours of December 17th of 2016 to Lindsey outside of Harrah's.

Because of his conduct, he's charged with three

crimes, sexual assault, battery with intent to commit sexual assault, and open or gross lewdness. At the end of this trial, we are going to stand here on behalf of the State of Nevada and ask you to hold the defendant accountable for what he did to Lindsey and find him guilty. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you.

MR. FUSS: We'll be presenting an opening argument. May I approach to get the podium?

THE COURT: You certainly may.

MR. FUSS: Thank you, your Honor. Ladies and gentlemen, this case is about one day and one event that took place on December 17th, 2016 involving Mr. Chaparro and the complaining witness.

Don't be distracted from your jobs as a juror.

You indicated to us in voir dire, you indicated that you
would focus on the facts of this case and this case alone.

They talked about the video, everything that happened is on video and a 30 second video, and that clip will show you exactly what happened in that contact.

I would like you, if you will, to have laser focus in this case, focusing on the video, the DNA evidence in this case, listen to the testimony of the SART exam and our expert, Ms. Claire Nelli, another what they say SANE examiner, who is from California, they use a different term,

but they do the same thing.

What Mr. Chaparro did that night was lewd, crude and boarish behavior. He was more than just locker room talk, water cooler talk, talk between boys on an elevator. He put his hands on her without her permission in a very public, well-lit area with witnesses around.

You will see a video, as the State mentioned, that shows that this happened in less than 30 seconds between Mr. Chaparro and the complaining witness.

Video is like instant replay. We talked about that in voir dire. We talked about the ability to be a witness. That video, the DNA evidence will be your instant replay. We have instant replay in baseball, football, basketball and tennis and you get it in this case. Tennis is video. Instant replay in my opinion is the best way to determine is the ball in or out. If you've ever watched a tennis match, they show you the computer replay and it will show you whether the ball touched the line or didn't, in or out.

There will be no objective evidence presented by the State that indicates that Mr. Chaparro put his hands inside the complaining witness' tights. There will be no evidence that he -- that his hand touched her genital area, penetrated her vagina or her vulva.

The video won't show it, the DNA evidence won't confirm it. The only accusations that support those claims are memories of the complaining witness. And we talked about that in voir dire. We talked about what were things that you would expect reactions from a victim, the reactions of how we remember or misremember things. Memories that are not supported by the video or the DNA evidence, memories that are blurred by alcohol, fueled by anger and shaken by fear, inconsistent with the video and some unsupported by the video, accusations that have grown over time.

It's been a long time since this event took place, and you'll hear very different statements from the beginning to the end. Memories grow.

I'm asking you, again, laser focus, the events on December 17th, 2016, why you are here. Mr. Chaparro, again, crossed line on that night on December 17th, 2016. The behavior was lewd, boarish and crude. But we're going to ask you find him guilty of Count Three, the open and gross lewdness.

The objective evidence will not support a count that he sexually assaulted her by digitally penetrating her with his fingers.

Also, Count Two won't be supported, because it also alleges that he attempted to digitally penetrate her

1	with his fingers under the tights. The video won't support
2	it and the DNA evidence won't support it. I thank you for
3	your time. And I thank you for your ability to listen and
4	focus on the evidence. Thank you.

Just quickly, counsel, anything outside the presence of the jury? First, Mr. Lee on behalf of the State?

MR. LEE: Nothing from the State.

THE COURT: Mr. Fuss or Ms. Bertschy?

MS. BERTSCHY: No, your Honor.

THE COURT: Sorry, Mr. Fuss.

MR. FUSS: Not related to her testimony. Would the Court or the State be interested in a limiting instruction regarding the DNA findings by Gresko to be read to the jury at the time just before Mr. Gresko testifies as to not to speculate or draw any conclusions from that?

THE COURT: Well, I have no interest in a limiting instruction, but I certainly welcome suggestions from counsel about limiting instructions. I also want you to consider whether you want me to give a limiting instruction regarding Mr. Chaparro's conviction for battery with intent to commit sexual assault. I suspect that evidence will come relatively quickly and I want you to consider that.

If you have a limiting instruction you want me to give, I suggest that you type it out, put it in printed form and share it with counsel and me.

MR. FUSS: Would you prefer it to be on a pleading paper?

THE COURT: It doesn't have to be quite so formal as pleading paper, but it's best if we're going to discuss the language of a limiting instruction that we all have it, have an opportunity to read it and consider it.

MR. FUSS: I appreciate it. Thank you.

MR. LEE: Judge, I misspoke, I do have one thing. The defense in their opening suggested to the jury that they should find Mr. Chaparro guilty of Count Three. I would ask if the Court would be willing to ask the defense to make a record as that. Is that a strategy that they planned with Mr. Chaparro and is it with his consent that they're asking the jury to find him guilty of that count?

THE COURT: Ms. Bertschy. 1 MS. BERTSCHY: Thank you, your Honor. According 2 to Hernandez, we don't have to go through that inquiry any 3 further, however, if the Court would like us to. 4 THE COURT: I'm not interested in any way risking 5 invading the attorney-client privilege. I don't believe a 6 specific inquiry is necessary given the caselaw as I 7 understand it. I'm happy to be corrected if you think 8 there's something newer than the case just offered. 9 MR. LEE: No, thank you. 10 THE COURT: I'll see you all at 1:30. 11 (A short break was taken.) 12 THE COURT: This is case CR17-0636, State of 13 Nevada versus Osbaldo Chaparro. Mr. Chaparro is present with 14 his attorney. I show the appearance of the State. I show 15 the appearance of the jurors and the alternates. We're in 16 the middle of the examination of Lindsey. recess, it is your duty not to converse among yourselves or with anyone else connected with this trial or to read, watch or listen to any report of or commentary on the trial by any person connected with the trial or by any medium of information, including, without limitation, newspaper, television, radio, Internet or smart phones. You're not to form or express an opinion on any matter connected with this case until it is finally submitted to you after the presentation of evidence and arguments of counsel are concluded. We'll be in recess until 3:15, ladies and gentlemen.

(The following proceedings were had outside the presence of the jury.)

THE COURT: This continues to be case number CR17-0636, the State of Nevada versus Osbaldo Chaparro. Mr. Chaparro is present as are both of his attorneys and the attorneys for the State.

I'd like to place into the record the colloquy that occurred related to the objections and/or use of Exhibit 45. As I understand it, Exhibit 45 is a zip drive that contains an audio recording and/or video recording, I don't really know, of the interview of the complaining witness in this case. Is that accurate, Ms. Bertschy?

MS. BERTSCHY: That is correct, your Honor. Just

for the record, it's the interview at the police station with Detective Autrey.

THE COURT: All right. And you sought to utilize that, as I understood it, to seek to refresh the recollection of Lindsey, correct?

MS. BERTSCHY: Your Honor, I believe that's where there's some disagreement. I believe that initially Lindsey had -- and I was using it for the purpose of impeachment, because initially Lindsey had said she wouldn't have said that she didn't say that. Then she said, I don't remember saying that. So my purposes was for impeachment, because she said she didn't remember the discussion, so it would need to be used for refreshment.

