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

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

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

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Certainly. 1 А 2 DNA really does one thing; it contains information. It's what makes us what we are. 3 There are about 25- to 30,000 packets of information that 4 5 make us humans, same thing for cats, but they don't have as many -- dogs, trees -- pretty much all the 6 7 way down to viruses. You get your DNA, as we all 8 know, when an egg and a sperm are fertilized or fertilized egg. Half comes from mother through the 9 egg, half comes through sperm through the father, so 10 11 DNA can be used to track evidence. It can also be 12 used in those cases where we need to find out 13 parentage of a particular person or item of 14 evidence. 15 What normally happens to us, we receive evidence -- it could be sexual, assault, it could be 16 a homicide or any one of a number of things, and the 17 evidence that we look for is biological material. 18 19 This could be blood, this could be semen, it could 20 be tissue -- any number of things -- even bones. 21 What we then do is take that, isolate the DNA, and then we compare that to a known standard. 22 By a 23 "known standard," I mean a DNA sample that we know comes from a particular person. That's the control 24 sample, and DNA is like most forensics, we compare 25

1 the DNA pattern from the evidence from the DNA from 2 a known person, they will either match or not match. 3 If they don't match, then that person couldn't have 4 left that material. If they do match, we'll put a 5 statistic on that which allows us to make a 6 statement. What was the likelihood of that DNA 7 coming from a particular person?

The parts of DNA you look at are DNA that 8 9 we all have, but those DNAs differ among the human population. What you look at are series of DNA 10 11 markers. These are either going to be given number 12 names or letter names, so you simply go through and 13 compare these. If all these match, that DNA 14 originated from a particular person. If they did 15 not match, that person did not leave that DNA 16 behind.

17 Q Dr. Henry, I want to go to the general 18 description of the types of DNA testing that were 19 done or known to be available in Clark County 20 through the crime lab back in August of 1998.

At that time, were there two general types of DNA testing that was available in Clark County, and then, secondarily, throughout the United States? A That's correct.
Q And could you explain the two types of DNA

1 testing?

2	A Sure. The original part, original test
3	which was actually the second type of DNA test that
4	was available to forensics was what's called a "dot
5	line." Really what it was is a strip of paper that,
6	under certain conditions, laboratory conditions
7	we went through the entire process, you would get a
8	series of blue dots. These blue dots in this case
9	were letters. You simply compare the pattern or the
10	letters from DNA from evidence to the letters of
11	pattern from a person, and again, they would either
12	match or not match.
13	The second type is what is termed "STRs"
14	which is the current method we've been using for a
15	number of years now. This is the primary method
16	that's used throughout the United States, in fact,
17	throughout the world. Again, it's a series of DNA
18	markers which differ in the population. The only,
19	pretty much, difference in this case is these are
20	numbers as opposed to letters, and again, you go
21	through and compare these. If the numbers match,
22	you could have left the DNA. If they don't match,
23	the person didn't leave the DNA.
24	Q Relative to the match, what you've
25	described is this series of numbers. Is there also

1 a statistical database that you, as biologists -2 molecular biologists use to determine whether or not
3 there's a genetic match?

That's correct. The database is simply А 4 bean counting. It's -- you take a number of people 5 and run exactly the techniques we use on evidence, 6 and we put people in baskets. We look at how rare 7 and how common each particular number is. What you 8 can do -- all of these markers happen to be in 9 different locations on the DNA which allows you to 10 multiply the numbers, so if you say one of these 11 12 markers is found in about ten percent of the population, a second marker is found in 10 percent 13 of the population, you can multiply those together; 14 so, ten percent times ten percent is actually 15 one percent; so, of those two markers, you've 16 actually thrown out 99 percent of the population. 17 18 What we're doing is starting with everybody, and our ultimate goal is to get down to one person which 19 would match the evidence. 20 And that statistical database genetically 21 0 now is across ethnic lines and genetic lines as 22 well, correct? 23 That's correct. 24 A 25 And to be able to make a match? 0

Yes, that's correct. 1 A Over your right shoulder, Dr. Henry, is a 2 0 3 series of blow-ups there, and I would ask you to go to the first one that's facing you, and that should 4 be Exhibit 203. 5 Do I have to stand or should I just hold А 6 7 this? Are you familiar with what's contained on 8 0 9 Exhibit 203? A Can everybody see this that needs to see 10 this? I'm sorry, your Honor. 11 12 THE COURT: Can you guys see it? MR. WHIPPLE: Yes, your Honor. 13 MS. JACKSON: Yes. 14 BY MR. STANTON: 15 Are you familiar with the information 16 Q contained in Exhibit 203? 17 Yes, I am. 18 A 19 Dr. Henry, beginning with the column 0 furthest to your left that referenced as "locus," 20 21 could you please explain to this jury what is 22 depicted in this column? A Certainly. "Locus" certainly means 23 24 "location." What you're going to see is a series of these which are the STRs. They're going to be 25 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610 64

1	followed by a series of numbers except for one,
2	which I'll explain. These are the older methods
3	which I talked about, the Blue Dot. One of these
4	actually was an STR method that was done by a
5	different method, so it always has numbers, but what
6	I want to point out is you're going to see letters
7	or numbers. What you simply have to do is look
8	through here (indicating) and see if they match or
9	don't match. In this case, however, these are
10	controlled stains. In other words, these were taken
11	on autopsy, blood or buccal swabs from known
12	individuals, and as I understand it, these are the
13	seven people primarily involved in this particular
14	case. You see the names up here.
15	Q In the first when you said "known" or
16	"reference samples," there's been previous testimony
17	that, in this case, the police obtained the known
18	DNA samples for the first four or the second, third,
19	fourth and fifth columns of being the victims in
20	this case from them at autopsy; is that your
21	understanding as well?
22	A That's my understanding, yes.
23	Q And that blood taken from the victims at
24	autopsy would be a fluid that reference samples of
25	genetic material could be obtained?

