THE COURT: We're on the record in the Silva matter. It's 8:45, we're scheduled to begin at 8:45.

Counsel, I first want to tell you that yesterday as we talked about schedule I was just thinking about it. I don't want to be bound by anything I had said in terms of Fridays and Mondays, I just want to keep pushing effectively and justly and let's see how we are at the end of the day.

Second, just minutes ago I was given a motion to reconsider. I want to invite your advocacy. It is more important to do right than to be right. And there's a sentence in Mr. Lee's motion where he said, I'm paraphrasing, I want to let you know judges hate motion for the reconsideration it's with great reluctance, but you haven't seen that I can tell by your eyes, Ms. Ristenpart.

MS. RISTENPART: Correct, your Honor.

THE COURT: So Mr. Lee has filed a motion in which he asks me to reconsider my ruling on my oral pronouncement of that position of Mr. Silva's statement

will be added to the State's evidence.

We're not going to resolve it right now without Ms. Ristenpart reading it, we're not going to resolve it while the jury waits, but here's the issue as I see it, and even I will have it percolate and we'll talk probably during next break.

The State is absolutely accurate that Mr.

Silva's statement out of court is not hearsay if
introduced by the State adverse to Mr. Silva. Mr. Silva
can't insist that his out-of-court declaration be
presented and avoid cross-examination of these
statements presented to the jury. That's the general
rule. State gets to select what evidence it presents
and the defense does not get to insist that the State
add evidence of his prior statements. That must be
balanced with NRS 47.120 which is rule of completeness,
an evidence prophecy is patterned after Rule 106 and the
idea is that only if the second portion somehow provides
context to the first, if it explains the first, if it is
necessary for full context, that's when it comes in.

I can't make that decision about argument in probably reviewing the video, so I acknowledge your motion. I'm holding it in abeyance. When does this particular evidence fall in your sequence?

MR. LEE: Towards the end, your Honor.

THE COURT: Toward the end of what?

MR. LEE: So probably last two witnesses, three witnesses.

THE COURT: So not before lunch today.

MR. LEE: Not before lunch.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. LEE: Well, I was wrong yesterday but I would not expect it before lunch.

THE COURT: All right. As a courtesy to Ms.
Ristenpart, Ms. Clerk, if you will please print a copy
of the State's motion in hard form. Do you have a copy?

MS. RISTENPART: Ms. Clerk just provided me

one.

THE COURT: Thank you. I didn't notice. I was talking. So I want to give you a chance to read it but let's proceed to trial right now and then we'll discuss the terms of the issue when we can contemplatively.

MR. LEE: Thank you. I have one other matter, Judge, I have the redaction of the video we talked about yesterday. My sentiment to Ms. Ristenpart the time I'm trying to redact from or that I did redact from I hope that would be sufficient. I don't know if there's

anything. I didn't find anything else in that interview. I'll just leave it at that.

MS. RISTENPART: May I inquire, your Honor? Mr. Lee, did you send in an email form to my office?

MR. LEE: I did.

MS. RISTENPART: What time?

MR. LEE: Give me a moment.

THE COURT: I'd love hearing what time. I love when people send emails at 4:30 in the morning and 12:30 at night.

MR. LEE: I sent it 5:51 p.m. yesterday.

THE COURT: All right. We'll stand for our

MR. LEE: I'm sorry, Judge, one more thing. This is the last thing. Because of the redaction there's a clear break in the video, you see a glitch, it's obviously something's been doctored and I would propose an instruction be read just regarding the redaction.

THE COURT: Would you read your proposed instruction?

MR. LEE: Sure. You're about to hear a recorded conversation between Richard Silva and Reno Police detectives. A certain portion of this recording

1 has been deleted and is not legally available for your consideration based upon rules of evidence. You are not 2 3 to speculate, Ladies and Gentlemen, as to what would 4 have been in the redacted portion and infer any bad 5 faith on the part of either party. 6 MS. RISTENPART: I'll object to that 7 instruction, your Honor, it just highlights an imperfect 8 redaction that was done by the State which I have not 9 seen yet anticipating that it's going to be a very 10 awkward cut. 11 THE COURT: Well --12 MR. LEE: And I can show you the portion just 13 right now if you'd like. 14 COURT CLERK: Exhibit 129 marked for 15 identification. 16 (Exhibit 129 is marked for identification.) 17 THE COURT: The jury, please. 18 MR. LEE: I'm sorry? 19 The jury, please. THE COURT: 20 (Jury returns to the courtroom.)

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THE COURT: The entire jury is present.

Ladies and Gentlemen, in a moment a witness from yesterday will return to the witness stand. During testimony you will hear and you will see a recorded

conversation between Mr. Silva and Reno Police detectives. A certain portion of that recording has been modified at my direction. Please make no inference about my decision. Please do not speculate or guess about the portion of the ordered modification.

You may call your next witness.

MR. LEE: Thank you. Detective Ernie Kazmar.

THE COURT: The witness remains under oath from yesterday.

THE WITNESS: Yes, your Honor.

THE COURT: Be seated, please. And the State may continue.

MR. LEE: Thank you, your Honor. Do I ask the witness just to step down to look at this computer?

THE COURT: Yes.

CONTINUATION OF DIRECT EXAMINATION
BY MR. LEE:

Q Detective, if you could? I'm going to show you what's been marked as Exhibit 129. Go ahead and look through that.

A Yes.

Q Thank you. You can have a seat. Have you had adequate time to scroll through, look at Exhibit 129?

- A I do.
- Q Do you recognize this?
- A I do.
- Q What is it?
- A That is the video of interview with Mr. Silva conducted by Detective Thomas and I on November 8th.
- MR. LEE: Your Honor, I move to admit Exhibit 129.
- MS. RISTENPART: Based upon our earlier conversation, no objection.

THE COURT: Exhibit 129 is admitted.

(Exhibit 129 is admitted into evidence.)

COURT CLERK: Thank you.

BY MR. LEE:

- Q Detective, my intent is to play the entirety of this video but let me ask a few questions up front about it. How did -- as a reminder, how did we get in this situation on November 8th?
- A Through discussions with Mr. Silva's brother, Bernard, regarding the open CPS case that was currently ongoing in conjunction with our murder investigation, but unrelated, we had requested from Bernard his assistance in getting family members down to conduct voluntarily interviews.

1 Including Mr. Silva? Q 2 Α Correct. 3 At this point were you specifically 4 interested in talking to Mr. Silva? 5 Α We were. 6 So let me point out on the table here, looks 7 like a bottle of water? 8 Α Correct. 9 Q Who put that there? 10 Detective Thomas did. Α 11 And the bottom right of the screen, what is Q 12 that? 13 That is an empty trash can. Α 14 Q How do you know it's empty? 15 Because we made sure it was empty before the Α 16 interview initiated. 17 What was the hope here with that water bottle 18 and that empty trash can? 19 That at some point during the interview that 20 Mr. Silva would drink from the water bottle and discard 21 it in the trash can, therefore, allowing us to collect 22 the surreptitious DNA subpoena. 23 The surreptitious? Q 24 Without his knowledge.

Q I'm pushing play at the beginning. Excuse me, I'm actually going to scroll forward. Starting at five minutes.

THE COURT: Will you hit pause for just a moment, please? What is the source for the sound? Is it just the computer itself?

MR. LEE: No, it should be the TV.

THE COURT: Okay. Ladies and Gentlemen, if at any time you can't hear, just raise your hand and indicate, okay?

Go ahead, Mr. Lee.

(Exhibit 129 is being played.)

THE COURT: Pause it. It's muffled.

(Jurors are saying it is muffled.)

THE COURT: One option is that we put a microphone, unless you have a different suggestion.

There are three options. Play it as it is, put a microphone in front of it and see if that amplifies it better or any other technological suggestions you have.

MR. LEE: No, with the acoustics I guess that's not an option, if we can try the microphone. If not, my other option would be simply to play a portion and ask Deputy Kazmar.

THE COURT: Let's try the microphone first.

We've had some success in the past with that.

Deputy? You should put it at the television or the computer.

MR. LEE: I think it does come out of here (indicating). Let me experiment if I could.

Stopping it at 6:20. Seems a little clearer for me.

THE COURT: Let's play it, go ahead and start it, begin from the beginning.

Ladies and Gentlemen, if, again, you just simply can't hear, we'll then go to the third option which is to have Mr. Lee inquire of the witness.

MS. RISTENPART: Your Honor, if may I suggest--

THE COURT: Hold on. Let's first go off the record so we don't have all the different voices talking all at once. Just pause.

(Discussion held off record concerning sound.)

MR. LEE: Your Honor, so the intent was I'll play some parts that are not jumbled, certain parts I will try to ask Detective Kazmar if he recalled or understands other parts are so jumbled and we'll let them go.

MS. RISTENPART: For the record, I am hearing

1 from the jury that appears to sound better and it's not 2 as jumbled as before. 3 THE COURT: Thank you. You may proceed. 4 MR. LEE: Starting at five minutes. 5 THE COURT: I'm sorry, it's about 90 percent 6 right for me but I just want to try this one other 7 thing. Deputy? 8 MR. On top of that he mentioned the fact that he

specifically avoided the area of Neil Road as well as 1 2 other locations within Reno that he, quote, deemed a 3 high crime area. 4 And so he talked about Airway and Peckham. 5 So if you were to follow Moana it turns into Airway, 6 correct? 7 Α Correct. 8 And eventually meets up with -- is it Peckham 9 down that -- south? 10 Correct. 11 All right, Detective, we're nearing the end. Q 12 I had stopped it at 1:04:59. I'll push play. 13 (Resuming playing Exhibit 129.) 14 Stopping at 1:05:20. What Mr. Silva did, is 15 that what you were hoping he would do? 16 Α It was. 17 What happened to that water bottle 18 afterwards? 19 It was collected, collected and placed inside 20 a Reno PD evidence envelope seal and then taken to the 21 crime lab for processing. 22 Q Was the crime lab able to rush that? 23 Α They were.

2	second instant we're talking about on the October 20th
3	of 2017 where Bernard used a firearm and somehow shot
4	his chest. Correct?
5	A Correct.
6	Q And we just heard commentary questions as to
7	whether it was self-inflicted or attempted suicide or an
8	accident. Correct?
9	A Correct.
10	Q And from your review of those Sparks Police
11	Department reports you also learned that Luz had showed
12	up at the scene of the shooting of Bernard's wound to
13	his chest, right?
14	A I believe that is correct.
15	Q And then when Luz arrived, Richard, Mr. Silva
16	was trying to calm the situation down.
17	A That may be correct and I apologize, but it's
18	been quite sometime since I read that Sparks Police
19	report.
20	Q It's been two years, right?
21	A Correct.
22	Q Now, Mr. Silva himself, he does not have any
23	children, correct?
24	A I don't believe so.

- Q And the children we're talking about,

 Fernando we've already heard of, is Ms. Castillo's

 biological son, but Bernard and Luz had been together

 for 11 years, right, married for 11 years?
- A As I said yesterday, I don't recall the exact time that they were married, but I think either from Mr. Silva or some another person that I interviewed indicated it was an extended period of time, I thought it was between 11 and 12 years.
- Q And from your investigation you knew that Fernando was like Bernard's son, I mean, he helped raise him and cared for him, correct?
 - A Just not biological, yeah.
- Q And was very close to Bernard also, Fernando and Bernard, as well as the other kids.
 - A I believe so.
- Q And we heard some conversation between you and Mr. Silva in regards to when Bernard was in the hospital Richard would bring the kids to go visit with Bernard while he was in the hospital?
 - A Correct.
 - Q After the shooting on October 20th --
- 23 A Correct.

Q -- 2017? And we heard that he would go pick

up the kids from Luz's mom's house? 1 2 Mr Silva indicated that on one occasion 3 that's what occurred. 4 And Luz's mom's house, that's the one over on 5 Lester Avenue, correct? 6 I believe that is that house, yes. Α 7 That would be over by the Nissan dealership? 0 8 In that part of town, yes. Α 9 And also in your investigation Bernard was 10 released from the hospital days before Luz's killing. 11 Right? 12 I believe he was discharged from the hospital 13 on October 30th. 14 Now, just to get the timeline very clear Q 15 here, investigators had an interview with Bernard on 16 November 2nd of 2017. Right? 17 Α Correct. 18 And that was after you guys went to the day 19 care where he was going to pick up Ruby? 20 Correct. That was not me, that was other 21 detectives. 22 Q Other people in your investigation, right? 23 Α Correct.

And then this interview with Richard took

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Q

place on November 8th of 2017.

A Correct.

