And so you've missed having to be here for the last three days so that's -- that's the good news. I mean, I mean try and be a glass half full kind of person.

And so thank you for your patience. What I'm trying to do and all the lawyers here interested if doing is selecting a fair and impartial jury for this case. And we do that through a process that is known as voir dire wherein, we

ask questions of the jurors.

Everything that happens in this courtroom is reported via a court recording system. There are microphones that are located throughout the courtroom. You'll see the one here on the bench. There's one on the witness stand. They're here and there and everywhere. And it picks up the audio as well as there are cameras in the courtroom that pick up. And they're voice activated based upon who's speaking, either me sitting here on the bench, the witness stand or counsel tables.

The cameras do not focus, however, on the jury box at any time regardless of whether someone's speaking. But because we're going to have to be asking you questions, if someone speaks during this process, any of you all, then we need to know who you are for the record. And so if you're called upon to give a response of any kind, before you speak into the microphone, which is a handheld microphone, I'd ask you to give me your full name and the last three digits of your badge number before you speak, and that's for the purpose of making an entire record in this matter.

Now, this handheld microphone, you have to hold it up, and you have to -- you'll see, it's a normal microphone that you're kind of used to having. So hold the microphone. If you're the kind of person that gestures when you speak, do not gesture with the microphone hand. Gesture with this hand.

Okay? Got that? Okay.

So we're going to swear you all in.

THE CLERK: Can everybody please stand and raise your right hand.

(CLERK SWEARS IN SECOND VENIRE PANEL)

THE COURT: So there aren't too many excuses for not serving on a jury. There used to be years ago automatic exclusions for teachers, doctors, you know, lawyers, whatever. But they've eliminated that quite some time ago, leaving only two. The first one being if you are 70 years of age or older, and you do not much to wish on this jury, then you may request to be excused. In fact, you may request of the Jury Commissioner that you be dropped entirely from the roll so that you aren't part of the pool to be called again.

Of course, if you want to serve, we certainly would encourage you to do so because our seniors have a lot to bring to jury service, and they have a lot of wisdom. So if you happen to qualify for that exclusion and didn't want to exercise it, that would be wonderful. But if you do, as I peruse the jury, okay, I don't see anybody that looks like they qualify because it looks like a pretty young group to me. But I've been fooled before by youthful appearances.

However, since you do look like a very youthful group, then I would need you to show the Marshal your identification to show that, in fact, you are 70. Is there

anyone who can't hear very well that needs -- uh-huh, okay, we have hearing headphones for you. Testing. Can you hear me? Four by four, five by five.

All right. So the next thing I want to do is tell you what the second exemption is. Oh, is there anybody that's 70 other older and wishes to avail themselves? Record will reflect a negative response.

Next exception is or exemption is if you are 65 years of age or older and you live at least 65 miles from the courthouse, then you -- which means you'd have to live in Laughlin or Mesquite, then you also don't have to serve if you don't wish to. Although, I have had people serve when live in those communities. They either drive in each day or they stay with friends in town or something of that nature. So is there anyone who qualifies for that and wants to avail themselves? Okay.

THE MARSHAL: State your name and last three of your badge number.

THE COURT: Oh, I thought you looked pretty youthful.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 844: (Inaudible).

THE COURT: You have to be 65. Okay. So don't bother to show your identification to the Marshal because it's only for folks that are 65. I guess, they presume that folks over 65 can't drive for 70 miles, but sort of silly but anyway, it is what it is.

All right. The other thing is, is there anyone here who is not a citizen of the United States? Record will reflect a negative response. Is there anyone here who has been convicted of a felony, but has not had their civil rights restored so they're not permitted to serve on a jury? And again, record will reflect a negative response.

Okay. Next thing we're going to do is I'm going to have the -- one of the Chief Deputies introduce the case to you, just a brief synopsis of what the charges are, and where it occurred and the date, that type of thing because you're going to be asked if you have ever heard of this case.

Also, they're going to read to you a quite lengthy list of potential witnesses. These are not all of the witnesses that will be actually called, but any one of them could be called, so you need to pay attention because you're

going to be asked if you know any of these people. All right.

Ms. Lexis.

