THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Possibly, yeah.

THE COURT: Okay. Well we need to know that.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yes.

THE COURT: Yes, it will?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. How so?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Just because my mother and just from
THE COURT: And I always feel terrible having to ask you these questions
because they're so personal. When did your mother disclose this to you?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Maybe about three years ago.
THE COURT: Okay. But you understand what happened to your mother and
what goes in here are completely separate things?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yes, I do.
THE COURT: Okay. So, you wouldn't want to take out on anybody else what
happened to your mother; correct?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah, I wouldn't.
THE COURT: All right. And you agree with me as the Defendant sits here
today, he's innocent?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yes.
THE COURT: Do you agree with that?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yes.
THE COURT: And you understand the State of Nevada has the burden of
proof. They have to establish each of the material elements as alleged in their
charging document by proof beyond a reasonable doubt?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yes.
THE COURT: Do you understand that?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah. Everyone's entitled.
THE COURT: Okay. If the State fails to meet their burden of proof, what
verdict are you going to return if the State does not meet their burden of proof?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Okay. Well then he wouldn't be guilty.

THE COURT: Okay. And if they do meet their burden of proof?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Then guilty.

THE COURT: Okay. So, how is what happened to your mom interfere with that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: I guess it wouldn't then.

THE COURT: Well I don't know. I'm not trying to talk you out of it. I'm trying to figure out if it's going to really interfere with your ability to be fair and impartial. Here's the bottom line. Everybody comes to this courtroom with life experiences. I'm not going to every find anybody that doesn't have a life experience. Okay. What I need to know is if you're a person that can leave those life experiences at the door and come in here with an open mind and judge this case based solely upon what you see and hear in the courtroom and the instructions on the law which will be given to you at the end of the case.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Okay. I could do that.

THE COURT: Can you do that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah.

THE COURT: Okay. Will you be able to set aside what happened to your mother and not judge this case based upon what happened to your mother?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah.

THE COURT: Okay. And now you said you're friends with your mother?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah, really close.

THE COURT: Does she live here in Clark County?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: No, they live in New York.

THE COURT: All right. So, I'm assuming you communicate with her by talking on the phone?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Constantly, yes.

1	THE COURT: All right. Every day?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah, every day.
3	THE COURT: Okay. So, you understand that if you're asked to be a juror on
4	this case you could not talk to her about this case; do you understand that?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah, yeah, I understand.
6	THE COURT: When you talk to her every day you could tell her you're a juro
7	in a criminal case but you couldn't tell her anything else; do you understand that?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Absolutely.
9	THE COURT: And you would comply with that?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yes.
11	THE COURT: But when you're done, when you're discharged as a juror, you
12	could talk to anyone or you don't have to talk to anyone. It's completely up to you;
13	do you understand that?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah.
15	THE COURT: Okay. Well what if you returned a verdict in this case, let's say
16	a not guilty verdict, would you have a problem telling your mom that?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: No, I wouldn't just because it's different from
18	what happened to her.
19	THE COURT: Okay. So, you wouldn't have any fear of any ramifications or
20	your mom being upset with you?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: No, no.
22	THE COURT: Okay. So, we wouldn't have to worry about you trying to return
23	a verdict that would make your mom happy?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: No.
25	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about what happened to your mom that is

going to interfere with your ability to give the State of Nevada and this gentleman a fair trial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: No.

THE COURT: Okay. And, again, I'm sorry we had to ask those questions.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: That's okay.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. Anyone else?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #40: Can you repeat the question again?

THE COURT: Have you or anyone close to you such as a family member or friend ever been the victim of a sexual assault, sexual abuse or domestic violence? So, other than what you've already disclosed to me, ma'am, will you state your name just so the -- will you state your name and badge number?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Kathleen Smith, Badge 40.

THE COURT: Okay. All right. Again, I see some people that are not in the 32 raising their hands. I'm so appreciative everybody's paying attention because you may end up here in the box. But I don't need you to answer these questions. They are just for the first 32. So, is there anyone in the first 32 that needs to respond. Ms. StClair, go ahead.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Melinda StClair, Badge 14.

My mom had domestic violence when we were growing up.

THE COURT: Your mom was what?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: My mom had some domestic violence. We were growing up with my stepfather. He also molested my two oldest sisters.

THE COURT: Okay. The same person?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. So, your mom was a victim of a domestic violence?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
2	THE COURT: Did you witness it or did you hear about it?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I seen her black and blue from head to toe.
4	THE COURT: Okay. So, you knew that that was a result of stepdad?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
6	THE COURT: Yes?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
8	THE COURT: Okay. Did she ever call the police?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I'm not sure. I was young. I can't remember
10	that part.
11	THE COURT: Okay. How old were you?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Seven, eight.
13	THE COURT: Okay. So, you were really little?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yeah.
15	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that experience that would affect your
16	ability to be fair and impartial in this case?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No.
18	THE COURT: And then you said something about your older sisters were
19	molested?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yeah; he molested both of them.
21	THE COURT: Okay. How did you come to find out that?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: They mentioned it later on in life.
23	THE COURT: So, after they became adults?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I guess when they were younger and
25	teenagers and stuff. There was a lot going on and I guess I was left out of it 'cause I

1	was younger.
2	THE COURT: Yeah. Again, you were like seven or eight?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
4	THE COURT: Okay. But your older sisters, are they how much older are
5	they than you?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Seven, eight years old.
7	THE COURT: Okay. And they disclosed it?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
9	THE COURT: When they were teenagers?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yeah, to my mom.
11	THE COURT: Okay. How did you find out about it?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: There was a lot of animosity because my
13	mom didn't believe them.
14	THE COURT: Okay. So, sisters disclosed it to mom; mom, you believe,
15	didn't believe the sisters?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Correct.
17	THE COURT: Okay. But you're so little. Did you figure this all out on your
18	own?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yeah.
20	THE COURT: Okay. And then what did the police ever get called?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I'm not sure. I know that they after he beat
22	her black and blue he was gone.
23	THE COURT: Okay. She made him leave?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I'm not sure.
25	THE COURT: Okay. So, stepfather was gone at some point, and even today

1	you don't know why he left?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No. I know that he contacted my mom a few
3	years ago and she told him do not do not come see me or I will let my daughters
4	know where you're at.
5	THE COURT: Okay. So, has she since kind of changed her opinion?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: My mom passed away in 2012.
7	THE COURT: Oh, I'm sorry. I'm sorry. But it sounds like at some point she
8	changed her opinion on whether your sisters were telling the truth or not?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yeah, she did. She starting coming to be a
10	little bit smarter than she was then.
11	THE COURT: So, at first she didn't believe it?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Right.
13	THE COURT: And then she came around
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
15	THE COURT: and believed it. Okay. Was it ever reported to the police?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I don't think so.
17	THE COURT: Okay. And it sounds like you kind of know all this because yo
18	figured it out?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Right.
20	THE COURT: Did your sisters ever tell you?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: We never have really talked about it.
22	THE COURT: Okay. It's something that's not really talked about?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Right.
24	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about those experiences that would affect
25	your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No.
2	THE COURT: Okay. Anyone else? Thank you.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I also had some domestic violence with my
4	husband.
5	THE COURT: I apologize. Oh, I'm sorry. Okay.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: It's all taken care of though.
7	THE COURT: All right. Can you just give me a brief statement of what
8	happened.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: We got into a really fight and he went to jail.
10	He got out and went to drug therapy.
11	THE COURT: Okay. Did you call the police?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
13	THE COURT: And they came and got him?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yep.
15	THE COURT: And he was arrested?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yep.
17	THE COURT: And he was charged?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yeah. The charges were dropped, I believe.
19	THE COURT: Okay.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: He didn't have to go to class or anything.
21	THE COURT: All right. So, he went to jail and he got out but he was never
22	charged with anything?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: He had to go to Court but I don't I think the
24	dropped it because he was going to class.

THE COURT: What kind of class?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: A drug therapy behavioral -- Nevada Behavioral Center.

THE COURT: Okay. So, you think that because he was going to some classes that the government didn't proceed against him?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Correct.

THE COURT: Did you ever talk to him about it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Well we're still married.

THE COURT: Okay. I'm just wondering.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: But, yeah, we talked about it. You know, we worked our problems out and everything.

THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that experience that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No.

THE COURT: Okay. Anything else?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No, thank you.

THE COURT: Okay. I'm sorry you had to tell us that but thank you very much. I know I had a lot of hands. Go ahead.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Hello. Yvonne Lewis, number 37. I just grew up in a home with a lot of domestic violence. My mother was actually the aggressor and the cops were called more times than I can remember, and being this little third grade talking to judges and whatnot, that was about it. Once I was old enough to fight back, it stopped.

THE COURT: Oh, you mean it was against you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: My dad and myself. She was a big woman.

THE COURT: From your mom?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah.

THE COURT: Okay. And so you or your father would call the police on her? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Or the neighbors or whoever saw what was going on, but yeah.

THE COURT: And she would get arrested?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Sometimes. Sometimes they would just be separated for a few months and then she'd come back. It was just a, you know, periodic thing. Every couple years she would go crazy and beat somebody up and then leave. But small towns and, you know, things are kind of just -- don't do it again and then they came back.

THE COURT: Okay. Anything about those experiences that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No.

THE COURT: Thank you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Thank you.

THE COURT: Anyone else in the box?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Mona Stammetti, number 20.

My mother was sexually molested by her brother.

THE COURT: Okay. How did you come to find out about that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: She told me probably 30 years ago.

THE COURT: Okay. Was that her first disclosure or had she told somebody else?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I know she told my dad. She was married to my dad at the time. And then my best friend was molested by her father. She and her sister were both molested by her father.

THE COURT: Anything about those experiences that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: No.

THE COURT: Thank you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Diana Hayes, number 44.

My mother was a victim of incest from her father.

THE COURT: Okay. Now how did you come to know that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Probably about ten years ago, my aunt, her sister, and I were talking.

THE COURT: And who told you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: She did, my aunt.

THE COURT: Your aunt told you that that happened to your mother?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Right. There's some question whether or not my aunt is my sister.

THE COURT: Okay. Anything about -- I'm sorry -- anything about that experience that would affect your ability -- and again I'm sorry, I'm sorry, Ms. Hayes, -- anything about that disclosure and learning that that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: I've heard you ask the other people and I want to say the answer's no, but it's -- I mean, I'm surprised at my own reaction. So, my concern would --

THE COURT: Would you rather -- Ms. Hayes, if you want to approach the bench you can. Is that more comfortable? Okay. It's Badge number 44, Ms. Hayes. You can approach the bench.

[Bench conference -- begins]

1	THE COURT: I'm sorry, Ms. Hayes.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: It's pretty public.
3	THE COURT: Okay. All four lawyers are present. Ms. Hayes is here. I just
4	want to make sure I understood. Your mother was the victim of sexual assault by
5	her
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Repeated incest from her father.
7	THE COURT: by her father. And then you said your aunt might really be
8	your sister?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Um-hm.
10	THE COURT: Because your mom gave birth to your aunt?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Possibly.
12	THE COURT: Possibly. Okay.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: There's a 14 year difference between them.
14	The abuse was going on during that time because my grandmother had diabetes
15	and we don't know. We've never tested it.
16	THE COURT: Okay. And you found this out I'm sorry and you found this
17	out because your aunt told you?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Um-hm.
19	THE COURT: Okay. When was this disclosure made?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: About ten years ago.
21	THE COURT: All right. And it has a pretty profound affect on you?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I was afraid [indiscernible] and then you
23	asked a question and now here I am. Sorry.
24	THE COURT: That's why I hate asking these questions. And then the next

question I have is there anything about that that would affect your ability to be fair

and impartial to these parties?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I want to say no but I also would not think that I would be responding like this. I want to think we were beyond it and above it and educated. I don't know. I don't know that I wouldn't think about that through the whole thing. I don't know. I can't say.

THE COURT: Okay. Well I can't tell you what to think about.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I know.

THE COURT: Okay. So, there's nothing --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I want to say going into no, but if I'm in the middle of it I don't --

THE COURT: Okay. And let me tell you that's what I'm trying to avoid. I don't want any members of the panel to get on the panel and then decide halfway into the case I can't be fair; do you understand that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I do.

THE COURT: Okay. So, I need someone --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I'm afraid I couldn't be.

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I'm embarrassed. I'm embarrassed to say that I couldn't be fair.

THE COURT: Okay. So, you're afraid you can't be fair? I feel terrible. I really do apologize. Who is it you think you can't be fair to?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Well the Defendant.

THE COURT: Okay. Because of the allegations?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Mm-hmm.

THE COURT: You just really think it's too overwhelming that you might not be

1	able to be fair?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Yes, that's correct.
3	THE COURT: Okay. Does the State want to follow-up at all?
4	MS. LUZAICH: No, Judge, we're satisfied.
5	THE COURT: Do you want to follow-up at all?
6	MS. ALLEN: No, Your Honor.
7	THE COURT: Okay. Do you have anything back at your chair?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Mm-hmm.
9	THE COURT: Okay. 'Cause what I'm going to do is ask you again, I
10	apologize. Do you want to stand here for a minute until you regain your
11	composure? We will.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I'm sorry.
13	THE COURT: That's okay. Just let me know when you're okay. You know
14	what we'll do. We'll take a break.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Okay.
16	THE COURT: And when we come back from the break, just don't sit back in
17	your seat because I'm going to replace you by putting another juror there.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Okay.
19	THE COURT: You okay with that?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I'm sorry.
21	THE COURT: That's okay. I just don't want you to have to turn around and
22	face everybody. Are you okay? Okay. We're going to take a break right now.
23	Okay. Did you guys need to say something to me?
24	MS. ALLEN: I was just going say something really quick but that's fine.

