DEFENDANT CHILES: All right. And the factual basis, what would the State be able to prove if this case went to trial?

Did willfully or unlawfully and feloniously, after the commission of a murder, which is a felony, conceal and/or destroy and/or aided in the destruction or concealment video surveillance and/or DVRs and/or recordings, which are material evidence, with the intent that defendant, Javar Eris Ketchum, might avoid or escape arrest, trial, conviction and/or punishment, having knowledge that defendant Javar Eris Ketchum had committed the murder of Ezekiel Davis and/or was liable to arrest therefore. (Inside the presence of the jury)

THE COURT: All right. You may be seated. Back on the record. We're back in the presence of the jury and members of the panel are present, counsel for both sides are present, defendants are present. State, you may make your opening statement.

(Opening Statements not transcribed)

THE COURT: We're going to take a short recess, about ten minutes. So if the jury will step out, please.

THE MARSHAL: Rise for the jurors.

(Outside the presence of the jury)

THE COURT: All right. Outside the presence of the jury. Counsel, you may make your record.

MR. GIORDANI: Your Honor, there's been extensive pretrial litigation regarding the victim's history. The defense attempted to elicit specific acts committed by the victim in order to show he was violent. That is obviously precluded by law unless for some reason the State opens the door to that evidence.

We litigated this on Friday in front of Judge

Villani. He made a -- I don't know how he could be more

specific that anything with regard to the victim's prior

robberies is not admissible. The only thing the defense can

do when he presents his witnesses, which we understand he was going to, is ask them do you know who Zeke Davis is? In your opinion, is he violent?

He was specifically ordered when I asked the judge to make this record so Your Honor would be aware of it, that he could go no further. What the defense just did is grounds for a mistrial and completely violates the Court's order. I mean, at this point, I hate to waste the Court's time and jury selection for a day-and-a-half, but that's ridiculous. There is no coming -- there's no unringing that bell.

I don't know if the Court has the minutes at this point, but I believe I printed them out and I can pull them up from Friday. I don't know what else to say to that.

THE COURT: All right, thank you.

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: Sure, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Counsel.

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: First of all, Ezekiel Davis, I didn't refer to prior booed acts. What I referred to was his reputation, right? And his reputation is that he does have a reputation for sticking people up at gunpoint. At the appropriate time, if I'm really going to get into those prior bad acts, which I don't want to forecast my entire defense to the State, but if Mr. Ketchum takes the stand and says something, well, then that's all going to come in.

But right now I referred to reputation. And he

does have a reputation for sticking people up at the gunpoint.

MR. ROSE: And Judge, here's the issue with this, is you can't simply get around the prohibition on bringing in specific acts of the victim unless they're known to the defendant by simply saying, well, he was a reputation for doing these specific acts.

What the case law says is a reputation for violence. And what Judge Villani's ruling, specific ruling on Friday was, is that you could ask about if the person had a reputation or an opinion that Mr. Davis was violent. He was told specifically that he could not go farther than that. He could not get into any of these specific acts.

And with regard to the argument that's been made more than once in front of Judge Villani that, you know, he doesn't have to forecast everything, Petrocelli applies to everybody. 48.045 applies to everybody. And in fact,

Mitchell v. State indicated that -- it involved a scenario where the Court, in fact, held a Petrocelli hearing prior to the defense in that case bringing in other bad acts of one of the witnesses.

This is not something that you can simply get around by saying well, I don't want to show you that beforehand. If we're going to have some kind of proof that the defendant knew about these specific acts, I think we

should have that hearing beforehand, before it's brought up here, which is why we filed the motion in limine. We filed the motion in limine specific to address this particular issue where it comes up in opening when it shouldn't, and then you simply unring that bell.

This is exactly why we had this issue litigated on Friday before the trial started.

THE COURT: All right. Reputation evidence with the character of the victim in this type of case is admissible, if you have the proper witnesses. And in order for it to constitute self-defense, your client's going to have to testify he knew or --

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: I understand that.

THE COURT: -- somebody's going to have to provide evidence that he knew what the reputation was.

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: That's correct.

THE COURT: Specific evidence as to the specific bad acts or proving the bad acts is not admissible. You're not going to be able to put the victim on trial to prove that he had prior convictions or had prior incidences of robbing people. It's what his reputation and character was.

So you're stuck with witnesses who can testify they were aware of his reputation. You can have a reputation of being violent, even if you're not.

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: Sure.

THE COURT: It's what people around him knew of his reputation, maybe stories he's read or someone else read, that have no basis in truth, but that's his reputation. So he's going to be allowed to put on that evidence. Be careful how you argue it on opening statements, though.

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: Okay.

MR. GIORDANI: And I would just add for -- seek the Court for clarification. There's a difference between a reputation for violence and getting into specific acts of robbery, which I believe he just did, unless I misheard.

THE COURT: That's where I'm cautioning him.

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: Okay.

THE COURT: All right? So be careful what you state in opening statement if you don't have the evidence to support it, and no, you will not be able to prove specific prior bad acts, only reputation and character.

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: At this stage, you're correct, Your Honor.

THE COURT: All right, thank you.

MR. GIORDANI: And can we move to strike that portion of what defense counsel said?

THE COURT: I think it would just emphasize it in the minds of the jury at this point so let's just go from there. All right.

- 9 A Responding to calls for service, proactive stops
 10 patrol -- car stops, people stops, investigative follow-up,
 11 things of that nature.
- Q And so were you working with Metro on September 25th, 2016?
- 14 A Yes.

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- 15 Q And in the early hours of that morning -- actually, 16 let me ask you this first, what shift do you work?
- 17 A Graveyard.
- 18 Q And what hours is that?
- 19 A 10:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m.
- 20 Q Now, in the early morning hours of September 25th, 21 2016, did you have reason to respond 4230 South Decatur?
- 22 A Yes.
- Q And is that particular place located here in Clark
- 24 | County, Nevada?
- 25 A Yes.

Q In fact, do you have any reason within your line of work to go outside of Clark County, Nevada when you're on patrol?

