8	Q Now, before we get to 2019, I want to ask you about
9	an incident in 2015.
10	THE INTERPRETER: I'm so sorry, Counsel. Could you
11	repeat the question?
12	MR. WHIPPLE: Yes.
13	BY MR. WHIPPLE:
14	Q Before we get to 2019, I wanted to ask you about an
15	incident in 2015.
16	A Okay.
17	Q Do you remember Mr. Salazar talked about an accident
18	that you have that happened to you in December of 2015. Do
19	you remember that?
20	A Yes.
21	Q Tell the Court what happened.
22	MR. GONZALEZ: Objection, calls for a narrative.
23	THE COURT: No all right. Let's see how it goes.
24	But I I note your objection. Thank you. Go ahead.

THE DEFENDANT: Okay. Yes. So in 2015, I took my 1 kids to the movies, but first, beforehand, one of my girls asked if we could go buy a gift for her boyfriend. I said 3 yes. We went to the store to do so, and then when we were there, I was looking for her to give her the money to pay. And I didn't realize how, but I slipped and fell, and then I didn't really know any more about me until I came to, and the paramedics had arrived. BY MR. WHIPPLE: Did you go to the hospital? 10 Α Yes. 11 12 Did you eventually have a surgery to -- to someplace

Q Did you eventually have a surgery to -- to someplace on your body?

A Yes. So then I was hospitalized for four days at

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Summerland Hospital, and my husband, well, he could not be with me during the time of the surgery because he had to work. So the girl that I took in was who took care of me during the surgery, and after.

Q From 2012 through 2015, did you ever work and make money yourself?

A No, I never worked because I knew that if I worked, we'd have to pay -- or I'd have to pay more in babysitting.

So I preferred to stay home and take care of the children.

Q After the accident, did it affect your health on a

day to day basis?

A Yes. Yes, it did, because only I know what I'm feeling, and the pain that I have. I have pain. Also, I have to take pills called Norco that I take 10.23 milligrams of for the pain, and that's what helps me and keeps me a little bit better when I take the pills. But for example, by night time, I'm so tired for the same reason, due to all of the pain.

Q Now, in May of this year, did you move out of the residence at 3127 Panocha?

A Yes.

Q Why?

A Because Oscar Salazar was really damaging me, and affecting me psychologically. He would constantly drank — drink with the girl that I took in every weekend. He'd play the music so loud. I would tell him, turn it down. It's time for us to go to bed, and he would respond, saying, this is my house, and I do what I want. So that really started to damage me so much. One day also, he hit me in my right arm, and pushed me from the stairs. I said, Oscar, you know, listen, what — what are you trying to do? You trying to kill me? And he said, yes, that's what I should have done, I should have killed you. So then I started to be afraid of him because he — he was hurting me psychologically. He also has a weapon, so, you know, it hurt me very much, because I left

my kids behind, but I left so that I wouldn't have to continue having that fear and trauma.

- Q Have you ever discussed that event with police officers?
 - A Yes.

- Q When did that happen?
- A On May 10th, when I left the house.
- Q Did you show them pictures?
- A No. The police saw the bruise on my arm, and asked me what had happened. So I said what happened, and that was it.
 - Q Did they take pictures of it?
 - A Yes. There's pictures of the bruise.
 - Q Do you know if Mr. Salazar has a warrant?
- A Yes. Because I drove the GMC. He said that was the only thing that he was going to give me, so I was driving the vehicle, and the cop -- the cops pulled me over. You know, I said, what -- what happened? You know, what's going on? I pulled over. The officer said, oh, is this Jose Salazar's truck? I said yes, and he said, sorry, you know, I thought it was him driving, and he has a warrant, a warrant for his arrest. So I called my son and told him, Oscar, tell your dad that he has a warrant. And my son told me that he let him know, but that he disrespected --

Did there come a time that you were required to sell the vehicle that you were driving, because you had no money?

MR. GONZALEZ: Objection, leading.

THE COURT: Sustained.

BY MR. WHIPPLE:

Did you sell a vehicle?

MR. GONZALEZ: Objection, vague.

THE COURT: Overruled. Go ahead.