THE COURT: That's okay. I can excuse her. Are you okay to go back to

1	your seat?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Mm-hmm.
3	THE COURT: When we take a break, when you come in, don't sit in that
4	seat. Okay. Got it. Okay. Thank you, Ms. Hayes. Thank you very much for being
5	here.
6	MS. ALLEN: I was going to tell you this before I told you I've already had two
7	jurors come up and talk to me.
8	THE COURT: Shut up. You're kidding me.
9	MS. ALLEN: It happens all the time now.
10	THE COURT: You must be like have like this nice
11	MS. ALLEN: Which I don't understand because they hate me.
12	THE COURT: They don't hate you.
13	MS. ALLEN: I'm totally kidding. So, if you just want to because they were
14	asking me questions and I'm doing all like
15	THE COURT: You're doing the whole get away from me.
16	MS. ALLEN: Right, the song and dance. If you could just maybe give 'em
17	that we're not supposed to talk to you.
18	THE COURT: I'll tell 'em again.
19	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
20	THE COURT: All right. And then obviously I'm going to
21	MS. ALLEN: Yeah.
22	THE COURT: excuse Ms. Hayes.
23	[Bench conference concludes]
24	THE COURT: At this time, Ladies and gentlemen, we're going to take a

25 recess. Again, I want to remind you that when we're in recess the parties, the

attorneys, myself, the staff in Department 12 with the exception of the Court marshal, are not permitted to have any communication with you whatsoever. So, if you're out in the hallway and you see the attorneys and you try to talk to the attorneys, they're not going to talk back to you. Again, please don't be offended should they not talk back to you. They are just complying with the Court order not to have any communication with any member of the jury panel at all. Does everybody understand that? If there's any questions you need to ask, you ask the Court marshal or you can ask me when Court is in session. We're going to take a 15 minute recess.

During this recess, you are admonished not to talk or converse amongst yourselves or with anyone else on any subject connected with this trial or read, watch or listen to any report of or commentary on the trial or any person connected with this trial by any medium of information, including without limitation, newspapers, television, the internet or radio or form or express any opinion on any subject connected with this trial until the case is finally submitted to you. We'll be in recess till 3:45. Thank you very much. You're excused.

Ms. Boulton, have long have you lived in Clark County? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: Two years.

THE COURT: Two years. Okay. Your education background.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: I have a bachelors [indiscernible] medical

1	technology. I also went to grad school. Not able to do was my thesis dissertation
2	for microbiology.
3	THE COURT: Okay. So, you have almost a doctorate in microbiology?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: Masters in microbiology.
5	THE COURT: Masters.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: Yes.
7	THE COURT: Okay. What do you do for a living?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: I worked at UMC. I'm the microbiology
9	laboratory supervisor.
10	THE COURT: Your marital status.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: Married.
12	THE COURT: Is your husband employed?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: Yes.
14	THE COURT: What does he do?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: He's a physician assistant.
16	THE COURT: Do you have any children?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: Yes.
18	THE COURT: How many?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: Two.
20	THE COURT: Are they old enough to be employed?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: No.
22	THE COURT: Have you ever served as a juror before?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: No.
24	THE COURT: Do you know of any reason why you could not be a completely

fair and impartial juror if you were selected to serve on this panel?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: No.

THE COURT: Thank you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #079: You're welcome.

THE COURT: Thank you for being here.

Okay. I'm going to open it back up to the panel of 32 again and the question pending is, have you or anyone close to you such as a family member or friend ever been the victim of sexual assault, sexual abuse or domestic violence? Is there anyone else that would like to -- okay. Over here. Your name and badge number.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Millie Hiatt, number 63.

THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: When my son was 14 he was molested by a camp counselor, and the camp counselor pled guilty and was sentenced to prison for a certain of time. There were several boys involved in the molestation and my son was listed as one of those that -- that the person molested.

THE COURT: Okay. So, your son disclosed it to you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: No; the police came to my door to tell me. My son did not remember it. He said he was sleeping. The person who did it said my son was sleeping when he did this, and my son does not remember it.

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: But he -- we did not have to testify or anything because he did admit to it, the person admitted to it.

THE COURT: Anything about that experience that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: No.

THE COURT: Thank you. Anyone else that wishes to respond? Remember, if you're not in the 32 you don't need to respond right now. No,you're in the 32. You're in the box. Go ahead. Your name and badge number.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Robert Bell, number 46. In grade school, my best friend and his sister were psychologically and physically abused by their parents.

THE COURT: When you were in what, grade school?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: When I was in grade school. When I turned 13, his father committed suicide and his mother was institutionalized and my mother adopted them.

THE COURT: Oh, so they're your siblings?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yeah.

THE COURT: So, your best friend and his sister became your siblings?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead. I'm sorry.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: And then my brother and his ex-wife were both addicts and their children were taken away from them because they were both physically and psychologically abusive to 'em.

THE COURT: Okay. Anything about -- where are those children now?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: My mom still has one of 'em because she adopted -- she took custody of one and the other one is old enough to be on his own.

THE COURT: Okay. So, she took custody of your best friend and his sister and then also a grandchild?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Mm-hmm.

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THE COURT: Okay. Anything about those experiences that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: No.

THE COURT: Thank you, sir. Anyone else that needs to respond to that question? Okay. The record will reflect no further response from the panel.

Have you or anyone close to you such as a family member or friend ever been accused of a crime? So, other than what's already been disclosed to us, have you or anyone close to you such as a family member or friend ever been accused of a crime. Okay. Go ahead, ma'am, in the checkered red shirt. Your name and badge number.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yvonne Lewis, number 37.

THE COURT: Go ahead, Ms. Lewis.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I was accused of trespassing and assault.

THE COURT: Okay. When did that happen?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: When I was 17.

THE COURT: So, you were a minor?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah, but I was tried as an adult.

THE COURT: For trespassing.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: And assault.

THE COURT: Was that here in Clark County?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No, no, no, it was in Arizona.

THE COURT: All right.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Basically I beat someone up; I got arrested.

But the cop who arrested me --

THE COURT: More than assault. I mean, there's actually a battery?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I guess.
THE COURT: Do you remember really what you were charged with?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No. I just remember they kind of quick.
Okay. You assaulted somebody and you went on their property to do it and that's
why we're arresting you and that's why you got to go in front of a judge. I was a
Defendant, you know.
THE COURT: Okay. What happened?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Luckily the police officer that arrested me
knew why I did it and thought I had a pretty good reason to do it and actually had m
record expunged.
THE COURT: Okay. So, you don't have any convictions?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No.
THE COURT: All right. Anything about that experience that would affect you
ability to be fair and impartial?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No.
THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. And I think Ms
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Kathleen Smith, number 40.
Back in the early '80s I was cited for petty theft. I was at the time
THE COURT: When you say cited, did a police officer write out a citation?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
THE COURT: Okay.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: And I had to pay a fine and do community
service. At that time things were I was doing drugs. It was a bad time.
THE COURT: Okay.
PROSPECTIVE ILIBOR #040. And then I had one other thing hannen

1	recently with a situation with the father of my daughter's child.
2	THE COURT: Okay.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: And so I was charged with
4	THE COURT: The father of your grandchild?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Right.
6	THE COURT: Okay.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: So, I was charged with battery for that.
8	THE COURT: Do you have a pending battery charge?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: No, no, that was in 2012. So, I was cited for
10	that as well.
11	THE COURT: You got a citation?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
13	THE COURT: Did you have to go to Court?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
15	THE COURT: What happened?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Well yeah I did go to Court and I just pled
17	guilty to it and paid a fine.
18	THE COURT: Here in this courthouse?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: North Las Vegas.
20	THE COURT: North Las Vegas as well?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
22	THE COURT: So, you pled guilty to battery?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
24	THE COURT: Paid a fine?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.

1	THE COURT: And what else?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: And then it was dismissed.
3	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about those two experiences that would affect
4	your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: No.
6	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. Anyone else? Have you or anyone close
7	to you such as a family member or friend ever been accused of a crime? Ms.
8	StClair, Melinda St.Clair, Badge number 14. Go ahead.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: My stepson got arrested for assault with a
10	knife.
11	THE COURT: All right. And where was that?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: In Clark County.
13	THE COURT: Here in Clark County. What happened as a result of that?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: He did some time in juvenile hall.
15	THE COURT: He was a minor?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
17	THE COURT: All right. I don't need to get into minor things.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Okay.
19	THE COURT: He was a minor. It was resolved in juvenile court?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
21	THE COURT: Did you accompany him as the parent?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
23	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that experience that would affect your
24	ability to be fair and impartial in this case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No.

1	THE COURT: Do you think he was treated fairly?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
3	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: He got in some more trouble back in Georgia
5	also.
6	THE COURT: As a minor or as in an adult?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: As an adult.
8	THE COURT: Okay. And what was that?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I didn't go to Court with him or anything like
10	that. He's on probation still.
11	THE COURT: For?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: He was running from the police and ended up
13	in some kid's bedroom.
14	THE COURT: Okay. Ended up in someone's house in their bedroom?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: In a child's bedroom and he did not know the
16	people that lived there.
17	THE COURT: Okay. But do you know what he was charged with?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No; but it doesn't sound good.
19	THE COURT: Okay. And you believe he's on probation?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
21	THE COURT: Anything about that that would affect your ability to be fair and
22	impartial in this particular case?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No.
24	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: You're welcome.

THE COURT: Anyone else? Okay. The record will reflect no further response from the panel.

Is there anyone on this panel who would have a tendency to give more weight or credence or less weight or credence to the testimony of a police officer simply because he or she is a police officer? Okay. The record will reflect no response from the panel.

Is there anyone on this panel who believes they cannot wait until they have heard all of the evidence and after being instructed on the law before they reach the appropriate result in this case? Anyone who believes they cannot do that? The record will reflect no further response from the panel.

At this time, I'm going to turn the panel over to the State of Nevada.

MS. LUZAICH: Good afternoon, Ladies and gentlemen.

I am also going to apologize in advance. As the Court had indicated, what we want to do is get a panel of jurors that are going to be fair and impartial to both sides, and unfortunately the only way we can do that is by asking questions that are very personal in nature. I always end either upsetting or distressing somebody so I apologize in advance because it is absolutely not my intent to upset or distress anybody. We just really want to make sure that everybody here can be fair to both sides. So, I do apologize.

This is kind of a participation thing. We all need to talk to you. So, just so you know when I ask questions, if somebody doesn't want to volunteer and participate I will seek out volunteers, just so everybody knows in advance.

So, that being said, is there anybody here that would disagree with me, who would disagree with me when I say a woman has an absolute right to say no to a man's sexual advances? Anybody disagree? Okay. Everybody's looking at me

blankly. Does anybody here think that a woman at some point gives up that right?

Does anybody think that a woman at some point gives up that right? Does anybody think that no means convince me? Okay. I'm glad we're all on the same page here.

Now when I talk about a woman, what about a child. Does that change for anybody when we start talking about a child? When I say child I mean somebody under 18. I don't necessarily mean somebody that's five or six. Does that change at all for somebody who is under 18? Now people are starting to nod their heads in a negative way.

Who here thinks that a child has the same ability to say no that an adult does? Does anybody think a child has the same ability? Nobody does. Okay. Why not? Why does a child not therefore have the same ability to say no than an adult would? Remember what I said about no --

THE COURT: I'm so happy you all are paying attention. Thank you so much. But, again, if you're not in the 32, you don't have to respond. And I really do appreciate you paying such close attention.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Ms. Mandel, you started talking. Why might a child not have the same ability?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Respectability. They're respecting an authority figure which in this case would be the adult. They don't have the life experience to recognize that something is perhaps happening that shouldn't or feels uncomfortable until after it's happened.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think that that is something that you would take into consideration when you're evaluating witness testimony in a trial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Meaning if a child was testifying? MS. LUZAICH: Um-hm.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Well I would take at point blank that it's the individual testifying. You mean that they don't have life experience in understanding the question that's being asked?

MS. LUZAICH: No, no. When they're talking about what occurred are you going to take into account the fact that they don't have the same life experience that you or I might?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No; they have their life experience and certainly if they're relaying a story I don't think it's a fable at that point.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Miss -- what about you? Do you think a child has the same ability to say no as an adult?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: I don't think so.