A No.

Q What brought you to 4230 South Decatur?

A I was working in -- my area command is enterprise area command. We received a call for service reference somebody who had been shot. The call originally, I believe, came out just at the corner of Flamingo and Decatur. I wasn't too far away. I believe, I was at Tropicana and Decatur at the time. And I rode north on Decatur, looked around for the scene, which was initially hard to find in that intersection. But I eventually found it at southeast corner of Flamingo and Decatur.

Q And when you arrived at the scene, can you describe for the ladies and gentlemen of the jury what it was that you first saw when you got there?

A What I first saw was a crowd gathering around in front of a strip of businesses in the southeast corner, one of them being a clothing store. And there was maybe nine or ten people. When I pulled into the parking lot heading south into the parking lot, there was one black male laying on the ground, and another black male giving him chest compressions, CPR. There was a white female and who seemed to have known the person on the ground because she was approaching me.

Also, my partner, Officer Torres, we arrived on scene about the same time, and there was a crowd gathering around and slowly dispersing, I should say, as we were approaching.

- Q Okay. I'll want to stop you right there. We're going to go through some of the things you've just mentioned. You said that there was a black adult lying on the ground; is that correct?
 - A Yes.

- Q Was there anything distinctive about this particular individual?
- A He -- his pants weren't on. It looked like they had been ripped off. There was a lot of various personal items on the ground. He was laying on his back near a parked white vehicle, sedan vehicle.
- Q Now, with this particular individual, you said his pants were off and there were some items around him on the ground. Was this the person who was receiving CPR or chest compressions?
 - A Yes.
- Q And at that point in time, could you observe any visible injuries to him?
- A Well, this being a 415A call, assault battery with a gun call, I looked for signs of a gunshot wound. There was not blood, but some type of fluid coming from on his stomach.

There was a small wound on his, I believe, maybe upper -- I'm not too sure -- I believe upper stomach, and so recognized that.

Q Now, was it your primary responsibility to deal with this particular individual on the ground or were you trying to do something else at the time?

A I was more concerned with the possibility that there might be someone with a gun walking around because the time lapse between the call being broadcasted and us arriving is relatively short. So because there was somebody already administering first aid and because my partner was already -- Officer Torres was already communicating with people at the scene, I was only at the scene for maybe two minutes before a sergeant arrived and had pointed out and requested me to go talk to two other people who were walking away. They were headed northbound through the parking lot.

- Q Okay. Now, you said that one of your main concerns was that somebody might be on scene with a gun; is that correct?
- A Yes.

- 21 Q Did you ever find anybody on scene with a gun?
- 22 A No.
 - Q Did you ever -- other than, obviously, you know, the firearms that Metro has, did you see any other guns at the scene?

- A No, I did not.
- Q So let me ask you this, you said that it is the concern for the people with the gun, you were kind of focused on everybody else at the scene; is that correct?
 - A Yes.
- Q Beyond your initial observations of the individual lying on the ground, did you have any other contact with that person?
 - A With the person on the ground?
- 10 Q Correct.
- 11 A No.

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- Q When you arrived, could you tell if that person was alive or dead?
- 14 A I remember thinking that they were still conscious.
- 15 Q And are you a medical doctor?
- 16 A No.
- 17 Q Do you have any medical training?
- 18 A No.
- 20 person is dead?
- 21 A No.
- Q So what did you see that made you think that he was still conscious at that point?
- A I believe, his eyes were still open, and I couldn't 25 -- as far as words that he may or may not -- I don't know if

he was speaking. It was close eight months ago, but I remember his eyes still being open. That's pretty distinct.

Q So after you go, you're talking to some of the other people who were at the scene, what was the remainder of your involvement with this particular crime scene?

A I was maybe a hundred yards north, communicating with those two other people that were stopped, a Hispanic male and I believe a Hispanic female. Because when the cops show up and two people start walking away, maybe it's a good time to talk to them. And just pretty much gathering their personal -- you know, their name and their recollection of what happened or why they're in the area, which I did do, for maybe 40, 45 minutes before a detective came over. I believe, a detective came over and spoke to them. And then I went back to the scene to help keep crime scene preservation, and I debriefed my partner, who was then going to brief homicide detectives upon their arrival.

- Q At some point, did you end up leaving the scene?
- 19 A Yes.

- Q Now, you've mentioned your partner Officer Torres a couple of times. Do the two of you ride in the same car?
 - A No.
- Q Okay. So although, she was your partner that morning, you two are not necessarily in the same car together?

No, she's -- she was, at the time, I believe, on 1 Α 2 another squad. We have two squads that work in the area. 3 She was on the other squad. We don't have assigned partners 4 like some departments might where you're always with the same 5 But generally, you're never going to go on a call 6 without someone. So they'd be your partner for that time. 7 So when you left the scene, was she still present? 8 Α Yes. 9 She didn't leave with you?  - Q And what kind of businesses are we talking about?
 - A I wasn't sure at the time. They just looked like small offices that were leased out for whatever reason.
 - Q Okay. And when you pulled into that particular business, are you in the front of the business or the back?
 - A The front.
 - Q And are you in the parking lot?
- 25 A Yes.

Q Could you describe the parking lot for us? Is it empty? Are there people there? And what's happening when you first arrive?

A When I arrived, I arrived heading south in the parking lot and the building that everybody was in front of was the furthest one on the -- in the complex. It was on the corner. And there was a few cars in the parking lot, but there was people in the parking lot. There was a man on the floor that needed help and then there was a couple people standing around his body.

Q Okay. And then you said there was a man on the floor who needed help. Could you describe for us in a little bit more detail what you mean by that?

A It appeared that he was shot. He was laying there. It was a black male adult. Another man was giving him CPR. There was a girl standing above him. There wasn't blood around him, but he didn't have any pants on. He just had like boxers on and a T-shirt, and he was -- I couldn't tell if he was dead or alive.

Q Okay. Let me ask you this. You said that he didn't have any pants on. Was there anybody else there who, for lack of a better term, was pantless?

A No.