THE COURT: Well, the juncture at which you sought to use it was you indicating you -- you had asked the question, would hearing the interview refresh your recollection? You would agree with me about that?

MS. BERTSCHY: Yes, your Honor.

THE COURT: So you sought to use it to refresh her recollection. Whether you at some other time considered using it for impeachment or not, the record will reveal, I believe, that you sought to use it to refresh her recollection. Do you agree?

MS. BERTSCHY: Your Honor, I agree. I would note

that I -- yes, your Honor, I would agree.

THE COURT: All right. I asked you to approach, interrupted you, we approached and had a colloquy. The colloquy went to the effect of, judge, I want to use it. I understood your communication to me to be, I want to use it to refresh her recollection. To which I said, that's fine, the jury can't hear it. If you have a transcript of it, you could use the transcript. To which you said, there is no transcript.

I would simply offer to you, I don't mean this in an argumentative way, but that's not my issue that there is no transcript. That doesn't make it more admissible. And so I indicated to you, then, what I indicate now, which is you can't ring the bell with the jury of an unadmitted exhibit whether it's to refresh recollection or otherwise.

I appreciate that you had a challenge in that you don't have a transcript available and/or you have not had the opportunity to have her listen to it with you so she could authenticate it for the purposes of admitting it.

But I just want the record to reflect, again, my ruling is, no one can, as it were, ring the bell with a piece of evidence, sort of like showing the jury a picture before it's admitted, and that's why I would not let you use that to have her listen to it in the presence of the jury if that

makes any sense. I don't know if there's any other record you want to make about it.

MS. BERTSCHY: Your Honor, that is correct. I had just requested to be able to excuse the jury in order to --

THE COURT: I don't recall that occurring. I don't recall you saying to me, I want to excuse the jury. I'm sorry. We may have a different recollection about it. But I have no recollection of you saying, I want to have the opportunity to do it outside the presence of the jury. Is there any other record you want to make?

MS. BERTSCHY: Your Honor, I just want to be clear that my purpose was for impeachment. I know we had the discussion now to be used for recollection based on my last statement to this Court that it was for the purpose of refreshment.

THE COURT: Well, I don't recall you ever saying you wanted to impeach her with it. I could be wrong. I sometimes miss things that are said. Sometimes we think things in our head and don't say them. So I'm not accusing anybody of any misconduct.

To be clear, as I understand it, you just confirmed when you -- when we had the colloquy at the bench, your indication to me was you wanted to refresh her recollection with it.

Counsel, let me offer to all of you, because a similar confusion, I think, happened for Mr. Lee. This area of what is hearsay and how can hearsay be used for impeachment is a complicated one, I think we can agree. This exhibit may be admissible or not for a prior consistent statement, prior inconsistent statement, impeachment or otherwise.

At the point at which you approached, you said you wanted to refresh her recollection with it. Let's be clear, I heard nothing of a hearing outside the presence of the jury or to use it as impeachment. I'll let you make whatever record you want.

MS. BERTSCHY: Your Honor, I believe we made the record of what had occurred.

THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Lee, do you want to be heard on this issue?

MR. LEE: No, thank you.

THE COURT: All right. Is there anything else we need to discuss outside the presence of the jury in your opinion on behalf of the State?

MR. LEE: No, your Honor.

THE COURT: Mr. Fuss, on behalf of the defense?

MR. FUSS: Your Honor, prior to the lunch break,

you asked me, perhaps, to prepare a limiting instruction

regarding the prior bad act that has been admitted -- been ruled on by the Court. Having reviewed it with Mr. Petty, who is our appellate deputy, and recalling the order in the record that it's coming in for propensity, I don't -- I can't -- we couldn't figure out a way to limit it.

Now, I don't know if the question was to invite whether or not you would reconsider its relevance and whether at this juncture in the trial is it more prejudicial than probative based on the fact that we have admitted to the jury that he is going to -- that he's admitting to Count Three in this case.

But other than that, I have nothing to provide.

If the Court can give me some other guidance, I'll keep looking. I'll beat the bushes.

THE COURT: Well, let us set the stage for our conversation in this way: I believe it's Allen is the case in which the Supreme Court, correct me if you all remember a different name, indicated that prior incidents of sexual misconduct are admissible in subsequent cases alleging sexual misconduct, because sexual misconduct in the words of the Supreme Court is so unusual or out of the ordinary that proof of intent is difficult. And because proof of intent is difficult, propensity evidence which would otherwise be squarely inadmissible as prior bad act or prior character

evidence, so-called, is admissible.

The context in which this issue has been discussed in this trial is that you wanted to bring it up during voir dire and I wouldn't let you.

MR. FUSS: Understood.

THE COURT: And you made a comment about it, Ms.

Bertschy did, during opening statement -- whoever made the opening statement. I apologize.

MR. FUSS: I did for the record, your Honor.

THE COURT: Thank you. And so the cat is out of the bag, as it were. If you desired it, I would consider a limiting instruction. To my eye, it's much like whether or not I give the limiting instruction about whether or not Mr. Chaparro testifies. I think it's a defense — an appropriate tactical choice to decide you want me to underline and bold it for the jury or not. And I am not going to underline and bold propensity evidence for the jury unless you ask me to.

I believe I could give them an instruction to the effect of, ladies and gentlemen, at the point at which the evidence comes in, I think there's been a suggestion that the prior victim will testify and that she will then testify that there was a conviction in this case. So if I'm accurate about when that is going to come in, if it were to come in at that juncture, I could consider giving the jury an

instruction to the effect of:

Ladies and gentlemen, this evidence is not available for you to use to decide that Mr. Chaparro is a bad man. He is not on trial for the incident that occurred in 2011. He is on trial for an incident that is alleged to have occurred in 2017. The sole purpose for which you can use this evidence is to determine Mr. Chaparro's intent in 2017 and whether or not there was a common scheme or plan or common intent in the prior incident that would illustrate to you his intent in 2017.

I would consider an instruction to that effect, but I would offer to you that I think it's a two-edge sword in the way you and Mr. Petty may have discussed it. Again, I'm underlining and bolding this thing that is a new area of the law, to my eye, in Nevada and it's powerfully negative evidence against the defendant.

MR. FUSS: At this point, I believe if we offered the instruction, we would offer it as part of the jury instructions.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. FUSS: So I will supplement that. If I could request from the reporter if she could give me a copy just of your soliloquy?

THE COURT: What I just said.

1 MR. FUSS: Thank you. 2 THE COURT: I'll ask,

THE COURT: I'll ask, Ms. Koetting, if you could with whatever alacrity you may give it, Ms. Koetting, prepare a section of the record just as Mr. Fuss requested, because I'm not sure I could repeat it again.

MR. LEE: Simply if they wish to do it at jury instruction time or before, we're in favor of either one. I think a limiting instruction is appropriate. We'll just work with the defense on that.

THE COURT: I appreciate that. You had mentioned a limiting instruction on another topic. Since we're on the topic of limiting instructions, have you considered that?

MR. FUSS: We have, and if I do, it will, again, come in during jury instructions. We'll provide it then.

