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

9 Those are the allegations that we have proceeded upon 10 and what you'll hear throughout the course of this trial.

11 Thank you for your time and attention. I appreciate 12 it.

13 All right. Thank you, Mr. Giordani. THE COURT: 14 Ladies and gentlemen, in a moment, counsel for the 15 defense will introduce themselves to you along with their 16 client. An accused in a criminal case is never required to 17 present any evidence or to call any witnesses. However, if 18 there are any witnesses who may be called those names will be 19 given to you at this time.

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1 her helping us out in court.

Mr. Brown has entered a plea of not guilty to all of the charges set forth by the State. As the Judge just told you, the defense is never required to put on any evidence or any witnesses. THE COURT: All right. Thank you.

Ladies and gentlemen, the clerk is now going to call
the roll of the panel of prospective jurors. When your name is
called, please answer present or here.

22 THE COURT: Is there anyone whose name was not 23 called?

Ladies and gentlemen, the questioning of the jury at the beginning of the case is done under oath. If you would all

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please rise, the clerk will administer the roll -- the oath, 1 2 excuse me, to the panel of prospective jurors. 3 (Prospective jurors sworn.) THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Please be seated. 4 5 Ladies and gentlemen, we're about to commence 6 examination of prospective jurors in this case. During this 7 process you will be asked questions bearing on your ability to 8 sit as fair and impartial jurors. The Court, the lawyers and 9 everyone involved in this case are all deeply interested in 10 having this matter tried by a jury composed of 14 open-minded 11 people who are completely neutral and who have no bias or 12 prejudice toward or against either side. 13 In order for us to accomplish this, it is necessary 14 for me to ask you some questions. The attorneys will also be

11 For me to dark you some questions. The detorneys will drive be 15 given the opportunity to ask you some questions. Please 16 understand that it is not our desire to pry unnecessarily into 17 your personal lives although the questioning can at times 18 become quite personal. Our only objective is to ascertain 19 whether there is any reason why any of you cannot sit as 20 completely fair and impartial jurors if you are selected to 21 serve in this case.

It is important that you understand the significance of full, complete and honest answers to all of the questions we are about to ask you. I caution you not to try to hide or withhold anything touching upon your qualifications to serve as

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a juror in this particular matter as that fact could
 contaminate your verdict.

I'm going to ask you a series of questions, and if you wish to respond to any of the questions in the affirmative, please raise your hand, and when I call on you please state your name and your badge number for the record.

And I see no hands.

7 Ladies and gentlemen, this case is expected to last 8 through the end of this week and up until at the very latest 9 Friday, December 20th. We will be off for the weekend, and 10 we will be dark on Monday. I know that's inconvenient for many 11 people. Obviously people are going to have to miss work. We 12 live in a community where many people work in the service 13 industry or the construction industry or the casino industry 14 and may not make their full wages or won't be making their tip 15 income. I simply can't excuse people solely for the reason 16 that they'll be missing work or won't be making their full 17 income if they're serving.

Having said that, I will ask if it would be an
extreme or undue hardship for any of you to serve as a juror
through Friday, December 20th?

All right. I see no hands.

All right, ladies and gentlemen, you are in our second group, Group B of prospective jurors. We began jury selection with a larger group of jurors yesterday. In a moment our bailiff, Officer Hawkes will be bringing in the other group

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of jurors, and we will resume the questioning of those jurors. At some point during the process some jurors will be excused and some of you may take their places, and you will be asked the more specific questions that you're about to hear me ask and the lawyers ask.

6 Listen to the questions as we're asking the questions 7 because you may be called up to take one of these chairs, and 8 we'll just be asking the same questions of you. So the process 9 can be sped up if you know and anticipate the kind of 10 information that we're looking for. And once again, the 11 questions we're asking are all part of the process designed to 12 make sure that we have a completely fair and impartial juror --13 jury and that our jurors have no bias or prejudice toward or 14 against either side.

So in a moment Officer Hawkes will be bringing inthose other jurors, and then we can resume the process.

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2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Yes. Yeah, first time
3 offense.

THE COURT: Okay. Any feelings as to how your sister was treated in the justice system?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: I know she was my sister.
I love her, but no, I mean, she did the crime so she had, you
know, face -- pay the price for it.

9 THE COURT: Okay. Do you have any friends or family 10 that either work in law enforcement or the legal field?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: No.

12 THE COURT: All right. Mr. Giordani, Mr. Dickerson,
13 you may follow up with all of the people --

14I'm sorry, what race or ethnicity do you identify?15PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Caucasian.

16 THE COURT: All right. Now, you may follow up.

17 Thank you. All right. Good afternoon MR. GIORDANI: 18 everybody. As you probably gathered so far, the goal of this 19 whole thing is to get a group of individuals on our jury that 20 can be fair and impartial and can follow the law. That's all 21 we want out of this. Both sides can agree. It might be the 22 first thing and the only thing we agree on in this case, but we 23 certainly will agree that we just want people that can be fair 24 and impartial to both sides and follow the law as it's given by 25 the Judge.

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Many of the questions that the Judge asked you go to kind of who you are and your background as individuals, and I'm going to ask you some kind of broader questions, but they have to deal with your insights and your feelings about not only the criminal justice system, but also law enforcement and kind of crime in general.

7 There are some basic tenets of our justice system 8 here in the United States, and you're going to hear a whole lot 9 about them if you get selected as a juror, and I'm just going 10 to go through a couple of them briefly and make sure we're all 11 on the same page.

So everyone here, me, you, Judge, the defendant Mr. Brown, everyone in this room is entitled to a trial by jury; right? If you're accused of something by the State, which is Mr. Dickerson and myself in this case, then you're entitled to a trial by juror -- jury, and you're entitled to a jury that will not prejudge the case in any way.

Obviously, you guys all have unique experiences in your lives. Over the course of your lives you've been involved maybe as a victim or accused of something or you know people who have.

In this particular case, can everyone here, at least you first 32 and we may get to you folks later, but the first 32, can everyone agree with me that Mr. Brown should be entitled to the presumption of innocence? Everyone agrees with

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that?

Does anyone have an issue with that or think, well now because he's sitting there he's probably guilty or there's something, there's something there? Can everyone agree that he like everyone else is entitled to the presumption of innocence? It looks like everyone's nodding. We have a burden of proof. We the State,

8 Mr. Dickerson and I have this -- the burden of proof in this 9 case like we do in every criminal case, and that burden is 10 beyond a reasonable doubt. That is the same standard that 11 applies to all criminal cases whether it's a traffic citation 12 or domestic violence or DUI or a murder. I can't define that 13 for you right now. We're not permitted to because at the end 14 of this trial the Judge is going to instruct you on the law.

15 So without me being able to define it, I just have to 16 ask kind of a vague question. Is there anyone on this first 32 17 that thinks that they will not hold us to our burden of proof? 18 Okay.

It doesn't look like anyone's responding.

Is there anyone kind of to the contrary that because these are such serious crimes and you know it's a crime; right, that may hold us to a higher standard than what the Judge instructs you that standard is?

24 Basically, I can ask it this way. Can everyone here 25 agree to follow the law as the Judge gives it to you at the end

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of the case? Whether -- okay. Everyone's nodding yes. Whether you agree with it or not, maybe you think God could have written this law a little bit better or whatever it may be, can you all promise me and promised the Court right now that you will follow the law as it is given to you? And everyone's nodding.

> Am I in your space too much, ma'am? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No.

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9 MR. GIORDANI: There are a couple of questions that 10 the Judge asked, and I'm just going to briefly follow up on 11 them, and then I'm going to individually talk to each of you 12 and hopefully very quickly.

13 The Judge asked about law enforcement and several of 14 you replied, yeah, I know a friend or I have a close family 15 member who's in law enforcement. The idea behind that line of 16 questioning is, and you heard my witness list, there's about 60 17 or so law enforcement officers, is we want folks on this jury 18 who are not predisposed to make some kind of judgment about law 19 enforcement. From Mr. Brown and the defense's side I would 20 presume they don't want people who are just going to accept 21 carte blanche anything a law enforcement says. And from our 22 side we don't want people who have maybe a negative interaction 23 with a law enforcement officer.

24 One individual said the police didn't respond fast 25 enough to their incident. We don't want people who are going

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to hold whatever happened to them personally against any
 officers we may call in this case.

3 So first let me ask, is there anyone on the jury who 4 has a predisposition or a bias against law enforcement? Anyone 5 here who thinks that they're going to judge law enforcement 6 differently than they would a normal person off the street? 7 Okay.

8 Is there anyone who is so predisposed in favor of law 9 enforcement that they may, say, adopt anything an officer says, 10 you know, a unicorn came in and took the items from the scene. 11 Okay. Looks like no one is responding to that.

Just to be clear, does everyone here think that they can be fair when they judge law enforcement officers just like they would a layperson off the street?

15 Looks like everyone's nodding their heads yes. No 16 one's disagreed with me; right? Okay.

17 Is there anyone here in the first 32 who watches any 18 shows that have to do with the criminal justice system? 19 Documentaries? Okay. That's usually the question that gets a 20 lot of responses. Anyone here who watches those CSI-type 21 shows? Okay. Is there anyone who just raised their hand that 22 thinks those are reality, like the truth?

There's a couple people saying sometimes. I'd agree with you there. For those of you who just raised your hands to the first question, does anyone watch criminal-justice-type

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shows, can someone brave just put your hand up and let me ask 1 2 you a few more questions? Anybody? I'm going to call on 3 somebody if not. All right. Santa Claus. 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yes. 6 THE MARSHAL: I allowed him to wear the hat too, by 7 the way. 8 MR. GIORDANI: What's your badge number, sir? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: 394. Name's David 9 10 Marshall. We watch Bull and then Bluff City. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Bull is the one that deals with 12 jury selection? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yeah. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Why do you watch that? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Just for fun. 15 16 MR. GIORDANI: Do you like it? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: I don't -- we don't watch 18 a lot of reality shows so --19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: -- it's just something 21 that comes on. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Are you interested in the jury 23 selection process? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yeah, I think it's a neat 25 process, yeah. JD Reporting, Inc.

MR. GIORDANI: Are -- that other show I don't know 1 2 it. 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Bluff City. It's a new one this year, and it's, you know, they just deal with 4 5 different criminal or civil things. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Fiction show? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yeah, kind of. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Does it have, the filming, does it 9 happen inside a courtroom? It's like court cases? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yeah, yeah. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. So as a person who watches 12 those types of shows in your, you know, when you make your 13 personal choice to watch those, is this something sitting on a 14 jury that you want to? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yeah, I think it would be 16 interesting. 17 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you think that you can be 18 fair and not prejudge either side in this case? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yep. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Give both sides a fair shake? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yes. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Anyone in that first group that 23 I asked the question of that watches documentaries that deal 24 with criminal justice? Okay. So can you raise your hands, 25 please, whoever does. All right.

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1 Can you pass that down -- ma'am, you're in Seat 2 Number 1 and now that we've shoveled everyone I don't have your 3 badge number. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I'm Juror Number 440 --4 5 I'm sorry, for 452. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Ms. Armstrong. 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Roben Armstrong, and I 8 don't know, well, I guess this is a documentary. For your 9 question I like to watch the First 48. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. So that's reality based. 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Yes. 12 MR. GIORDANI: That is reality; right? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Uh-huh. MR. GIORDANI: What do you find interesting if 14 15 anything about that? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: For me I'm always 17 interested in not only the crime that's committed, but whether 18 or not there's a true motivation to commit the crime. Whether 19 they knew the person, whether it was revenge based, whether it 20 was just an active opportunity or not. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Interesting. Okay. I'm not permitted 22 to go into jury instructions or what I think the jury 23 instructions will be even though I kind of know, but I can tell 24 you this: We as the State are required to prove the elements 25 of the crimes we charged, but not necessary -- not necessarily

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1 the reason why a crime was committed; does that make sense to 2 you?

3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Yes. MR. GIORDANI: Would you agree with me in watching 4 5 the First 48 that there is sometimes where you're like this is 6 senseless; I don't get why someone would do something like 7 that? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Absolutely. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. What we want out of our jurors 10 is people who are thoughtful and who are interested in this 11 type of thing, but we don't want someone who's going to say, 12 well, the State didn't tell us why so I'm not going to, you know, convict somebody or whatever it may be. Do you think 13 14 that you can set aside kind of your personal interest and your 15 personal want for that type of information and just judge 16 whatever evidence we present from the witness stand? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Yes. 18 MR. GIORDANI: So long as we meet our -- the elements 19 of the events beyond reasonable doubt; that would be sufficient 20 for you? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Correct. 21 Yes.

MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Any other shows that you watch? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Most of them are just crime shows. Sometimes I do watch documentaries. I can't think of the name of one where they really talk about, you

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know, some of the murder -- previous murders that have 1 2 I think recently there was a documentary on like happened. 3 there had been a child's murder. So those types of things that I'm very interested in what happened during that time or some 4 5 of that -- the historical basis of what happened and where they 6 are now, and definitely sometimes they have documentaries on 7 cold cases are, you know, that I'm interested to find out if in 8 all of this time of new technology they have been able to come to some resolution or be able to solve the crime. 9 10 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. You seem like you might be a 11 pretty good fit for this case. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Uh-huh. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Unfortunately, is that what you --14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I just said, uh-huh. That's all. 15 16 MR. GIORDANI: Do you -- do you think that you can 17 give both sides a fair shake and wait to hear all the evidence 18 before rendering any opinion on either side? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I do. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. There -- the little form that 21 we get gives a little bit of information so I'm going to go off 22 that. You indicated to the Judge, I believe, that your work 23 was strategic planning a portion of the department of aviation? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Correct. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So you're a County employee?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Correct. 1 2 MR. GIORDANI: So are we, at least Mr. Dickerson and 3 I. 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Uh-huh. 5 MR. GIORDANI: Do you interact with law enforcement 6 in the course of your duties at work? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Not really. I mean, 8 there's a Metro police, I don't really want to say station, 9 but, you know, they are stationed at the airport, but I don't 10 necessarily interact with them on a daily basis. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you -- well, in your 12 personal life have you ever had positive or negative 13 interactions with law enforcement? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I've had both. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Both? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Uh-huh. MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Can you give us an example. 17 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Most of them have been 19 positive. None of them were negative to the extreme that I 20 felt as though -- let me say this, I wasn't physically harassed 21 or touched in any way. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: But I have had 24 experiences where I felt as though the officer had a negative 25 demeanor.

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MR. GIORDANI: Okay.

2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: And I felt like maybe, I 3 mean, the only thing I've ever been pulled over, you know, I've 4 only been involved in like traffic --

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MR. GIORDANI: Sure.

6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: -- citations, but I just 7 felt like, you know, some officers are really nice about it. 8 They just come up, can I see your license and registration and 9 kind of go through the routine. But then there are some that I 10 feel like definitely approach you with a little bit of a 11 negative disposition or at least in my opinion.

MR. GIORDANI: Right. Fair enough.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I've been approached, you know, but not necessarily all the time. So I chalk it up to there are good and bad people no matter what they do.

16 MR. GIORDANI: Perfect. Yeah. I'm -- you would 17 agree with me that law enforcement officers are people just 18 like you and I?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Correct.

20 MR. GIORDANI: There's good ones, there's bad ones, 21 there's kind of neutral in between ones. Do you think that you 22 can judge the law enforcement officers you will hear from in 23 this case neutrally?

24PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Yes.25MR. GIORDANI: Not -- not bring in any prior good or

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bad experience and just judge them based on what they have to 1 2 say? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Yes. MR. GIORDANI: Would you agree with me that law 4 5 enforcement officers have more training -- or training in the 6 area of, you know, documenting crimes and observing things a 7 little more than the normal person? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Yes. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Could you still, even 10 considering that, judge them fairly and not be predisposed one 11 way or the other? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Yes. 13 MR. GIORDANI: You indicated you were the victim of a 14 residential burglary and the cops took too long, an hour to get 15 there? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: 16 Yes. That is correct. 17 MR. GIORDANI: And they didn't do much about it? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Correct. 19 MR. GIORDANI: What -- what more -- what do you think 20 they did not do? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I felt like there were 22 things they could have done like maybe take some fingerprints 23 or see if they could have at least looked around and located 24 any information that they could have used. They just kind of 25 in my opinion just dismissed it as though this is happening in

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This is happening, I mean, this happens when new 1 the area. 2 development goes up, and it's just kind of what happens. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Right. 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: So the best you can do, 5 you know, is make sure you have a security system, make sure 6 maybe you have some video to maybe catch a license plate or 7 something like that if they back into your driveway. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Sure. 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: But it was just kind of dismissed as kind of -- kind of this is what happens. 10 This is 11 just the hazard of purchasing in a new development. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Right. Did -- did you interact with 13 patrol officers, you know, just normal black and white police 14 cars? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: We did I think once. The 16 neighborhood got hit so much, then they started patrolling 17 more. So than we did have, like, community events, national 18 night out, you know, pulling an officer over and saying hey, I 19 live in this house right here. I just want to introduce 20 myself. That did happen eventually. I felt like probably it 21 should have happened prior to going through a string of 22 robberies since they already know that this is happening or 23 they knew at that time this happens when you had to meet with 24 all of them. 25 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Okay. Overall, what is

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1 your impression of the criminal justice system?

2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I honestly I think
3	there are things that could be refined. I don't know that
4	people always fairly get innocent until proven guilty. I think
5	a lot of times there's guilty until proven innocent, and then
6	even sometimes whether they've done it or not because they've
7	gone through the process they've already been basically,
8	they've been accused of it and so people still are very
9	skeptical about, you know, if they're innocent or not.
10	MR. GIORDANI: Sure.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: So I think the criminal
12	justice system does need some could use some review and some
13	tweaking in my opinion.
14	MR. GIORDANI: Fair enough. Just overall do you
15	think that, and you have to answer truthfully
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Okay.
17	MR. GIORDANI: do you think that you'll be a good
18	fit for this jury?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I will say at this time
20	yes.
21	MR. GIORDANI: Okay. At this time
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: At this time.
23	MR. GIORDANI: reserving
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Well, I didn't bring up
25	any hardships yesterday.

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MR. GIORDANI: Ah oh.

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2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: So there may be one so I 3 will say at this time, yes, I chose to respect the Judge and wait until the break to talk to the bailiff. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: So at this time I will 7 say yes. 8 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Judge, should I --9 THE COURT: Yes. What is the issue that came up? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Well, I didn't really 11 want to get into that yesterday because I felt it was more of a 12 private medical matter. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Oh. 14 THE COURT: Oh, okay. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: So that's why I wanted to 16 wait. 17 THE COURT: Okay. All right. And if you -- did you 18 bring anything --19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: I did. Yes. 20 THE COURT: Okay. So you can give that to the 21 bailiff. Okay. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: Yeah. Uh-huh. 23 MR. GIORDANI: All right. All right. Thank you very 24 much, ma'am. I appreciate it. 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 452: You're welcome.

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MR. GIORDANI: Will you pass the microphone down to 1 2 Ms. Allen, 454. How are you doing, ma'am? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: I'm good. How about 4 5 yourself? 6 MR. GIORDANI: I'm good. You had raised your hand 7 earlier about the documentaries and the TV shows; right? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Correct. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Which ones do you watch? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: First 48. My interest is 11 similar to hers. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And do you have a feeling one 13 way or the other about the criminal justice system? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: No. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you think it's fair? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yeah. 16 17 MR. GIORDANI: You have a --18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: For the most part. 19 MR. GIORDANI: For the most part? Okay. You talked 20 about your two brothers and what happened with them yesterday 21 I want you to get into it a little bit further. briefly. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: All right. 23 MR. GIORDANI: That was -- that was here in Clark 24 County; right? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes.

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MR. GIORDANI: And it was 2008? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Was it 2008 that the crimes occurred or that they went to prison? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: The crimes occurred. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And then I believe you said it 7 was -- they knew the quy, but it was a drug dealer that they 8 robbed? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Do you -- do you think that -- that 11 your brothers were treated fairly in the criminal justice 12 system? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Like, I don't know how to say it other 15 than you think they did it and that they were held accountable 16 for what they did? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 18 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. In 2008 you said that you went 19 to a couple of the court hearings --20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 21 MR. GIORDANI: -- right? Do you recognize anyone now 22 that's it's been a day or so that may have been involved in 23 that? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: No. 25 MR. GIORDANI: I'm not saying anyone was, I don't

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1 know, but --2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: No. 3 MR. GIORDANI: You don't think any of us were involved in the case; right? But it was in this building? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And was it in this courtroom, 7 Department 21? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: I can't remember. 9 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Do your brothers have the 10 same last name as you? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: No. 12 MR. GIORDANI: What's their last name? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Farmer and Chilton. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Farmer and Chilton? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Uh-huh. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And since -- since that 17 happened they went off to prison and then they -- they're out 18 now; right? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 20 MR. GIORDANI: I think you kind of indicated like 21 they're doing -- they're doing okay now; right? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Uh-huh. They're not in 23 trouble. They're good. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Staying out of trouble, and were they 25 able to get employment afterwards?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. Both of them. 1 2 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Okay. The concern you can 3 probably imagine from our side is what we're accusing of 4 Mr. Brown of conspiracy to robbery, robbery and murder with a 5 deadly weapon. And two of those charges have applied to 6 some -- two people very close to you. What we don't want is 7 for you to kind of juxtapose or kind of look at the defense 8 table and think about your brothers and make it kind of leaning 9 one way before you hear anything. Is that a concern? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: No. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think you can judge this case 12 fairly even though the charges are the same --13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 14 MR. GIORDANI: -- as applied? Okay. Your -- you 15 reference your sister too, you were kind of laughing about it, 16 like, yeah, multiple batteries. 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 18 MR. GIORDANI: Was she prosecuted by our office as 19 well? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: She -- I wasn't really 21 there for her court proceedings. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. It seems like it was all 23 real minor stuff. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 25 MR. GIORDANI: One's DV, domestic violence and then

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1 once was like a normal battery.

2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Well, let me just ask the blanket 4 question. Having had siblings that were prosecuted, do you 5 think that Mr. Dickerson and I might start off not on a level 6 playing field with you? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: No. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And I'm not saying I get that 9 vibe from you in anyway, I just, we have to ask. Do you think 10 that you can wait in this case before rendering any 11 determination until you hear everything? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Wait until we rest our case and we 14 argue in front of you and make your judgment when you go back 15 with your fellow jurors? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 17 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And you -- I don't know if you 18 said this, but the little sheet says you're employed with the 19 Postal Service? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 21 Is that right? What do you do there? MR. GIORDANI: 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: I'm a clerk. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: A processing clerk. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So you deal with people off the

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street. Like they come up to the --1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Looking for mail. 3 Uh-huh. 4 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Looking for mail and then you 5 just interact with them and get whatever they need? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that you are the type of 8 person who can voice your opinion if you don't agree with your fellow jurors? 9 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Anything about any of the questions 12 that I asked your fellow juror or any of the questions that 13 were asked of the panel that you'd like to chime in on or add 14 to? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: No. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you think you can be fair? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 454: Yes. 18 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Thank you, ma'am. You can 19 pass that. 20 And I think you're out of order as well. Can you 21 give me your badge number. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Badge 0318. It's where I 23 sat yesterday. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Was it? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Yes.

1 MR. GIORDANI: I'm sorry. 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: That's all right. It's 3 Calderon-Arkenburg. MR. GIORDANI: Gotcha. You have a boot camp 4 5 business; right? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Yes. Uh-huh. 7 MR. GIORDANI: And is that on the west side or is 8 that Henderson? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Southwest Henderson. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Southwest? Okay. And are you -- do 11 you work there on a daily basis or do you --12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: I do. I'm the head 13 coach, but I have staff and coaches so they take care of 14 things, and I have a director of operation that kind of 15 overseas it if I need her. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: It's -- it's Christmas 17 18 time so it's kind of slow. Nobody wants to come work out. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Right. 20 THE COURT: It's January 2nd. 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: January we might talk 22 again it's too busy. But I'm pretty sure nothing's going on. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. You talked about what happened 24 to your sister. 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Yes, in '98. JD Reporting, Inc.

MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. And when you were talking with 1 2 the Judge about that I got the vibe, and correct me if I'm 3 wrong, that you had forgiven the guy that killed her. 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Yes. 5 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. How is it that you've come to 6 that place emotionally? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Well, when it first 8 happened, you know, the emotions and then having to speak after 9 from '98 till 2000 I really needed to really evaluate myself 10 and realize that I can't allow it to affect my life, and I 11 needed to release it and allow that, and so therefore while he 12 was in prison I just hope that he got the help that he needed. 13 My family thinks that's crazy, but I think that everybody has 14 an opportunity to have a second chance, and so I kind of just 15 was very open and to where ever I'm at in any kind of situation 16 I'm open. 17 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. And, I mean, forgiveness is 18 right. You're carrying that bag not him. 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Exactly. 20 MR. GIORDANI: It's your choice and --21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Right. 22 MR. GIORDANI: -- it will affect you if you want to 23 forgive or not, not him; right? In -- in this case, again, I 24 can't talk about jury instructions, but I can tell you, you as 25 the jury you are not making a determination on any punishment.

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Okay. You're making a determination on did we the State prove 1 2 So whether you're an empathetic person or a our case. 3 forgiving person, whatever that may be, you -- can you judge this case based upon the evidence, not, like, personal feelings 4 5 you have? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: By the evidence, yes. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. All right. Any positive or 8 negative interactions with law enforcement? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: No. 10 MR. GIORDANI: And what's your feeling generally 11 about the criminal justice system? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Every -- I personally 13 with the criminal when I was in court with my sisters I felt 14 like it went smoothly on both ends. It was exactly what I 15 expected. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: Pretty neutral what I 18 found and it -- neutral on both sides. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And when you were going through 20 that, did you meet with people from our office, the DA's 21 office? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: It's been so long --23 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: I believe so, yeah. I 25 just know that a Judge was [indiscernible]. That's all I -- I

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don't remember anybody else's names. 1 2 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Then fair to assume that you're 3 not going to lean our way or lean against us; it's not something that's going to --4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 318: No, I'm open to both 6 sides. Yes. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Thank you, ma'am. You can pass that down. 8 9 And I think I'm caught up. Is it Mr. Peries? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Peries, yes. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Peries? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Uh-huh. 13 MR. GIORDANI: And that's 465? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Yes, 465. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you, sir. You had referenced 16 going to trial in the Henderson thing, the little misdemeanor 17 trial? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Yes. 19 MR. Did you say or do you remember 16 who your lawyer was? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: No. I don't remember his 18 name, no. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Did -- did your lawyer ever 20 approach you and say, you have an option to not go to trial 21 or --22 MS. TRUJILLO: Judge, may we approach? 23 THE COURT: Sure. 24 (Conference at the bench not recorded.) 25 THE COURT: We're going to take a quick break, ladies

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1 and gentlemen.