- Q And during that time -- well, in fact, on November 2nd, 2017, CPS took the three kids, took custody of them, right?
 - A I believe so, yes.
- Q And then as we heard you repeated over and over again to Richard in this November 8th, 2017, interview that you wanted to be to get the kids back to Bernard. Right?
 - A Correct.
- Q And that you even admitted that you were using the CPS and that the kids had been taken away as a tool to get the family talking. Right?
 - A Correct.
- Q And at one point Detective Thomas told
 Richard in that interview that you guys wanted -- needed
 to clear Bernard in order to get the kids back.
 - A Correct.
 - Q Because Bernard was a suspect.
- A No. We were simply saying to Mr. Silva as well as the other family members that part of using that investigative tool with the CPS tangle, that we needed as much information as possible to provide to CPS for

them to make that determination whether or not they were going to return the children to Bernard.

Q And that's because CPS took the kids because Bernard was a suspect, and were waiting to hear from you as to whether or he was cleared as a suspect, right?

A Correct.

MR. LEE: Objection, speculation.

THE COURT: Overruled.

THE WITNESS: I can --

THE COURT: If you know the answer you may provide it. If not, please do not guess.

THE WITNESS: Well, at that point in the investigation there was no suspect, per se. There was obviously — if we're talking about November 2nd when CPS took the children, the DNA primary — preliminary results from Bernard's DNA sample had not been returned yet.

BY MS. RISTENPART:

- Q Okay. But at this point when you're interviewing Richard the kids are still in CPS custody. You had just done a DNA test for the cigarettes against Bernard's DNA. Right?
 - A Correct.
 - Q And you're telling Richard in this interview

1 that you guys need to clear Bernard. Correct, that's what we said. 2 3 You arrested Richard on November 16th of 2017, correct? 4 5 Α Correct. 6 And at that time you took some clothing from 7 him on the day of his arrest 8 We did. Α 9 0 49er hat that we talked about with the 10 State? 11 Correct. Right. Α 12 You also took a black hoodie. Right? Q 13 Correct. RISTENPART: No further questions. Thank 10 you. 11 THE COURT: Is there any redirect? 12 MR. LEE: There is none. Thank you. 13 In a moment you'll be free to THE COURT: 14 leave the courtroom. Thank you. 15 Ladies and Gentlemen, during this recess 16 please do not discuss this case amongst yourselves. 17 Please do not form or express any opinion about this 18 matter until it's submitted to you. 19 We'll be in recess until 11:55. 9	CROSS-EXAMINATION
10	BY MS. RISTENPART:
11	Q Mr. Manzo, you claim that you didn't know
12	that Luz was still married to Bernard while you were
13	romantically involved with her?
14	A What is that? Can you repeat that one more
15	time?
16	Q You claim that you did not know that Luz was
17	still married to Bernard while you were romantically
18	involved with her?
19	A Well, I knew she was married with him but not
20	in the relationship with him.
21	Q But you did know that Luz was still living
22	over with Bernard?
23	A Yes.
24	Q And you stated that you never met Mr. Silva.

1 Is that what you testified to today? Richard, I'm referring to. Yet you knew all about the relationship 2 3 and who was related to who? 4 Α Yes. 5 So you learned that all from Luz? 0 6 What was that? Α 7 You learned all that from Luz. Right? 0 8 Yes, because she told me a lot. Α 9 Q Now, let's take you to October 20th of 2017, 10 right? You just testified that you knew that there was 11 an incident involving Bernard and Luz. Right? 12 Α That's correct. 13 And, in fact, Luz called you and told you 14 that Bernard had hit her? 15 Α Yes. 16 And you went over to Bernard's house? 0 17 That's correct. Α 18 How did you know where he lived? Q 19 How? Because everybody knows their family, Α 20 so pretty simple. 21 And when you got there there were Sparks 22 Police Department on scene. Right? 23 Α Correct.

Right? 17 Α Yes. 18 Swore to tell the truth? 0 19 That's right. Α 20 The whole truth? 0 21 Α I am telling the truth. 22 Q And nothing but the truth? 23 Α Yes.

And on previous testimony, Mr. Manzo, you

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Q

testified that the conversation with Bernard that he was angry during that. Right?

A Well, he was not angry. It was just wanted to make sure he fell with her or not.

- Q You previously testified that that conversation with Bernard, that it wasn't a good conversation, Bernard was angry. Right?
 - A I didn't say that.

- Q Are you claiming that you did not testify to that previously?
- A Well, like I said, I did have a conversation with Bernard that day. I was angry because he had hit Lucy, not him. He was kind of like sad because he had lost the love of his life.
- Q I know what you're telling us today after you've met with the prosecutor numerous times. I'm asking you about what you testified to previously in courtroom about that conversation with Bernard, and you told us that it was an angry conversation with Bernard; didn't you?
- A Like I said, I was angry because Lucy had to call me and told me that Bernard had hit her. So when Bernard -- because Bernard called Lucy telling her a bunch of stuff about me, like, talking bad stuff, so I

told Lucy to keep my number to him in order so he could call me. So I would get, like, an impression I don't remember this was what, a couple months ago.

Q And you also told us -- and you also told us in that prior testimony that that conversation with Bernard took place on October 17th of 2017, didn't you?

A Yes.

Q Now, you claim that you have never seen Richard Silva. You told us that today. Right?

A Yes.

Q But, in fact, there was one time that you went over with Luz to drop off the kids. Right?

A Yes.

Q And Richard was there to picked up Ruby the youngest one and brought ruby back inside?

A Yes, that's right.

Q So you have seen Richard before, haven't you?

A Well, before -- what do you mean like before all the accident but what was just one time I saw him this was the day. And I have seen him in patient and everything but not in pictures and everything, but not in person.

Q Now, you also -- Mr. Manzo, you have an ex-girlfriend, Esmerelda Castillo, correct?

A Yes.

Q Did you end things well with Esmerelda Castillo?

A Whoa. I shouldn't answer that because it's not related to that case, so.

Q You were having problems with Esmerelda

Castillo and the fact Esmerelda was having qualms that
you were with Luz. Correct?

A I repeat myself why does my ex-girlfriend has to do with this case?

THE COURT: You are in a trial in which the State has alleged a crime against Mr. Silva, and Mr. Silva is defending those allegations. You're under cross-examination which is not a comfortable experience for anyone. I determine what is relevant and not relevant.

There may be a point at which I do not allow the attorneys to go. But all attorneys are entitled to examine the credibility and the facts present by a particular witness and so as to that question I'm going to instruct you to answer. But I'm mindful of the boundaries and at some point I might have a discussion with the attorneys about what is not relevant. But as to that question you shall answer.

1 THE WITNESS: Okay, your Honor. THE COURT: 2 Thank you. 3 BY MS. RISTENPART: 4 Your ex-girlfriend, Esmerelda Castillo, had 5 problems that you were with Luz. Right? 6 Α Yes. 7 And it's made her, Esmerelda, very angry not 8 only at you but at Luz also. Right? 9 Α Yes. 10 In fact, there was a physical altercation Q 11 between Esmerelda and Luz prior to Luz's killing. 12 Right? Q 2 Α (Nods head.) 3 Q That's a yes? 4 Α Yes. 5 And you claimed today that that conversation 6 ended badly, didn't you? 7 Α Yes. 8 And that somehow there was some discussion 9 about meeting up at a park where Richard asked you to 10 meet up at the park? 11 Α That's right. 12 You've testified about that conversation you 13 had with Richard previously, haven't you? 14 Α Yes. 15 Where, again, you were in this courtroom, 16 right? 17 Α Yes. 18 And you swore to tell the truth? Q 19 Α Yes. 20 And in that testimony, you stated that Mr. 0 21 Silva and you, that he had a conversational tone when he 22 was talking to you on the phone. 23 Α Yes, I did. 24 Q Wasn't yelling at you?

- A He wasn't.
- Q In fact, he said he was talking to me like professional, you know, like no incident, nothing.
 - A That's right. I did say that.
- Q And you just told him to stay out of it, I already talked to your brother, and you have nothing to do with it?
 - A That's right.
- Q He didn't say anything about this alleged request to meet up at the park.
 - A Well, yes, I did say that, too.
- Q Are you claiming you said that previously in your prior testimony?
- A Like I said, I don't remember things like it's been a few months ago, but I been saying that he asked me to meet him in a park the same day that he called me.
 - Q You're saying that today.
 - A I been saying that since the day one.
- Q When you prev -- are you claiming you said that to the police too, Mr. Manzo?
 - A Yes, I did.
- Q Really, when police interviewed you're saying that you told them that there was some request by

- This is not yet admitted so if you don't mind just keeping it to yourself right now but go ahead and look at both pages in that exhibit.
- And once you've had sufficient time I'll ask if you recognize them.
 - A Yes, I recognize both of them.
 - Q What are these?
- A These are the reverse search that I do. So if somebody says information was looked at using the DMV data base can you see who touched it. And so I go back, first I search the person or thing that they want so in this case it was people's names, so I looked for any plates, any Social Security numbers, any driver's license, anything that connects that person to our data. And then from that I look at anybody who has looked at that data using our data base.
- Q Okay. And does Exhibit 87 have a print-out of what you found?
 - A Yes.
 - MR. LEE: Your Honor, I move to admit 87.
 - MS. RISTENPART: I haven't seen that. No
- objection.

1	THE COURT: 87 admitted, Ms. Clerk.
2	COURT CLERK: Thank you.
3	(Exhibit 87 is admitted into evidence.)
4	BY MR. LEE:
5	Q Ms. Roberts, I'm going to show now, and you
6	can see on your screen or the big screen behind.
7	A Uh-hum.
8	Q 87, there's two pages in this exhibit.
9	Correct?
10	A Correct.
11	Q Starting with page 1, let me just ask you a
12	few specific questions, then I'm going to ask you to
13	explain some things.
14	A Okay.
15	Q First of all, looking at the bottom letters
16	MCTLR, what's that?
17	A That's my ID.
18	Q So that shows you ran this information?
19	A Yes.
20	Q There's a what is this when it says
21	reported on the bottom right, reported 12-11-17?
22	A That would be the date that I ran the report.
23	And oh, sorry. Go ahead.
24	Q Go ahead.

A The thing next to it is the query that I use to run it.

Q Does it mean search log and transaction?

A That's what I would name my searches that I wrote for it.

Q Okay. And then towards the top there's a line that says transactions run around the time of the above searches.

A Correct. When we look and we find that somebody has pulled up that data, we then say well, maybe they were gonna do a registration renewal or new driver's license or something, so to justify that search what work was done, there was none. Had there been any they would be there.

Q Meaning, so say a customer never came into the DMV to have something done that day.

A There's nothing from that record that looks like it was done at that time by that person.

Q Okay.

A There was -- we don't look at everything that was run that day. What we look at is okay, the person -- because you're never supposed to touch a record that you're not using to go in and look something up, you should be doing something to that record, right? That's

the general premise and so this person didn't do anything to that record on that day.

Q So would you normally expect if you're to run an inquiry that there was a transaction run that day?

A Usually, yes. It could also be a reference for something but, generally, yes, there's a transaction run.

Q Okay. Ms. Roberts, at this point I'm going to ask a couple questions, and ask if you can describe them for us, all right?

A Uh-huh.

Q The screen is a touch screen, I'll hand you this pin, it makes it a little easier to write on it so let me just ask a couple of things. Explain this first box up top if you could. And if you need to touch and show something --

A Okay.

Q -- please do so.

A So the first box, now, I've seen that starting with looking has anybody touched that data so this says that J. Macias is the user who logged in at the date and time of 10-26 17:00 hours using military time, 2017, that would be the employee ID 7984 using a computer with the IP address, this -- the IP address

1 tells us what PVT is done on this computer in room one--2 THE COURT: Hold on. Hold on. 3 THE WITNESS: Sorry. Sorry. 4 THE COURT: You're going too fast. 5 THE WITNESS: Sorry. 6 THE COURT: That's okay. We have a reporter 7 here and you'll just slow your answers a little bit, 8 please. 9 THE WITNESS: Okay. 10 THE COURT: Thank you. 11

THE WITNESS: So the IP address designates that computer number that was logged into that answered it. The plate number is what they looked up so they typed in a search box, give me UNR 21305, the employee's Jessica Macias, and that would pull up the information for that person.

BY MR. LEE:

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Q So, again, you could tell what this employee,
J. Macias, looked up and if that person punched in UNR
21305?

A Correct.

- Q The more demographic information that appears somewhat in the middle, what is that?
 - A Was -- they would have asked me to look up,

most likely, the Arturo Manzo-Reyes and the Luz Linares-Castillo, they give me usually — go find this person and see everybody that touched that records. So when they give me that, I have to go into the back end of our database and find all the information that relates to that person because you can search by any piece of information. And so I find it all, then I go and I look for when was this last touched within the date ranges that they gave me. And so here it says between 9-1-2017 and 11-17 they said search to see who touched that record.

- Q Circle those days, would you?
- A Those dates are here.

- Q Okay. So when you're talking about they gave me this information you're talking about the individuals at your work who asked you to look up this information?
- A Normally only the deputy director and the deputy director will ask for these searches they're pretty isolated in time. So in this case it was the deputy director who asked for it, and gave me the date range and what to look for.
- Q Okay. And then the deputy director provided some of this demographic information?
 - A No, they would only provide the names

generally.