But at this point and prior to any testimony, I don't anticipate providing that.

THE COURT: Okay. Fair enough. Are there any other matters we need to discuss? I'll see you at 3:15.

(A short break was taken.)

24	Q. And, Ms. Robison, what is your occupation?

A. I'm a sexual assault nurse examiner.

- Q. And how long have you been a sexual assault nurse examiner?
- A. Well, I have been a sexual assault nurse examiner since 1999. However, prior to that, I worked in the emergency during that time and before that I worked in the emergency department at various hospitals. And until sexual assault nursing became its own discipline, we did exams in the emergency room. And so even though I had been an examiner for 20 almost 20 years, I have actually been working with sexual assault patients for the 39 years I've been nursing.
- Q. Could you please just describe the education and training you have that allows you to be a nurse?
- A. So I went to work nursing school, graduated in 1980, passed the NCLEX, which is the state board of nursing test. And then, again, I've been a nurse for 39 years, maintained my certification, of course, with continuing education.
 - Q. And what nursing degrees do you have?
- A. I graduated with that a two-year degree and then just a couple of years ago I graduated with my bachelors in science in nursing.
 - O. What credentials or certifications do you

- 1 | currently hold?
- A. So I am a certified sexual assault examiner,
- 3 | adult, adolescent. I'm a sexual assault examiner pediatric.
- 4 I received certification as a forensic nurse examiner.
- Q. And are these acronyms that SANE? Is that the sexual assault nurse examiner?
- 7 A. Yes.
 - Q. What's SANE-A?
- 9 A. Adult, adolescent.
- 10 Q. What does SANE-P?
- 11 A. Pediatric.
- Q. From when you graduated in 1980 up until 1999, you
- 13 | worked in emergency rooms?
- 14 A. Yes, I did. In fact, I continued to work in
- 15 | emergency rooms until 2006.
- Q. And since 2006, what has your work been as a
- 17 | nurse?
- 18 A. I worked in a surgery center until 2011. And
- 19 | after 2011, I have been the medical coordinator for the
- 20 | sexual assault program for Northern Nevada as well as doing
- 21 examinations.
- 22 | Q. When were you certified as a SANE nurse?
- 23 A. The very first national certification was in 2002,
- 24 | so I've been certified since 2002.

- Q. So have you been certified since it became its own discipline?
- A. No. The sexual assault nursing became its own discipline in the '90s. I believe 1992 the International Association of Forensic Nurses was born and then 1995 I think the American Nurse's Association recognized it as an entity and 1997 something happened to make it even more of its own thing.
 - O. So you became certified in 2002?

- A. 2002 was the first test, national certification test that was offered.
- Q. What is required to become a certified sexual assault nurse examiner?
- A. You have to take a class. At the time, they were 40-hour classes, in class classes, and so I went to a hotel room for that. And then there was some work to do after that. There was spending time with normal examinations, spending time with law enforcement, spending time with District Attorney's Office, spending time with advocacy and being precepted by somebody who had been doing exams already. And when they felt we were ready, we were on our own.

Even now, that continues, although there are plenty of on-line classes now you can take to be a sexual assault nurse examiner.

Q. In addition to the class you had to take, did you take the test?

2.1

- A. That was the national certification test in 2002.
- Q. And is there requirements to recertify for the same designation?
- A. Yes. You have to recertify every three years. So recertification is either retake the test or take 45 hours of continuing education every three years. And that's specific to sexual assault nursing. It can't be just any type of nursing, it has to be specific to.
- Q. Can you go into some of the trainings you've had specific to sexual assault examinations?
- A. Well, I try every couple of years to go to the International Association of Sexual Assault Nurses Scientific Conferences that are offered once a year, East Coast, West Coast. Those are generally 2 or 3 days of lots and lots of trainings and classes that we pick what we want to do and go to those classes.

I go to the California Clinical Forensic Training

Center has trainings. I'll go to California and attend

trainings. Webinars are now a thing and so the International

Association of Forensic Nurses, the California Clinical

Forensic Training Center, entities like that, forensic — I

can't remember the name of the forensic group that also does

classes. So multiple webinars are offered and I take advantage of those as I'm able.

- Q. Since 1999 when you became a SANE nurse, can you estimate how many trainings you've done in sexual assault nursing?
 - A. No.

- O. More than 20?
- A. Oh, yes.
- Q. 50?
- A. I'm not sure. I know my CV is seven pages long.
- Q. Have you testified previously in a case as an expert in sexual assault examinations?
- A. I've been qualified as an expert in the Second Judicial District Court in Washoe County. I have testified in the Third Judicial Court in the State of Nevada. I've also testified in a couple of jurisdictions in California also.
 - Q. And what is your relationship to Washoe County?
- A. Washoe County independently contracts the nurses that do sexual assault exams independently, so we're independent contractors to the county. We do examinations for all of Northern Nevada and then the 7 or 8 border counties of California.
 - Q. And how many, as an estimation, how many sexual

assault examinations have you conducted?

- A. I've conducted over 2,000 sexual assault exams since 1999.
- Q. And you said there's some you performed before 1999, before the designation?
- A. So before it became its -- so in the emergency room, nurses didn't do examinations on their own, it would be the physician. We would do as much as we could as far as the examine, evidence collection, specimen collection and that kind of thing. When it got to the genital area, the doctor had to come in and do that part of the examination.

 Certainly, I would do all of what I could and then I would assist the physician in that last piece.
- Q. Since 1999, you have alone conducted approximately 2,000 of these examinations?
 - A. That's correct.
- Q. What's the age range that you conduct the examinations on?
- A. From months to -- I think my oldest patient may have been 91 years old.
 - Q. Men and women?
- A. Correct.
- Q. I'm going to move on from your qualifications at this point. Is it fair to say that the female genitalia is

1 | made up of several components?

A. Yes, it is.

- Q. Can you give a brief over view of what makes up the female genitalia?
- A. So the female genitalia is a couple of different kinds of mucosa. We have vaginal mucosa, we have skin on the outside, and so mucosa, skin. And lay people call the entire area the vagina. It's not. The vagina is what's on the inside. But then there's the definition of what's external. It's external to the vagina, but there's internal genitalia and external inside the vagina, but we still have the labia majora that lays over everything.

So what is classified as external genitalia is internal to the labia majora. So it's a complex group of tissues and, again, mucosa that makes up a female anatomy.

- Q. And is this an area of the body that heals relatively quickly?
- A. Yes, it does. It's warm and moist and dark and for that reason healing occurs rapidly.
- Q. And you had indicated that the female genitalia is complex. I believe that's what you just said.
 - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Does that indicate to you that it's something that is better understood when seen in person?

A. Yes, it is.

- Q. As opposed to photographs or video or anything like that?
 - A. Yes, it is.
- Q. In your experience, have there been sexual assault examinations conducted where there's no injuries found?
 - A. Oh, for sure.
- Q. And in your experience in cases of digital penetration, if there are injuries, where in the genital area are they generally found?
- A. Certainly injuries can be found anywhere in any kind of a sexual situation, whether it's consensual or nonconsensual. There are studies out there that say there are more injuries for this reason or there are more injuries for that reason.

