1	THE COURT: Okay. And you know what – you know what the allegations
2	are in this case, correct?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
4	THE COURT: 'Cause you heard the District Attorney tell you all yesterday
5	what the allegations were, correct?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Right, yes.
7	THE COURT: And knowing what the allegations are do you think that you wil
8	be able to sit and listen to those types of facts again?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
10	THE COURT: Okay. Even though you know it's going to be difficult?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes, I think I could. I don't want to but I will.
12	THE COURT: No. I would be more concerned if you said you wanted to.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yeah.
14	THE COURT: Okay. You know, I don't think anyone wants to listen –
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
16	THE COURT: to that kind of stuff, but -
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Right.
18	THE COURT: you know that somebody has to, right?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Right.
20	THE COURT: And if you were called upon, you would do that?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
22	THE COURT: Okay. And you don't think that the fact that you've done this
23	before would interfere with your ability to be fair and impartial in this case, correct?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Correct.
25	THE COURT: Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family member or

1	friend, ever been the victim of a crime?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
3	THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I was – my house was broken into. I've had
5	three cars stolen. I've been shot at by gang members.
6	THE COURT: Oh, I'm sorry.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: And that's about it.
8	THE COURT: Okay. In those cases were the police called?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
10	THE COURT: And I'm assuming that all happened in Long Beach?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
12	THE COURT: Okay. Were you happy with the way it was handled by the
13	police?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Very.
15	THE COURT: All right. Anything about those experiences that would affect
16	your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.
18	THE COURT: Okay. Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family
19	member or friend ever been the victim of a sexual assault, sexual abuse or domestic
20	violence?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Not to my knowledge.
22	THE COURT: Okay. Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family
23	member or friend ever been accused of a crime?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
25	THE COURT: Can you tell me about that?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I've had three uncles that went to prison.
2	THE COURT: Okay. Why don't you tell me – three uncles?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Three uncles.
4	THE COURT: Dad's, mom's siblings, which?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Mom's, mom's brothers.
6	THE COURT: Mom's siblings?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
8	THE COURT: All three of them were mom's brothers?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
10	THE COURT: Okay. What did they go to prison for?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: One of them – two of them went to prison fo
12	armed robbery and one went to prison for murder.
13	THE COURT: Okay. Was it around the same time or was it –
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No, it was throughout the years. A couple o
15	my uncles were younger and they had been in and out of jail most of their lives.
16	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that that would affect your ability to be
17	fair and impartial in this case?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.
19	THE COURT: Okay. Anything else?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No, that's it.
21	THE COURT: All right. Do you think they were all three treated fairly?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
23	THE COURT: Okay. Would you have a tendency to give more weight or
24	credence or less weight or credence to the testimony of a police officer, simply
25	because he or she is a police officer?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: You know, I really believe I would. I have a great respect for police officers. I've actually applied for the academy of a police officer in Long Beach and passed and was accepted. But my wife kind of talked me out of it, so I wound up turning it down. But I have a great respect for police officers.

THE COURT: Okay. And there's nothing wrong with that. But what my question is if – and I told some of the jurors before – if a police officer comes in and testifies, you're going to know that person is a police officer. They'll either be in their uniform or they're going to tell you what they do for a living. Do you understand that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. So if we have a police officer that comes in and testifies, would you have a tendency to give more weight or credence or less weight or credence to their testimony, simply because they are a police officer?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I have to be honest that I believe I would probably give more.

THE COURT: Okay. So regardless of what they say, just because they're a police officer, their testimony is going to carry more weight and credibility with you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: For the most part yes. I'm not naïve. I know we got some bad cops out there and I know the majority of them are good and they're – they strive to do the best job they can. I've ran into some terrible ones, but I – overall I believe that they're up and up, and I would give them more credibility.

THE COURT: Okay. So if someone walks in, they have a badge and a uniform, they're automatically going to have more credibility with you than someone who is not in a uniform?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Well, I wouldn't say just because they walked

1	in. I would probably have to listen to them and see.
2	THE COURT: Okay. Well, that's what I'm trying to get out.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yeah, right.
4	THE COURT: 'Cause my question is simply because they are police
5	officers –
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.
7	THE COURT: Okay. So simply because a witness is a police officer are they
8	going to get more weight or credibility from you, simply because they're a police
9	officer?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.
11	THE COURT: Okay. So you'll listen to their testimony?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
13	THE COURT: Yes. And you'll judge the credibility based upon the
14	instructions on the law, which the Court will give you?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
16	THE COURT: Okay. So we don't have to worry about if a police officer
17	testifies, you know, they're going to have more credibility with you, simply because
18	they have a badge?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No, not because they have a badge.
20	THE COURT: Okay. So you'll listen to the testimony and the cross-
21	examination and judge their credibility like you would any other witness?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
23	THE COURT: Okay. If you're selected to be on this panel, can you wait in
24	forming your opinion as to the appropriate result to be reached in this case until
25	you've heard all of the evidence and after you've been instructed on the law by

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myself? Can you do that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. Can you think of any reason why you could not be a completely fair and impartial juror, if you were selected to serve?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.

THE COURT: Thank you.

Ms. Luzaich, you can question this juror.

MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.

Good afternoon. Kids, do you think that it is harder for kids to talk about abuse than it would be for grownups?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I don't know if it would be harder. In my opinion it would be just as hard for a grownup to talk about it. But kids, depending on their age, might come under a little more pressure to talk about it or not to talk about it, whereas an adult might be a little more embarrassed.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Can you think of a reason or reasons that kids might not tell somebody that they've been being abused – that they have been abused?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Sure. Some of the reasons would probably be fear for thinking they might have done something wrong. Or fear that something might happen to them or someone they love. Or fear that – just, overall just fear of not being accepted.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think you can listen to the testimony of kids and evaluate that testimony the same as you would any other witness?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes, I could.

MS. LUZAICH: You wouldn't automatically believe an adult over a child, simply because they're an adult?

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MS. LUZAICH: And, you wouldn't automatically believe a child over an adult, simply because they're a child?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.

MS. LUZAICH: If somebody gets on the stand and talks to you about things that they've done that you find to be so incredibly foolish, can you still listen to something that persons says objectively?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: What about individuals that exchange sex for money, do you have an opinion about that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.

MS. LUZAICH: So if somebody gets on the stand and tells you that they have in the past exchanged sex for money, can that individual in your mind still be a victim of sexual assault?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: And can you listen to that person's testimony objectively like you would other people?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: I mean, clearly, you would take that into consideration, but you won't automatically disbelieve everything they say, simply because they told you that they had exchanged sex for money?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No, there's a reason for everything.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. You've sat here for the last two days and heard all the questions that I have been asking. Is there anything that you think you need to tell us about yourself that'll let us know whether you would be a good juror?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Well, I raised four kids and I have ten
grandkids and two great grandkids. I believe I know kids pretty good. I know when
my kids are lying, I know that; and some of my grandkids for the closeness I've beer
with them. But I don't judge them for lying as much as I try to correct them not to do
it again.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Would you consider yourself to be a fair and open-minded person?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: For the most part, yes.

MS. LUZAICH: What would make you not fair and open-minded?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: If it got to a point where I believed that the testimony was absolute truth of one person or another, then I would probably be acceptable to go with that way.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Earlier you said that on the prior case that you sat on, it was gruesome. When you say gruesome, do you mean violent or?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Violent and very sexual oriented.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Well, that's what this case is going to be, very sexual oriented.

POSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I understand that. And like I said earlier, I don't wish to go through that again, but I believe I'm capable of doing it.

MS. LUZAICH: And you would, if selected?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Overall, did you enjoy your experience last time?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.

MS. LUZAICH: Why? Because of the nature of what they talked about?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

1	MS. LUZAICH: Do you remember when that was?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Not exactly, but I believe it was in the late
3	'80s.
4	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. In California?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
6	MS. LUZAICH: And you know the law in California is very different than the
7	law here?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I have no idea what the difference of the law
9	is but I'm sure I'd be instructed.
10	MS. LUZAICH: You will be, which is what I going to. If there is anything that
11	you remember from the law that the Court read to you in that case, will you promise
12	that you will forget it and only follow the law that Court reads you in this case?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I have a hard time remembering last week.
14	MS. LUZAICH: Fortunately, you're going to have a notepad if you sit, so you'
15	get to take down the notes. Is there anything about you that would prevent you from
16	being able to sit in judgment?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No.
18	MS. LUZAICH: And if you listen to all the testimony, see any evidence, if
19	you're convinced beyond a reasonable doubt the Defendant committed the crimes
20	that he is charged with, would you be able to say the word guilty?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I most certainly would.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.
23	The State pass for cause.
24	THE COURT: Okay. The panel is yours.
25	MS. ALLEN: Thank you, Your Honor.

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Okay. Good afternoon, Mr. Lyons. How are you?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Good.
MS. ALLEN: You apparently took your headphones off 'cause you were
tired of listening to all this, is that right?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: For the most part.
MS. ALLEN: I get it. Think my kids feel the same way about me. Do you
have a problem with burden of proof?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No, I don't.
MS. ALLEN: Okay. You said a minute ago that if you heard someone say
something that was the absolute truth, someone comes in here and marches up on
the stand and says the light was absolutely red. You were convinced, totally
convinced that that person was telling the truth. Would you then shut out whatever
other – let's say we have a witness that came in and said the light was absolutely
green.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: No, I wouldn't shut it out. There's many
truths.
MS. ALLEN: Okay. But you understand I'm a little concerned about the
answer you gave a minute ago where you said if someone comes in and I absolutely
believe them, then I'm done. Okay. I – that's it.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Okay.
MS. ALLEN: Do you remember saying something to that affect?

MS. ALLEN: So you understand how that's concerning if – you understand the State goes first and the then defense has a chance to go, right? And so if the State brings in all their witnesses and you absolutely decide before you hear any-

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes, yes.

1	thing from the defense that they're all telling the truth and that's the end of it, you
2	shut out anything that we've had to say, you understand that's concerning?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes, I do understand and I wouldn't shut you
4	out.
5	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you'd just take your headphones off.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Well, I can hear you fine. It's just when I was
7	back there in the corner it's hard to hear.
8	MS. ALLEN: I was kidding. Just giving you a hard time. It's late in the day.
9	Okay. You have a lot of grandkids and great grandkids and there's all kinds of kids
10	at your house?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: I don't have anybody at home right now.
12	But –
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Oh, okay, all right. So it's just you and your wife?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Just – yes.
15	MS. ALLEN: Nice and quiet?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: For the most part.
17	MS. ALLEN: The most part. All right. All your kids finally moved out?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Was it like moved out, came back in, moved out again
20	with some of them?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: One did.
22	MS. ALLEN: One did. There's always one, isn't there?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.
24	MS. ALLEN: Yeah. I always thought I was going to build a one-bedroom
25	house once they're all gone, so they don't come back.

What – tell me about being shot at by gang members, what happened?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: What had happened is that the wife and I we were much younger and my uncle and his wife, we went over to a place called Shady Acres, which is a miniature golf course.

MS. ALLEN: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: And as we was leaving, there was three gang bangers, sort to speak, they were – in LA they're called the Crips.

MS. ALLEN: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: And there was a, kind of a little confrontation

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: And there was a, kind of a little confrontation in the parking lot, we was parked next to 'em. And one of them had said something to my uncle, which was driving his car. And my uncle snapped back at him. But, anyway, there was a confrontation and we got in the cars and left. And they followed us. My uncle dropped me and my wife off at our house, which only about two miles from there. And they followed us and as we was getting out of the car and going in the house, they drove by and shot at us.

MS. ALLEN: So a drive by shooting.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

MS. ALLEN: Anybody ever get caught for that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes, they did.

MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay. All right. Were they prosecuted?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes, they were.

MS. ALLEN: Did you testify or anything?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes, I did.

MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay. All right. And were you happy with the outcome?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

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MS. ALLEN: You previously served on a jury, we've talked about that and with a criminal case. And you said that it was sort of explicit, is that correct? There was some explicit sexual content to it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. Did it involve children or adults?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: It was an adult.

