PRENGAMAN: Yes, thank you, Your Honor. 16 Good afternoon, Members of the Jury. 17 I submit to you that this is a case of these two 18 defendants, Mr. Williams and Ms. Norman, attempting to get payback 19 from one person, Steve Sims, and in the course of events that 20 followed that attempt, killing another person completely 21 uninvolved in that beef, Jacob Edwards. 22 The evidence in this case will show that on 23 February 22nd, 2020, these two defendants, along with another 24

individual, entered Bob & Lucy's Tavern, a small tavern on Oddie

25

and Rock in Sparks, confronted Steve Sims inside. They confronted him over a perceived beef that Ms. Norman had with him.

In the course of events that followed, the police were called, and the defendant, Mr. Williams, ended up fleeing Bob & Lucy's, with Ms. Norman still inside, in a white pickup truck, a white Chevrolet pickup truck.

He led the Sparks police on a pursuit throughout various areas of Sparks, in the general area of Bob & Lucy's, that ultimately led them to the intersection of Victorian Avenue and East McCarran Boulevard, where he then entered the freeway, going eastbound on the westbound exit. So he entered the freeway going against oncoming traffic.

He drove that truck into the middle of the traffic lanes and collided with a truck, with a vehicle driven by Jacob Edwards, and killed Mr. Edwards. And you'll hear that Mr. Edwards was pronounced dead at the scene of that collision.

Now, the evidence you're going to hear is that Steve Sims knew Defendant Norman prior to February 22nd. You'll hear that he spent a number of weeks, a period of weeks staying with her at her residence in Winnemucca. They were acquainted.

Mr. Sims ended up leaving her residence in mid January of 2020. And when he left, he didn't tell her. He just left. He up and left without telling her.

This prompted her to issue a series of text messages where she accused him of stealing from her kids, and issued a

couple of threats along the lines of "Your day is coming," "Your time will come soon," words to that effect.

Now Steve Sims did not respond to those text messages, and he didn't see her again, Ms. Norman again, until the morning of February 22nd. So February 22nd, 2020, early morning hours, Steve Sims is at Bob & Lucy's in Sparks.

Now, he's a regular there. You'll hear, the evidence will show, he's a regular at that little tavern. And it's a small tavern. It's got sort of a small gaming area. And he frequents that there.

He knows the bartender. In fact, the bartender -- he was actually staying with the bartender at the time this happened.

So he knew the bartender, was acquainted with the bartender.

So Steve Sims is in the casino and he's gambling. And just after 6:00 a.m., a truck arrives. And you will see the truck arrive because Bob & Lucy's is equipped with a surveillance camera system. They've got a number of cameras both inside and outside the casino and the tavern.

And so you'll be able to see the outside parking lot and you'll be able to see that white Chevy pickup truck pull up, park right in front of the tavern.

You'll also be able to see -- but not hear, because there's no sound. You'll be able to see the events that transpire inside the casino. So you will be able to see what happened, just

not hear the words that were spoken.

So just after, again, 6:00 a.m. that morning, the white Chevy pickup truck pulls up and parks at Bob & Lucy's. You'll see that it was -- there were three people inside that truck. You'll be able to see that it was driven by Defendant Williams.

Mr. Williams was the driver. And there was a passenger, Ms. Norman, and another passenger, a man that you'll again be shown named Zane Kelly.

And what you'll see is that Zane Kelly gets out of that truck while the two defendants stay inside. He enters the casino. And as you'll again see in the surveillance footage, there's sort of a breezeway, sort of a double set of doors. So you enter one set of doors, there's an internal breezeway, and you enter -- actually enter the tavern through the second set of doors.

And there's a camera right inside that little breezeway, so you'll be able to see the people come in.

So Mr. Kelly enters, enters the casino, the tavern. And you'll see that he kind of makes a loop around the gaming floor. He kind of makes a loop around where Mr. Sims is sitting at one of the machines, playing.

And he goes right back out the door, spends a matter of not even a minute inside and goes back out to the truck.

Now on his way out, he crosses paths with Mr. Williams, who's on his way in, Defendant Williams. And you'll see from that camera in the little breezeway that Mr. Kelly motions, thumbs

back, back into the casino, to Mr. Williams, as they cross paths.

Mr. Williams then enters the casino. You'll see that he goes to the area where the bathroom is. He appears to go inside the bathroom, and comes out. And then he does a smaller -- he loops around that gaming floor, in the -- right in the area where Mr. Sims is playing, and then he, too, goes right back out to the truck.

And a couple of minutes, at most, later, Defendant Williams -- I'm sorry, Defendant Norman then gets out of that truck and she comes in.