But, really, generally speaking, regardless of the type of sexual activity, most injury occurs in the labia minora and below the vaginal opening. So in the posterior fourchet and the fossa navicularis. These are long words, I realize. These are all structures that are below the vaginal opening. From the research I've done, again, it doesn't matter whether we have penile penetration or digital penetration, the injuries tend to be in those same areas.

Q. So when you reference below the -- sorry -- below

the vagina, say we're looking at the clock, I believe the terminology we're looking at the clock. Where at on this clock of the female genitalia is what you're speaking of the posterior fourchet?

- A. We do find injury findings based on the face of a clock. And this is so all of us can understand what we're all talking about in the same manner. 12:00 being the clitoral hood or towards the upwards side and 6:00 being towards the anal area, 3:00 being to the left and 9:00 being to the right as a face of a clock. So generally most information or injuries is found between 3:00 and 9:00.
- Q. In your experience, what types of injuries are found with nonconsensual digital penetration?
- A. So between 3:00 and 9:00, again, the fossa navicularis, so the area below the vaginal area. So those are the lips, inside the labia majora, which are the bigger lips and some vaginal and some cervical injuries have been found in digital penetration.
 - Q. And what are the nature of these injuries?
- A. Abrasions, erythema, which is redness, and lacerations, which is a tear that is created by blunt force trauma.
 - Q. And what is an abrasion?
 - A. An abrasion is just a scraping of the skin. So

it's just a scraping of say the top layer or a couple of layers of skin.

Q. Is it fair to say a scratch?

- A. It could be a scratch, yes.
- Q. And in your experience, what causes these injuries?
- A. Well, certainly something scraping the skin. On our fingers, we have fingernails, fingertips, which can be rough or smooth depending on a person and their makeup.

Linear abrasions, linear scratches can be caused by like dry skin on somebody's finger or stuff, because this mucosa is very soft and can potentially scrape easily or hang nails or fingernails or rough skin, that kind of a thing.

- Q. You had indicated that these injuries can be found anywhere in the female genitalia. Are there any medical studies involving nonconsensual digital penetration that says these injuries should be at the 12:00 area?
- A. No. I found nothing that documented any 12:00 position for finding injury. Although, certainly, in some of our textbooks, they don't specify 12:00 as far as injury goes or a common area of injury. Although in looking at photos, there have, you know, there were photos of injuries in, say, the clitoral hood, I think. But in the entire textbook, I think there was only one. All the rest were down lower,

- 1 | again, below the vaginal opening.
 - Q. And I'm sure there's all kinds of factors that will affect where the injuries are located?
 - A. Yes, there are.

- Q. Does that include if the victim is struggling physically?
- A. Sure. Yes. It can include how they were touched, if they were struggling, whether there was movement, whether the touching came from the front, it came from the back, it came from the bottom, you know, there's just -- whether it came around the side, whether there was clothing, you know, that affected where the -- where somebody's hands may have went. There's so many factors that indicate something or where something may have happened on a genitalia.
- Q. I'm going to switch gears. What is the purpose of a sexual assault examination?
- A. The purpose of a sexual assault examination is to, first of all, make sure the patient is okay. We're going to check them over. We're going to talk to them about what happened, get consents to say it's okay for us to touch them after they've had something like this happen. Get them in contact with advocacy, start working on mental wellness.

And then to do a physical examination to document any findings. Do they have bruises? Do they not have

bruises? Do they have any kind of medical conditions? Is there something going on with their body that maybe had nothing to do with the sexual assault. Do they have injury from the sexual assault? Can we tell whether anything happened from the sexual assault or was injury there prior, because certainly patients come in with injuries that happened from, you know, running into a desk as they were walking by on the way to work, things like that.

Specimen collection, similar to going to the hospital with a sore throat, we're going to swab their throats. Specimen collection in a sexual assault, where were you touched? We're going to use Q-Tips and we're going to touch in those same areas.

Assessing for toxicology, do we need to collect blood urine? Do you think you were drugged? Do we think that's a potential? Should we collect blood? Should we collect urine? Pregnancy testing, HIV testing, is there exposure? Do we need to treat for that? STD testing or not testing or prophylactic, instruction for medical or mental health reasons.

And so it's a whole package of wellness and then specimen collection and documentation for somebody who has been through a traumatic experience.

O. And specimen collection and documentation, is it

fair to say that's evidence collection?

- A. Yes. It's specimen collection for evidence of DNA.
 - O. DNA of who?

- A. Any contact with that person. So whoever touched that person for their DNA. Although that specimen collection may -- collects any DNA, not necessarily just the person that touched them unconsensually or nonconsensually, but it could be anybody's DNA.
- Q. Do you also collect a reference sample from the patient for their DNA?
- A. Yes, we do. Guaranteed in the kit is going to be one DNA profile. So we always need that control, that swab says that -- that the DNA profiles found, that one of them belongs to that person.
- Q. And given your experience in digital penetration cases, would you be surprised if there's no finding of DNA?
 - A. No, I would not.
 - Q. Why is that?
- A. Well, just from the classes I've taken and so on. For sometime, if there was digital penetration, nobody even asked to have the patient seen. They didn't feel like an examination was warranted, because there wasn't going to be any DNA.

Dr. Green in California at the California Clinical Forensic Medical Training Center did a little small study, but a study of touch DNA. And, again, it's small, so it's limited, but basically said, unless there's contact of more than 30 seconds, that there's not going to be any DNA left behind. Certainly, DNA is affected by what kind of contact is there and sweat on fingers is better.

MR. FUSS: I'm going to object as to her foundation to be testifying about touch DNA. It sounds like she's relying simply on one article.

THE COURT: I'll allow you to voir dire. I overrule the objection. That means you can ask the question and you can answer, Ms. Robison. Go ahead.

MS. NORTHINGTON: Thank you, your Honor. BY MS. NORTHINGTON:

- Q. Does the nature of the female genitalia also affect your understanding of DNA?
- A. So yes. Because it's a very moist environment, we have a ton of DNA down there of our own. That's where it belongs. That's where it lives.

When we get a control DNA sample, we get it from the buccal swab or the cheek area, which is again, mucosal, wet. So that's a great place to get a person's DNA. The genital area is the same kind of area or the same type of

tissue. So touch DNA may or may not deposit a large amount of DNA, but we have a huge amount of DNA of our own down there. So the potential there is for dilution.

But, again, with Dr. Green's study, he just said touch DNA seems to need a fair amount of contact in order for it to be found.

- Q. Would urination affect that finding?
- A. Yes, it could.
 - Q. And wiping after urination?
- 10 A. Yes, it could.

- Q. Why is that?
- A. Well, because the potential is there, urination is you're washing that area with urine and then we're wiping that area. So if there is DNA there, then there's a good possibility that is all going to be wiped away.

Certainly, we can find DNA in the vagina up until a person has a period and then with the flushing of the menstrual cycle, then we're not going to get DNA anymore. So there are many studies or several studies out there that have proven that. So it's the same concept.