MS. ALLEN: Does it concern you at all that this involves – this could involve children?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Yes, it does.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. Why does that concern you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Because children are very impressionable –

MS. ALLEN: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: -- between certain ages. They – that's when they get their learning from is. And if something like that could happen to a child, it could stick with him for the rest of his life. Some of them come out of it. Some of them with therapy can really be helped. And some of them, they're messed up for the rest of their life. And I think that's just a crying shame. I don't think that a child should ever have to go through something like that or anybody, but especially a child because he's – he had no defense or she has no defense.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. It sounds like you leave out the possibility that someone could make something like that up?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: Well, sure. Sure. Yeah. Kids, kids - everybody lies -

MS. ALLEN: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: -- everybody. I mean I don't think there's a

1	soul on earth that hasn't lied.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: You know, so.
4	MS. ALLEN: I'm not going to follow that up with what do you think about
5	lawyers question; just skip that altogether.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #097: And car salesmen.
7	MS. ALLEN: Thank you, Mr. Lyons. I appreciate that.
8	And I am finally, you know, I'm trying to get to talk to some of the
9	people in the back; I think I'm almost done. Can you pass the microphone down
10	that way [indicating]? Yeah, that's fine, since I don't know where the marshal is.
11	He's the one doing it. The end, just the end.
12	Kordoban, Mr. Kordoban –
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Yes, ma'am.
14	MS. ALLEN: How are you?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: I'm great. Thank you.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I'll try not to be too repetitive. Too late, right? Would –
17	some of the questions I asked earlier regarding where children might feel a safe
18	place, let's say, to report or to talk to somebody about about possible abuse. And I
19	had said things like a CPS worker. Would you agree that a Child Protective
20	Services worker, a social worker, would be someone that you would think a child
21	would feel safe reporting to?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: I would think so.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. What about a police officer?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: To some degree, yes.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. To some degrees. How about, like, a school counselor?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Yes.
2	MS. ALLEN: Or just a teacher even?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Teacher, yeah.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. What about a psychiatrist?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: I think so, in the circumstances that they'd be
6	in probably a period of time talking to them, so.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You – they – these are instances of people that generally
8	- I think most people think of them as being safe, is that right?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Yes, I would.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you agree that – well, let me ask you do you –
11	automatically are you going to believe a child over an adult?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: No.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Do you think everybody motivations, whether
14	they're coming in here to testify or sit at tables or sit in the back row, everybody has
15	a motivation, is that correct when it comes to certain things?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: To be – yeah –
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: To be here, sure.
19	MS. ALLEN: And motivation sometimes cause us to lie or be dishonest?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: To protect their peer pressure or their own
21	ego or whatever, yes.
22	MS. ALLEN: Do you think peer pressure necessarily has to come from
23	outside, from friends? Or, can it come internally from, let's say, siblings?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Siblings, I have five brothers, so yeah.
25	MS. ALLEN: Oh, five boys; so six boys, total?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Uh-huh.
2	MS. ALLEN: Wow, okay. All right. Were you the youngest, oldest, middle?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: I was – my older brother stayed with my real
4	dad. The guy got divorced so I was the oldest of the five.
5	MS. ALLEN: Oldest of five.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Um-huh.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Did the little ones follow you around –
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Oh, yeah.
9	MS. ALLEN: and annoy you?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: There's enough span of time to – yeah.
11	MS. ALLEN: Did they annoy you? Were they good to you?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Well, I was the babysitter all the time 'cause
13	was always the –
14	MS. ALLEN: Ah.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: the older one.
16	MS. ALLEN: Oh, you got that job?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Yeah.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Did you see, I guess since you were
19	babysitting, did – let me ask you, were you somewhat resentful about having to
20	babysit your siblings?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: No.
22	MS. ALLEN: You weren't resentful at all?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: No, not at all.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You didn't feel like you were sort of abandoned with the
<sub>25</sub>	kids?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: No, I – no, I was pretty athletic, so I still got to
2	play a lot of sports, so.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Were you the disciplinarian? Were you
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Yeah, always, um-huh.
5	MS. ALLEN: Firm hand?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Sorry?
7	MS. ALLEN: Firm hand? You always had them under control?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Yeah, I think so or pretty much so, yeah,
9	'cause I was – 'cause of the span of years between us all.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Do you think that a child can make up
11	allegations and I don't just mean sexual allegations, I mean anything; they can make
12	anything up?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Making up stories, you mean?
14	MS. ALLEN: Yeah. Do you think children can make that up?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: I think so, uh-huh.
16	MS. ALLEN: Would you agree that with some of the other jurors I talked to
17	that – like sex is more accessible now?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Completely more.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. A lot more, right?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Yeah.
21	MS. ALLEN: As – I think someone, Mr. Greenwood, you know you go to the
22	library like 20 years ago, now it's just turn on a computer, right?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: That's most definitely.
24	MS. ALLEN: Or the TV? It's very easy to get an idea, isn't it?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: That's correct.

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Okay. Is there anything else I asked anybody that you
2	wouldn't approve or any of those fun things that you thought, I really have to answer
3	that question?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: I think generally speaking I'm a very fair and
5	impartial person. So I think I read people well and I've been in the people business,
6	the hotel business, et cetera, so.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: So I've been around that. So pretty strong
9	with listening to all sides and had a lot of employees and et cetera like that.
10	MS. ALLEN: Sound like you want to be on the jury?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: To a degree. You know, I mean I – it's like
12	when I got drafted and I'm a Vietnam veteran. Well, I think there's a responsibility
13	for us all to participate. And if I was sitting over there, I'd want to have, have some-
14	body that cares enough to hear the facts and be a part of it.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you believe both sides are entitled to a fair trial?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Very much so.
17	MS. ALLEN: All right. And you understand what's at stake here?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Pardon?
19	MS. ALLEN: You understand what's at stake here, is that correct?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Yes.
21	MS. ALLEN: It's very serious?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Very serious, yeah.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Thank you very much.
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #042: Thank you.
25	MS ALLEN: Ms Spaur –

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes.
2	MS. ALLEN: how are you? If you can pass –
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: I can hear you.
4	MS. ALLEN: How are you? You're a attorney?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: And how excited were you to get the jury summons?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: It's kind of like, ooh, I could miss work for a
8	day or two. I was kind of – the one, I actually postponed, 'cause my original
9	summons came around when I was really busy, but fortunately things are quieter
10	now, so my boss isn't e-mailing me every 30 seconds.
11	MS. ALLEN: I had – I received one and I actually got called and sat in. I
12	didn't get picked, but I got to sit and it's a totally different perspective –
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: It really is.
14	MS. ALLEN: picking a jury versus sitting there, is that correct?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: It absolutely is.
16	MS. ALLEN: And I was so excited that I thought I'd – you know, I thought,
17	wow, I get to actually sit on a jury. Do you kind of feel that?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Actually, I have been thinking about it and I -
19	would be, I think, an opportunity, I think. I agree with some of the other jurors like
20	Mr. Kordoban says, you know, it's a part of citizenship and service and –
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: and it would be an honor to serve.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. The charges bother you at all?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: I think the severity of the charges certainly
25	bother me because it's very serious and some difficult issues and I'm sure difficult

1	facts; but – and I'm sure no one would look forward to going through it, but you
2	know, it's a part of the process and the Defendant is entitled to a fair hearing and a
3	fair trial and the State's entitled to fair opportunity to present their case, so –
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: we'd just have to listen.
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And you think you're pretty impartial? You can be fair
7	and impartial?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Absolutely.
9	MS. ALLEN: Listen to both sides?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Absolutely.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think that you possess, because I assume you've
12	cross-examined some people or that you've examined people on the stand?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: I've actually only participated in one trial and
14	I'm - I was second chair and my boss kinda forgot to - that he was going to let me
15	cross-examine a couple of witnesses. So I've prepared testimony but I haven't
16	actually examined witnesses personally.
17	MS. ALLEN: Have you done depositions?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So –
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: I mean I have done that. But – yes.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So depositions are – you can –
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Similar, yes.
23	MS. ALLEN: When you're in a deposition do you – you sort of have to assess
24	people as you're questioning them, would you agree?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. And depending on what it is, I mean personal injury is obviously different than construction defect or, you know, securities fraud – whatever it is, they're all different. But you're still assessing the credibility of a person sitting in front of you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Right.

MS. ALLEN: And how they respond to the question, correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes.

MS. ALLEN: And their demeanor on the stand?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. So do you think you possess a special talent for that because of what you do; assessing people's credibility?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: I don't know if I'd call it a special talent. I think I have developed the skill –

MS. ALLEN: Um-huh.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: -- of assessing credibility if someone is in the process of testifying and observing, you know. When I'm either doing the direct examination or the cross-examination myself, when I'm doing the questioning, you know I have to kind of figure out where they're going and what questions need to be followed up on and what, you know, the demeanor of the witness. And so I think I have picked up the skill of evaluating someone who's testifying.

MS. ALLEN: All right. Was there anything that I mentioned earlier to any of the other jurors that struck you, that again, as I said to Mr. Kordoban, like, oh, I have to answer that; let me just jump up right now and, like now –

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: No.

MS. ALLEN: Nothing that exciting?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: No. I – you know, I think you know, think I've
2	pretty much addressed the issues that both sets of attorneys might have with me.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I appreciate it. If you could just hand the microphone to
4	Mr. Bocage.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Bocage [pronounces name].
6	MS. ALLEN: Bocage [pronounces name]. Good afternoon. How are you?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Good afternoon.
8	MS. ALLEN: Did your voice get any better?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: It's getting a little better.
10	MS. ALLEN: A little better. What's the weather like now in Louisiana?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Well, the problem – this year it's part my fault
12	because I was doing Mardi Gras, so I kind of overdid it a little bit after school, so,
13	being honest.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Were you – I didn't know if I caught this but were you
15	raised in Louisiana?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yes.
17	MS. ALLEN: What part?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: New Orleans.
19	MS. ALLEN: New Orleans.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Right.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Great place.
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Went to an all boys' school, so you know.
23	MS. ALLEN: And then you broke free and came to Vegas?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: No, I went Salt Lake City.
25	MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay. So you went to Salt Lake City. What did you do in

1	Salt Lake City?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: I was the HR director for Sperry Univac.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And then from Salt Lake City here?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Salt Lake City here.
5	MS. ALLEN: All right.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: And now I'm a director with the Disabled
7	American Veterans.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Did you serve in the military?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Absolutely.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I apologize. It's been two days and I know it seems long
11	for you, but it's even longer for us. And what branch?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Navy, but I took care of the Marines. I was a
13	hospital corpsman.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. And how long were you in the military?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Four years.
16	MS. ALLEN: Four years, okay. You go down to – how long did you live in
17	Louisiana before you moved out.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Okay. I lived in – I left Louisiana in 1960.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And now – and you haven't gone back to live, is that
20	right, since?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Oh, no, I haven't gone back to live.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: But I been teaching down there. That
24	program that I'm in, this is my 30 <sup>th</sup> year.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And so you fly down there?

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1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yes.
2	MS. ALLEN: To teach?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yes.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. How often do you fly down there?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Say it again.
6	MS. ALLEN: How often do you fly down there? Back to –
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Once a year.
8	MS. ALLEN: Just once a year?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yes.
10	MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay. And how long are you there?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Two weeks.
12	MS. ALLEN: All right. Would you say that Louisiana has changed, that New
13	Orleans has changed since you moved?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Absolutely.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Good, bad, indifferent?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: You got to realize I was come up in the '50s,
17	so –
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I understand.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Okay. I'm 72, so.
20	MS. ALLEN: Well, you don't look it.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Thank you.
22	MS. ALLEN: But you understand – okay, so I understand what you're telling
23	me and it is – we're talking about a totally different era.
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Um-huh.
25	MS. ALLEN: But do you think it changed for the better?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Absolutely.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Would you say that Louisiana, in general, is like no other
3	part of the country?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Absolutely.
5	MS. ALLEN: Not just 'cause you lived there or you're wearing a Saints jacket
6	but it's like no other part of the country, isn't that right?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: It's very friendly, okay, you know.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Very friendly.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: And it always been that way even in the '50s,
10	I think —
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: you know, the relationship with the people
13	out in Louisiana –
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: is quite different; it's not in other places.
16	MS. ALLEN: What about the people? Do you think the people are different
17	than anywhere in the country?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Friendly.
19	MS. ALLEN: Friendly?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yeah.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. There are other things that are different about Louisiana
22	than other states, like they use a different law, like legal system, is that correct?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Okay. Now –
24	MS. ALLEN: The French Civil Code?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yeah. My mom used to tell me that Louisiana

1	is totally different when it comes down to their politics.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Because, you know, she tell me this is a
4	crook, but I'm going to vote for him anyway.
5	MS. ALLEN: Fair enough.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: So, you know, we -
7	MS. ALLEN: Well, at least she was honest, at least she was honest.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Right. And then, of course, everybody know
9	that our previous mayor, a friend of mine, you know he's going to be going to jail, so
10	MS. ALLEN: It happens.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Happens.
12	MS. ALLEN: It happens, okay. So you've served in the military and you're,
13	obviously, well-educated. And I have to ask are you – is this something you want to
14	do is serve on a jury?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yes.
16	MS. ALLEN: Have you ever – have you done it before?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: No.
18	MS. ALLEN: Never done it before.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: No.
20	MS. ALLEN: Wow, that's surprising. Retired military, we get a lot of retired
21	military in our jury pools. You must have been in Louisiana every time the summon
22	came.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Well, I had to postpone this one because it
24	was during the time I was teaching.
25	MS. ALLEN: I understand.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: So I had to reschedule.
2	MS. ALLEN: Is this case going to present difficulties, based upon the nature
3	of the charges for you?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: No.
5	MS. ALLEN: No. You think you can still be impartial regardless of the
6	charges?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Absolutely.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you – you recall the questions I was asking about sex
9	and the media and television. Did you agree with some of the jurors, previous jurors
10	who answered those questions?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Oh, sure.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. That it's more out there now than it was let's say even 20
13	years ago?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Oh, absolutely.
15	MS. ALLEN: Things have changed a lot in the last 20 or 30 years?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yes.
17	MS. ALLEN: In the media –
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yes.
19	MS. ALLEN: is that correct? Okay. And it's much more accessible to
20	children now?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yes.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Thank you very much.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: Yeah.
24	MS. ALLEN: I hope your voice gets better.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #048: I hope so.