1 А That's correct. These are chain of We know exactly where they came from and 2 custody. whom they came from. 3 Relative to the final three columns on the 4 0 far right of Exhibit 203, that is known reference 5 6 samples from the three defendants in this case; is 7 that correct? That's correct. А 8 9 And you said -- once again, you used the 0 10 term for what type of swab they --11 Eventually, I think they were using А 12 actually blood stains. There's another type that 13 you can use, which certainly is valid, which are called "buccal swab." That's a swab with basically 14 15 a Q-Tip which is taken on the big, fat inside part 16 of the cheek. There are a lot of healthy cells, and they have a lot of DNA, and that's what we use now, 17 18 primarily. This is the reference chart of all the 19 0 significant individuals in this case? 20 21 A Correct. 22 Thank you, Dr. Henry. 0 23 If you could take the next exhibit closest 24 to you which should be 204. 25 Is this the correct one? Ά

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Actually, that's 205. 1 0 There we are. 2 A Dr. Henry, once again, as far as the locus 3 0 portion of the left-hand column, that is the same 4 criteria or items that you're looking for as far as 5 the location of genetic markers; is that correct? 6 7 A That's correct. They're in the same order as on the other chart. 8 9 On the next column to your right on the 0 right of that exhibit is something labeled "Donte 10 Johnson." 11 12 Once again, that's the reference sample of the defendant in this case? 13 That's correct. 14 A And the next is a cigarette butt that was 15 Q retrieved pursuant to earlier testimony at the Terra 16 Linda home. 17 Could you explain what the results in 18 19 Column No. 3 mean as it relates to identifying who the donor of that genetic material was? 20 Okay. What we normally do again is 21 A compare, so DNA is isolated from a reference 22 standard, in this case, Mr. Johnson. We run the 23 test that we do, either the old type Blue Dot test 24 or STR test. We generate a series of numbers, as 25

1	you can see. Then what happens is at a separate
2	time, we would isolate DNA from the evidence, in
3	this case, a cigarette butt. Cigarette butts
4	when people smoke, as I mentioned the buccal swab
5	region, there's a lot of nice, healthy cells in
6	there. The same thing is true when someone smokes a
7	cigarette. Your saliva contains cells sloughed off
8	on the inside of the mouth, so those cells are
9	deposited on the cigarette filter. They can be
10	isolated in the cells, and the DNA is isolated from
11	those, and we can compare. That gives us an
12	indication that there's a DNA pattern on who had the
13	cigarette butt in their mouth which may be more than
14	one person. Some people share cigarettes.
15	What you see in this case is this
16	particular locus or location which we all have is a
17	16, 17. If you go to the cigarette butts, you see
18	the same location, 16, 17. What this means is this
19	particular individual can have that pattern at that
20	particular locus or that particular location. If
21	you simply follow through here in all of these
22	locations, you can see that these numbers or letters
23	match. Each situation we have, we put a number on
24	that. I gave you an example of ten percent times
24	chae, I gave you an example of ten percent times

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25 ten percent. We simply continue to multiply

numbers, if they match, until you get a statistic. 1 2 In this case, the statistic we use is high enough for us to make an identity statement, that is, that 3 this DNA originated from this individual with a 4 5 reasonable degree of scientific certainty. The single exception to that is what is called a 6 7 "monozygotic single egg" -- in other words, when the egg is fertilized, for some reason in certain cases, 8 we can separate them in two or more individuals. 9 These are identical siblings. As far as we know, 10 11 they have the same DNA. Regular twins, brothers, et cetera only have about 50 percent of their DNA, so 12 in this case, we go all the way down, we put it on 13 14 the list, and the number we reach is an identical 15 number. When you're talking about the numbers 16 0 multiplying, there's, you say, from a reasonable 17 18 degree of scientific certainty, that is a genetic 19 match to the exclusion of all others known in the 20 population save and except for the one example that 21 you gave? That's correct. 22 A And the final column, "sperm on black 23 Q jeans," is the results the same in that case? 24 That's correct. 25 A

Q Dr. Henry, in the middle column beyond the identifiers that reference this cigarette butt, there are several numbers that are in excess or addition to the known reference sample of Donte Johnson.

6 Could you explain what those numbers mean 7 to you?

8 A Certainly. That happens relatively often 9 in forensics -- sexual assaults, some types of 10 evidence. In other words, if two people or more 11 people are in contact with a particular item, we can 12 have what's termed a mixed stain. That's two people deposit their DNA. The case of cigarettes -- as I 13 14 mentioned, if one person took a puff and the other 15 person finished the cigarette off, you could expect the person that did most of the puffing to leave 16 17 most of the DNA, which is normally what you get. What you see in this case is what we term "major 18 19 contributor" and some "minor contributor." In this case, for instance, the 11, 12 for Mr. Johnson are 20 21 the major components of the DNA. We also picked up, based on our criteria, how to interpret this a 13. 22 I don't know where the 13 came from; it simply means 23 24 there's a mixture of DNAs on this cigarette butt; the major contributor that person that left most of 25

1 the DNA would be Mr. Johnson.

2 0 In the major minor component of the DNA 3 genetic material on that cigarette butt, there's no way of telling from your testing when that genetic 4 material was deposited on that cigarette butt? 5 No; we can't do that. А 6 7 0 There's no way of telling whether or not 8 that was on there before Donte Johnson's DNA was 9 deposited on there or if it was after? That's correct. 10 Α And the testing that you do, Dr. Henry, 11 0 12 there's criteria lab protocol that you use as a 13 standard to determine what is a major donor or what is a minor donor in a mixed stain? 14 That's correct. 15 Α Thank you, Dr. Henry. 16 0 17 If you could go to the final exhibit. I'm sure I can get this one right. 18 A Exhibit 205. 19 Q Are you familiar with the contents of this 20 exhibit? 21 22 А Yes, I am. And I'm assuming the column to the far 23 Q left identified as "locus" is the same and 24 25 consistent with your previous testimony regarding SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

that portion of DNA testing? 1 Right. These are the ones that we use, 2 А 3 and eventually, every other laboratory in the country uses exactly the same markers. 4 In the second column that's labeled 5 0 "Gorringe," that is one of the reference samples 6 7 that is previously noted on the reference chart of one of the victims in this case? 8 9 A That's correct. Now, in the third and fourth column, these 10 0 are several different blood stains that were 11 12 obtained from the defendant's black jeans. Could you tell the jury what the results 13 of all the different blood stains on those jeans as 14 15 far as the genetic results? 16 А Sure. Again, we simply take, in this case, blood 17 18 from autopsy, isolate the DNA, do our usual procedure of all the markers and we generate a 19 pattern. Again, DNA is taken in this case from 20 blood stains. There were eight of these, I believe, 21 on a pair of black Calvin Klein jeans. These were 22 all typed. All of these originated from the same 23 individual. 24 The reason you see two columns is a very 25 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

simple reason. If you see right here (indicating), 1 it says "INC" for "inconclusive." That means one of 2 two things. That means either that particular locus 3 4 or DNA did not come up or it was below level of our interpretation. We have to have a certain amount of 5 DNA before we can feel confident in making a call. 6 7 In that particular instance, it was called "inconclusive." All of these matches through all of 8 9 these loci except this one, that's why it's in its 10 own individual column. Relative to your statistical analysis in 11 0 12 this case, Dr. Henry, do you have an opinion whether or not there is a genetic match of the blood stains 13 being that from Tracey Gorringe? 14 Yes, they were, to identity. 15 A Even to the stain that's referenced as 16 0 "Bloodstain H" in the far right column? 17 Yes, that's correct. 18 A 19 Thank you, Dr. Henry. I'm done with that 0 20 reference sample. 21 Dr. Henry, my final set of questions relate to a portion of the testing in this case 22 dealing with Item No. 21, a cigarette butt that was 23 found at the Terra Linda home and additional or 24 25 third-party genetic testing.