Now she goes right to where Mr. Sims is sitting at the machine, playing the game. And I submit to you that the evidence of that video footage will show, without even hearing any testimony, that she confronts him, because you'll see the vigorous movements and the body language, that she begins confronting.

And you'll hear from Mr. Sims. Mr. Sims will tell you that when she walks in, she immediately confronts him about the accusations.

She basically confronts him, "You didn't think I'd find you," and then starts accusing him of stealing a number of items -- an Xbox, tablet -- from her home, that belong to her children.

And they have a confrontation. You'll be able to see them sitting -- she sits next to him, and you'll see them talking.

You'll see it's vigorous at that time. You can tell it's angry.

Now, in the meantime, Mr. Williams is out in that truck, with Zane Kelly. And while Mr. Sims and Ms. Norman are inside, talking, confronting -- confronting each other -- Mr. Kelly gets out and he comes in at one point and again makes a loop. He loops around that gaming floor, right? Right behind, right past where Ms. Norman is confronting Mr. Sims. And he goes back out to the truck.

Very shortly after that, he again comes in, but this time -- and starts heading in the direction of Ms. Norman and Mr. Sims.

But you'll see that Mr. Cole, the bartender, confronts him, basically says "hey," because he's coming in and going out, and so basically tells him go back out, and he does; at which point Mr. Williams then enters the casino. And Mr. Williams goes directly up to where Mr. Sims and Ms. Norman are. He takes the position directly behind Mr. Sims.

As Mr. Sims will tell you, at that point, after Mr. Williams arrives, he is afraid, and he has been. And that's because when Ms. Norman initially came in, he -- Mr. Sims can see that under her coat she had a gun.

And, in fact, at one point, he'll testify that she sees him kind of looking, keep looking in that area, and she pulls out the gun and shows him, to show, yeah, it's real, and then puts it back.

And you'll be able to see that on the video, that she

pulls out the gun and puts it back in.

Now, Mr. Williams, after that has transpired,
Mr. Williams then comes and takes the position directly behind
Mr. Sims. And Mr. Sims has only seen or known Mr. Williams once
before. He's met him once before and that was during the time
period that he was living with Ms. Norman back in Winnemucca.

And on that day, Mr. Williams was carrying a gun on his person, and had made a point of bringing it out and placing it on the console of the car where they were together.

And that's the only day that Mr. Sims had met or had contact with Mr. Williams.

Now, when Mr. Williams walks up, Mr. Sims basically will testify, he'll tell that you he basically makes an appeal like, "You don't think I did this, stole," because that's what they have been talking about. She's been accusing him of stealing. He's been denying.

He will tell you that Mr. Williams says "Let's go."

That's basically immediately after he gets there, "Let's go. You know how I roll." And based on that, Mr. Sims' only contact with Mr. Williams having been that prior occasion, Mr. Sims believed that not just Ms. Norman, but that also Mr. Williams was armed by virtue of "You know how I roll."

Mr. Williams then reaches across. He's right behind
Mr. Sims. He reaches across, presses the cashout button and takes
Mr. Sims's gaming ticket out of the machine that has his -- the

money that he has been playing on that machine, and says, "We're going for a ride," and then ushers Mr. Sims toward the door.

So the three of them, Ms. Norman, Mr. Williams, and Mr. Sims, then edge toward the door.

Mr. Sims, you'll hear from Mr. Sims that he was afraid. He did not want to leave the casino. He was worried about what was going to happen to him were he to leave the casino.

And so he starts offering up to them, "Hey" -- again, he'll tell you his mind is racing. He starts offering up, "Hey, I can get some money for you."

"How much?"

"How much is the Xbox? How much? How much will it take to replace it," when they make that accusation.

And ultimately, he offers up that he believes he can get the bartender -- again, Mr. Cole, who he knows -- to get his brother to bring a hundred dollars.

And the defendants say okay, make it quick.

And so Mr. Williams then heads out to the truck while Ms. Norman stays inside with Mr. Sims.

Now one thing that you'll see in that camera, in the breezeway, is that while Mr. Sims sort of heads over to the bar to talk to Mr. Cole, ostensibly to arrange for the money to come, then you'll see Mr. Williams motioning to Ms. Norman.

Ms. Norman steps into the breezeway. And at that point Mr. Williams reaches into, right under her coat, removes the gun,

places it in his sweatshirt pocket in front, then goes out to the car.

And so Mr. Sims portrays to Ms. Norman that he has arranged for Mr. Cole's brother to bring a hundred dollars to the casino, it's going to take about 15 minutes.

He will == you'll hear from him again. He'll say that while standing there, at one point Ms. Norman says Mr. Williams is calling, you better make it quick, basically because if he comes back in, I can't stop what's going to happen.