Q Was there anybody else there who was in a similar state of undress?

A No.

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- Q Did you see pants not on any particular individual elsewhere in the parking lot?
 - A I can't remember.

 - A I told somebody at one point not to leave.
- Q Were there any attempts by anybody to leave the scene in their vehicles?

              And how long have you been with Metro?

              I've been with Metro approximately 13-and-a-half
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years, and I've been in the crime scene unit about eight-anda-half of those years.

- Q Now, you said that you're a crime scene analyst.

 Did you have any special education or training or experience which allows you to be a CSA?
- A Yes, I have a bachelor's of science degree in criminal justice. I've also completed ten weeks crime scene analyst academy and 12 weeks of field training with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. And I've also completed over 800 hours in training related to crime scene investigation. And we receive training annually.
- Q And all that training, is that through Metro, outside agencies or some mixture of both?
- 14 A Both.

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- Q Okay. Now, you said that you've been a CSA for, what, eight-and-a-half years, did you say?
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 Q Okay. Have you ever seen the show CSI?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Do you like the show?
- 21 A Yeah.
- Q Well, let me ask you this. How accurate is CSI, the show, compared to what you do?
- 24 A Not very.
- MR. WOOLDRIDGE: Objection. Relevancy, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Overruled. You may proceed you. You may answer.

THE WITNESS: Not very accurate.

BY MR. ROSE:

- Q And what makes you say that? Kind of what -- if there were just a few kind of glaring differences between that and real life?
- A Well, one, we don't necessarily solve a crime within an hour. When we fingerprint process, it's actually a whole process. We have a whole latent print detail, so we'll process on scene, we'll submit the prints and it has to go over to the latent detail. Same thing with any sort of type of evidence that might have maybe some sort of biological material on it. We actually have a DNA forensic lab that will do the analysis on those items.
- Q Now, you mentioned you have a fingerprint detail and a biological detail. What are some of your responsibilities as a CSA? Do you specialize in any particular area?
- A Just in general as far as crime scene investigations, packaging, making sure all the evidence is packaged correctly before it gets over to those sections.
 - Q So are you usually in the field or in the lab?
- 24 A The field.
- Q Or some of both?

A Oh, well, a mixture of both. Mostly in the field, but in order to finish the evidence then we'll need to be back at the lab.

- Q Okay. So were you working as a CSA with Metro on September 25th, 2016?
 - A Yes.

- Q And at that point in time, do you have reason to respond to UMC trauma?
 - A Yes.
 - Q And what was it that brought you to UMC trauma?
- A There was a death investigation.
- Q And when you got there, could you describe for us what you saw and what you did?
- A When I got there, I met with the detective. It was actually a homicide detective. And then we waited for the coroner investigator to arrive. So once the coroner investigator arrived, we were able to take a look at the decedent inside the -- it's called negative pressure isolation room at UMC. It's actually a room kind of set off to the side for deceased individuals.
- Q And are they -- you said it's a negative pressure room. What is that, do you know?
- A I don't actually. I just know it's a separate room for deceased individuals. It's a very quiet kind of secluded area.

Okay. So in your experience, the only time that 1 0 2 particular room is used is when you have a decedent in the 3 room? Yes. 5 And what was your role when you arrived at UMC 6 trauma and went into this room set aside from decedents? 7 To photograph the decedent and collect any possible Α 8 evidence that may be present. And you said that you from a photographed the decedent. Was that with your cell phone or a camera, you 10 11 know, how did you do that? 12 A Department issued camera. 13 Q And you mentioned that you had, you know, field training, 800 hours, I think you said. 14 Um-h'm. 15 Α Does that include training in photography? 16 17 Yes. 18 And when you finished with your photography, what 19 did you do with the photos themselves? 20 The photos we actually put into an envelope and Α 21 then we take it back to our lab section, we log it, drop it, 22 and somebody from the photo lab will come over, grab the card

And was this how you found the decedent when you 14 0 arrived? 15 He was actually covered with like a blue 16 Α No. 17 cover. 18 And do you remember who it was who removed that blue cover? 19 20 The coroner investigator. 21 And was that in order to allow you to take 22 photographs and examine the body? 23 Α Yes. 24 Now, do you see anything of significance to you in 25 this particular photo?

- A Yes, I do.
 - Q Now, have you ever seen Monday night football?
- A Yes.

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- Q Are you a football fan? Have you seen where they kind of draw on the screen and you can see it at home?
 - A Yes.
- Q Well, you can actually do that on this screen as well. So if you wouldn't mind just kind of using your finger to trace whatever it is that you saw of significance to you. (Witness complying). And could you tell us what it is in that particular area that was of significance to you.
 - A There's actually injury to the left abdomen area.
- 13 Q Is that the area that you were trying to circle?
- 14 A Yes.
 - Q Okay. Sometimes the machines aren't quite as precise as we would like. Was this the only picture that you took of the decedent at that point in time?
 - A No.
 - Q I'm going to show you what's been admitted as State's Exhibit 142. Can you tell us what it is that we're looking at in this particular photo.
 - A An injury to the right cheek.
- Q And in this particular photo, can you see any other injuries, do you remember?
- 25 A Oh, yes. There's a injury behind the right ear.

- Q Is that why you took this particular photo?
- A Yes.

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- Q And briefly, can you tell in this particular photo whether or not he has any earrings in?
 - A It does not appear that he is wearing an earring.
- Q Okay. Showing you Exhibit 143. Do you remember taking this particular photograph?
 - A Yes.
 - Q Is this of that same individual?
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q And in this particular photo, can you see the wound 12 that we saw previously to the right side of the face?
- 13 A No.
- Q Can you see any visible injuries in this particular photograph?
- 16 A No.
- Q Now, do you see a earring in this particular photograph?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Showing you 144. You recognize this photograph?
- 21 A Yes.
- Q And is there anything in here that is of particular significance to you?
- A A little bit closer photo of the injury to the abdomen.