MS. LEXIS: Yes, Your Honor. Good afternoon, everyone. My name is Agnes Lexis. This is my co-counsel Marc DiGiacomo. We are chief deputy district attorneys with the Clark County District Attorney's Office. We are the prosecutors who have been assigned this particular case.

The charges in this case as set forth in the Second Superseding Indictment are conspiracy to commit robbery, burglary while in possession of a deadly weapon, home invasion while in possession of a deadly weapon, attempt robbery with use of a deadly weapon, murder with use of a deadly weapon, attempt murder with use of a deadly weapon.

The State is alleging that on September 21st, 2014, at about 8:00 p.m., four men attempted to commit a robbery, burglary, home invasion on a home located at 1661 Broadmere in Pecccole Ranch. That's off of Charleston and Hualapai. Two people were home at the time, Joey Larsen and Monty Gibson.

A gun fight ensued between the homeowners and invaders and Monty Gibson was killed subsequently -- or during the gun fight.

But the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until the State proves otherwise. So the State has the burden of proof in this matter. Defense doesn't have to call any witnesses, but they may have some that they want to advise you. Go ahead.

MS. McNEILL: Thank you, Your Honor. My name is Monique McNeill, and I represent Mr. Joey Laguna who has pled not guilty to the crimes that he's charged with. Our potential witnesses are my investigator Craig Recky (phonetic)

and Darcy Flores-Nocedal. Thank you.

MR. WOLFBRANDT: And good afternoon, my name is Lou Wolfbrandt, and I represent Jorge Mendoza. Thank you.

started picking the jury this week on Monday, and because I have a very busy docket that includes a criminal docket as well as drug court, my department's a little unusual in that I have court in the morning every day except for Fridays so that we have to do trials in the afternoons Monday through Thursday in the afternoon only. Friday we can go all day.

But so our anticipated schedule is basically on Tuesdays and Thursdays we'd have to start at 1:30 because drug court goes a long time, like yesterday the drug court calendar had almost 100 people on it. So it takes a long time to talk 100 people.

So, as I say, 1:30 on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and we would go through until 5:00. You'll notice it's 5:00 o'clock right now. We're going to go a little longer today just because I'm going to try and get through some of these early questions so that those of you who don't need to return tomorrow, don't have to. But otherwise, we're trying to adhere to 5:00 as close as possible.

On Monday and Wednesday, most of those days we should be able to start at 1:00. I know it's not a lot of difference, but it's an extra half hour that we should be able to pick up that time. And then on Friday we would go from 8:30 or 9:00 until 5:00. If we're going all day, obviously, we'd take a lunch break, we would take a morning break. You know, we'd go for about two hours then we'd take a break to

let you use the restroom, stretch, move around. So we would take a morning break and afternoon break of that nature.

This is not a forced march. So if you need a break, you need to raise your hand and let me know. That's our schedule each day of the week. We're expecting -- we're actually hoping that it won't go as long, but we like to er on the side of caution. And we had hoped to have a jury by today and we have not. So we're, though, expecting the trial to last a total of three weeks, which would put the ending date on September 30th.

So as I say, we've already gone through half the week of the first week. So that's what we're looking at.

Now, I tell you that because the next question that I'm going to be asking you is -- and I don't want to see hands yet because I have a little talk to give you before you answer the question. But I'm going to be asking you whether there is any reason that you can't possibly serve on that schedule for those days.

Now, that being said, of course, as citizens of the United States, you have a duty and obligation to serve on juries and it's a really important obligation because that's our system of justice. And people who come to court want to have a jury of their peers decide on that matter. Whether it's a civil case or a criminal case, it's extremely important to all the participants that they have a fair and impartial

jury.

And if people just got off because they just didn't want to have to be bothered and they didn't want to take away from their normal activities, well, you can see that that would cause problems for us having our system of justice work effectively.

So this is one of the few times that you can serve your country outside of military service. It's a really important job, and it's particularly in this kind of case with very serious charges, a very serious job.

So there are certain things that I do need to hear about. So, for instance, this is not an exhaustive list, but it is something that I would say I need to hear about. So if any of you are going to have a baby between now and the 30th, I need to know about that. If you are not actually having the baby yourself, but are expected to be present at the delivery of said baby, then I need to know about that.

