### STATE'S BENCH BRIEF REGARDING THE ADMISSIBILITY OF EVIDENCE OF TRAITS OF CHARACTER OF THE VICTIMS

During the defendant's opening statement, it became apparent to the State that the defendant may inadvertently be commenting upon victim Echo White's character, and unintentionally introducing evidence that would tend to paint her as a drunken, chain-smoking, tattoo-loving harlot. Likewise, during opening, the defendant's attorney made comments regarding victim Joseph Averman's first marriage that unfairly characterize him as a "cheater" during that relationship.

In particular, with regards to Echo White, the defendant's attorney mentioned in his opening that, after Echo separated from the defendant and began her relationship with Joseph Averman, she began to drink, smoke and acquire tattoos. Additionally, the defendant's opening Powerpoint presentation included three photographs from the Echo's phone declaring "I love shoes, booze, and boys with tattoos," "some girls are just born with glitter in their

veins," and "free-spirited." (See Exhibits 1, 2 and 3, Slides from Defendant's Opening PowerPoint presentation, attached hereto).

Such use of circumstantial and irrelevant character evidence regarding Echo and Joseph is simply impermissible. NRS 48.045(1); 48.055.

NRS 48.045 specifically delineates the use of character evidence. The general rule under that statute is that "evidence of a person's character or a trait of his or her character is not admissible for the purpose of proving that the person acted in conformity therewith on a particular occasion..." NRS 48.045(1). While some exceptions exist, including "[e]vidence of the character or a trait of character of the victim of the crime offered by an accused... and similar evidence offered by the prosecution to rebut such evidence[,]" the fact remains that the traits of character at issue must be relevant to a charge or defense. As the Nevada Supreme Court has previously stated,

Before any evidence is admissible, it must be relevant. Character evidence is no exception.

Coombs v. State, 91 Nev. 489, 490, 538 P.2d 162, 162, (1975); see Daly v. State, 99 Nev. 564, 571, 665 P.2d 798, 803 (1983) ("proof [of good character] must be confined to the particular traits of character that are relevant to the conduct with which the accused has been charged").

Here, Echo White's alleged affinity for tattoos, her choice to drink alcohol or smoke, or whether she held herself out to be a "free-spirited" person, are simply not traits of character or behaviors relevant to the determination of any charge or defense at issue. See NRS 48.015 ("relevant evidence' means evidence having any tendency to make the existence of any fact that is of consequence to the determination of the action more or less probable than it would be without the evidence"); NRS 48.025(2) ("Evidence which is not relevant is not admissible"). Whether Echo drank or smoked or purchased tattoos, for example, does not excuse her killing, nor reduce the crime of murder to manslaughter.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> The use of these photographs are also problematic on hearsay grounds. The defendant offered these statements in his opening as adoptive admissions, urging the jury to use this photographs to believe that Echo White was in fact "free-spirited" and loved "shoes, booze, and boys with tattoos." <u>See</u> 51.045 (defining "statement"). Regardless of the relevancy of the statements, no hearsay exception or exclusion allows for their admission.

Similarly, whether Joseph Averman is a "cheated" on his first wife is irrelevant to the defendant's killing of Echo White, as this trait of character is not evidence of the defendant's criminality, does not negate any element of the offenses charged, and does not excuse any of the offenses.

Additionally, even if the defendant were to proffer some relevant purpose for the admissibility of these traits of character, the probative value of the character evidence would be substantially outweighed by the danger of unfair prejudice or confusion of the issues, and therefore should be excluded. NRS 48.035(1). As the Court is aware, in addition to touching upon Echo White's character, the defendant portrayed his own character positively by, for example, calling himself a "family man," "happily married for years," who did "everything he could to keep his family together" after he was "betrayed" by Joe Averman. (See Exhibits 4 and 5, attached hereto). The obvious danger of this competing character evidence is that the jury will render a verdict based upon the alleged (positive) traits of character of the defendant in contrast to the alleged (poor) traits of character of the victim, rather than actual evidence of the defendant's innocent or guilt. —

Finally, even if relevant, "evidence of character or a trait of character of a person...

may be made by testimony as to reputation or in the form of an opinion." NRS 48.055
(emphasis added). Thus, photographs on the victim's phone declaring "I love shoes, booze,
and boys with tattoos," or "some girls are just born with glitter in their veins," or "freespirited," constitute inadmissible physical evidence tending to show a trait of character, rather
than opinion or reputation testimony. Similarly, evidence that Joseph had cheated on first wife
is a specific instance of conduct not permitted by NRS 48.055, as it also is not opinion or
character evidence.

For these reasons, the State requests that the Court prohibit the introduction of any irrelevant character evidence, testimonial or otherwise.