And Mr. Sims is going to tell you he was worried, he was afraid. He didn't want that to happen.

What he had actually done is ask Mr. Cole to call the police. And that's what Mr. Cole did, he called the police.

And so Mr. Sims is basically stalling. The police begin arriving. You'll be able to see that on surveillance camera footage. You'll be able to see police cars arrive, pull in behind the white Chevy pickup truck.

Mr. Williams is in the driver's seat and Mr. Kelly is the passenger.

And as we go through, you'll hear testimony from officers who responded. And what they will describe is that they pulled in, they left some distance, because they believed from the report that had come out from 911 that there were armed suspects in that truck, so they kept a distance.

They got out. They began calling out to the truck,

, ,

calling out to the people in the truck to come out.

The evidence will show that Mr. Williams does not.

He -- he turns on the truck, and he pulls out and drives quickly away from the Bob & Lucy's. And he is pursued, as you will see from the camera footage from the police cars, by a number of police officers.

Now, those police officers have their lights and sirens activated. And you will see a number of them. And for a short period of time, the very first car does not have its lights and sirens activated because the equipment wasn't working. Now it came on shortly, but that very first car for a short period of time did not have its lights and sirens activated, but the other cars following behind did.

And you will see those cars pursue Mr. Williams. And Mr. Williams proceeds to drive at high rates of speed. He goes down Rock Boulevard, he goes under the freeway. He goes down to Glendale. He leads the police sort of through little industrial areas on Glendale, attempting to evade them.

You'll hear that the police follow him, lights and sirens activated, that whole way; that he does not stop on Rock, he does not stop on Glendale. He does not stop, he does not yield to those lights and sirens at all, the evidence will show.

Ultimately, you'll hear Officer Chambers, after a pursuit around the little industrial area, he was further back in line of cars pursuing Mr. Williams, but ultimately he becomes the

first car. He becomes the very first car behind Mr. Williams.

He will describe -- you'll see that pursuit from his dash camera footage, him pursuing Mr. Williams up East McCarran, under the freeway, into the -- into that area, there's a little residential area where he turns on to Lincoln Street, and you'll hear and see that footage of Officer Chambers' pursuit.

At one point on McCarran, right before turning on to East Lincoln, you will see the defendant veers into the oncoming traffic lane and then makes that turn on to Lincoln, and the pursuit continues through a small residential neighborhood, ultimately on to Stanford, and then south on Stanford to where Stanford connects to Victorian.

Now at that point Officer Chambers -- again, you'll hear his testimony, you'll see his footage -- but he has asked to be authorized to use what the police call a PIT maneuver, which is a way to disable a vehicle and stop it.

And he is authorized, and he engages that maneuver, but it's not effective. It doesn't stop the truck. He engages it but it doesn't stop the truck. And the truck kind of regains control and then continues eastbound on Victorian.

And at that point, Officer Snow becomes the first car pursuing the defendant driving that white truck.

And again, you'll hear testimony, you will see the camera footage of Officer Snow, and the defendant -- again, on Victorian, he kind of veers into the opposite bike lane for a

period of time, to get around the police cars. And then he heads to the, ultimately, to the intersection of East McCarran and the freeway.

And that's -- right across, is where the on-ramp -- I'm sorry, the off-ramp. So the westbound traffic coming off of the freeway, that westbound off-ramp is right there. And the defendant drives up that off-ramp.

Now you'll see it. Again, you'll see the footage.

There's a semitruck coming off of the freeway. There are markings on the road clearly indicating that it's the wrong way. There's the sign that says "Do Not Enter."

The defendant drives up that off-ramp, followed by Officer Snow, and further back another officer, Officer Guillen, you will also hear from.

And he enters the freeway and he enters the westbound travel lane going eastbound, and he does so at essentially freeway speed.

Now, Officer Snow veers off onto the shoulder with his lights and sirens activated, so he does not enter into the main freeway traffic.

But the defendant, as he's driving down — what I'll submit to you, you'll see the middle of the freeway — collides with the vehicle, the Jeep Liberty, driven by Jacob Edwards.

And you'll see that collision, because there's a semi-truck that happens to have a dash camera, it is traveling in

a different lane, but who happens to capture the collision on his camera.

And so you will see the braking and you will see the defendant's truck collide with Mr. Edwards' vehicle.

Now the police arrive very quickly. They get Mr. Edwards out of his car.

1.2

First, they get Mr. Williams and Mr. Kelly out of the truck, and they do that. You'll hear because they believe they're armed and the first priority is to make sure that everyone there is safe and not in danger. Once they have done that, and, in fact, while they are doing that, other officers go and get Mr. Edwards out of his Jeep Liberty.