- Q. I'm going to shift gears again. Here in Washoe County, physically where are these examinations conducted?
- A. We do the sexual assault examinations at the Washoe County Child Advocacy Center.

- Q. How does it work? Are you on-call?
- A. Yes, the on-call program.
- Q. When you get a call to conduct an examination, do you meet the patient at the child advocacy center?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. What happens when the patient walks through the door? Can you walk me through that?
- A. When the patient comes to the child advocacy center, sometimes I'm there and sometimes the nurses. It depends on timing. But the patient meets with the nurse and the advocate in the lobby. We go back to the examination room.
- Q. Once you're back in the examination room, what do you do next?
- A. So we talk about the patient, about application for funding secondary to sexual assault. We talk about consent, get consent for it to be treated. We talk to them about the history of what happened to them. We have a questionnaire type form the forensic lab provides in the kit that we go through that is a checklist and fill in the blank type form that we talk about medical history, contact, where they were contacted on their body, how they were touched. We talk about what they did after the assault. Did they bathe? Did they go to the bathroom? Did they brush their teeth?

There's a whole list of things that we do.

And then when we're finished with that questionnaire, then I will — the nurses will tell them what we're going to be doing for them as far as what the examination looks like and then talk to them about after the examination whether we're going to offer medication or not.

And, of course, let them know that any part of the examination they can refuse. They do not have to comply with everything.

Photography or video is a part of our examination. It can be very difficult for somebody to have video taken of their genital area and so discussion about that and consent for that.

And then from there the nurse will then start doing the examination. The advocate is there and then kind of doing paper work and advocacy in tandem.

- Q. Are there different types of examinations you'll do depending on what the report is?
- A. Yes. The examination really is based on what happened to the patient.
- Q. Are there the different types like a genital examination, is that one of the areas specifically that you will examine?
 - A. Well, if the patient == in this case, yes, but I

mean if the patient says they were only assaulted in their mouth, well, then I'm not going to do a genital examination, because I'm just going to examine them in their mouth. But of course make sure their whole body is okay.

- Q. You get what happened so you know how to proceed from there?
 - A. That's correct.

- Q. In cases of genital examinations, you talked about a video. Can you describe how this video is taken?
- A. Oh, we have a colposcope in the room, which is a very large machine. It is a binocular vision machine that magnifies everything really big and it's connected to a DVD player and a monitor.

So at the time when we were doing -- when we were using the colposcope, we're not using it as much anymore, we're using the digital photograph now, at the time we did this examination it was exclusively the colposcope. We would videotape the entire examination of the genital area. We would turn it on when the patient was positioned and the video would be of the entire genital examination.

- Q. Can you say where the big machine is?
- A. So the patient is on a regular patient gurney and the machine, all the machinery sits to the side of the patient, pretty similar to this monitor next to me except

it's turned so the patient can't see it. The machine is on a big -- is a roller. It's very heavy. But it's got an arm, articulating arm. And then the binoculars come down in front of me and then I look through the binoculars in front of me and shines a really bright light in the genital area.

And then it's -- so it's just stationed there between the patient's legs and I'm constantly looking between the colposcope and the binoculars to the monitor to make sure everything is in focus on the monitor and back and forth and doing the examination at the same time.

- Q. It's quite the contraption this colposcope?
- A. It does not travel. It's huge and it's very heavy.
 - Q. Do you manipulate it?

- A. I have to manipulate, because I have to make sure whatever I see on the monitor is focused, because that is going to be what I review later and so it needs to be clear. And what I see through the binoculars is not necessarily what I'm see on the monitor. I'm touching the patient and I'm back and forth looking and looking through the binoculars where everything is very magnified.
- Q. When you're doing a genital exam with this colposcope, what's your first step once you get down there?
 - A. A patient is in lithotomy position, laying on

their back with their feet in stirrups. And I start videotaping and I will videotape just top to bottom, again, magnified. So basically that really small area of genitalia does not fit on one screen, so I'm moving the camera up and down to make sure I get everything.

I will then swab on the outside of the genitalia, again, if this is appropriate to what happened to them. I will swab on the outside, which is the mons and the labia minora. And so -- sorry -- labia majora. So swab on the outside and kind of go from the top down to the bottom. So I can't see DNA, I can't see if there's anything there. And so it's just a general all over swab.

And then set that aside and then I just start working from the top, so separate the labia. I look at those areas. I look at the -- between the labia minora and labia majora, the clitoral hood. I move the camera down. I'm looking at all the labia minora, the posterior fourchet, which is the tip of skin that connects the labia minora, which -- and below the hymen and the vaginal opening. I'm looking at the hymen, I'm looking at all of those tissues. And so all of that I need to make sure I capture it, and you know, so I'm touching all of these areas. And then that is a general examination.

Toluidine blue dye, I'll do that next. I'll do a

- speculum examination, collect swabs from inside. In this
 case, I did not do a speculum examination. I went from
 looking at the outside to looking at the inside to collecting
- Q. So this examination that you're talking about is for just a physical hands-on visual inspection?
 - A. Yes, it is. Hands-on visual and touching. I mean, we have to separate everything and look at everything.
 - Q. So your hands on are on the patient?
 - A. Yes, they are.

the swabs from there.

- Q. If you see something of note, is that when you use the dye or do you always use the dye?
- A. The only time I don't use the dye is if the patient has so much injury that it's obvious. The days after the incident can be a little burnie and if somebody has very bad tearing or that kind of thing, I don't want to put dye on it. I don't need to. It's very obvious. But routinely I use it on every patient, again, except for those cases.
 - Q. What does the dye do?
- A. So toluidine blue dye is a chemical reaction with broken cells. So it pick ups the nucleus of the cell picks up this dye and you only get the nucleus if the cell is broken. So we will wipe it on the tissue, let it set for a second, and then we will dab it off or wipe it off with

either a one percent vinegar solution. Again, if can imagine
if there's injury if we're placing a vinegar solution on
there, it's not going to be okay. That's another reason why
I might with an injury that I am not going to do this. We
can always still use a lubricant, a water based lubricant to
take it off. Either way is fine.

But we'll put the dye on and then we'll use the gauze with either the vinegar solution or, I'm sorry, lubricant to take it off. Then we should be able to see injury initially and then we should be able to see it better with the dye. But it should support findings that we've already seen.

- Q. So, in general, did the dye confirm the findings you've already seen?
 - A. Yes, it did.
- Q. And you mentioned dabbing or wiping off the dye.

 Is that the commonly used practice when using this toluidine dye?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. What's the difference between dabbing it and wiping it and why do you use it certain times?
- A. Certainly we don't want to get very aggressive about cleaning. We just want to take it off. But lubricant, you can't dab a lubricant. You need to wipe it on and wipe

it off. With a liquid, you can spray it on or use the gauze, wet gauze to dab it and then just take off the dye that is not adhering to just normal healthy tissue.

- Q. So this dye is a liquid? It's not like a gel?
- A. It is a liquid, that's correct.
- Q. And I'm going to backup a little bit. When the patient and the nurse first enter the examination room, is the patient still clothed?
 - A. Yes, they are.