- Q Now, would you agree with me that there are two visible injuries in this particular photo?
 - A Yes. The left side of his chest has sutures.
- Q Okay. And if wouldn't you mind, and this might be obvious, but if you wouldn't mind just kind of circling the area that you're talking about with the sutures. (Witness complying).

Now, are you a medical doctor?

- A No.
- Q Have you had the opportunity through your training and experience with Metro as a CSA to view other decedents.
- A Yes.

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- Q And have you ever seen what you would describe as medical intervention before?
- A Yes.
- Q Just based on, you know, what you've seen in the past and what you're looking at here, does this appear to at least be consistent with medical intervention?
- 19 A Yes.
 - Q So what, if anything, in this particular photograph primarily drew your attention?
 - A The injury to the abdomen.
- Q That would be the lower injury towards the bottom of the picture that we're looking at?
- 25 A Yes.

- Q Would that be the injury that you documented in 2 145?
- 3 A Yes.

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- Q And looking at that particular injury, have you had the opportunity to see gunshot wounds before?
- A Yes.
 - Q Have you had the opportunity to photograph gunshot wounds before?
 - A Yes.
- Q And again, just without saying, you know, whether or not it actually is, does this appear to be at least consistent with a gunshot wound?
- 13 A Yes, it does.
- Q What did you do when you saw the decedent on the table and you saw this particular wound?
- 16 A I documented it as-is and then I took a photo of it
 17 with a scale.
- 18 Q And what's the purpose of taking it with a scale?
- 19 A To get an approximate size.
- Q And is that what we're looking at in Exhibit 146?
- 21 A Yes.
- Q Is that the same wound that we saw in 145, just this time, as the scale?
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q Now, we saw a number of photographs of Mr. Davis's

chest. Did you take photographs of any other parts of his body?

A Yes.

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- Q And do you remember what parts of the body you took photographs of?
- A He also had an injury on the right side of the torso and again, the right cheek and behind the right ear.
- Q And were your photographs limited to the torso and head?
- A No.
- Q What is it that you're looking for what you're decided to document various parts of a decedent's body?
- A Again, if there's any sort of injuries present on the individual. Depending on the scene and the information I get from the detectives, whether we need to collect any certain other evidence, transient evidence.
- Q Are there times that you would take a picture of something that does not show an injury?
- A Yes.
- Q And why would you do that?
 - A Again, just the whole documentation of the individual.
 - Q Showing Exhibit 147. Can you tell us what it is we're looking at in this particular photograph?
 - A That is the decedent's left hand.

- Q And what was your purpose in taking this particular photograph, if you remember?
 - A Just overall condition of the hand.
- Q So were there any knowable injuries that drew you to the hand?
- A No.

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- Q And in fact, looking at this, can you point out for us any visual injuries that you can see on his hand?
 - A No.
- 10 Q Showing you 148, can you tell us what that appears 11 to be?
- 12 A The left hand.

- Q Can you describe that education?
- A I'm a doctor. I completed medical school. I then completed residency in pathology and I'm a board certified anatomic pathologist. After that I completed a fellowship in forensic pathology and I'm a board certified forensic pathologist.
- Q Do you do ongoing or since you came to the Clark County Coroner's Office, did you receive any training or anything of that nature?
 - A No, I've been working full time.
- Q Okay. So you came in as a full-time, and since 2015, you've been doing autopsies?
- 16 A Yes.
- Q What is an autopsy?
 - A An autopsy consists of an external examination of a dead body. So I look at them, document hair color, length, eye color, injuries, scars and then an internal examination, which is where you open the body up and look at the organs, looking for natural disease, any injuries to determine cause and manner of death.
 - Q Did you perform an autopsy on a person by the name of Ezekiel Davis on September 26th of last year?

A I did.

- O And describe when and where that was conducted.
- A That was conducted at the office of the Clark County coroner that morning --
 - Q Okay.
 - A -- on the 26th.
 - Q Who was present during the autopsy?
- A Detectives from Las Vegas Police Department, myself and my technician.
- Q Okay. You described earlier a little bit an external examination and then an internal examination; is that accurate?
- 13 A Yes.
 - Q I want you to go through your external examination and any findings related thereto as it relates to Ezekiel Davis.
 - A On his external examination there was a gunshot wound of the left side of his abdomen. He also had some other injuries, including a bruise with some skin tearing on his right cheek. Some skin tearing behind his right ear and a small abrasion on the right side of his back.

I'm going to show you Exhibit 116. 21 that appear to be a Metro photograph? 22 Α Yes. 23 0 How would you know that? 24 There's no identification card with our coroner's 25 identification number in it.

- Q Okay. As a typical process in the coroner's office, would you have a little identification tag, essentially, in the frame of each photograph?
 - A Yes. Unless it's a close-up of an injury.
- Q Okay. But do you recall the injury here to Mr. Ezekiel Davis?
- A Yes. This is the area of bruising on his cheek with the associated area of skin tearing.
- Q Okay. It's got a little glare to it, so let me zoom in here. And, ma'am, you've testified before, you know you can write on that screen up there?
- 12 A Yes.

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- Q Describe that again, please, and just point to -14 you know, put a dot on what you're talking about.
- A All right. So there's bruising in this area, and then there's skin tearing in this area.
- Q Was there an associated injury to Mr. Davis on that side of his head behind his ear?
 - A Yes.
- Q Was that -- can you describe that injury?
- 21 A It's a laceration or a skin tear.
- Q All right. I'll move this photograph a little bit.
- 23 Can you see this skin tear that you're describing?
- 24 A Yes. It's right here. It's a little --
- Q I want to show you Exhibit No. 121. Let me zoom

out. Are we looking at the left side of Mr. Davis's abdomen?

A We are.