Q Okay.

A Because you don't know all that demographic information.

- Q Okay. But correct me if I'm wrong, with the names, however, you're able to come up with other information such as a license plate?
 - A Correct.
 - Q UNR 21305?
 - A Correct.
- Q Now, if J. Macias looks up UNR 21305 what information can J. Macias find out?
- A Once you've looked it up, find a lot. You can find out all their other vehicles, titles, registrations, addresses, the basic demographic of the person. There's a lot of information that comes back in the search results to make sure that you have the right person.
 - Q So a current registered address?
 - A Uh-hum.
- Q I'm now going to go to page 2 of Exhibit 87.

 Let me ask you many of the same questions here, Ms.

 Roberts. Again at the top, is this an employee identification at the top left in the box?

A Correct. It's the log-in user ID is R.

Silva, the date that they did this search, the identify of the employee who did the search, the IP of the computer they did the search on, and in this case used a driver's license number. And that's for Richard Silva.

Q And Richard Silva is the employee?

A Yes. That's same -- it takes it back to that user log-in and employee ID.

Q In this case there was a transaction run around the time. Correct?

A Yes, there was a temporary movement permit in there and it used vehicle ID, and it -- so what I look at to see it is I take that vehicle ID that's there and I come down below and find that that vehicle is tied to the vehicle, and has been pulled.

Q ID that's there, thank you. Just one moment. Again, if the information such as a driver's license number, that's DLM at the top, correct?

A Correct.

Q If that is looked up by employee Richard Silva, again, a wealth of demographic information is available?

A Yes, on the other tabs.

Q Now, at the DMV are people supposed to use

each terminal that they are logged into? 1 2 Α No. 3 Q Is that the same for really any state 4 employee? 5 Correct. There's a state computer policy and 6 a DMV computer policy that says you do not use other's 7 log-in. 8 MR. LEE: Thank you. That's all the questions 9 I have. 10 THE COURT: To the defense. 11 MS. RISTENPART: Thank you, your Honor. 12 CROSS-EXAMINATION 13 BY MS. RISTENPART: 14 Ms. Roberts, I'm going back to Exhibit Number 15 87. 16 Α Uh-hum. 17 And I just want to be very clear. 18 information that I'm marking in the red box that says 19 individual's first, last name, date of birth, license 20 plate, VIN numbers, that doesn't come up in the initial 21 search. Correct? 22 They could search by any of those items to

get to those names, so in order to do the reverse

search, I have to pull it off and then go into the

23

search log because it reports what was searched by.

Q So this -- the red box is what your search vehicle was when you're doing this rigorous search, right?

- A I pulled that up to do the research.
- Q Okay. So this exhibit's -- it's a little misleading because it's not exactly what's seen on the computer screen if someone typed in that plate number and what information came up. Right?

A Correct. They could — they could take the search from that plate to other tabs on the same screen. This is screen comes up and got five tabs across, the data like the demographic data, the vehicle registration data, all of that comes after they type in that search item.

Q But we don't have any indication that the other tabs were actually even open or clicked on. Right?

A No, this doesn't. Again, they are opened or clicked on them.

Q And this search particularly was just for a license plate search that occurred on October 26 of 2017. Right?

A Correct.

1 It wasn't for a name. Right? Q 2 The name will come up with the vehicle 3 information. Excuse me, with his. 4 Q The search itself was only for license plate 5 number. Right? 6 Correct. But with the result pop up that Α 7 plate will be there with its --8 You have the option of search by name. 9 Right? 10 Yes. 11 Okay. Because when we saw on the second page Q 12 of that exhibit, that it was searched on September 14th 13 of 2017, it looked like? 14 Uh-hum. Α 15 And it was done by a driver's license number 16 as we pointed out. Right? 17 Α Correct. 18 And then it does look like there was some 19 transactions that day for that person, driver's license 20 number for a temporary moving permit. Right? 21 Α Correct. 22 And one was issued for that person. Correct? 23 I'm just looking at the information. It

looks like a completed transaction, the vehicle ID was

1 put in. Correct.

1.5

Q And again, this information in the red box, that is not, again, what pops up on even this screen, this is the search term that you put on?

A The information returned with the driver's license would return with the person, but yes, this is the information that I searched to -- to do the research.

Q So I really want to be clear here because, again, this exhibit is a little -- let me just -- confusing to me, but if you typed in a driver's license number and searched for that that came back to Luz Linares-Castillo as you saw, you kind of highlighted it here right here (indicating)?

A Uh-hum.

Q This other information of Arturo Manzo-Reyes would not come up --

A Correct.

0 -- under this search?

A Correct.

Q And despite the fact that is office policy to not use each other's terminals at the DMV, it does sometimes happen. Right?

A I have never done it. It's a state policy.

1 It's a security policy and everyone signs a thing that 2 says they will not do it. You don't share passwords or 3 log-ins. 4 I know you have never done it, Ms. Roberts, 5 but it's happened before. 6 I don't know of any example where it does. 7 If they do, then they -- be claiming under that policy 8 that they violated it which I think is a crime in the 9 state of Nevada. But I don't know. 10 Okay. But again, you were in Carson, you 11 were nowhere near Galetti? 12 I've been in Galetti multiple times. Α 13 You just said that you worked in Carson. 0 14 I worked at the Carson City DMV. I don't Α 15 work at the counter. 16 You were not day-to-day operation at the 17 Galetti DMV, were you? 18 Correct. Α 19 MS. RISTENPART: No further questions, your 20 Honor. 21 THE COURT: Is there any redirect examination? 22 MR. LEE: None, your Honor. 23 THE COURT: Thank you. You're free to leave.

Ladies and Gentlemen, we're going to take our lunch

5	Josh Watson.
6	COURT CLERK: Please raise your right hand.

8	DETECTIVE JOSH WATSON,
9	called as a witness herein, being first
10	duly sworn, was examined and testified
11	as follows:

13	COURT CLERK: Thank you.
14	THE COURT: Be seated everyone, please. To
15	the State.
16	DIRECT EXAMINATION
17	BY MR. LEE:
18	Q Detective, could you please give us your
19	first and last name?
20	A Josh Watson. W-a-t-s-o-n.
21	Q And what do you do for a living?
22	A I work at the Reno Police Department.
23	Q In what capacity?
24	A I am a detective in the Computer Crimes Unit.

1	Q How long is that it's a police officer
2	position, correct?
3	A Yes.
4	Q How long have you been a police officer?
5	A Eighteen years and seven days.
6	Q How about a Detective, how about in the
7	computer crimes what unit again?
8	A Computer Crimes Unit.
9	Q About how long have you been working in the
10	Computer Crimes Unit?
11	A Full time for four years plus.
12	Q How about your involvement within that?
13	A Approximately ten years.
14	Q Before full-time position in the Computer
15	Crimes Unit were you in a different unit?
16	A Yes, a couple.
17	Q Tell us what those were.
18	A I was in the family crimes, Domestic Violence
19	Unit, as well as the Sex Crimes Child Abuse Unit.
20	Q In the Reno Police Department how many
21	individua;s are in your unit full time?
22	A One.
23	Q Just you?
24	A Just me.

Q Do you have any training or education that qualifies you to do the work that you do in your unit?

Q Explain that if you could.

A Nearly a thousand hours of various trainings from all different kinds of entities to include the US Secret Service computer school, the NCFI.

Q Do you have experience as well in running or investigating computers, cell phones, other media storage and means?

A Yes.

Α

Yes.

Q Give us an idea of what experience you have.

A Close to 2,000 examinations of computer tablets, cell phones, DVR cemented video games systems, pretty much anything that holds data, as well as cell phone record deciphering and mapping.

Q Explain that. What do you mean cell phone record deciphering and mapping?

A So they're called CDs, detailed records in various locations associated with certain times or certain transactions with cell phones, plotting those within a map and being able to go through those and understand and present what that data looks like.

Q Is one of the phone -- do you use certain

programs to help pull or extract data from a cellular telephone?

A Yes.

- Q What's the programs, the one you use?
- A Cellebrite.
 - Q Tell us about Cellebrite a little.

A Cellebrite is a standalone unit. It's its own computer in which you connect a mobile device, not just cell phones and tablets and other potential devices, that extract, pulls the data from that device in different formats or in different levels, and then we use its adjoining program that is Cellebrite physical analyzer to analyze that data.

- Q And so does it extract all the data from a phone?
- A I can't say that it extracts all but everything that it can get, yes.
 - Q And then does it organize it?
- A Yes.
 - Q And in a searchable format?
- A Yes.
 - Q With regard to Cellebrite have you found that to be reliable in your field since you've been using it?
 - A Yes.

Q And is it used throughout the country and by other experts in your field?

A Yes.

Q Tell us about what if I were to say a tower dump, what does that mean to you?

A A tower dump is a term used to describe request for transmissions that have touched or connected to a specific tower during a specific date and time and window.

Q And you're talking about a tower. How about a cell phone tower?

A A cell phone tower, yes.

Q Now, if a person was to get a search warrant to obtain a tower dump information would it have to be pretty narrow, the time? Let me ask it a better way.

You'll easily find information would it have to be pretty narrow or if you didn't narrow it by date would it just be a lot of information?

A Yes, it would be -- even narrowing it by date in a small window of time it tends to be a lot of information depending on how busy that tower has been.

Q So if a tower dumps the information that pulls is one?

A Is what?

Q What is that information?

A It's going to show date and times for various connections of devices, cell phones or other devices that connect a sim card that connect with tower and give a generally connection time, maybe a disconnection time, what kind of connection it was, whether it was data or voice or text or other, et cetera.

Q So just to help me understand or help us all understand, if you were to use my cell phone, right, and look up on the internet would I be using a tower -- Assuming I'm not on WiFi would I be using a tower?

A Yes.

- Q And which tower would I be using?
- A Most often the closest tower.
- Q But not always?
- A Not always.
- Q Let me show you a series of exhibits,

 Detective. I'm going to show you Exhibits 88 through

 91. If you don't mind taking a look at those and we've

 -- when you've had enough time, look up to me, please.
 - Have you had sufficient time?
- A Yes.
- Q In fact, on all these pages do your initials appear?

1 Not all of them. Α Take a look at it, at least the majority of 2 3 them, or at least on each exhibit do your initials 4 appear? 5 Yes, on each exhibit my initials appear. Α 6 Have you seen these before then? 7 Α Yes. 8 First of all, were you aware of the tower 9 dump by search warrant through AT&T? 10 Α Yes. 11 Was this for any connection involving a phone Q 12 with a telephone number assigned to a Yiovannie Guzman? 13 I don't recall which -- yes. Yes. Α 14 I'm sorry? Q 15 Yes, sir. Α 16 And was it received with a phone number 775 17 313-1807? 18 Yes. Α 19 And from your investigation and also looking 20 at Mr. Guzman's phone later did you learn that that's 21 his number? 22 Α Yes. 23 So this first Exhibit 88 shows a lot of data.

What is that in general terms?

1	A That's a tower.
2	Q Exhibit 89 is a map with a location drawn on
3	it. What is that in general terms?
4	A That indicates the location of the tower, or
5	a tower.
6	Q Exhibit 90 is now a satellite image, it
7	appears, of the same rough area; is that correct?
8	A Yes.
9	Q Does that indicate the same thing?
10	A Yes, it indicates location of the tower.
11	Q And then lastly, a photograph appears in 91.
12	What is that?
13	A That's the tower that's indicated on the maps
14	previously.
15	MR. LEE: Move to admit, your Honor, 88
16	through 91.
17	MS. RISTENPART: No objection.
18	THE COURT: 88 through 91 are admitted, Ms.
19	Clerk.
20	COURT CLERK: Thank you.
21	(Exhibits 88-91 are admitted into evidence.)
22	BY MR. LEE:
23	Q Showing you Exhibit 89. Tell us what we're
24	looking at here.

1	A	That is a Google map of a specific tower
2	location.	
3	Q	Where is the tower?
4	A	It's where that red can I do the drawing
5	on this sc	reen?
6	Q	Please.
7	A	It's in the middle of all those dots I just
8	made.	
9	Q	If I give you a pen?
10	A	Thank you.
11	Q	If you hit the bottom left corner and erase
12	that?	
13	A	(Witness is marking Exhibit 89.)
14	Q	Thank you. Do you know from the mark where
15	the area c	of Parkview and Mazzone is?
16	A	Yes.
17	Q	Could you please circle that for us, the
18	intersecti	on?
19	A	(Witness circling Exhibit 90.)
20	Q	Is this the same thing but just now satellite
21	imagery?	
22	A	Yes.
23	Q	And Exhibit 91 is a specific tower that
24	you've bee	en showing?