If you have surgery scheduled between now and the 30th, and then obviously, I need to know about that. If you're -- you don't have the actual surgery schedule between now and the 30th, but say your surgery is the first week of October and you need to go in for your post -- or pre-op checkup to make sure that your heart can withstand the surgery, et cetera, then I need to know about that. Or if you have a serious medical appointment that you scheduled six

months ago with a specialist and you need to make that appointment -- we're not talk being a routine physical that you could change -- I need to know about that.

If you have a fabulous prepaid vacation where you have airline tickets and hotel reservations, we'll all be jealous that you'll be able to take that vacation, but we need to know about that. That's, as I say, not an exclusive list.

Things that I'm not as interested in, that your boss can't live without you. Yeah. Sadly, all of us can be replaced. And so if your boss said I need you to go to court and you need to get out of jury duty, that's not a proper -- that would not have been a proper instruction to you.

Moreover, you cannot be terminated from your job, it's illegal to dismiss someone from their job because they are serving on a jury. Many of our employers in this town pay for their employees when they're on jury service. So all of the large employers, the school district, the state, the county, the power company, the phone company, the gas company, most of the major gaming properties and companies all pay their lawyer -- or their employees when they are serving on jury service.

And so don't tell me that you're not going to be paid unless you have checked, and I assume that you have a checked because you got your jury summons sometime ago. It's not like this was a surprise.

So those are the kind of things. Now, if you actually have a hardship, you know, that you need to tell me about, then you need to tell me about that. That you don't have transportation, we have public transportation. You know, you can take the bus. So those are some of the things that I want you to know that I consider.

Now, I'm going to -- once I ask this question and I'm going to have a show of hands, and again, we're going to go in order starting with the people up here and then we'll go to this side and then this side. And I hear all the excuses. I write notes. I ask you questions and I write it down. And then after I've heard from everybody, then we make the decision. I consult with the lawyers and I decide then who gets to stay and who gets to go.

All right. With that long prefatory statement made, I know pose the question, is there anyone who feels that they can't possibly serve during the time frame that I've explained as well as the -- on the schedule? Starting here. And those of you don't let the blood drain out of your arm. We'll get back to you.

MR. DiGIACOMO: I imagine that, you know, their drugs led them to make some poor choices in life. That's why some of them have gone to jail and/or prison, right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yeah.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. Do you agree with the concept, though that, you know, people who make poor choices in this world, they still are entitled to the protection of the law? For example, if one of your cousins was a victim of a violent crime, you'd expect the law to do something to protect them; would you agree with that statement?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yes.

MR. DiGIACOMO: I mean, there are people in this world that would say hey, if you're doing something wrong, I don't really care and we shouldn't be spending our time here in a courtroom talking about it. Would you subscribe to that or would you think, hey, look, everybody makes mistakes in life, but they still are entitled to the protection of the law?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Well, I believe that

they did what they did. They should have thought about it 1 before, but --3 MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: -- they just had to pay 4 5 for their consequences. Sure. And I'm talking more on the 6 MR. DiGIACOMO: victim's side than the suspect side --8 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yeah. MR. DiGIACOMO: -- you know. For example, a dope 9 dealer can be robbed, right? 10 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yeah. MR. DiGIACOMO: And even if it's a dope dealer who's 12 being robbed, the people who are robbing should still be held 13 responsible for the crime; would you agree with that 14 15 statement? 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yes. 17 MR. DiGIACOMO: I imagine before coming down here, you're young enough that you've never even received a Jury 18 19 Summons before, correct? 20 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yes. When you got that Jury MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. Summons, what was your reaction? 22 23 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Oh, great. 24 MR. DiGIACOMO: Right. That might be the best 25 answer we've had in the last four days. But it sums up,

generally, what everybody thinks. Had you ever thought about being a juror before?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: No.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. This is a -- you know, a fairly weighty decision, you know, that you have to make. Do you think that you're a type of person who one, is capable of making that decision as to whether or not someone's guilty or not guilty?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: I don't think I'm that worthy enough to judge someone on that.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. Well, and that's sort of what I want to talk about is that, you know, this is a Civic duty of our citizens and nobody probably thinks that they should be the person that's the expert in being a juror, nobody is.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yeah.

MR. DiGIACOMO: I mean, we put 12 people in a room and we ask them, did Ms. Lexis and I prove beyond a reasonable doubt the guilt of one or all three of these defendants.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Um-h'm.