THE DEFENDANT: Yes. I got the GMC that was from 2000, and I sold it because it was eight cylinders, so it would waste too much gas. And since I worked sometimes, and sometimes I did not, once I knew about his truck burning, I said, Oscar, can I sell the Yukon? And he said yes. I sold it for \$2,000, and so when I did, I called him and told him, come for the money. He went. I gave him the \$2,000, and he gave me \$500 for me.

BY MR. WHIPPLE:

Now, are you working for money in the last couple of

So it's 13 l kind of obvious that how were they going to come with me when 14 their dad gave them everything, and their mom had nothing to 15 live off of. 16 BY MR. GONZALEZ: 17 Okay. But my question was very specific. At the 18 Q last court hearing, you -- your children, or the children -- I 19 mean, the adult children testified that you were not at home, 20

A They never said that I was never home. They said that sometimes, and that sometimes would be when Oscar would tell me, honey, here's \$100, go to the casino. And he would

you were out and about at night, correct?

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Q Okay. So your husband is going to dance with another woman while you're gambling. Is that your understanding of a beautiful family?

A Well, yes, since we were in agreement, it was never taken as a bad thing. I would go play, and I knew that he would go dancing, so I wouldn't say that we weren't a beautiful family. We never argued or fought. I was in agreement for him to be able to go dancing, and he would agree that I can go to the casino.

Q Okay. And do you remember your children testifying that the adult children would have to take the children, the minor children to school and pick them up, because you were unavailable. Do you remember them testifying to that?

A Yes. I recall that, but it was not an everyday thing. For example, there were some times when I couldn't. So obviously, who else was I going to call, or who would I call? I would call my children, and tell them please pick up your siblings because I can't. Sometimes I'd be with a doctor, sometimes I would be with a friend. But I would call them so that they would be -- pick them up, and I never left them stranded.

Q Do you also remember your children testifying that

they don't trust you, and that you have a habit of lying? Yes, I do recall that. Of course, no one is perfect 2 3 in this life, and everyone lies sometimes, not just me. I don't know why they said that. But the love I have for them, nothing -- nothing is ever going to change that. And nothing will ever change that, even if they say that I'm a liar, or if I'm a liar, but I will always be their mom. So you're acknowledging here today that you do lie? 8 9 MR. WHIPPLE: Judge, argumentative. THE COURT: Sustained. 10 BY MR. GONZALEZ: 11 | Okay. Do you also recall that your adult children 12 testified that they would not feel secure with you having the 13 | minor children in your custody? 14 | I do not recall. 15 Α Okay. Well, you were here the last time in court, 16 17 | and heard their testimony, right? 18 MR. WHIPPLE: Argumentative again, Your Honor. She 19 asked and answered. 20 THE COURT: Sustained as to asked and answered. 21 BY MR. GONZALEZ: Okay. 6	people, I don't. And I'm not saying it for him to to look
7	bad. I just don't know what it is that we're fighting so muc
8	about. You know? If what we're going to get what he's
9	going to get is a divorce. So I just want what belongs to me
10	I don't I don't know why so many questions.
11	BY MR. GONZALEZ:
12	Q All right. Help help me understand this, becaus
13	minutes ago, you said that you had a beautiful family and you
14	never fought. And now you're saying that you guys were alway
15	fighting over a car, and he's sending you to church on foot.
16	Help me understand that.
17	MR. WHIPPLE: Judge, objection, argumentative, form
18	of the question, compound question.
19	THE COURT: Sustained.
20	BY MR. GONZALEZ:
21	Q Why are you now saying that you guys always fought
22	over cars, and he sends you on foot, when earlier, you said

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that you guys never fought and you had a beautiful family?

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THE INTERPRETER: Thank you so much. The

Interpreter required a brief clarification, but got that clear. The response is yes. I don't know if you remember, from 20 -- I said from 2012 to 2019, we were a beautiful family. After that, once he filed for divorce, he made my life completely miserable. He started taking off to go dancing with that girl, and then he asked me for a divorce, said, I don't love you anymore. And I can accept that, because I'm not going to keep someone with me against their will, if they don't want to be with me. BY MR. GONZALEZ:

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All right. Last question. Earlier you testified that you earned about 800 a month, and now you're testifying that you're earning about 600 a month? Is that your testimony?