1 Α Yes. 2 Now, moving to Exhibit 88, is this just a 3 custodian of record form from AT&T? 4 Α Yes. 5 Looking at the third page of the exhibit, do 6 your initials appear in the bottom right? 7 Yes, sir. Α 8 What's the number? 0 9 Α The phone number? 10 No. Does it say your initials and 350? Q 11 My badge number. Α 12 Thank you. So what does this page tell us? Q 13 That Yiovannie Guzman's cell phone connected Α 14 to that tower, that I indicated on the map. 15 Q At approximately what time? 16 Α This is kinda fuzzy, I can't really see. 17 If I hand you the exhibit would that be 18 easier? 19 Yes, sir. Α 20 Approximately 4 -- 3:53 a.m. local time on 21 November 2nd. 22 Q These are UTC time? 23 Α Yes.

Tell us what UTC time is.

24

Q

Ι	A It stands for Universal Coordinated Time,
2	although I recognize that the UTC is backwards, which is
3	also known as Green GMT, Greenwich Mean Time. It's a
4	zero timing in Greenwich, England.
5	Q So you have to take the time that's given on
6	the exhibit and sync it to get to the Pacific tab time?
7	A Yes, in this case subtract seven hours.
8	Q And on this there's a connection there. Is
9	it with Mr. Guzman's phone?
10	A Yes.
11	Q At 3:53 a.m.?
12	A Yes.
13	Q So what does that mean to us with regard to
14	this tower in Exhibit 91?
15	A That his phone was within range of that tower
16	and connected to that tower.
17	Q Did you also extract information from a
18	Samsung telephone with that same phone number we've
19	discussed earlier, the 775 313-1807?
20	A Yes.
21	Q Did you use Cellebrite to do so?
22	A Yes.
23	Q Do you know how the phone came into your

possession?

1	A	A detective asked me to examine it.
2	Q	Do you recall if it was by consent?
3	A	Yes, it was.
4	Q	Of Mr. Guzman?
5	A	Yes. Or no. Which phone are we talking
6	about?	
7	Q	I'm talking about Yiovannie Guzman.
8	A	Yes. Sorry.
9	Q	So by consent, meaning you give you
10	permission	to look at it?
11	A	Yes.
12	Q	And extract?
13	A	Yes.
14	Q	I'm going to show you Exhibit 92 and 93. And
15	take a lool	at those. Take as much as time as you need,
16	look up whe	en you're done.
17	F	Have you had sufficient time?
18	A	Yes.
19	Q	I'm going to start with Exhibit 92. What are
20	we looking	at in that exhibit, in general terms?
21	A	In general terms this is a portion of a
22	extraction	report from Mr. Guzman's phone.
23	Q	And a portion. What kind of portion?
24	A	This portion contains a cover sheet

1	indicating extracted information numbers, as well as a
2	section of SMS or text messages, as well as a section
3	from the call log.
4	Q And those sections or portions are arranged
5	by date?
6	A Yes.
7	Q And does it appear only pulled a certain
8	date range?
9	A Yes.
10	Q And is that what is that part of what you
11	pulled from Mr. Yiovannie Guzman?
12	A Yes.
13	MR. LEE: I move to admit.
14	MS. RISTENPART: Voir dire?
15	THE COURT: Yes. Brief voir dire.
16	VOIR DIRE
17	BY MS. RISTENPART:
18	Q Did you actually create those documents?
19	A No.
20	Q So, in fact, you just download dump of cell
21	phone, correct?
22	A That's one of the things I do, yes.
23	Q Right. And then someone else can go in and
24	selectively choose what to extract from what you

1 downloaded? 2 Α What to create a report with, yes. 3 Q And that's what generates that report, 92 and 93? 4 5 Yes. Α 6 But you did not generate those reports? Q 7 Α No. 8 MS. RISTENPART: Lack of foundation. 9 THE COURT: Supplement foundation? 10 MR. LEE: Sure. 11 BY MR. LEE: 12 Let me hand you again 92. All the 13 information that you found in Exhibit 92, does that come 14 from Yiovannie Guzman's phone? 15 Α Yes. 16 Did you check these phones or did you learn 17 that these do, in fact, on all the pages that follow the 18 initial page come from Yiovannie Guzman's phone? 19 Α Yes. 20 The collection of cell phone to SMS messages 21 are in chronological order? 22 Α Yes. 23 And do they contain the cell phone messages

from the time parameters within that?

1	A	Yes.
2	Q	Was there anything deleted from that or
3	omitted fr	om within those time parameters?
4	A	I don't know.
5	Q	You did initial these. Correct?
6	A	Yes.
7	Q	That means you've looked over them?
8	A	Yes.
9	Q	You reviewed them?
10	A	Yes.
11	Q	You reviewed them with me, actually.
12	Correct?	
13	A	Yes.
14	Q	And you by initialing them what does that
15	mean to yo	u?
16	A	That these records are true and accurate to
17	informatio	n taken from the extraction I did on Mr.
18	Guzman's p	hone.
19	Q	And then that entire extraction is provided
20	in discove	ry. Correct?
21	A	Yes.
22		MR. LEE: Thank you.
23		THE COURT: The objection is overruled. 92 is
24	admitted.	

1	COURT CLERK: Thank you.
2	(Exhibit 92 is admitted into evidence.)
3	BY MR. LEE:
4	Q First of all, Exhibit 92, the cover page, I'm
5	zeroing in on some information, it's a little fuzzy,
6	Detective, but can you see it okay?
7	A Yes.
8	Q Do you see the phone number that is
9	associated with this Samsung telephone that you have
10	ran?
11	A Yes.
12	Q Could you circle that for us?
13	A Oh, man. I'll just point at it a couple
14	times.
15	Q So that's the 775 313-1807?
16	A Yes, sir.
17	Q Okay. And then there's information at the
18	bottom that says Yiovannie, and then examiner named
19	Watson. Is that information you enter?
20	A Yes.
21	Q And what's the phone date and time that's
22	just above that?
23	A 11-16-2017 at 9:57:31 p.m.
24	Q What does that mean?

A That's the time that was indicated on the actual device when I examined it.

Q Looking at page 2 of the exhibit again, these are your initials at the top right corner?

A Yes. And badge number.

Q Now, explain to us if you could how are these messages arranged?

A There's the folder that they originate from so where it was extracted from, whether it was an inbox, so a received message with a sent box, a sent message, the party to or from in which it was sent, as well as the direction indicated, the time stamp for that message taken from the phone, presented in local time, and as I said, UTC minus seven hours. The status, whether it was read or sent, the message itself which is the text within that SMS or text message, and then what source of the extraction did it come from prior to I mentioned multiple levels of extractions and this came from logical extraction.

Q So looking at our first row, where's the content of the text message?

A On the far right.

Q Is this it? I'm circling where it says "Where you at, bro?"

A Yes.

Q Now I see under the party area it says from -- it gives a number and then a name. Where does that pull from?

A That pulls from the contacts list within the phone, so the way that the software deciphers this information when it's extracted from the device it will use if I find a number, it's 775 771-7590 is assigned to a contact name, it will match those two up, say this message came from this person within the context list on the device.

Q So in the case where it says Willow cousin, that's what some person had entered in as a name associated with that number, 771-7590?

A Yes.

Q Let me just ask you about these messages in order. Our first message, comes in at 4:28:15 a.m.

A Yes, sir.

O On November 1st?

A Yes.

Q And it's "Where you at, bro?"

A Correct.

Q Does that mean that is coming from that number from Mr. Yiovannie Guzman's phone associated with

1	Willow cousin?	
2	A Yes.	
3	Q And then we have SMS silence until 5:54 on

3	Q And then inbox from cousin Willow on row
4	seven, "No nigga, I've been awake this whole time".
5	Correct?
6	A Correct.
7	Q Then from Yiovannie Guzman to cousin Willow,
8	row eight, "Today I'll head over, then you can just wake
9	me up." Correct?
10	A Correct.
11	Q Then we've got a little period you have time
12	from 9:23 a.m. until 5:08 p.m. between columns 8 and 9,
13	but the messages from cousin Willow to Yiovannie Guzman,
14	what does it say?
15	A "What time you out"?
16	Q And the response?
17	A It was response
18	Q From row ten?
19	A "Six but I gotta help my dad unload some shit
20	to the casa after important day."
21	Q Let's move to the next row from Yiovannie
22	Guzman, what does the text read?
23	A "Don't forget to sleep over."
24	Q And row 13 have response?

1	A "FS. I'll head over around ten or some."
2	Q And then the response to that on row 14 from
3	Willow cousin?
4	A "If you can earlier that be better like at
5	8:30."
6	THE COURT: And with that, Ladies and
7	Gentlemen, we'll take our noon recess. Please do not
8	discuss this case amongst yourselves. Please do not
9	form or express any opinion about this matter until it's
10	been submitted to you.
11	We'll see back here at 1:45, that's almost an
12	hour and a half.
13	We'll stand for our jury.
14	(Jury recesses for lunch break.)
15	THE COURT Counsel, we'll need some time.
16	You indicated the State may close tomorrow.
17	Is that still your
18	MR. LEE: Meaning Thursday, right?
19	THE COURT: What's today, Wednesday?
20	MR. LEE: Yes.
21	THE COURT: Yes, meaning tomorrow.
22	MR. LEE: I think that still can be done.
23	We're on track for that.
24	THE COURT: Well, tomorrow's a long day. You

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said -- I'm not trying to trick you or put you in a box, I'm just trying to get a sense because yesterday you surprised me by saying we could be done Thursday morning. Are you still Thursday morning?

MR. LEE: I would have to look at things but, again, we're getting close.

THE COURT: All right.

MR. LEE: We're getting real close but I anticipate certainly tomorrow I can have a little better answer for you after lunch.

THE COURT: So today is the day where we should meet outside of the jury's presence in the event that there's any housekeeping or video work or any of that to be done in the evening. So let's plan on sending this jury home probably in the neighborhood of 4:15.

MR. LEE: Okay.

THE COURT: And counsel, we'll spend some time together after that.

MS. RISTENPART: For the issue in regards to his filing today?

THE COURT: Yes, among other things, to include instructions. I'm starting to read instructions. Now, we won't settle them but might have 1 some things to ask about instructions tomorrow.

MS. RISTENPART: I understood, your Honor,
I'll just go back and try to prepare for but I don't
know if I'll be prepared for argument on the motion this
afternoon just to let you know.

THE COURT: I'm going to plan on sending the jury home at 4:15.

MR. LEE: Thank you.

THE COURT: All right. Let me know if that changes dramatically in a way that's not right. All right. We'll see you at 1:45.

(Lunch break.)

THE COURT: The entire jury is present. The State may continue.

MR. LEE: Thank you.

BY MR. LEE:

Q Detective, where we had dropped off was looking at Exhibit 92, we were talking about a text, an SMS message conversation between Yiovannie Guzman and Willow cousin. Does that sound right?

A Yes.

Q I think we'd gotten to page 2, text message 15.

A That's correct.

- Q Now, these SMS messages, two pages worth and 23 messages?
 - A Yes.
- Q If you want to -- if you're gonna look at something and narrow it down to 23 messages such as this, how do you get to that?
- A In this case, as in most, there's a filter function, or a search function within the program so when you have all your data up, obviously you rarely want to see absolutely everything, especially if somebody has thousands and thousands of messages, so you can narrow it by either entering a phone number, which I did in this case, or the person's name, contact name, or a date range, and then narrow those things down.
- Q So on these particular ones, the 23 SMS messages, was it narrowed by phone number?
 - A Yes.
 - Q And by date range?
 - A Yes.
- Q And so you're not saying that these are all the text messages involving Willow cousin and Yiovannie Guzman.
 - A No, I'm not saying that.
 - Q Well, are these all the text messages within

1 these date ranges from the first row to the 23rd row? 2 Α Yes. 3 So I'm going to start us back, just for 4 reference, on row number 9 there is some discussion by 5 text, and I believe you already read these in "About what time you out?" Down to 10, "I gotta help my dad." 6 7 Row 12, Willow says "Don't forget to sleep over." 8 response "For sure. I'll head over around 10 or 9 something." And Willow asks "Come over earlier, 8:30." 10 Right? 11 Α Yes. 12 Okay. So that's where we are. Picking up at Q 13 row 15 now, if you can narrate that for us, would you? 14 "FS cousin with parents." Α 15 That -- that means Yiovannie sent it. Q 16 Α Yes. 17 Okay. Received from Willow cousin is "K". 0 18 Right? 19 Correct. Α 20 Row 17, does WYA mean anything to you? 0 21 Generally it means where ya at? Α 22 Q And then that is -- what direction is that

That was outgoing message followed by an

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coming from?

incoming from Willow cousin saying "My house". 1 2 Okay. And what's the next outgoing message 3 say? 4 Α It says "FS, OTW in a bit. Who's awake?" 5 How about row 20, what is cousin Willow's 6 response? 7 "Everyone. My parents should leave to the Α 8 other house, like, in an hour or so, though." 9 The question comes on row 21 "What other Q 10 house?" Correct? 11 Α Yes. 12 And Willow cousin's answer was what? Q 13 "Yeah, they sleep over there." Α 14 Q And then the last from Yiovannie Guzman "Okay 15 FS." Correct? 16 Correct. 17 With the number of text messages that you 18 have seen in your capacity as a detective do you have 19 any indication of what FS means? 20 For sure. 21 Now I'm turning to page 4 of Exhibit 92. 22 Now, this is labeled call log. Correct? 23 Α Correct. 24 Q What is this then?