MS. LUZAICH: Why not?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: I don't think they really have any comprehension depending on the age or they're not understanding what's going on. They're just kind of like in a -- like unconscious state just like -- not, you know, unconscious but just not aware.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. When you say depending on the age, is it a chronological thing or is it --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: There again, because I can't fully understand it. So, I mean -- all I can say is that under 18, I just don't think they understand what's going on.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Lambert, behind you. What do think? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: I think a child can say no but I think that it would easier not to. I think depending on their experiences it's going to vary from one child to another. I don't think that you can blanketly say every child definitely

1	could or could not say yes or no to anything.
2	MS. LUZAICH: You think all kids are different?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yes.
4	MS. LUZAICH: What makes kids different?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Life experiences, the way they grow up, who
6	they grow up around, what they're doing, education, parenting. A lot of things affect
7	a child.
8	MS. LUZAICH: And does that affect how a child might appear when they
9	come in here and talk to you?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: How they appear physically or their demeanor
11	or
12	MS. LUZAICH: Demeanor.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Okay. Yeah, I think how they've been raised
14	and what they're the atmosphere they're used to or the, you know, the
15	environment, I'm sorry, that they're used to would affect how they would appear or
16	the way they would act.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Allen, what do you think?
18	Is it hard for a child to say no?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: I would think so.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Why?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Well because their experiences aren't that
22	great.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Are kids different? Are kids the same? What do you
24	think?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: No; I think they're all different. They've grown

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up a little different.
MS. LUZAICH: What makes them different?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Their experiences. How well their parents are
in raising them.
MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think that there can be some really good
parents and some really bad parents?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Oh, yeah.
MS. LUZAICH: And then somewhere in between as well?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
MS. LUZAICH: And in your mind will that effect what kids appear like, how
their demeanor is and their attitudes and things of that nature?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: I would definitely think so, yes.
MS. LUZAICH: What else could that effect the way their parents raise them
and treat them?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Their self esteem, I would think.
MS. LUZAICH: Thank you. Mr. Greenwood, what about you?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Pretty much what the others have said.
Everyone's made good points.
MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Nobody has is there idea? Oh, new ideas up front.
Ms. Randolph.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I think a lot of reasons kids have trouble saying no to adults is one thing they be in fear of the adult. Another thing they have a deep desire to please an adult and they may pressure them to agree to something they might not necessary feel comfortable with.

MS. LUZAICH: Have you had experiences like that in your life or seen it

1	happen?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Well I've seen where I work at a rec center
3	and I've talked to kids in different situations.
4	MS. LUZAICH: The rec center that you work at
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Um-hm.
6	MS. LUZAICH: is it adults, kids or
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: It's everybody. It's a county rec center.
8	MS. LUZAICH: What do you do at the rec center?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I'm a program assistant so I work the front
10	desk.
11	MS. LUZAICH: At which center?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Walnut Rec Center.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Does any of the names that you heard mean anything to you
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Which names?
15	MS. LUZAICH: The kids.
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Excuse me?
17	MS. LUZAICH: The kids.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: No, I didn't recognize those kids at all.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Not at all.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: No.
21	MS. LUZAICH: So, what do you see at the rec center with the kids that helps
22	you kind of give us insight into kids?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Well sometimes, you know, I've gotten into
24	conversations with kids and not really necessarily it's just a lot of peer pressure.

25 Kids, a lot of times they're followers, like older kids, look up to older kids in the same

dynamics I see with adults, kids and adults. They're trying to please their parents, trying to please someone older, and a lot of times they're intimated too to do things they normally wouldn't do.

MS. LUZAICH: Are all these things that you'll take into consideration when you're evaluating?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Most definitely, most definitely.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Ms. Lewis, you wanted to share as well.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I was just going to say the same thing as she did, that fear is a huge factor in wanting to please a parent or an older person that you look up to.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Anybody else? Anything else? Any other comments? Ms. StClair, all the way in the back.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: We've always been told to respect our elders and that's one thing we've always taught our kids to respect our elders. And anybody that's older than you you look up to and you want to be like them and you want to follow them. So, as a kid, you know, it's hard to say no, you know, when you want to be like somebody else.

MS. LUZAICH: In addition to being harder to say no, do you think it's harder for a child to disclose that they have been abused than an adult?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes; it's very hard for them.

MS. LUZAICH: Why is that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Because a lot of times they've been told not to of something you're ashamed of, you're embarrassed by, you know, and you don't know who to trust anymore.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. And are these all things that you would take into

1	consideration?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Mr. Urquico, is that how you say it?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: Urquico.
5	MS. LUZAICH: Urquico. I'm sorry. Nobody ever gets my name right. So, I tr
6	so hard with other people. What do you think about that? Is it harder for a child to
7	disclose that they've been abused than for an adult?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: Yes.
9	MS. LUZAICH: Why is that?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: I don't think they really experience humility
11	yet.
12	MS. LUZAICH: They don't experience what?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: Humility. And it's just more embarrassing just
14	to talk about something like that. It's just easier to keep it down inside for most kids.
15	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Are there any other reasons that you can think of?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: And just fear of adults.
17	MS. LUZAICH: And are these all things that you would take into
18	consideration when evaluating the testimony of witnesses?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: Yes.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you. Ms. Stephens, what about you?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #032: Yes; I think it would be hard for I think it
22	would be hard for a kid to tell an adult or a stranger what had happened to them.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Because?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #032: Because they would be well they would be
25	afraid. Maybe the adult wouldn't believe them or maybe the adult would tell the

other person involved and it would be worse for them. So, I don't think -- I think it would be a very hard thing to come forward.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Greenwood, do you agree with that? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: You want to add to that at all?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: No.

MS. LUZAICH: How would you go about evaluating the testimony of kids that you don't know?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Without the insight of not knowing the kids, you just have to judge it on their believability and maybe you could just get a feeling for, you know, their truthfulness or --

MS. LUZAICH: What if you don't just get a feeling? I mean, are there anything that you might look at or look to in evaluating his testimony?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Not sure. Not sure how to answer.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So, let me ask you this. If an adult says one thing and a kid says something else, are you going to automatically believe the adult simply because they're an adult?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: No.

MS. LUZAICH: Why?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: There's two sides to every story and there's two different viewpoints for what's happened. The adult could say it's this way and the child could say it's this way and could possibly be somewhere in between. It depends on who the action is going against.

MS. LUZAICH: Well you do think it depends by who the action [indiscernible]?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Well if it's something for the kid, the kid might say -- it's something that happened to the kid, the kid might say, oh, it happened just like this, but if I'm the adult overlooking that I might see it in a different way.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Would you agree that different people can perceive the same set of facts differently?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Why?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: You might not have all the information for -you might not -- you might have as a witness come up and seen it as a different
way. You might not -- I don't how do I explain it -- you could have come up on it and
not seen the whole story what happened. I might have got here late and missed all
this that happened before this happened or whatever.

MS. LUZAICH: Would you agree that even, you know, five or ten seconds can make a difference?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Geiger, what do you think?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: My voice is gone.

MS. LUZAICH: Already. We haven't even started.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: I've been thinking about. I mean, when you talk from 18 down I'd have to say that each level of age would be a different -- I mean, five to eight years old versus 15 to 18 can be a whole different set of circumstances on what they seen and done, how they react to things, how they're raised. If you're 15 to 18, are you're rebellious, are you more structured in your life. So, you'd have to watch what you see with each person and make your judgment based on their delivery, their comfort with what they're saying and not saying, and

you'd have to just watch and have a feel and listen to the questions and the answers and make a decision from there. Younger children may not be able to tell you what they had happen to them because they think they did something wrong. They don't know for certain that something was right or wrong or they don't want to get somebody in trouble for what they say may or may not be wrong. So, they're caught in a situation where they don't know what to say and do.

MS. LUZAICH: In your mind, it is a chronological thing, like a numeric, five to eight years, 15 to 18, or is it more of a an emotional thing?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: I think your emotions go with your chronological -- as you develop you -- how you develop is judges -- determines how you react to things.

MS. LUZAICH: I guess maybe emotional is a bad word. Would you agree that there are some five to eight year olds that could be smarter than some 11 to 12 year olds?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: By far.

MS. LUZAICH: Are there some 15 to 18 year olds that are not quite as smart or savvy as some ten year olds?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: Yeah or vice versa or smarter than me. I mean, I run into it with the nephews and nieces often.

MS. LUZAICH: But it's not necessarily a number thing.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: No.

MS. LUZAICH: It's not the age. It's the ability. I guess that's a better word.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: It is.

MS. LUZAICH: Is it the ability of the child that would make the difference to you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: Yes. It's the individual and how he's raised;
how he's taught in school; what he's exposed to and not exposed to; how they are a
home, what they see and don't see; what television they see. It affects how they
think.

MS. LUZAICH: How about perception. Is a perception a big thing?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: It's huge.

MS. LUZAICH: Different people perceive things differently.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: It does, yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Thank you. Mr. Yowell.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: What about you? You agree different people can perceive the same circumstances differently?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Absolutely I do.

MS. LUZAICH: For example, why?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Sometimes people have different opinions when they come upon situations, I think. And everybody sees things differently just by their experiences and stuff like that.

MS. LUZAICH: Is it also possible that when two different people view one set of circumstances, different aspects of that circumstance could be important to one but not the other?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Right; absolutely. They could have a totally disagreement just by -- with the same facts, but because of the way they think or their experiences it'll be a little different, different opinion, yeah.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. For example, you and I watched two cars crash.

You're really concerned about that cool blue Mustang and I'm worried about the girl

1	in the pink dress.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Right.
3	MS. LUZAICH: And her dress got dirty. But different perspectives, different
4	things are important; would you agree?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Yes; absolutely.
6	MS. LUZAICH: And what might enter into that? I mean, I gave you the boy
7	girl description. What else might make different people think things or perceive
8	things differently?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: I'm not sure. Just the way people people's
10	demeanor are, you know.
11	MS. LUZAICH: If something is happening to you but I'm watching it happen to
12	you, do you think what's important of those facts to you might be different than
13	what's important to me?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Yes.
15	MS. LUZAICH: Might you see something that I don't see and might I see
16	something that you don't see?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Right; absolutely.
18	MS. LUZAICH: I mean, that's unusual to you or out of the ordinary?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: No, not at all.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Is that something that you might be able to take into
21	consideration when you evaluate testimony?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Yes; absolutely.
23	MS. LUZAICH: How might you evaluate the testimony of kids that you've
24	never met?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: I would listen to how they were speaking and

1	details in front of a room full of strangers?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #011: Absolutely, yeah.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Mr. Kamaunu, is that how you say it?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Kamaunu.
5	MS. LUZAICH: Kamaunu. What about you? You have several kids.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: I have five.
7	MS. LUZAICH: What ages, age range.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Eighteen, 15, 13, 10 and 8.
9	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So, you got 'em all. How do you deal with disputes
10	between your kids?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: It's hard, man. I try to tell them to be quiet. I
12	got four girls.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. One of the girls says she did it; the other girl says, no
14	she did it, and the third one says, no, the other one did it. What do you do then?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: It's hard because two of my girls is real sneaky
16	and one of 'em she's always pretty straight forward. So, I always believe the
17	straight forward one.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. That makes sense. The sneaky ones, do they also
19	have kind of a motive or a bias as to why they might say what they do?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: An excuse or
21	MS. LUZAICH: Like do sometimes they say what they want because they
22	want to make themselves look better to you?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Yeah.
24	MS. LUZAICH: So, they say what they say because, you know, they want
25	tickets to the concert that's coming up.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Oh, my God. They do some crazy ones.
MS. LUZAICH: Okay.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: They con me all the time.
MS. LUZAICH: So, sometimes do they say crazy things that just sound so
crazy and you later realize they're true?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: No.
MS. LUZAICH: No? Really.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: No.
MS. LUZAICH: You never heard the expression, you know, there's some
things that are so crazy you just can't make 'em up?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: I'm Daddy so it's different. Like they just go
and I give in, you know what I mean. And then I really got to tell me crazy things,
you know.
MS. LUZAICH: Okay.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: They just got to give me sad face and I'm like,
go get it.
MS. LUZAICH: What happens if somebody breaks mom's favorite
possession, whatever it is, how are you going to figure out which one did it when
she says she did and she says she did it?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: They're all going to get punished.
MS. LUZAICH: Okay. What if you can't punish everybody? I mean, you got
to make a decision. For example, in Court you've got to make a decision.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: I got to go by the facts and the evidence, you
know what I mean.
MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Are you going to look at what one person says and

1	see how it compares to what somebody else says?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Yeah.
3	MS. LUZAICH: When you say evidence, what do you mean by evidence? Is
4	it something that you hold in your hand?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Maybe it was like maybe this person had
6	debris of whatever they broke or something on their hand. Maybe they were
7	touching 'em or maybe they were the last one to touch it.
8	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Would you agree that eye witness testimony can be
9	evidence?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Yes.
11	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So, are you expecting to see anything here?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: I don't know what you mean.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Well you heard what the charges are?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Yeah.
15	MS. LUZAICH: You heard that a lot of people are going to come in and
16	testify. They're going to talk to you about things that they saw and heard and
17	whatnot. Are you expecting to see anything in particular?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Yeah, I guess.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Like what?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Witnesses maybe.
21	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. We can do that. What if there's no evidence that you
22	can hold in your hand; is that going to be a problem for you?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Like I said, I got girls and they tell me all kinds
24	of stuff so it might be a problem, you know. I don't know.

MS. LUZAICH: Can you make a decision based on only things that you hear

as opposed to having to see and touch something --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Yeah.

MS. LUZAICH: -- to make a decision?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Yeah.