MR. WHIPPLE: Form of the question, Your Honor. I -- I don't ever remember the 800. Just argumentative, form of 17 \parallel the question.

THE COURT: Yeah. Sustained.

BY MR. GONZALEZ: 19 |

> Do you recall testifying that you made \$800 a month at the last hearing?

> Yes, yes, I remember that. That's what I -- what I Α said, and that's approximately \$160 a week. Do the math. I don't lie.

MR. GONZALEZ: I have no further questions, Judge. 2 THE COURT: Anything else, Mr. Whipple? 3 MR. WHIPPLE: No, Your Honor. Thank you, and we 4 rest. 5 THE COURT: All right. So everyone's presented all 6 of their -- their evidence, and both sides have rested. 7 you want to take five minutes before closing? 8 MR. WHIPPLE: I'm ready, Your Honor. 9 MR. GONZALEZ: I'm ready. THE COURT: You're ready? Okay. 10 11 MR. GONZALEZ: All right. So, Judge, what we've got here is a -- a divorce that it -- I mean, sorry, a marriage 12 13 that started back in 2000, and the issue before the Court is 14 custody, child support, two properties, which is real properties, one on Panocha Street, one on Ardmore, and then we 15 16 have a -- a GMC -- sorry, that was sold. We have a Malibu 17 that is in dispute, and I'm assuming that they're claiming that they have an interest in the Escalade. The Audi, I'll --18 I'll address it, too, but my client has testified it is 19 nonexistent. So I'm going to address the Court based off of 20 21 those -- oh, and then spousal support. I'm going to address each -- each issue to give the Court (indiscernible) what the 22

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evidence showed. Now, it -- a lot of this -- this court

hearing, Judge, had to do with -- with credibility. That --

that -- there was minimum documentation or -- a few documents, but the majority of the testimony is based off of the parties' credibility. And at the beginning of the case, I -- in opening statements, I've mentioned that credibility was going to be a big issues, and I think we've demonstrated that. About 10 minutes ago, she -- she admits, yeah, I'm a liar. She said that. And -- and -- and there's also examples of her lying. She lied to people in Texas at the hospital about who the real father is. She lied to the Department of Vital 10 Records as to who the real father is, when she got the birth certificate. When she got that birth certificate, then she 11 12 took it to Mexico and lied to church officials to get a baptism certificate, knowing that -- that Pedro was not the 13 father. On top of all that, Judge, the biggest harm here is that she told her kids that Pedro was the father. One lie after another lie after another lie. And now she's here today telling you, yeah, I lie. So with that as a backdrop as to what's going on here, Judge, I want to get into the issues now, as far as custody, Judge, there's no dispute that the minor children have lived with -- with -- with Dad since -since May, since she moved out. And the children, the adult children testified that it -- it -- it was -- that they're happy there, that Dad provides for them, that he's been the -a -- a -- a swell dad, for lack of a better word, and he's

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provided for every need that they've had. Now, as far as the -- the minor children, Judge, this Court ordered the minor children to conduct a child interview. Under 16.215, which I'm going to put up on the screen right now, I'm not sure if the Court can see it --

THE COURT: I can't.

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MR. GONZALEZ: I'm having really slow internet problems, but I'll just mention the statutes. 16.215, it -it says that the Court must use procedures and considerations in child custody proceedings when the determining the scope of a child's participation in custody proceedings, the Court should find a balance between protecting the child, the statutory duty consider the wishes of the child, and the probative value of the child's input, while insuring to all parties their due process rights to challenge evidence relied upon by the Court in making custody decisions. So this statute -- or this rule, Judge, permits the Court to view the child witness interview and take it into consideration when making a -- a child custody determination. And the Court ordered the children to be interviewed, and -- and the child interview, what the children said, particularly in the time share with Mom, they said -- Maybel and -- and Mellyarive acknowledged that they reside primarily with their father and siblings, and that their mother calls to see if they want to

come over. But the girls acknowledged that if they decide to go to their mother's home, it's with their older brother.

Which gives credibility to what the older brother is saying, that he does all the transportation. The -- the -- the interview also says that Oscar drops them off and picks them up. Mom sometimes picks them up, too, but the majority of the -- of the lifting is by the children.