MR. DiGIACOMO: And so I don't think anyone can prepare for that, study for it, or do anything, but life experience is probably something that you do have to have to do that. Do you feel like you have the kind of life experience where you could make that kind of decision?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Well, I'm only 23. I'm

still young. I -- I don't know.

MR. DiGIACOMO: And unfortunately, for us, we only get one chance to talk to you. And once we're done and there's 12 people and some alternates sitting here, we'll talk at you, but we will never get an answer back from you until you come in the room and tell us what your verdict's going to be. So it's -- and it's terrible to say, hey, tell me an answer one way or the other right now, but we really -- only you know yourself. It's not, I don't want to. It's not that this is going to be hard. The question is, in your own mind, are you capable of doing it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yes.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. So you haven't been here, and I apologize to all the people who have been here because there's going to be a lot more questions asked of you being the first juror in the next group, than any of them probably that follow you. So what the Judge hasn't talked about yet is in a murder case, and I mean, this is a murder case, if a jury returns a verdict of first degree murder against one or more of these defendants, then there is a second phase.

So what happens is, the jury goes in the back in the beginning after the first phase happens, they sit down and they have a discussion. Here's what the evidence is, here's what the law is. We apply the law to the evidence or the evidence to the law, I guess, technically, and this is our

decision. Either they're guilty or they're not guilty.

And you come back here and you announce it in the open court. And if you say they're guilty of first degree murder, then what happens is we start a second trial. It's much shorter. You get some different information. At the end of that, you're going to go back to that room with your 11 fellow jurors and you're going to make a decision as to what should happen to the individuals you've already convicted. And there's three possible punishments in this case.

And let me allay some fears for pretty much everybody in the room who hasn't been here before. This is not a capital case. There's no death penalty that's available for these defendants and so that's not going to be something we're going to be talking about in this case. But the three penalties are still fairly severe. There's life without the possibility of parole, there's life with the possibility of parole, and then there's what we call a term of years, which is a very large sentence. It's a very large term of years that these defendants could be sentenced to.

And there's some people in this world who say, look, it's my Civic duty, I can do the first part. I can look at what the facts are, I can apply them to the law, and I can decide hey, did State meet their burden or not. And then there's people in the world that say, but, I can't do that second part. That that's sitting in judgment of somebody and

it is not my place to make a determination as to what should
happen to them.

Do you think that you, along with your fellow

jurors, could make that type of decision?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: I don't know if I want that on my back, though.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Well, that's -- you know, I don't think that anybody is going to find it easy or take it not seriously, or not have some stress imposed upon them by having to make that decision. I mean, that's really not the question. There isn't really a choice. Twelve people are going to have to do it. The question is, is are you capable of doing it, much like I kind of talked about in the first phase? In your mind, do you think you're going to get to that back room and just go, look, this is too much for me, I can't possibly make that determination and so I'm not going to pick any of the three because I just can't do it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: No.

MR. DiGIACOMO: No --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: I don't think I can do that.

MR. DiGIACOMO: You don't think you can do that? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: No.

MR. DiGIACOMO: And that's fair. Now, I imagine this is the first time you've thought about this, right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Yeah.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. So ultimately, I guess, right now I'm going to stop asking questions and see if the other -- the lawyers for the defendants want to ask you anything. Thank you, ma'am.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Okay.

THE COURT: I want to ask her a question before that happens. Why do you think you can't? Why can't you consider those three penalties and make a decision with the help of your fellow jurors?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 686: Because I don't want that in the back of my mind. I'm no one to judge. I can't judge them for what they did.

DiGIACOMO: And I know the Judge sort of asked around this question, but let me just ask you, do you have an 18 opinion as to whether or not the criminal justice system is 19 fair or unfair? 20 I don't really have an 697: IVE JUROR NO. opinion. I think it's fair. I'm grateful to be an more than 22 23 and I think it's a good justice system we have in place. 24 MR. DiGIACOMO: Sure. And that's sort of leads into 25 with the police officer thing, which is like police officers