MS. LUZAICH: You can make a decision based on things that you just hear?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #09: Yeah.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thanks. Ms. Ross, you look like you were nodding when you expecting to see something. Is there something that you're expecting to see?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Oh, no, I wasn't nodding.

MS. LUZAICH: No.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: No.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. All right. Well since I have you. What do you think? Is it harder for kids to disclose some kind of abuse, physical or sexual abuse, than it would be for an adult in your mind?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yeah. I think sometimes it is because they're innocent and they trust their adults, they trust their parents or their -- people that are older than them.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. And when you are -- if you are sitting as a juror and listening to the testimony and having to evaluate all of the witnesses, can you look at and listen to a bunch of kids and evaluate their testimony objectively?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes. I get very emotional so it's hard for me to hear that but -- yes, I believe I can.

MS. LUZAICH: I expect -- if you talked to a hundred thousand people, the would all tell you that they would get emotional having to listen to that. But what we

1	want to know is can you listen to the testimony of kids and at least be objective and
2	listen to what they have to say?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
4	MS. LUZAICH: You won't automatically discount what they have to say just
5	'cause they're kids?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: No, absolutely not.
7	MS. LUZAICH: And you would never automatically believe an adult over a
8	child simply because they're adults?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: No, absolutely not, no.
10	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you. Mr my handwriting is so bad. Mr. Newman,
11	what about you? Can you objectively evaluate the testimony of kids?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes, ma'am.
13	MS. LUZAICH: You won't automatically believe an adult over kids just
14	because they're kids?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: No, ma'am.
16	MS. LUZAICH: You sat in a trial before?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Similar charges?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Kids testified.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
22	MS. LUZAICH: And were you able to do that? Were you able to listen to
23	what they had to say and take them at face value?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
25	MS. LUZAICH: How was that experience?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: It was definitely a tough experience.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Something you thought about for a long time after?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Absolutely.
4	MS. LUZAICH: Is it something that you can do again?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.
7	Ms. Stammetti.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Yes.
9	MS. LUZAICH: What about you? Is it harder for kids to disclose than for
10	adults any kind of abuse, physical abuse, sexual abuse?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: I think so, yes.
12	MS. LUZAICH: Why?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: I think depending on circumstances, they could
14	be scared of things getting worse; they could be scared of the outcome. Those
15	adults have really control of their lives. So, you know, I can see a kid wondering
16	whose going to believe them.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think sometimes kids could feel pressure not to
18	disclose?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Yes.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Are there different kinds of pressure in your mind?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Probably. I mean, there would be a self-
22	imposed pressure. There could be pressure from outside sources.
23	MS. LUZAICH: When you say self-imposed, what do you mean?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Just bring it on themselves; feeling maybe guilty
25	or ashamed or did I do something wrong and putting pressure on themselves that

1	way.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Well what about worrying what other people would think?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Right; yes.
4	MS. LUZAICH: Will it get worse, things like that?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Yes.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Almost like a subtle threat, not an overt threat? Do you agre
7	that there is such a thing as subtle threat?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Yes, mm-hmm.
9	MS. LUZAICH: Are these all things that you could take into consideration
10	when you're evaluating the testimony?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Yes.
12	MS. LUZAICH: But you don't have kids?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: I have two.
14	MS. LUZAICH: Oh, two. How old?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Seventeen and 13.
16	MS. LUZAICH: How do you deal with when your 17 and 13 year old
17	disagree?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Well my son can't lie very well and his sister's
19	always putting things over on him. She's sneaky and she'll coerce sometimes to try
20	to get her way. Depending on what it is, I'll just say you guys work it out. It's the
21	problem between the two of you. Sometimes I just might have to step in and make
22	a decision for them if it's not going so well.
23	MS. LUZAICH: And when it's your own kids sometimes it's easy to tell if
24	they're not being completely honest; right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Obviously these are not going to be your kids that are going to testify. So, how are you going to try to make that determination?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: I think their demeanor would come into play and I'd probably would think about my kids and how they react to things. Sometimes things may not quite make sense, you know. If the child's saying something -- my son, for instance, swore that he was chasing the dog and the dog tripped and knocked that hole in the wall. But he said [indiscernible] my hands like this but there was a fist through the wall. So, it's like no, no, I think he's lying about that. Sometimes things don't always quite make sense. You'd have to take that, I think, into account too.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Carlyn, what about you? Thoughts in general about kids.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: I think everyone has their own, you know, right to say no, honestly. But I guess it depends on how you were raised, you know, how good your parents were. Mine always told me, you know, if there's a problem go to someone and that's what I do.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. If you hear that the kids had a really horrible parent, are you going to hold that against the kids?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: No; but I'll definitely look at it differently.

MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it is harder for a kid to disclose abuse than for an adult?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: Depends on how they were raised.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. How they were raised and other things as well?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#20: Mm-hmm. Like all the schools I went to, you know, if there was a problem, just like I said, you go to someone and tell them, you

1	know. I don't like to keep secrets or anything like that.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Okay.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: If something's happening like that why hold it
4	in? I mean, unless you're scared of your parents. I know if someone did that to me
5	I would definitely at least fight back.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Are you going to be able to objectively listen to what
7	the kids have to say?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: Mm-hmm; yeah.
9	MS. LUZAICH: And are you going to look at it as well I wouldn't have done
10	what you did therefore you're lying and automatically disbelieve them?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: No.
12	MS. LUZAICH: I mean, you won't impose your views
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: Own opinion.
14	MS. LUZAICH: and standards and stuff on other people; will you?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: No.
16	MS. LUZAICH: Just because people didn't act in a way that you would have
17	everything your sister might have or your girlfriend, you won't automatically
18	disbelieve what they have to say?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: No.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Will you automatically believe an adult over a child simply
21	because they're an adult?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: No.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Would you agree that different people can perceive the same
24	set of the circumstances
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: Perceive. What do you mean?

MS. LUZAICH: I can go back to the -- you and I both watch a car accident happen --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: Oh, yeah.

MS. LUZAICH: -- I think the light was red, you think it's green. Clearly it couldn't have been both, but what was I paying attention to and what were you paying attention to? So, is it possible that one of us is wrong but not necessarily lying?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: Exactly; yep.

MS. LUZAICH: Is there a difference in your mind between lying and mistaken?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: Mm-hmm.

MS. LUZAICH: What's the difference?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: Well lying, I believe, is when you're making up something. When you mistake, I guess it's just like you said. You saw one thing but you weren't really paying attention.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Can you tell the difference, like if somebody's talking to you, can you tell the difference between whether they're lying or mistaken?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: I guess you just have to watch how they react to stuff. That's my best bet.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Is there a particular way in which somebody who mistakes -- is mistaken reacts as opposed to the way somebody not does, in your mind?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#23: I'd have to see it, honestly.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Ms. Haber, what about you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: To which question.

1	MS. LUZAICH: Oh, God, I know. I'm sorry. The whole time standing there
2	Well first can you evaluate the testimony of kids objectively?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes, I think so. I have five kids so yeah.
4	MS. LUZAICH: What are your kids age ranges?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Twenty-three down to nine.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So, you've got some long range as well. You won't
7	automatically believe an adult over a child simply because they're an adult?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: I would not.
9	MS. LUZAICH: When you are looking at the kids and what they have to say
10	to evaluate their testimony, what are some things that you're going to take into
11	consideration to determine what happened?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Body language; how well they recollect what,
13	you know, what they saying. It's really hard. Every kid's different and you don't
14	know those kids personally so
15	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that why do people talk about experience?
16	You think that's going to enter into it clearly, right, their life experiences?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes.
18	MS. LUZAICH: How they were raised?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes.
20	MS. LUZAICH: What about just straight out intelligence or lack of
21	intelligence?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Of course.
23	MS. LUZAICH: How might that affect the way you evaluate somebody?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: I think it might affect it more actually because
25	like I said, I have five kids. They've all been raised with the same mother, same

1	father, and they all have completely different personalities. So, when people say,
2	you know, the raising and all this other stuff I've been hearing here about that
3	determines how a kid is, not necessarily.
4	MS. LUZAICH: A little bit?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: A little bit but not one hundred percent.
6	Definitely not.
7	MS. LUZAICH: Would you agree that of your five kids, one's going to be the
8	smartest, one's going the least smart, and the other ones are varying degrees in
9	between?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes.
11	MS. LUZAICH: Yeah, they may be close in range but they're not all going to
12	be the same?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Right.
14	MS. LUZAICH: So, is that something that you would take into consideration
15	when you're evaluating
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that somebody who is smarter is going to be
18	able to keep themselves trouble free necessarily just because they're smart?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: No.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that somebody that's not very smart will be able
21	to keep themselves trouble free because of that?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: No.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Would you agree that just all kids are different?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes.
25	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that well do you think that even kids, kids who

1	are raised together and raised in the same family perceive other things differently?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Sure they can.
3	MS. LUZAICH: So, if two different kids just in general look at a set of
4	circumstances they might not view it the same; would you agree with that?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Therefore do you think they're going to necessarily recollect it
7	the same, remember it the same?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: No, no.
9	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that if an adult in the trial view a set of
10	circumstances they could perceive it differently?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes.
12	MS. LUZAICH: And therefore just remember it differently?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes, of course.
14	MS. LUZAICH: Does that mean that either one of them is necessarily lying?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: No, not at all.
16	MS. LUZAICH: Why?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Well because like you say you they're
18	perceiving it differently so they're remembering it differently. It doesn't mean they're
19	lying. That's how they remembered it.
20	MS. LUZAICH: And is that something that in your mind is reasonable?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Sure.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Is that something that you could take into consideration when
23	evaluating witnesses?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#24: Yes.
25	MS. LUZAICH: Mr. Lambert, what do you think about that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#25: As far as --

MS. LUZAICH: I know. I got to way better in my --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#25: I was right there and then bam.

MS. LUZAICH: Well do you agree different people recollect things or see things differently --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#25: Absolutely; yes.

MS. LUZAICH: -- and they therefore remember differently?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#25: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Therefore when two different people describe a set of events for you, if they don't describe them the same, in your mind, does that mean that one of them is necessarily lying?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#25: No. Lying to me is basically an intentional act and if you're mistaken it's not intentional that you just didn't remember it clearly or you just didn't get all the details or whatever. So, that's for me a lie is an intentional act of trying to deceive.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. And do you think that because different people view things differently, they can still appear to be telling the truth when they're not telling the truth or telling a lie when they're not; does that make sense at all?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#25: Kind of.

MS. LUZAICH: Lawyers just ask terrible questions. I mean, can you necessarily tell whether it's a truth or a lie or a mistake?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#25: I don't think you can absolutely tell, no. I mean, you have to use some of your own objective thinking and kind of analyze as much as you can. You know, as a parent, I don't always go face value on everything that I'm told. I know that, you know, I have two children. One will say oh this and the

other one will say that. She really freaked out. The other one will be like well no it really wasn't that bad. You just got to kind of figure out in the middle who's exaggerating a little bit or whatever. A lot of it has to do with personalities, you know, what you said. Raising kids you realize you see -- they're going to react and see things differently even in the same situation.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Allen, lie versus mistake. Do you agree that different people who recollect things differently aren't necessarily lying. They could be mistaken.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: It's possible.

MS. LUZAICH: But in your mind it is possible?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: And do you think that if an adult sees a set of circumstances and a child sees the same they're going to necessarily perceive it the same?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: No, not necessarily.

MS. LUZAICH: So, therefore if they relayed to you later they could be relate different because neither one is necessarily lying?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: Yes. I'm thinking in my mind I pretty much have to see this real time to apply some logic to it to see if it all makes sense.

MS. LUZAICH: What do you mean?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: It's hard to talk about this stuff without really actually seeing the people and what -- their reactions are.

MS. LUZAICH: Absolutely. Okay. My bottom line question to you then is can you listen to kids objectively?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: Well I haven't been around kids for 40 years but I guess so. My youngest is 29.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. If kids get on the stand, are you automatically not going to believe what they have to say just 'cause they're kids?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: No; like I said, I'd have to see their body language and see if it all makes sense.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. You won't automatically believe an adult over child and believe the adult?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: Same thing. I don't think it would make a difference.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think that sometimes people have a reason for telling you what they're telling you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: I think they always have a reason.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. And if somebody is going to tell you a lie, do they have reasons for it sometimes?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: Could be.

MS. LUZAICH: What, for example?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: Well they're scared or they just want it go away. There's all kinds of reasons to lie.

MS. LUZAICH: Has anybody ever told you just what you wanted to hear just so you'd stop asking them questions?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: Yes, my wife.

MS. LUZAICH: Even though it wasn't necessarily true? Okay. And because she did that you're not going to automatically disbelieve everything she tells you in the future; are you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#28: Right; no.

MS. LUZAICH: But you'll remember that. Okay.

Mr. Greenwood, what	about you. L	_ie versus mistake.	Is it possible that
people have reason for not telling	the truth?		

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#30: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: In your mind what might a reason be for not telling the truth?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#30: Just pressure for a perceived reason maybe that's important to them that's not important to somebody else. They think that they have to lie.

MS. LUZAICH: Now clearly somebody can lie just because they're lying and don't want to get in trouble, you would agree with that; right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#30: Correct.

MS. LUZAICH: But are there other reasons as well in your mind?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#30: Sure.