And they render aid at the scene and do CPR, but as you will be able to hear, he's pronounced dead at the scene in spite of those efforts.

Mr. Williams is taken into custody there at the scene. You will hear that the truck that he was driving was taken back to the Sparks Police Department and searched, and that inside the truck they found that same gun that was seen on the video tucked up under the driver's seat. And they found that ticket under the, basically, the floor mat of the driver's side.

The evidence will also show that upon being taken to the hospital for his injuries that he sustained, Mr. Williams has his blood drawn.

So the police applied for a warrant. They took samples

of Mr. Williams' blood. And you'll hear from -- you'll hear testimony about the analysis of that blood, and you'll ultimately hear that he had a level of methamphetamine in his blood that is well above the legal limit.

You will also hear that on the -- from the camera footage of one of the officers who rode in the ambulance from the scene of the collision on the freeway to the hospital with Mr. Williams, that in the course of getting information, that one of the medics, the medic attending to Mr. Williams in the ambulance, asked him whether he's had any substances or alcohol, and he replies that, yes, he's had alcohol and methamphetamine.

You will also hear that back at the casino -- so the police, a number of officers pursue Mr. Williams in that white Chevy truck. Other officers show up at the scene. And they find Mr. Sims coming, running out from the casino. You'll hear from Sergeant McNeely who contacts Mr. Sims right there.

You'll also hear from Sergeant McNeely that shortly after he contacts Mr. Sims and gets some basic information about what's happening, so basically what happened. And he's concerned about were there weapons involved and getting information out over the police radios to the other officers responding, who were involved in that pursuit.

He also redirects Mr. Sims to go back and wait in the casino. And as Mr. Sims is heading back, he sees that Mr. Sims has seen a woman walking away from the area of Bob & Lucy's. And

that woman ends up being Ms. Norman.

And so Sergeant McNeely calls to her, calls her over, and he begins handcuffing her because he believes she's involved. And in that process, Ms. Norman calls out to Mr. Sims, who is heading back towards Bob & Lucy's, as directed by McNeely. And there's an exchange between Mr. Sims and Ms. Norman.

And what you'll hear is Ms. Norman essentially pleading, I submit to you, pleading with Mr. Sims, "Why are you doing this to me?" But what she tells him is, "Okay, I'll drop" -- "the Xbox is dropped." She indicates to him she will drop the Xbox, again, I submit to you, if he will help her get out of this situation.

Ladies and gentlemen, based on that evidence, at the conclusion of this case I will ask you to find both defendants guilty of robbery, attempted robbery, and burglary for what happened inside Bob & Lucy's Casino, for entering the casino, for taking the ticket, and by attempting to take money that he has offered them to avoid being taken outside.

I will ask you to find them guilty of murder, felony murder, because the killing of Jacob Edwards occurred when the defendant fled from the commission of felonies at Bob & Lucy's.

And I will ask you to find Defendant Williams, and him alone, because he's the only one charged with these last three offenses, of eluding the police causing death, of reckless driving, and of driving under the influence causing death, because that conduct was -- proximately caused the death of Jacob Edwards.

Thank you for listening. 1 THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Prengaman. 2 Ms. Grosenick, Ms. Hickman. 3 MS. GROSENICK: Thank you, Your Honor. Permission to 4 use the podium? 5 THE COURT: Of course. 6 MS. GROSENICK: Thank you. 7 As you've heard already, the events of February 22nd, 8 2020, involved a lot of events and many things happened. 9 At the conclusion of this trial we will be asking you to 10 find our client not guilty of robbery, attempted robbery, burglary 11 12 and murder. Now let's talk about some of the evidence that you will 13 see in this trial that you are not aware of yet. 14 I want to talk to you about why Mr. Williams and 15 Ms. Norman were at Bob & Lucy's in the first place that day. 16 I want to talk to you about evidence regarding the two 17 conversations that are at issue in this case that occurred inside 18 Bob & Lucy's, and then the police response and why they responded 19 20 the way that they did. And if anybody has trouble hearing me, please let me 21 It seems like sometimes if I turn my head this way, I cut 22 23 out. So let's begin with why Ms. Norman and Mr. Williams were 24

at Bob & Lucy's in the first place that day. You are going to

25

hear evidence that a third individual, Zane Kelly, asked them for a ride to Bob & Lucy's because he was supposed to meet someone there.

And that is why the three of them arrived in a white pickup truck at Bob & Lucy's on February 22nd, 2020, around 6:00 in the morning.

You are also going to see in the video that Zane Kelly is the first person to enter Bob & Lucy's.

You will see him do a lap around the bar and then exit and go back out to the truck.

You will then see Mr. Williams get out of the truck, enter Bob & Lucy's, go to the rest room area, disappear in there momentarily, come back out, leave the bar, go back to the truck.