1	MS. ALLEN: If we could go down this way [obtaining microphone]. Thank
2	you. Okay. Let's see you are Ms. Barlow, is that right?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Um-huh.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And you're a teacher.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: And so you've heard a mandatory reporter being thrown out a
7	lot?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So can you explain specifically what that is 'cause I'm not
10	that any – I don't know if anybody else gave a specific explanation.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Well, if you suspect any physical or emotional
12	or neglect, you need to – you have to report it.
13	MS. ALLEN: And what happens if it's – comes to someone's attention that
14	you don't? Are there consequences if you don't report?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
16	MS. ALLEN: And what would those consequences be?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: The – your principal would talk to you and,
18	depending what the district decides, you could lose your job.
19	MS. ALLEN: Do you know if you can – I apologize.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Right.
21	MS. ALLEN: Do you know if you can be charged with a crime?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: I am not – I'm sure. I'm not sure, though;
23	actually, I'm not sure.
24	MS. ALLEN: You're not sure.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Liust know my responsibility

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And you said before that you really didn't – you hadn't at
2	least come across any teachers or people you worked with that you thought were
3	hesitant to report?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: No.
5	MS. ALLEN: Everybody you know has been very forthcoming with that?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
7	MS. ALLEN: And if – let's say, that they're – you reported. Actually, you did.
8	You reported something. Did other teachers in your school know about it?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: No.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You were the only one –
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yeah.
12	MS. ALLEN: and the principal?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Um-huh.
14	MS. ALLEN: Yes. Okay. Thank you very much.
15	Miss Hiatt.
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes.
17	MS. ALLEN: How are you?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: I'm good. How are you?
19	MS. ALLEN: I'm good. Thank you. Just – I've asked a bunch of questions o
20	a bunch of the jurors over here and, hopefully, you've been listening to some of it.
21	So without completely regurgitating everything, obviously, you think you can be fair
22	and impartial, you answered those questions earlier. Is that correct?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes, that's correct.
24	MS. ALLEN: The charges don't bother you in the least?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: I wouldn't say they don't bother me, but –

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: I will do what I have to do and be impartial
3	with, you know, and listen to all the, you know, the information before you make a
4	judgment.
5	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think that children are capable of – again, making
6	up stories? I don't mean specific to what we're talking about here –
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Right.
8	MS. ALLEN: but just in general?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Definitely.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Carrying it forward, you think that they have the ability to
11	make up stories with regard to things such as what we are talking about here?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes, I – it depends on the age, of course –
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: as to maybe how significant the situation is
15	or how, you know, how they can give details. But, yes, I believe they can.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So details would be important, is that correct?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes. Yes.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. What about this idea of talking, that there are
19	potentially safe people to talk to like a CPS worker.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Uh-huh.
21	MS. ALLEN: Would you agree with that?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. What about a police officer?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes. You would hope so.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Psychiatrists, school counselors, things such as that?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Um-huh. I think anyone in authority of that
2	nature that deal with children especially, you would hope they would feel
3	comfortable enough to discuss it with them.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I think Ms. Luzaich asked you, I can't remember if she
5	specifically asked you, I know she asked I think everybody, but – about the
6	prostitution, sex for money –
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Uh-huh.
8	MS. ALLEN: that doesn't bother you, does it?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: No.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
11	If I may have the Court's indulgence for just a moment?
12	THE COURT: You bet.
13	MS. ALLEN: Thank you. [Conferring with co counsel]. Your Honor, I think
14	the defense will pass for cause at this time.
15	THE COURT: Okay. Both parties having passed the panel for cause, at this
16	time, the Clerk has prepared what has been marked as Court's Exhibit Number 1.
17	And the State of Nevada may exercise their first peremptory challenge.
18	Let me just ask, I know we've been in here all afternoon, is everyone
19	okay? Does anyone need a break?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: But there's something that I need to say or
21	ask?
22	THE COURT: Okay. Can I have the – just you hang onto it, Ms. Luzaich?
23	MS. LUZAICH: Sure.
24	THE COURT: Okay.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: It's just something that, you know, I just
	1

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thought about.

THE COURT: Okay. Your name and badge number.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Kathleen Smith, badge 40. My concern just is that if I were selected would I still be able to work my job downstairs at the information desk? We open – we start at six in the morning, doors open at seven. And you made mention that court would start like about 10, 10:30.

THE COURT: Oh, sure. I don't care what you do before we're up here.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: All right. Because I – well, my concern was with some of the witnesses coming through, that they would see me at the information desk and then see me here in the courtroom. And I don't want them to – I don't want anybody to be feeling uncomfortable that – well, she's there –

THE COURT: As long as you wear a – if you're selected, as long as you wear a badge that identifies you as a juror in Department XII, I'm okay. And as long as you don't talk to anybody. If you feel like that's going to be a problem, then I'll tell you don't work at the information desk. Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Okay.

THE COURT: Are you okay with that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes, I am.

THE COURT: Okay. So your concern was maybe witnesses coming to you and asking you questions?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: No, just would they feel uncomfortable that if they saw me at the information desk and then they see me in the courtroom and say, well, she's both places?

THE COURT: No. So it's just a concern?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Right.

THE COURT: Thank you for letting us know that.

State can exercise – let me just – does anyone need a break? 'Cause this may take awhile. Okay. So if one person wants a break, we all need to take a break. What I'm going to try to –

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Five minutes, five minute pee break.

UNIDENTIFIED PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Five minutes or -

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Ten minute pee break, to be straight.

THE COURT: Okay. So we'll take about a ten minute recess. If you can try to limit it to ten minutes, so we can get back 'cause this is all we have to do. And then I'm going to let – if you're not chosen, you'll be able to go home. Remember, I have to read the admonition.

During this recess, you're admonished not to talk or converse amongst yourselves or with anyone else on any subject connected with this trial or read, watch or listen to any report of or commentary on the trial or any person connected with this trial by any medium of information, including without limitation newspapers, television, the Internet or radio; or form or express any opinion on any subject connected with this trial 'til the case is finally submitted to you.

We're in recess for ten minutes. Thank you.

[Recess taken from 4:42 p.m. to 4:51 p.m.]

MS. LUZAICH: Yes, ma'am.

MS. ALLEN: Yes, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Okay. Have both sides exercised their first challenge?

MS. LUZAICH: Oh, no, the State did.

1	[The State exercises its first peremptory challenge]
2	THE COURT: Okay. And the defense may now exercise their –
3	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
4	THE COURT: I'm sorry. The defense may now exercise their first challenge.
5	[The Defense exercises its first peremptory challenge]
6	MS. LUZAICH: Oh.
7	THE COURT: Will you bring – I like to see it in –
8	MS. ALLEN: Oh, I'm sorry.
9	THE COURT: That's okay. I just like to see it in between –
10	MS. LUZAICH: Oh.
11	MS. ALLEN: Understood.
12	THE COURT: – just in case.
13	State of Nevada may exercise their second peremptory challenge.
14	[The State exercises its second peremptory challenge]
15	MS. LUZAICH: You put a two.
16	MS. ALLEN: I am so tired; here, sorry, sorry, sorry. Here
17	MS. LUZAICH: Judge, just for the record, the defense put a two.
18	MS. ALLEN: Two.
19	MS. LUZAICH: So she's changing it to a one –
20	MS. ALLEN: To a one. Do you want me to initial it?
21	MS. LUZAICH: - for her first preempt.
22	MS. ALLEN: And sorry.
23	THE COURT: You know what? I actually wrote a two down too.
24	MS. ALLEN: I'm -
25	THE COURT: So I just –

1	MS. ALLEN: It's just been a long day.
2	THE COURT: It's been a long day.
3	MS. ALLEN: I'll initial it.
4	THE COURT: So thank you. If you will just initial it, I would appreciate –
5	thank you very much.
6	MS. ALLEN: Thank you. Sorry about that.
7	THE COURT: A whole lot of good I did checking it.
8	[Colloquy between the defense counsel]
9	[The Defense exercises its second peremptory challenge]
10	MR. MACARTHUR: We should ask.
11	THE COURT: Did you want to –
12	MS. ALLEN: I just have – we have a question, Your Honor.
13	THE COURT: Okay. You may approach.
14	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
15	[Bench conference transcribed as follows:]
16	THE COURT: All four lawyers are present at the bench.
17	MS. ALLEN: I didn't even think to ask this or maybe you said it and I just
18	didn't listen. I'm sorry. Do you snake up once we – or do they fill in?
19	MS. LUZAICH: Huh?
20	THE COURT: No.
21	MS. ALLEN: Do you know understand what –
22	THE COURT: I don't know what snake up means, but here's what – when
23	you're done, all of you –
24	MS. ALLEN: Right.
25	THE COURT: - when you're done exercising -

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
2	THE COURT: - you get eight each, I start at the top -
3	MS. ALLEN: Right.

24	to sit on this jury and listen to this case?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: Yes, I can do it.

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	MS. ALLEN:	Holding	nothing	against M	r. Harris	for the	number	of	charges

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: No, no problem.

MS. ALLEN: And as he sits there you understand he's not guilty?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: Yes.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. And that has to be changed by the State?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #012: Yes.

MS. ALLEN: Thank you, Mr. Geiger. I appreciate your time.

5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Okay.
6	THE COURT: All right. You know what, sir, you can come right up here to
7	the podium.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Okay.
9	THE COURT: The record will reflect this hearing is taking – no, right there
10	[indicating] to the podium.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Oh, right here?

19	THE COURT: Okay.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: My work does –
21	THE COURT: After two days, you think there's something you haven't told
22	me?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes.
24	THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Well, I called the – my HR department today

1	THE COURT: Uh-huh.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: And they said I do not get paid –
3	THE COURT: Okay.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: for the jury duty –
5	THE COURT: Okay.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: and there's absolutely no way I'd be able to
7	afford my bills or anything.
8	THE COURT: Okay. Why don't you tell me about that? What do you – let me
9	get – let me go back in my notes. What do you do for a living?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: I work as a coordinator at H and E
11	Equipment.
12	THE COURT: That's right. Now it's all coming back to me. And yesterday
13	when we were having all these discussions, why didn't you bring it up then?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: I thought they paid, honestly. And then I
15	called my boss last night. And I was like, hey, this is like a one to two week trial. He
16	said, well, you don't get paid for it. I'm like are you sure?
17	THE COURT: Okay.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: So I called the HR this morning.
19	THE COURT: Well, it's really up to the company. Some pay –
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Exactly.

23	THE COURT: So it's up to your company.
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Um-huh.
25	THE COURT: So if you were – when do you work, Monday through Friday?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Um-huh.
2	THE COURT: Is that a yes?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes.
4	THE COURT: So if you were called upon to serve on this panel and you had
5	to miss two weeks of work, how would that affect you?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: I wouldn't be able to pay my bills.
7	THE COURT: And you have a wife, correct?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: I do.
9	THE COURT: She works full time?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Um-huh.
11	THE COURT: Is that a yes?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes. Sorry.
13	THE COURT: And you – both of you have to be working full time at all times?
14	I mean you couldn't – what I'm trying to get at, I'm not trying to bankrupt people
15	here.
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: No, I understand.
17	THE COURT: You understand that?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Uh-huh, uh-huh.
19	THE COURT: But you – is that a yes?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes. Sorry.
21	THE COURT: You have a wife that works full time?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Uh-huh. Oh, yes, sorry.
23	THE COURT: And you work full time?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes.
25	THE COURT: But do you have, I don't know, vacation time, any paid time

3	THE COURT: Okay.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: These –
5	THE COURT: How much do you have?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Well, these, two days have pretty much take
7	up my whole thing.
8	THE COURT: You only have two vacation days?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Um-huh, yes.
10	THE COURT: How much vacation do you get a year?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Two weeks right now. But, you know –
12	THE COURT: Have you used it up already?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: You can't cash out 'til when I use it.
14	THE COURT: Okay. I don't understand what that means.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: At the end of the year only hourly employees
16	can cash out their PTO and I'm on salary, so I can't cash out. So I have –
17	THE COURT: Maybe you don't understand my question. Do you have – you
18	have two weeks vacation time, correct?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: You get a certain amount of hours each
20	paycheck. So you get eight – a little less –
21	THE COURT: So you accrue them?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes.

3	THE COURT: Okay. So you've used it?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Uh-huh, yes.
5	THE COURT: All right. Sorry, I know it's hard to get used to that.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes.
7	THE COURT: And without your paycheck for, I guess, you know, I guess it
8	would be three days, maybe eight days you believe that would prevent you from
9	paying your bills?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes.
11	THE COURT: You wouldn't be able to pay any of your bills?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: I'd be able to pay some but there's no way I
13	could, you know, make rent or anything like that.
14	THE COURT: Okay. Do you have rent or a mortgage?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Rent.
16	THE COURT: All right. And you're responsible for the rent not your wife?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Me and my wife.
18	THE COURT: Okay. So together you have to do it?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes.
20	THE COURT: Okay. And this would make it so you wouldn't be able to pay
21	to pay your bills?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: That's correct.
23	THE COURT: Okay. Are you sure?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yes.
25	THE COURT: 'Cause we'd sure love to have you stay.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: No. Yes, I'm a hundred percent; trust me, I'd
2	like to be on this case, honestly.
3	THE COURT: Okay. All right. Well, based upon your representations at this
4	time I'm going to excuse you. When you go outside, I'm going to ask you not to
5	discuss anything we've discussed in here –
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Okay.
7	THE COURT: with your fellow jurors. I'm going to ask you to go to the third
8	floor –
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Okay.
10	THE COURT: and check out.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Okay.
12	THE COURT: And thank you very much for being here.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Thank you and I appreciate it.
14	THE COURT: Thank you.
15	[Prospective Juror #023 excused]
16	THE COURT: Okay. The record will reflect that that juror has left the
17	courtroom.
18	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Badge number? If I could, Judge. Your Honor, badge
19	number?
20	MS. ALLEN: Oh, 20
21	THE COURT: He is badge number 23 –
22	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Okay.
23	THE COURT: Nicholas Carlyn. He was in box number 9. So when we
24	come back in, I will be putting –
25	MS. LUZAICH: Isn't it Del Taco.