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2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I was just going to say I 3 needed to use the rest room.

THE COURT: Okay. Yeah, there are a few I think. All right. (Panel of prospective jurors recessed 2:43 p.m.) (Outside the presence of the prospective jury panel.) THE COURT: Just briefly before we take our break.

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Ms. Trujillo objected at the bench. My concern may have been 1 2 the same as hers that maybe it's suggesting, oh, why wasn't 3 there a plea negotiation, and we don't want them speculating about that. So I sustained the objection and Mr. Giordani said 4 5 he would move on. MR. GIORDANI: Yeah, and that's not where I was going 6 7 either. 8 THE COURT: Yeah, and your follow-up question that 9 you were going to ask was what? 10 MR. GIORDANI: You would agree with me that everyone 11 deserves a fair trial; the evidence doesn't matter. 12 THE COURT: And I --13 MR. GIORDANI: Which was tied into what I was just 14 talking about 10 minutes prior that everyone's entitled to the 15 presumption of innocence at trial, et cetera. 16 THE COURT: And then --17 MS. TRUJILLO: To complete my record was that my 18 problem with it was the question first he said and you actually 19 did it right. So you were fine with the fines, and then he 20 moved on to say, well, can I just ask you why didn't -- why did 21 you go to trial in that case, to me implying you go to trial 22 even though you know you're guilty, which is suggestive here 23 that they could potentially take away, okay, maybe he's guilty, 24 but he's going to trial anyways. That was my concern and then 25 obviously what the Court already said about the plea

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1 negotiations.

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THE COURT: Right. I just don't want them speculating. Like, oh, was it -- they do anyway because they always ask me when I go talk to them. Oh, was there an offer. But we don't want to encourage any kind of speculation. So I think the follow-up question was appropriate, but Ms. Trujillo you asked them not to do the follow-up question although I do believe it was appropriate, the follow-up.

TRUJILLO: Do you want to just release them? Ι 7 mean, do you think -- are you worried? 8 THE COURT: You never know. I mean we're only on 9 person four and now person one has a new problem. 10 MS. TRUJILLO: Right. 11 THE COURT: And I thought she seemed really good. 12 MS. TRUJILLO: Yeah. 13 THE COURT: So -- right? 14 MS. TRUJILLO: I forgot about that. 15 THE COURT: All right. Let me -- I may not make them 16 come back tomorrow, the ones at the end because I want to see 17 how we do today. But now as they've been sitting 3 here --They were dazed from waiting downstairs 4 MR. STORMS: 5 for too long. 6 THE COURT: They've been -- they're coached by the 7 other people so now they'll start saying oh, gee. All right. 8 All take your break. 9 (Outside the presence of the prospective jury panel.) 10 THE COURT: All right. We're on the record out of 11 the presence of the jury with the bailiff. 12 THE MARSHAL: Badge Number 419, she has an issue with 13 childcare. She has to pick up two elementary-aged children 14 after school. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, we already moved her to the end. 16 THE COURT: She's already at the end. 17 THE MARSHAL: Okay. 18 She just wants to get out early today or MR. STORMS: Yeah. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 9 THE COURT: Okay, you guys were fine with excusing her? 10 11 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 12 MS. TRUJILLO: Yeah. 13 THE COURT: Okay. So you can pull her aside. 14 THE MARSHAL: Badge Number 452, Ms. Armstrong. She's 15 that African-American lady. 16 THE COURT: Uh-huh. 17 THE MARSHAL: She has lymphedema --18 THE COURT: Oh, lymphedema. 19 THE MARSHAL: -- affects her heart. She has several 20 tests scheduled. One on the 11th, one on the 17th, one on the 21 18th -- actually two on the 17th, one on the 18th --22 THE COURT: Which one -- is she in Chair 1? 23 THE MARSHAL: I believe so. 24 MS. TRUJILLO: Yes. 25 MR. STORMS: Yeah.

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THE COURT: Okay.

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2 THE MARSHAL: And she -- they're at various times 3 throughout the day. Some are in the morning, some are in the 4 afternoon. 5 Did she give you anything more than that? THE COURT: 6 THE MARSHAL: She has, like, a whole folder full of 7 all of her appointments --8 MR. GIORDANI: I kind of liked her, but we'll stip. MS. TRUJILLO: I like her too. But, I mean, she has 9 10 medical issues. 11 THE COURT: And she has appointments? 12 THE MARSHAL: Yes, she has four. First one's 13 tomorrow, two on the 17th and one on the 18th. 14 MS. TRUJILLO: Yeah, that's just too much. 15 THE COURT: Okay. So that number was what? 16 452. THE MARSHAL: 17 THE COURT: Okay. And then who's next? 18 THE MARSHAL: Badge Number 521. She's a 19 developmental services person for the State. 20 THE COURT: Oh, right. 21 She just picked up a new family. THE MARSHAL: The 22 last name was similar so she just wanted to make sure that 23 there wasn't an issue. The father of the children she just 24 picked up was Dwight Carter and the mother is Angela Diaz. 25 MS. TRUJILLO: No.

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1 MR. GIORDANI: No. 2 THE MARSHAL: Okay. 3 THE COURT: Okay. THE MARSHAL: So I can let her know then? 4 5 THE COURT: She's fine. She's fine. Yeah, you can 6 let her know. 7 MS. TRUJILLO: That was Stephanie Blankenship? 8 THE MARSHAL: Yes. 9 MS. TRUJILLO: Okay. 10 THE COURT: Is that it? 11 THE MARSHAL: That was -- oh, and Ms. Pucci-Johnson, 12 as long as it doesn't go into the 23rd she's okay. She goes on 13 vacation on the 23rd. 14 MR. GIORDANI: So do I. 15 THE COURT: So now the truth comes out. 16 MR. STORMS: Yeah, and it's, like, 2 percent or 6 2.5 percent of the --7 THE COURT: Not even. 8 MR. STORMS: Not even that. It was like one point 9 something percent so, yeah. I think we're -- don't get past 10 the first prong at this point on that test so. 11 THE COURT: No. 12 (Pause in the proceedings.) 13 (Panel of prospective jurors entering 3:01 p.m.) 14 THE COURT: Counsel, approach. 15 (Conference at the bench not recorded.) 16 THE COURT: All right. Court is now back in session. 17 And, Mr. Giordani, you may resume your questioning of 18 the panel. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you. Do you have the microphone 20 still, sir? Just a couple more questions. 21 Have you had negative or positive interactions with 22 law enforcement? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Yes, I've had negative 24 interactions with law enforcement. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Was that the DUI thing that we JD Reporting, Inc.

1 were talking about earlier or other?

2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Yeah, the DUI thing I was
3	acting kind of aggressively because I was under the influence,
4	and I don't remember exactly what I was saying to him, but I
5	know I was put in, I don't know if it's a drunk tank or you're
6	by yourself and it's just a room. There's no real there's
7	nothing in there and then yeah, so I guess that was a little
8	negative.
9	MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Negative on your side or
10	negative on their side?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Mine.
12	MR. GIORDANI: Okay. What about other interactions
13	with law enforcement?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: When I was under 18 I was
15	stopped and I wasn't taken to jail because I was under 18. I
16	did have a little bit of marijuana, and I guess that wasn't so
17	negative. I guess the guy I was with was kind of arguing back
18	and forth with the cops or the kid I was with. So that would
19	be another experience. Not so negative on my part, just the
20	guy I was with.
21	MR. GIORDANI: Got it. You understood the questions
22	I was asking earlier. The basic premise of this is are you
23	going to prejudge law enforcement one way or another?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: No.
25	MR. GIORDANI: You think you can be fair to law

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enforcement officers if you hear them testify on the sand? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Yes. 3 MR. GIORDANI: And you think you can be fair to the defense on the other side? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 465: Of course. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I think that's it for you. 7 Thank you very much, sir, you can pass that down to our [indiscernible]. You know we're going to say it. 8 9 What's your badge number? Is it 338? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 338: Yes, 338. 11 MR. GIORDANI: I'm going to try to speed this up. 12 Now, that I've talked to some of your fellow jurors I'm going 13 to get to the fun a little bit. You've had several interactions kind of both sides of the fence. Do you think 14 15 that you -- any of those personal experiences you've had would 16 affect your fairness to either side in this case? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 338: No. 17 18 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Can you set aside your personal 19 experiences and decide this case based upon the evidence we 20 present? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 338: Yes. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. The civil suit that you were 23 talking about yesterday, you understand and agree that civil 24 law is different from criminal law; right? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 338: Yes.

MR. GIORDANI: So any law you may have learned of in 1 2 that case you -- you've got to set that aside and just use the 3 law the Judge gives you in this case; can you do that? 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 338: Yes. 5 MR. GIORDANI: Is there anything I've asked your 6 fellow jurors that you think we should know about you or that 7 you should chime in on? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 338: No. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Thank you, ma'am. You can pass 10 the mic forward. 11 Mr. Thurgood, 522. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: Correct. 13 MR. GIORDANI: How are you, sir? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: Doing well. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Good. Those names you referenced 16 earlier, Judge Villani, Alex Chen and then you said that you 17 have a friend in the public defender's office --18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: Tracy Ip. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, Tracy Ip. Okay. Did you meet 20 them all in like Leadership? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: I met Alex and Tracy in 22 Leadership. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: I've known Judge Villani 24 25 for 20 years. JD Reporting, Inc.

1 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So Leadership Las Vegas is 2 something you do voluntarily on your own time; right? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: Correct. MR. GIORDANI: In fact, I think you pay for it; 4 5 right? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: Yeah. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And do you have an interest in 8 the criminal justice system or was it kind of a general 9 business-type situation why you got involved in it? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: It was not at all related 11 to criminal justice. It was just to understand what happens in 12 the community at a deeper level. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And the situation you described 14 as a kid, the scary stuff, you understand the gist of the 15 questions. Is there anything about your personal experience 16 that might cause you to be unfair to either side in this case? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: I don't believe so. 18 MR. GIORDANI: And have you had any positive or 19 negative interactions with law enforcement? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: I've really had very few 21 interactions with law enforcement. As part of the leadership 22 program I was able to go on a ride along, and I found the 23 police to be fair in their dealings with the people that I saw 24 them deal with. And that's really the only interaction I've 25 ever had.

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MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you have a feeling or an 1 2 opinion about the criminal justice system? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: Not really. I mean it seems to work smoothly from what I've seen. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: And can we as the State presume that 6 you'll give us a fair shake in this case and base any decision 7 you make on the evidence as it comes from the witness stand? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: Yeah, I believe I'm a 9 fairly pragmatic person so sure. 10 MR. GIORDANI: You'd agree with all those sentiments 11 I described earlier, the presumption of innocence, the State 12 has the burden of proof and all of that? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: Yeah. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Any issues with any of those? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 522: No. 16 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Thank you, sir. Pass that 17 back. 18 And, ma'am, you are definitely out of order. Is it 509? 19 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yes. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Gebretensie; right? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Gebretensie. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Gebretensie. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yeah. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Who is the police officer that

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you know? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: We call him John G. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: I've seen him since I was 4 5 a kid so. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. Is he from Metro? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: I believe so. 8 MR. GIORDANI: And do you talk about work like his 9 work with him at all? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: No. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And you probably have the gist 12 of where I'm going with that. 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Uh-huh. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Can you agree to not prejudge any law 15 enforcement officers you may see on the witness stand? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yes. 17 MR. GIORDANI: Just treat them as you would anyone 18 else and make a determination based upon what they say? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Uh-huh. I see them all 20 the time at work, but --21 MR. GIORDANI: How's that -- oh, at Sunrise. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yes, Sunrise Hospital. Ι 23 work in the ER. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Have you had situations where 25 you've seen gunshot wound victims? JD Reporting, Inc.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: All the time. 1 2 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. Pretty common? Especially at 3 Sunrise? 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yeah. 5 MR. GIORDANI: Do you -- so you're in administration; 6 are you at that front check-in desk? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: I do it all but mostly in 8 the ER, the ones that come and you bring in your ID and 9 insurance and I register you into the ER. 10 THE COURT: Are you one of the gals that actually may 11 go into the room and --12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Uh-huh. With the 13 computer. 14 THE COURT: Okay. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yeah. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Do you have any specific medical 17 training as opposed to not medical billing, but medical 18 training? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: No. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Did you recognize any of those 21 folks that I referenced in the --22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: No. 23 MR. GIORDANI: -- witness list? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: No. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Fair to say you may -- may recognize

people by face and not by name? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yes. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Cops that may --PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yeah, most of like pass 4 5 by or if they have a question, but --6 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Is there anyone that you've 7 interacted with in your professional role that might be a 8 friend or somebody that you might favor if they end up on the 9 witness stand? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: No. 11 MR. GIORDANI: So even if you only know them by face 12 can we presume that you can be fair to law enforcement and fair 13 to Mr. Brown --14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yes. 15 MR. GIORDANI: -- if law enforcement officers you may 16 have interacted with testify? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yes. 18 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. What's your feeling on the 19 criminal justice system? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: I think it's fair. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Have you had any negative interactions 22 with law enforcement? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: No, not really. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Can I presume that you can look at 25 autopsy photographs and not freak out for lack of a better

1 term?