- Q. What is the process if they're still wearing the same clothes as the assault to remove that evidence?
- A. So after we do our history and we get through all the paper work and I explain to the patient what we're going to be doing for them, then I will do what I can at the table.

So, say, I'll go ahead and wash my hands and go to my kit and get my swabs and my box and I'll go to the patient and I'll swab the inside of their cheeks and get their DNA.

If I were to collect fingernail swabs, I might do that at the table. The examination is difficult and so I like to do as much as I can for the patient before we even head to the bathroom and start getting undressed. So I will do as much as I can at the table and then the patient and I will go back into the bathroom and I will go ahead and get them undressed.

We'll put a sheet on the floor, have them undress over the sheet, bag the clothes. At the same time, I keep them covered with a patient gown, cover them up, clothes off, take a look at their body while we're doing it. Just kind of discreetly, we don't want somebody standing naked, but have them remove their clothing and bag it at that time. And then I'll make sure they're gowned and gowns are tied and so on. And if we need them to pee in the cup and give me a urine sample, if not, we go to the examination table from there.

- Q. And we discussed this colposcope video. Are there instances where you'll take still shots of this video for your report?
- A. So, yes, when we are doing video, then we always take the pictures that we -- that would show what we wanted, you know, what was pertinent, basically. We would take the pictures of that video and then we mount those with an explanation.
- Q. And this is your way of documenting injuries that are found?
 - A. Yes, it is.

- Q. How long do these sexual assault examinations generally take?
- A. It just depends on how much we do, how we talk, how much the patient needs from us. So they can take

anywhere from, again, depending on how much we do, from 45 minutes to 2 hours.

The examination itself doesn't take that long.

It's more all of the other stuff that we do with them, the talking about what happened and then, you know, afterwards talking about follow-up and medication and things like that and the advocacy and the paper work for Victims of Crime and all of the things that go along with it. So the examination itself can actually be very short, especially if it's a limited examination, like I don't have to do a whole lot.

- O. Is this examination invasive?
- A. Yes, it is.

- Q. And can it be traumatic for the patient?
- 14 A. Yes, it is.

- A. So she had pretty red eyes and she was just a little disheveled. But her clothing was intact. It wasn't torn or anything like that.
- Q. Is it your understanding she was still wearing the same clothing?
 - A. Yes, it was.

- Q. Did you go through the process of disrobing her as you discussed?
 - A. Yes, I did.
- 10 Q. Do you remember specifically if you collected any clothing?
 - A. I collected her dress and her tights.
 - Q. Was she able to describe the assault to you?
 - A. Yes, she was.
 - Q. And what exam did you perform on Lindsey?
 - A. So the way she described what had happened to her, her examination didn't need to be -- like I didn't need to do a full body, look for bruising, look for hickeys, things like that. She described it as being a brief encountered. So my examination for her was very focused.

I swabbed her cheeks as I do for everyone. She wasn't sure if she scratched the person, so I swabbed her fingernails. I collected her clothes. And then I did a genital examination. And that was really the extent of the

- 1 examination itself. So a very, very quick examination.
- Q. And was the cheek swab to get her DNA?
- 3 A. Yes, it was.
- Q. For a reference sample? For her genital exam, did
 you use the colposcope as you described?
- 6 A. Yes, I did.
- 7 Q. This is the method you had in place in December of 8 2016?
- 9 A. Yes, it was.
- Q. And based on your visual inspection of her genitalia, did you note injuries?
- 12 A. Yes, I did.
- Q. Did you then use this toluidine dye on her?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. Did this dye confirm your own findings?
- 16 A. Yes, it did.
- Q. Is there a diagram that is part of your standard forms that you use when you're doing these examinations?
- 19 A. Yes, there is.
- MS. NORTHINGTON: Your Honor, may I approach the
- 21 | clerk?
- 22 THE COURT: Yes. Please approach freely.
- 23 BY MS. NORTHINGTON:
- Q. Ms. Robison, I'm showing you what has been marked

- 1 | as Exhibit 7. Please review this.
- 2 A. Yes.
- 3 O. Do you recognize what's depicted in this exhibit?
- 4 A. Yes, I do.
- 5 Q. Is this the diagram you usually use in your sexual 6 assault examination?
- 7 A. Yes, it is.
- 8 Q. Do you recognize this from a specific examination?
- 9 A. Yes, I do.
- 10 Q. Which examination?
- 11 A. This is Lindsay's examination.
- MS. NORTHINGTON: Your Honor, State moves to admit
- 13 Exhibit 7.
- 14 THE COURT: Any objection?
- MR. FUSS: No, your Honor.
- 16 THE COURT: Seven is admitted.
- 17 BY MS. NORTHINGTON:
- 18 Q. Ms. Robison, can you describe what is indicated on
- 19 | the top right of this diagram?
- 20 | THE COURT: Perhaps you could circle it or draw an
- 21 indicator.
- 22 BY MS. NORTHINGTON:
- Q. Can you describe what is indicated in this portion
- 24 of the diagram?

- A. So that is actually the inside of the vagina or a flat depiction as best can be from a 3D item. But that is a cervix at the back. The round thing with the little whole in the middle is a picture of a cervix. And that is looking at the vagina and the cervix through a speculum.
- Q. And this is part of the female genitalia that is inside the body?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. As you can see, this was not assessed with Lindsey?
 - A. That is correct.
- Q. Can you please describe what's indicated in this portion of the diagram?
- A. So as I was talking about earlier, the female genitalia, 12:00, 12:00.
 - Q. You can mark on the diagram.
- A. I'm trying. There we go. 12:00 at the top, 6:00, 3:00 and 9:00. And so in her case, she had toluidine blue dye uptake to the sides of her clitoral hood. So this is the clitoral hood here. This is the hole where we pee from here. This is the vagina right here. This outer circle right here is the -- where's the erase?
 - O. On the bottom.
 - A. Thank you. The hole where we pee from, the

vagina, the hymen is around here, and then what I was talking about earlier with the -- so this is the labia minora here, the labia majora outside and this is, of course, with all of the tissues retracted open. And the fossa navicularis is below the vaginal opening and then this posterior fourchet is this thin piece of skin that connects the labia majora. What I have documented is some toluidine blue dye pickup up here and toluidine blue dye uptake down here.

2.1

- Q. And this is the update we were discussing that confirmed your findings from your visual examination?
- A. So the toluidine blue dye uptake at the bottom down here, I could see that abrasion when I did my examination initially. I did not see anything of concern up in this area, but when I put the toluidine blue dye on and I cleaned it off there was still uptake so I need to address it. And so I documented it was there. But I didn't see anything there prior to applying the toluidine blue dye.

Toluidine blue dye only uptakes to injured tissue. It doesn't say how it was injured. So not only injury from contact, but certainly irritation or say somebody had an STD or anything that irritates the skin can uptake toluidine blue dye. So I'm just documenting that it's there. But certainly down here, this I saw before I put the dye on and so it supported my findings there.