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- Q Appear to be some medical intervention that was performed up on the right here?
 - A Yes. He had thoracotomy incision.
- Q Okay. Just real basically, what is a thoracotomy incision?
- A They opened his chest and massaged his heart in order to try to bring him back.
- Q Underneath that is when we're -- I guess, in proximity to that, it would be in the left in the photo.
- 12 What are we looking at there?
- 13 A This is an entrance gunshot wound.
- Q Before I move on to internal injuries, I want to
 ask you were there any other injuries on the person of
 Ezekiel Davis that were acute as in recent?
- 17 A No.
- 18 Q No injuries whatsoever that were acute or recent on 19 Mr. Davis?
- 20 A None other than the ones we've just spoken about.
- 21 Q Showing you Exhibit No. 117, 117. What are we 22 looking at here?
- A This is the projectile, the bullet we removed from Mr. Davis.
- Q Okay. I want you to please describe your internal

examination of Mr. Davis.

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A On the internal examination, there was over a liter of blood in Mr. Davis's abdomen. There was injury to his large and small bowel. There was injury to his bladder, and there was a perforating wound through his aorta and his abdomen.

- Q And did you determine a cause and manner of death in this particular case?
 - A I did.
- 10 Q And what were your findings there?
- A Gunshot wound of abdomen, homicide.
- Q Okay. Gunshot wound of abdomen, is that the cause of death?
- 14 A It's the cause of death, yes.
- 15 O And the manner of death?
- 16 A Homicide.
 - Q Okay. Did you take samples from Mr. Davis's blood and/or body and seek toxicology examination on those results?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Q And do you, yourself, conduct a toxicology exam or 21 is that sent out to another lab?
- 22 A That's sent out.
- Q In this particular case, are you familiar with the lab results?
- 25 A Yes.

- Q And were there elicit substances in Mr. Davis's body?

 A There were.
- A He had methamphetamine and amphetamine, which is the metabolite, as well as marijuana and there are metabolites and the non-elicit substance would be alcohol.
- Q Do you recall, as you sit there, the levels of those substances in his body?
- 10 A Yes.

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Q Can you list them for the jury?

Can you list them?

- A The methamphetamine was at 110 nanograms per
 milliliter. Amphetamine was 36 nanograms were milliliter.

 His alcohol, his blood alcohol level was 0.014. And I don't
 recall the marijuana metabolites offhand.
- Q Okay. So he had, I believe, it's three or is it four different substances?
- 18 A Three.
 - Q Three. Okay. And how many autopsies could you estimate that you conducted on murder victims?
- 21 A Hundreds.
- Q Have you seen similar results in other cases with regard to toxicology?
- 24 MR. ARNOLD: Objection.
- MR. WOOLDRIDGE: Objection.

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              MR. ARNOLD: Relevance.
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              MR. GIORDANI: I'll get to the relevance.
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    Certainly not speculation.
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              THE COURT: I'll allow the question. Go ahead.

              THE WITNESS: As in similar substances?
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    BY MR. GIORDANI:

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              Would Mr. Davis's levels when it comes to
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    methamphetamine in any way shock or surprise you?

              Have you seen levels much higher than what
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    Mr. Davis has?
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         Α
              Definitely.
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              And of course, you've probably seen people with no
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    methamphetamine in their system, I would assume?
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         Α
              Yes.
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              Were there any personal effects on Mr. Davis's
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    person when you conducted your autopsy or beforehand, I
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    quess?
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         Α
              Beforehand, yes.
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              What were they?
         Q
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              As far as clothing, he had a green Polo shirt and a
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sock and he also had a earring, I believe, in his left ear --1 2 Okay. -- and a yellow metallic bracelet around the right 3 4 wrist. 5 MR. GIORDANI: I have no further questions. I'll 6 pass the witness. 7 THE COURT: All right, thank you. 8 MR. WOOLDRIDGE: Bear with me a moment, Your Honor. 9 CROSS-EXAMINATION 10 BY MR. WOOLDRIDGE: 11 So one of the things I was a little -- are you 12 saying that most people that are shot are high on meth? Is 13 that what you were saying? I'm saying that a lot of our homicide victims have 14 Α 15 methamphetamine on board. 16 So a lot of people that are shot are high on 17 methamphetamine? 18 Not just shot, but yes. Or killed, you're saying? 19 20 Yes. Α 21 So is that -- that's just something that a lot of 22 times that people that come through these -- that you do 23 these autopsies with are always high on meth or --24 Not always, no. 25 -- the majority of them are high on meth? Q

- A I can't give you a exact number.
- Q You testified to something earlier about you've done lots of these cases and lots of them are high on meth.

 Did I understand your testimony wrong?
- A No. I said I've done lots of these cases and there are some people who are high on meth.
 - Q Okay. So only some are high on meth?
- A I can't say if it's majority or -- I'd have to go back and do research and tell you the numbers.
- Q Okay. One of the things that you did -- you did do an autopsy report in this case, though, right?
- 12 A I did.

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- Q All right. And I think one of the things that you noted you have like basically, three Roman numerals in the beginning of your report. Do you remember that, putting those three --
- 17 A May look?
- 18 Q Sure, of course.
- 19 A Yes.
- Q And you put gunshot wound to abdomen,
- 21 methamphetamine intoxication --
 - A Yes.
- 23 Q -- and no significant natural disease?
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q So it was your medical conclusion that he was

- 1 intoxicated on methamphetamine, right? 2 Yes, on some level. You also -- on direct you indicated that you had 3 4 completed an external examination for scars, right? 5 Yes. Α 6 MR. GIORDANI: Objection. Relevance. I asked were 7 there any other acute injuries and she said no. MR. WOOLDRIDGE: It was -- the door was opened, 8 Your Honor. THE COURT: Counsel, you had directions from the 10 11 Court. The objection's sustained. 12 MR. WOOLDRIDGE: Okay. 13 BY MR. WOOLDRIDGE: You indicated that you ruled this to be a homicide, 14 Q 15 right? 16 Yes. Α 17 And a homicide is not necessarily a murder; isn't 18 that right?
 - A Correct.
- 20 MR. GIORDANI: Objection. That's outside the
- 21 scope.

- 22 THE COURT: Overruled.
- 23 BY MR. WOOLDRIDGE:
- 24 0 Is that correct?
- 25 A Yes.