2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 509: Yeah. I got used to it.
3 I'm okay now.

MR. GIORDANI: And that's one question for the whole group. You will see some photographs. Obviously this is a murder case so you're going to see some photographs of a dead person and some blood. Is there anyone on the jury in the first 32 that feels like they'd be so overwhelmed by that that they couldn't consider it for its evidentiary value?

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UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Me.

11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I'm going to get to you in a 12 second. And there's two hands and before I -- before I start 13 creating an issue where there isn't one. No one's going be 14 asked to stare at and examine and stare at them for more than 15 what is necessary. All we need is people who can consider them 16 for their evidentiary value. If you see a photo of a dead 17 person, you're not going to be asked to stare at it. You're 18 not going to be forced to stare at it, but you do have to 19 consider it for whatever evidentiary value you deem it has.

The question is, are you going to be so overwhelmed my emotion that you just won't be able to look at it and consider it for what it is?

Now, I'm not seeing hands.

Fair to say that you all who did raise your hands can consider it for what it is? It looks like no one is

1 responding.

2 Do you want to try and end this? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Are you talking to me? MR. GIORDANI: 4 Yeah. 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: I get, like, really --6 MR. GIORDANI: You need to pass the mic. 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: -- lightheaded talking 8 about it. 9 MR. GIORDANI: What's your badge number? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: 473. I get like really 10 11 lightheaded talking about it. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. We'll come back to you. 13 Pass that back. Your Badge number? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: 354. 15 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Well, let's start with 16 that last question. Did you change your opinion after hearing 17 the way I kind of rephrased it? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: I do have a phobia. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: So I -- my ex-husband had 21 an incident where he -- he was bleeding out, and I fainted and 22 ever since that time I --23 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: -- it makes me very 25 nervous.

1 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. Do you watch TV? 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: No. 3 MR. GIORDANI: You don't watch TV? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: I watch the criminal 4 5 shows sometimes. MR. GIORDANI: Okay. You don't like pass out when 6 7 you see blood on TV; right? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Huh-uh. 9 MR. GIORDANI: All right. We're not going to bring 10 you real blood. I mean, actual, physical blood. It's going to 11 be in photographs. All we need is for you to be able to look 12 at it, consider it for what it is. You don't ever have to look 13 again if you don't want to. That's your choice. Can you do 14 that? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Yes. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And you mentioned your friend 17 is a Henderson Police Department SWAT sniper? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Uh-huh. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Do you interact frequently with that 20 person? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: I would say once a week. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So that's kind of frequent. 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Uh-huh. MR. GIORDANI: Does he talk about his work? 24 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Sometimes.

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1 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. The same question for you as 2 all the other jurors. Can you judge law enforcement officers 3 based on what they have to say not just the fact that they're wearing a badge or have a gun on their hip? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Yes. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And -- well, there's no one 7 from Henderson listed on our witness list so I can assure you 8 of that. Is there any other witnesses that you recognize from 9 law enforcement? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: No. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Do you have -- or what's your opinion, 12 ma'am, on the criminal justice system? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: I don't know much about 14 it. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: So I think it's fair to 17 my knowledge. 18 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Yeah. Can you give Mr. Brown a fair trial if you're a juror in this case? 19 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: I believe so. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And can you give us, the State, 22 give us a fair shake and wait to hear all the evidence and then 23 make a decision? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: In that question do you 25 mean like I can't make up my mind until the end?

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1	MR. GIORDANI: Yeah, you need to wait, keep an open
2	mind, listen to all the evidence before you start deliberating
3	with your fellow jurors. So you may see some piece of evidence
4	and think oh, that's legit evidence; right? But you can't make
5	a determination on guilt or not guilty or innocence or whatever
6	it may be until you've been instructed on the law and hear the
7	whole case and go back to deliberate. Can you do that?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: I'm not sure about that.
9	MR. GIORDANI: What do you mean?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Like I'm not sure if I
11	would be capable of making up my mind until the end.
12	MR. GIORDANI: Okay. That's fair. Let me ask you
13	this way. You would agree with me that if we selected you
14	right now, I stood up and said the State rests and we sent you
15	back to deliberate, the verdict would be not guilty; right?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: I'm not sure. Oh, wait.
17	MR. GIORDANI: You haven't heard any evidence.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Yes, yes.
19	MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So you don't know anything
20	about this case until you hear the evidence; you'd agree with
21	me there?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Yes. Uh-huh.
23	MR. GIORDANI: What we've said is just an allegation
24	that we've made, and you take that for what it is. It's not
25	evidence.
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1 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Okay. 2 MR. GIORDANI: Can you wait to hear the evidence 3 before making a decision? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Yes. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. That's what we need you to do. 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: Okay. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Anything else that I've asked 8 your fellow jurors that would apply to you or that you think 9 you should chime in on? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 354: No. 11 Thank you, ma'am. You can pass MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 12 the mic. 13 On the end there, sir, what's your badge number? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: 437. 14 15 MR. GIORDANI: 437. All right. Did you say 437? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes. 16 17 MR. STORMS: He's looking at his juror ID. 18 MS. TRUJILLO: You're Nikolas Cruz; right? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes. 20 MS. TRUJILLO: Okay. 21 Is there another number there? THE COURT: 22 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah, it's badge number, sir. Sir, 23 you're 361. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yeah. 25 MR. GIORDANI: All right. And have you -- have you JD Reporting, Inc.

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been paying attention while I've talked to these other jurors? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes. Only my English not 3 that good, but I like it to be, I don't understand a lot only my speaking is the language is --4 5 MR. GIORDANI: Understood. Okay. That's why I 6 asked. So you seem to speak fine. You have been speaking 7 English for very long time; right? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes, yes, I do. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Is there anything that I've said to 10 your fellow jurors that you just did not understand? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Almost so I understand 12 almost everything. Something I don't understand. Almost I 13 understand everything. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you -- well, let me ask you, 15 have you ever had a positive or negative interactions with law 16 enforcement, with the police? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Positive. 18 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And do you have a feeling about 19 the criminal justice system in general. 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes. 21 MR. GIORDANI: What you think about our system? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: I think that that's the 23 best things that we have in this country. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Where did you say you are from? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Dominican.

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1 MR. GIORDANI: That's right. Different system here 2 than in the Dominican. 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes. MR. GIORDANI: Do you -- all those things that I 4 5 talked about earlier, like the defendant Mr. Brown is presumed 6 innocent until or unless the contrary is proved; right. We the 7 State, Mr. Dickerson and I have the burden of proof; do you 8 agree with that? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes. 10 MR. GIORDANI: And are you okay with that idea? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes, I do. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Can you wait until you hear all 13 the evidence before rendering a decision? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Don't prejudge anything. 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: No. 17 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you consider yourself a fair 18 person? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 361: Yes, I do. 20 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Thank you, sir. You can 21 pass the microphone down. 22 And your badge number, sir? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: 362. 24 MR. GIORDANI: And we're back in order. 25 Mr. Williams.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: 1 Yes. 2 MR. GIORDANI: I was a little confused. I thought I 3 heard you say you were on the travel team and then later it 4 was --5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: It's called FAST team 6 field and airborne support. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Oh. 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: Somebody has a private 9 airplane they break somewhere. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Got it. 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: I'm on a team that goes 12 and fixes it. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And so that causes you to 14 travel quite a bit, but it sounds like you don't have any 15 hardships when it comes to being here for the next week and a 16 half; is that right? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: It is what it is. Ι 18 mean, it's my duty. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. Fair enough. Did you say that 20 you did prior time in the military? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: I didn't say that, but I 22 did. I was in the Army. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And how long did you serve? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: A year and a half. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Were you discharged?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: Medical. 1 2 MR. GIORDANI: Medical. Okay. 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: Honorable. MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Understood. How do you feel 4 5 about law enforcement, sir? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: I don't have a problem 6 7 with it. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: I don't have any feelings 9 10 about. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Neutral? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: Yeah. 13 MR. GIORDANI: All right. That's what we want. Not 14 a trick question to that. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: Yeah. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Do you have a feeling one way or 17 another about the criminal justice system? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: No. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you think that if you were 20 selected as a juror that you could give both sides in this case 21 a fair shake? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: Yes. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Meaning follow the presumption of 24 innocence, follow the laws the Judge gives you, hold us to our 25 burden and all of that?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: 1 Yes. 2 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you have any issues 3 whatsoever with this idea that you might see some autopsy photographs? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 362: No. 6 MR. GIORDANI: I didn't -- okay. I thought you may 7 have raise your hand. I appreciate it. If you can pass the 8 microphone down. 9 Ms. Vallejo? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Yes. 11 MR. GIORDANI: 364? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: 364. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Ma'am, you have lived here I believe 14 for 11 years; right? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Yeah. 16 MR. GIORDANI: And is that, when you say here was 17 that in the U.S. or in Vegas? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: In USA. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Where did you live before 20 Vegas? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: New Mexico. Albuquerque, 22 New Mexico for five years. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, that's right. And that's where 24 you took the class and all that? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Uh-huh, yes. JD Reporting, Inc.

MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Are you -- you don't seem to 1 2 have any language issues. 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: No. That I'm picking up on. 4 MR. GIORDANI: 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: No, I have a study 6 English for a long time already. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: And I -- because I have a 8 9 high level of education in Columbia, my Spanish is good level, 10 and I would like to have English good level too. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: So that was my focus when 13 I was in New Mexico. And also I came to Miami. In Miami I 14 wasn't able to learn English. That's why I moved to the other 15 side of the country. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Understood. Okay. 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: You have to speak English 18 or speak English. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Right. 20 THE COURT: Was that because and Miami there where 21 too many other Spanish speakers? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Yeah. 23 THE COURT: Okay. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Uh-huh. Spanish speakers and I just stayed there for week and move. 25

1 MR. GIORDANI: A week? 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Yeah. 3 MR. GIORDANI: So you're understanding everything I'm saying and the Judge has been saying throughout this, no issues 4 5 there. 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Yeah. I pretty sure. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you have any -- or have you 8 had any interactions with the justice system or police in the 9 last 11 years? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Just the traffic ticket. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: And they have been 13 positive. They have been polite. I don't have any issue with 14 them. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you think you can be fair in 16 this case? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: 17 Yeah. 18 MR. GIORDANI: And follow the law as the Judge gives 19 it to you at the end of the case? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 364: Yeah, I will. 21 Thank you, ma'am. You can pass MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 22 the microphone. 23 Mr. Flangas. 367, how are you sir? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Good. How are you? 25 MR. GIORDANI: Good. So lots of lawyers in the JD Reporting, Inc.

1 family?

2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Yes, sir. 3 MR. GIORDANI: And I think you indicated you are definitely taking the LSAT, not so sure about whether you'll 4 5 follow along with law school; right? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Correct. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Would you say that you have some kind 8 of interest in the criminal processes? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: No. My interest would be 10 to benefit where I'm at now, more on the contract side. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: I have no interest in 13 doing what you guys do. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Fair enough. Good call. That's wise 15 of you. The convention services is what you're in now; right? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Uh-huh. 17 MR. GIORDANI: Do you manage a company that you're 18 also an owner of? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: No, I run the conventions 20 that come through the convention center. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, I'm sorry. So you work for the --22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: I'm a County employee. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Got it. Okay. Do you, considering 24 that I think all of your relatives who are in the law are on 25 the other side, not on the State side safe to say?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Correct. 1 2 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that you could be a fair 3 juror to us, the State --4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Yeah. 5 MR. GIORDANI: -- and Mr. Dickerson. Okay. Do you 6 think that you have a predisposition towards the defense, and I 7 don't mean to offend, I'm just --8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Yeah, no. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I've interacted with a couple 10 of your relatives. 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: I apologize. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you. I don't know if the other 13 lawyers in here have interacted with them, but can you promise 14 us that if you are selected that you can zip it and not talk 15 about what happens in this courtroom or the people involved 16 with your relatives? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: The facts of the case, 18 yes. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. What do you mean? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Currently interested on 21 the cross between the other side of the aisle. So I might ask 22 why one person does one thing over another. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 24 THE COURT: Do you understand you can't ask them that 25 while the trial's in session?

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## PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Oh, yes.