Now, under the home section in the child interview, paragraph number 2, the middle of it says, the girls reported that they enjoy a variety of activities with their father, and that prior to Covid, they all went to lakes, hiking, and watched movies. Both -- both of the minor children testified that -- that they have household rules in -- in Dad's house, but there's really no rules at Mom's house.

The most important part -- the most important part of -- of the child interview is under the family relationship, where the children rate their relationship with their mother between a six or a seven, and they rate the relationship with Dad nine to 10. And they both testified that when Mom lived with the minor children, Mom wouldn't really be in the house. That's the minor children's testimony, and it -- it's -- it's corroborated by the adult children's testimony, and by my client's testimony. The only one that we have here that's saying that that's not true is the person who's admitted to

lying. She's the only one.

And the children also in the report acknowledged that Mom has lying problems. So -- so that -- that's -- that's what we have here as far as -- as custody, Judge. And we're going request that the Court implement what's been going on as a -- as the status quo. There hasn't been any issues. The children are doing well in school. The family is functioning. There's no reason to alternate that. We haven't heard any evidence from Mom saying that the children would be better off living with her. No testimony at all. No witnesses that would support a finding of -- of joint physical custody because we have a history where Mom has been an absent Mother.

Now, they're going to try to say that -- that -- that Jose, my client, is some sort of violent person, that he's always hitting -- or that he hit Augustina sometime in -- in May of this year. Well, my client testified that he's never been arrested, he's never been to court, he's never touched Augustina. But what did we hear from Augustina when I was cross examining her? She said, oh, well, he pushed me. And then when I pressed her more, she escalated the domestic violence issue to a punch. That -- that -- that -- she figured out that it wasn't severe enough, and then she made that up, that he punched me. And we don't have any evidence

at all that my client actually committed some sort of domestic violence, other than her word. And again, it goes back to credibility. And even if -- even if she told the police that -- that he committed some sort of domestic violence, it doesn't mean he did it. It doesn't mean that -- that the Court already determined he's -- he's guilty of domestic violence. He's innocent until proven guilty, and what we're relying here is the credibility of a person who's admitted on the record that she lies.

Now, the alternative motive for her to tell this to a police officer is to gain a new visa. We heard her say that the asylum petition was already denied. She said that. She said that. So what alternatives does she have? Oh, well, let me go invent this incident of domestic violence to see if that works. She's been trying to gain some sort of status in the country for several years now, and she's trying different alternatives. This is just one alternative, and she doesn't care about bringing down Jose. It doesn't matter. It's her survival. It doesn't matter whether he goes to jail or whether he loses his business. It doesn't matter whether he loses his kids. That does not matter to her. And that's — that pretty telling, when you're putting your selfish interest before your children's, Judge. And so that's — for — for those reasons, we're requesting that the Court award Jose

primary custody.

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Now, as far as spousal support, Judge, she claims that -- that -- that she's -- she's injured. But we didn't hear any -- we didn't see any documentation about a three level fusion. We didn't get any reports of a slip and fall. We didn't get any witnesses that came to court. All we have is her word. That's all we have.

And a three level fusion is pretty serious. So we would see that -- that she would be requesting for some sort of break, she'd be stretching out, she'd be shifting her body. Even if she's on medication, we have -- we're talking about three levels, three discs, that have been surgically fused or -- or some procedure happened. But nothing. She wasn't stretching out, she wasn't taking a break.

She's been sitting there peacefully, answering question after question, and she's also admitted that — that she's — she's worked, that she — she's been able to sustain herself, and that her monthly expenses are about \$800. This is what she testified to. Now, we have no — no — no reason to believe that she's not able to do further work, other than — than what she's testifying about her back. But if — if — if she's working, doing some sort of cleaning homes, then that means that — that she could put in more hours, and — and — and really sustain herself.

And alternatively, Judge, if she is injured, if -let's just say she is, she -- there's testimony that -- that -- that there's millions of millions of dollars in this recovery, and that leads to the conclusion that she doesn't need spousal support. So however we look at it, she does not need spousal support. One, because she can work, and if she can't work, then she's going to get a lot of money, however she wants to look at it, however they want to argue it.