1 This is a listed call log in reverse Α chronological order between those two numbers within a 2 3 certain time period. 4 That's how you search for these? 5 Α Yes. 6 So correct me if I'm wrong, Detective, you're 7 not just picking a call here and trying to marry up the 8 time picking a call there you can actually filter and 9 arranges this for you. 10 Yes. 11 And then these are all the phone calls to or 0 12 from cousin Willow and Yiovannie Guzman. Correct? 13 Yes, within that time frame. Α 14 Let me just point a few of them out. Row 11, Q 15 this is a call -- if it's outgoing does that mean it's a 16 call from Yiovannie Guzman to cousin Willow? 17 Α Yes. 18 And that's Halloween night, 11:00? 19 Yes. Α 20 And then let me draw your attention to row 721 and row 8. Correct me if I'm wrong again, these are missed calls so calls from cousin Willow? 22

To Yiovannie Guzman.

Yes.

- A Correct.
- Q On November 1st, in the 4:00 a.m. hour?
- A Yes.
- Q Now, does Cellebrite, is it able to pick up deleted messages?
 - A Sometimes.
 - Q Explain that if you could.
- A Depending on the operating system of the phone and the version of the operating system on the phone, and where those messages reside within that version of that operating system in the databases, some phones you're able to recover deleted text messages, and some phones you're not.
- Q Is it by phone or even within the same phone are there times you can and times you can't?
- A Necessarily not every -- so let's take, for example, a phone that you could potential recover text messages from, deleted text messages. There's no guarantee because of how the operating system works that you will recover all the deleted text message. You may get a portion of them. You may get parts of certain text messages, maybe not even the entire message, so because there's a finite amount of room on that phone or that device, as with a computer or another -- a tablet

or anything else, the system is constantly reusing chunks of data. So does that answer your question?

Q It does. So let me ask you a hypothetical question. If I text you would -- and none of us delete anything, ideally or in theory would Cellebrite be able to pull my phone and show the text to you?

A Yes.

Q And if Cellebrite was able to pull, extract from your phone would it show incoming text from me?

A Yes.

Q So looking at page 2 of Exhibit 92. These text messages that appear on Yiovannie Guzman's phone, if you were to obtain and extract information from the phone associated with the number 775 771-7590, what would you expect to find?

A I would expect to find these text messages if they had not been deleted.

Q I'm showing you now Exhibit 93. I think you've already looked at that but please take a look again.

A Yes, I have looked at this.

Q What is that, in general terms?

A This is a logical extraction report portion from an Apple iPhone belonging to Richard Silva.

1	Q	With that same number, 771-7590?
2	A	Yes.
3		MR. LEE: Move to admit 93?
4		MS. RISTENPART: I haven't seen it.
5		MR. LEE: I showed it to you before.
6		MS. RISTENPART: No objection.
7		THE COURT: 93 is admitted, Ms. Clerk.
8		COURT CLERK: Thank you.
9		(Exhibit 93 is admitted into evidence.)
10	BY MR. LEE:	
11	Q	So is this what do you call this page?
12	A	That's just the cover summary page.
13	Q	Just regarding the phone?
14	A	Yes.
15	Q	What kind of phone did Mr. Silva have?
16	A	An Apple iPhone.
17	Q	Now, normally can you just go as a police
18	officer down the street, grab anyone's phone and extract	
19	information from it?	
20	A	No.
21	Q	There's laws against that, right?
22	A	Yes.
23	Q	Do you recall how this phone came into your
24	possessior	1?

1 From a detective. Α 2 Q Was it by a search warrant? 3 Α No. 4 It was by consent? Q 5 Α Yes. 6 Let's look at page 2. What can you tell us 7 about timeline? 8 Timeline is -- it's a running log, if you 9 would, of the information on the device in chronological 10 order so exactly that, a timeline of all the different 11 things that are on that device from a start date until 12 the day I examine it. 13 So SMS messages? Q 14 Α Yes. 15 Q Phone calls? 16 Α Yes. 17 And even other data? Q 18 All kinds of other data. Α 19 Now, in this case how did you filter? Q 20 This was for phone calls between Yiovannie's Α 21 phone and Silva's phone. 22 Did you also look for SMS messages? 23 Α I did. 24 Q Did you find any?

1	A No.
2	Q during this frame. Is this time frame
3	coincide with the time frame from Yiovannie Guzman's
4	phone?
5	A Yes.
6	Q Did that surprise you to not find those?
7	A Um, I would expect to have found them based
8	on the fact that I found them on the other phone.
9	Q Okay. But here they're not on Richard
10	Silva's phone.
11	A Correct.
12	Q However, the four phone calls, the call in
13	from the call log that appear, do those match up with
14	Yiovannie Guzman's phone?
15	A Yes.
16	Q So what can you say about about the fact
17	that there are missing SMS messages from the phone
18	belonging to Richard Silva?
19	A They were deleted.
20	MS. RISTENPART: Objection, speculation.
21	THE COURT: Overruled.
22	BY MR. LEE:
23	Q Could you answer it again?
24	A They were deleted.

1	MR. LEE: Thank you. That's all I have.
2	THE COURT: To the defense.
3	COURT CLERK: Exhibit 131 marked for
4	identification.
5	(Exhibit 131 is marked for identification.)
6	CROSS-EXAMINATION
7	BY MS. RISTENPART:
8	Q Detective, you were just asked a question in
9	regards to the call log on November 1st, 2017, Exhibit
10	93, compared to a call log for Yiovannie's phone, and
11	the State asked you did they match up. Right?
12	A Yes.
13	Q And you said yes.
14	A Yes.
15	Q Showing Exhibit Number 93. And this is from
16	what you reported to be Richard Silva's phone, correct?
17	A Yes.
18	Q And you see four calls, two outgoing, two
19	incoming. Right?
20	A Yes.
21	Q From all November 1st, 2017.
22	A Yes.
23	Q In Exhibit 92, which was purported to come
24	from Yiovannie's call logs, there's only three calls on

this generated report, on November 1st of 2017.

A Correct.

- Q And again, on this report, Exhibit Number 92, as you testified earlier, that you didn't actually make this report, correct?
- A I worked with -- well, that's not the report that I submitted to the District Attorney.
- Q You don't know, in fact, who made this report, right?
 - A No, I do.
- Q And these reports, as opposed to Cellebrite program, these reports can be, well, modified. Right?
- A It's a selected portion, so yes. It's not the entirety of the extraction if that's what you're asking.
 - Q Because if we're looking at page 1 of 92.
 - A Uh-hum.
- Q You can see this is a screen shot which is actually what opens as soon as you open a Cellebrite program. Right?
 - A Yes.
- Q And kind of zooming in over here

 (indicating), there are several different tabs that you

 can actually click on to that open up different things

to look at like, for example, text messages, right?

A Yes.

Q Or you could look up and look through images, right?

A Yes and no. That's -- I see where you're going. Yes, you can, okay.

Q And I know this program's a little bit more complex than I'm simplifying, right, but there's a lot you can actually do with Cellebrite.

A Yes, ma'am.

Q And when you are going through Cellebrite after you click open, let's say, on one of those tabs or you can do your own search and filter, it opens up its own separate tab with that information, and then you can further filter or search within that topic or tab, right?

A Yes.

Q So let's just say I clicked on -- I don't know. Call log, right? Which is what we were just talking about.

A Yes.

Q And it would be a new tab, and then I wanted to filter it to, let's say, November 1st of 2017.

Right?

- A Okay.
- Q And then I want to filter it further by doing only certain phone calls to a certain person on that day, right?
 - A Okay.
- Q Then it opens up a new tab where thereupon, I can actually go in and manipulate it and click a check box on or off whatever I want to export into a PDF, generate a report which is Exhibit Number 92. Right?
 - A Yes.
- Q So I can choose, or whoever's making this report can choose what you leave in and what you take out.
 - A Correct.
- Q Which, Detective, you can agree with me would change possibly what someone was seeing in generating a report, right, which was actually on the Cellebrite?
- A It's a representation of a portion of the data from the entirety of the data.
- Q And I could put hypothetically omit text messages with this method, right, if I just didn't click on that one?
 - A Yes. Hypothetically you could.
 - MS. RISTENPART: With the Court's permission

I'd ask that Detective Watson be allowed to use the laptop for some demonstrative evidence?

THE COURT: How do you anticipate you will use it? Is he going to join you in the well of the court?

MS. RISTENPART: Correct, your Honor.

THE COURT: Let's begin by that, yes, that is approved so far. If you'll join counsel in the well of the court, Mr. Lee, you may also stand by and observe, if you like. Ms. Ristenpart.

MS. RISTENPART: Thank you, your Honor.

THE COURT: Let me know what's going on as it unfolds, please.

MS. RISTENPART: I'm just trying to switch off our -- this is just a document screen, okay.

Can I get Exhibit Number 131 for demonstrative purposes?

THE COURT: Yes. Oh, you do have it.

MS. RISTENPART: I do, yes.

THE COURT: Go right ahead.

MS. RISTENPART: And just for the record, I'm not displaying this to the jury at this time. I'm just asking that Detective Watson be allowed to use this with the computer.

BY MS. RISTENPART:

1 What did you see as soon as the thumb drive Q 2 for Exhibit 11 popped up? 3 Α I see two folders. 4 Q And how's the first one labeled? 5 17-23530, Bernard Silva-Guzman. Α 6 And the second one? 0 7 Richard Silva report 2017-11-17.12-53-43. Α 8 And if I click into the folder on Bernard 9 Silva-Guzman, what do you see? 10 Three folders. 11 If I click into the one labeled report, what 12 do you see? 13 I see a folder containing a report, or 14 labeled as containing a report. 15 Q And if I click that one open? 16 Α It's a phone, cell phone model report. 17 What is that? 0 18 SM-G935B Galaxy S7H. Α 19 And Detective, you were the one who actually Q 20 did the Cellebrite of Bernard Silva's cell phone. 21 Correct? 22 Α Yes. 23 And then if I click that one open, what do I

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see next?

17	Q If you click open UFED reader.	
18	A It will take a minute.

22	Q You see a program opening called Cell	ebrite

THE WITNESS: Sorry. Which is the text message portion commonly referred to. Then once that has populated indicating the totality of the text messages on the device, I opened a time-stamp sorting filter, and I'm going to enter dates --

BY MS. RISTENPART:

- Q October 24th of 2017, to November 1st of 2017.
- A So what I've selected in the filter is the

from date of 10-24-2017 at 12 a.m., to -- or the to date of 11-1-2017 at 11:59:59 seconds p.m. And I'm going to click okay. And it will sort and only show the messages in that time frame.

- Q Okay. And that also actually gives you a number for the amount of messages in time frame, right?
 - A Yes.

- O And what is that number?
- A One thousand nineteen.
- Q Now, within this tab as we talked about you can further search to only look for a certain phone number or even a contact name, correct?
 - A Correct. That's called the table search.
- Q So if you typed in Lucy, L-u-c-y space x space wife, w-i-f-e with an asterisk, would that filter through text messages during this time frame to and from that person?
- A Yes, if that person's contact name was within this phone and associated with the phone number in question.
 - Q See if you type in Lucy ex-wife asterisk.
 - A Is it one word ex-wife, two words?
 - Q It's a space x space wife asterisk.
 - A And you want the asterisk on it.

1	Q Yeah. If you search by a phone number is	
2	that maybe better than with the asterisk?	
3	A The asterisk	
4	Q Doesn't make sense?	
5	A generally indicates a wild card.	
6	Q Okay. So let's do by phone number 775	
7	276-7331.	
8	A 775 276-7331?	
9	Q Correct. And so of that when you filtered	
10	through how many text messages were between that time	
11	frame from and to Bernard's phone from that phone	
12	number?	
13	A Five hundred fifty-four.	
14	Q Now you can filter even further through that,	
15	and you can only look for text messages that are	
16	outgoing, correct?	
17	A Yes.	
18	Q Meaning text messages that Bernard or this	
19	phone is sent to that phone number.	
20	A Correct.	
21	Q During that time frame.	
22	A Yes.	
23	Q And how would you do that?	
24	A Want me to explain how I do it for or just	

how doing it?

Q Explain how you're doing it.

A There's another -- each one of these has a column which denote, say, the number, whether it was ingoing, outgoing, the time stamp, whether it was delivered, read, missed, et cetera, and you can filter each one of those columns out. And it can sort just -- it can sort everything, and in this case it can sort just incoming and just outgoing. And you wanted which?