2 THE COURT: Once you're discharged, you can talk to 3 them about it, but during the process you can't ask them anything. You can't even say, oh, do you know Mr. Storms or do 4 5 you know Mr. Giordani. All you can say is that you're, you 6 know, serving as a juror. Can you do that? And then later 7 after you've been discharged you can gossip about --8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: I'm not interested in 9 talking to any of them right now anyway so. 10 THE COURT: Okay. 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: I didn't mean that like 12 that, but, no. 13 THE COURT: Okay. 14 MR. GIORDANI: And it's not that anybody here, you 15 know, has some positive or negative interaction with them; it's 16 that even saying the players might cause them to mistakenly, 17 you know, sway you one way or another or whatever it may be. 18 So just until the end of this can you promise to not talk about 19 anything with them? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Yes. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. You said you're -- well, you're 22 flying out but it's the night of the 20th? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: It's the afternoon of the 24 20th. 25 MR. GIORDANI: What time? JD Reporting, Inc.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: 1:00 or 2:00, something 1 2 like that. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I don't want to, misspeak, but 4 I think we're trending towards ending way before that Friday. 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: We're good. I run the 6 consumer electronics show; so if it went past that then it 7 would be an issue. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Understood. And your 2005 9 thing in Sparks? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Uh-huh. 10 11 MR. GIORDANI: Any carryover that that may have on 12 you being fair in this case? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: No. 14 MR. GIORDANI: What's your opinion of the criminal 15 justice system? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: I don't really have one. 17 MR. GIORDANI: You're just. 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Good people, bad people. 19 That's about the size. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. You just don't have any 21 interest in what we do; why? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Well, I mean, what I do 23 now I deal with the leases, the contracts, also stuff like that 24 so that's more my interest more so than being a trial attorney. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: I've heard enough of the 1 2 closing arguments when I grew up. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Right. Okay. Do you think you can be fair and give both sides a fair shake in this case? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 367: Yes. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Thank you, sir. You can pass 7 the microphone over. 8 It's Mr. Pursell? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yes, sir. 10 MR. GIORDANI: And you were on the jury previously? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yes. 12 MR. GIORDANI: And it's Badge 368 for the record. 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Right. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Did you find that to be, once it was 15 said and done, did you find that to be a positive experience? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yeah. I mean, it was --17 It was interesting, and it, I think took about it was long. 18 three or four days, something like that. It was like 16, 17 19 years ago I don't remember. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Now, I'm just going to ask you 21 another question but keep in mind what the Judge said. We 22 never want to know for any prior jury service what the verdict 23 was. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Uh-huh. 25 MR. GIORDANI: But you were an alternate? JD Reporting, Inc.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Right.

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2 MR. GIORDANI: You got sent out. I'm just curious 3 personally, after sitting and hearing everything, did you follow up to find out what your fellow jurors rendered -- what 4 5 the verdict they rendered? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yes. 7 MR. GIORDANI: You did? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Uh-huh. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Just because you were personally invested in the case? 10 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: I was just curious. Т 12 had spent enough time there so what happened. It would be like 13 watching a movie and then leaving five minutes before the end. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: You know, you invested so 16 much time whether it was a great movie or not you at least got 17 that far so it's just what happened. 18 MR. GIORDANI: Right. Now, again don't say what the 19 verdict was, but did you agree with the verdict that was 20 ultimately rendered by your fellow jurors? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yeah. Yeah, I did. 22 MR. GIORDANI: And what are the business publications 23 that you run? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: I run -- I run one called 25 Synopsis Sports and another one called Synopsis E Sports. It JD Reporting, Inc.

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basically covers the business side of sports and the E sports, 1 2 a competitive video game made a part of it and then sports 3 media advertising deals, that type of thing. MR. GIORDANI: Understood. You referenced several 4 5 family members that have a history of law enforcement? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yes. 7 MR. GIORDANI: And I assume you're a smart quy, you 8 get the gist of what I've been getting at --9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yeah. 10 MR. GIORDANI: -- with these other jurors. Should 11 the defense be concerned, well, should either side be concerned 12 that you might have a predisposition towards law enforcement? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: No, I don't think so. My 14 very first beat as a reporter when I first started writing was 15 in crime, and I like to think I was fair throughout the entire 16 process. I've met great people on the law enforcement side. 17 There's some people I didn't like on the law enforcement side. 18 Just like in every career path there's, you know, people all 19 sorts of personalities on both sides of it. I like to think I 20 could be fair. 21 MR. GIORDANI: And as a reporter, right, you were an 22 actual reporter? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Right. 24 MR. GIORDANI: You're supposed to be neutral; right? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yes. Absolutely.

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1 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Can you carry that over to your 2 jury service if you are selected here? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Yes, sir. MR. GIORDANI: And judge the case based upon the 4 5 evidence from the witness stand and not anything outside this 6 courtroom? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 368: Uh-huh. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you, sir. Please pass it down. 9 Ms. Blankenship. 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Yes. 11 MR. GTORDANT: 521? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: You got it. 13 MR. GIORDANI: I think that, correct me if I'm wrong, 14 when Juror Number 1, who's now left, was speaking earlier I saw 15 you nodding vigorously when she said something; what was that? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Just being able to be impartial to both sides. You know, I work with individuals 17 18 with disabilities and families that come from all different 19 levels of socioeconomic status. 20 MR. GTORDANT: Uh-huh. 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: So I can't go in there 22 and prejudge with any kind of prejudgments at all. You know, I 23 have to be very objective. Information that they share with 24 me, I may not agree with it, you know, I can't point fingers; I 25 can't point fault. I have to hear what they say and take it

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objectively and see how it's affecting what I do in supporting 1 2 the family and the children that I work with. 3 So in that sense I could, you know, I'm very open-minded both sides and burden of proof is on you guys. 4 Ι 5 mean, if you -- if you have evidence and you prove your case, I 6 have to judge accordingly in my opinion. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. It sounds like your job is 8 pretty difficult. 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Uh-huh. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Do you consider yourself without 11 minimizing the title, like somewhat of a social worker? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: I wear many hats. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: I'm a licensed teacher, 15 special education teacher. I'm a social worker. I'm a case 16 manager, service coordinator, sometimes a therapist because the 17 families we work with very medically fragile children as well 18 who are pretty much vegetables, but the parents aren't able to 19 give up on them, and so we're there for them to support them, listen to them and even if we inside we know that the child is 20 21 not a viable life, we still are in support of the family and 22 encourage them to not give up and just to be there for them as 23 much as they need us to. That's heavy stuff. 24 MR. GIORDANI:

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Uh-huh.

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MR. GIORDANI: So do you think that -- do you think 1 2 that you can carry over your personal experience to this 3 courtroom, obviously; right? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Yes. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: But being in that type of environment 6 frequently --7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Uh-huh. 8 MR. GIORDANI: -- do you consider yourself someone who is extremely empathetic? 9 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Yes, very empathetic, but 11 very also very logical, analytical, strategical. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Yes. 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: So I believe in due 14 process, and, you know, you've got to hear everything in order 15 to be able to come to an important decision. You can't just, you know, make a decision. It's like saying you don't like 16 17 broccoli. Well, how do you know if you haven't tried it. 18 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: You've got to take what's 20 there and make a decision based on that. MR. GIORDANI: Fair enough. Thank you, ma'am. 21 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Uh-huh. 23 MR. GIORDANI: If you can pass that microphone down, 24 I'd appreciate it. 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 521: Uh-huh. JD Reporting, Inc.

MR. GIORDANI: I want to say Wallace? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Wallace, yeah. 3 MR. GIORDANI: What's your badge number? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: 4 393. 5 MR. GIORDANI: How are you, ma'am? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Excellent. Thank you. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Your prior -- prior jury 8 service? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Yes. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Was it a positive experience overall? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Yes, it was. 12 MR. GIORDANI: When you came into that courtroom for 13 the first day to be selected like this, did you think it was 14 going to be a positive experience? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: No, I didn't. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: I tried to get out of it. 18 MR. GIORDANI: Usually the case. People really enjoy 19 it surprisingly when they actually get selected. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Yeah. 20 21 MR. GIORDANI: Your friend that's a DV detective? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Yes. 23 MR. GIORDANI: He's now patrol detective because they 24 don't have DV detectives anymore. 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Right. Yeah. JD Reporting, Inc.

MR. GIORDANI: You didn't hear his name on the list? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Did not. Thought I did. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, really? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Well, because you said 4 5 Detective Dan and I thought you were going to say his name, but 6 it wasn't the same last name. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you still talk to him 8 frequently? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Yes. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So the concern would be, you 11 know, Ms. Wallace might not be fair because she answers to a 12 law enforcement officer, and I don't mean that in a bad way you 13 answer to one. But you talk to one frequently? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Yes. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Can you -- whatever your determination 16 is, can you say that you would be fair in this case and your 17 personal relationship -- close personal relationship will not 18 affect your judgment? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Absolutely. I know -- I 19 20 know so. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Good. The situation with your 22 best friend's dad. 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Uh-huh. 24 MR. GIORDANI: That was -- that was pretty recent; 25 right? JD Reporting, Inc.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Yeah, it was two -- two 1 2 years ago in August. So, yeah, very recent. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Can you tell us just his last name. 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Kopp. K-o-p-p. 5 MR. GIORDANI: K-o-p-p. Okay. And you -- I think 6 you indicated you don't know if it went to trial because you --7 your friend would have told you if it went to trial? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Right. Well, and, yeah, 8 there was -- her life went in a different direction fairly 9 10 shortly after that incident so that sort of became the focus, 11 and we didn't talk much about her dad after that. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Oh. Okay. 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: She was involved in the 14 Group 61 shooting. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. Okay. Can I assume even though 16 you're very close with this family that whatever happened to him or if you learn something happened to him that you can be 17 18 fair to both sides in this case. 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: I never knew him. I've 20 never met him. So it's just his daughter that I was so close 21 to. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I did not realize that. Okay. 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: Uh-huh. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Thank you, ma'am. Anything 25 about -- do you have any prior interactions with law

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enforcement other than the detective? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: No. 3 MR. GIORDANI: And do you have a feeling one way or 4 another about the justice system? 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 393: It seems fair. It seems 6 that it works, and I think there are people that make mistakes 7 either side now and then. Nothing is ever perfect, but it 8 seems to do the job. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Fair enough. Thank you very much. 10 Can you pass that down. 11 And Ms. Mazzarella. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Mazzarella. 13 MR. GIORDANI: I'm sorry. Mazzarella. I wasn't 14 making fun. I'm Giordani so I get it. You had -- before you 15 raised your hand and I think we were talking about the gory 16 photos. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: No, I understand better 17 18 what you --19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Not a concern for you? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: No. 20 21 MR. GIORDANI: You're not -- you're not being forced 22 to stare. 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: I don't have to sit there 24 and analyze it for hours. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. Right. Do you have any JD Reporting, Inc.

positive or negative interactions with law enforcement in your 1 2 history? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: I'm neutral. I've had no 3 experience either way. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: Not even traffic ticket? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Traffic, yes, had some 7 incidents. It was -- I'm neutral about it. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you have a feeling or what 9 is your feeling about the criminal justice system as a whole? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Neutral also, either way. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you watch any shows? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: I used to watch TV. Ι 13 haven't for three or four years now. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, really. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: I don't watch TV. 16 MR. GIORDANI: What do you do instead? Are you a 17 reader? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: YouTube. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, yeah. 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: That's about it, yeah. Ι 21 don't really read. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. What was your former retail 23 employment -- unemployment? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: It was Michael's and then 24 25 before that --

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MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And before that was the 1 2 warehouse and you don't --3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: No. Michael's was at the warehouse and then I was VF Outlet. It was more a sales clerk. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Yeah. 6 7 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that you, based upon 8 everything I've talked with the other jurors, do you think 9 there's anything we should know about you or that you would 10 like to volunteer? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: I know that she had asked 12 if I had any experience. I was mugged once. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: This was like in the 15 early '90s. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: I was walking on a side 18 street. It was early in the morning and I was walking to work. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: And he just came out of 21 nowhere, and I knew he was probably going to, you know, mug me, 22 and I just kind of left my purse hanging off --23 MR. GIORDANI: Right. It's hard. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: I just knew. I just 25 thought let him grab it.

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1 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: And he grabbed it, and he 3 took off. So I was lucky. 4 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: And I did report it, and 6 it was a positive outcome. They did find my purse. He just 7 took the money, and he threw it in a garbage can, and I had all 8 my ID and everything. 9 MR. GIORDANI: So you got your stuff back. 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Yeah. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Do know if he was prosecuted? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: I don't know anything 13 about that. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Positive outcome. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Yeah. 15 16 MR. GIORDANI: Got your stuff back. You weren't 17 hurt. 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Yeah. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. You've heard the charges we've 20 listed in this case. 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Yes. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Two of them are conspiracy to rob and 23 robbery with a deadly weapon. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Yes. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Can you be fair in this case, JD Reporting, Inc.

notwithstanding the fact that you've been robbed or mugged? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 515: Yes. I would have to 3 hear all of the evidence, yes. 4 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Thank you, ma'am, I 5 appreciate it. And you can pass that back, and if you would, 6 folks, down the row. I promise we'll be done by Christmas. 7 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: My little people are busy. 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: David Marshal, 394. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you. You -- I talked to you a 10 little bit earlier --11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yes. 12 MR. GIORDANI: -- and you've being paying attention. 13 Is there anything about your relationship with law enforcement 14 that might cause you to be unfair to either side in this case? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: No. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And you -- that's your son 17 who --18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Yes. 19 MR. GIORDANI: You talk to him frequently? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: No. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. Why is that? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: They're up in Northern 23 California and we only go up maybe two or three times a year to 24 see the grandkids. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Okay.