1	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Right.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Del Taco is next.
3	MR. MAC ARTHUR: No objection to –
4	THE COURT: Okay.
5	MR. MAC ARTHUR: letting Del Taco go.
6	MS. LUZAICH: I'm not objecting, I'm just –
7	THE COURT: Mr. Ruben Hernandez-Diaz will become number 9.
8	So I know we're with, with you, Ms. Allen.
9	MS. ALLEN: Yes.
10	THE COURT: So what I'll do is, I'm just going to –
11	MS. ALLEN: Um-huh
12	THE COURT: take him through, get him back up to speed. I'll ask the
13	State if they have any questions for him and then I'll turn the panel back over to you
14	MS. ALLEN: Not a problem.
15	THE COURT: So you get a little break.
16	MS. ALLEN: I'm happy to sit here, in fact I'm very, very happy.
17	THE COURT: Okay. And I – do we have everyone here now?
18	THE COURT MARSHAL: Your Honor, we do.
19	THE COURT: Okay. We're having a little trouble getting them all here.
20	THE COURT MARSHAL: Yes, Your Honor.
21	THE COURT: But they're all here now, let's bring them in.
22	THE COURT MARSHAL: Yes, ma'am.
23	THE COURT: Before we lose somebody.
24	[In the presence of the prospective jury panel, 2:36]
25	THE COURT: When you come in, you can have a seat.

1	THE COURT MARSHAL: Your Honor, the panel is in.
2	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you very much.
3	Do the parties stipulate to the presence of the jury panel as now
4	empaneled?
5	MS. LUZAICH: Yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: Yes, Your Honor.
7	THE COURT: Thank you.
8	Okay. At this time Mr. Ruben Hernandez-Diaz.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
10	THE COURT: Can you come up here. I'm going to ask you to take seat
11	number 9. So you're right up here [indicating] in the box and you're in seat number
12	9.
13	Good afternoon, sir. He's probably going to need the microphone.
14	THE COURT MARSHAL: Yes. Yes, Your Honor. I'll get it.
15	THE COURT: Okay.
16	Sir, I have a few questions for you. Can you tell me how long you've
17	lived in Clark County?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Lived for 18 years.
19	THE COURT: Eighteen years. And your education background?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: High school diploma.
21	THE COURT: And what do you do for a living?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I work at Del Taco as team member. And I
23	work at Sands Expo as a bus runner.
24	THE COURT: Your marital status?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I'm single.

1	THE COURT: Do you have any children?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No.
3	THE COURT: Have you ever served as a juror before?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes, at '09.
5	THE COURT: In 2009?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: [Nods].
7	THE COURT: Is that a yes?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
9	THE COURT: Was that here in Clark County?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah, it was in this, this courtroom.
11	THE COURT: Was in this building?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
13	THE COURT: In this courtroom?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
15	THE COURT: With me?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: It was a long time.
17	THE COURT: Okay.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah.
19	THE COURT: So it was in this courthouse but it wasn't in here with me?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes, I guess.
21	THE COURT: Okay. Was it civil or criminal?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: It was just – they ask me questions like what's
23	your name.
24	THE COURT: Was it a civil case or a criminal case?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: It was not criminal case.

1	THE COURT: It was a civil case?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I guess.
3	THE COURT: And you were selected to be on the jury panel?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
5	THE COURT: Okay. And were you selected to be the foreperson?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No, it was just a day at the court and then
7	that's it.
8	THE COURT: Okay. So let me ask you again, were you selected to be on
9	the jury panel?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes. Yeah, I got the badge and, yeah, I got
11	selected.
12	THE COURT: All right. And the case only lasted one day?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes, because – yeah, they sent me and they
14	send me to the third floor and then they just said to give the badge and then they put
15	the writings on the back of it.
16	THE COURT: So you were not selected?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I guess, yeah.
18	THE COURT: All right. Did you come into a courtroom, were you sworn in as
19	a juror and did you hear witnesses come up and testify on the witness stand?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No.
21	THE COURT: No.
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No.
23	THE COURT: Okay. So you've never served as a juror before then. Other
24	than you've been called to be a juror, but you haven't been selected and
25	empaneled, is that correct?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
2	THE COURT: Okay. Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family
3	member or friend, ever been the victim of a crime?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Like family member? It was on the news, like
5	I got a call, in the phone call and someone, like my cousin's mother, something like
6	happened, like the uncle did something and it was – it harmed – and there was a
7	funeral and that's it.
8	THE COURT: So something happened to your cousin's mother?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
10	THE COURT: She was killed?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes, that's why there was a funeral.
12	THE COURT: Okay. By a criminal act?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I need more, more information. You know, it's
14	something – that's all I can say.
15	THE COURT: Okay. Do you understand my questions?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes, I understand.
17	THE COURT: Okay. 'Cause the question is have you or anyone close to
18	you, such as a family member or friend, ever been the victim of a crime? And so -
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes –
20	THE COURT: your cousin's mother –
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No –
22	THE COURT: is that your aunt?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No. The Uncle.
24	THE COURT: So it was a man that passed away?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No. no. The uncle killed cousin's mother.

1	THE COURT: Okay. So your uncle killed his wife?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I guess, yeah.
3	THE COURT: You guess or yes?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No, no, no. Yes.
5	THE COURT: Yes.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah.
7	THE COURT: And did that happen here in Las Vegas?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah, it did.
9	THE COURT: How long ago was that?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I did not – I don't think like this stuff, you
11	know, all the time. Who knows when it happened? I don't want to remember that
12	stuff.
13	THE COURT: I understand that, but you don't know when it happened?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I just remember I just got a phone – a call on
15	the phone and then someone says something.
16	THE COURT: Do you know when that call came to you?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Well, I don't want to remember. If I could,
18	like, I'd rather remember other stuff.
19	THE COURT: Sure, I understand. Was that this year in 2014?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Well, I can't say the date.
21	THE COURT: Was it last year in 2013?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I can't say the date when it happened. But it
23	was on the news and stuff like that.
24	THE COURT: Okay. Was it within the last five years?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah, again, you know I can't.

1	THE COURT: Okay. Do you have any idea when it happened?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I can't say, I –
3	THE COURT: You have no idea when it happened?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No. I remembered it but I did not like, like
5	aimed it to know what it was, when the year, 'cause I was doing other things.
6	THE COURT: Okay. All right. Have you or anyone close to you, such as a
7	family member or friend ever been the victim of a sexual assault, sexual abuse or
8	domestic violence?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No.
10	THE COURT: Okay. Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family
11	member or friend ever been accused of a crime?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No.
13	THE COURT: Okay. Well, was the uncle accused of murder of the aunt?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: It – yes.
15	THE COURT: Okay. Did he get arrested?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: It happened like in the morning and then it -
17	then they did the case, like they – the news reporters or something, they all got
18	information pretty quickly. And it happened like in the morning, I guess.
19	THE COURT: Okay. Do you understand my question?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes, yes.
21	THE COURT: I said did he –
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I'll get good attention, all right.
23	THE COURT: Did he get arrested?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes. He got arrested and he was – yes, he
25	got arrested.

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THE COURT: Okay. Do you know what his name is?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I would like to know his name because I don't
<ul> <li>I normally haven't heard his name a long time. I don't like – I don't know his</li> </ul>
name. I know he's my uncle, but normally I, I – his name, if I know his name, I have
to know his name every single day or, you know, know his name, but I, I can't tell
what his name is.
THE COURT: Okay. He's your uncle but you don't know what his name is?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah, it's been a long time. Like – like if you
really care about someone or something, you know someone's name a lot. I have
had other things that I was doing.
THE COURT: Like what? What else have you been doing?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I was, I was going to college and stuff like
that.
THE COURT: Okay. Well, I asked you what your education was and you
said high school?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah, I went to college too because –
THE COURT: Okay.
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I went there because I – to go to some
courses 'cause – to pass. I went and they gave me a test to do. And then they told
me to go to some courses, like mathematics and –
THE COURT: Where did you attend college?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I attended at Cheyenne, CSN.
THE COURT: Okav. And are you currently enrolled at CSN?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No, no, no. I'm more like looking for, for jobs.

THE COURT: Okay. So you're not currently enrolled but at some point you

1	were enrolled at CSN, correct?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
3	THE COURT: How many years or semesters did you take at CSN?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I was there like, since, I guess it was like
5	three years, that's it.
6	THE COURT: Okay. So you spent three years at CSN?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
8	THE COURT: Okay. Did you get any degrees?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Well, I just wanted to pass the courses that
10	my instructors told me back in high school what to pass. And I passed my GED
11	courses, you know, for the proficiencies. And that's why I went back to -
12	THE COURT: Okay. Are you talking about your high school proficiency
13	exams?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No, like when I was at high school, I passed
15	it. But it said to – they gave me a higher education. So I went and – I just went to
16	prove that I can do it.
17	THE COURT: Of course.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah.
19	THE COURT: So you went onto CSN and you spent three years at CSN,
20	correct?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
22	THE COURT: And what did you study at CSN?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I studied mathematics. I went all the way to
24	90 – I think it was 95, like math 95. English 101. I also, let me see, those two
25	courses I did.

1	THE COURT: You did two courses only?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes. I did other courses, 'cause I was kind of
3	like, like thinking well, I took keyboarding class, like, you know, like college –
4	THE COURT: Okay.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: college –
6	THE COURT: Did you just take general education courses?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
8	THE COURT: For three years?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah; yes, I did.
10	THE COURT: Okay. Did you ever declare a major?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: That like – I was like, for me like – I was just –
12	I'm just trying to get a job with my high school diploma, that's it.
13	THE COURT: Okay. But you told me you went to CSN for three years,
14	correct?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
16	THE COURT: Did you ever declare a major while you were there for three
17	years?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: No, just passing the courses –
19	THE COURT: Okay.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: you know.
21	THE COURT: How many credits did you earn?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I think it was like 25 or something.
23	THE COURT: Twenty-five credits, okay. All right.
24	Would you have a tendency to give more weight or credence or less
25	weight or credence to the testimony of a police officer, simply because he or she is a

1	police officer?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes, I guess.
3	THE COURT: Yes, you would?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Like what's that? What do you mean like,
5	credent?
6	THE COURT: Do you understand my question?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Can you explain, please?
8	THE COURT: Sure. Would you have a tendency to give more weight or
9	credence or less weight or credence to the testimony of a police officer, simply
10	because he or she is a police officer?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Can you define what credence is?
12	THE COURT: Credibility.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Oh, credibility? Yes.
14	THE COURT: Yeah.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes, I can. I can tell you what I can think of
16	that's low and high.
17	THE COURT: Okay. I'm not quite sure you answered my question, okay?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Okay.
19	THE COURT: So if a police officer comes in and testifies –
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Okay. So –
21	THE COURT: And you'll know that a person is a police officer, because
22	they'll either be in a uniform or they'll tell you what they do for a living; that's usually
23	what a witness does. Would you have a tendency to give that person's testimony
24	more weight or credibility or less weight or credibility, simply because they work as a
25	police officer?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: I guess I have to give the police officer
2	information, like I give information, like if I will come here – like – okay, like take the
3	next week off but he said I got to come to court. So I guess I got to listen to the
4	officer.
5	THE COURT: Okay. Did you understand my question?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah.
7	THE COURT: Okay. You know what, can I have the parties approach for just
8	one moment.
9	MS. ALLEN: Sure.
10	[Bench conference transcribed as follows:]
11	THE COURT: You know, it's really kind of really hurting my feelings, because
12	some of the other jurors were laughing at him.
13	MR. MacARTHUR: Right.
14	MS. ALLEN: Oh, yeah.
15	THE COURT: Okay. And I don't think that he understands.
16	MR. MAC ARTHUR: I mentioned this yesterday.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Uh-huh.
18	THE COURT: I know you did. And I'm trying to – I was –
19	MR. MAC ARTHUR: I have no objection to having him being released.
20	THE COURT: I can't get a signal from either one of you, I keep looking at
21	you, and –
22	MS. LUZAICH: The State has no objection to him being –
23	MR. MAC ARTHUR: No objection to letting him go.
24	THE COURT: guys are giving me blank looks.
25	MS. ALLEN: You can let him go.