- Q Just outgoing. And what's the number of just outgoing messages from this Bernard Guzman's cell phone to the phone number associated with Lucy ex-wife between 10-24 to November 1st?
 - A Three hundred twenty-five.
 - Q Can you do the same with a call log?
- A Yes.
 - Q If you went back and did the similar for a call log for phone calls from Bernard's cell phone to Lucy x wife?
 - A Would you like me to do that?
 - Q Sure. For the same time frame, 10-24 to November 1st.
 - A You want to go 10-25 this time? Or 10-24.
 - Q We'll do 10-24 to keep it the same.

THE COURT: Ladies and Gentlemen, at this time we're going to take a recess, it will be at least 20 minutes. So if you want to go outside, breathe fresh air, you may do so. If you do leave the jury deliberation room please make sure that you are back in the deliberation for entry into the courtroom at about 2:50. It could be after that. My best guess is that we're going to be in recess for 20 minutes.

During this recess please do not discuss this case amongst yourselves. Please do not form or express any opinions about this matter until it's submitted to you. You're free to leave.

(Jury recesses for short time.)

(Outside the presence of the jury.)

THE COURT: There are two matters to discuss. First is the availability of Mr. Guzman's lawyer if Mr. Guzman is scheduled next.

And then second, accomplice. Second, what visible presence his attorney may or may not have. My understanding from the side bar is that Mr. Guzman continues to be represented by Mr. Routsis. Mr. Routsis was subpoenaed, which would push him within, presumptively, the rule of exclusion, although I can

hear from counsel about whether it applies to another attorney.

To the State, I'm familiar with the points and authorities underlying the issue, the statute and its decisional authority.

Ms. Ristenpart, do you wish to begin with arguments? How do you want to handle it?

MS. RISTENPART: So first I think the easiest matter is that it's a unique issue to an accomplice who is represented by private counsel who we did subpoena, and because we don't frankly know what Yiovannie is going to say today. But I think that his right to have counsel trumps potentially the rule of exclusion on this case, so even though I'm asking that he remain under subpoena and possibly for purposes later on depending on what Mr. Guzman claims today, that he still remain under subpoena, that he be allowed in the courtroom during his testimony.

THE COURT: And his presence in the courtroom is nondescript and nonidentity, just sit in the spectator gallery?

MS. RISTENPART: I mean, no. He's saying my attorney's right there, even me, what does that -- it doesn't seem to matter anyway for --

THE COURT: I just want to make sure I understand the boundaries.

MS. RISTENPART: Yeah.

THE COURT: I've never had accomplice testimony with an attorney present.

MS. RISTENPART: Exactly.

THE COURT: So I want to make sure I don't unintentionally step on a land mine. I do feel that if Mr. Guzman testifies that Mr. Routsis, that he should always have counsel, particularly because there is a negotiation performance that remains being established and a sentencing scheduled, so he should always have an attorney present.

Mr. Lee, should you identify the attorney or is there harm in attorney's identification during Mr. Guzman's testimony?

MR. LEE: I don't know that's harm, that's just not relevant. I've reached out to Mr. Routsis at the lunch hour and told him an expected time and asked him to be here. I'm more comfortable with him here as well.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. LEE: But whether he's identified, I don't see the relevance of that.

THE COURT: Does he sit behind the bar in the spectator gallery?

MR. LEE: I think so.

MS. RISTENPART: Your Honor, I do think that as part of he's allowed to — if he's going to be here that I'm allowed to question him that his attorney is there and present and not go into anything obviously privileged or confidential, but there is the fact that — as the Court's very well aware, that there's sentencing on April 22nd and that there is pressure on this young man.

THE COURT: I'd probably allow one question.

MS. RISTENPART: I have no problem with that.

THE COURT: I can't see the relevance but I want to yield to defense when I can.

MS. RISTENPART: Thank you.

THE COURT: So if it becomes a focus, then please stand up and object.

Let's talk about whether Mr. Guzman testifies about this conversation. Assuming he will, do you wish to preserve any arguments against his participation?

MS. RISTENPART: I do, your Honor, even with the State's proffer as to what they believe Mr. Guzman will say, the evidence that they're using, quote,

independently corroborate Mr. Guzman's statements are only corroborated by Mr. Guzman's statements meaning the cigarette butts Mr. Guzman who would say oh, yeah, Richard was smoking that day at this time behind the car in that area.

In regards to the conspiracy, Mr. Guzman is the only one who claims that there was some kind of conversation between he and Mr. Silva at some convenience store on October 31st of 2017. We've had no independent corroboration of that.

In addition, we've had no independent corroboration as to the plan itself in regards to it's only Mr. Guzman making a claim that there was some grand conspiracy between Bernard Silva, Richard Silva and himself, with the purpose to kill Luz.

So I know the State's going to stand up and harp on the cigarettes, we've heard a lot of testimony about cigarettes, and whether or not they appeared fresh, but it has to independently corroborate everything that Mr. Guzman is being proffered to testify to. And that is not independently corroborated anything. It's more of they're focusing on one thing and then trying to build Mr. Guzman's uncorroborated accomplice testimony to -- it's kind of like the chicken

and the egg situation, your Honor, for lack of a better analogy is that they are not giving independent corroboration of this actually conspiracy beyond Mr. Yiovannie Guzman's claims.

THE COURT: I want to ask a few questions before hearing from the State. Part of the challenge is that we are mid trial, and I anticipate that other independent corroboration may be presented to the Court for admission to the jury, specifically, a jail recorded telephone call, and a recorded conversation between Mr. Silva and his brother.

How do I efficiently consider or exclude from consideration evidence I'm aware of but not yet before this jury?

MS. RISTENPART: So because the State has elected to call Mr. Guzman in the middle of trial with what they believe, and they told you, your Honor, because we had this discussion, I believe it was on Friday, as to well, where is he gonna call a witness with this accomplish testimony motion. And the State said that he would be towards the end because we'll be putting on the corroborating evidence ahead of time.

Now, in regards to the Court's question, the evidence before the Court before making this decision is

what is the evidence that should control. And that even if we don't even know if the State is going to get in that evidence, I know the Court has made some rulings, but now we're having reopening rulings, and the way the case law is written on uncorroborated accomplice testimony is that the Court does not allow that testimony unless there's independent corroboration before it goes on.

THE COURT: So your position, then, is that an evidentiary proffer would be insufficient. Because the State can stand and proffer what it intends to.

MS. RISTENPART: Correct.

THE COURT: I want to ask about some specific evidence and whether you contest or concede it corroborates. Detective Kazmar talked about motive. That may or may not be independent corroboration. Let me step back.

The purpose behind NRS 175.291 is to prevent two accused from pointing the finger at each other, or one pointing the finger at the other without some external corroboration of those cross-allegations. So Detective Kazmar talked about motive. We do have DNA evidence — well, we have cigarettes, not DNA, excuse me. We have a general description of a — provided by

an early witness in which he saw somebody wearing a black hoodie turn away from him at a very tenuous but existent description, and then we have now text messages that have some significance. I don't apply weight, I just determine if there's any external corroboration.

Do any of those constitute corroboration?

MS. RISTENPART: For parts of Mr. Guzman is what I anticipate going to claim based upon what he told police, but not the full corroboration. And that's — the heart of this is this conspiracy statement. And I politely disagree with the Court as to accomplice testimony. The case law isn't about preventing two individuals from pointing the finger at each other. The reason for it having corroborated accomplice testimony before allowing it is because it's so highly suspect.

In this particular situation, from a life imprisonment case with a deadly weapon consecutive enhancement, down to a conspiracy with battery with a deadly weapon, and a pending sentencing where he must, quote, testify truthfully and cooperate with the State, this is the — this is exactly why the courts have said there has to be some kind of independent corroboration before it goes on.

THE COURT: Well, I accept your proposed

front, and I admire the spirit in which it was given by you, and I will disagree about how we describe the purpose of NRS 175.

The corroboration in the Court's opinion is necessary so that two accused don't just cross-allege against another, there has to be something.

All right. To the State, what am I missing besides my short list of what could be construed as accomplice testimony, and the legal significance of the evidence to be proffered but not yet admitted.

MR. LEE: So first of all, your Honor, I found no authority that says a witness is precluded from testimony beforehand. I get the practicality, perhaps it makes sense, but really it's just a verdict can't be had. That's all the statute says.

THE COURT: A burden can not be had?

MR. LEE: A verdict can not be had on the testimony of an accomplice alone. It doesn't say an accomplice may not testify until it's corroborated.

THE COURT: Well, let me just have you -- I want to pause there because I've now read the jury instructions and you have proposed an instruction consistent with this law. Let me look at it.

A conviction shall not be had on the testimony

of an accomplice, unless it is corroborated by other evidence. And with the -- without the testimony -- which in itself without the testimony tends to connect the defendant.

All right. I understand your argument.

MR. LEE: So that's just one issue. If we were to take it even further, I think the defense is reading of 175.291 is very broad. I mean, every single statement of Mr. Guzman's testimony must be independently corroborated, that is not what the substitute says one bit.

Here it is looking for some type of corroboration. It's a low standard, I'm trying to find the exact term here, your Honor, just give me one moment.

First "The evidence need not in itself be sufficient to establish guilt. It can be taken from the evidence as a whole direct or circumstantial, but it has to only tend to connect", not connect but just tend to connect him with the crime.

And so here what we have is a lot of things going on, even so far what we have in evidence, and I'm just painting a broad stroke, but I'd ask the Court to look at all the evidence together, that's what it

permits.

We have cigarette butts. And the NXT, we have Mr. Silva linked to these NXT cigarettes. There has been testimony of the YSTR coming back to a male member of the family of Bernard. We have him on video stepping out of a gray SUV six hours before the murder, as a passenger in a gray SUV. That gray SUV was almost identical to that seen at the crime scene by an independent witness who, unbeknownst to him, was following the vehicle, meaning he didn't intend to follow, he just happened behind it. But we have him there so, obviously, we know there's another person involved at least six hours before, he's wearing the similar clothing, dark hoodie, and that's pretty broad, but again, tending to connect and looking at everything together.

And then we have text messages indicating a conspiracy, a tie to Mr. Guzman and Mr. Silva, all of which — I think one of those is enough. Altogether, it's certainly not this, it certainly tends to connect, and the location of the cigarette butts, and the denial of him ever being in this area before, it certainly tends to connect. Apart that, I'm sorry, sometimes my mind goes faster than my mouth, let me think for just a

moment.

I do agree, I do think that you can use a proffer at this point. The Court's well aware of the evidence that's gonna be coming in shortly, the Court's made some rulings on that evidence and I think it would be absurd to say we can not consider that evidence here. But I don't think we need to in this case. I think there's plenty.

THE COURT: I don't have Mr. Guzman's Guilty
Plea Memorandum right in front of me. Would you remind
me of the two crimes that he entered the guilty plea?

MR. LEE: He plead guilty to a --

MS. RISTENPART: Your Honor, I should have this marked as an exhibit already. If I may approach.

THE COURT: Sure. I'd like to see it.

MR. LEE: Your Honor, he pled to a Conspiracy to Commit Murder and a Battery with a Deadly Weapon.

THE COURT: Right.

MS. RISTENPART: Exhibit Number 120 I'm showing you.

THE COURT: Thank you. This is not the time to settle instructions, but I'm going to take advantage of the jury's absence because I am working on instructions now. I have several notes lined up with

the conspiracy and aiding and abetting instruction, and I intend to ask about that later, but you both mentioned conspiracy.

As I review the information in this B case, and consider lesser includeds, how is it that Mr. Silva conspired with Mr. Guzman -- you know what, as I'm speaking I'm listening to my inner voice. I'm going to stop and lose all the jury instructions.

Anything else to add on the -- of Mr. Guzman's participation at trial as an accomplice witness?

MR. LEE: Nothing, your Honor.

MS. RISTENPART: No, your Honor. We'll submit it.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you to the State for adding a few additional items to include the witness description of the vehicle when viewed with the video evidence of the actual vehicle Mr. Silva was in, I find that Mr. Guzman can testify as an accomplice, that his participation does not violate NRS 175.291 or its decisional authorities.

MS. RISTENPART: Lastly, your Honor, before we proceed, you know that the State turned over pursuant to the court order some of Mr. Guzman's jail phone call records?

THE COURT: Yes.

MS. RISTENPART: I ask that I be allowed to inquire about a phone call on February 18th of 2020, between Mr. Guzman and his mother, Sylvia Guzman, where mom instructed Mr. Guzman "Don't worry about anything, there's nothing they can do to take it away", referring to the plea deal.

Also on January 30th, at -- the call number is 0725, Mr. Guzman talks with his family, specifically his mother, Sylvia, again about the District Attorney visiting him and talking to him and about there's reference to an email that was sent to the family about the deal.

I will note, your Honor, even though I requested it the Court had ordered the jail phone logs and I was -- and I never received any of the email correspondence that Mr. Guzman was sending or receiving while in custody.