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1 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: And we go to see the 2 grandkids. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. What kind of law enforcement is he in? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: He's -- it's public 6 safety police and fire. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: And he's a traffic 9 officer, you know, he's in charge of the motor -- motors 10 department. 11 MR. GIORDANI: All right. You know, we joke around a 12 little bit in this portion of the trial. 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Right. 14 MR. GIORDANI: But this is real serious stuff; right. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: Right. Yes. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that either side here 23 should be concerned with you as a juror in any way? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 394: No. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. You mentioned your sister, not

You can pass that down. 18 Ms. Becker, 396? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yes. 20 MR. GIORDANI: How are you? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Good. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Good. I have a similar question for 23 you. Your dad, deputy sheriff and then your friend is a civil 24 attorney? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yes. JD Reporting, Inc.

1 MR. GIORDANI: So with regard to your dad, you get 2 the gist of where we're going with these questions with law 3 enforcement? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: 4 Yep. 5 MR. GIORDANI: Can you be fair to both sides in this 6 case? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yes. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Can you wait to hear what law 9 enforcement witnesses have to say before rendering an opinion 10 on it? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yes. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Do you have a feeling or what's your 13 feeling about the criminal justice system in general? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: I mean, I think it's 15 I think like all things it could always be improved, but qood. 16 that's probably with everything. Probably in all of our 17 careers there's some aspect that could be improved. So I think 18 in general though pretty good. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Do you -- do you have a cell phone 20 with you? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: I do. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you have your location 23 services on? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: I don't think so. Only 25 for emergency personnel I'm pretty sure. JD Reporting, Inc.

MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I'm just curious. Are you 1 2 familiar or do you use, like, social media? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yes. MR. GIORDANI: Can you promise -- I'm only asking you 4 5 this because you're young and not that I'm -- you guys 6 aren't -- can you stay off the social media and not publish 7 that if you're selected as a juror? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yes. 9 MR. GIORDANI: And I'm not, like, picking on you. 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: No, I'm fine. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you -- what's your cell 12 carrier? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Verizon. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And have you ever looked at 15 your cell phone records before? Meaning, do you know what's 16 contained at Verizon with regard to your cell phone? 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: No, I don't think so. 18 I've only ever compared with my sisters to see who used the 19 most data. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Oh. Okay. 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Them or me. 22 MR. GIORDANI: All right. And do you watch any --23 any shows or anything like documentaries or Netflix or whatever it may be on? 24 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yeah, we do. JD Reporting, Inc.

MR. GIORDANI: Like what? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: We just watched the one, 3 I forget what it's called, but it was about the five boys in 4 New York. 5 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, yeah. 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: They got convicted 7 wrongly for the rape of that lady --8 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: -- in Central Park. I have No Activity I watch. I follow SVU and stuff like that, 10 11 Bluebloods, but --12 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So you have some kind of 13 interest in the system or just good drama? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Probably both. Probably 15 more the drama side if I'm being honest. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: I always watch like 18 Grey's and stuff. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, Grey's Anatomy? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yeah. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. The documentary that you 22 referenced, I forget the name of it, Central Park Filing I 23 think or something like that. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yeah. 24 25 MR. GIORDANI: You know, that's a unique case just

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like every case is; right? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yes. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Would you agree with me there? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: 4 Yes. 5 MR. GIORDANI: What we don't want is people who will 6 try to right some wrong that they've learned of in some other 7 case and bring that into this courtroom. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Right. 8 9 MR. GIORDANI: Can you judge this case based upon 10 what you hear from that witness stand? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 396: Yep. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. All right. Thank you, ma'am. 13 If you can pass the microphone down. 14 What's your badge number, ma'am? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: 473. 16 MR. GIORDANI: You have a brother-in-law and a friend 17 in law enforcement; right? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: My brother-in-law and 19 uncle. 20 MR. GIORDANI: I'm sorry? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Brother-in-law and uncle. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And you've heard the other 23 questions of the other jurors. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Uh-huh. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Can you be fair to both sides in this

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case and judge law enforcement officers like you would any 1 2 other witness? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Yeah. 4 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: I believe so. 6 MR. GIORDANI: I have to ask you --7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Wait. Don't say the word 8 though. 9 MR. GIORDANI: What word? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Oh, I thought you were 11 going to say what you were saying earlier. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Is there a word that -- I 13 noticed that you got a little bit emotional earlier. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: I did. I don't like 15 talking about what you brought up earlier. I just get, like, 16 really hot. 17 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Just the words caused you to 18 get emotional? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: I mean, not emotional. I 20 just get, like, really hot and like, lightheaded, like talking 21 about it. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I'll move on from that. I want 23 to talk to you about the 2000 --24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: 9. 25 MR. GIORDANI: 9 --

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Uh-huh. 1 2 MR. GIORDANI: -- situation that ultimately just 3 resulted in a dismissal; right? 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Uh-huh. 5 MR. GIORDANI: And was that -- is there anything 6 about that experience you had with the system that might bleed 7 over into this case? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: No, I feel like I wasn't 9 really involved in it. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, yeah. Understood. Okay. And do 11 you have any -- other than your relationships with law 12 enforcement, do you have any positive or negative interactions 13 with law enforcement outside of those relationships? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: I think both traffic 15 stuff good and bad, yeah. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Fair and neutral. Do you believe you 17 would be fair and neutral? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 473: Yep. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Even considering those -- thank you. 20 You can pass the microphone. 21 Mr. Williams. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yes, sir. Gavin 23 Williams. 480. 24 MR. GIORDANI: How are you doing? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: I'm doing great. How are JD Reporting, Inc.

1 you doing?

2 MR. GIORDANI: Good. Your friend, cousin? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Right. MR. GIORDANI: Kenneth; right? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yes, sir. 6 MR. GIORDANI: You learned about what happened pretty 7 quickly after? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yes. 9 MR. GIORDANI: It sounds like you're close with them? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yeah. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. And I -- I'm personally 12 familiar with the facts so I'm going to ask you some vague 13 questions, but --14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Okay. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Everything that went down with that 16 situation, is that something that you are going to carry over 17 to law enforcement here? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Not at all. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Did you ever see any video 20 footage? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: I did. 22 MR. GIORDANI: You did? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yeah. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Was that out of character for 25 Kenneth?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: How he was acting? 1 2 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Only the part showing pulling out the gun, yeah. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yeah. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Did you know him to have a gun or be 8 erratic with guns? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: No, not erratic. I did 10 know he had one --11 MR. GTORDANT: Yeah. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: -- and stuff like that, 13 but hopefully for protection while everybody else has one. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Referring to that video --15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Okay. 16 MR. GIORDANI: -- I think we both saw, you and I. 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yes. Absolutely. 18 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that what ultimately 19 happened, what the officers had to do was fair considering the 20 circumstances? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yeah. I said that 22 yesterday. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Oh. I missed that. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: I understand they were 25 protecting [inaudible] acting out of their protocol for that JD Reporting, Inc.

1 situation.

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2 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So I missed that part, I 3 apologize.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: No. I was just
reiterating. I apologize. It's not disrespect.

6 MR. GIORDANI: So you're a bar back and you've got 7 the aviator stadium and T-Mobile now; right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: I do.

9 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And do you -- well, like last 10 night was a night's game, did you have to work last night or 11 the night before?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: I didn't work last night
because I was here --

14 MR. GIORDANI: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: -- but I let everybody
know I was doing my duty and stuff like that.

17 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Not going to be a concern if we 18 have --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: No. Yeah, they already know, and I printed off the paperwork and stuff saying that I was here so I'll be covered.

22 MR. GIORDANI: Have you had -- other than Kenneth's 23 situation, have you had positive or negative interactions with 24 law enforcement in your life?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: I wouldn't say positive

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or negative. Any interaction I've had, I paid my consequences, 1 2 and I was treated fairly and stuff like that. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Yeah. That was the minor marijuana thing? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yeah. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that you're the type of 7 person, you're 23, you have life experience, but not as much as 8 some of your fellow jurors --9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Absolutely. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that you'd be a good fit 11 for this jury? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: I do. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: I know the problem is 15 talking about experience I'm not in many respect. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Maybe --PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: -- I'm all about seeing 17 18 both sides before judging anything. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Obviously, heavy -- well, 20 serious charges in this case; right? It appears to me, 21 observing you and hearing you speak that you're going to have 22 no problem sitting, judging the evidence as it comes in and 23 waiting to render a decision. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Right. 25 MR. GIORDANI: You don't seem erratic in any way.

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1 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: Yeah, no, I'm okay. 2 MR. GIORDANI: And you think you can be fair to both 3 sides in this case? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 480: A hundred percent. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you, sir. Pass it to the left 6 side over. 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: I'm Tyler Bayne, 408. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you. The several police 9 officers that you know from your coaching experience --10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Uh-huh. 11 MR. GIORDANI: -- you know the gist of my question, 12 do you think that's going to cause you to be unfair to both 13 sides in this case? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: No, sir. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I assume you know them by name? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: I do. 17 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So they wouldn't be on our 18 witness list, obviously? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: No. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Are there any others that whose kids 21 you coached that you just don't know the names of? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: There may be. The 23 Bennetts. I think you brought up some Bennetts. Their father 24 may be one of them that's in the club, but that's not somebody 25 I interact with personally.

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MR. GIORDANI: Okay. You had a prior jury service? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: I did, but it was 3 dismissed or it was settled before we --4 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. So you were just released? 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Correct. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Positive or negative 7 experience? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Neutral. We did this and 9 then we left. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you have a feeling or an 11 opinion on the criminal justice system? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: I worked -- just as a 13 little background. For 18 years I ran an alarm monitoring and 14 response company. So I've worked on response and been involved 15 with home invasions both in apprehension and then on the 16 management side of it. So I've had lots of interaction with 17 Metro and police personnel in that regard. As far as the 18 justice system, like several people said, there's certainly 19 some tweaks that need to be made, but overall it's pretty good. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. What company was that that you 21 worked for? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Total Safety 23 Incorporated. TSI. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Local? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Yeah.

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MR. GIORDANI: Did you ever respond while something 1 2 was still in progress? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Correct. Yes. MR. GIORDANI: Oh, wow. Okay. Did you intervene or 4 5 have to intervene in any situation? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Three times. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Wow. Did you make any arrests? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Yes, three. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Do you think that, considering 10 your background and you gotta -- you're a busy, busy man --11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: A lot going on. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that you can sit for the 13 next say week or so, week and a half, focus on this case and 14 the evidence you hear in this courtroom and not be distracted 15 by your 25 jobs? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 408: Yes. I'll have very busy 17 evenings for sure. 18 MR. GIORDANI: All right. Thank you, sir, you can 19 pass the microphone. 20 It's Ms Pucci-Johnson? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yes. 22 MR. GIORDANI: 412? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yes. 24 MR. GIORDANI: And you have a best friend's dad who's 25 now the sheriff of Napa?

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1 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yes. 2 MR. GIORDANI: That's a pretty big gig; right? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yeah. 4 MR. GIORDANI: And he used to be one of the PR quys 5 with Metro? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yeah. 7 MR. GIORDANI: What's his last name? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Plummer. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And while you were describing 10 that, I don't know if I misheard or what, but I thought you 11 said I was in the news media for several years? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: I was. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. How? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: I was an executive 15 producer at Fox 5 News for the last five years of my career. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: But I worked at Channel 17 18 3, Channel 13. I was involved in the news for 14 years. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. With regard to Fox, were you 20 involved and I quess you -- did you say executive producer? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Correct. 22 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. So were you involved in making 23 the decision of what to air and what not to? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Correct. 25 MR. GIORDANI: Lots of the Fox 5, especially at

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night, they show like these court cases from that day; right?
 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yeah.

MR. GIORDANI: Was -- what goes into your calculation? What went into your calculation as to what type of criminal cases you should show?

6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Well, mainly that 7 decision would be made at the beginning of the day when we 8 would send the camera to court or a reporter to court. My job 9 mainly consisted of logging that video if it was a photographer 10 sent to court, and I would have the job of logging the video, 11 going through -- determining what was, you know, what was the 12 principal matter at hand that day. Some days it would be 13 continued from the day before, and it would just be a brief 14 synopsis of what happened in court that day.

15

MR. GIORDANI: Right.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: At other times there would be a reporter on the case where they would give me, you know, kind of the summary of what happened, and then I would mainly write transitions to them and they would summarize it.

20

MR. GIORDANI: Okay.

21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: But it would -- it would 22 usually consist of, you know, ahead of time determining what 23 was worthy of being aired that day.