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So we're requesting that the Court not award spousal support in this case. As for the -- the Ardmore home, I think that it -- it's been established that the -- the home was purchased before the marriage. There is the there is dispute about -- about they were married and there was kids, but she $14 \parallel --$ she told Your Honor that she was married to another individual before they started dating. So when Jose purchased the -- the -- the first Ardmore home, the Defendant, Augustina, she was married to another man.

And there is no proof that she gave 5,000 or 3,000. There's no evidence of that, other than her word. And even if that's the case, the moment she handed over that money, it's considered a gift. So however they want to argue that, too, it's still not -- does not convert into a community property asset. And immediately following the -- the -- the marriage, she got deported, Judge. She went to Mexico, she spent from

2000 to 2012 in Mexico, while my client was here, paying for -- for the Ardmore home, and she was married to another man.

The Court heard testimony from my client that she was married to another man. And now she's asking the Court to benefit from -- from having this double life. While Jose's over here working, and -- and -- and contributing to the Ardmore home, now she wants a piece of it, 20 years later. And I would request that the Court order that the Ardmore home be my client's -- or Jose's sole and separate property, based off of the -- the -- the facts that -- that we've proven today.

Now, the Panocha home, that's the -- that was -there's no dispute. That was purchased during the marriage.

And there -- there is issues as to what the -- the value is,
but my client will submit that the FDF has the -- the -- the
-- an estimate as to what the true market value is of the
home. And if the Court is inclined to give her a part of the
Panocha Street, then alternatively, what we can do, and my
client would propose this, is that he be awarded the Panocha
Street as his sole and separate property while she would get
the Ardmore as her sole and separate property. That the
alternative that -- that my client would propose, and that she
would be required to refinance the home and put it in her
name, and make payments.

Now, as far as the Escalade, there's no evidence to suggest that this was purchased from community funds. This was from the children's funds, and they gifted it to Dad.

They didn't gift it to -- to the community. It's not a gift where the intent was to give it to Augustina. The intent was to give it to Dad, for the purpose of insurance, to save money on insurance. Not so that Dad could own it and drive it, or that Mom could own it and drive it. This is separate property, Judge, and we're asking the Court -- that the Court hold -- issue an order with that.

Now, as far as the Malibu, there -- there is a Malibu. It's 6,000. That could be divided. There's no dispute about that. There were no -- no -- no Audi, Judge, and -- and I'm going to fall on the sword here, and I'll let the Court know that if the Court compares the Defendant's FDF with the Plaintiff's, the Defendant's was submitted before the Plaintiff's. And what happened there is that it -- that it's -- oh, I'm going to -- like I said, I'm going to fall on the sword. But my office copied and paste what the information was from the -- the Defendant's.

But the fact of the matter is, it holds true that there is no Audi. There is no Audi and there was never was. That was a mistake. And that's a mistake that I'm going to have to deal with in my -- my -- my office. But there is no

Audi. That's what my client testified to, that's where the errors come from.

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The -- as far as the trailer, my client also testified that he doesn't own the trailer, that he pays for it. That -- that the trailer, which is the back part, not the actual front part where -- where you drive, there's two parts to a trailer. He -- he did admit that he owns the -- the -- the driving part on the trailer, but that was burned. He said that he didn't get a penny because the insure -- he didn't have insure -- he didn't have full coverage. What he had was liability only. And the reason why he didn't get a penny is because the -- the debt was greater than the value of the trailer, and so that is now a -- a non issue. It's -- it's -- it's actually a debt that he owes, versus an asset. So my client would assume any debt that's associated with -- with that vehicle.

Oh, and the last thing I want to mention about his employment, Judge, with the 120,000, we're asking the Court to look at the tax records. He's been honest. He earns about 43,000. Mr. Whipple tried to make it seem that he earns about 10,000 a month, and -- and that he's doing great. But that is certainly not the case. He earns about 4,300. That's after all his expenses, which include gas, maintenance, materials. It also includes insurance, fees, government fees. So at the

end of the day, about \$3,500 a month.

And that -- when you -- when you take that into account, that is not enough to sustain two households, I guess, or -- or to provide -- allow him to give to Augustina spousal support. And in this particular year, Judge, his finances have been difficult. We have Covid, which he testified that dropped his earnings. And then we have this -- this incident that dropped his -- his -- we had this incident with the fire that dropped his -- his earnings further.