1 Are you familiar with that aspect of this 2 case? 3 A I am familiar, but I thought it was cigarette butt 22. Might I check my notes? 4 Yes, 22, I believe. 5 0 6 Α Yes, it should be Marlboro cigarette item 22. 7 Q Okay. 8 9 Are you familiar with the process and the 10 procedure about why this material was sent to an independent genetic testing facility? 11 12 A As I understand it from the notes and discussions with Mr. Wahl, it's our policy, wherever 13 14 possible, to leave at least half the material. The reason we do this is for a couple of reasons. One 15 is the defense have a right to have things retested. 16 17 Secondly is that new methods might come along simply that would be more informative or we can do 18 19 additional tests. At this point, half of the filter 20 paper around the filter was used up in the first 21 test. As I understand it in this case, since it was only half this material left, a separate reference 22 lab was chosen to do additional testing, the actual 23 24 STR method. Those first 13 I showed you with numbers, that was sent out to a laboratory called 25

1 "Cellmark Diagnostics," and that same procedure we used, same loci was performed. 2 3 And Cellmark Diagnostics is in Germantown, 0 Maryland? 4 That's correct. 5 A Are you familiar with that lab? 6 0 7 Very familiar. А Are they a certified and accredited lab to 8 Q 9 form genetic DNA testing? 10 Yes. They're one of the oldest in the А 11 business. 12 Based on the results of Cellmark's DNA, 0 did they concur with the assessment that your lab 13 did regarding the genetic material deposited on that 14 cigarette butt, right? 15 What we received from them were the STR 16 А 17 patterns, those 13 loci that we talked about. That was sent back to us. We reviewed those results, and 18 it was compared with the STRs that was done on a 19 20 sample from Mr. Johnson in our laboratory. And Dr. Henry, finally, the amount of 21 Q material that we're talking about that is deposited, 22 23 it's a very minute genetic material that can possibly be tested; is that correct? 24 Yes, definitely. 25 A

Depending on what cell structure of the 1 0 material it is, it can be as little as the saliva --2 MS. JACKSON: Your Honor, I'm going to 3 object to the form. He's testifying. I think that 4 that would be overly leading even for this type of 5 proceeding. 6 MR. STANTON: Your Honor, I just want to 7 get to the essential issue here, and instead of what 8 I can do in ten questions, I can do it with one. 9 THE COURT: She's objecting, Counsel. 10 MS. JACKSON: I let him testify, like, for 11 12 ten minutes. 13 THE COURT: You already made your objection. All right. 14 Sustained. 15 BY MR. STANTON: 16 17 Q Dr. Henry, would you be able to obtain genetic material from licking the back of a stamp? 18 19 Α Potentially, except, of course, no one licks stamps anymore. We used to be able to do that 20 when people did. 21 But it could be as little as that? 22 Q 23 А It could be, but here again, it's variable. Some people have more cells. If you're 24 one of those people that salivates a lot, you're 25 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

1 going to be putting out more cells; so, I'd say in 2 stamps, you would have a relatively high percentage 3 of samples that would yield to DNA results, but not 4 all.

5 Q How about if someone were to hold a 6 cigarette relative to the sweat or the secretions 7 from their hand, would that possibly leave genetic 8 material as well?

Possible. Sweat is not a particularly 9 А good source simply because your skin -- the cells on 10 11 your fingertips -- we all have calluses on those and those cells are dead. They don't have DNA that's 12 usable for us in our particular methodology, so 13 14 sweat, if somebody was in contact with something for a long time, like a baseball cap, you can get a 15 pattern. Sweat is an iffy thing. 16 MR. STANTON: Pass the witness. 17

18 MS. JACKSON: Thank you, your Honor.
19 We have no questions of Dr. Henry.

20 THE COURT: You're excused. We'll take a 21 five-minute recess.

The jury is admonished not to discuss this case among themselves or with anyone else, read any newspaper or television reports or listen to any radio reports or express any opinion.

THE BAILIFF: All rise. 1 2 (Recess taken.) THE BAILIFF: All rise. Court is again in 3 Please be seated and come to order. 4 session. 3	BY MR. DASKAS:
4	Q Dr. Telgenhoff, by whom are you employed?
5	A The Clark County Coroner's Office.
6	Q What is your job title?
7	A I'm a forensic pathologist, medical
8	examiner.
9	Q You're actually a medical doctor?
10	A Yes.
11	Q You mentioned you're a forensic
12	pathologist.
13	What is "pathology," and then tell us what
14	is "forensic pathology"?
15	A "Pathology" is a subspecialty of medicine
16	in which a person studies all manners of disease,
17	like cancer, flu anything known to man pretty
18	much. Most pathologists work in a hospital and
19	diagnose tumors, read pap smears, that kind of
20	thing. "Forensic pathology" is another step beyond
21	that. You have to be able to first do those things,
22	and you take another year and study abnormal deaths.
23	Q As a forensic pathologist with the Clark
24	County Medical Examiner's Office, one of your duties
25	primarily is to perform autopsies?

1 Yes. A What is an autopsy? 2 0 An autopsy consists of primarily looking 3 А at the outside of the body for any evidence of 4 5 injury or disease process. Also, we take the organs out of the body, including the brain, and we study 6 7 each and every organ involved, and we're also looking for any evidence of injury or disease 8 process. 9 And is that the primary purpose of an 10 0 autopsy, to determine cause and manner of death? 11 12 А Yes. Give us some examples. I mentioned cause 13 0 and manner of death. What does that mean to you as 14 a forensic pathologist, both cause of death and 15 manner of death. 16 If 17 Α Cause of death is the proximate cause. a person dies of a heart attack, coronary artery 18 disease would be the cause. If a person dies from a 19 20 gunshot wound, the gunshot wound would be the cause. Manner is a whole different area, and we have five 21 options from which to pick. Those would include 22 natural, accident, homicide, suicide or 23 undetermined. 24 Am I correct that there are an infinite 25 0 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610 80

number of causes of death but a finite number of 1 manners of death? 2 Α Yes. 3 Tell us just a little bit about your 4 0 training and education that enables you to form your 5 duties as a forensic pathologist. 6 7 A I have a four-year college degree in biology and chemistry. I have a master's degree in 8 biology and physiology. I have four years of 9 medical school. I have another five years of 10 pathology residency training and an additional one 11 year of forensic pathology training. 12 You have testified as an expert in the 13 0 field of forensic pathology? 14Yes, many times. 15 A Does that include the Eighth Judicial 16 0 17 District Courts here in Clark County, Nevada? А 18 Yes. You did not perform the autopsies in this 19 0 case; am I correct? 20 That's correct. 21 A When I say "this case," I mean the four 22 Q victims that brings us all here today. 23 That's correct. А 24 Who did perform the autopsies? 25 0 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610 81