1	THE COURT: Usually – okay.
2	MS. ALLEN: Please, let him go.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Yeah.
4	MS. ALLEN: He's terrible.
5	THE COURT: Because it's really hurting my heart –
6	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Uh-huh.
7	THE COURT: that these other jurors are laughing at him.
8	MS. ALLEN: No, he clearly doesn't understand.
9	THE COURT: Yeah, I don't think he understood this last question, so –
10	MS. ALLEN: Yeah.
11	THE COURT: I'm just going to ask him to step out.
12	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Okay. No objection.
13	MS. ALLEN: No problem.
14	THE COURT: And calling – just so you all know who the next person is,
15	MS. LUZAICH: McCreedy, something like that?
16	THE COURT: it's Richard McCreedy.
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
18	THE COURT: Okay.
19	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
20	THE COURT: Thank you.
21	[Bench conference concluded]
22	THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Hernandez, thank you very much. I appreciate you
23	answering – Mr. Hernandez-Diaz, correct?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yes.
25	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you very much. I appreciate you answering the

1	questions for me. I'm just going to ask you if you can leave the microphone on your
2	chair.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #081: Yeah, I'll leave it.
4	THE COURT: And then you can go back to sitting in your seat. And I do
5	appreciate you being here, sir. Thank you very much.
6	Mr. Richard McCreedy, you're going to become juror number 9. Good
7	afternoon, Mr. McCreedy.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Afternoon.
9	THE COURT: Thank you very much for your patience and your willingness to
10	be here. How long have you lived in Clark County?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Almost 34 years.
12	THE COURT: Your employment, training, education background?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I've got a BA in landscape architecture.
14	THE COURT: In what architecture?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Landscape architecture.
16	THE COURT: That's what I thought you said. So what do you do for a living?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I design parks and trails and anything outside
18	the building. Do a lot of government work and residential design.
19	THE COURT: Your marital status?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Divorced.
21	THE COURT: Do you have any children?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I have one daughter.
23	THE COURT: Is she old enough to be employed?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, she is not.
25	THE COURT. Do you know of any reason why you could not be a completely

1	fair and impartial juror, if you were selected to serve on this panel?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
3	THE COURT: Okay. Have you ever served as a juror before?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No.
5	THE COURT: Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family member or
6	friend, ever been the victim of a crime?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: My mother.
8	THE COURT: Okay.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: She was molested when she was 13 by her
10	brother's best friend.
11	THE COURT: Now, how did you come to know about that?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: My mother felt that it was necessary so that
13	the same thing wouldn't happen to myself.
14	THE COURT: Sure.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: So –
16	THE COURT: So when did she disclose that to you?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Fifteen, 16 years old.
18	THE COURT: Okay.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yeah.
20	THE COURT: And did she give you any of the details or just kind of what you
21	just told me?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Just about what I told you.
23	THE COURT: So she told you generally –
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Just to let –
25	THE COURT: and this is why you need to be careful?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Correct and that it was wrong.
2	THE COURT: Okay. So you don't know what happened as a result of that?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
4	THE COURT: Do you know if she disclosed it when she was a child?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, she did disclose it as a child.
6	THE COURT: Okay. Who did she disclose it to?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: To her parents.
8	THE COURT: And what happened?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: As far as I know, nothing.
10	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that that would affect your ability to be
11	fair and impartial?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
13	THE COURT: Okay. Other than what you've just told us, have you or anyon
14	close to you, such as a family member or friend, ever been the victim of sexual
15	abuse, sexual assault or domestic violence?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: My mother was also domestically – domestic
17	violence with my father.
18	THE COURT: Okay. And I always hate to ask this but can you give me just
19	kind of a brief statement?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: She was just beat up by my father.
21	THE COURT: Okay. And were the police called?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I'm sure, yes.
23	THE COURT: You know what, how did you come to know about it?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Witnessed.
25	THE COURT: You saw it?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Oh, yeah.
2	THE COURT: As a young person?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: As a very young person, yes.
4	THE COURT: How young?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Probably five, six years old.
6	THE COURT: Okay. So really young?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
8	THE COURT: All right. Did they stay together?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, they did not.
10	THE COURT: Okay.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: They were divorced.
12	THE COURT: And so at some point they got divorced?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Correct.
14	THE COURT: But were you aware of whether the police were called and
15	there was any action by the government?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: There were never charges brought against
17	my father for any of that.
18	THE COURT: Okay. But you saw it with your own eyes?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes –
20	THE COURT: Okay.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I defended my mother several times.
22	THE COURT: I'm sorry.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I had defended my mother several times at
24	that age.
25	THE COURT: At five?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
2	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that that would affect your ability to be
3	fair and impartial in this case?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
5	THE COURT: Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family member or
6	friend, ever been accused of a crime?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
8	THE COURT: Okay. Tell me about that.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: My father is a 1 Percenter biker, so he –
10	many things that he's been accused of.
11	THE COURT: He's a what biker?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: One Percenter, outlaw.
13	THE COURT: Okay.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: My brother –
15	THE COURT: So he's been accused – I mean can you give me like kind of a
16	summary or do you know?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: He's never actually been convicted of any-
18	thing but he's gone to court but never been –
19	THE COURT: He's been arrested and charged with things?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Correct, correct. He's never been charged.
21	THE COURT: Do you know what they are?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, I do not.
23	THE COURT: Okay. Did you say he's never been charged?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, he has not been charged.
25	THE COURT: He's been arrested but always released and never charged?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: That's correct, ma'am.
2	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: My brother has drug possession, or – not
4	accused but charged with drug possession. He's three years into probation right
5	now.
6	THE COURT: Okay. So he's got a criminal case pending right now?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, he's in probation, so it's been already –
8	THE COURT: Okay. Well, I would consider that pending.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Okay. Then, yes, it's pending.
10	THE COURT: So he's on probation?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
12	THE COURT: Okay. Is that here in Clark County?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
14	THE COURT: And was it a felony, a gross misdemeanor?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Felony.
16	THE COURT: It's a felony?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
18	THE COURT: And did you follow that case?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, I did not.
20	THE COURT: All right. How do you know about what you've just told us?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: About my brother?
22	THE COURT: Yeah, how do you know about that?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Because I knew he got arrested and I had
24	gone down to CCDC to, you know, put money on his account.
25	THE COURT: Okay And then you know eventually went to court. And did

1	he – was he – did he go to trial or did he plead guilty?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I think he pleaded guilty for possession.
3	THE COURT: Okay. Did you ever go to court with him?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
5	THE COURT: All right. And you know that he – do you know who he was
6	prosecuted by?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
8	THE COURT: Okay. Well, he probably was prosecuted by the Clark County
9	District Attorney's office. Do you understand that?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
11	THE COURT: Do you have any problem with the fact that the prosecutors
12	here are from the same office that prosecuted your brother?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
14	THE COURT: Okay. Do you think he was treated fairly?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
16	THE COURT: Anything about his case that would affect your ability to be fai
17	and impartial in this case?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
19	THE COURT: And he's currently on probation?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
21	THE COURT: And how do you know that?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Just from –
23	THE COURT: Talking to him?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: talking to him. He collects his chips for all
25	his weeks and months of being soher and –

1	THE COURT: Good.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: just all that stuff.
3	THE COURT: So he's doing well on his probation –
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: He's doing very well.
5	THE COURT: from what you can tell? Okay. And so that's a good thing,
6	right?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
8	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about what you've told us that would affect
9	your ability to be fair and impartial if you're selected to be on this panel?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, ma'am.
11	THE COURT: Anything else?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No.
13	THE COURT: No. Okay. Would you have a tendency to give more weight o
14	credence or less weight or credence to the testimony of a police officer, simply
15	because he or she is a police officer?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No.
17	THE COURT: Okay. Can you wait in forming your opinion as to the
18	appropriate result to be reached in this case until you've heard all of the evidence
19	and after considering the instructions on the law, which will be given to you by
20	myself at the end of the case? Can you do that?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
22	THE COURT: Okay. Any reason why you could not be a completely fair and
23	impartial juror, if you were selected to be on this panel?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No.
25	THE COURT: Ms. Luzaich, do you have any questions for this juror?

1	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.
2	Good afternoon, Mr. McCreedy.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Afternoon.
4	MS. LUZAICH: A 1 Percenter, we've seen a lot of that on the news lately. Do
5	you know was your dad any part of the stuff that we'd seen on the news?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, he was not.
7	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Are you and your dad close at all?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, we are.
9	MS. LUZAICH: Are you still close with your mom?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
11	MS. LUZAICH: So you can keep them separate?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
13	MS. LUZAICH: You know, the Court asked you you won't hold it against us
14	that your brother was prosecuted, right?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, I will not.
16	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. You heard all the questions I was asking today and
17	yesterday. You have a daughter, how old is your daughter?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: She's ten.
19	MS. LUZAICH: So I assume you would agree that a woman has the absolute
20	right to say no to sexual advances?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
22	MS. LUZAICH: She ever give up that right?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No.
24	MS. LUZAICH: Is it any different for a child?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, it is not.

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MS. LUZAICH: Can you listen to kids – and when I say kids, I mean anybody
under 18, not necessarily five or six - can you listen to kids testify and evaluate their
testimony the same as you would any adult?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, I feel I do. I can.

MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it would be hard for a child to disclose any kind of physical or sexual abuse?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I feel that they can if they've been coaxed into, you know, that they're either going to get harmed or someone else is going to get harmed, if they do speak the truth or don't speak the truth.

MS. LUZAICH: Is that what it would take for you to think that? Like does a child have to be either threatened or something to not disclose? Could there be other reasons that a child wouldn't disclose, other than threats of harm?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes. They could have a block that they don't remember it, but, no, not that I can think of.

MS. LUZAICH: Maybe they just don't want to talk about it?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Or they don't want to talk about it, yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Is that something that you would – or you would consider to be embarrassing?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that – well, do you think all kids are different?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.

MS. LUZAICH: Just like people are different?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that people perceive things differently?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, they do.

1	MS. LUZAICH: What would cause two different people to perceive the same
2	thing differently in your mind?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: It could be location. How they actually viewed
4	the situation. It could be their domestication and how they were raised, by society or
5	their parents or schooling to what they think is right and what they think is wrong.
6	Each person can perceive something differently than anyone else, yes.
7	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thanks. Would you agree that some people can be
8	terrible parents?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
10	MS. LUZAICH: Would you hold that against kids?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No.
12	MS. LUZAICH: Do you have an opinion about people who exchange sex for
13	money?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, I don't.
15	MS. LUZAICH: So if you hear from somebody that they have in the past
16	exchanged sex for money, can you still listen to what that person says and evaluate
17	what they have to say objectively?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
19	MS. LUZAICH: What about people who may describe things that they've
20	done that you believe are really, really foolish and you would never have done?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, I would listen to them for full credibility.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Listen to them –
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Right.
24	MS. LUZAICH: at least objectively?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Objectively, sorry, yes.

1	MS. LUZAICH: Not automatically disbelieve what they have to say?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Correct.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think you could be a good juror?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
5	MS. LUZAICH: Why?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I can be impartial to listening to everybody
7	and making that judgment off the rule or the law that has been given to - for that
8	particular situation.
9	MS. LUZAICH: Listen to what everybody has to say before you make up you
10	mind?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
12	MS. LUZAICH: Is there anything about you that would prevent you from bein
13	able to sit in judgment of someone?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No.
15	MS. LUZAICH: And if you listened to all the testimony, see any evidence, if
16	you were convinced beyond a reasonable doubt the Defendant committed the
17	crimes he's charged with, would you be able to say the word guilty?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.
20	I'd pass for cause.
21	THE COURT: Okay. The panel is now yours.
22	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
23	All right. Mr. McCreedy, I'll just start with you, since you have the
24	microphone.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Sure thing.

1	MS. ALLEN: How are you this afternoon?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Doing good.
3	MS. ALLEN: You seem very eager to be on this jury?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Oh, it's definitely interesting.
5	MS. ALLEN: Why do you say that?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I have not been in this situation to be on a
7	juror panel before.
8	MS. ALLEN: Have you ever been summonsed before? Is this your first time
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I was – six years of college and this is the first
10	one since I got out of college that I've been able to attend.
11	MS. ALLEN: Did you attend college here?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. At UNLV?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
15	MS. ALLEN: All right. You design parks, you said parks and trails, a lot of
16	government and residential design?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, a lot of government and residential.
18	MS. ALLEN: So you spend a lot of time outside?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
20	MS. ALLEN: You –
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, I pretty much color all day.
22	THE COURT: Wow –
23	MS. ALLEN: That's okay.
24	THE COURT: are you kidding?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yeah, I make ugly buildings look pretty.