Lastly, your Honor, I would ask that a phone call from, again, January 30th, it's 3536, Mr. Guzman informs his mother "Ain't nobody really know, because I can not say anything over the phone".

THE COURT: You will be allowed to examine, cross-examine the witness based upon those telephone

calls.

MS. RISTENPART: Thank you.

THE COURT: Now, I'll just say in advance remember, I just listened to my own inner voice about instructions and I'm overriding that inner voice. The State has proffered an objection. It is -- excuse me, an instruction. It is Instruction Number 22 which this Court customarily gives, but to which the defense has objected in this case.

That instruction is "It is not improper for the attorneys to have interviewed witnesses prior to trial in this case. The practice of interviewing witnesses before trial is expected and completely proper under Nevada law."

I just want to get a sense for what your objection to that instruction is because I believe that your cross-examination is going to include conversations Mr. Guzman might have had with the State. So what is your objection to this? I'm just trying to avoid any unintended law.

MS. RISTENPART: Well, the case law that's cited is not anywhere even near the 9th Circuit let alone the State of Nevada, your Honor. And, particularly, you actually drilled down into the case

law, and I don't have it before me, but I believe it's the third case that's quoted by the State, they're talking about the use of pictures, and being shown pictures to a witness prior to testimony, nothing about questioning or meeting privately with witnesses and/or questioning them so it's far beyond the scope.

I do have notes on the other cases, I just don't have before me the jury instructions.

THE COURT: All right.

MS. RISTENPART: But that's -- I have numerous objections to it.

THE COURT: All right. Yes.

MR. LEE: About that instruction. Judge, there's been questions pushing in bad faith I'm gonna say, malfeasance on my part, there's zero evidence of that. But what your Honor doesn't see are the facial expressions of counsel, the walking back and looking at me and shaking head of counsel, it's inferring something to the jury that there is zero evidence of because there isn't any evidence of it. It's pure showmanship, it's discourteous at the very least, but violates a duty of candor.

And I know she's going to attack him, and she can. But the facial expressions, the smirks, the

surprise looks, the shaking her head at me for nothing, for something I didn't even do, she's trying to paint a picture that I'm coaching testimony. If she can draw that out, great. But she can not testify in front of this jury by shaking heads and making weird looks —

THE COURT: All right.

MR. LEE: -- and especially at me.

THE COURT: My response rises higher than Mr.

Lee's comment about Ms. Ristenpart specifically. I

don't invalidate what you're saying. I don't validate

it, I simply don't acknowledge it. I'm going higher

than that. Justice Scalia wrote a book entitled "Making

Your Case". One of the things he said was "To be

persuasive an attorney must be likable".

In every court drama, regardless of who the attorneys are, includes various forms of nonverbal communication.

This is a form of theater, and attorneys will often anticipate and regulate and carefully present themselves to the jury.

I am not going to start issuing prior restraint on personality. I would do so against incivility, but both of you may present to this jury any way you want with its risks and rewards.

t.o--

I anticipate a spirited cross-examination of Mr. Guzman. Anything less would be unacceptable.

You can be certain, Mr. Lee, that I am going to offer some form of instruction that describes your ability to meet with your witnesses. And then you can argue it however you want after it's given to the jury, but I'm not going to say anything beyond that, the record's been made.

I think we have five minutes at most?

Mr. Silva, are you okay? Do you need a chance

THE DEFENDANT: I'm good, sir.

THE COURT: You okay?

THE DEFENDANT: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: Counsel, I'd certainly accommodate you, just coordinate with Deputy Coss so that you can be available as quickly as possible.

Α 10 Did you see them when he sent them or did you 11 see them later? 12 Later on. Α 13 I'm going to show you Exhibit -- whoops. 14 going to show you Exhibit 92 here, page 2. Now, did you 15 provide your phone to Reno Police detectives? 16 Yes, sir. 17 And you knew that they were gonna pull, 18 extract information content from your phone? 19 Α Yes, sir. 20 You did that willingly? 0 21 Α Yes, sir. 22 Now, I see here, sir, on row 1 it says "party 23 from Willow cousin". Who is that?

Richard Silva.

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Α

1 Is that how you identified him in your phone? Q 2 Α Yes, sir. 3 Q Okay. So I see it -- at 4:28 a.m., I see a 4 text from Willow "Where you at, bro? Is that a text you 5 received? 6 Yes, sir. Α 7 And you slept in. 8 Yes, sir. Α 9 So it's not for another approximately hour 10 and a half on row 2 there that you then respond "Just 11 woke up"? 12 Α Yes, sir. 13 Looking at page 4 of Exhibit 92, you 14 mentioned before that you had called Mr. Silva on the 15 Halloween night. To find out where he was at? 16 Α Right. 17 Look at row 11 here. Is this Halloween night 18 at about 11 p.m.? 19 Α Right. 20 And is this a call to your cousin, Richard 0 21 Silva?

And then moving up to row 8, 7, did Mr. Silva

try calling you in the morning at 4:26 and 4:31?

1 Correct. Α 2 So the murder didn't happen that -- that 3 early morning November 1st. Right? 4 Α No, sir. 5 And is it because of you sleeping in? 6 Yes, sir. Α 7 So was that it? 19	parents, Mr. Silva's parents told detectives that they

Did he appear at all to you worried 5 about you following through with this? 6 He told me consistently throughout the night 7 not to get cold feet. 8 All right. So what happens after that? 9 After we woke up, I went to my car and I 10 started my car before he also came to the car. 11 Where was your car parked? Q 12 Right outside his house, on the curb, not in Α 13 the driveway. 14 Q Okay. Was it parked the right way meaning if 15 you're heading west was it parked facing west? 16 Α Yes, sir. 17 Okay. 13	A Right there (indicating), took a left on
14	Kietzke Lane.
15	Q Okay. And where do you go on Kietzke Lane?
16	A I go all the way down to where it says East
17	Taylor Street.
18	Q You know what, if you push hard enough on
19	that screen, Mr. Guzman, you can draw on it actually.
20	Let's have you do that. Show us where you went.
21	A (Witness labeling on Exhibit 133 route.)
22	Q And the mom lived on Lester?
23	A Yes, sir.
24	Q Now, this is your second time being at

	Lester. C	orrect:
2	A	Correct.
3	Q	Was the red Dodge Charger there?
4	A	No, sir.
5	Q	So where did you go next?
6	А	After I didn't see it there we proceeded to
7	go to Artu	ro Manzo's house, which would be on Moana and
8	Neil.	
9	Q	So did you head at some point south from here
10	(indicatin	g)?
11	А	Yes, sir.
12	Q	Until you hit Moana?
13	А	Correct.
14	Q	Now showing you, Mr. Guzman, Exhibit 1. Take
15	a minute j	ust to orient yourself. At the top here
16	(indicatin	g), is this Moana lane?
17	А	Yes, sir.
18	Q	And then does Neil Road come off that to the
19	south?	
20	А	Yes, sir.
21	Q	Is that where you went?
22	А	Correct.
23	Q	Okay. So again with your fingers, sometimes
24	fingernail	works a little better, show us the path you

1	took.
2	A (Witness marking Exhibit 1.)
3	Q Okay. So you've drawn from Moana right onto
4	Neil, then a right or west onto Parkview. Correct?
5	A Correct.
6	Q You show a little bit of a line going up on
7	Mazzone; is that right?
8	A Correct.
9	Q How far up on Mazzone did you go?
10	A I would say I can't quite remember but I
11	would say it was where I was able to visually see Lucy's
12	car.
13	Q From here (indicating) do you remember where
14	Lucy's car was parked?
15	A Yes, sir. Somewhere around right there
16	(indicating) (Witness marking Exhibit 1).)
17	Q So you went up just enough to see her car?
18	A Correct.
19	Q Turned around?
20	A Correct.
21	Q And then where did you park?
22	A Right in front of this house (Marking
23	exhibit.)
24	Q Did you park facing which way?

1	A Facing the opposite direction of originally
2	how the car should be parked.
3	Q Okay. So just in case I may have a different
4	idea of how cars should park, tell us, describe that for
5	us.
6	A So that's an arrow.
7	Q So you parked facing east.
8	A Correct.
9	Q But on which side of the street?
10	A On that side (indicating).
11	Q On the north side?
12	A Correct.
13	Q And you said in front of that first house
14	there?
15	A Correct.
16	Q That night, showing you Exhibit 34, is this
17	the vehicle you were in?
18	A Correct.
19	Q At the time the vehicle didn't have this
20	lettering and markings, did it?
21	A Correct.
22	Q What happens then? You arrive there, what do
23	you do?
24	A I turn the car off and we sit and wait until

she comes around the corner at the stop sign.

Q This is Luz?

- A Lucy, right.
- Q And so you turn the car off and waited. Do you know about how long you waited?
- A Approximately, I would say, from anywhere to 30 minutes to an hour.
 - Q Okay. Did you ever exit the vehicle?
 - A No, sir.
 - Q Did Mr. Silva exit the vehicle?
- A Yes, sir.
 - Q How many times?
 - A He got out once, stayed out for a little bit, got back in the car, and then got out.
 - Q So he only entered -- reentered the car once in that time?
 - A Right.
 - Q Where was he hanging -- where was he at the times he was outside the car?
 - A He would be on the -- either on the passenger side of my car on this corner stop (indicating) , and I believe -- can't quite remember, but I believe that right there (indicating) next to the stop sign where I would be at.

1	Q So crossing Mazzone?
2	A Correct.
3	Q But you remember seeing him on this northeast
4	corner of Mazzone and Parkview?
5	A Correct.
6	Q Did Mr. Silva ever really leave your sight?
7	A When I was paying attention whenever I saw
8	him in my rear view I saw him but sometimes I wasn't
9	always in the rear view so if he did I wasn't paying
10	attention.
11	Q Did you ever see him walk headed up north on
12	Mazzone?
13	A I don't quite remember, sir.
14	Q Okay. Let me bring you now to Lucy's coming.
15	From where you're parked can you tell me from where
16	she's coming?
17	A From where I'm parked? No, not until she
18	gets closer to the corner.
19	Q Did someone alert you to her coming?
20	A Correct.
21	Q Who?
22	A Richard.
23	Q What did he say?
24	A He said "Don't get cold feet. She's coming

1 | around the corner".

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Q At some point before that did he tell you something about the timing of when he expected her to come?

A He told me that he knew the work schedule of hers, but I didn't know exactly what time it would take place.

Q Okay. So bringing you back, "don't get cold feet, she's coming"?

- A Correct.
- Q Where did he go?

A After he told me at the car he waited around this (indicating) general area, so on the corner of Mazzone.

- Q Okay. Could you see him?
- A Yes, sir.
- Q How were you looking at him?
- A My left rear view mirror.
- Q So out of the side of your car?
- A Correct.
- Q At what point did you see Lucy's car?
- A When she arrived at the stop sign.
- Q Did you see her stop at the stop sign?
- 24 A Yes, sir.

1 At that time did you know who was in it? Q 2 Α Yes, sir. 3 I mean you couldn't see in the windows, would 4 that be fair? 5 Α Correct. 6 Was it your assumption that Lucy was in it? 7 Α Correct. 8 That's just based on it's her car? Q 9 Α Correct. 10 Okay. Once she stops at that stop sign there Q 11 on Mazzone and Parkview, what happens? 12 When she stops right there at the corner, I'm Α 13 looking in my left rearview mirror, and I see Richard on 14 her driver's side window, and I see him fire the first 15 shot, but after I saw him fire the first shot I didn't 16 look again until the shooting was done. 17 How many shots did he fire, that you 18 remember? 19 Six. Α 20 0 Did you hear them? 21 Α Yes, sir. 22 Q You saw the first one? 23 Α (Nods head.) 24 Q Heard another five?

1 Α Yes, sir. 2 Do you know the order or the succession of 3 shots, the timing? 4 Α Pretty close. 5 Okay. Was there any pause between any of the 6 shots? 7 I felt -- I felt personally that there was a 8 pause between the first and the rest, but that was just 9 -- I feel because I saw that part. 10 Okay. After -- could you touch the bottom 11 left of that screen? That will delete that marking. So 12 the shooting happens. Did you see --13 Well, let me back up. Exhibit 74. Is this 14 the car you saw? 15 Α Yes, sir. 16 You see the defects to the driver window 17 there? 18 Yes, sir. Α 19 Is that in the -- at least as far as the 20 first shot that you saw, is that where it appeared Mr. 21 Silva was shooting into? 22 Α I believe so. 23 Now when -- what was the next thing you saw?