Robert Bucklin. 1 Α Were you familiar with Dr. Bucklin's work? 2 0 I knew about Dr. Bucklin the first 3 Yes. А year that I was at the Clark County Coroner's 4 Office. He was in the process of retiring, and I 5 actually replaced him. He's no longer living. Нe 6 7 died a couple of years ago. If I were to represent to you that he has 8 Q previously testified that he, being Dr. Bucklin, 9 performed in excess of 25,000 autopsies, would you 10 11 agree with that? 12 Α I read that, and over a 60-year period, I would say that's about right. 13 At my request, did you review the autopsy 14 Q reports and photographs associated with the four 15victims in this case? 16 Yes. 17 A I should ask you, are reports typically 18 0 generated or after an autopsy? 19 They're done during an autopsy, and I know 20 A that because when I first got to the Clark County 21 Coroner's Office, I adopted the way that Dr. Bucklin 22 did it, and he dictated directly into a recorder 23 while he was looking at the body. That was done at 24 the time of the examination. 25

1 You reviewed the autopsy reports 0 associated with the four victims in this case? 2 I'm sorry? 3 Α 4 You reviewed the autopsy reports 0 associated with each victim in this case? 5 Yes, I did. 6 А 7 0 As well as photographs? 8 A Yes. 9 Let me ask you, just generally, do you 0 agree with Dr. Bucklin's findings regarding the 10 cause and manner of death regarding the four victims 11 12 in this case? A 13 Yes. 14 0 You have copies of the autopsy reports 15 there? 16 A Yes, I do. Can you tell me who attended the autopsies 17 0 of each of the victims in this case? 18 19 A Well, I assume the same officers were on each --20 21 0 Yes. -- of the cases. A 22 I'm just reading from the report on 23 Mr. Biddle. Those detectives present were Hefner, 24 Thowsen and Buczek as well as Crime Scene Analyst 25 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

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1 Morton and Norman.

2 Q What is the purpose of having a crime 3 scene analyst attend an autopsy?

A crime scene analyst is a very 4 Α hard-working individual that does a lot of the work 5 involved in the crime scene in respect to getting 6 7 fingerprints, photographs, getting trace evidence from a body, collecting blood samples at the scene, 8 and we use them at our facility. We let them go 9 10 over the body first to make sure that no trace evidence or anything is lost, and then after their 11 12 expertise, then I do my part.

13 Q In this case, did Crime Scene Analyst 14 Sheree Norman impound certain evidence associated 15 with each victim?

16 A I read that she did, but I don't recall 17 exactly what all she impounded.

18 Q I want to talk to you now first about the 19 autopsy of an individual identified as Jeffrey 20 Biddle.

21 You reviewed the reports and photographs22 regarding his autopsy?

23 A Yes.

24 Q Would it assist you in explaining your 25 opinions to show photographs to you and then the

1 members of the jury?

A Yes.

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3 **MR. DASKAS:** Judge, if I might just let 4 the members of the court know we're going to display 5 some autopsy photos for those members who don't want 6 to be present.

THE COURT: All right.

8 BY MR. DASKAS:

9 Q Dr. Telgenhoff, let me ask you, first of 10 all, did Dr. Bucklin provide a general description 11 of Jeff Biddle in his autopsy report?

12 A Yes.

What is that description, please? 13 Q In general, Mr. Biddle, at the time of the 14 А 15 autopsy, weighed 173 pounds and was 5 feet 8 inches tall. 16 Did he provide an apparent age of Jeff 17 Q Biddle? 18 A I believe he did -- approximately 20 years 19

20 of age.

21 Q Did Dr. Bucklin perform an external 22 examination of Jeff Biddle?

23 A Yes.

THE COURT: Hold on a minute.

Let me see those photos.

(Counsel approached the bench.) 1 MS. JACKSON: Judge, may we approach and 2 3 take a look at the particular ones he plans to use? THE COURT: Yes. 4 5 (Sidebar conference outside the presence of the court reporter.) 6 BY MR. DASKAS: 7 8 0 Dr. Telgenhoff, let me display for the members of the jury what's been admitted as State's 9 10 Exhibit 137. 11 If you would, Doctor, please just describe generally what is depicted in this photograph and 12 13 the significant findings from an external 14 examination. 15 Well, since I didn't do the case, I can't A 16 identify which particular person this was, but I 17 assume it's Mr. Biddle. 0 Correct. 18 19 Obviously, there's a person lying on the Α gurney here face down, and it's quite obvious, and 20 21 it's also present in Dr. Bucklin's report that there's an abundant amount of duct tape around the 22 wrists and hands, as well as the ankles. 23 24 0 That is documented in Dr. Bucklin's 25 report?

1 Α Yes. Is there a mention in the report of a 2 0 3 gunshot wound? А Yes. 4 What is the location of that gunshot 5 0 6 wound? 7 The gunshot wound noted on this A individual -- there's only one -- it was on the 8 right occipital aspect of the scalp which means that 9 it was in the back of the head just right of center. 10 If you feel the back of your head where that bump 11 12 is, that's right about where we're talking about. Let me display for the members of the 13 0 14 jury, first of all, No. 145. 15 Can you see the gunshot injury in that photograph? 16 Yes. It's difficult to see because of the Ά 17 hair and, we typically shave the area where the hair 18 is. Right here (indicating) you can see there's a 19 defect, and this area down here (indicating) is 20 21 blood that is dried and smeared, and of course on the clothing, but this is the gunshot wound injury 22 23 right here (indicating). Let me display for the members of the jury 24 0 25 Exhibit 146; that's the same portion of the injury SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

1 with the hair now shaved.