1	MS. ALLEN: That's a really good answer, all right.
2	THE COURT: I color – did he say I color all day [to court clerk]?
3	MS. ALLEN: You love your job, don't you?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I do love my job.
5	MS. ALLEN: You get to color all day long. You stay within the lines?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No. Makes it look better when it's outside the
7	lines.
8	MS. ALLEN: I agree with you there. All right. Your brother or your, I'm sorry,
9	your father – you said one percent, a 1 Percenter?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Right. That –
11	MS. ALLEN: I don't even – you would think I would know that. I had no idea.
12	I actually had to turn to my co counsel, I don't understand what that is. Can you
13	explain that? I have no idea.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: It's - 1 Percenter is - there's a lot of people
15	that ride bikes or motorcycles, street bikes.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: One percent of them they're usually – is what
18	they're called, they're an outlaw biker.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: They – a Three Patcher is another way of
21	saying it.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: So.
24	MS. ALLEN: All right. I went to law school, I don't know, I guess I don't have
25	a lot of practical commonsense sometimes. But you are close with your dad, is that

1	right?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And you said he's been accused of a lot of things but
4	never prosecuted?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Correct.
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay. When did your parents separate?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: When I was like six years old, seven years
8	old.
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Did you go back and forth between their homes?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Would you say that your mom – your mom's way of
12	raising you and your father's way of raising you are different?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
14	MS. ALLEN: Very different?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: My father was also a Marine, so it's very
16	different.
17	MS. ALLEN: Oh, well, that's interesting. Okay. Was he stricter?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: He was very strict.
19	MS. ALLEN: All right. So I would have expected the opposite answer, based
20	upon what you just said about him being a One Percenter; but he wasn't, he was
21	very strict with you?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Did you meet a lot of his friends?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Are you still close to a lot of them?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
2	MS. ALLEN: You – I think you agreed that – with Ms. Luzaich's assertion that
3	it would be – sometimes it could be difficult for a child to disclose any sort of abuse,
4	whether it's sexual or physical, even verbal abuse; would you agree with that?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think that there are certain – and if I screw this up
7	and you don't understand tell me - but do you think that there are certain people
8	who a child might feel safer disclosing it to? Do you think, let's say, a police officer?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I would hope so, yes.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. What about a CPS worker, Child Protective Services?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I would hope so, yes.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. What about a school counselor?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. How about a psychiatrist?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: More so.
16	MS. ALLEN: All right. Do you think given the right circumstances a child
17	would, let's say, be more likely to disclose to people like that than their neighbor?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Or maybe even a family member?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Those people may create a more safe environment for
22	disclosure?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think children have the ability to make things up?

25 Just generally and things?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
2	MS. ALLEN: Does your daughter make things up?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, she does.
4	MS. ALLEN: All right. Are you good at catching her?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, I am.
6	MS. ALLEN: All right. Do you think that children – and going further, have the
7	ability to make up things like we're talking about today?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, I do.
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think a child naturally has – is embarrassed to
10	talk about sex?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: I think to a point where they don't have as
12	much familiarity with it.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: And, maybe, like was mentioned before with
15	the media and social media and how things are done a little differently these - in the
16	2010s. Yes, I think they are a little more exposed to it and they probably know a
17	little bit more.
18	MS. ALLEN: You were listening.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: The whole time.
20	MS. ALLEN: Wow, I'm impressed. And everybody else was thinking where
21	am I going for lunch, you were actually listening; well, thank you.
22	So you would agree that you can go on the Internet right now, even on
23	your phone, right?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
25	MS. ALLEN: And you can pull up –

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Anything you wanted.
2	MS. ALLEN: anything. Pornography, any sort of naked picture, anything
3	you wanted?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
5	MS. ALLEN: Okay. If you wanted to, right. All right.
6	Do you agree that children have an easier access to that, let's say, now
7	than ten years ago?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
9	MS. ALLEN: And it's a lot easier now than it was ten years ago?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. If you coupled that ease of gaining information with a
12	home life that isn't structured, can you imagine the possibilities?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You said you had to defend your mother at various
15	times?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes.
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Does that still affect you?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No, it does not.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think it affected you growing up?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, it made me not want to touch any
21	women. You know, I didn't – I was very aware that you were not allowed to –
22	MS. ALLEN: Hit women.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: touch anybody or hit women or abuse
24	anybody.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. So it just – it increased your awareness of it?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: That's correct.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You didn't hold it against your father?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: No.
4	MS. ALLEN: All right. Your mother – you said, I think, that you mother had
5	experienced some abuse by her brother's best friend?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
7	MS. ALLEN: Did she tell you about that?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Yes, ma'am.
9	MS. ALLEN: What was her affect when she told you? Do you remember?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Just to be knowledgeable really. She wasn't
11	- it wasn't a very emotional thing. It was that it happened and that to make sure that
12	the situation didn't happen to me, so. But it was not emotional for her when she told
13	me.
14	MS. ALLEN: So it was practical?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: It was very practical.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. This is what happened. Don't ever do this.
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: Right. Correct.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. I thank you very much for your time, Mr.
19	McCreedy.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #085: You have a good day.
21	MS. ALLEN: You too. If you would pass it back to Ms. Ross.
22	I'm going to talk to you, Ms. Ross. How are you?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Good. How are you?
24	MS. ALLEN: I'm good. Thank you. I'm trying to wind this down and go
25	quicker. So you heard some of the questions I've asked some of the other jurors?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Um-huh.
2	MS. ALLEN: You have to answer yes out loud.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes. Yes. Sorry.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And, specifically, the questions that I was asking about,
5	social media and just media in general. Do you think that – I think most of the jurors
6	agree that it's sort of affected the younger generation of children.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yeah.
8	MS. ALLEN: Would you agree with that as well?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Have you seen that – do you have children?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes, I do.
12	MS. ALLEN: Have you seen that at all with your kids? It have an effect on
13	your kids?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: No. Not –
15	MS. ALLEN: Is your home very structured?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: I – well, I'm a single mother –
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: so it's just me and my son.
19	MS. ALLEN: I see.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: So, yes, it's structured but he, he wouldn't –
21	him and I are very close.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: So he tells me everything.
24	MS. ALLEN: All right.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: He's not one to look at stuff like that on the

1	Internet.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay. How old – I'm sorry, how old is your son?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: He's 13.
4	MS. ALLEN: He's 13, okay. But it's not just the Internet, is it; it's just
5	television in general?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Well, it's everything; yeah, yes.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You don't even have to – you don't have to go to HBO
8	anymore to get it.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Sure. No, he sees it I mean in movies.
10	MS. ALLEN: Right.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yeah. But he doesn't really have any
12	comment on it, I mean.
13	MS. ALLEN: All right. Would you agree that based upon this, the idea that
14	you can watch it on television, you can get it as easily as you can, I'm not talking
15	about your son necessarily –
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Um-huh.
17	MS. ALLEN: but generally, that it wouldn't be hard for someone who didn't
18	have any experience with sex to then describe it?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Later?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay. It is that explicit. You can get that kind of explicit stuff or
23	television, movies, that kind of thing?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes, correct.
25	MS. ALLEN: I think I asked Mr. Newman this, but you – do you understand

1	what a mandatory reporter is?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And just in your own words what would that be? Sorry.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Could you – I know you did ask him, but –
5	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So is it someone – when you – just taking the words,
6	mandatory reporter –
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes, um-huh.
8	MS. ALLEN: it's mandated, right? It's –
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Somebody that would report.
10	MS. ALLEN: Has to, right?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Um-huh.
12	MS. ALLEN: They're obligated by law to report?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Correct.
14	MS. ALLEN: Do you know what – who would fall in that category?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Teachers, parents possibly –
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think doctors would fall in that category?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes, yes, absolutely.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Nurses?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
20	MS. ALLEN: Maybe even – well, I assume police officers or firefighters,
21	something like that. You would assume it would be those type of –
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes, yes.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. When you heard the charges like I had asked
24	some of the other ones, did this, the sexual assault, did that stand out to you?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: That and the other charges as well, yes. It's-

1	MS. ALLEN: So it wasn't just the sexual assault?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: It wasn't just the sexual assault.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Actually, my – sorry –
5	MS. ALLEN: That's okay.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: My heart like beats very fast when I, when I
7	hear stuff like that, because I – being – not only being a single mom but being a
8	parent in general, I think of, if anything God forbid, happened to my child. It hits
9	close to home.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think that will affect you hearing this case?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: It's hard – it's hard to say. I don't think that I
12	be able to hear them talking about it to be honest with you.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. When you say them, do you mean just any of the
14	witnesses?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Any of the witnesses.
16	MS. ALLEN: So you think that your judgment might be impaired or it may
17	suffer as a result of hearing people describe whatever, whatever they may come in
18	here, based upon the charges, the sexual assault or whatever it is?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Correct –
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
22	MS. ALLEN: And this sway in your judgment, does it – which side would it go
23	against? Would it go against the State or the defense?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: I mean I can't say. I – it – from what –
25	hearing from what the – just from what the defense has explained of what the

1	charges are, I mean it –
2	MS. ALLEN: Do you mean the State?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes, that's what I – sorry.
4	MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Sorry, sorry, yeah.
6	MS. ALLEN: That's okay.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
8	MS. ALLEN: So – this is always a really difficult question –
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yeah.
10	MS. ALLEN: and I never phrase it right, but if you were sitting where Mr.
11	Harris was sitting –
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
13	MS. ALLEN: if you were sitting at the defense table and you were the
14	Defendant in this case
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Correct.
16	MS. ALLEN: would you be concerned about someone like you on your
17	jury? Does that make sense?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes, it makes sense. I don't – I don't know. I
19	mean it's – it's so hard and I don't want to be a concern. But, unfortunately, it's just
20	how I feel.
21	MS. ALLEN: I understand. And I – don't ever feel like you can be honest, we
22	prefer that you're honest up front and then, you know, let the chips fall where they
23	may.
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Right.
25	MS. ALLEN: But understand now what you're telling me is of concern for my

1	client.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Sure.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And so I – well, and I would want fair to both sides. I
4	mean it's not – I'm not looking for someone who is absolutely, you know, sides with
5	the defense either. I mean people need to be fair and impartial.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Right.
7	MS. ALLEN: But if these charges are going to affect you or if you think that
8	hearing let's say a child of 12, 13, 14, 15-year-old child talk about something like
9	that and if you think that's going to affect you, this would be the time to disclose that.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes, absolutely. I just don't think – I would
11	picture my child up there and I just – I can't – I wouldn't be able to listen to another
12	child saying that, honestly.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So if one got up and testified, you think that would be the
14	end of it –
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yeah.
16	MS. ALLEN: and you'd be done?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yeah.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think maybe you're –
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Unfortunately.
20	MS. ALLEN: suited for a stolen car case?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Possibly, yes.
22	MS. ALLEN: Or a –
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
24	MS. ALLEN: car accident case?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.

1	MS. ALLEN: No, I appreciate you being honest, Ms. Ross, I really, really do.
2	I know it takes a lot sometimes to say that.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yeah.
4	MS. ALLEN: I appreciate it.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: I'm sorry.
6	MS. ALLEN: No, don't ever apologize for that. Thank you so much. I
7	appreciate it.
8	Let's see, I'm going to ask you to pass the microphone all the way dow
9	and I'm going to butcher your name, so I'm not even going to say it.
10	THE COURT: Ms. Allen is there going to be a motion?
11	MS. ALLEN: Um-huh.
12	THE COURT: Okay. Can the parties approach?
13	[Bench conference transcribed as follows:]
14	MS. ALLEN: I'm sorry. I just –
15	THE COURT: That's okay.
16	MS. ALLEN: No, I thought you wanted us to do it at the end.
17	THE COURT: No.
18	MS. ALLEN: That's why I wasn't going to ask for cause.
19	THE COURT: No. I like 'em to do it.
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
21	THE COURT: So I can hear what they say.
22	MS. ALLEN: I understand.
23	THE COURT: So I'm assuming there's a challenge for cause?
24	MS. ALLEN: Challenge for cause, um-huh.
25	MS. LUZAICH: I just don't think that it rises to deliberate cause. I mean it's

1	preempt for sure. But nobody wants to sit on this, nobody wants to listen to it.
2	MR. MAC ARTHUR: I want to sit on something. I'm never going to be
3	allowed to.
4	MS. LUZAICH: Well, me too, but.
5	THE COURT: She said if a kid gets up and testifies, she's done.
6	MS. ALLEN: She can't listen to anybody else.
7	THE COURT: Okay.
8	MS. LUZAICH: Oh, I guess I took that differently. Okay.
9	THE COURT: Well, I took –
10	MS. ALLEN: She couldn't hear anything. I'm saying, I just –
11	THE COURT: I took it that she was just
12	MS. LUZAICH: Done I took it as done; upset. Whatever.
13	THE COURT: Well, do you want to take her on voir dire?
14	MS. LUZAICH: No, no, that's fine. That's fine.
15	THE COURT: Okay. Any objection then?
16	MS. LUZAICH: No.
17	THE COURT: Okay. The challenge for cause is granted. The number two
18	will now be Tom Shinkawa.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Can't we get a Jones or a Smith or?
20	THE COURT: Can we get –
21	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Could we get an Anglo – did you just ask for an
22	anglicized name?
23	THE COURT: Sure.
24	MS. LUZAICH: A name that's easy to say.
25	THE COURT: You know what if there were

1	MS. ALLEN: Allen.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Allen.
3	THE COURT: if were any –
4	MS. ALLEN: I know. There's an Allen.
5	MR. MAC ARTHUR: What if we want an Obakunda [phonetic].
6	MS. ALLEN: Does that mean –
7	THE COURT: That would be – Allen is already on the panel.
8	MS. LUZAICH: Actually, that wouldn't be too hard say.
9	MS. ALLEN: Are you going to receive this person now –
10	THE COURT: Right now.
11	MS. ALLEN: and question them?
12	THE COURT: That's why I do it.
13	MS. ALLEN: So I'm going to sit down.
14	THE COURT: Right.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
16	THE COURT: Okay.
17	MS. ALLEN: Awesome.
18	[Bench conference concluded]
19	THE COURT: Okay. Ms. Ross, I'm just going to ask you to step out of the
20	box. Do you have the microphone?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
22	THE COURT: Oh, okay. Thank you. If you'll just step down and you can sit
23	in the back, wherever you would like.
24	Tom Shinkawa, you will now become juror number 2. Mr. Shinkawa
25	can you tell me how long – if you'd pass the microphone down, that's very nice.