So this is going to be a very bad year, and it's going to be months, maybe even years, before he recovers from having to pay the debt for the new trailer, for having to recover from what he's lost during Covid. So that's another basis for — for denying any request for spousal support. And I believe that that covers all the issues, Judge. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you. Mr. Whipple?

MR. WHIPPLE: Your Honor, thank you. First of all, I appreciate the opportunity to present this through video. I appreciate the Court's patience in giving me ample opportunity to present what I believe to be all the evidence in this case. Your Honor, I believe this is actually a very simple case. I think -- I didn't want to object during some of the argument because you can argue -- argue reasonable inferences, but I

think there's a lot of really extreme argument with regard to the actual facts of this case. I think the irony is probably the most honest thing that was ever stated was stated by my client, when she said nobody's perfect, and everybody lies at some point.

And I just think back this morning, when I was walking out the front door and my wife asked me how much I'm weighing now. I told her a hundred to 235 pounds. I know for a fact it's 245, right? But I don't want to admit that to myself, that I'm overweight, and I don't want to have to put -- her put me on another diet, so I'm not getting a full meal anymore. You know? So we've all got our motives, we all -- you know, just because somebody may misstate the truth, or may -- or not state the 100 percent truth doesn't mean they're a liar. It means we're all human, and we're all imperfect.

And I think her statements and her credibility showed through. I'm not going to sit here and argue credibility about somebody who I think was extraordinarily credible. The case has a -- there's a -- a number of issues. The child custody, Nevada law is making this whole case very simple for us, the presumption is joint custody. I -- I think there's some suggestion that she tried to abandon the children. We know different from that now.

She spent her entire life taking care of this

family. Part of it was in Mexico, and her husband would bring -- would send her money, and when she produced children down there, and bring them back. But they -- they were always together. Last thing I remember, last point I remember, this is a no fault state, right? A lot of allegations going back and forth, but -- but again, Nevada law makes it simple.

It was -- it was a -- it was a marriage. They raised their children together. The presumption is that two parents are better than one. The presumption is best interests of the child, and the Nevada Legislature says, you know what? We have -- we need two children -- two parents for our children. And that -- there's nothing here to dissuade from that. It's very simple. Joint custody, best interests of the child, very simple.

Assets, community property. All their assets are community property. They were married the entire time. There's an argument regarding Ardmore, because apparently he bought that 11 months before their first child, or a year or two before they were married, whether she paid money or not doesn't really matter. You know why? Because he refinanced it, and bought joint community property. The trailer, and the truck that they used as a joint community.

So even if one can argue, well, you know, back in -- when they first bought it, it was separate property, once he

refinanced it, and -- and financed joint community property, it all became community property. There's not an asset that you've -- that the Court has heard of that's not community property in this case. It's all community property. It was all purchased during the marriage. Or perhaps the one residence that was converted. All community, all joint.

So I -- I -- I just -- I -- I look at this case, and it seems very straightforward and very simple to me. I think the only issue really it comes down to is child support.

Money's obviously very important to Mr. Gonzalez's client, right? The vast majority of my argument is based on his testimony, not my client's.

He told you, and he told me that he controls the money. He makes the money. The money is his, 100 percent. And so I don't think you need to look any further than the fact that he refused to pay her for the last four months for whatever reason, that he is going to do exactly -- and get whatever he wants, through the use of money.

He controls people, because he controls money. He controls the kids because he controls the money. He controls the things that the kids get. He could make -- he could send them wherever they want, and they'll thank Dad, but they don't thank Mom, because he has the money. So any suggestion, if my client is a seven instead of a nine, that is -- that's not to

suggest that -- that he gets primary custody. That suggests that oh, by the way, I recognize that Dad has the money and takes care of the kids, and gives them what they want. They still love their mother, they still want to be with their mother. Doesn't change the fact that they -- they should have joint custody.

But look at where the money and who controls it, and who insists on controlling it. Mr. Salazar is a controlling person. He tried to control his wife, he tried to -- he controls the money, but he can't control the law. Because the law in this state says when you do it together, it's community property. The law in this state says, when you -- when you have two parents, the children should stay with two parents. It's a really simple case.