A couple of minutes later, Ms. Norman leaves the truck, goes inside Bob & Lucy's and makes contact with Steven Sims.

So let's talk about the first conversation that's at issue. And that is the conversation between Ms. Norman and Mr. Sims. You'll see in that video that it is a heated conversation and Mr. Sims will likely describe it that way himself.

And the State has already given you a preview of the subject matter of that conversation. And it was a confrontation. And it was a confrontation about the way that the living situation between Mr. Sims and Ms. Norman had ended over a month prior.

In December of 2019 Mr. Sims had moved in with Adrianna

Norman and her family. He slept at their house. He ate meals with them. He spent Christmas Day with them. And then in January he left, without a word and without explanation.

That was the topic of their conversation that day.

And you will see video of that conversation. As the State has already told you, there's no audio recording of it.

You will have to look elsewhere to fill in the gaps and for that evidence.

Now, one thing that you will see in that video is that Ms. Norman does pull out what appears to be a shiny silver object and that's alleged to be a gun, but that doesn't happen until after Steven Sims stands up out of his chair and leans over her during their heated conversation.

Another thing is that Steven Sims will tell you that while it was heated, and while Ms. Norman did confront him about the way that he left, she also accused him of taking her children's Christmas presents, including the Xbox.

Steven Sims will tell you that Ms. Norman never threatened him and that Ms. Norman never asked for money.

He will tell you that he offered to give her money to make things right.

Now, this heated conversation, this conversation between Mr. Sims and Ms. Norman lasts for approximately 10 minutes.

And during that time you will see Zane Kelly leave the truck and come in and walk around twice. He walks towards the

conversation between Mr. Sims and Ms. Norman, both times, and then exit.

And it's not until about 10 minutes after Ms. Norman had entered Bob & Lucy's that Mr. Williams entered the bar for the second time.

At that time he does enter Bob & Lucy's. He made contact with Ms. Norman and Mr. Sims. You'll see in the video that Mr. Williams and Mr. Sims are speaking, are having words. And you'll also see it appears that they touched hands.

Mr. Williams, after a very brief conversation, then took the ticket out of the gaming machine where Mr. Sims was playing, and walked towards the front of the bar.

Adrianna Norman and Steven Sims got up and followed him.

There is a brief encounter at the front of the bar between Mr. Williams and Ms. Norman, and he appears to be motioning for people to follow.

Mr. Sims didn't follow Mr. Williams out of the bar. He stayed in the bar. And what you'll see in the video is that Mr. Williams' response is to go wait in the car.

He never forced Mr. Sims to come outside.

Adrianna Norman and Mr. Sims stayed inside the bar while Mr. Williams returned to the truck where Zane Kelly was still waiting. And it's during that time that Mr. Sims went to his roommate and friend, the bartender, David Cole; told David Cole that he had been threatened and needed money, and David Cole

called the police.

Several Sparks police officers responded within minutes.

So now I want to talk to you about their response and why they responded the way that they did.

Within a few minutes of the 911 call, there were at least three to four police cars outside of Bob & Lucy's parked behind the truck that Mr. Williams and Mr. Kelly were in.

The truck did not have on headlights or brake lights and the police cars did not have on red and blue lights or sirens.

You will hear from the officers that as they waited there behind Mr. Williams' truck for several minutes, the information that they had was the make of the truck, the color, the body style, the license plate number, and that all that information would allow them to find out who the registered owner was.

After a couple of minutes, Mr. Williams' truck reversed and left the parking lot.

Several Sparks police officers followed in their vehicles and that was the beginning of a nearly eight-minute high speed pursuit throughout portions of Sparks that did culminate, tragically, in the death of Jacob Edwards.

You'll hear testimony that during that pursuit

Mr. Williams and the numerous police cars following him did run

red lights, were speeding, and did not obey the traffic lanes.

Now, the State mentioned that at one point Mr. Williams

was driving the wrong way on McCarran and turned left on to Lincoln. And what you will see is that there are cars in oncoming traffic that he could have run into head-on if he hadn't turned, but he did turn left there and avoided a collision.

Now you will also hear that during that high speed pursuit, two police vehicles collided into each other; a third was disabled during the PIT maneuver, an intentional attempt to disable Mr. Williams' vehicle; and two police Sparks vehicles followed Mr. Williams the wrong way onto Interstate 80.

What you will also hear testimony about is the fact that just before the collision with Jacob Edwards, Mr. Williams took his foot off the gas applied the brakes and swerved.

Now I want to go back to why the police responded that way, because the initial call was for threats with a gun; but you will hear that that reason for the call was upgraded to robbery with a gun after police on scene spoke with Steven Sims, based on what Steven Sims told officers that morning. And that happened during the pursuit throughout Sparks.