are humans, right --1 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: 2 Sure. MR. DiGIACOMO: -- just like everybody else? 3 there's good ones, there's bad ones, and even the good ones, 4 they can make mistakes sometimes? 5 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Sure. MR. DiGIACOMO: You'd agree with that? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Absolutely. 8 MR. DiGIACOMO: And that every person should be 9 judged on who they are and what they have to say and how that 10 is corroborated by other evidence from the witness stand? 11 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Right, correct. MR. DiGIACOMO: What about you -- I don't think you 13 were in the room when the juror next to you was discussing --14 other side --15 16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Oh. 17 MR. DiGIACOMO: -- her husband years ago had a choice to make about whether or not he told on his friends or 18 he went to prison. You know, would you agree with the idea 19 that people in that position, they're in a pretty tough 20 position? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Heck, yes. 22 23 MR. DiGIACOMO: And it's possible that, you know, 24 they're telling the truth, and it's possible they're lying 25 right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: 1 Sure. 2 MR. DiGIACOMO: And how you tell that is from what they have to say, how reasonable it is, and from applying corroborative evidence to see if what they're saying is true, 4 5 right? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: 6 Right. MR. DiGIACOMO: So you think you're capable of doing 8 that? 9 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Yes. Do you think you'd be a good juror? 10 MR. DiGIACOMO: PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697. I think so. 11 12 MR. DiGIACOMO: Well, thank you very much, ma'am. 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: You're welcome. MR. LANDIS: Yes. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: No. I -- no. He's been retired for 15 years or I'm sorry, 11 years now, and no, not 15 really. He -- not really. I was kind of a troublesome 16 17 teenager so I -- you know, I -- so when I got in trouble by him, his -- his parenting was maybe a little harsher than 18 someone who didn't have the background of the force, but --19 MR. LANDIS: I smiled because that's exactly what I 20 was about to ask you is if you (inaudible) or not? 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Yes, very much so. did not care for him until I was an adult. 23 24 MR. LANDIS: And he kind of took over the 25 disciplinary role it maybe sounds like?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: He was really good at not. He was really good at just stepping back and letting my mom do all of the discipline. But at some point, he had to cross that line and say, you know, this is -- this is unacceptable behavior, we're not going to do this in this house. But he was -- he was a really good stepfather. I just -
MR. LANDIS: All right.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: -- you know, didn't care for him.

MR. LANDIS: Authoritative figure, I get it. I get it. But since then patched up, no hard feelings?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Definitely. He's the best man I know.

MR. LANDIS: If you had your choice, which I understand you don't, would you be on this jury tomorrow or be going to work?

MR. WOLFBRANDT: Okay. And you've got 11 others around you with this vast wide amount of history and knowledge and opinions as well, too, correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Correct.

MR. WOLFBRANDT: So each one of you, but I'm talking to you right now, feel like you kind of on the hot seat because all these questions are directed at you --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 697: Right.

was accused of a crime? 1 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: He had crime in Chicago 2 3 and since then has been expunded. THE COURT: All right. Would the State like to inquire further? 22 23 MR. DiGIACOMO: How are you? 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Good. How are you? 25 MR. DiGIACOMO: Good. I don't want to dwell so much

on your husband's experience, although, I do have sort of a 1 2 question. You said that you met him in 2007, and you moved here in 2007. Did you meet him here or back in Illinois because he had problems in Chicago? 4 5 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: I met him here. I came out for a cosmetology convention. 6 7 MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: So I happened to meet 8 him there. 9 MR. DiGIACOMO: And he just happened to be from 10 Chicago? 11 12 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: He is actually part of our group of friends. 13 MR. DiGIACOMO: Oh, okay. 14 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: However, our paths never 15 16 crossed. Oh, okay. 17 MR. DiGIACOMO: That makes sense to me. All right. And so, I mean, to a certain extent the only thing 18 I really want to talk to you about is as it relates to your 19 husband is, you know, whether or not he did it or didn't do it 20 is irrelevant. But, you know, do you think that someone like 22 -- who is involved in distribution of drugs or something like that can still be a victim and should have the protections of 23 the law? 24 25 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: I don't know how to

answer that. If you did something, if you distributed drugs, you're in trouble, you're guilty. Sure. You're in trouble, right? MR. DiGIACOMO: PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Yeah. MR. DiGIACOMO: You know, the law's going to arrest you and you're going to go to jail or prison or something else like that. But for example, you know, a lot of people don't die -- a lot of innocent people that are doing nothing wrong don't wind up getting killed. Sometimes people make some bad choices to put them in a situation where they wind up getting hurt. Do you think that we should all be spending our time in a courtroom, you know, punishing the people who committed that crime even though the victim may be involved in stuff he shouldn't be? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Should we stay in the courtroom to find out? MR. DiGIACOMO: Well, should the system care about those cases? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Yes.