And you were not there when Zeke Davis was shot? 1 2 No. Α And you have no personal knowledge as to what led 3 0 4 to the shooting? 5 No. Α MR. WOOLDRIDGE: No further questions. Actually, 6 7 one more question. 8 BY MR. WOOLDRIDGE: The bullet, the bullet to the abdomen, the way that that -- the way that's displayed, that indicates that it's a 10 11 close-range shooting; is that correct? 12 Α No. 13 Q Okay. MR. WOOLDRIDGE: No further questions. 14 THE COURT: Mr. Arnold. 15 MR. ARNOLD: No questions for this witness, Your 16 17 Honor. THE COURT: 18 Thank you. Any further questions from State? 19 20 MR. GIORDANI: No, Your Honor. Thank you. 21 right, thank you. Any from the jury? All right, thank you. 22 You may step down. 23 THE WITNESS: Thank you. 24 MR. GIORDANI: You may be excused. 25 THE COURT: You may call your next witness.

MR. ROSE: State would call CSA Szukiewicz. 1 JOSEPH SZUKIEWICZ, STATE'S WITNESS, SWORN 2 Please be seated. Please state and 3 THE CLERK: 4 spell your name for the court's record. 5 THE WITNESS: Joseph Szukiewicz, 6 S-z-u-k-i-e-w-i-c-z. 7 MR. ROSE: May I proceed, Your Honor? 8 THE COURT: You may. 9 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. ROSE: 10 11 Sir, how are you employed? 12 I'm a senior crime scene analyst with the Las Vegas Α 13 Metropolitan Police Department. And how long have you been with Metro? 14 Q For 20 years. 15 Α 16 And do you have any kind of special training or 17 experience that helps you to be a CSA? 18 I have a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from UNLV. I have a certification through the International 19 Association For Identification For Crime Scene 20 21 Investigations, and I've taken numerous classes, workshops 22 and seminars relating to crime scene investigation, 23 bloodstain evidence, homicide and death investigations. 24 And that's all in addition to 20 years of practical 25 experience doing the job?

- A Yes. Over 6,000 calls.
- Q So it might be an obvious question, but were you working as a CSA with Metro on September 25th, 2016?
 - A Yes.

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- Q And did you have reason to respond to 4230 South Decatur?
 - A Yes, I did.
- Q And what was the nature of the call that brought you out there?
 - A We were responding to a homicide investigation.
- 11 Q And what jobs did you have while out at that 12 particular location?
 - A My job at the scene was to collect and preserve the evidence and to complete a crime scene diagram.
 - Q Now, what is a crime scene diagram?
 - A So what we do is we take a drawing of the crime scene and then we will measure items of evidence as well as buildings and cars into that scene. Then later on the -- the sketch will be made into a computer diagram and that's what we do for that.
- Q Does that take you a long time to create?
- 22 A It does.
- Q Do you remember, approximately, how long you were out at that particular scene?
- 25 A We were out at that scene for approximately, eight

hours.

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MR. ROSE: And Your Honor, at this point in time, I believe there's a stipulation to Exhibits 1 through 127.

MR. WOOLDRIDGE: I have no objection.

THE COURT: All right.

MR. ARNOLD: No objection, Your Honor.

THE COURT: It will be admitted.

(State's Exhibits 1 through 127 admitted)

BY MR. ROSE:

- Q And sir, don't worry I'm not going to walk through all 127 photographs with you. But what I would like to do is to go through some of them with you. And specifically, starting with Exhibit 33. Do you recognize what's shown here?
- A I do. That's the frontage area of the strip mall where the scene was located.
- Q And do you remember where specifically within this strip mall your efforts were focused?
- A Yeah, the focus was where the black vehicle is, all the way down to the third vehicle at the end, and then there was a business in front of that vehicle. That's where we concentrated our -- our investigations to.
- Q And do you remember that particular business being Top Notch Apparel?
- 25 A Yes, I do.

Have you ever been to Top Notch Apparel before? 1 0 No, I have not. 2 Did you have the opportunity to see both outside 3 4 and inside that particular business? 5 Α Yes. Were you able to do that all at once or how long 6 7 did it take you to make your way inside the business? 8 Α No, we did the exterior first, the business was locked, and it took, approximately, three to four hours before we entered the interior of the business. 10 11 And you said that you processed the exterior first. 12 Did you document the things out in the front parking lot 13 area? 14 Α My partner that I was with, Crime Scene 15 Analyst Erin Taylor, she did the note taking and the 16 photography of the scene. So that was documented by her. 17 And while she was doing that, I was collecting the -- or 18 marking evidence as well as completing the diagram. 19 MR. ROSE: Your Honor, at this point in time, State 20 would move to admit by stipulation Exhibit 131. 21 THE COURT: All right, it will be admitted. 22 (State's Exhibit 131 admitted) 23 BY MR. ROSE: 24 Sir, do you recognize this particular document?

Yes, I do.

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- Q And what do you recognize this to be?
- A That's the diagram that I prepared for this case.
- Q Now, you said that you took measurements and then you created this particular diagram.
 - A Yes.

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- Q Is this designed to be to scale?
- A No, it's not to scale. But it's an accurate depiction of the scene.
- Q So does there show the physical relationship between the items located the on scene as you recovered them?
- A Yes.
- Q And this might seem obvious, but is this only of the outside portion of that particular business?
 - A Yes, it is.
- Q And I'd like to show you Exhibit 1, in fact. Can you tell us what we're looking at here?
- A Yes. It's the opposite direction so it's a south view looking north of the parking lot in front of the building.
- Q And the items -- (indecipherable) you can see certain items on the ground in this particular picture?
 - A Yes.
- Q And the items that were there, did you -- are those the items that were -- we see marked on your diagram?
 - A Yes, those are some of them. That's not all of

There are more items that were recovered, but those are the ones that were marked that were small enough to put onto the diagram. We mark those with cones. The other things with clothing and other areas were not put on the diagram.

- Now, you said things like clothing. Do you remember recovering any clothing at the scene?
 - Α Yes, I did.
- And do you remember what kind of clothing you recovered?
- 11 I did or I do.