1	Thank you.
2	How long have you lived in Clark County?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I moved here in '81, so that's – be about 33
4	years.
5	THE COURT: Thirty-three years. Your education background?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: High school.
7	THE COURT: What do you do for a living?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I'm retired from Clark County.
9	THE COURT: You worked for the government, Clark County?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
11	THE COURT: What did you do for Clark County?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Sunset maintenance, parks and recreation.
13	THE COURT: You worked at Sunset Park?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
15	THE COURT: And you took care of the park?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
17	THE COURT: For how many years?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: About 17.
19	THE COURT: That's one of my favorite parks, so thank you. Your marital
20	status?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Single.
22	THE COURT: Do you have any children?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No, just stepchildren, not mine.
24	THE COURT: How many stepchildren do you have?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Three.

1	THE COURT: Three?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Well, I got – make that two.
3	THE COURT: Two. Okay. Are they old enough to be employed?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
5	THE COURT: Can you tell me what they do for a living?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: One's a cabdriver at the airport and the other
7	one works construction.
8	THE COURT: Do you know of any reason why you could not be a completel
9	fair and impartial if you were selected to serve?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No reason.
11	THE COURT: Okay. Have you ever served as a juror before?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Long time ago, maybe about 2009.
13	THE COURT: That's not that long ago. Was it here in this building?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I really can't say. I really don't know.
15	THE COURT: Okay. Was it civil or criminal?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: It was criminal.
17	THE COURT: Is this the first time that you've been to this building?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
19	THE COURT: Okay. Then if you served as a juror it had to have been in
20	another building, right?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: It probably was the old Bridger Building. I'm
22	not too sure, then.
23	THE COURT: Okay. Yeah, have you noticed, the old Bridger Building –
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yeah, it's -
25	THE COURT: is now, oof. It's just dirt now. Was it a civil or criminal case

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I believe it was criminal.
2	THE COURT: Were you selected to be the foreperson?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No, I was not.
4	THE COURT: Without telling me what your verdict was, were you able to
5	reach a verdict?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: The Defendant, I believe, pleaded out.
7	THE COURT: Okay. So it was resolved without you having to deliberate?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Correct.
9	THE COURT: Is there anything about that experience that would affect your
10	ability to be fair and impartial in this particular case?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No.
12	THE COURT: Thank you. Have you or anyone close to you, such as a famil
13	member or friend, ever been the victim of a crime?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Victim of a crime?
15	THE COURT: Yeah. Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family
16	member or friend, ever been the victim of a crime?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No.
18	THE COURT: Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family member or
19	friend ever been the victim of sexual assault, sexual abuse or domestic violence?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Myself domestic violence.
21	THE COURT: Yourself?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
23	THE COURT: You were the victim of a domestic violence?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
25	THE COURT: Okay. Can you tell me a little bit about that, what happened?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: My wife assaulted me. She punched me in
2	the mouth and I said I wasn't going to have any of that and I called the cops.
3	THE COURT: Okay.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: The cops came out. They took her into
5	custody, but for some reason the cop knew my wife and –
6	THE COURT: For some reason the cop knew your wife?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
8	THE COURT: Okay.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: The sergeant did. So –
10	THE COURT: What?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: The sergeant.
12	THE COURT: So a sergeant came?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
14	THE COURT: And the sergeant knew who your wife was?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
16	THE COURT: What did your wife do for a living?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Well, she was in real estate for a period of
18	time and then work restaurants as a waitress –
19	THE COURT: Okay.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: and a hostess.
21	THE COURT: But she knew the sergeant?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
23	THE COURT: She got arrested and then what happened?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No, she was not arrested.
25	THE COURT: Oh, she was not?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No. They just kept her back in the patrol ca
2	for awhile.
3	THE COURT: And then what did they do?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Nothing.
5	THE COURT: They let her out?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Well, they just – I was going to work, so they
7	let me go to work and they just released and tell her go in the house and stay awa
8	from him.
9	THE COURT: Okay. And then you went to work?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
11	THE COURT: And when you came home from work was she there?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
13	THE COURT: Okay. Did everything work out?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
15	THE COURT: Okay. So she wasn't arrested; no charges were filed, nothing
16	like that?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Nothing like that.
18	THE COURT: Okay. Anything about that experience that would affect your
19	ability to be fair and impartial in this case?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I will be fair and impartial in this case.
21	THE COURT: Okay. Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family
22	member or friend ever been accused of a crime?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Not to my knowledge.
24	THE COURT: Okay. Would you have a tendency to give more weight or
25	credence or less weight or credence to the testimony of a police officer, simply

1	because he or she is a police officer?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I will give no more credence.
3	THE COURT: Okay. Let me make – what was your answer?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No more credence. I mean it's just the
5	testimony would be weighed on.
6	THE COURT: Okay. So you would treat that person in – the same way you
7	would treat any other witness?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
9	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. If you're selected to be on this panel, can
10	you wait in forming your opinion as to the appropriate result to be reached in this
11	case until you have heard all of the evidence from both sides and after you are
12	instructed on the law by myself? Can you do that?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
14	THE COURT: Okay. Can you think of any reason at all why you could not be
15	a completely fair and impartial juror if you were selected to serve on this panel?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No reason, ma'am.
17	THE COURT: Thank you, sir. And, again, thank you very much for your
18	patience and your courtesy.
19	Ms. Luzaich –
20	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.
21	THE COURT: you may question this juror.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Good afternoon, Mr. Shinkawa. How did you feel about that
23	when the police officer, the sergeant released her?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I got no problems with her being release and

everything else. But it was a just a judgment call on his part because he really don't

1	want to take her downtown and book her. And it was - I didn't want to see her go to
2	jail either, but it was nice to see her in a patrol car, in the back.
3	MS. LUZAICH: I get that. But I guess my question is more did it make you
4	angry that he released her instead of taking her away?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No, ma'am.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. The – is that the only time you got to see her in the
7	back of a patrol car?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
9	MS. LUZAICH: She never hit you again?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Never touched me again.
11	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. That's a good thing. The two step kids that you
12	mentioned, would they be her kids?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
14	MS. LUZAICH: Did you participate in raising them or were they already older
15	when you came into their lives?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: The daughter, Jeanine, she was 13 years old
17	and she was living with my wife then. And she'd move in with her brother. So she
18	moved out the house after she ran away. So it's one of them things.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Why did she run away?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Headstrong. She knows everything. You
21	know, the same thing like any teenager does; you know, they know everything.
22	They know what you know and they know more.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Of course they do. How – is the son older than her?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
25	MS. LUZAICH: A bit older?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I would say about – I would say eight years
2	older.
3	MS. LUZAICH: So when you came into their lives, he was already not living
4	with his mom?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes. He was living with his father.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Did you have any decision making authority when it
7	came to the daughter or was she just out of the house and not living with you?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: She lived with us for awhile but then, you
9	know, then she ran away. And then the – we couldn't control her, you know. So
10	she moved in with the son.
11	MS. LUZAICH: Did she ever come back to your house and live?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, for awhile, but you know, just, eh, uh.
13	MS. LUZAICH: In and out?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: In and out.
15	MS. LUZAICH: Was it a difficult situation for you?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: A little bit, but it's baggage that some people
17	have and you have to deal with it.
18	MS. LUZAICH: All right. Okay. So in light of that, do you feel that you have a
19	little bit of experience dealing with kids and kind of evaluating what they have to
20	say?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Can you evaluate the testimony of kids the same as you
23	would any other witness?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
25	MS. LUZAICH: With an open mind objectively?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it might be hard for kids to disclose abuse to
3	someone else?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: It has to do with the individual child.
5	Sometimes they make up things. And sometimes they tell the truth. So you just
6	have to evaluate for what the situation, what the person says.
7	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. But just like adults sometimes they make up things,
8	sometimes they tell the truth, right?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Correct.
10	MS. LUZAICH: Can you think of reasons that a kid might not disclose that
11	they were being abused?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
13	MS. LUZAICH: What might some reasons be in your mind?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Would be, probably, shame and then the peer
15	pressure of the other parent or whatever saying something. And then the loss of the
16	family structure.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it is embarrassing to have to talk about
18	things of that nature?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Is that something that you might take into
21	consideration when evaluating testimony?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that – well, do you have an opinion about
24	individuals who exchange sex for money?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No ma'am It's – there has to be a reason

1	but if – it's their business.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Illegal, but it's still what they do?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I have an opinion on this, if you want to hear
4	it?
5	MS. LUZAICH: I – absolutely I want to hear it.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Everybody does it for money.
7	MS. LUZAICH: In one way or another?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: In one way or another. In other words –
9	MS. LUZAICH: Okay.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: you married a person and it's the long term
11	Don't marry the person, it's the short term.
12	MS. LUZAICH: I like that. Okay. So if somebody in court tells you about hov
13	they have actually exchanged sex for money, in the illegal sense, can you still listen
14	to what that person has to say and be objective?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
16	MS. LUZAICH: You won't automatically disbelieve what they have to say
17	simply because they've told you that they exchanged sex for money, which is a
18	crime?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Which is a crime, yes, but it's still their
20	testimony and you have to give weight to anything what they say.
21	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Are you expecting to see or hear anything in this trial?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Expecting? I just expect the truth, ma'am.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So do we. You've heard the questions that I've asked
24	over the last two days, is there anything that you think that I need to know in light of
25	what I've been asking about you? Is there anything you think I need to know or we
1	

1	need to know about you?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No, ma'am. Everything you ask me, I'll
3	answer.
4	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think you would be a good juror?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Why?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I'm fair and impartial. I listen to everything,
8	then I make my decision.
	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Is there anything about you that would prevent you
9	
10	from being able to sit in judgment of somebody?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: No, ma'am. I can –
12	MS. LUZAICH: You hesitated.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: I always hesitate because I have to think
14	important questions through.
15	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. I appreciate that. So if you serve as a
16	juror in this case and you listen to all the testimony, see any evidence that might be
17	admitted, if you are convinced beyond a reasonable doubt the Defendant committed
18	the crimes that he is charged with, would you be able to say the word guilty?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, ma'am.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you. Pass for cause
21	THE COURT: Ms. Allen –
22	MS. ALLEN: Yes.
23	THE COURT: it's your panel
24	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
25	Good afternoon, Mr. Shinkawa.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Good afternoon.
2	MS. ALLEN: How are you?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Okay.
4	MS. ALLEN: I think – oh, you were asked if you served on a jury before, is
5	that right?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Say again.
7	MS. ALLEN: You served on a jury before, is that right?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes, a long time ago.
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I can't remember if you said it was a good experience,
10	bad experience?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: It was an enlightening experience.
12	MS. ALLEN: Enlightening?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yeah.
14	MS. ALLEN: Would you say that you – were you – would you say you were
15	glad you did it?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Yes.
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. I have to say, I think – I just – your answers
18	were very entertaining and I really liked them, so I really don't think I'm going to pick
19	you on all that much.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Thank you.
21	MS. ALLEN: You're welcome. If you could just pass – I was going towards
22	seat number 7, if you could pass it down.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #089: Okay.
24	MS. ALLEN: And I promise I'll get to you this time. Could you say your last
25	name for me?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: Urquico [ pronounces name].
2	MS. ALLEN: Urquico [pronounces name]?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: Yes.
4	MS. ALLEN: How are you?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: All right. How you doing?
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So tell me, excited about your jury summons?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: No.

24	MS. ALLEN: and bore them and listening?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: No, I'm guy that likes to clock in, make my

1	money and go home.
2	MS. ALLEN: All right. What kind of work do you do?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: I'm a bartender.
4	MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay, all right. Doesn't that require you to talk to people?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: It requires me to BS with people, yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: Aren't you a smooth, smooth dude. Aren't you like a pseudo
7	psychiatrist or something?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: No, no.
9	MS. ALLEN: Don't you ever listen to people gripe and complain about every-
10	thing?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: I do. But see over here I tell the truth or I
12	have to tell the truth. Over there, I can tell you what you want to hear, so make my
13	tip bigger.
14	MS. ALLEN: Oh, I bet that could get very creative?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: Yeah.
16	MS. ALLEN: And you strike me as a very creative kind of person. All right.
17	So you like your job?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: Yes, I do.
19	MS. ALLEN: All right. So you – for you it pretty much sucks being here, is
20	that right?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #015: I wouldn't say sucks, but –

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I would try my hearts of hearts, but to hear the kids testify would be the hardest part.

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: If I could just read something or if it was just all – but, you know, to actually see a witness, a young witness, you know, recall events like that, whether it's alleged or really did happen, wouldn't matter, just to see a child, you know, recall something like that would be – it's going to be very disturbing.