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MR. DiGIACOMO: Do you think -- I don't know if you have an opinion -- do you have an opinion about the criminal justice system as a whole?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: No.

MR. DiGIACOMO: So before coming down here today,

you really hadn't had much contact, I'm assuming, with it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: No.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. We've asked a bunch of questions that -- any one of them stick out to you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: No, I -- you know, I think I was a little caught off with having your own opinion and picking a side more, and I don't feel like I could pick a side. I feel like when it's involved in a murder, that's -- that's it for me. I don't think I could listen to evidence or anything like that.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. I guess, maybe I don't know how to ask the next question. So maybe could you explain to me what you're saying about picking a side versus a murder?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Well, you want the jury

to hear both sides.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Correct.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: I feel when it has reached that level, there is no side.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Well, let me ask it this way, and let me see if I can figure out. Are you saying essentially, if you find out someone's killed, you're likely going to side on the side of the victim as opposed to the perpetrator?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Most likely.

MR. DiGIACOMO: What about the idea, though, that, you know, these three individuals, they're presumed innocent.

That means as we sit here today, I haven't presented a piece of evidence, Ms. Lexis hasn't done anything like that. They may not be involved in this crime at all. I mean, are you suggesting the idea that because it's a homicide case that there should be a different standard associated with the burden of proof than let's say a possession of stolen vehicle case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Sure.

MR. DiGIACOMO: And thus, you'd be more willing to side with hey, maybe the reasonable doubt is a little bit wider. Maybe I could have a little bit more doubt because the idea that I might release somebody who committed a homicide is something that is scary to me?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Yes.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. Do you think that you're capable of setting that aside and following the instructions of the Court? She's going to give you a definition of what reasonable doubt is, and I can tell you, it's the same definition she would give if this was a possession of stolen vehicle case. Do you think that you could follow that instruction or do you think that, you know, you are not going to be able to give them their presumption of innocence because it's a murder case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: When you say it like that, there's more of a, I could do that.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Right. And I don't -- I'm not trying to trick you, and I'm not trying to put words in your mouth. I mean, it's hard for people to -- that haven't been in the justice system to sort of grasp the idea of -- first of the presumption of innocence because you would hope that people like Ms. Lexis and I are not prosecuting people everyday that every one of them is innocent, but the idea is, is that they have nothing to prove.

As they sit here today, since there's no evidence presented, they didn't have anything to do with this and there is absolutely no evidence that suggests that they are, and then as the evidence comes in, you're supposed to wait until the very end, and when you go to the back room, you start off with the idea, these guys had nothing to do with it, now what evidence is there? And as you start getting there, if you get to the point where you're like, yeah, there's no reasonable doubt these individuals committed these crimes, then we convict them.

And it doesn't matter what those crimes are. If I had accused them of stealing a car, you'd do it the same sort of way. That's sort of the way the system works. Do you think you could do that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Yes.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. And, you know, at the day, there is going to be -- it's weighty, right? There's victims

here who are going to want justice, and there's defendants here who have a lot on the line, and so everybody wants fair jurors. Do you think that you're the type of person who's going to be able to, with 11 people, go back there and do what the Judge is asking you to do or is it going to be do you think -- only you know because we don't get to talk -- that at the end of the day you're going to get back there and go well, they were close, but -- and I'm really scared to let these guys go, so even though I think the State didn't quite prove it beyond a reasonable doubt, I still think I'm going to convict them and they're going to have to suffer the consequences even though Ms. Lexis and I didn't do our job?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: No.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. You think you could do what we're asking you to do?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Yes.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Thank you very much, ma'am.

THE COURT: Defense.

MS. McNEILL: Thank you, Your Honor. I don't want you to feel like you're being picked on. I'm going to kind of follow up on some of his questions. And there's no right answer here. That's what, I think, is important. There's just your honest feelings, and we just want to you to be honest with us so that -- because it's really important to these gentleman sitting over here to kind of get honest

answers.

One of the things that you indicated was that you said you're going to have to listen to both sides. What if you don't hear anything from these three gentlemen? What if all you hear is from them?