2	A After we shaved the hair, for obvious
3	reasons, then you can see the details of the wound.
4	You can see if there's any indication of range of
5	fire, how far away the gun might have been and that
6	kind of thing? Also, you can see if it's actually
7	an entrance or an exit. This particular wound is
8	definitely an entrance. It has what we call a
9	"surrounding abrasion collar." In addition, there's
10	singeing on the edge of the wound where fire comes
11	out a flame comes out of the end of the barrel.
12	It's very short, so to get the singeing, you have to
13	be very close.
14	Q Let me ask you a couple of questions about
15	your last comment.
16	That is an entrance wound you said?
17	A Yes.
18	Q Was there a corresponding exit wound?
19	A No.
20	Q And you mentioned something about the
21	ability to determine how close the barrel of the gun
22	was when this injury was sustained; is that correct?
23	A Repeat the first part of your question.
24	Q You mentioned something about your ability
25	to determine how close the barrel of the gun was at
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1 the time this gunshot injury was sustained? 2 A Yes. What types of things do you look for? 3 0 This requires knowledge of how guns 4 A 5 discharge, what comes out of the barrel, what kind of gun we're talking about, and rifles are different 6 7 than handguns, and handguns are different than 8 shotguns, but assuming we're talking about a handgun, most handguns, if they're right against the 9 skin and it's on the scalp, you typically get a big 10 11 tear in the skin because the gases get shoved 12 underneath the skin and push the skin out and tear 13 That's not present here. Another thing that it. 14 happens is the flame that I mentioned. Another 15 thing that happens is that gunpowder is burnt and it's turned to soot, so, within a few inches or so, 16 soot usually is apparent either on the skin or in 17 18 the wound. After that, after about an inch or so, 19 unburned gunpowder particles come out of the barrel 20 and scrape the skin, and this is what we call 21 "stippling" -- those little orange-red dots on the 22 skin around the wound. We don't have that here. 23 That usually occurs out to about two feet. After that, we call it a "distant gunshot," and you don't 24 25 have any of those features; all you have is a round

1 hole, but with the singeing present but no stippling present, this gunshot wound, to me, is obviously 2 3 about an inch or so away from the skin. 4 0 In other words, the barrel of the gun 5 would have been about an inch or so away from the skin at the time the gun was discharged? 6 7 A That's my opinion, yes. And if Dr. Bucklin testified similarly and 8 0 9 if that was contained in his report, you would agree 10 with that opinion? 11 А Yes, I would. 12 0 Was an internal examination performed on Jeff Biddle as well? 13 Yes. 14 Α Describe, if you would, what is an 15 0 "internal examination"? 16 One moment as I --17 А 0 Absolutely. 18 19 Α -- thumb through the report. Well, the bullet fragmented, as they often 20 do when they hit bone, and the fragments went 21 through various portions of the brain, one course 22 23 downward and just beyond the base of the skull; so, Dr. Bucklin retrieved these various fragments and 24 gave them to the crime scene analyst. 25

Let me ask what may be an obvious 1 0 question, but what causes a bullet to fragment? 2 Well, it's lead core. Sometimes bullets 3 A are jacketed. They have like a copper or a lumen 4 coating on the outside. Usually, it's copper, but 5 once that -- if it's jacketed at all, that usually 6 7 breaks away as a free piece and the inside lead is heavy but it's soft, so if it hits anything hard, it 8 tends to bust up into pieces. 9 During the internal examination of Jeff 10 0 Biddle, were the bullet fragments recovered? 11 12 A Yes. 1.3 Q Let me display what's been admitted as State's Exhibit 135. 14Tell me, if you would, what is depicted in 15 Exhibit 135? 16 I haven't seen those photos before, of 17 A course -- I take that back. I did see them in some 18 photographs. Of course, I wasn't there, but this is 19 very consistent with what Dr. Bucklin described in 20 21 his report. These are fragments of a lead projectile. 22 And also depicted on that exhibit is the 23 0 general location, at least from which those 24 fragments were recovered? 25

Yes. In this particular photograph on the 1 А left side there's a group of three fragments which 2 3 he retrieved from the base of the skull or the head. Let me take that back -- he retrieved from the 4 inside of the head. The one on the right he 5 retrieved from the neck area, the base of the skull 6 7 that I described. Does Dr. Bucklin describe in his report, 8 0 9 at least generally, the trajectory of that bullet? 10 A Yes. What is, generally speaking, the 11 Q 12 trajectory the this bullet traveled? 13 A Of course it's back to front. It went in the back, slightly left to right and downward. 14 Would the trajectory be consistent with 15 Q the victim having been face down on the ground with 16 someone standing over the victim an inch away and 17 firing that gun? 18 A Yes. 19 Did Dr. Bucklin reach an opinion regarding 20 0 the cause of Jeff Biddle's death? 21 22 A Yes. What was that opinion? 23 Q Gunshot wound to the head. 24 А And did Dr. Bucklin reach an opinion 25 0 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

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regarding the manner of Jeff Biddle's death? 1 А Yes. 2 How was that? Q 3 Homicide. 4 Α How do we define "homicide"? 5 0 6 A The way we use it is a very general way, 7 the death of one at the hands of another. This is probably the -- we don't address murder, per se; we 8 address homicide which is one taking the life of 9 another. 10 Do you agree with Dr. Bucklin's findings 11 0 12 regarding both the cause and manner of death of Jeff 13 Biddle? А Yes. 14 Based on your experience, your expertise, 15 0 how long would you expect someone to survive after 16 having sustained this type of gunshot wound? 17 Not very long -- a couple seconds to 18 Α minutes, and it depends on how we're describing 19 death. Unconsciousness would probably be instant. 20 21 Let me move on now to the next victim, 0 Tracey Gorringe. 22 Did you review the autopsy reports and 23 photographs associated with the autopsy of Tracey 24 Gorringe? 25

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1 Yes. A 2 Is there a general description of height, 0 weight and age of Tracey Gorringe? 3 Yes. 4 A What is it? 5 0 A The height was described as being 6 7 68 inches, and at the time of the autopsy, the weight of the body was 158 pounds. 8 Let me display for the members of the jury 9 Q Exhibit 148. 10 11 Can you please describe what's depicted in 12 that photograph? 13 A It looks very similar to the last photo we looked at, and having not done the case myself, I 14 15 can't identify this particular body, but I assume 16 it's Tracey Gorringe. 17 Q Correct. 18 A Very similar findings. We have hands and wrists bound pretty secure with duct tape. I can't 19 20 really see that well down at the ankles, but I remember the description is it being there. 21 At page 2 of the doctor's report --22 0 23 Dr. Bucklin's report, he states that the tape has produced pallor, P-A-L-L-O-R. 24 25 What is "pallor"?