MS. LUZAICH: If two people tell you something that they saw and it's very different even though they saw the same thing, in your mind, were they necessarily lying?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#30: No; I think it is just interpreted what happened differently.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.

Ms. Randolph, when you have the kids at the center, do you ever have situations where they're kind of covering for each other but thinking that they're helping each other?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#33: Yes, that's happened before.

MS. LUZAICH: So, in your mind it's not reason for somebody telling you something that you know isn't entirely true?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#33: Yeah.

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MS. LUZAICH: And how do you react to that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#33: Well I mainly work the front desk. So, I usually just tell them to go to a staff member to handle that. I do, I do. I admit it. And a lot of times the kids they don't want to lose their little group, their little clicks, and so they'll cover up for each other to protect one kid. There's always a reason for lying though. Always.

MS. LUZAICH: Does anybody ever come clean and say, okay, yeah, I lied? PROSPECTIVE JUROR#33: Sometimes, yeah, because they can't hold water. By the end of the week you know what happened.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.

Ms. Mandel, do you think it is embarrassing to have to talk about intimate sexual details?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: Absolutely.

MS. LUZAICH: Do you think it's embarrassing to come into a room full of strangers and have to talk about intimate sexual details?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: Absolutely.

MS. LUZAICH: Is that something that you would take into consideration?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: I don't think this is anyone's natural environment. So, I think adult or child coming in and having to talk about intimate anything has got to be difficult. And watching it is just as difficult.

MS. LUZAICH: If somebody comes in here and talks about things of that nature and they don't act in the same way that you might, is that going to have any effect on you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: It would affect me in knowing that they are being authentic. We wouldn't handle it in the same -- I mean, I don't think we would

-- any of us would handle it the same way and so they're being as authentic as they can. So, I would not anticipate them or expect -- to have expectations to act the same -- anybody to act the same way I would.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. Ms. Smith, what about yourself? People come in here and act or react in a way that you don't think you might, are you going to automatically disbelieve what they have to say?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: No.

MS. LUZAICH: Would you agree that different people react differently to certain circumstances?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Have you ever seen anybody laugh at a funeral? It's not appropriate but that's how they deal with pain?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: I've never seen it personally.

MS. LUZAICH: Have you heard about then?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: There was a movie about it.

MS. LUZAICH: But do you see what I mean?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Different people react differently.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: So, they don't act the way you would that's okay?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#41: Yeah, because, I mean, like when a person dies sometimes they expect for a person to react a certain way with a lot of crying and a lot of grief and some people will just grieve in their own way.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. You probably all thought that I forgot about you. I have not. I promise. Guess what, Ms. Fried.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: Do I have to stand?
2	MS. LUZAICH: No, no, you absolutely do not. All right. Ms. Fried, while
3	you're sitting down, what about you? You don't have kids?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: No, no children.
5	MS. LUZAICH: Kids are going to come in here and testify. Can you evaluate
6	the testimony of kids the same as you would adult witnesses?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: Yeah.
8	MS. LUZAICH: You wouldn't automatically believe an adult over a child
9	simply because they're an adult?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: No.
11	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that kids sometimes have a way of explaining
12	things that may not make sense to you?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: Well yeah. I mean, I think everybody has their
14	own way of explaining any experience that they have that may not make sense to
15	anybody.
16	MS. LUZAICH: And you won't automatically disbelieve 'em
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: No.
18	MS. LUZAICH: just because of that?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: No.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it is harder for a child to disclose abuse than
21	for an adult?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: Yes; I think it's hard for both parties but more so
23	for a child.
24	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Why would it be hard in your mind for an adult?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: Well because it's an embarrassing humiliating

situation and, you know, it's just -- it depends on the person I think. If you're, you know, an introvert and you internalize things that happen to you you're just going to back it on down and you're not going to say anything. But if you're, you know, more outspoken and more comfortable you might tell other -- you know, you will tell other people.

MS. LUZAICH: Do you think it's necessarily somebody who's outspoken or comfortable that would tell?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: Well no, no.

MS. LUZAICH: It's possible that somebody that's outspoken and comfortable might not tell?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: Yeah. I mean, it really just depends. I really think it's just from person to person. It really depends.

MS. LUZAICH: And can you keep an open mind when you hear from all the witnesses?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#50: Yeah.

MS. LUZAICH: Thank you. Mr. Bocage, did I get that right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#48: Yeah.

MS. LUZAICH: What do you think? Do you think that it is hard for a child to disclose abuse?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#48: I think that you would have to really focus -- if I'm on the jury I'll be focusing on the child in total concentration on what that child is saying, looking at his demeanor, looking at the expression, and I still think it would be a thing that you, as an individual, would have to make up in your mind do you or do you not believe that child.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Would you agree that all kids are different?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#48: Absolutely.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Would you agree that all people are different?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#48: Absolutely.
4	MS. LUZAICH: What makes kids different?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#48: Again, I think it's they are violent that they
6	came up in. And also I think the juror should be able to understand that
7	environment also.
8	MS. LUZAICH: When you say understand that environment, what do you
9	mean?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#48: Well say if you had a minority child and you're a
11	minority and you was living in that environment, I think you would have maybe a little
12	different perspective on that kind of bringing up say if he wasn't.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Well do you think that all similarly situated families raise their
14	kids this the same?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#48: No.
16	MS. LUZAICH: Would you agree that pretty much all families raise their kids
17	differently?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#48: Absolutely.
19	MS. LUZAICH: And if you don't agree with the way kids are being raised, is
20	that going to affect how you view those kids?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#47: I don't know; yeah, some I'm sure some will be emotional, some won't. So, every little factor can make a -- change your mind, you know.

MS. LUZAICH: What if they're not emotional; is that going to matter to you? PROSPECTIVE JUROR#47: It would -- it might. You never know.

MS. LUZAICH: How?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#47: I don't know. Maybe they -- I don't know. It just might not. You think they would be. So, maybe it's a perception you have and you think they would be or wouldn't be, you know.

11	is it basically teaches all religions. She's equivalent of a Sunday school teacher
12	but teaches the basis of all religions.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think that well if you listen to kids then
14	families don't aren't involved in that in any way, is that going to have any affect on
15	you?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#47: No.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Would you agree that different people perceive the same set
18	of circumstances differently?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#47: Yes.
20	MS. LUZAICH: And therefore they may recollect things differently?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#47: Yes.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Mr. Torres.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: Yes.
24	MS. LUZAICH: What do you think, kids? Is it harder to disclose?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: Yes, definitely.

MS. LUZAICH: Can you think of reasons why a child might not disclose abuse?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: Fear of any repercussions. Maybe fear of, you know, I think, inherent human fear is fear of the unknown. It's better to know what you're up against then what might happen in the future of that stability or the individual that's caring for you is taken away.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. When you say repercussions, what kind of repercussions?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: Increase in the severity of maybe abuse; having that parent, loved one or whoever you look up to maybe being incarcerated for a period of time; being taken away from that parent or adult, things like that.

MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it's possible for a child to be asked about it and still deny it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Why might that happen?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: I think it goes back to the point I made earlier just wanting to maintain that stability in their lives and not want to give it up no matter how bad the situation has gotten.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think sometimes kids try to help each other but it doesn't really turn out to help them?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: Yes, I could see that happening.

MS. LUZAICH: Sometimes kids have good intentions --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: -- but it just doesn't turn out well?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR#45: Yes.

Before I do allow both sides to give you a brief statement of the facts, I'm going to introduce the members of the staff in Department 12 and give you a brief description of what they do.

You have all met Officer Amani already. He's the court marshal in Department 12. He is the person that you will have the most contact with. Throughout this process of selecting a jury and after we do have a jury impaneled, myself, the attorneys, the parties, and the staff in Department 12 with the exception of the Court marshal are not permitted to have any communication with you whatsoever outside of the courtroom. So, if there anything that you'd like to address with the Court I ask that you please do it when we're in the courtroom on the record

in the presence of both parties.

In front of me is the Court Recorder. The Court Recorder is required to take down everything that is being said and done in the courtroom. At some point she'll be called upon by myself to prepare what we call a written transcript which means that she will listen to everything that is said in the courtroom and she will type down a verbatim transcript. So, if you're called upon to respond to the lawyers or to the Court, I ask that you please state your name, the badge number that's been provided to you by the jury commissioner before you do respond to the Court so that we have a clear record of who is speaking at all times.

To my right is the Clerk of the Court, Susan. It's Susan's job to keep the official record. She takes the minutes of the Court; she's also the person that will take charge of all of the evidence when it's introduced at the time of trial.

To her right is Michael. Michael is a licensed attorney in the state of Nevada. He's the law clerk in Department 12 and he assists the Court with legal issues.

With that, I'm going to allow the State of Nevada to introduce themselves. They're going to give you a brief statement of the facts. Both sides will also have the opportunity to give you a list of the witnesses who will be called to testify in this matter. I ask that you pay close attention to the names of the witnesses because at some point I will ask you if you're familiar with any of the witnesses who will be called to testify in this matter.

We represent the State of Nevada, and the State of Nevada in this case has brought charges against the Defendant, Frederick Harris, by way of Information, and all an Information is a piece of paper. To prove these charges to you over the course of the next several days, we're going to be providing you with witness testimony and potentially some evidence.

You will hear about the Defendant between August 2007 through September 2012 being in a relationship with a woman named Lealer Ann Cooks. The Defendant lived with Ms. Cook in a house at 966 Blankenship. Ms. Cooks had guardianship over the five Duke Children. Their names are Taquanda, Taharah, Shabazz, Mahlica, and Victoria. And during that time period they all lived in that house at 966 Blankenship and also during that time period the Defendant physically abused all five children. He is therefore charged with five counts of child abuse, one for each of the Duke children.

You will also hear about the Defendant between October 1<sup>st</sup> 2010 and September 26, 2012 in that same residence sexually abused Taharah Duke, which is the second youngest of the Duke children. He is therefore charged with numerous counts of sexual assault with a child under fourteen and lewdness with a child under 14.

You will also hear about the Defendant sexually abusing the oldest of the Duke children. Her name is Victoria Duke again. This abuse first occurred from

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December 2005 to -- through May -- I'm sorry -- December 2004 through May of 2005 at a house on Trish Lane here in Las Vegas, Nevada. The sexual abuse also occurred several times during August 2007 through December 2011 in various locations including an apartment on Walnut Street here in Las Vegas, at that residence at 966 Blankenship, at St. Andrews Club Apartments in North Las Vegas, and at 1100 Center Street in Henderson. The Defendant is therefore charged with numerous counts of first degree kidnapping, sexual assault with a child under 14, lewdness with a child under 14, sexual assault with a child under 16, sexually motivated coercion, administration of a drug to aid in the commission of a crime, sexual assault and battery with intent to commit sexual assault.

You will further hear about the Defendant between August 2007 and December 17, 2011 also being in a relationship with the Duke children's mother, Tina Duke. The Defendant is charged with pandering, sexual assault, living from the earnings of a prostitute, and battery by strangulation for abusing Tina Duke, forcing her into prostitution, and taking her money from his prostitution.

In order to prove these charges to you, we will be calling some of the following witnesses. We will not be calling all of them. We just want you to know all of their names so that you can let us know if you know any of these people. Henderson Police Detective Christopher Aguilar, Lealer Cook, a Custodian of Records for the Clark County Detention Center, a Custodian of Records for Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department Communications and Records, Detective Delacanal at the Henderson Police Department, Mahlica Duke, Shabazz Duke, Taharah Duke, Taquanda Duke, Tina Duke, Victoria Duke. Craig Fabert, he is an investigator with the Clark County District Attorney's office. Michele Fisher. She is a forensic interviewer at the Children's Advocacy Center here in Las Vegas. Dr.

Nan Kufuor, she is a pediatrician. Detective Nicholas Matsen. He works with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. Dr. Neha Mehta. She is a physician. She worked at the Children's Advocacy Center. Dr. Jeff Melchert. He is a detective with the Henderson Police Department. Sholeh Nourbakhsh. She works at Department of Family Services and Child Protective Services. Devon Stokes. She also works at Department of Family Services. Theresa Tibbs who works at Department of Family Services. Cheryl Collie [phonetic]; Vassa Brockaman [phonetic], and Virgil Clark who all work at Department of Family Services, and Rose Smith is a family friend of the Duke children. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you. Ms. Allen.

MS. ALLEN: Yes, thank you. If I may just have one moment.

THE COURT: Of course.

MS. ALLEN: Thank you. I apologize.

Good morning. My name is Betsy Allen and I along with Jonathan MacArthur, who's present, represent Mr. Frederick Harris. If you could stand up. And as the State's stated correctly, there is an Information charging him with in fact all those charges that they listed, however, this is just an Information which means they are just charges.