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- 12 And what was that?
- 13 I recovered a pair of corduroy pants, a pair of shoes and a hat. 14
 - Those corduroy pants, do you remember what color they were?
- 17 I think they were burgundy, if I remember 18 correctly.
- 19 If I can show you Exhibit 4. Are these those pants?
- 21 Yes, they are. Α
 - Is the color slightly off on your screen?
- 23 Α It is. It could also be the photograph, too. 24 way it photographed, but I believe they are burgundy.
- 25 And looking at this particular photograph and from

your own memory, do you remember if those pants were inside out or right side out?

A No, they were inside out.

- Q And Exhibit 5, do you recognize that as also being part of those pants?
- A Yes. It was just the photo of the pocket, a close-up photo.
- Q Now, you said that you also recovered a hat and a number of other items. Did you -- before you recovered those items, did you take any other steps to document where they were located?
- A Yes. They were -- well, they were -- they were photographed and then they were measured into the diagram and they were given placards and numbers for recovery.
- Q Showing you Exhibit 39. Are these the placards that you're talking about?
- 17 A Yes, they are.
 - Q And are these -- why do you use these particular placards?
 - A In this case, these are to mark items of evidence that are fairly small. So it would be difficult to see them if we didn't lay them down so that's the reason we use them. And they're also going to be items that we are going to be recovering as well.
 - Q And looking at the placards here, is each placard

individually numbered?

- A Yes, it is.
- Q Do you have multiple placards of the same number?
- A No.

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- Q Why is that?
- A It would create confusion. So we give one item of evidence for one placard so we know what -- what each item is going to be for the impound.
- Q So if we're looking at your diagram here, does that also have item numbers on it?
- A Yes, and those would correspond with where the placards are on the parking lot pavement.
- Q So if we look at item number 2 behind vehicle number 2, would that correspond to placard number 2?
- 15 A Yes, it is.
 - Q And would that be the hat and the shoes and the other items, which you mentioned in your -- as you were listing off what you recovered?
 - A Right. So this is an overall photograph of that grouping, but the specific item for number 2 would be that gold chain with the lion's head medallion on it.
 - Q And then looking at item number 4 on your diagram also behind vehicle number 2, would that correspond with that particular piece of jewelry?
 - A Yes, it was an earring and it had a bent post to

it.

- Q Do you remember if you found one or more than one earring?
 - A No, we just -- I believe it was just that one.
- Q And you said you noticed that it had a bent post. Did that signify anything to you?
- A It could have been stepped on, it could have been driven over, so it was just a observation, but I don't know how the post got bent.
- Q Now, all of these items that have these placards, did you recover those items?
- 12 A Yes, I did.
 - Q And could you briefly walk us through how it is that you go about recovering particular items of evidence.
 - A So we'll mark the items of evidence. They're going to go into the -- measured into the diagram, they get photographed, and then we pick up each item of evidence individually. They'll be placed in groupings. So I won't pick up jewelry items and mix them with cigarette butts, for instance. So they'll be picked up, placed in the proper containers, and then put into proper bags for collection from the scene for transport to our -- to our lab.
 - Q Now, I want to draw your attention back to your diagram. Do you see vehicle number 1 listed here?
 - A Yes, I do.

- Q I'm zoom in a little bit for you. Do you see an item number 1 also listed?
 - A Yes, I do.

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- Q And could you just kind of point out briefly or quickly where item number 1 is located on this?
- A Yeah, it's -- oh. It's right next to the rear right tire of vehicle number 1. I know I made a mess of that.
- Q Okay. And vehicle number 1, is that what we see depicted in State's 64?
- 11 A Yes, it is.
- Q And you said that particular item, item number 1, was located near the tire --
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q -- on that particular car?
- 16 A Yes.
- Q And in State's 61, are we looking at a slightly closer view of the tire in the area nearby?
- 19 A Yes.
 - Q Looking at State's 62. Could you tell us what it is that we're looking at in this particular photograph?
- A Yeah, that's the photograph of the -- the cartridge case that was item number 1 next to the tire, and it's -- it's pretty much sitting up on the tail end of the cartridge case.

- Q Now, before this photograph was taken, are you aware of whether or not this was manipulated in any way?
 - A I do not know.
- Q Is it policy to go and move something before you photograph it in place?
 - A No, it's not.
- Q So to the best of your knowledge, is this how this particular cartridge casing was actually found at that scene?
 - A Yes.

- Q Now, you refer to it as a cartridge casing. Do you have any training with firearms and ballistics and anything like that?
- 13 A I -- I do.
 - Q Could you just give us a quick description? What's a cartridge casing?
 - A Okay, so explain a cartridge case, I'll explain what a cartridge is. So cartridge is a full round of ammunition and it's the cartridge, which is the metal body part, the primer, the gunpowder and then the bullet. So the bullet would be actually where you see the opening. The bullet would be coming out of that, and then you would have powder and then primer.
 - When a round of ammunition is fired, the cartridge case, if this is a semi-automatic or if it's a revolver, it stays within the cylinder. But on a semi-automatic it ejects

out of the -- it ejects out of the gun and you are left with a cartridge case.

- Q So this is not the complete round itself?
- A It is not.

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- Q From what you see here, can you tell that the bullet itself has already been fired?
 - A The bullet has been fired.
- Q Do you remember recovering any other cartridge casings from this particular scene?
- A No, this was the only one.
- 11 Q Do you remember if any other cartridges were 12 recovered from the scene?
 - A Yes, there was one cartridge recovered from the scene.
- 15 Q And where was that cartridge located?
- 16 A It was located on the rear left passenger
 17 floorboard of vehicle number 3, which was located in front of
 18 suite number F.
 - Q And if I could direct your attention to Exhibit 86.

 Is this a picture of the interior of vehicle number 3?
 - A Yes, it is.
 - Q And if we zoom in on that, do you see the cartridge that you described inside that vehicle?
- A I do. It's located on the floor area between, I believe, those are two coins that are on that -- on that

floor mat or the floor of the vehicle.