1 А Can you tell me which line that's on? 2 0 Absolutely. MR. DASKAS: May I approach the witness, 3 4 Judge? THE COURT: Yes. 5 6 MR. DASKAS: Thank you. 7 THE WITNESS: Okay. The ankles show 8 restriction marks due to duct tape described that 9 duct tape restrictions have reduced pallor in the 10 areas of the wrist. "Pallor" is simply blanching. 11 When you push on your skin, you can see the blood 12 retreats from the area. In a dead person, it tends 13 to stay. BY MR. DASKAS: 14 15 Q Does that suggest anything to you about 16 how tightly that duct tape was wrapped around the victim's wrists and ankles? 17 А It indicates that it's tight. 18 19 Now, I assume that Dr. Bucklin performed 0 20 an external examination on Tracey Gorringe? 21 Ά Yes. 22 And what were the significant external Q 23 findings? 24 Ά Well, there was -- in addition to the duct 25 tape findings, there was a gunshot wound also in the SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

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back of the head in the same region; however, this 1 one was more centered, central rather than on the 2 right. 3 Let me display for the members of the jury 4 0 Exhibit 151. 5 Can you please describe what is depicted 6 7 in that photograph? 8 А Yes. In this picture, we see another 9 entrance wound in the back of the head. You'll 10 notice it's very similar to the last one, although 11 we don't gauge caliber by the size of the wound. 12 You can see that they're very similar in shape and 13 size. Also, we have abrasion collar around the wound which indicates it's an entrance. There's 14 15 some black singeing on the edges which indicates 16 that it's close. There are some areas around here 17 (indicating) where the hair isn't quite shaved well, 18 so it looks like there's other marks here, but there 19 is no stippling here. So, once again, we have a range that's very close, within an inch or so. 20 21 You say about an inch or so? 0 22 Α Yes. And again, you're referring to how close 23 Q 24 the barrel of the gun was placed to the victim's head at the time the gun was discharged? 2.5

Yes. 1 A 2 0 This was an entrance wound? 3 А Yes. 4 0 Was there a corresponding exit wound? 5 A No. 6 Was an internal examination performed and 0 7 were bullet fragments recovered from Tracey Gorringe? 8 9 A Yes, as I recall. I need to look at the 10 report once again to refresh memory here. I think if you turn to page 4 under 11 Q "Description of Injuries." 12 13 A Yes; I found it. 14 It went into the brain after going through the skull but just below the area known as the 15 16 cerebellum, which is the very back bottom part of 17 the brain. It went somewhat rightward, and three metal fragments were recovered from the right front 18 19 of the brain up in this area (indicating). 20 Was the direction of the bullet from back 0 21 to front just like with the first victim? 22 Ά Yes. 23 And did the crime scene analyst, at least 0 24 as far as you can tell, recover and impound those 25 bullet fragments?

Yes. 1 Α Let me display for the members of the jury 2 0 Exhibit 147. 3 Are those the three fragments you 4 5 referenced in Dr. Bucklin's report? Yes. He mentioned recovering a base of a 6 A bullet, and you can see that here (indicating). You 7 can see how flattened out the bullet gets when it 8 hits bone. This (indicating) -- he didn't 9 particularly describe this, but it looks to me like 10 11 it's a piece of jacketing. That might be aluminum 12 jacketing. It's Silver color; it's not a typical copper jacket. 13 The distance from which the gun was placed 14 0 to the victim's head was very similar to Jeff 15 Biddle; is that correct? 16 Yes, nearly identical. 17 A 18 0 Did Dr. Bucklin reach an opinion regarding the cause of Tracey Gorringe's death? 19 20 А Yes. What was that opinion? 21 Q Gunshot wound to the head. 22 А Did he reach an opinion regarding the 23 Q manner of death? 24 25 Yes. A (702) 455-3610 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727

1 Q What was that opinion? Homicide. 2 А 3 Q Do you agree with those findings? 4 Α Yes. 5 Let me ask you the same question. 0 Are the injuries and the trajectory of the 6 7 bullet or the fragments consistent with Tracey 8 Gorringe having been face down on the ground with someone standing over him holding a gun about an 9 10 inch from his head and then firing the gun? 11 Α Yes. 12 0 Let me move on now to the third victim, 13 Matt Mowen. 14 You reviewed his autopsy report and photographs from that autopsy? 15 16 Ά Yes. 17 0 Did Dr. Bucklin provide a general description of height, weight and apparent age? 18 19 А Yes. What was that? 20 0 The height was 69 inches, and at the time 21 A of the autopsy, the weight was 189 pounds. I need 22 23 to check the age. About 20 years of age is what he states. 24 I take it an external examination was 25 0 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610 99

performed by Dr. Bucklin on Matthew Mowen? 1 2 A Yes. What were the significant external 3 0 findings? 4 Again, the decedent was bound with duct 5 A tape. All three photos look pretty much the same. 6 MR. DASKAS: For the record, I've 7 8 displayed for the members of the jury Exhibit 130, 9 your Honor. THE WITNESS: Here again, I can see the 10 same almost exact tying of the duct tape around the 11 hands and the wrists, also around the ankles. This 12 is the way the decedents were received, the way I 13 14 understand it, is face down like this. BY MR. DASKAS: 15 Does Dr. Bucklin describe a gunshot injury 16 0 on Matthew Mowen? 17 18 A Yes. What was that description, generally 19 Q 20 speaking? 21 А This particular shot was in the neck just below the area we've been talking about right about 22 23 the nape of the neck or right where the head meets the neck -- right in the midline. 24 Let me display for the members of the jury 25 Q (702) 455-3610 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 100 1 Exhibit 134.

2 Is the gunshot wounds visible in that photograph? 3 Yes. This is hard to get orientation on, 4 A I know, but this is the right shoulder 5 (indicating) -- the back of the right shoulder. 6 7 This would be the left shoulder over here 8 (indicating), and looking at the back of the 9 person's head and the back of their neck. Right up 10 here right in the middle (indicating), the midline 11 and right about the base of the head there, there's 12 an obvious round gunshot wound of entry. 1.3 You say that's an entrance wound as 0 well -- an entrance wound? 14 15 А Yes, absolutely. 16 Was there a corresponding exit wound? 0 17 А No. And again, same question, did Dr. Bucklin 18 0 19 determine how close the barrel of the gun was when 20 Matthew Mowen sustained this injury? 21 A I think he described it as being somewhat farther away but not more than a fraction of an inch 22 23 or so, the way I recall. This is an entrance 24 (indicating), there is a larger area of singeing, 25 and it appears to be soot disposition there

1 (indicating).