I want to stop and talk about Steven Sims for a moment, because you're going to hear evidence on — about things that impacted his ability to recall and perceive events, as well as evidence that contradicts or does not support things that he told the police happened that morning.

You are going to hear evidence that Mr. Sims was at Bob & Lucy's since approximately 5:00 a.m. that morning. He had not

slept at all the night before, and he had been using methamphetamine and was actively high during the events in this case.

You are also going to hear that the results of the police investigation don't support some of the things that Mr. Sims told police that morning. And you will see for yourself in video evidence that some of his statements to police are directly contradicted by the video.

For instance, Mr. Sims told police that he saw possibly three guns that morning. He described two of them. One was a silver gun that he says was in Ms. Norman's possession.

The second, he said that Mr. Norman (sic) pulled up his shirt to show his waistband, and showed Mr. Sims, in Bob & Lucy's, the butt of a black handgun tucked into his waistband.

You will see the video evidence for yourself, which does not show that happening.

The police investigation also found only one gun; did not find a second or third.

Another thing that Mr. Sims told police was that Mr. Williams took his wallet. Again, the video evidence does not show that. And Mr. Sims' wallet, nor any of its contents were located on Mr. Williams, on Zane Kelly, or inside the truck.

So a lot of things happened on February 22nd of 2020.

And at the end of this trial it will be your job as the jury to sort through all of that.

You get to decide what the facts are and what happened.

And then you will apply the law as given to you by the Court to

those facts and decide what our client is responsible for.

And at the end of this trial we will be asking you to find Ryan Williams not guilty of robbery, attempted robbery, burglary, and murder.

Thank you.

THE COURT: Ms. Grosenick, thank you very much.

Mr. Picker, Ms. Rosenthal.

MR. PICKER: Thank you, Your Honor.

Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen.

As you remember, Ms. Rosenthal and I, we represent Adrianna Norman.

And I apologize already, but some of this is going to be repetitive, but you all know that each of these defendants, each of these two people at these two tables need to be considered separately. The charges against them have to be considered separately. So some of the things I'm going to say, you've already heard, but they apply now to Ms. Norman.

The prosecutor has told you that you this was a series of events, connected events. And the problem is that you're going to hear testimony that contradicts.

First, let's look at how everything began. You've heard Steven Sims lived with Adrianna Norman at her residence in Winnemucca. She let him stay with her, because the guy he was

staying with in Winnemucca got arrested for drugs.

You're going to hear that she allowed him to stay with her, she didn't ask for money. He didn't pay any money. She provided food. She provided the house.

Then you're going to hear Mr. Sims say, well, that he left without saying anything to her.

After he left, she texted him a number of times saying, "You left without saying anything, you took my children's Xbox, you took some other things."

He ghosted her. Explaining that term, he didn't respond to any texts, he didn't respond to any messages, he never offered any information, despite the fact that the phone he was receiving those messages on was one that once belonged to Ms. Norman and was on her grandfather's account.

Days, weeks go by. That incident is over. Nothing happened, no follow-up by anyone.

Then you're going to hear that Ms. Norman, Mr. Williams, with Zane Kelly, they traveled to Reno.

They end up in Bob & Lucy's. They travel there so that Mr. Kelly can meet a woman. That's his version of the story.

You'll see and hear that Mr. Kelly is not charged, was never charged in this case. And obviously, he is not here.

So the morning, February 22nd, Mr. Kelly goes in to Bob & Lucy's first. You can see him looking around. He comes up.

You see Mr. Williams on the video. He goes into

the entrance of Bob & Lucy's. He comes in.

Ms. Norman has not left the pickup at any point of this.

Then you see Ms. Norman go into Bob & Lucy's. She goes directly to Mr. Sims. We agree with that. And she confronts him about stealing her child's -- children's Xbox.

He offered — he's going to tell you that he offered up some explanations, and her response was, "Why didn't you respond to any of my text messages? Why didn't you respond to any of my Facebook messages? Why did you leave me hanging?"

He doesn't have any more response to that.

Then on the video, you're going to see Ms. Norman get up and go to walk away. And you're going to see Sims motion her back, and point to the chair. So she goes over and sits down.

You're going to see that that happens twice, where she attempts to walk away and he calls her back.

Now the prosecutor said there was vigorous movement -- vigorous movement and body language of Ms. Norman as she confronts Sims.

You're going to watch the video. And what you're going to see is Mr. Sims get up and stand over Ms. Sims -- I mean Ms. Norman, yelling at her. That is clear on the video.

Ms. Norman never does that to Mr. Sims. You're going to see that.

The aggressive body language, the aggressive movement only belongs to one person. You're going to that on the video.

