#### **PETITION**

The Board of Governors of the State Bar of Nevada ("State Bar") hereby petitions this Court to amend SCR 81 regarding the election of members to the Board of Governors and the lifetime limit for which a Governor may serve. The State Bar respectfully requests this Court increase the term for which a Governor may be elected from two years to three and to increase the lifetime limit from eight years to 12 years, unless elected as vice president, president-elect or president, in which case, the lifetime term would be 15 years.

The proposed rule, as amended, is attached hereto in its entirety as Exhibit A.

#### **DISCUSSION**

The Board of Governors is responsible for the fiduciary and strategic development of the State Bar, an organization that oversees more than 10,000 attorneys licensed in this State. They engage in generative discussions focusing on the problems and opportunities faced by the profession and develop policy to further the State Bar's mission and carry out the goals set forth in its strategic plan.

Since the enactment of the State Bar Act of 1957, the State Bar has benefited from the leadership of a 15-member Board of Governors<sup>1</sup> charged with the

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executive functions of the State Bar and the enforcement of the provisions set forth in Supreme Court Rule. From 1965 to 1990, Governors stood for re-election every two years with no lifetime limit of service. The provisions under this Rule theoretically allowed each Board member duly re-elected by his or her constituency to serve until reaching a position of leadership, including the presidency of the State Bar.

In 1990, Supreme Court Rule 81 was amended, implementing for the first time, a six-year lifetime limit of service.<sup>2</sup> The Rule was amended again in 1996 to increase the lifetime limit to eight years<sup>3</sup>.

Since that time, the State Bar has enjoyed gender diversity on its Board of Governors, including eight female presidents since 1996, a steady progression of new representation, and contested elections. However, the lifetime limit for service has capped the ability for qualified Governors to serve in leadership positions.

The role of the governing body for unified state bars is fairly consistent from state to state, including oversight of admission and regulatory functions, management of the bar's fiduciary responsibilities, and the review and development of programs and policy to further the bar's mission. Additionally, although the size of the governing bodies varies from state to state, a majority of the unified bars surveyed include a governing board elected for three year terms, with no lifetime limit of service if re-elected. A unified bar association comparison is attached as Exhibit B.

Attorneys elected to the Board of Governors are immersed in the governance process and are quickly introduced to issues affecting Nevada practitioners and

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their clients and the national trends reshaping the profession. Governors serve on Board taskforces and committees to explore future policy issues. They also rotate as liaisons to State Bar committees and sections and act as a conduit to relay information directly, listen to concerns, and work together to improve the practice of law. They often face a steep learning curve and the knowledge needed to effectively govern is accumulated over time.

Rather than eliminating lifetime terms altogether, the Board of Governors proposes an amendment which would increase the lifetime limit to 12 years. This amendment would provide for the continuity the Board seeks and would give Governors a greater chance to become President if re-elected to office and voted among his or her fellow Governors to serve in a leadership position.

Additionally, the Board of Governors respectfully requests this Court to increase the terms of elected service from two to three years, similar to the appointed terms of the Board of Bar Examiners and its subcommittees<sup>4</sup> and the State Bar's northern and southern disciplinary boards<sup>5</sup>.

The State Bar requests this time period be extended to provide individual Governors more opportunity to become immersed in the State Bar's governance and strategic development before standing for re-election. This includes service on Board subcommittees and taskforces, as liaisons to State Bar sections and committees, and participation in long-term policy discussions.

#### **CONCLUSION**

The Board of Governors has maintained with this Court a strong and cooperative relationship resulting in significant changes and improvements to Nevada's legal community. The amendments requested herein are offered as a tool to further the objectives set forth to date, to provide for the growth and continuity of existing Governors, and to afford those Governors who invest a substantial amount of time and resources to volunteer their service to the State Bar an opportunity to rise to a position of leadership.

The State Bar respectfully requests, pursuant to Nevada Rules on the Administrative Docket, Section 4.2, that the Court make the proposed amendment to SCR 81 so it can be reflected in the nominating petitions for the 2017 elections. Furthermore, the State Bar requests the Court to extend the lifetime limit to Governors currently serving so that they may benefit from a full 12 years of service on the Board, subject to re-election.