After I heard the shots fire I looked in my

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Α

1 middle rear view, and I saw that Richard was coming and I saw this red car continue on slowly towards the curb. 2 3 Q Okay. Which way did Richard get in? 4 Α The passenger side. 5 Was he -- how did he get there? Did he run, 6 walk? 7 I can't quite remember, but it was definitely 8 not walking. 9 Now, at the time when -- I'm just going to 10 draw at the intersection there there's a stop sign, you 11 say? 12 Correct. Α 13 When the red Dodge Charger pulled up did it 14 fully stop? 15 Α Correct. 16 How soon after that stop did Mr. Silva pull 17 the trigger the first time? 18 Pretty fast, I would say. 19 And I want to ask you about that. Pretty 20 fast you would say. What do you mean by that? 21 Once I saw the -- once I saw Lucy's car stop 22 at the stop sign, I would say it was in between couple 23 seconds. I would say, like, two, three seconds.

any conversation?

A To me, no.

Q And then again you said as Richard's approaching your vehicle the red vehicle rolls that way, is that correct, south?

A Correct.

Q Did you see where it ended?

A Right -- that's too far, but right there (indicating) where the curb was, like the tip of that red arrow.

Q Okay. Now, what happens next?

A Richard entered my vehicle and I turned the car on and I proceed like normal. I drive speed limit and I -- blinkers, put the blinkers on, and then I just drive away like nothing happened.

Q Why did you drive normal?

A Because Richard told me to drive as nothing would happen so it wouldn't be more suspicious.

Q Okay. So you're -- at that point you're working to obey all the laws.

Q While you were waiting did you ever see anybody approach from these buildings on the south side and walk up to a car parked on Mazzone?

- 1 Correct. Α 2 Was that -- do you remember the timing of 3 that? Long before the shooting, right before or 4 anything? 5 I don't. Α 6 Okay. Do you recall if you ever saw another 7 person south of that intersection just standing somewhat 8 just past the buildings, did you ever see that? 9 Α Correct. 10 Q A second person? 11 Α Yes. 12 Okay. Did you ever see a vehicle that as you Q 13 were pulling out, did you see a vehicle behind you? 14 Correct. Α 15 Where did that vehicle come from? Q 16 He was parked on -- facing south on this 17 building (indicating), and he did a U-turn going up 18 Neil. 19 How far was he behind you for? 0 20 Up until I hit the freeway, so he followed me 21 all the way until I made a right on the freeway.
 - A Nervous, anxious.

1 And nervous for what? Q 2 Α Nervous that they heard or saw. 3 Q And how about the individual behind you in 4 the car, how did that cause you to feel? 5 Um, I honestly thought he was gonna follow us 6 all the way. 7 Were you fairly relieved when he didn't? 8 Yes, sir. Α 9 Exhibit 76, you described six shots. Do you 10 see six bullet holes there in that window? 11 Α Yes, sir. 12 Exhibit 63, now, you never saw this 13 (indicating) area that morning or with any tape around 14 it, did you? 15 Α Correct. 16 Do you see -- there's little cones here 17 (indicating)? 18 Α Correct. 19 Do you see a sidewalk here (indicating)? Q 20 Α Yes, sir. 21 I'm pointing to the right gutter and also in 22 the right side of the page. Where were you parked 23 around that area? 24 Right here (indicating). Α

1 So you were you right in front of that Q 2 sidewalk? 3 Α Yes, sir. 4 Let me show you now Exhibit 4. During this evening recess, you are admonished not to converse amongst yourselves, or with anyone else on any subject connected with this trial. You will not read, watch or listen to any report of or commentary on the trial by any person connected with this case, or by any medium of information, including without limitation the newspaper, television, internet or radio.

You're not to perform any personal investigation, research or experimentation. You're to do no site visits or field trips.

Do not form or express any opinion on any subject connected with this case until it is finally submitted to you.

I will have a narrow -- a better explanation for the rest of the trial about noon tomorrow. In the meantime I'll have you be here for entry into the courtroom at 9:30 tomorrow morning.

Please don't make any plans or anything until you can at least hear from me at nine about where they are. All right. Good night. Thanks for being here.

(Jury is excused for the evening.)

Mr. Guzman, you may step down. The public session will now be closed. I will clear the courtroom. In a moment we're going to remain in the courtroom just to talk about actually it's an entirely different matter that I need to resolve before trial tomorrow. The challenge I have is that Mr. Silva needs to be here while his attorney argues on his behalf. I don't want to keep the jury, so let's excuse everybody but Mr. Silva and counsel and, of course, staff, on behalf of the attorneys. Good night, everybody.

(Jury recesses for the evening.)

(Out of the presence of the jury.)

THE COURT: Stand if it's comfortable, be seated at your election.

MS. RISTENPART: Thank you.

THE COURT: We've been seated all day. All right. So I'll quickly say what was said at sidebar.

 $$\operatorname{MS.}$ RISTENPART: Your Honor, I do note that ${\operatorname{Mr.}}$ Guzman is still in the courtroom.

THE COURT: I agree.

MR. LEE: I think they have to wait for some family to clear.

THE COURT: I first announced that I wasn't

inclined to do much work today. It's 4:45. We're all tired. Our reporter's been writing furiously since 8:45. There will be lengthy and possibly spirited arguments about the State's motion to reconsider. It's better to entertain those arguments tomorrow morning.

We talked about the problems with translating the portions of the recordings and video — telephone recording and video that Mr. Silva seeks to have admitted to the State under the rule of completion. The State has asked that I revisit the rule of completion because the accused can not testify by presenting his own evidence without being subject to cross-examine so there's this issue.

Counsel, will you talk for just a moment about how I can view the portions that Ms. Ristenpart contends are rule motions. There are logistics. Don't argue the motion or whether it applies or not.

MR. LEE: Well, first of all, Judge, if we have two exhibits that are video exhibits with captions embedded, I would not have an objection to the Court looking at that, that is my proposed, it's not the full of the trans -- of the copies, let's say.

So in one exhibit, just make sure I'm getting this right, Exhibit 96, it's approximately two minutes

long. What the State did is captioned some things up on the video as it goes. The entire interaction between Mr. Silva and his brother, Bernard, is roughly five minutes. And so after the two minutes it's not translated, but certainly available to look at.

THE COURT: Well, if it's in Spanish it won't have any purpose for me because I need to determine if the omitted portion provides context to that which is presented.

MR. LEE: Your Honor --

THE COURT: How much of that five minutes is even intelligible and translatable?

MR. LEE: I can't answer that. You can hear some stuff. And from my very limited I can make out some meanings but, again, in a courtroom setting like this it would be tough, I mean, part of what I'm going to bring up tomorrow is how the translator had to listen and interpret, so.

THE COURT: Is your translator available tomorrow morning?

MR. LEE: I have no idea. She was here this afternoon. But I know what she'll say about that because we've had that conversation. She'll say I'm not -- I will not be able to sit and listen to it in the

courtroom and translate.

THE COURT: When does the defense have the -- stop. All right. As to the telephone recorded recording.

MR. LEE: The telephone -- I'm sorry, and the translation itself, your Honor, is marked as Exhibit 97 of the entire portion that the State provided. As to the jail calls, that's Exhibit 99, it appears on the thumb drive. I have included the introductory in English remarks, you know, this is a recorded phone call from somebody, and then there's one snippet, off the top of my head I believe it's about 45 seconds to a minute, and it's translated the same way as captions. That translation, however, your Honor, comes in large part originally by Reno Police Department did a translation of it.

THE COURT: The entire.

MR. LEE: The entire. A translation does exist of that. My interpreter only listened to a few portions and really agreed with those portions.

THE COURT: Did or did not agree?

MR. LEE: Did.

THE COURT: So embarrassed, counsel, I have been to my Ph.D. audiologist and she said there's

nothing I can do with hearing, it's this thing.

MR. LEE: Well, I've quit wearing mine, so.

THE COURT: Do you have -- that is 90?

MR. LEE: The audio is 99. If counsel would agree I'd be happy to provide the translation from Reno Police Department. I think whether it's entirely accurate is a different story, but it certainly would give your Honor some idea to what the rest of the call says, I'd be comfortable with that.

THE COURT: I'm comfortable -- I'll hear from the defense in a moment but I'm comfortable beginning with just the Court's review of the translated call in its entirety.

But now I'm trying to -- Ms. Ristenpart, at the beginning of trial you argued the rule of completion required the admission of more exchange between your client and his brother. So certainly you have an understanding of what is intelligible and what is being said in Spanish?

MS. RISTENPART: I do, your Honor.

THE COURT: You do.

MS. RISTENPART: And I think what's really frustrating, your Honor, is that this Court made a ruling in regards to these translated statement --

exhibits that the Court -- that the State is now referring to, I believe he said it was 96 and 99.

And the Court was a very clear after watching it saying you can not use that State. Because the captions are unnecessarily emphasizing only certain portions of the translation, and also have labels on it as Bernard and Richard.

And now hearing tonight that they want to again use that somehow instead of giving a clean copy with is what we were supposed to do. That is a separate issue, I just don't know where that's going with that because I have not see a clean copy proffered by the Court -- excuse me, by the State.

The second issue as to this translation, my anticipation was that their expert who is an expert, I never argued against that, she is bilingual, she's court certified, she does in-court translation at all times, and could in-court translate what we're talking about.

It goes back to the original argument as to unintelligibility of this translated statement between Bernard and Richard. And now the State just admitted that most of it is unintelligible yet they want to cherry pick certain statements that they think their translator can hear, which was part of the issue under

federal and state law, your Honor, that the Court had to make some kind of even perfunctory finding that it's not so unintelligible that you couldn't get the contents of a statement.

THE COURT: In some way we're putting the cart before the horse.

MS. RISTENPART: Correct.

THE COURT: Because I was presented with the argument, I didn't have time to reflect and analyze as I prefer, I responded to an oral argument with an oral pronouncement.

Now that I've read the State's motion, it intrigues me, and it's possible that I was wrong. And if I was wrong, then all of this is irrelevant. And so I need -- go ahead.

MS. RISTENPART: I'm sorry. I just don't understand the State's logic. They're claiming and telling the Court that they can't understand what's in the rest of the translated statement?

THE COURT: This prosecutor gets to choose whatever evidence he wants to admit against you're client.

 $\label{eq:MS.RISTENPART:} \mbox{ I understand that, your } \\ \mbox{Honor.}$

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THE COURT: And he doesn't have the

responsibility to admit evidence that's your client's own statement unless he wants to.

If your client wants to speak to the jury that's a Constitutional choice he'll make in the future. So I don't like the word cherry pick or selective or strategy. The State, as I read the law the State has cited, really has the ability to decide what statements your client made to use against your client they fall outside the hearsay rule.

MS. RISTENPART: I would like to pause on this argument because I think this is what you said, the cart before the horse. We're just trying to get to the point of how this Court could hear the rest of the translated statement.

THE COURT: So let me make a decision on the motion then before I decide the logistics of how.

MS. RISTENPART: The motion for reconsideration.

THE COURT: Yes.

MS. RISTENPART: Your Honor, I have not had time to --

> THE COURT: I know.

MS. RISTENPART: -- read or prep for that.

THE COURT: I know. I'm suggesting you come in in the morning and argue it.

Okay. So what time should we be here in the morning?

MR. LEE: Jury's at 9:30?

THE COURT: Jury's at 9:30.

DEPUTY COSS: I just heard her comment that

she thought she was getting a fever.

MR. LEE: Could I make a suggestion?

THE COURT: Please, yes.

LEE: I think at the very least, perhaps it could be communicated to her that we are very aware of her schedule, that's a consideration that the Court is taking quite often daily even, and seeing where it progresses, perhaps just to put her at ease and leave it at that. pay attention? I hear that regularly. And the fact is I would have excused her for cause if there would have been a request because she has a nondiscretionary fixed event and she could just serve another time, but neither one of you made the request and I didn't want to do anything on my own. She has participated virtuously. She's been here every day on time, she hasn't been a distraction, she hasn't caused anything in the jury deliberation room, so I want to honor what she's given us so far and I'd like a suggestion.

Deputy Coss, in the morning at 9:25 we'll bring her in alone and I'll try and put her at ease.

DEPUTY COSS: Understood.

THE COURT: I'll also hear from her in front of the attorneys and Mr. Silva about whether she has made adjustments to her plane and at some point I'm going to have to make the call whether I discharge her as an alternate. If the defense case rests tomorrow at close of business will the State have any rebuttal case to present?

MR. LEE: Obviously it depends, but right now I don't anticipate, but we'll see what happens.

THE COURT: So would your request be that we go into instructions and arguments and deliberations on

Friday?

MR. LEE: I would hope we could settle instructions tomorrow, depending on what time we finish. Just because that would aid in my presentation of my closing, but. So if we have time tomorrow I'd love to put that out there and do that, otherwise, it's fine Friday, I'd love to get it done before the weekend if we can.

THE COURT: Let's stop writing because I now know we're over talking about that particular juror.

I do feel that this is the State's attempt to reopen argument that has already been settled by the Court, specifically with regards to the translated portions that they want to use in front of the jury and more even specifically the captions that they had used that the Court had already made a ruling on saying that they had to have a clean copy for court, they couldn't have --

THE COURT: I want to ask about that, because you said that yesterday, but I thought I was all over the