There is a vigorous confrontation, and it is all on behalf of Mr. Sims.

A few minutes later, you're going to, after discussion, you're going to see that Mr. Sims looks, and Ms. Norman does pull out a firearm. And what he's going to testify to is she said, "Yeah, it's real."

But what he's also going to testify to is that before she ever showed him that gun, he told her, "I've got a gun. I'm armed. I've got people all around me. I'm not here alone."

During this lengthy conversation -- and it is lengthy. It is a 20-minute conversation between Ms. Norman and Sims. You are going to see at some point Zane Kelly come back in, circle around. He doesn't say anything to anybody, he doesn't do anything. And then he goes back out.

But what you're also going to see is that the bartender, Sims' roommate, David Cole -- we're going to hear from him. He comes over while Ms. Norman and Sims are having this discussion and serves Sims a drink.

He doesn't react to anything. He doesn't ask Sims if he's okay or if Ms. Norman is confronting him. You're going to hear that he didn't respond or act in any way. He didn't react in any way.

Okay. Mr. Williams then comes in, goes over directly to where Ms. Norman and Sims are sitting.

And then on the video you're going to see Ms. Norman get

ŏ

up and walk away, leaving Mr. Williams and Sims at the machine. She's walked away.

So when the State tells you the three of them head toward the door, the video is going to contradict that.

In fact, Mr. Sims is going to tell you she was at least 10 yards away at that point.

She doesn't -- she's not part of whatever happens over there at the machine. She doesn't know. She's already headed toward the door.

Mr. Williams and Sims come toward the door where she's waiting, and at that point, for the very first time, somebody mentions money.

The only person whoever mentions money in that entire event, according to Steve Sims, is Steve Sims.

He offers to get it, give Ms. Norman some money to make it good for this Xbox that he has denied taking. Okay.

You're going to see on the video that Mr. Williams then leaves, goes back out to the pickup.

And Ms. Norman stays.

Now you're going to hear various information, especially from David Cole and Steve Sims, that Ms. Norman stood over by that door, that entrance and exit to Bob & Lucy's, and she held it open with her foot so that Mr. Williams could come storming back in, in case there was an issue.

You're going to see on the video that that testimony is

absolutely false.

Ms. Norman does not hold the door open, despite
Mr. Cole's written statement and Mr. Cole's information to police.

She's standing there. You're going to watch this video and you're going to see Mr. Sims walk away, come back, walk away, come back.

And at least, a couple of points, this person who is supposedly -- what is it? He was worried and afraid, according to the Prosecution, he's so worried and afraid that he stands leaning against the wall like this, talking to Ms. Norman, chatting with her.

I would suggest to you, from the body language, you're going to be able to tell from the video that he was never worried or afraid at all. He was nonchalant.

A few minutes after that, you're going to see the police arrive, the white pickup leaves, and they leave Ms. Norman behind.

Again, another break in all of this action. She's left standing there.

And at that point you're going to hear from Mr. Sims, he headed for the back door and he ran out. He ran out.

Ms. Norman didn't run anywhere.

She goes out the front door, nobody is shown there, according to Sims and the testimony we've heard before, but at the point where Sims is coming back to Bob & Lucy's after telling the police that Ms. Norman was in there robbing people, those are his

words, that's what he told the police, "She's robbing people with a gun."

Later you're going to hear he testified, "No, she never attempted to rob me. She didn't want to rob me. She never asked for money. Not once did she mention money."

You'll see that Ms. Norman walks up to the police.

Walks up. And the first thing you're going to hear on that

video -- on that police officer's body cam, is "She's the one,"

coming out of Steve's mouth, Steve Sims' mouth. "She's the one.

She's got three guns."

He knows that's not true, and he's going to tell you he knew that wasn't true then.

Ms. Norman is taken into custody and she talks to the police. I think they described her as surprisingly cooperative. And that's what you're going to hear from the police, in their testimony, she was surprisingly cooperative.

Oh. When Steve Sims was asked under oath previously whether he said Ms. Norman attempted to rob him, he said he never said that. You're going to hear that on the body cam.

He says he never accused her of having three guns. You're going to hear that on the body cam.

Your going to hear that Ms. Norman's version of what happened that day is surprisingly similar to that of Zane Kelly's version, and surprisingly different from what Steve Sims has to say.

So Ms. Norman is not in the pickup when it leaves Bob & Lucy's. The evidence will confirm she's not part of the chase, she's not part of the collision. This is yet again another separate incident.

Again, listening to Steve Sims, you're going to hear that Ms. Norman never asked for money. She never even mentioned money. She never even asked him to make it right.