24 MR. GIORDANI: Got it. And worthy meaning 25 interesting, salacious sometimes or --

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: No, not salacious but 1 2 determining factors in the case. Like, you know, we wouldn't 3 be here for jury duty. We wouldn't, you know, be here on a day where you start at 1:30 maybe and not a lot going on. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: Got it. Understood. Okay. And then 6 you got out of that, and you went to brand development and 7 [inaudible]. 8 Yes. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: MR. GIORDANI: Why is it that you got out of the news 9 10 business? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: The philosophy of the --12 of journalism since I learned it in college had changed, and I 13 didn't agree really with the philosophies of where it was 14 going. 15 MR. GIORDANI: Can you give me a little more detail. 16 I think I know what you're saying, but I mean --17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Just journalistically 18 from a -- from a perspective of, you know, wanting to get to 19 deeper issues. Sometimes things that they uncover isn't 20 really, you know, impacting on anybody else's life except a 21 small group of people or, you know, something that's gone viral 22 which --23 MR. GIORDANI: Right. Like look at this chipmunk on 24 skis or --25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Right. JD Reporting, Inc.

1 MR. GIORDANI: Not quite news. 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yeah. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Would you agree with the general sense and that the news should be neutral? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yes. Absolutely. 6 MR. GIORDANI: Right. Fact-finding, neutral. 7 Reporting; right? 8 Yes. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: MR. GIORDANI: Is that a personal philosophy that you 9 10 hold? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yes. Absolutely. 12 MR. GIORDANI: Do you think that you could be fair to 13 both sides in this case? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 412: Yes. 15 MR. GIORDANI: I appreciate it, ma'am. You can pass 16 the microphone. 17 Mr. Cadieux, 413? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: Yes. 19 MR. GIORDANI: Sir, that situation that you had with 20 your family, was that pretty recent? 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: February of this year. 22 MR. GIORDANI: A lot. Is there still -- well, have 23 you been updated? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: Actually, no, not in a 25 while. My last update that I received was in April of this JD Reporting, Inc.

1 year.

2 MR. GIORDANI: And that -- was that through the FBI? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: The FBI keeps things related to this matter very compartmentalized. So, no. Most 4 5 of my updates came from the direct investigator contact that I 6 had with Metro. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. If anyone from Metro that we 8 call in this case responded to your home, would you still be 9 able to judge them fairly? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: Yes. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. I'm just saying that because I 12 would presume you don't know every officer who you met? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: No, there where a lot. 14 And honestly I can probably remember two, and none of them were 15 on the list that you --MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. The ones you do remember 16 17 who had some impact on you --18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: I've had direct contact 19 with them since and I have not heard any of those. 20 MR. GIORDANI: You discussed with the Judge about 21 your close family friend that was convicted. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: Yes. 23 MR. GIORDANI: And the general gist of what I 24 understood was, you felt that the Judge should have had more 25 discretion and individualized his punishment rather than follow

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the mandatory guidelines set by some higher court? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: I would agree, yes. 3 MR. GIORDANI: I talked with one of your fellow 4 jurors, I forget who, but we discussed your role in this is 5 determining whether we've proven our case guilty or not guilty. 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: Yes. 7 MR. GIORDANI: It's not going to be sentencing --PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: I understand. 8 9 MR. GIORDANI: Anything that whether you agree or 10 disagree which you clearly disagree with what happened to your 11 friend -- close family friend, can you set that aside and judge 12 this case based upon the law the Judge gives you? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: Yes. 14 MR. GIORDANI: And can you follow that law even if 15 you may not agree with it? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: Yes. 17 MR. GIORDANI: What -- how are you attached to NASA? 18 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: I was in the research and 19 development division and the meteorology and then propulsion 20 laboratory. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: I was a pilot for them. 23 We were working on initially cloud seeding in the Dakotas, 24 trying to eradicate hailstorms, that decimated the crops and trying to make wet clouds rain more. And then on the 25

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propulsion side I have a background in fluid dynamics. And we 1 2 were working on a new type of engine that ultimately did not 3 really go anywhere.

4 MR. GIORDANI: And was that a temporary job based 5 upon the project?

6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: It was a contract 7 position while I was trying to leverage to get into a permanent 8 position. Unfortunately, the early 2000s were not a great time 9 to be part of government budgets. So I spent the rest of my 10 career in commercial aviation.

11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And currently Alaska. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 413: Alaska Airlines, yes. 13 Based in San Francisco.

14 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. All right. Thank you, sir, I 15 appreciate it.

Ms. Selby, 418; correct?

16

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: Correct. 17

18 MR. GIORDANI: You had a prior jury service? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418:

20 MR. GIORDANI: Criminal case and without saying the 21 verdict, there was a verdict rendered; correct?

I did.

22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: You know I started to 23 think about it last night because I was an alternate, and I 24 think I remembered it wrong, but I was an alternate, and I 25 believe the Judge asked me if they came to a verdict, but I --

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if I remember right it was settled and then everybody was 1 2 dismissed. 3 MR. GIORDANI: Oh, okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: Sorry about that. 4 5 MR. GIORDANI: No, that's okay. I appreciate the 6 clarification. Was that overall positive or negative 7 experience for you? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: Fine. 9 MR. GIORDANI: Neutral? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: Uh-huh. 11 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. Any positive or negative 12 interactions with law enforcement in your past? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: No. 14 MR. GIORDANI: Do you have any feelings or what is 15 your feeling, I guess, about the criminal justice system? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: I believe it works. MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And can you be fair to both 17 18 sides in this case and hold us, the State, to our burden of 19 proof? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: [Inaudible]. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Anything that I've discussed with your 22 fellow jurors or any point that's been brought up by a fellow 23 juror that you think, hey, I should chime in on that or we the 24 parties might want to know about you? 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: I don't really watch TV.

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1 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: Hockey. I'm a Knights 3 fan. 4 MR. GIORDANI: Nice. 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: That's about it. But I 6 actually turn on the news in the morning, pause it and 7 fast-forward it to the weather and turn it off. 8 MR. GIORDANI: They have an app for that. All right. 9 Do you think you could be fair and you'd be a good juror for 10 this case? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 418: I can be fair. 12 MR. 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THE COURT: Just keep the microphone close to your 1 2 mouth --3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Oh, sorry. THE COURT: Because you have a soft voice and you're 4 5 a little bit hard to hear. 6 So you -- you're on various floors. Do you ever work 7 in, like, emergency or trauma at UMC? 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Yes. THE COURT: Okay. Is that rare, or do you frequently 9 10 work in the trauma or ER area? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: At this moment, since 12 September, it's rare now. 13 THE COURT: Okay. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: But before that it was 15 pretty frequent. Okay. And so is it fair to say that in 16 THE COURT: 17 your work as -- as a nurse at UMC you've encountered victims of 18 gunshots, victims of stabbings, and that sort of thing? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Yes. 20 THE COURT: Car accidents, all of that? Have you had 21 much interaction with police officers as a result of your work 22 as a -- when you were working in trauma or ER? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Yes. 24 THE COURT: Okay. Any, I guess, impressions 25 favorable or negative, one way or the other based on your

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interactions with law enforcement? 1 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: No. 3 THE COURT: Okay. Kind of neutral? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Neutral. 4 5 THE COURT: All right. And then are you married, 6 domestic partner, significant other? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I'm married. 8 THE COURT: What does your spouse do? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: He's a surgical tech in 10 the trauma of UMC. 11 THE COURT: Okay. And any children? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Six. 13 THE COURT: Okay. And what's the age range? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Range from 8 to 21. 15 THE COURT: Okay. And have you ever been a juror 16 before? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: 17 No. 18 THE COURT: Have you or anyone close you ever been 19 arrested or charged or accused of a crime? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Yes. 21 Tell me about that. THE COURT: 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I was a troubled youth. 23 THE COURT: Okay. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I just -- misdemeanors probably all the way till I was 22 maybe. 25

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Okay. Well, and where did you grow up? 1 THE COURT: 2 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Tn TA. 3 THE COURT: Okay. How long have you lived here in Clark County? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: 21 years now. 6 THE COURT: Okay. So you said you were a troubled 7 youth, and you had a lot of misdemeanors. 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: My daughter, my son. 9 THE COURT: Okay. Now, at the age of 18 you become 10 an adult. Did you have any contacts -- negative contacts or 11 charges as an adult once you turned 18? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Yes, I did have a 13 misdemeanor. 14 THE COURT: Okay. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I think I was 18. 16 Like for what? THE COURT: 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I decided I wanted to be 18 a stripper and got, I think I got in trouble for soliciting. 19 THE COURT: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I don't know if I was 20 21 younger. 22 THE COURT: Okay. Was that, like, were you arrested 23 or did you get a citation? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I got a citation or 25 ticket or something.

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THE COURT: Okay. All right. Well, now, you're an
 RN.
 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Yes.
 THE COURT: So it sounds to me like you turned your

4 THE COURT: So it sounds to me like you turned your 5 life really around from wannabe stripper to RN.

6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I did -- I was 7 embarrassed.

THE COURT: Okay.

9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I could not go home and 10 tell my mom what I did so I never wanted to tell her. Now I'm 11 embarrassed right now.

12 THE COURT: Okay. Well, no, here's my take on jury 13 selection. Everybody I think is probably so concerned about 14 what they've had to say and disclose that no one's paying 15 attention really to you or remembering that. But what other 16 kinds of things -- what other kinds of negative contacts did 17 you have with law enforcement when you were younger under 18 as 18 a juvenile?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Just when I was younger?
THE COURT: Uh-huh.

21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I hung out with a lot of 22 gang members in LA.

THE COURT: Okay. Was that because of theneighborhood you grew up in?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: It was.

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THE COURT: Okay. And I'm assuming you went to 1 2 school, like high school and things like that with people who 3 were gang members? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: It was. Pretty much I 4 5 was a straight A student. 6 THE COURT: Okay. 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: And then --8 THE COURT: Okay. So were you taken to, like, 9 juvenile detention and that sort of thing? 10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I was. 11 THE COURT: Okay. Were you ever incarcerated as a 12 juvenile beyond just the kind of pretrial detention? Did you 13 ever go to like a youth facility? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: T did. 15 THE COURT: Okay. On what kinds of charges? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: It was assault and 17 battery. 18 THE COURT: Okay. And just in a nutshell what were 19 the circumstances of that? Was it a fight with a classmate 20 or --21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: It was a fight with a 22 neighbor. 23 THE COURT: Okay. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: That was -- that 25 assaulted my mom and just -- and I just took it to the next JD Reporting, Inc.

1 level.

2 THE COURT: Okay. Was your mom, I'm sorry, not your 3 mom but was the neighbor an adult? 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Yes. 5 THE COURT: Okay. What are your feelings just sort 6 of generally and overall as to how you were treated in the 7 justice system, whether by police or the Courts, the 8 prosecutors, your own counsel? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I'm actually -- it was I 10 felt like it was just their job, nothing out of the ordinary. 11 THE COURT: Okay. And then you also mentioned that 12 both your son and daughter have had some problems. Can you 13 tell me a little bit more about that. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Actually I don't know 15 much about the 21 year old. 16 THE COURT: Okay. 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Actually, I guess she's 18 okay. Was there one incident where law 3 enforcement was involved or more than one incident? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Probably more than one. 4 5 THE COURT: Okay. And did you ever have to go to 6 court and testify as a victim or anything like that? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I did. 8 THE COURT: Okay. Just once or more than once? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I believe twice. 10 THE COURT: Okay. I went to school for nursing, and she became an 4 5 officer. Okay. What's she doing now? 6 THE COURT: 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: She -- I think she's on 8 the -- on The Strip. I haven't talked to her and about a 9 month, but --10 THE COURT: Okay. 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: -- our kids usually go to 12 dance classes together. 13 THE COURT: Okay. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: An officer I worked with 15 at Boys and Girls club, I think he teaches people self-defense. 16 I don't know exactly what he does, but I just see him on the 17 news and I see him at UMC. 18 THE COURT: Okay. And then any friends or family 19 that work in the legal field? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I have a niece from my 21 husband's side that's Judge clerk. I don't know which Judge. 22 THE COURT: Oh, a judicial clerk? 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Yes. THE COURT: And where is that? 24 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Here, but I don't know

3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: No.
4	THE COURT: Okay. So do you know if it's District
5	Court like what I'm do what I do, or do know if it's family
6	court or the Supreme Court? Do you know
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I think it's that
8	whatever she does is civil. I don't really
9	THE COURT: Civil. Okay. And what about a serious
10	crime. Do you have any close friends or family that have been
11	victims of a serious crime?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: No.
13	THE COURT: All right. Do you feel like you're the
14	kind of person who would make a good juror?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I don't know.
16	THE COURT: Well, why are you let me ask you this.
17	Why are you hesitating?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I guess I'm not sure
19	either way.
20	THE COURT: Okay.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I think I'm just tired
22	right now.
23	THE COURT: Okay. And then I neglected to ask you.
24	What racial or ethnic group or groups do you identify yourself
25	as?
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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Hispanic. 1 2 THE COURT: All right. Mr. Giordani, you may follow up with this prospective juror. 3 4 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you. I'll be quick, Ms. Simon. 5 And I know you're tired. 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Okay. 7 MR. GIORDANI: Lots of interactions with police in 8 your youth; right? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: Uh-huh. 10 MR. GIORDANI: Are you going to be able -- well, do 11 you like police, not like police, are you neutral? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 183: I'm neutral. Any friends or family in 3 law enforcement or the legal field? 4 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: No. 5 THE COURT: No one at all? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: No. 7 THE COURT: Did you hear me or Mr. Giordani ask any 8 of the other jurors a question and as you sat there in the 9 audience you thought oh, yeah, that pertains to me or I'd have 10 to answer that one? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: No. 12 THE COURT: Okay. 23 THE COURT: I promise. All right. Is it okay -24 have a seat or --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: I'm all right.