In addition to any of the State's witnesses that they listed, which we reserve the right to call, we do have some witnesses of our own. I'm going to list them and give a little bit of a description just so you know. The first one is Shakira Bailey, and that is Lealer Cook's -- I think you heard the State mention her name -- that's Lealer Cook's step-daughter. We have Kamilah Bywaters, Hernandez Cooper, and Kenyoni House. And all three of those are individuals work for the Clark County School District and they will be testifying -- they're testifying on behalf

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of the Defense that in fact the children never told them those allegations. They allege -- the children allege they told them these allegations. These three teachers will tell you that that never happened. Custodian of Records from the Clark County School District; Sharday Green, that's my client's step-daughter that he raised. Dorothy Harris, which is his mother; Mary Harris is his ex-wife; Moses Harris is his son; Dr. Anita Gondy who saw and treated two of the girls approximately about a year and a half ago; Dr. Emmanuel Nwapa who is a psychiatrist who treated Victoria for psychiatric issues. Any of the CPS records -- people that the State named, Michele Fisher, Sholeh Noubakhsh, Devon Stokes, Bobbie Tibbs, Shelly Warbush.

In addition to that, the State -- I apologize -- the Defense will be calling Michael Loving. He is actually a Metro officer who took a purported DV report from Tina Dukes. And my investigator, Harris Mayo. He's a former Metro cop who now works for Nevada Investigative Group.

We look forward to showing all of you that end up lucky enough to sit in the box that Mr. Harris is not guilty as per his entry at the beginning of this case and that in fact this was a simple revenge tactic on behalf of --

MS. LUZAICH: Objection; this is not opening statement.

THE COURT: Sustained.

MS. ALLEN: Thank you. I'm finished.

THE COURT: Thank you.

Okay. At this time, Ladies and gentlemen, the clerk is going to call the roll of the panel of prospective jurors. When your name is called if you'd please say present or here.

THE COURT CLERK: Thank you, Your Honor.

[The Court Clerk calls the roll of the prospective jurors]

THE COURT: Anyone whose name was not called by the Clerk of the Court?

The record will reflect no response from the panel. If you all will please stand and raise your right hand so the clerk can administer the oath.

[The Court Clerk swore the prospective jury panel]
THE COURT: Thank you. You can have a seat.

We're about to commence what is called voir dire examination. The term voir dire means to tell the truth. During this process, you'll be asked questions bearing upon your ability to sit as fair and impartial jurors. To accomplish this result, various questions will be asked of you by myself or counsel for the parties. On occasion, some of these questions will seem somewhat personal. While we do not wish to unnecessarily pry into your personal lives, the questions are necessary so that counsel and the Court can make an intelligent determination as to your capabilities to serve fairly and impartially. I want you to know that myself and the attorneys and all other persons involved in this case are concerned with having this matter tried by jurors who are completely open minded, neutral, objective, and unbiased in their thinking. Wide discretion is vested in the trial judge to the method of examination of jurors. As I stated previously, I will personally conduct the voir dire, but I will give the attorneys the opportunity to participate in this questioning.

It is important that you know the significance of full, complete and honest answers to all the questions we're about to ask you. I caution you not to try to hide or withhold anything which might indicate bias or prejudice of any sort by any of you. Should you fail to answer truthfully or if you hide or withhold anything touching upon your qualifications that fact may tend to contaminate your verdict and subject you to further inquiry even after you're discharged as jurors. Your decision should be based upon all of the evidence presented during the trial and not based

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upon any preconceived prejudice or bias. I will conduct a general voir dire examination of all of you while you are seated in the audience. After those general questions, the clerk will call the first 32 names using the order provided to us by the jury commissioner to fill the jury box.

At some point during the process of selecting a jury, the attorneys for both sides will have the right to ask that a particular person not serve as a juror. These requests are called challenges. There are two types of challenges, challenges for cause and peremptory challenges. A challenge for cause means that as a juror has been excused because his or her answers to some of the voir dire questions indicates that he or she would have a difficult time in giving a fair and impartial hearing to the case. I will ask the attorneys to pass or waive the prospective jurors for a cause challenge when they are done questioning the jury panel. A preemptory challenge means that a juror can be excused from duty without counsel having to give a reason for the excusal. Please do not be offended should you be excused by either of the challenge procedures. They are simply a part of the procedures designed to protect the rights of the parties under our system of government. Again, if you wish to respond to a question individually and in the affirmative, please raise your hand, state your name, and the badge number that's been provided to you by the jury commissioner.

Is there anyone on the panel who has ever been convicted of a felony? The record will reflect no response from the panel.

Is there anyone on the panel who is not a citizen of the United States? The record will reflect no response from the panel.

Is there anyone on the panel who is not a citizen of Clark County, Nevada? The record will reflect no response from the panel.

1	Is there anyone who has such a sympathy, prejudice or bias relating to
2	age, religion, race, gender or national origin that they feel would affect their ability to

9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: I am.
10	THE COURT: Okay. You know him?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Not personally, but I'm aware of him.
12	THE COURT: How?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Previous trial. I was the jury foreman.
14	MR. MCARTHUR: Your Honor
15	THE COURT: Okay. Why don't you come down here and approach the
16	bench and I'll have both attorneys.
17	[Bench conference begins]
18	THE COURT: He's never had a prior trial?
19	MS. ALLEN: No.
20	THE COURT: Okay.
21	MS. ALLEN: Never. Of course.
22	THE COURT: All right. Mr. Newman, Badge number 1?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
24	THE COURT: You served as a juror before?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Jury foreman on his previous trial.

1	THE COURT: He's never been tried before, ever.	
2	MS. ALLEN: Ever.	
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: You were his attorney.	
4	MS. ALLEN: No.	
5	THE COURT: So, you recognize Ms. Allen?	
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Her and him. I recognize the names of the five	
7	children.	
8	THE COURT: I'm sorry. What?	
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: I recognize the name of the five children as	
10	well as you this morning.	
11	THE COURT: Okay. When did you	
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: This was probably about four years back,	
13	maybe five years back.	
14	MS. ALLEN: What were the charges?	
15	THE COURT: What were the charges?	
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Sexual abuse of children.	
17	MS. ALLEN: Are you sure it wasn't Cecil Hall.	
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Uh	
19	MS. ALLEN: Bald guy, Cecil Hall.	
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: I don't know if he's involved.	
21	MS. ALLEN: He had four or five kids. It was in front of Judge Togliatti.	
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Togliatti.	
23	MS. ALLEN: You guys acquitted him?	
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.	
25	MS. ALLEN: It's Cecil Hall.	

1	THE COURT: Okay.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: It's not this guy. Okay.
3	THE COURT: All right. So you understand that's not this guy.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Okay. Sorry about that.
5	THE COURT: Okay. So, it kind of sounds like you recognize Ms. Allen?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
7	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about
8	MS. ALLEN: I'm like
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Sorry.
10	THE COURT: Okay. I know we all just sort of panicked because all right.
11	He's never been tried he's never been in a jury trial before.
12	MS. ALLEN: Yeah, no, never.
13	THE COURT: Okay. So, you understand that?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Okay Yes.
15	THE COURT: So, you're thinking of somebody else?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Apparently, yes.
17	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that that would affect your ability to be
18	fair and impartial in this case?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: No.
20	THE COURT: Okay. So, we've clarified it enough for you?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
22	THE COURT: And you believe us that it wasn't him?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.
24	THE COURT: Okay. And you can continue to sit on this panel?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes.

1	THE COURT: Okay. You can go back to your seat, but if I could have the
2	lawyers stay here. Thank you. Okay.
3	MS. ALLEN: Oh, my God.
4	THE COURT: I know. I don't even know what to say.
5	MS. ALLEN: Heart attack; I'm like what.
6	MR. MACARTHUR: I think we just inform the jury that he's never been tried
7	before.
8	THE COURT: Is everyone okay with me that saying that the juror was
9	mistaken?
10	MR. MACARTHUR: He recognized her not him.
11	THE COURT: Yeah.
12	MS. ALLEN: Yeah, that's fine.
13	THE COURT: Well now I get the next question. Does he recognize any of
14	the lawyers. We've already been through that.
15	MS. ALLEN: That was Taleen Pankdukt and [indiscernible]. That's fine.
16	THE COURT: Okay. Were you the prosecutor?
17	MS. ALLEN: No, it was Taleen. It was her case.
18	THE COURT: All right. So, everyone's okay with me just saying that the jurc
19	recognized you but it clearly was not this
20	MS. ALLEN: Correct.
21	THE COURT: it wasn't this particular person. It was another case.
22	MS. ALLEN: Yes, that's fine.
23	MS. LUZAICH: And admonish him not to talk about it to the other jurors. MR
24	MR. MACARTHUR: That's fine.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.

## [Bench conference -- concluded]

THE COURT: Okay. Ladies and gentlemen, Juror number 1, upon further clarification up here, Juror number 1 recognize Ms. Allen as being an attorney in a case that he had previously served as a juror before. So, is there anything about what Juror number 1 would affect anybody's ability to be fair and impartial in this particular case? Okay. And Mr. Newman, I'm just going to ask you not to discuss anything that we discussed up here with your fellow jurors, and you understand that; correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #01: Yes, ma'am.

MR. MACARTHUR: Your Honor, if I may. At the bench there were two parts to that. Permission to approach?

THE COURT: Sure.

## [Bench conference -- begins]

MR. MACARTHUR: We don't want to dispel the perception that he may have been tried before.

MS. ALLEN: Oh, yeah.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. MACARTHUR: Because he's never been --

THE COURT: oh, okay. You don't think -- all right. That's fine.

MS. ALLEN: Yeah, because he's never been trial ever.

MR. MACARTHUR: This is his first felony charge.

THE COURT: Okay.

MS. ALLEN: No; it's not his first felony charge. He's never been tried.

MR. MACARTHUR: This is his first felony charge.

THE COURT: Well I don't want to --

1	MS. LUZAICH: No; it's not his first felony charge. He's never been to trial.
2	THE COURT: I just kind of
3	MR. MACARTHUR: I'm unaware of this.
4	THE COURT: But I'm okay with me saying he's never been tried.
5	MS. ALLEN: He's never been tried
6	MS. LUZAICH: He's never been tried to a jury.
7	MR. MACARTHUR: Okay.
8	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
9	[Bench conference concluded]
10	THE COURT: Also I just want to make it clear that Mr. Harris has never beer
11	tried to a jury for anything. So, clearly Mr. Newman just he recognized Ms. Allen
12	and that was the connection.
13	Okay. Are there anyone else that's acquainted with the Defendant in
14	this matter? The record will reflect no response from the panel.
15	Anyone familiar with the defense attorneys other than what you've told
16	us, Mr. Newman. Anyone else that's familiar with the defense attorneys? Okay.
17	Right here. Your name and badge number.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR#40: Kathleen Smith, Badge number 40.
19	THE COURT: And who are you familiar with?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #40: Jonathan MacArthur.
21	THE COURT: Okay. And how do you know him?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #40: I know him from when he was running for
23	Justice of the Peace and as well I work at the court house. I work at the information
24	desk so I know a lot of the attorneys that come to the courtroom.

THE COURT: Okay. Is there anything about that that would affect your ability

to be fair and impartial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #40: No.

THE COURT: Okay. Anything about the fact that you're an employee here in the courthouse that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #40: No.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. Ms. Smith, do you know any of the other attorneys?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #40: I've seen her before, you know.

THE COURT: Okay. Do you mean Ms. Allen?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #40: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. And how about the prosecutors?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #40: No, I don't recognize 'em.

THE COURT: Okay. All right. Thank you. Anyone else that's familiar with the defense attorneys? The record will reflect no response from the panel.

MR. MACARTHUR: Your Honor, I'm sorry. What was the number associated?

THE COURT: Forty. Okay. Are there any you who are acquainted with the Deputy District Attorneys that have been assigned to prosecute this matter? Okay. The record will reflect no response from the panel.

The District Attorney's office employs many deputies and other personnel. Is there anyone on the panel who has such a close relationship with either the District Attorney, Mr. Steve Wolfson, his deputies or other members of his staff that you feel might affect your ability to serve as a fair and impartial juror in this particular case? The record will reflect no response from the panel.

Are there any of you on the panel who are acquainted with any of the

witnesses whose names were previously mentioned by the Deputy District Attorney or defense counsel? Okay. Go ahead, ma'am. State your name and badge number.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: Badge number 32.

THE COURT: Badge number 32, Helen Stephens.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: Yes.

THE COURT: Do you mind standing up?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: I'm familiar with Dr. Gondy.

THE COURT: Okay. How so?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: I worked at University Medical Center in department of surgery where I was working with her quite frequently.

THE COURT: I can hardly hear you. If you just hold it closer, I might be able to hear you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: I worked at the department of surgery --

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: -- at UMC and Dr. Gondy was there as a R-5, resident five, just before she graduated. I was around her quite often. We're not friends or anything, just work acquaintances.

THE COURT: Anything about that that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: No, I don't believe so, no.

THE COURT: Okay. Well you're the only one who can tell me. Is there anything about the fact that you knew her would affect your ability to be fair and impartial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: No, ma'am, no.