2 BY MR. GIORDANI:

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- Q You said that is a full cartridge?
- A Yes, it is.
- Q Do you remember what caliber the cartridge casing that you found was?
 - A The cartridge case was a 9 millimeter.
- Q And the cartridge that you found, that's in a bullet that has not been shot, right?
- A Yes.
- 11 Q That's how you described it?
- 12 A That's correct.
 - Q Do you remember if that was the same caliber or different caliber?
- 15 A No, it was a different caliber.
- 16 Q And do you remember what caliber that was?
- 17 A It was a .380 auto.
- Now, the black car, vehicle number 1, that you -
 that, you know, you said that the cartridge casing, the spent

 round, was right outside of that car, do you remember if

 there were any cartridge casings or cartridges found inside
- 22 vehicle number 1?
- A No, there were not.
- Q Do you remember if there were any guns found inside vehicle number 1?

A No.

- Q What about inside vehicle number 3, where you found the full cartridge, were there any guns found there?
 - A No.
- Q So other than the one spent cartridge casing right outside of vehicle number 1 and the unexpended cartridge inside vehicle number 3, do you recall there being any firearms or firearms related items that were recovered at this location?
 - A No, I do not.
- Q So you had the opportunity to spend quite a while outside the business documenting everything, collecting everything. Did you have the opportunity -- maybe you mentioned it earlier, but did you have the opportunity to enter the building itself?
 - A Yes, I did.
- Q And what, if anything, were you looking for inside that building?
 - A We were looking for anything that would give us information on to what may have happened. We were looking to see if there was possible surveillance. We were looking to see if there was anymore firearms evidence that we can, you know, try to kind of help us. We kind of really didn't know exactly what we had, so we were still in a search mode when we went into the building so -- but still documenting through

notes and photography and then searching for items that we can potentially find.

- Q Now, you said that one of the things that you were looking for was surveillance. Did you locate any surveillance in or around that particular building?
- A Yes. There were -- there were cameras pretty prevalent throughout the interior of the building as well as some on the exterior.
- Q So both inside and outside. Do you remember how many styles of cameras you saw?
- A Not exactly. There were -- there were standard, like infrared type looking camera, you know, surveillance cameras or video cameras.
- Q I'm showing you State's 95. Is that one of the cameras that you're talking about?
 - A Yes, it is.

- Q And from what you see here, from your recollection, was that found inside or outside of the building?
 - A That looks like it's outside of the building.
- Q And in State's 96, do you see any surveillance cameras in this particular photograph?
- A I do. There's one in the upper corner, upper right-hand corner of the photograph of the retail area.
- Q Now, it's -- I recognize this is a little bit far away. If you wouldn't mind just kind of circling around

where you're describing that to be.

- A It's in the lower corner of that circle.
- Q So the lower left portion of where you just circled?
 - A Yes.

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- Q Now, you said that you had the chance to go through the interior of the store. Is this how you found the front portion of Top Notch Apparel?
 - A Yes.
- Q And would this be, State's 97, just be another angle from the front of that?
- 12 A Yes, it is.
 - Q Now, in State's 96, would you agree with me that there's kind of a glass window close to the center of the picture?
- 16 A Yes.
- Q Do you have the chance to see what was on the other side of that particular window?
- 19 A Yes, we went inside.
- 20 O What was in there?
 - A It's like a music studio. There was equipment inside of there. Yeah, just like music equipment and, you know, studio equipment.
- Q Would you agree with me that there's also a door kind of on the left wall of the hallway that leads towards

the back of the store?

A Yes.

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- Q Did you have the opportunity to go through that door?
- A Yes, I did.
- Q And was what you found through that door also a part of a clothing store?
 - A No.
- 9 Q Or did it appear to be what you would expect to 10 find in a clothing store?
- A No, it wasn't.
- 12 Q Showing you State's 27. Do you recognize what's 13 shown in this picture?
- 14 A Yes, I do.
- Q And can you just kind describe for us briefly what you see here?
- A Okay, so the door in the far back corner, that was
 the door that you saw going off of the hallway. And you have
 a center elevated platform with a pole, numerous seating
 areas and speakers and some musical equipment inside that
 room.
- Q So this is actually taken facing towards the front of the store itself?
- A Yeah. Yes, this would be a west view of that room.
- 25 Q And if you were standing where this particular

photograph was taken, and you were to turn 180 degrees, so you're now facing towards the back of the store, could you describe for us what was back there? Was it a blank wall or what was it?

- A No, there was -- there was another room back there that encompassed -- there's a bar and a pool table.
- Q Showing you State's 31. Is this that area that you were describing?
 - A Yes, it is.
- 10 Q So the portion of this picture that's off to the left, do you see some of the sound equipment?
- 12 A Yes.

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- Q Is that the -- kind of the dance area we saw in the last photograph?
- 15 A Yes, it is.
- 16 Q Now, did you have the opportunity to go through all
 17 of these rooms and into the back area behind the clothing
 18 store?
- 19 A There was an outdoor like patio area that I went 20 outside to, yes.
- 21 Q And did you -- and you went to actually go back as 22 well?
- 23 A Yes.
- Q And showing you State's 13. What are we looking at here?

- A So that's the back east rear patio area of the business, and that would just be outside of that poolroom that you saw in the last photograph.
- Q And this is State's 14. Is this another angle of that back patio area?
 - A Yes, it is.
- Q And I'll ask again, the (indecipherable) but State's 15, is this another area back there?
 - A Yes.

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- Q And I want to draw your attention specifically to one portion of this particular picture. Do you see the area above the what looks like a rolling door?
 - A Yes, I do.
- Q And would you agree with me that there's a light directly above the right-hand side of that rolling door?
 - A Right. Yes, there is.
- Q Do you see something off to the left from that area?

 - A I -- I don't know. It looks like it could be a camera, but I don't, you know, recollect exactly what it was.

- Q Okay. And you said that as you went through the building, you found numerous cameras both inside and outside?
 - A Yes.

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- Q Did you recover any video during your trip through this particular store?
- A I didn't recover a video, per se, but I recovered two hard drive disks that were from the -- from the room that had that window in it.