MS. McNEILL: Okay. Do you understand the overview they gave you is just what they think happened?

And it's all about, can they prove their theory to you beyond a reasonable doubt? Do you have any problems with that? Do you have any problems with the fact that Mr. Landis, Mr. Wolfbrandt and I might sit there and drink coffee and read magazines. Would that bother you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Yes, it would.

MS. McNEILL: Well, it might bother you about our

work ethic, but would it bother you that you didn't hear from 1 I mean, would you be able to let that go and hold them to their burden? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: 4 No. You would not be able to do that? 5 MS. McNEILL: You would feel like you needed to hear from them? 6 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 702: Yes. Okay. and drink coffee and read magazines, that's never going to happen because they're good lawyers. But their duty is to make sure their clients get a fair trial and they will make sure their clients get a fair trial.

It's these prosecutors' job to prove their case beyond a reasonable doubt. If they don't do that, then you must acquit the defendants. If they do do that, and you feel beyond a reasonable doubt that they have done that, then you must find the defendants guilty.

But the defense doesn't have to do any affirmative proving. The defendants never have to take the stand and testify and tell their side of the story because there's a fifth amendment right under our Constitution. They don't have to do that. And so again, State does all the proving. Just that's just the overview of what the law is, and we'll be asking you further questions about that. But just so it's clear. Call the next in order.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: The most memorable thing 18 I have from it is it -- was all the waiting that we did. I 19 read a lot of books. It seemed like we -- we spent a lot of 20 time in -- in a room. I think it was a different building 22 back then, but --23 MR. DiGIACOMO: It was. 24 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: -- it seemed like we were in a room where we got to just lounge around and wait 25

until we got called in to sit and hear either testimony or closing arguments.

MR. DiGIACOMO: We try and do better. I'm not sure how much better we do after 20 years. There's probably still a lot of waiting, but at least in this court she recognizes she's not going to finish her morning calendar and has you come at 1:30 instead of 10:00 and wait for three hours.

But ultimately, hopefully, we do better than we did 20 years ago. I'm assuming, you know, based upon your answers here that there's nothing about anything -- any question anybody's asked that you thought to yourself oh, I better tell the lawyers about that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: No, no.

MR. DiGIACOMO: The idea that you may have to look at graphic pictures for their evidentiary value is not something that concerns you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: It definitely concerns me, but I know it's something I can do.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Okay. Yeah, and that was a poor choice of words, right? I don't think anybody should be happy to look at these photographs, but ultimately, you think you have the capacity to do so?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: Yes.

MR. DiGIACOMO: And you obviously, you must feel since you've done it once before that you have the capacity to

talk with 11 fellow jurors and make a decision in both the first phase, and if we get there, the second phase?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: Yes.

MR. DiGIACOMO: Thank you very much, sir. Judge, we'd pass for cause.

THE COURT: Thank you. Before our defense goes,

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: We all -- that was not the problem.

MS. McNEILL: Okay. So it was just about how they viewed the evidence?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: Yes.

MS. McNEILL: All right. Was there anything about that deliberation process that you didn't like?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: No, that was actually a 1 -- it was a jury of people that seemed to be very polite, very 2 respectful to each other. LANDIS: You mentioned -- going back to your 25 previous jury experience. You mentioned that the trial was

straightforward. You also mentioned there was a lot of waiting, but nevertheless, I assume the total duration was relatively short, a couple days?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: Total duration with some days where we did not have to meet. We actually could -- for my case, I went back to school. About a week.

MR. LANDIS: And I'm assuming there was one defendant in that case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: Yes.

MR. LANDIS: Obviously, both in time and in complexity, as we've mentioned, this case is going to be probably less straightforward in terms of facts, in terms of your job. No qualms based on that previous experience that you'll be able to do the job necessary here?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NO. 703: I feel like I could serve on this jury, yes.

MR. LANDIS: And a moment ago there was some talk about maybe a juror not listening in that previous experience, which is scary for an attorney because a person can be forced to be on a jury, but you can't force somebody to listen. And before I think you guys were here, we were talking about experiences where you'll talk about something with juries during this phase, and at the end of the trial, when you talk to them, even though they said one thing, they're now saying the other, and it can be frustrating, obviously.