1	THE COURT: When was the last time you worked with her?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: I've been retired seven years.
3	THE COURT: Okay. So, it's been at least seven years since you've seen
4	her?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #32: Yes, yes.
6	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. Thank you very much.
7	Anyone else who is familiar with any of the witnesses? Go ahead.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: Melinda St. Clair, Juror number 14. I think one
9	of the CPS workers, Shelly. I can't remember her last name. I think she got
10	married. It was years ago though.
11	THE COURT: Okay. So, you think you know one of the CPS workers?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: She was a case with my nephew.
13	THE COURT: Okay. What does that mean? Your nephew which would be -
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: I had custody of him and she was the worker
15	on the case.
16	THE COURT: She was your CPS worker?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: No; she was his CPS worker.
18	THE COURT: Okay. But you said you have custody of him?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: I had custody of him, yes.
20	THE COURT: So, there was an open case?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: Yeah, and he was returned to his mother and
22	stuff. But I'm not sure it's the same Shelly. I can't her last name.
23	THE COURT: Okay. How long ago was this?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: It was about seven years ago.
25	THE COURT: Anything about that that would affect your ability to be fair and

1	impartial?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: No.
3	THE COURT: If it is the same Shelly and you recognize her and it's the same
4	one that was a CPS worker for your nephew, is there anything about your
5	experience with her that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial in this case
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: No, no.
7	THE COURT: I mean, you don't even know if it's the same one?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: I'm not sure.
9	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #14: You're welcome.
11	THE COURT: Anyone else? Okay. We have a juror in the back. Your name
12	and badge number, please.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Maria Boulton, Badge number 79.
14	THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Dr. Nwapa. He's seeing my son for some
16	issues.
17	THE COURT: He's treated your son?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Yes.
19	THE COURT: Currently or past?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Currently.
21	THE COURT: Okay. So, your son is currently a patient of that doctor?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Yes.
23	THE COURT: All right. How often?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Like every six months.
25	THE COURT: Anything about that that would affect your ability to be fair and

2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: No.
3	THE COURT: Okay. And you know that you do you have any pending
4	appointments with this doctor?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: I think next month, I believe, for my son.
6	THE COURT: So, next month?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Yes.
8	THE COURT: Is it within the next two weeks?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: No.
10	THE COURT: All right. And how long has he treated your son?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: I think about six months ago.
12	THE COURT: For the first time?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: About twice.
14	THE COURT: So, you've been to see the doctor twice?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Yes.
16	THE COURT: Is your son a minor?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Yes.
18	THE COURT: So, you go in with your son?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Most of the time it's my husband. I just met
20	him once.
21	THE COURT: Okay. You've only met him one time?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: Yes.
23	THE COURT: Anything about this relationship that would affect your ability to
24	be fair and impartial in this case?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: No.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #79: You're welcome.

THE COURT: Anyone else that's familiar with any of the witnesses who will be called to testify in this matter? The record will reflect no further response from the panel.

This case we do expect to last a couple weeks which means we expect it to last through this week and then we expect it to probably go the full week next week. And I know that that's -- I know everybody has busy schedules and you have lives and I know that that's a lot to ask of people to be here for two weeks.

So, my next question is going to be, is there anyone that serving for that amount of time would be such an undue hardship or burden on you such it would make it impossible for you to be here? And let me tell you what the schedule will be so you can think about it before you want to answer. Tomorrow we're starting at 10 o'clock and we'll go till five; Thursday we will be starting at 10:30 and go till five; Friday will be generally 8:30 to five. And then on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays we will generally start at 10:30 unless I tell you otherwise and go to 5 o'clock. Wednesdays and Fridays are what I call more full days and I like to start at 8:30 with the exception of tomorrow. Tomorrow we'll be starting at 10 o'clock. So, I can give you a general overview of what our schedule is. Unless I tell you otherwise, that's what I -- that's the schedule I generally like to adhere to.

So, I'm going to start over here in the jury box. Is there anyone that serving for that amount of time would be such an undue hardship such it would make it impossible for you to be here? Okay. We'll start with Mr. Philips.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: Chad Philips, Juror number 2. I umpire baseball and I have a full schedule for the next two weeks and there's no possible

5	THE COURT: Okay. So, that's what I need to get to. Is that what you do for
6	a living, you umpire baseball games?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: That's correct.
8	THE COURT: At what level?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: High school and college.
10	THE COURT: So, you umpire for UNLV and CSN?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: Lower level college.
12	THE COURT: Well what other teams we have in Vegas besides CSN and
13	UNLV?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: The season hasn't started yet, I'm not exactly
15	sure, but as for high school
16	THE COURT: Okay. But high school baseball going right now; right?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: Yes, ma'am.
18	THE COURT: Okay. And so that's what you do for a living?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: That's correct.
20	THE COURT: Okay. And if you were asked to be here for two weeks well
21	when do the games I guess high school games are in the afternoon; correct?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: Three o'clock, yes.
23	THE COURT: Okay. They start right at three?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: Yep.
25	THE COURT: Okay. So, why don't we get to you said you would if you

1	don't umpire you don't get paid?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: That's correct.
3	THE COURT: Is that what you do full time?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: That's right.
5	THE COURT: You don't have any other job?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: No.
7	THE COURT: Okay. If you missed umpiring for the next couple weeks,
8	would you be able to meet your financial obligations?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: No.
10	THE COURT: Are you married?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: I'm engaged.
12	THE COURT: Okay. So, you're the only breadwinner in your home?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: My fiancé makes very little money.
14	THE COURT: Okay. So, you live together?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: Yes.
16	THE COURT: Okay. What does she do?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: She works for Spirit Airlines.
18	THE COURT: Okay. But you don't believe you'd be able to meet your
19	financial obligations if you were required to be here?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: I don't believe so. It would be very difficult.
21	THE COURT: How many games do you umpire a day? Is it every day?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: Well this next couple weeks is the busiest
23	portion of the schedule and I have several out of town games which pay very good
24	because I get paid to travel.

THE COURT: Oh, so you actual travel out of town as well?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #002: Yeah. And I've already had to take today and tomorrow off so -- I mean, the schedule is already made through May -- through April, I mean. I'm sorry.

THE COURT: Okay, sir. Thank you. Thank you for being here. Anyone else in the box? You can just pass it on down. Ma'am, you in the red shirt. I like to kind of go in order. So, do you want to respond to that question? I just like to go in order It's easier for me to keep track.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: I'm an independent contractor.

THE COURT: Name and badge number.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Oh, I'm sorry. Jeneen Miller.

THE COURT: Badge number 7.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Seven, yeah.

THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: I'm an independent contractor and if I don't work I don't get paid.

THE COURT: What do you do?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: I'm a massage therapist in a casino.

THE COURT: Okay. If you're -- when do you work? What are your hours?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

THE COURT: Okay. So, you'd only have to -- I mean, you understand we're -- the courthouse is closed on the weekends.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Right.

THE COURT: Okay. Do you work during the day, at night?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: On Friday I work during the day and I'm also

1	on call at Southern Highlands.
2	THE COURT: Okay. So, how would it affect you financially if you were aske
3	to be here during the day?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: I'm the breadwinner of the family so it would
5	affect us.
6	THE COURT: All right. Would you able to pay your bills?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: No; not for two weeks.
8	THE COURT: Okay. You would be unable to meet you won't be able to
9	pay your rent?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: My mortgage.
11	THE COURT: Okay. Are you married?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: I'm married.
13	THE COURT: Is your husband employed?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Yes; he's a massage therapist.
15	THE COURT: Okay. And without your income
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Right.
17	THE COURT: All right. But you said you're independent contractor. Do you
18	get paid a certain amount?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: I only get paid per massage. So, if I don't
20	make any massages I do not get paid.
21	THE COURT: Okay. I understand that. But what I'm trying to get at, do you
22	know how much money you're going to make every week?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: It's up and down, but it's pretty good. And if
24	don't work I
25	THE COURT: Okay. Let me ask you this. Do you have appointments the

1	next two weeks?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: No. It's cold sales.
3	THE COURT: Okay.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Except for the on call and Southern
5	Highlands.
6	THE COURT: All right. But you're telling me if you're required to be here you
7	won't be able to make your mortgage?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Exactly.
9	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #007: Thank you.
11	THE COURT: Go ahead.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #008: Christina Quattrone, Juror number 8. I am a
13	journalism student at CSN full time. I have midterms coming up on Monday and I'm
14	also acting manager editor of a staff of 15 students. So, our next pieces are due on
15	the 2 <sup>nd</sup> . So, I have to edit their grammar mechanics and everything. My editor in
16	chief she could help me, but most of the kids come to me.
17	THE COURT: I'm more concerned about your midterms.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #008: Yeah.
19	THE COURT: When are you taking those?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #008: On Monday and on Wednesday next week.
21	And I just accepted an internship for Disneyworld so I can't miss school or else that
22	internship could be in jeopardy.
23	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. Anyone else on that back row? Anyone
24	else in the box? Go ahead. Ms. Sinclair, Badge number 14. St. Clair. I'm sorry.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes. Melinda St. Clair, Badge 14. I'm a

1	caretaker for my stepfather. He has chemo. He has appointments on Monday and
2	he has another one on Friday.
3	THE COURT: This Friday?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: The 31 <sup>st</sup> and then on the 4 <sup>th</sup> .
5	THE COURT: So, is that next Friday?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Next Monday and next Friday.
7	THE COURT: Okay. What time on Monday?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I believe it's 11:30.
9	THE COURT: What if you can't take him?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: It's a really important appointment.
11	THE COURT: I don't doubt it for a minute that it's important. Okay. I clearly
12	think that's important.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: There's no one else to take him.
14	THE COURT: So, if you're not able to take him he misses his chemo
15	treatment?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: My sister has to come from Utah to bring him
17	THE COURT: Okay. Would you be able to make those accommodations if
18	you're required to be here?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I can if I have to but
20	THE COURT: Okay.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: he basically wants me to take him because
22	I have all the information.
23	THE COURT: Sure. I understand that. But if you are required to be here
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I could be here.

THE COURT: -- would you be able to make other arrangements?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I can make arrangements, yes.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. I appreciate you being here. Anyone else in the box? Okay. I'm moving over to the left side. Anyone on this first row? Okay. If you don't mind -- it's easier if you stand up so I can see you better.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: Hello. My name is Cordero Gomez, Juror number 29.

THE COURT: Good morning.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: Good morning. I work at the DMV. I just got that job. I'm still on probation. My days off are Tuesday and Wednesday so luckily it fell on a day off. But I am married. THE COURT: You work for the state of Nevada.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: I work for the state of Nevada.

THE COURT: You get paid if you're here.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: I do get paid if I'm here?

THE COURT: No, I'm asking you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: Oh. Sorry. No; it's still furlough and I don't get annual until I've been there six months so I wouldn't get paid time off.

THE COURT: Okay. So, how would this affect you financially?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: It would be pretty severe. I don't think I would be able to make my rent such as it is.

THE COURT: Okay. And your wife doesn't work at all?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: She works part time but it's student work at HR at UNLV which isn't very much and very few hours, and we have two kids.

1	We're married and no support from grandma besides babysitting occasionally.
2	THE COURT: No support from who?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: Grandma, my mother. So, like our extended
4	her parents and my parents they don't like give us any money or anything like that
5	So, we're pretty independent.
6	THE COURT: Okay. That's a good thing; right?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: Yeah, it's a great thing.
8	THE COURT: Okay.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: But for the record, I would love to do jury duty.
10	I just don't think that as of right now I would be financially able.
11	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. I appreciate that, sir.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #029: No problem.
13	THE COURT: Thank you for being here. If you can just pass it down to your
14	next fellow juror. Ms. Stephens, Badge number 32.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #032: No, Valeria McIver, Badge 31.
16	THE COURT: Okay. I'm sorry. Go ahead.
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #031: I actually attend full time at UNLV.
18	THE COURT: You're a full time UNLV student?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #031: Yes.
20	THE COURT: What are you studying?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #031: Accounting.
22	THE COURT: Where are you in the semester?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #031: What do you mean?
24	THE COURT: Would you be able to miss two weeks of school?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #031: No; I have midterms next week.

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THE COURT: Midterms next week. Okay. Of course I get a bunch of students when midterms are due. Okay. What year are you in school? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #031: It's my junior year. THE COURT: All right. So, you have one more year till you --PROSPECTIVE JUROR #031: For my bachelors. THE COURT: So, are you taking pretty much 400 level -- is that what they call 'em still? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #031: Yes. THE COURT: Okay. All right. Thank you. Thank you for being here. Anyone else? On this first row, first row. Okay. We're going backward. PROSPECTIVE JUROR #027: I'm Roselinda Daggett, 27. And my husband had a barrage of tests last week. We go to the doctor Monday and he may have to have surgery for -- on his heart, for his heart. So, I'm worried about that. I don't know if I'd be able to be here and take care of him. PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: Your Honor, my name is Patrick Hoover,

Badge number 34. My hardship is not financial but physical.

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THE COURT: Okay.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: I'm a recovering cancer patient and as a side
effect of some of the treatments I've had have been very difficult for me to sit those
kind of hours. And even in a shorter trial, I require breaks very frequently.
THE COURT: Okay. Kind of tell what. Can you give me a little bit more?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: Well the
THE COURT: The kind of treatment that you had was it
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: It was radiation treatment for prostate cancer.
THE COURT: Oh, okay.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: And the side effects to
THE COURT: I'm sorry that you have to tell me that. I apologize.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: That's okay. The side effects of the treatmen
is that I have to use the restroom quite often.
THE COURT: Okay. Are you okay right now?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: I'm fine.
THE COURT: All right. You'll let me know if
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: And it's really not I mean, it's just the
longevity of this particular trial. I would like to maybe get on maybe a short trial, but
this one is just going to be difficult and the breaks is another concern that I have.
THE COURT: How often if we took hourly breaks.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: Hourly would probably be fine.
THE COURT: So, if we took hourly breaks you could be on the panel?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: Well I wouldn't say for the duration of this tria
but for a shorter trial I would imagine I could do that.