And the law also says, you know what? When a person spends 20 years building up an enterprise, and their wife stays home for that entire time, taking care of the kids, and has very little earning capacity, whether it be because of earnings, or because of disability, that alimony is in order. That's what the law says. Mr. Salazar can't control the law or the legislature.

The law and the legislature makes it very clear. He spent his entire life building up his own practice to where he can work for himself and make 40, \$45,000 every year pretty

easily. And what does my client make? Well, through the pain pills, and when somebody calls her to clean a house, she may make between 150 to 160 in a week, at best.

It's joint custody, it's community property, and this young lady still has the rest of her life to look forward to, should get \$1,000 a month for the next 10 years. I thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you. Anything else, Mr. Gonzalez?

MR. GONZALEZ: Yeah, quick rebut -- quick rebuttal.

I -- I -- Mr. Whipple, I know he's trying to -- to do his best to defend his client's intentional lying, but the example he gave with, oh, I told my wife 235 versus -- then later on I found out 245 is inapplicable, and it's just misplaced.

There's one thing about mistaken belief about your weight, and knowing -- knowing that you're taking a government document that you obtained through fraud and presenting it to a church as a legitimate document. There's a big difference. We all believe that we weigh something that is pretty close, but it's a belief. It's -- it's -- it's a belief that -- that we just have developed, based off of everyday living.

But there's a big difference when you know what you're doing, you know the truth of the matter, you know the facts, and you don't care. You simply do not care about the -- the -- the -- the administration, the system that's in

place to obtain a -- a baptism. You don't care about anything. It's me, myself, and I, and I'm going to get what I want.

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Now, Mr. Whipple says that -- that my client is controlling. Well -- he controls her with money. It -- let's think about that. He test -- Augustina testified that four months ago, he stopped giving her 250. Well, what happened four months ago? His truck burned down. He was unable to work. He couldn't afford it. He has kids to feed, she's working. It's not that he's trying to control her. There's no evidence of control. It -- it -- there's -- there's methodical, there's reasonable explanation for my client's conduct.

He's never hurt her. He's never tried to put her down. He's never done anything to damage her. But quite the contrary, she lived with another man, and lied about it for 12 years. She never let him know where she lived and who she lived with. The -- this is intentional conduct, and she knew what she was doing. And at the end of the day, we can't believe anything that she said that comes out of her mouth. It's -- it's -- it's sad. It's sad, to say the least.

But this is not even remotely close as to whether it's a mistake or an intentional lie or -- or it was -- it's just -- it's sad. That's all I can say about that now. As

far as the child's best interests, yeah, it's -- it's -- it -- it's the policy of this -- of this state to have joint legal and joint physical custody. But that's -- that's a -- that's a preference that we've overcame, Judge, and -- and when one parent doesn't care, one parent goes out gambling, one parent is non-existent, rather be with friends -- she testified, oh, yeah, I'm with my friends, go pick up the kids.

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When you've demonstrated a pattern of indifference, then that's when we determine, yeah, it's not in the children's best interests to leave them in your custody when your own children don't trust you. When your own adult children say, you know what? I'm scared or -- or I don't -- I don't want my siblings to be with Mom because we don't trust her, that's when it's time to realize, oh, it's not in the children's best interests to do some sort of joint physical and joint custody.

She brought this upon herself, Judge. It -- it's nothing that my client did to her. This is not -- not -- this isn't anything that my client forced her to live through. This is something that she brought upon herself.

And what does she want to do now? Make him look like the monster, make him look like the guy who was never there. Make him look like -- like doesn't deserve -- well, I'll just leave it that, Judge. I think we've -- we've -- I

-- I've proven my case. And this is not a -- a -- a 1 preponderance or a clear and convincing. I think we've met a higher burden, demonstrating that she's -- she's not -- she's 3 simply not credible, Judge, and -- and I'll leave it at that. Thank you. 5 6 THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. 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(THE PROCEEDINGS BEGAN AT 09:06:37)

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THE COURT: Good morning. This is the time set for case D-19-595434-D. If we could have Counsel make their appearances, starting with Counsel for Plaintiff, please?

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MR. GONZALEZ: Good morning, Judge. Rodolfo Gonzalez, Bar number 12751, appearing on behalf of Plaintiff, who's present in my office.