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Is it all right for you to stay little 1 THE COURT: 2 bit after 5:00? 3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yes, it's fine. THE COURT: Okay. And like I said, we won't keep you 4 5 too long. 6 Mr. Giordani, you may continue with this line of 7 questioning. 8 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you. And I just have few brief 9 questions. 10 Sure. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: 11 MR. GIORDANI: What type of training, education do 12 you have in order to do your job as an engineer. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: I have a bachelor's in 13 14 electrical engineering and lots of -- I worked at AT&T for a 15 little over a decade, I believe, and then another company doing 16 wireless and then Verizon for about the last five and half 17 years, and, you know, when you work for one of these carriers 18 there's a lot of training and classes that you take to get up 19 on the latest technology whether it's LTE, 5G or whatever it 20 is. 21 MR. GIORDANI: Got it. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: So we take a lot of 23 classes on that kind of thing. 24 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. And are you familiar with 25 generally the types of information that can be gleaned through

1 records when a cell phone, handheld device interacts with the 2 cell tower?

3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yes, I am. MR. GIORDANI: Are you familiar with the records that 4 5 are kept by Verizon, the types of records I mean? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: In a general way I would 7 But that's not really, you know, what we do in my say yes. 8 department. We build the network, and then there's other 9 people that are worried about, you know, maybe, you know, 10 building and whatnot. But I'm familiar with what, you know, 11 what the phone sends to the network and what comes back and, 12 you know, what you can tell about, you know, the phone. 13 MR. GIORDANI: Okay. You've being paying attention I 14 presume when we talked to all your fellow jurors? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yes. 16 MR. GIORDANI: Today at least. Is there anything 17 about you, your life experience, your interactions with your 18 work that might bleed into this case? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: No. 20 MR. GIORDANI: Meaning, can you be fair and impartial 21 in this case to both sides? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yes, I think so. 23 MR. GIORDANI: Thank you very much, sir, and I'll 24 pass. 25 THE COURT: All right. There may be some evidence

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relating to phone records that are presented. Can you if 1 2 you're selected as a juror, just confine your consideration and 3 deliberation just to what's presented here from the witness stand and the physical exhibits and other -- not other things 4 5 you may have experienced or learned by virtue of your job; does 6 that make sense? 7 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yes. 8 THE COURT: All right. So if something is not 9 testified to you can't bring in your specialized experience 10 and, you know, consider that. You just have to consider what 11 all the State presents. 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yeah. 13 THE COURT: Does that make sense? 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yes. And the answer is 15 yes. 16 All right. THE COURT: 17 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: I can do that. 18 THE COURT: If the defense would like to question at 19 this time just relating to this prospective juror's job --20 MR. STORMS: Sure. 21 THE COURT: -- and work experience. And then other 22 questions we can follow up with. 23 MR. STORMS: Mr. Gunnell, you mentioned you worked 24 for a third carrier besides Verizon and AT&T; what would that 25 be?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Well, the third carrier 1 2 was a startup called Next Wave. 3 MR. STORMS: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: We were down in 4 5 They were doing -- developing a technology called Henderson. 6 WYMAX which was a competitor to LTE and LTE won and WYMAX lost. 7 The VHS, beta --MR. STORMS: 8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Exactly. 9 MR. STORMS: The beta --10 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yeah. LTE got the market 11 share. 12 MR. STORMS: And all of your work here with phones 13 has been in the valley or other places besides here in the 14 valley? 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Most of it has been -- so 16 when I worked for AT&T, I started up in Salt Lake City and in 17 I was in what was called an engineer development Seattle. 18 They trained us right out of college, and I was in program. 19 Salt Lake for a while, but I've been in Las Vegas for 21 years. 20 I did work from one other entity that was a government entity 21 that was, I'm not supposed to talk a lot about, but there was 22 some work that we did that was similarish. 23 So does it -- does your work with these MR. STORMS: 24 networks there you essentially have a visual picture in your 25 mind of where most of these towers are in your network; is it

1 all in that kind of granular level that you're familiar with 2 the network?

3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: So I'm familiar with
4 Verizon's network. So everybody has a different network.
5 Verizon has their own network. AT&T has different cell sites.
6 Occasionally, they're on the same pole.

MR. STORMS: Yes.

8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: You might see a pole and 9 lots of antennas and that's called pole located. So Verizon's 10 network, I'm pretty familiar, I mean, if you told me, hey, you 11 know, is there a cell tower over at this cross street, I might 12 know it; I might not. We have a lot of towers.

MR. STORMS: Uh-huh.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: So you know, I can't say I know every single one of them, but I might, you know, I might know a particular tower in a certain area of town. Again, it's only the Verizon's network. I worked for AT&T years ago, but it was so long ago their network has grown so much it, you know, I wouldn't know much about that, and T-Mobile I know very little about, Sprint less.

21 MR. STORMS: What's your understanding of 22 triangulation with these towers?

23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: You mean as far as
24 locating where --

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MR. STORMS: Yes.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: -- a person is? 1 Is 2 there -- there is the capability to figure out where -- where 3 people are, you know, part of that is due to E911 which has been mandated for a while that, you know, they want the 4 5 carriers to try and figure out where people are. If somebody 6 makes an E911 call you want to try and figure out where they 7 are so they can send an ambulance or police or whatever to that 8 location. 9 So when you say where they are, what MR. STORMS: 10 sort of proximity do you understand phones to potentially get a 11 triangulation of an individual user's call in? 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: It depends. To be honest with you, I'm not a hundred percent sure exactly how granular 13 14 you can get a specific user. It kind of -- it might depend on 15 the type of phone that they have and where in the network they 16 are. 17 Is that something you concern yourself THE COURT: 18 with as part of your job? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: No. 20 THE COURT: Okay. 21 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: No, it's not -- my job if 22 I can kind of answer that question. 23 THE COURT: Please. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: My job is -- we look at 24 25 Verizon's network and, oh, my gosh, we've just had New Year's

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Where were the places where we didn't have enough 1 Eve. 2 We have a ton of people over here and life is capacity. 3 beautiful, but downtown, we have a ton of people or we have a festival or something at a convention center. My job is to 4 5 figure out what -- how do we augment capacity so people can 6 still stream and upload to Facebook or whatever when they're at 7 an event. That's the kind of thing that I do.

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THE COURT: Okay.

9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: So I'm -- I'm not in the 10 business of trying to figure out -- in fact, as employees we 11 are strictly forbidden to, you know, doing anything that would 12 identify anybody even -- even a coworker. You know, we have a 13 testing person that is going out and doing testing. We are 14 strictly forbidden to do anything that could possibly tell 15 where they are. You know, they went home this way and, oh, 16 there's a bar over there and, you know, they're, you know, that 17 kind of thing is forbidden.

18 THE COURT: Right. Or Wanda's house is here.
19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Exactly. Wanda's house,
20 I heard you hanging, you know, we can't do any of that.

THE COURT: Okay.

22 MR. STORMS: So if we're talking in terms of you have 23 a cell phone, you know it hits a particular tower and you have 24 a panel on that tower, what is your understanding of the 25 triangulation that could be done in that circumstance?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: If the cell phone is --1 2 is on a particular tower -- let me -- let me first of all say 3 as an RF engineer, no one has ever come to me, you know, in any 4 kind of capacity and said, hey, we're from Metro or we're 5 from -- I'm a detective from somewhere, and here we have some 6 data, and we need to figure out was -- was Mr. Jones at the 7 corner of First and Elm, you know, according to these records. 8 I've never done that.

9 Just from an RF perspective, that means radio 10 frequency, you know, cell phones are radios, a tower will cover 11 a certain area, and a given tower might cover a large area if 12 it's out by Stateline where there's not a lot of population or 13 if it's on The Strip it might cover 300 feet of what we call 14 small cell. So you could probably tell if somebody was near a 15 You could probably say, well, the record shows small cell. 16 they were on this small cell, and I could tell that that small 17 cell only covers 500 feet in each direction because it's very 18 low power. So it's a high likelihood that that person was 19 within 500 feet of that small cell.

If they're out, you know, near Stateline and they're somewhere along maybe I-15, I'd have a much lower probability of telling where they were. I'd say, well, they're probably somewhere between Prim and Jean --

24 MR. STORMS: So your -- sorry I didn't want to --25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yeah, no.

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1	THE COURT: Do you have specialized knowledge by		
2	virtue of your job of, you know, whether it's a cell tower		
3	that's going to be, you said a small cell I think or, like, the		
4	Stateline, or is it kind of the same general knowledge that we		
5	all would have that, wow, there's lots of people on The Strip,		
6	and there's not a lot of people in Sloan? Or do you have kind		
7	of more a specialized knowledge because of your job, or is it		
8	just sort of the same intuitive knowledge we would all have,		
9	like, downtown's crowded and, you know, maybe Logandale is less		
10	crowded kind of a thing.		
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Let me repeat your		
12	question and see if I understand it. So if I could you're		
13	asking me do I have any knowledge that cell site, let's call it		
14	Cactus, we give them names.		
15	THE COURT: Okay.		
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: So you know, the Cactus		
17	cell site that the Cactus cell site has certain individuals		
18	around them		
19	THE COURT: No, no. Like how many what was the		
20	term you used?		
21	MR. STORMS: A panel?		
22	THE COURT: Right. Because intuitively or just based		
23	on general knowledge we all know okay, there's lots of		
24	people on The Strip, and there's not a lot of people maybe in		
25	Logandale or not a lot of people out at Primm.		

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Right.

THE COURT: Do you have any more unique or special knowledge of that other than what we all would kind of know based on some areas are very populated and dense and other areas aren't populated and dense?

6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: That the -- the 7 special -- the only specialized knowledge I guess I would have 8 is that there is a lot of cell phone data traffic in a 9 particular area, which almost always means there's a lot of 10 people unless you had, you know, three people there and they 11 were all trying to screen 10 Netflix movies at the same time. 12 Okay. So that would show up differently? THE COURT: 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Yeah.

THE COURT: Okay.

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MR. STORMS: But logically if you saw a cell tower in, say, downtown or on a freeway exchange where there's a lot of people passing through using their cell phones, is that going to say something to you about the type of tower that is, the range of the tower?

20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: I'm not -- I know about 21 the range of the towers because I designed them. So I can -- I 22 can tell you that, you know, like I said, we have a tower not 23 far from here that's on the top of, I can't remember which 24 building. It's not far from the Fremont Street Experience and 25 it happens to capture a lot of traffic, maybe even some of the

1 people out in the hall here.

2

MR. STORMS: Uh-huh.

3 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: And that one has a ton of traffic on it just because it happens to hit a lot of big 4 5 high-rise buildings. So if somebody were to say that, you 6 know, hey, this person was making a phone call on the Las Vegas 7 main cell site, which it just happened to be what it's called, 8 I could probably tell them, well, there's a good chance that 9 they were probably within about a mile of that cell site. It's not going to -- if somebody said were they 5 miles away, I'd 10 11 say no way. That's way too far. Is that -- am I answering 12 your question? 13 MR. STORMS: Yes. 14 THE COURT: Right, yes, thank you. No other 15 questions? 16 No other questions, Mr. Giordani? 17 MR. STORMS: Not at this time. 18 THE COURT: All right. Well, so far you're the 19 ice -- I think you're the only engineer we've had, if I recall 20 correctly. 21 Counsel, approach. 22 (Conference at the bench not recorded.) 23 THE COURT: We're going to go ahead and excuse you 24 for the evening recess. And then you heard me say everybody 25 needs to be back at 9:00 a.m. tomorrow.

And I am required again to admonish you that during 1 2 the evening recess you are not to discuss the case or anything 3 relating to the case with each other or with anyone else. You're not to read, watch or listen to any reports of or 4 5 commentaries on the case, person or subject matter relating to 6 the case. Don't do any independent research by way of the 7 Internet or any other medium. Don't visit locations at issue, 8 and please don't form or express an opinion on the trial. 9 Additionally, you know, when you come back tomorrow 10 some of the other prospective jurors may say, oh, what do they 11 want to talk to you about or something of that nature; you're 12 instructed that you're not to discuss what's just transpired, 13 what questions we asked or your answers or anything like that 14 with the other prospective jurors. 15 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Absolutely. 16 THE COURT: All right. Thank you, sir. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: When I come back tomorrow 17 18 do I sit here or there? 19 THE COURT: No. Everybody will meet out in the 20 hallway. 21 Kenny -- right. Everybody meets -- because everybody 22 has to enter together. 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Okay. 24 THE COURT: So any other questions address Officer 25 Hawkes in the hallway, and then you will be seated back there

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again, but we bring all the jurors in together.		
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 189: Okay.		
THE COURT: Okay. All right. Thank you, sir, and		
you are excused for the evening recess.		
(Prospective Juror 189 left the courtroom.)		
THE COURT: All right. We can maybe talk about this		
more tomorrow.		
MR. GIORDANI: Thanks, Your Honor.		
MR. STORMS: 9:00 a.m.; right?