- Q. And to clarify something you said earlier, you said that the injuries in the female genitalia are generally found between 3:00 and 9:00. Could you indicate on this diagram where that's at just to be clear?
- A. So 3:00 to 9:00, so generally speaking this area here.
 - O. Towards the bottom?
 - A. Below -- so generally in this area right here.
 - Q. Okay. Thank you. I'm now showing you what has been marked as Exhibit 6, which is two pages. Can you take a moment to review both pages? Do you recognize what's depicted in the two pages of exhibit -- I apologize -- I forgot -- 6?
 - A. Yes, I do.

- Q. What is depicted in these two pages?
- 16 A. Those are photos I took from the DVD of the
 17 examination I did on Lindsey.
 - Q. Were these two items a part of your report?
- 19 A. Yes, they were.

- 18 | Q. And what do you see with the blue dye?
 - A. So I actually neglected to document in my documentation that -- so here is the dye that I'm looking at as pickup. The sulcus -- so mild toluidine blue dye uptake to the sulcus parallel to the clitoral hood. A sulcus is a crease between two items. This is a crease between the labia minora, the labia majora and the clitoral hood.

So these pictures are a little washed out because they're so bright on the monitor, as well as being a reproduction of any original photos. But you can see the purple here and a little bit mild purple there. There is toluidine blue dye pickup here. This person, Lindsey, had shaved and this was her, you know, kind of her follicles from shaving. And so for me, the toluidine blue dye pickup was not significant there, but I didn't document that.

But it is there, I acknowledge that it is there.

But it's -- it should be there, basically, because of shaving. But this is what I was noting that I didn't see any injury, but I did see some toluidine blue dye pickup there.

- Q. So the hair follicles were not a part of your finding?
 - A. No. I didn't document anything on that.
 - Q. Because that's not necessarily an injury?
- A. That's correct. It is from shaving or it's irritation, what I felt was skin irritation from shaving.
 - Q. On page two, is this before you applied the dye?
 - A. Yes, it is.

- Q. Thank you. And before you applied the dye, did you note any findings?
- A. So here is the abrasion that I was documenting, and it really is darker in real life, but this redness right

here was what I was looking at in my examination.

- And this is in the 5:00 to 6:00 area? Ο.
- Yes, that's correct. So this is the labia minora here. This is the hymen. She has a very thin hymen right here. And this is actually vaginal tissue right here.
- So is that, I apologize if I use the wrong terminology, but is that the vaginal canal, the tube that enters into her body?
 - That's the wall of it, that's correct. Α.
 - You can see into her vagina from this position? Q.
- Well, you can see vaginal tissue that is in the Α. You can't see the tube, but you can see the vaginal opening. tissue in the opening.
- So this is the injury you noted before you applied Ο. the dye?
 - That's correct. Α.
 - And did the dye confirm your findings? 0.

- Is this the photograph after the dye? 19 Q.
 - Yes, it is. Α.
- Could you explain what's depicted in this 0. 22 photograph?
 - So here you can see that the dye, that it's darker now than it was before, and so this supports that is injured

tissue. So the dye picked that up.

Now, you can also see dye here. Hymens are a different kind of tissue than, say, the labia minora and inside here. And so hymens actually uptake toluidine blue dye regardless. So on dye on a hymen, it means really nothing. So this edge of blue here, yes, it's there, but it's actually on the edge of the hymen. I tried to be careful about not putting it there. That's just an uptake on the hymen, but it is not significant for anything.

But this, you know, we just look for dye to show us the same thing that we've already seen in, you know, in the examination before we put the dye on.

- Q. And this injury that you found in the 5:00, 6:00 region, that's consistent with your understanding of where injuries that are normally found in the female genitalia?
 - A. That's correct, it is a common area.
- Q. This area that this injury is found in the labia minora, fossa navicularis, is that inside her vaginal opening?
- A. It's part of the external genitalia. It's inside the labia majora and it's inside the labia minora, but it's outside the vagina.
- Q. This area here, you can see is kind of risen from the rest of the area, that's the hymen you were discussing?

- A. So, no. This is the hymen right like this. This is vaginal tissue. And when I swabbed this area, this is the opening right down here that I swabbed into her I swabbed all of this with the Q-Tip, but I also went inside the vagina down in here and swabbed more inside.
- Q. So when you say opening, you mean the opening into the vagina?
 - A. That's correct.

- Q. And this injury that you documented is right on the edge of the hymen, right near it?
 - A. It's just below it.
 - Q. Just below it?
- A. And see here's -- this is all her hymen right here and it's kind of laying outwards, it's laying out, so it's actually against the labia minora here. So, you know, if I could take a Q-Tip, I could have gently push it, I would have pushed it towards the vagina, but it's laying open.
- Q. Thank you. Did your examinations of Lindsey include the use of a speculum?
 - A. No, I did not.
 - Q. And why not?
- A. Based on what Lindsey told me, standing up position with him reaching down into her genital area and the fact that her vaginal tissue is so right at the surface, I

felt that the speculum examination -- first of all, I would have had to swab first, which I did. I would have taken a speculum, looked inside really quick just to see if there was anything in there as far as injury goes.

Based on a standing position, mechanically speaking, how far can a person get down into the genitalia and into the vagina. I wasn't worried about her cervix and finding injuries on her cervix. That's at the very back of the vagina, depending on the person, 3 to 5 inches. I had vaginal tissue. I could see the vagina itself. I didn't feel in her case it would be beneficial to her to put a speculum in her vagina to see if there was any injury further up.

I didn't see any injury on the vaginal tissue that I could see. I did put a Q-Tip in there and kind of moved the tissue around as I was collecting my specimen to look in the area. I felt in order to spare her some distress, that I opted not to put a speculum inside.

MS. NORTHINGTON: Court's indulgence, your Honor.

THE COURT: Sure.

BY MS. NORTHINGTON:

- Q. Ms. Robison, I'll show you page 2 of Exhibit 6. This is where you noted the 5:00, 6:00 region, correct?
 - A. That's correct.

- Q. Is this injury inside the genital opening?
- A. Yes, it is. It is inside the labia majora and the labia minora is the external genitalia.
- Q. To be clear, this still shot is of you pulling it apart, correct?
- A. That's correct. I have all of her structures open here. If you were to see the —— if I had posted a photo of her before I even touched her, you could not see any of this.
- Q. So you couldn't see this injury if you weren't pulling it apart to clarify?
 - A. That's correct.

- Q. Is this abrasion here consistent with a victim that says she feels pain while urinating?
 - A. Yes, because urine burns in -- if your tissue is irritated or so on, urine burns. And so this could easily be something that would burn a little bit if she got some urine on it.
 - Q. And it's your understanding that such an abrasion would heal within a few days given the nature of the female genitalia?
 - A. Oh, yes.
 - Q. Given your experience, were your findings on Lindsey consistent with her account of what happened?
 - A. Yes, they were.

Dr. Green out of California, the California Clinical Forensic Training Center, had done a webinar in 2014 and was talking about touch. It was a touch DNA webinar. And it wasn't specifically about DNA in the genital area. It was touch DNA on the body.

And it was grappling type of touch and it was, you know, different types of grappling and how long and that kind of thing. And I think his conclusions were about touch DNA on the body, not necessarily in the genital area -- I'm sorry -- not necessarily not in the genital area.