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THE COURT: Yeah, can you turn him up? Thanks.

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MR. WHIPPLE: Good morning, Your Honor. Bret

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Whipple, Bar number 6168, on behalf of Augustina Landa, who's

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present in my cust -- or my office, as well as a certified

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interpreter, Your Honor.

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THE COURT: Perfect. All right. Can we have the Interpreter put their name on the record, and their number?

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THE INTERPRETER: Yes. Cristina Ranuschio R-a-n-u-

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s-c-h-i-o, LVFC 536.

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THE COURT: Perfect. All right --

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THE INTERPRETER: This is -- Alicia Herrera, and my

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THE COURT: Okay. So we have -- have Interpreters

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for both parties. Perfect. I have read everything. We're

here on Plaintiff motion to reconsider and Defendant's opposition. I'll start with you, Mr. Gonzalez. Do you have anything to add, because I see you didn't file a reply, so I want to hear from you first.

MR. GONZALEZ: Sure, Judge. (Indiscernible) two concerns here, spousal support, and then — and the — the — the distribution of the marital assets. So on spousal support, Judge, it — one of the things that — that the Court decided on Dad's gross monthly income was from 2018. Didn't — it doesn't seem from the reading of the decree that the Court took into account Dad's financial status in 2020, when he didn't work for most of the year, and he had — he didn't have an ability, and he still doesn't have the ability to pay the spousal support because his expenses exceed his income. He's been primarily living off of his savings.

So we think that if there is a spousal support claim, it should be set at \$1, with the right to then modify it at some time in the future, when Dad is able to pay spousal support in the future. But given the circumstances when the case was presented to the Court, there was an inability to pay spousal support. It's also important to note — and this is very important, because what the Court didn't do is — is say that Mom has an inability to work, Mom is disabled. The Court never made those findings.

What the Court did is -- is saying in the decree,

Defendant alleges -- and that's on page 7, line 10 -- and

then, Defendant asserted, page 9, line 8, that her injuries as
a result of a car crash may impact her ability to work. And
then on page 6, line 3, Defendant argued, right? So -- so the

-- the Court never made findings that Mom is disabled, or she
has an inability to work. So if Mom in fact does work, that
would give her more income.

And those are important factors that the Court did not really make findings or consider in its ruling. As far as the -- the distribution of the -- the value of the homes, what the Court did is take the Zillow value of each home, and then subtracted the -- the -- one -- one value from the other, and then distributed or divided that in half. That's what the Court did. But instead, what the Court should have done with the -- the -- the mathematical formula based off of equity, not the value. The equity of the home.

And so it's our position that there was an equity value of 122,950 for one home (indiscernible) equity value of 44,957 in the other home, for a difference of \$77,933. And then what the Court didn't do is subtract a \$10,000 debt from the tractor trailer, which would then reduce the total assets of the parties — this is the combined assets, would be 67,993 after we subtract the equity from the larger home to the

smaller home, and we also subtract the \$10,000. So a fair distribution -- I think I explained it a lot better in my -- in my moving papers. Mom should be entitled to \$33,996.50, not 60,000 as the Court ordered off of the Zillow value of the home, not the equity value of the homes.

And so those are the -- those are the -- the two things that we're asking the Court to reconsider. I think that there's a legitimate basis for it. The decree of divorce did not (indiscernible) compelling reasons. I -- I read the decree, and there's no compelling reasons for this unequal distribution of -- of assets, Judge, and so on that, we'll submit.

THE COURT: All right. Mr. Whipple? As I stated,
I've read everything. I do have a couple of questions for
you, and then I'll let you provide anything else you want me
to consider.

MR. WHIPPLE: Yes.

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THE COURT: Is your client living in the Ardmore house?

MR. WHIPPLE: Yes, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay. And is she on the title to either house?

MR. WHIPPLE: Your Honor, I don't have that information in front of me, but her -- she's representing that

With regard to the issue of the income, that's on page 8 of — of the 15 page decree, talking about how much he makes in gross income, and how much expenses he has.

They're trying to unwind something in a five or 10 minute deal, which we literally took hours and hours to get through, and -- and to -- and, you know, to find the