THE COURT: Okay. Why do you think the duration would affect you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: Well it's just besides the breaks it's just hard on me to sit that long --

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: -- for long periods of time.

THE COURT: How long are you post-treatment?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: I'm five years. I still have five years to go.

THE COURT: What does that mean?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: Well it's a ten year process where testing happens.

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: Post --

THE COURT: So, you're not currently under any type of treatment?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: Other than blood tests, no.

THE COURT: Okay. Are you just tired? What is it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #034: It's tired and it's just hard, physically hard on me to sit for those long hours at a time without being able to get up and move around.

THE COURT: Okay. All right. Thank you, sir. Thank you for being here.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: Hi. My name is Evan Casey. My badge number is 35. I'm also a private contractor. I work as a stylist model and producer for an all purpose production company here in town as well as individually teaching classes for different studios. And for me, I have to be able to work during the day in our office and I also have to be able to be available in the evenings, but our call times are about 4 o'clock and for me to get out of downtown to places on The Strip I need to be, I wouldn't be able to do those. I'm the only person. I live alone. I'm a

single woman and I can't pay my rent if I'm here.

THE COURT: Okay. So, you don't get paid if you're not working and missing two weeks --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: And additionally I have an appointment with a graduate advisor.

THE COURT: It's okay; okay, honey.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: I'm sorry. As soon as I heard that it was something to do with children, I started shaking. I have a long history with Child Protective Services and the state and I get very emotional.

THE COURT: All right. But it pretty much sounds to me like it would be a -- we don't need to go into that.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: I'm very sorry.

THE COURT: It would be a financial burden such that you couldn't be here?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: Yes, for me it would be.

THE COURT: Okay. I'm sorry.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: No, I'm very sorry.

THE COURT: Are you okay?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: Yes, I'm fine. I'm so sorry. I did not mean to do that. I also have an appointment with a graduate's advisor this week that I've waited over a month and a half for.

THE COURT: Are you a student too?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: I actually am trying to get back into school. I have two degrees and I'm trying to finish so I can work toward my Ph.D in history.

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: I can't be a model forever; right?

1	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #035: Thank you.
3	THE COURT: You can pass it down. Anyone else over here?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #038: Vivian Jones, 38. I'm a heart survivor and if
5	somebody else cries I will cry.
6	THE COURT: That's okay.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #038: And I'm on Coumadin.
8	THE COURT: I don't want you to cry so
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #038: Okay.
10	THE COURT: It sounds like you're a heart survivor. Okay. Are you in good
11	health?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #038: I spent a lot of time in the hospital and doctors
13	because of the Coumadin and I have a mechanical valve, and I just don't think I'm
14	healthy enough to do it.
15	THE COURT: You don't believe you're healthy enough to do it?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #038: Not enough to miss my appointments and not
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18	THE COURT: You're currently under medical care?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #038: Yes, after open heart surgery, yeah, I have to
20	be on Coumadin so I have to go once a week, once a month depending on how my
21	levels are.
22	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you, Ms. Jones. Thank you for being here.
23	Anyone else on that front row? I'm going to get to you in the back. I promise I'll get
24	to you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: Hello. Diana Hayes, Juror 44. I travel

extensively for work and after this particular jury was selected and I agreed, my company has booked me a trip. I'm a 6:30 flight tomorrow to New York City for the remainder of the week.

THE COURT: What do you do?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I'm a regional manager in retail.

THE COURT: And so if you're here you can't make your plane; right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: That's accurate.

THE COURT: Okay. How would that affect you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: This obviously would affect our company. They've already paid for the flight. I did bring a boarding pass and the itinerary.

THE COURT: But they knew you had jury duty?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: They did not know I had jury duty. I already -- I was scheduled for the last week of February. I postponed that because that was a training meeting in Akron, and then I re-scheduled for this week and then they -- a booking came up after that.

THE COURT: You knew. I mean, obviously you knew and you could have told your employer?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: I could not have told my employer. They booked it -- I did not know they were doing that. It's a training. It's a one time thing.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #044: No; I -- it's the only time they do the training. It's in New York. It's with a vendor. And so I am the one that doesn't get the training. It's not that I am giving the training. I'm getting the training.

THE COURT: Okay. All right. Thank you. Thank you for being here.

Okay. The left on the second row. Anyone on the left on the second row. Okay. On the right second row. Okay. On the left third row. Go ahead, sir.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I'm Ruben Hernandez-Diaz, 81. I am on call at Del Taco. I work Friday, Saturday and Sunday and I will be at Sands April 1st, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>.

THE COURT: You will be where April 1st?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Oh, at Sands Expo.

THE COURT: Okay. How would that effect -- I mean, everybody here I assume has something they have to do every day for the next two weeks. Okay. So, what I'm trying to get at, do you have things that it would be impossible for you to be here?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Well the people I work, I'm employed there. So they need someone to work.

THE COURT: Okay. So, if you're not there somebody else will have to take your place; right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: I do.

THE COURT:	Do you work?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: I do. I leave work to go get him. That's my lunch break basically.

9	THE COURT: What'd you do in the restaurant?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #003: A cook.
11	THE COURT: Okay. And you've been able to understand everything I've
12	said.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #003: Yeah, I understand but I don't fully understand
14	the conversations but [indiscernible] I can't
15	THE COURT: Okay. Is there anything that you don't understand, you'll raise
16	your hand and let me know so we can clarify it for you; correct?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #003: Okay.
18	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you, sir.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #003: Okay.
20	THE COURT: All right. Go ahead, sir. Your name and badge number. Go
21	head.
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #022: My name's Alexi Pumarejo, Badge number
23	22.
24	THE COURT: Okay.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #022: I don't know if this is going to be a follow-up

question but I don't know that I can be impartial in this case. 1 THE COURT: Okay. Why don't I just have you -- I'm going to have you 2 approach the bench. This is Mr. Pumarejo, Badge number 22. Oh yeah of course. 7 MS. ALLEN: Okay. I just didn't [indiscernible]. 8 THE COURT: Okay. The record will reflect a juror is present, Badge number 9 22 and all four lawyers are present. You indicated you didn't think you could be 10 impartial? 11 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: I don't think I can. 12 THE COURT: Because? 13 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: I never suffered child abuse myself 14 but --15 THE COURT: Okay. Come on here so everybody can --16 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: I've had very close relations who'd 17 had so I've dealt with a lot of that. 18 THE COURT: Okay. Who? 19 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: A former girlfriend, fiancé that I was 20 with for five years 21 THE COURT: Okay. 22 PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: Who suffered extensive child abuse 23 and rape and such. 24 THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: And so the entire time I was kind of dealing with that and with her issues, and just seeing that I don't know that I can -- that I could be completely impartial and just listen to the facts. It would be hard for me.

THE COURT: But you know what's happening. Your life is different than what's going on in this courtroom?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: I understand; yes, of course I understand that.

THE COURT: Are you a person that would able to separate that and judge this case solely upon what you see and hear in the courtroom?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: I could certainly try, but what I'm saying is I'm not -- if the question is whether you know that you can be completely impartial --

THE COURT: Sure.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: -- I don't know that I can be, but I can try but --

THE COURT: Who are you going to be unfair to?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: The Defendant.

THE COURT: Okay. And so just because the Defendant's sitting there and the charges you don't think you can be fair to him?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: I don't know. I'm not sure. I mean, I want to be completely honestly. So, I'm not sure that I can be. To be honest, when I first heard the prosecution's statement of the charges, I --

THE COURT: You know they're only allegations though; correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: I understand fully and intellectually,

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THE COURT: And you understand as he sits here today he is innocent; correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: Of course. That's our system.

THE COURT: All right. But that differs from your personal beliefs because of the charges?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: Yes; I just think it would be -- it might be difficult for me to -- after hearing all the evidence to be fully impartial. It's just a feel that I wanted to make aware and make the Court aware of.

THE COURT: So, you can't set aside your personal experiences?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #022: I don't know that I can.

THE COURT: Okay, sir. Thank you. Go have a seat.

[Bench conference -- concluded]

THE COURT: Okay. Anyone else that wishes to respond? Okay. Officer, yes, someone back there. Go ahead. You can stand up and start talking. I can hear you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: I'm Rochelle Herst, Badge 54. I potentially have a bias to you about a bias.

THE COURT: You want to approach the bench?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. It's Rochelle Herst, Badge number 54. If I can have the attorneys join me. The officer will escort you up here.

[Bench conference -- begins]

THE COURT: Okay. The record will reflect -- just a minute -- Ms. Herst is present, Badge number 54 and all four lawyers are present. Go ahead.

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: I'm a case worker with Desert Regional Center working in the children's division. So, I've had children with CPS and adults and kids with disabilities. So, I just thought I'd let you know --

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: -- of my bias.

THE COURT: What's your bias?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Well like he probably did it, but you know, I could be proven wrong but --

THE COURT: Okay. Well no one's here to prove you wrong. First, Desert Regional; what is that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Desert Regional Center. We work for the state agency that works with children with disabilities and adults from zero to death.

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: A case worker for the last 16 years there.

THE COURT: Okay. What I'm concerned about is you said I think he probably did it.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Yeah.

THE COURT: You've already formed an opinion?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: I have.

THE COURT: Based on what?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Just working with children for many years and children don't usually say things that they don't mean.

THE COURT: Okay. So, regardless of what goes on in here --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: I could be persuade
THE COURT: Well here's the thing. We're not here to change I mean,
we're not here to change an opinion you've already formed. We need people that
have not formed any opinions.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Right.
THE COURT: Have you formed an opinion?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Just by the little bit I've heard, yes.
THE COURT: Okay. And you understand you haven't heard anything? You
haven't heard any evidence.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Just [indiscernible] but no, right.
THE COURT: Okay. Do you understand as he sits here today he's innocent?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Yes.
THE COURT: But you don't agree with that?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: No.
THE COURT: Okay. So, our system says he's innocent. Your personal
belief doesn't accept that.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Just by looking at the children, yes.
THE COURT: Okay. Have you shared that opinion with anyone else on the
panel?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: No.
THE COURT: And I'm going to order you not to discuss these opinions or
anything that's discussed up here with any of the members of the jury panel.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Absolutely.
THE COURT: And you'll comply with that; correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #054: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.

[Bench conference -- concluded]

THE COURT: Anyone else that wishes to address the Court? Okay. We have someone in the back row. You can stand up. I can hear you, sir.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: My name's Anthony Bonde, 123. I have a tendency to prejudge. So, I don't think it would be fair to the families involved and I wouldn't want myself to be, you know, to make a decision on my -- based on my prejudgment.

THE COURT: All right. You've made a -- you haven't heard any evidence; correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: No, I haven't.

THE COURT: And you've made a judgment based on what?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: From what I've heard so far.

THE COURT: Okay. So, you understand what the attorneys say is not evidence. It can't even be considered by you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Okay.

THE COURT: Can you accept that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: I can accept that. I just want to be fair and let you know the type of person that I am, that I do prejudge people. If I was in their shoes I would want to know about me also.

THE COURT: Okay. But can you follow the rules in this courtroom? And one of the rules I'm going to tell you is can you keep an open mind, can you wait until forming opinion until you have heard all of the evidence from both sides and after you've been instructed on the law by myself?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: I would definitely try, yes.

THE COURT: Okay. You can think about it. But what I'm asking you to do is listen to everything that's presented by both sides --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: True.

THE COURT: And then it's my job to instruct you on the law that applies and then to follow the law and apply it to what you've heard in the courtroom. Are you a person that can do that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: I will definitely try, yes.

THE COURT: Are you a person that can do that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: I believe so.

THE COURT: Okay. And you haven't formed any opinions today; correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: So far I have, yes.

9	THE COURT: Okay. And you understand as this gentleman sits here today,
10	he's an innocent man; do you understand that?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Yes.
12	THE COURT: Okay. So, he deserves a jury panel that actually believed not
13	only believed not only recognizes that but also believes in it and believes in our
14	system, that as he sits here today he is presumed innocent; do you understand
15	that?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Yes.
17	THE COURT: And do you believe that?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Pretty much; yes, I do. Okay.
19	THE COURT: Will you accept that?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Yes, I will.
21	THE COURT: Okay. Does that conflict with your personal opinions? I mean,
22	everybody here, everybody in this whole room, everybody in the whole United
23	States of America is they're accused of a crime is entitled to that same presumption;
24	do you agree with that?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Yes.

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THE COURT: And do you agree with the fact that this gentleman is entitled to

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Yes.

THE COURT: You're entitled to it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Yes.

THE COURT: I'm entitled to it, he's entitled to it; do you agree with that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Yes, I do.

THE COURT: Okay. And you'll follow the law as given to you by the Court? PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. And I'm never going to tell you to let your personality traits interfere with what the law is?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Okay.

THE COURT: Can you do that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR NUMBER #123: Sure.

THE COURT: And can you wait until you've heard all of the evidence and after being instructed on the law before reaching a conclusion as to what the appropriate results should be?