- Q. Other than the webinar, have you gone to any educational programs regarding the transfer of, quote, your word, touch DNA, in the genitalia or vaginal area on patients?
- A. I don't remember if I have gone to any training.

 I have read some research articles, and I'm sorry, I can't

 even come up with those right now. But I have a few. And I

 just can't tell you specifically when.
 - Q. Would they be noted on your CV?
- A. No. I don't -- I just -- on my CV I note when I go to training and how long it is and who put it on and that type of thing, but I don't list all of the things I go to in those trainings.
 - Q. And based on your answer regarding trainings, it

- seems that has been a while ago, would that be fair to say, based on your answer?
 - A. 2014, that's correct.
 - Q. That's the last time you've gone to any education regarding touch DNA?
 - A. So I watched another webinar just at the end of 2019 where they talked about lips and that type of touch DNA and transfer of DNA with lips, so not fingers. But lips on lips and oral DNA, that type of application.
 - Q. I'm sorry to interrupt you. When you say lips, you're talking about mouth lips?
- 12 A. Correct, oral contact.
 - Q. Lip to lip?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. Mouth lip to mouth lip?
- A. That's correct. So that type of DNA or tongues in the mouth. Actually, it was kissing, tongue kissing, that type of touch DNA. Specifically with fingers, I can't give you anything specific about that since 2014.
- Q. So back in 2014 -- or strike that. In 2018, you were talking about kissing lip to lip contact, tongue to tongue contact and kissing scenario. Do you know if any -- do you know -- do you remember the name of the author or the presenter?

- A. I do not. I know it was through the International Association of Forensic Nurses, but I don't know who the author was.
 - Q. Did they talk about the possibility of finding and collecting DNA through that contact?
 - A. That was the goal. And, of course, technique basically for collecting oral swabs and how to collect the best oral swabs. Again, a pretty limited study in that the collection was within minutes after contact and certainly not doing, you know, a type study of, you know, after two hours, after four hours, that kind of thing.
 - Q. So it didn't discuss the length of time, how long you would find transfer DNA from one person, say, person A to person B, correct?
 - A. Correct.
 - Q. But they did acknowledge in that study in that short window, because they didn't extend it out, that they did collect DNA sample, transfers from A to B, or B to A?
 - A. I don't believe they did.
- Q. You don't believe they did?
- A. No.

- Q. Do you have a copy of that within your -- back at your office?
 - A. I should.

Q. We're probably going to have to take a break at some point. Would you be kind enough to send me a copy?

THE COURT: We need to discuss a number of matters, then. First, of course, I need to canvass Mr. Chaparro about his rights to testify, commonly known as a Carter versus Kentucky canvass. Would you like me to do that now, counsel?

MR. FUSS: I think it would be better at the close of the State's evidence.

THE COURT: I tend to agree with that. But I want you to be prepared, Mr. Chaparro, tomorrow I will offer some detailed information to you about basically your right to remain silent and your choice whether or not to testify.

I want you to confer with your attorneys now, as I know you have been all along, and before that canvass tomorrow and then make whatever choice you think is right about testifying. Does that make sense?

THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: So I anticipate doing that after the close of the State's case, of course, outside the presence of the jury.

What witnesses, if any, do you intend to call other than Dr. Danielson?

MR. FUSS: Claire Nelli who is noticed as an expert witness. And the rub in that is that she won't arrive, and I'm waiting for my phone, so I don't misstate it, but I don't believe she will arrive until 1:50. If I can get her here sooner somehow, I will do everything to get her here by noon. So that if the State rests at noon, we take the lunch break, that we can then dovetail into her testimony, but I can't promise that, but I will do what I can.

THE COURT: Lest I forget to bring up the issue, you all should expect that at some point tomorrow after the close of the State's case during a break either over the lunch hour or another break, which we'll discuss in a moment, we will begin to settle jury instructions. So I want you all to be prepared for that.

MR. FUSS: Okay.

THE COURT: Because you all have done your homework so assiduously, if there are breaks in the progress of the defense case, for example, if your expert witness whom I believe is coming from California --

MR. FUSS: Correct.

THE COURT: -- doesn't arrive until approximately 2:00 p.m., for lack of an easier way or perhaps an easiest

way to describe it, I'll cover the break with the jury. What I mean by that is I'll fall on the sword with the jury to say there are matters that we need to discuss, you don't have to be back until 2:30 or however that works out in terms of the progress of the day.

MR. FUSS: All right.

THE COURT: It sounds to me like you would then be closing except for Dr. Danielson tomorrow or your client?

MR. FUSS: Yes, but I will — I anticipate calling Dr. Danielson on Friday.

THE COURT: Of course, we scheduled the trial around that.

MR. FUSS: Okay. And so won't -- as a matter of sort of continuity to the case, airplane lands at 1:50 is what the schedule is, not far to get there from here. She would be prepared to testify. I'd ask her to be able to do that. If I can't get her here any earlier, would it make more sense to call them both on Friday, call one at 9:00 a.m.?

THE COURT: No, sir.

MR. FUSS: Fair enough.

THE COURT: Moreover, as I was beginning to say, if your client elects to testify, he should be prepared to testify tomorrow. Because I will not, given the timing of

the case, expect that he would testify at the end of the defense case.

We delayed the start of this case because of Dr. Danielson's schedule. I have no quarrel with that. But if after your other expert testifies tomorrow, there is time available, and Mr. Chaparro elects to testify, that's when I would expect you to call him.

MR. FUSS: Just for the record, I'm going to object to that, because the Court is telling me in what manner I -- what order I'm to present my case. I don't expect that to be an issue. But I want to preserve the record. It violates his due process rights to put on his case in the order in which he -- we choose to put it on. I recognize that the Court has given us great latitude. I just want the record protected.

THE COURT: Well, in fact, there is no such right you describe, I believe. What I mean by that, of course, is he is entitled to present a case, but as I would expect the State to take witnesses out of order, even to allow the defense to call witnesses in the State case, I expect the defense to use available time as it becomes available in its case.

You'll recall for purposes of the record, not for all of you, Dr. Danielson, I pressured mightily to come

- earlier than Friday. I only reluctantly agreed to start

 trial in this case Tuesday afternoon for purposes of voir

 dire when you all made the promise, which thankfully you

 kept, that voir dire would be accomplished Tuesday and that

 we would finish on Friday.
 - More particularly, I would be concerned that if
 the -- if we killed half a day tomorrow, for example, and
 Mr. Chaparro didn't testify until after both experts
 testified on Friday, the case would not go to the jury until
 late Friday afternoon. In my view, that places unnecessary
 pressure on a jury to deliver a verdict. In fact, I
 discussed that very possibility when we talked about timing.
 - Finally, it's my recollection that I ordered you all to consider that I would not bump witnesses out of order beyond Dr. Danielson for the very concern I'm talking about now, i.e., when we finish on Friday.
 - So notwithstanding your objection, I just want you and Mr. Chaparro to expect that if he testifies and there's time tomorrow, we're going to use that time.
 - MR. FUSS: Understood.