You're going to hear from Steve Sims that Ms. Norman never threatened him in any way. She never pointed the gun at him. And the evidence is going to show that Ms. Norman didn't flee, didn't leave the area.

At the end of this case, after the prosecution has presented its evidence, and Ms. Norman has responded to those allegations and those accusations, we're going to ask you to find her not guilty, not guilty of any alleged crimes against Mr. Sims, not guilty of entering Bob & Lucy's with any intent to commit any crime there.

All she wanted to do, and it's going to be clear to you from the evidence, she wanted to confront him and just call him out for stealing from her children.

And we're going to go ask that you find her not guilty of the murder charge. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Picker.

Mr. Prengaman, do you need a brief recess or are you prepared to call your first witness?

As you were approaching Exit 19 that morning, did you

notice a particular vehicle?

A Yes, I noticed a white pickup truck getting on the freeway.

- Q And so when you first saw it, describe for us where that truck was when you first laid eyes on it?
- A Well, I was heading westbound, on the westbound side of I-80, and the pickup truck had just got on the freeway, coming eastbound, but he was on our side of the freeway, so he came on the exit ramp the opposite way that he should have.
 - Q So driving against traffic?
- 11 A Yes, sir.
 - Q Describe what you saw happen after you first saw his truck?
 - A Well, as I first saw, you know, I'm looking around, because I have both hands on the wheel and I see vehicles all over the freeway. And there was a, what I would describe as a Wagoneer type vehicle coming up, the same direction I'm headed, in the outside lane.
 - Q And what did you see happen next?
 - A Well, as the pickup truck came out onto the freeway against all the traffic that's heading westbound, a few seconds later I see a couple of police cars coming up with red lights and sirens. And, I mean, they're moving.
 - And this pickup truck is way ahead.
 - Q And then what happened?

A Well, as I was looking back and forth at everything and concentrating on what I was doing, I was hoping that nobody was going to get alongside of me, in case this vehicle lost control and come in there, because if it would have hit the tank, it would have been a disaster.

But as they kept coming towards me, they were at a high rate of speed. And I'm trying to maneuver, because I want to get over to the right because I'm starting to come up by where the exit lane has broken white lines, where you're starting to move over, after you've turned your directional on and checked your mirrors.

And I see the truck keep coming, and now I know, now I know there's going to be a problem, because he's against the traffic.

- Q Okay. And then as you are making that, as you are veering over, what do you see happen with regard to that white pickup truck?
- $_{\rm A}$ $\,$ Well, when the pickup truck kept coming, I mean, he's zigzagging and everything, he's coming up.

When he got up near me, he went directly head on into this other vehicle.

- Q And was that the vehicle that you just described?
- A Yes, the white pickup truck.
- Q And the vehicle you saw it collide with, was that the Wagoneer type vehicle you described earlier?

Yeah. 1 Α What happened next? 2 Q Well, the minute they collided, you know, naturally, 3 they were smoking. And it only was a few seconds when the smoke 4 cleared. 5 And as I looked over this way, which was my driver's 6 door, there's the pickup truck with a man and woman in it, facing 7 this way. 8 And the one I said was a Wagoneer, it got hit head on. 9 It pushed it up into the cement barrier. I mean, the rear end of 10 it went in the barrier. 11 And did you stop your truck? 12 Oh, yeah, I was already stopped. 13 And then when you stopped your truck, did it come to a 14 Q stop near by where these two vehicles --15 Yeah, they were off to the left of me. 16 Α Very shortly after that, did some police vehicles start 17 arriving at the scene? 18 Right after that, there was a whole bunch of other 19 police officers that come up, I mean, like they were straight 20 through, first county-mounties, and Sparks, everybody. 21 Now, that morning --22 0 Uh-huh. 23 Α -- was your truck, your semi-truck, equipped with a dash 24 camera type of 25

1 Oh, yes, it was. Α Can you describe that for us. Oh, it sits up on the windshield, and whenever the truck 3 4 is started and whenever you're in it, around it, it's always 5 working. And so does it have a camera that points in some 6 7 direction forward out of your cab? Oh, yes, you can see everything, forward position. 8 Α And then does it also capture whoever is in the driver's 9 10 seat? Yes, they can see me the whole time. 11 Okay. And have you had a chance to see the footage ---12 and was it working that morning? 13 Yes, it was working. 14 Α 15 And you've had a chance to see the footage from that 0 16 morning? 17 Ά Yes, I have. And did your -- the dash camera mounted in your truck 18 0 capture the collision you described for us? 19 Yes, it did. 20 Α Mr. Sims, I'm going to show you what we've marked for 21 identification as Exhibit Number 3. 22 THE COURT: "Mr. Slattery." 23 MR. PRENGAMAN: I'm sorry. 24