Would you agree with Dr. Bucklin's opinion 2 Q regarding how close the barrel of the gun was to 3 Matthew Mowen's head when that injury was sustained? 4 5 А General, yes. It was about the same distance as was Jeff 6 0 7 Biddle and Tracey Gorringe's injuries? This might have been a little farther A 8 9 away. Was an internal examination performed 0 10 which revealed the trajectory of the bullet on 11 12 Matthew Mowen? А Yes. 13 What was the trajectory of that bullet? 14 Q The trajectory was basically back to 15 A front, and it went through the cervical spine or the 16 17 top of the neck area and involved the upper aspect of the spinal cord. When this happens in such a 18 traumatic way, it tends to put concussion on the 19 brain stem which is just above it, and I would 20 imagine the person was instantly unconscious and 21 22 basically instantly dead. 23 0 Were bullet fragments recovered? I recall that they were. А 24 Let me display for the members of the jury 25 0 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610 102 1 Exhibit 127.

2 What is depicted in that photograph? 3 On this photo, I see what I would describe A 4 as "jacketing" from the bullet, and this most likely is jacketing plus some of the core (indicating), but 5 that's just on my view here today. He describes a 6 7 couple of fragments that he recovered. Did Dr. Bucklin reach an opinion regarding 8 0 the cause of death of Matthew Mowen? 9 10 А Yes. What was that opinion? 11 0 12 A The opinion is gunshot wound to the neck. 13 Did he reach an opinion regarding the 0 manner of death of Matthew Mowen? 14 Yes. 15 A What is that opinion? 16 Q Homicide. 17 A Do you agree with those two opinions? 18 0 19 A Yes. Same question -- are the injuries and the 20 0 trajectory of the bullet on Matthew Mowen consistent 21 with someone having fired a gunshot at close range 22 while Matthew Mowen was face down on the ground? 23 А Yes. 24 Let me move now to the fourth autopsy, 25 0 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610 103

1 Peter Talamentez. 2 Did you review the autopsy report and photographs associated with his autopsy? 3 А Yes. 4 5 0 Is there a general description of height, weight and age? 6 7 A General description was 105 pounds, 69 inches and 17 years of age. 8 An external examination was done by 9 Q Dr. Bucklin, correct? 10 11 Α Yes. 12 Q What were the significant findings? 13 Once again, there was a gunshot wound, and A I'd like to review the report, once again, to get 14 the exact details. 15 If that would refresh your recollection. Q 16 17 MR. DASKAS: For the record, I'm displaying for the members of the jury Exhibit 18 No. 116. 19 Okay. This entrance wound THE WITNESS: 20 was on the back of the head again, but it was 21 somewhat leftward. Try to imagine this is the 22 decedent's left, not our left, so over here behind 23 the left ear in that area but in the back of the 24 head. Also, you can see from this photograph that 25 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610 104

we have a very similar situation as the other three 1 2 cases, the same binding with duct tape in the same type and also around the ankles. 3 BY MR. DASKAS: 4 You just described the gunshot wound. Q 5 Let me display Exhibit No. 125. 6 7 Can you tell me what is depicted in that 8 photograph? It's hard to say what's depicted in that 9 A 10 photograph. There's a bunch of drying blood down here. This is the back of the decedent's head 11 (indicating). I don't really -- I don't readily see 12 a gunshot wound on this particular photograph. 13 Let me point here to an area behind the 14 0 victim's left ear (indicating). 15 Do you see something that appears to be a 16 gunshot wound in that location (indicating)? 17 Possibly, but again, the lighting on the 18 А 19 photograph isn't that good, but that's where he describes it as being. 20 My next question is, is that consistent 21 0 with the description given by Dr. Bucklin in his 22 23 report? 24 A Yes. Does he describe that as an entrance or an 25 0 (702) 455-3610 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727

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exit wound? 1 He describes it as an entrance. 2 A Would you agree with that description? 3 0 4 А From the way he described it in the report, yes. 5 There was no corresponding exit wound, 6 Q 7 correct? А Correct. 8 And does Dr. Bucklin render an opinion 9 0 regarding how close the barrel of the gun was at the 10 time the victim sustained this injury? 11 12 A He mentioned that there's charring at the borders but no stippling, and again, that's a very 13 similar description to all the others that we've 14 talked about, and I don't doubt that it's probably 15 within the same range. 16 About an inch or so? 17 0 Yes. 18 A 19 Does Dr. Bucklin describe any other 0 injuries to Peter Talamentez in the autopsy report? 20 Yes. He mentioned something about a 21 А laceration behind the left ear, and also, I believe 22 there's an abrasion on the nose. 23 Let me ask you, first of all, about the 24 0 laceration behind the left ear. I'm going to point 25 (702) 455-3610 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 106

to another area on Exhibit 125, what I would 1 describe as closer to the center of the head versus 2 3 the injury behind the left ear. Do you understand that? 4 Α Yes. 5 Does Dr. Bucklin describe both of those as 6 0 7 separate injuries in his autopsy report? Α Yes, he did, and I can see why, because 8 they're widely separated. 9 Does Dr. Bucklin give a description 10 0 regarding the cause of the laceration on Peter 11 12 Talamentez's head? He describes it as a "laceration" which 13 А means it's not a cut; it's a tearing or a ripping of 14 the skin due to blunt force. If a person were to be 15 struck with something or if they fall down and hit 16 their head on the cement, say, for example; their 17 scalp may be bleeding but that doesn't mean they 1.8 have a cut they have a laceration. It's a smashed 19 20 area of the skin that's torn apart and bleeding. You mentioned a laceration would be caused 21 0 by blunt force trauma. 22 What do you mean by "blunt force trauma"? 23 It means anything blunt, anything other 24 Α than a sharp edge like a knife. 25

Anything other than something like a 1 0 2 knife? Yes, or broken glass or something like 3 Α that. 4 What about the handle of a gun, for 5 Q example? If someone were pistol whipped, could that 6 result in a laceration like this? 7 8 A Absolutely. Is this, in fact, being consistent with 9 0 being pistol whipped? 10 11 А That was Dr. Bucklin's impression, and I don't disagree with it. 12 13 0 You mentioned an injury to Peter Talamentez's nose. 14 He mentions it. 15A Q Let me display for the members of the jury 16 Exhibit 120. 17 Is that injury depicted in this 18 photograph? 19 Yes. If you look at the face and here is 20 A the nose (indicating), you can see there's what we 21 22 call "abrasion" here between the eyebrows (indicating) and also goes down the center of the 23 nose. It's a scrape. An abrasion is a scrape. 24 Q If Dr. Bucklin rendered an opinion that 25 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