The homicide detectives that were at the scene, was 15 16 that Travis Ivie, Tate Sanborn, Chris O'Brien and a Sergeant 17 Scott? 18 Α Yes. 19 When you arrived on scene, did you receive some sort of briefing as to what had occurred at that address? 20 21 Yes. Whenever we get there we do basically a crime scene brief. They give us the info that they have at the 22 time (indiscernible). 23 24 And what is the purpose of that briefing? 25 It's to give me as much information as they can so

I can basically start my investigation. 1 2 When you go to the scene with other crime scene analysts, do you all divvy up your tasks? 3 4 Α Yes, we do. In this case was that done? 5 А Yes. 6 7 And were your actual responsibilities at that scene? Mine was documentation. I took notes and 8 photography. I wrote the report. And then I did a final 10 crime scene diagram. And what did CSA Reiner do? 11 12 She collected evidence and did a rough crime scene 13 sketch. 14 0 Were you present when she sealed all of the evidence that she collected at the scene? 15 16 When she sealed it, no. 17 Okay. You were present when she collected it? 18 Yes. А 19 And how did she collect it? We put them in different paper bags and then she 20 21 kind of closes it up and then she'll transport it back to the lab where she will put the crime scene tape onto it for the 22 23 permanent seal. 24 And what is the purpose of that tape? 25 To make sure that you can tell if anybody else goes

into a package or not. It's special tape where if it's ripped 1 or damaged or someone tries to tamper with it at all you can 2 tell right away. 3 Do any identifying marks get placed on top of that 4 5 tape? Yes. It would be a P number and a date when it was 6 7 sealed and then by the person who sealed it. Does it also include the first initial of the first 8 name and the last -- or the first initial of the last name? 9 Yes. 10 А So it's first initial of first name, P number, first 11 initial of last name? 12 13 Α Yes. 14 And that's placed on the red tape that you all use to package evidence? 15 16 Yes, on each package. 17 And then once the evidence is sealed, what's done with it? 18 19 We put it into the vault and then if somebody else looks at it later then they can open it, but then they again 20 21 would reseal it and put their P number and initials on it. Does Metro use another color of tape to represent 22 that an analyst has examined evidence? 23 24 I believe the forensic lab uses blue tape. 25 Q And they do the same thing when they reseal it,

correct, as far as placing their first initial, P number, first initial of last name?

A Yes.

Q When you process a scene such as the scene at 325
Altamira, do you take -- in addition to the crime scene tape,
are any other precautions taken to make sure that evidence is
properly preserved?

A Uh --

Q Meaning, do you wear anything significant on your hands?

A Oh, yes. We use PPE, which is personal protective equipment. So in this case we'd use sterile gloves that we have.

Q Okay. You mentioned that your assignment at this scene was to photograph and document evidence?

A Yes.

Q Do you start from the outside or the inside?

A I always start on the outside and kind of work my way in.

Q Do you do an initial walk-through or do you immediately start documenting stuff that you find?

A It depends on the scene. Like if we don't have a search warrant, then I'll do everything on the outside first, and then once we get a warrant then I'll go inside. But other than that, usually it's, yeah, you'll get an initial walk-

through so you kind of know where everything is. I'll take 1 notes on everything and then I step back and then I take my 2 pictures. 3 4 In this case did you do an initial walk-through or did you immediately start documenting? 5 I started documenting on the outside first. Yes. 6 7 In addition to documenting the scene, were you ultimately responsible for preparing a crime scene diagram in 9 this case? 10 Α Yes. MS. MERCER: Court's indulgence. 11 BY MS. MERCER: 12 13 What is a crime scene diagram? 14 It's basically we take measurements of -- in this case the residence. You do just a rough sketch on the scene 15 16 and then you take it back and you -- we do a computer copy. 17 And it's just a representative way of showing what the scene actually looked like. 18 19 And does it also depict where certain items of evidence were recovered from? 20 21 А Yes. MS. MERCER: Your Honor, permission to publish? 22 23 THE COURT: You may. What's the number? 24 MS. MERCER: Ms. Kruse, I'm publishing State's

Exhibit 25.

1 THE COURT: Thank you. 2 BY MS. MERCER: 3 Do you recognize this exhibit? 4 Yes, I do. 5 And is this the crime scene diagram that you prepared in this case? 6 Α Yes. State's Exhibit 26 depict your neighbor's house at 325 1 Altamira? 2 3 Α Yes. 4 Now, was your house, 409, on the same side of the street as this house? 5 Yes, on the same. 6 А 7 And was it located to the south of this house? 8 My house would be to the south, this house would be 9 to the north. 10 All right, thank you. How many houses are between your house and this house in Exhibit 26? 11 12 Two more. Α 13 Do you remember what you were doing between 11:30 14 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. on July 27th, 2012? Yes. I was working on my front yard in front of my 15 16 house. 17 And at some point after twelve o'clock, did the police come to 325 Altamira? 18 19 I was outside my front home on the street. And did the police come to 325 Altamira? 20 Yes. 21 Α And while they were there, did you go and speak to 22 one of the police officers that was present? 23 24 Α Yes. 25 Why did you go and approach one of those police

officers?

A Because when I saw the police arriving at that home from both sides, from south and north, I thought that something bad was going on. I saw a man. He came out and he was talking. And then he went back into the home, and he got into a vehicle.

Q So we're not going to confuse the jurors here, I'm going to ask you a little bit more about what you saw. Did you go to that police officer because you believed you had some important information to share?

A Yes.

Q I know it's almost three years later, but I want to ask about what you remember about that man. Can you tell me, when is the first time -- or where was that man standing when you first noticed him?

A He was walking on the street towards this home.

Q Towards the home that's in Exhibit 26?

A Yes.

Q Was he walking south to north?

A South to north.

Q And the major road that's south of Altamira, is that Alta?

You want me 13 14 to make a mark? 15 THE COURT: Could you make a mark, sir, where you 16 saw it? 17 THE WITNESS: He crossed from here to here and I lost him. 18 19 BY MR. ROGAN: Q Okay. So you actually did not see him physically 20 enter the house? 21 22 No. The last point you saw him, he was walking on the 23 24 driveway of the house? 25 A Yes. Yes.