1 the laceration to the head and the scrape to the nose occurred around the time of the victim's death, 2 would you agree with that opinion? 3 Yes. 4 А Can either of those injuries, the 5 0 laceration or scrape to the nose, have signs of 6 7 healing? А Signs of -- I'm sorry. 8 9 Signs of healing? 0 10 No, not according to Dr. Bucklin. А 11 Were the bullet fragments recovered from 0 12 Peter Talamentez during an internal examination? Yes. There is -- I believe he describes 13 A it as a "large caliber." Again, I need to see the 14 15 report here. While you're doing that, let me display 16 Q for the members of the jury Exhibit 113. 17 18 A He describes bullet fragments recovered 19 from -- recovered close to the skull at the entrance wound and in the right frontal lobe tip, in other 20 words, the very front of the brain. And again, we 21 22 see similar fragments. Some of this, to me, is obviously aluminum or at least a light metallic 23 24 jacketing, and this is the lead core. 25 I don't recall if I asked you this. If I Q SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

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did, I apologize, but I'm going to ask it again. 1 Is there a description of the trajectory 2 3 of the bullet or bullet fragments recovered from Peter Talamentez? 4 He described it as left to right, upward 5 Α and does not describe any other deviation, as I 6 recall. 7 Whereas the other three victims were 8 0 9 described, that is, the trajectory was back to front; Peter Talamentez was described from left to 10 right; is that correct? 11 12 A I'm not sure I understand the question. I apologize. 13 0 The other three victims that you described 14 so far, the trajectory was from back to front? 15 16 А Yes. That was the primary angle, yes. I think you just described the trajectory 17 0 of the bullet from Peter Talamentez from left to 18 19 right? That's how he lift it, yes. 20 Α Would the injuries and the trajectory of 21 0 22 the bullet recovered from Peter Talamentez be consistent with Peter Talamentez having been face 23 down on his right side and someone having fired a 24 gun about an inch away into his skull? 25

Yes, it's consistent with that. 1 A Did Dr. Bucklin reach an opinion regarding 2 0 the cause of death of Peter Talamentez? 3 A Yes. 4 5 0 What was that? Gunshot wound to the head. 6 A And did he reach an opinion regarding the 7 0 manner of death of Peter Talamentez? 8 9 Yes. А What was that opinion? 10 0 A Homicide. 11 Do you agree with those two opinions? 12 Q Yes. 13 A How long would you expect Peter Talamentez 14 0 15 would have survived after having sustained this injury? 16 Again, survival is an interesting question 17 А in itself. A person can be unconscious immediately 18 but yet, not legally dead for some minutes; so, it's 19 hard to say. It depends on what you're putting your 20 21 emphasis on. He would be dead within minutes, I would think. 22 Let me jump back just for a moment to the 23 0 24 autopsy of Tracey Gorringe. Do you still have that autopsy report 25 SONIA L. RILEY, CCR NO. 727 (702) 455-3610

1 available?

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A Yes.

3 Q At page 2, I believe, of Dr. Bucklin's 4 report, he mentions what he describes as very marked 5 hemorrhage in the right upper eyelid?

A Yes.

7 Q He described it at trial as blackening8 around the eyelid.

9 What does that represent to you or suggest 10 to you?

I see it in many gunshot wounds, I see it 11 A in traffic accidents and all kinds of accidents 12 13 where -- or homicide where the very fragile bones right above the eyes, above the eyeball, get 14 fractured, and the blood from that area seeps down 15 through the skin into the eyelids and gives the 16 person the "raccoon eyes" some people call it. 17 Dr. Bucklin suggests that that indicates a time 18 19 frame. I'm not sure I agree with that, but that, just to me, indicates that that area of the skull 20 was fractured. 21 And that's consistent with the gunshot 22 0 23 injury that Tracey Gorringe sustained?

24 A Yes.

25

Q What are "defensive wounds"?

1	A Defensive wounds can look different
2	depending on what a person is being attacked with or
3	the person being attacked. If a person is being
4	confronted by a person with a knife, the thing you
5	would assume a person would do is put their arms up
6	in this fashion (indicating), and they tend to get
7	slashes and cuts on these areas of the body that
8	indicates the person is trying to defend themselves,
9	at least for a period of time. If it's blunt force
10	where a person is punching you or hitting you or
11	with a bat, maybe you would expect bruises, and
12	that's blunt force based on these areas of the body.
13	Q Based on your review of the autopsy
14	reports and all four victims in this case, did any
15	of them have any defensive wounds whatsoever?
16	A No.
17	Q Finally, are toxicology reports commonly
18	generated around the time autopsy are done?
19	A We take fluids at the time of autopsy,
20	they're sent to a lab in town, and it takes a number
21	of weeks to get those back.
22	Q What types of things is the lab looking
23	for when you submit the blood work, for example, to
24	the lab?
25	A There's a list of drugs that they screen
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for. Most of them are common drugs of abuse --1 marijuana, cocaine, methamphetamine, Ecstasy, a lot 2 of the abused prescribed drugs like Valium or 3 Oxycontin, those kind of things. 4 You don't have all of the toxicology 5 0 reports for each victim in this case? 6 7 A That's correct. I notice I have a couple, but I don't have all of them. 8 If I were to represent to you that all 9 0 10 four of the victims had methamphetamine, amphetamine and cocaine in their systems, you wouldn't disagree 11 12 with me, would you? No. I would say that two of them 13 A definitely do; there's no reason the others didn't 14 if that's what the report says. 15 If I were to represent to you that Matthew 16 0 Mowen had some alcohol in his system but the others 17 did not, you wouldn't disagree with that 18 19 representation? I wouldn't disagree with it. 20 A If Dr. Bucklin opined that the levels of 21 0 drugs in the victim's system were recreational 22 23 amounts, would you agree with that? Yes, and a couple of these somewhat A 24 higher. 25

Were any of the levels of drugs, however, 1 0 2 life threatening? That's a very difficult question to 3 A answer, because I have signed out cases with these 4 5 levels having died from drug abuse. However, there are many people also that do just fine on these 6 7 levels; so, it totally depends on the individual, 8 the state of their heart. Given that these people are very young, I would not expect much at this 9 level to necessarily kill them. 10 With regard to all four of these victims, 11 0 what were their causes of death? 12 A The cause of death is gunshot wounds. 13 14 MR. DASKAS: Thank you, Doctor. We'll pass the witness, Judge. 15 MS. JACKSON: Court's indulgence. 16 We have no questions of Dr. Telgenhoff 17 this afternoon, your Honor. Thank you so much. 18 Thank you, doctor. 19 THE COURT: All right. 20 21 You're excused. THE WITNESS: I'm dismissed, sir? 22 THE COURT: Yes. 23 THE WITNESS: Okay.