25	THE COURT: You can still be a juror if you believe the testimony is going to

1	difficult to hear.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Right.
3	THE COURT: What I need to know is, although –
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Will I be fair, yes.
5	THE COURT: remember, she's got to take down everything –
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I'm sorry.
7	THE COURT: that's being said, that's why we try not to talk over each
8	other. So, I agree, it may be difficult; may be difficult for everyone that's on the jury
9	panel. But even if it is going to be difficult, are you a person that will sit through this
10	trial, listen to the difficult testimony, keep an open mind, listen to both sides and be
11	fair and impartial to both sides?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Yes, I would be. I would -
13	THE COURT: Okay.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I would be.
15	THE COURT: Do you understand that's a little bit different –
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Yes.
17	THE COURT: than what you told Ms. Allen?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I understand now.
19	THE COURT: Okay. Well – and I'm not trying to talk you into
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Right.
21	THE COURT: Remember, there's no right or wrong answer.
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Right.
23	THE COURT: I'm not trying to talk you into any answer. I just want the truth
24	I want a panel of jurors that are going to be fair and impartial to the State as well as
25	to this gentleman [indicating]. Do you understand that?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Yes, Your Honor.
2	THE COURT: Okay. And so Ms. Allen asked an excellent question, if you or
3	someone you loved was sitting at that defense table, would you be comfortable with
4	someone like you sitting as a juror?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I would still be a little uncomfortable, because
6	I really love kids. I work with kids all the time. And just the ideas of kids and sexual
7	assault, it's just really – it's just so disturbing.
8	THE COURT: Okay.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: It just –
10	THE COURT: And you agree that your family member would be entitled to a
11	juror who was fair and impartial?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Right.
13	THE COURT: Okay. So when I ask you that question, you say oh, no, no, I
14	wouldn't want someone like me. See –
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Right.
16	THE COURT: at first you'll tell me I can be fair and impartial –
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Yeah.
18	THE COURT: then when I ask whether that was your family member, you
19	kind of backtrack and you don't want someone like you. So can you kind of
20	reconcile that for me, if you can?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Right. I want to be fair. I want to be as fair as
22	possible.
23	THE COURT: Okay.
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I'm just saying I don't know until – if I could be

totally fair. If I would let my emotions sway me, you know, and not be - like, pass

25

1	the judgment. If that's the best way I can describe it.
2	THE COURT: Okay. You want to be fair.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I want to, I have a deep desire to be fair.
4	THE COURT: Okay.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Um-huh.
6	THE COURT: And are you telling me that you might not be able to be fair?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Exactly.
8	THE COURT: Okay.
9	MS. ALLEN: Come up?
10	THE COURT: Uh-huh.
11	[Bench conference transcribed as follows:]
12	MS. ALLEN: Obviously, challenge.
13	MS. LUZAICH: I just think that she said she might not. It's going to be
14	difficult if everybody feels that way.
15	THE COURT: I completely agree.
16	MS. LUZAICH: So I don't think it rises to the level of cause.
17	THE COURT: Here's the problem, you know, there's that case, it's a recent
18	case where Judge Vega was the Judge and – do you know what I'm talking about?
19	MS. ALLEN: I think I do.
20	THE COURT: They just started jury selected and the juror kind of said –
21	MS. LUZAICH: Waffled?
22	THE COURT: Waffled. And then when the Judge questioned the juror, oh,
23	no, I can be fair and impartial. And the Supreme Court said, no, you got to let those
24	you know, when they tell you they can't be fair and impartial, you got to let those
25	people go. So –

MS. LUZAICH: But she didn't say she can't be -

THE COURT: Well -

MS. LUZAICH: -- she said she eh, eh, eh.

THE COURT: -- here's what I always have a problem with, she – for some reason I start ask them, that's why I always say I'm not trying to talk you into saying something. But they will always tell me something different than they tell the attorney. She did that. She told me something –

MR. MAC ARTHUR: Judge, they're telling us that.

THE COURT: And I'm not, I promise I'm not trying to talk her into it.

MS. ALLEN: Yeah, we know.

THE COURT: But for some reason they'll want to tell me they're going to be fair and impartial. Once you ask that question and I've asked it twice, whether you were sitting there or a family member, both times she said I wouldn't want a juror like me.

MS. ALLEN: I just feel like it's err in the side of caution.

THE COURT: So I'll let you take her on voir dire if you want, but it seems pretty clear to me that if she was sitting there, she wouldn't want someone.

MS. LUZAICH: But that's not what the standard is.

THE COURT: I agree. It's whether you can be fair and impartial. And when I ask her, well, if you or someone you loved was sitting there, what – you know, I asked her to reconcile it. Well, because – I think because of the allegations and the fact that kids will be testifying that my emotions will interfere.

MS. LUZAICH: Yeah, but everybody thinks that. I, I just – I don't think it rises to the level of cause.

THE COURT: I don't. I could sit on any case no matter what.

1	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Yeah.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Well, I don't have a heart, but –
3	THE COURT: But we're different.
4	MS. LUZAICH: Yeah.
5	THE COURT: We're different. We're kind of trained to just we're just weire
6	MS. LUZAICH: I know, but –
7	THE COURT: We're different. We are.
8	MS. ALLEN: I know.
9	THE COURT: We don't think like the regular people out there.
10	MS. ALLEN: No we don't.
11	THE COURT: I could sit on any case.
12	MS. LUZAICH: I just – she's never said that she can't be fair. She said it'll b
13	hard. She said she – you know, if she's sitting there she doesn't want herself, but
14	that's not what the standard is.
15	MS. ALLEN: My thoughts are – I'm sorry.
16	MS. LUZAICH: That's not, can't be fair.
17	MS. ALLEN: My concern is that she's like, well, I think I could; but once I hea
18	it I don't know that I can –
19	THE COURT: Yeah.
20	MS. ALLEN: and that's why I'm concerned. So if the kid gets on the stand
21	and all of a sudden she starts saying, oh, my God and starts crying.
22	MS. LUZAICH: I know. I still don't think it rises to the level of cause that's
23	what preempts are for –
24	MS. ALLEN: I know. I understand.
25	MS. LUZAICH: and that's the State's position.

1	THE COURT: Okay. I can question her again, but do you want to take her on
2	voir dire?
3	MS. LUZAICH: No, I think the record is fine where it is and, I mean, you're
4	going to do what you're going to do, so.
5	THE COURT: Okay. So you don't want me to question her anymore?
6	MS. LUZAICH: [No verbal response].
7	THE COURT: Okay. 'Cause I think every time I question her she's just trying
8	to please me. And so she's –
9	MS. LUZAICH: Right. She's trying to please whoever is asking her
10	questions.
11	THE COURT: Yes, and I hate that.
12	MS. LUZAICH: I agree.
13	THE COURT: And so –
14	MS. LUZAICH: And if I question her, she's going to say the same thing that
15	she said to you, 'cause I'm going to lead her in that direction, so. I mean there's the
16	record and –
17	MS. ALLEN: It is what it is.
18	THE COURT: Okay. All right.
19	MS. LUZAICH: I just think they should exercise a preempt for her.
20	THE COURT: Okay. I'm going to grant the challenge for cause.
21	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
22	[Bench conference concluded]
23	THE COURT: All right. At this time, Ms. Randolph, I'm just going to ask that
24	you will step out of your seat.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Okay.

1	THE COURT: We appreciate your willingness – I –
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: Thank you.
3	THE COURT: really appreciate your willingness to be here and your
4	courtesy in answering all the questions you have answered thus far.
5	Laura Has – can you pronounce your last name?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Hojnacke [pronounces name].
7	THE COURT: Ho –
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Hojnacke [pronounces name].
9	THE COURT: Hojnacke [pronounces name].
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.
11	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you and you're going to become juror number
12	15. And I just have a few questions for you. First of all, thank you very much for
13	being here for the last two days. I sincerely appreciate your courtesy and
14	willingness to be here.
15	Can you tell me how long have you lived in Clark County?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Four years.
17	THE COURT: Your employment, training, education background?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: High school and cosmetology school. And
19	I'm currently unemployed. I'm a homemaker.
20	THE COURT: Your marital status?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Married.
22	THE COURT: And you have children?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I have four and they're all minors.
24	THE COURT: Okay. And your husband is employed?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: He is.

1	THE COURT: What –
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: He does computer programming.
3	THE COURT: Do you know of any reason why you could not be a completel
4	fair and impartial juror –
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.
6	THE COURT: if selected to serve on this panel?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.
8	THE COURT: Have you ever served as a juror before?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.
10	THE COURT: Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family member or
11	friend, ever been the victim of a crime?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yes.
13	THE COURT: Can you tell us about that?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Well, we've had our cars broken into multiple
15	times and our car was –
16	THE COURT: When you say multiple, like three, four?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I think three.
18	THE COURT: Okay.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: And we had one of our cars stolen and it was
20	recovered. And our home was broken into while we were sleeping.
21	THE COURT: Oh, I'm sorry. Was that here in Clark County?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No, those are all in Oregon.
23	THE COURT: All of those things happened in Oregon?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah and we've been fine since we've been
25	here.

THE COURT: Okay. Well, good, I'm glad. But when you were in Oregon, how about like the home burglary when you were at home, can you tell me about that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: We were sleeping and someone came in and stole some things. And we think that my daughter woke up and was crying and that scared them off, so –

THE COURT: So you -

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: -- they dropped some of the stuff but they took some of it with them.

THE COURT: So you and your husband never woke up?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No. Well, I woke up 'cause my daughter was awake, but I didn't – we didn't wake up because of that.

THE COURT: Okay. And how did you know somebody had been in the house?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: There were muddy footprints coming in through the backdoor and a bunch of stuff was missing.

THE COURT: Okay. Did you notice it that night or the next morning?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: The next morning.

THE COURT: Okay. Did you call the police?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: We did and they came out and they looked around. And I reported my credit – like all my cards stolen, 'cause my purses were gone. And my bank messed up and they cancelled the wrong card for my debit card and the guy used it at several stores and so they actually caught him. They had him on videotape

THE COURT: Oh.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: -- at Walmart self-checkout place. And so they caught it. They knew who it was. And then he was apprehended later. And so he went to court and I had to go for a deposition. And I think he ended up pleading guilty so we didn't have to – it didn't go to trial.

THE COURT: Okay. So were you happy with the way it was handled? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.

THE COURT: Okay. And now the other matters, did you call the police on those matters?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: We did.

THE COURT: Were you happy with the way those matters were handled?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: One of the times our car was broken into
there was a bloody fingerprint in the car and they didn't never show up and I was a
little bit disappointed that they didn't come, since there was like some evidence of
who it could have been. But I mean I'm sure they were busy and had other things

THE COURT: Anything about those incidents that would affect your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.

that were more important to do.

THE COURT: Have you or anyone close to you, such as a family member or friend ever been the victim of a sexual assault, sexual abuse or domestic violence?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yes.

THE COURT: Can you tell me about that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I was molested by a neighbor as a child.

THE COURT: Okay. Are you comfortable speaking amongst us all or would you rather approach the bench?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I'd rather approach the bench.
2	THE COURT: Okay. And you can approach the bench with all four lawyers.
3	[Bench conference transcribed as follows:]
4	THE COURT: Okay. The record will reflect juror number 90 is present at the
5	bench with all four lawyers.
6	I apologize. I didn't know what you were going to say. But I just need
7	to kind of question you a little bit more about that.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Certainly.
9	THE COURT: Here, you want some tissue.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Thanks.
11	THE COURT: You let me know when you're ready.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I'm ready.
13	THE COURT: Okay. How old were you?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I don't remember, probably like eight.
15	THE COURT: So you were a little girl?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.
17	THE COURT: And it was a neighbor?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Uh-huh, she was a teenager.
19	THE COURT: A girl?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Uh-huh.
21	THE COURT: Okay. Did you disclose it?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.
23	THE COURT: Never?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I've never told anyone.
<sub>25</sub>	THE COURT: This is your first disclosure today

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Um –
2	THE COURT: Okay. What, what made you disclose it for the first time
3	today?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I'm supposed to be honest.
5	THE COURT: I agree. And I guess maybe a better question is why didn't you
6	disclose it until today? I mean does your husband know?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: [Shakes head].
8	THE COURT: No one knows?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.
10	THE COURT: Okay.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Well, why would I tell people, I mean?
12	THE COURT: Okay.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: It's not something you want everyone to
14	know. And I guess I felt guilty as a kid.
15	THE COURT: Why would you feel guilty? That was just an emotion you had
16	as a child?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.
18	THE COURT: Okay. But you never thought you should tell your mom or
19	dad?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I don't know.
21	THE COURT: Okay. Is there anything about that that would – you think
22	would affect your ability to be fair and impartial in this case?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I don't think so.
24	THE COURT: Okay. Well, and you're the only one who can tell us.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No, I don't think it would.

1	THE COURT: Okay. So regardless of what your experience was as a child,
2	you don't believe that's going to interfere in your ability to be fair and impartial if
3	you're selected to be on this panel?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.
5	THE COURT: Okay. Does the State have any follow-up?
6	MS. LUZAICH: Huh-uh.
7	THE COURT: Do you have any follow-up?
8	'Cause I won't allow them to ask you about it once you go back to your
9	seat, so.
10	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Right, right.
11	MS. ALLEN: Right, we understand.
12	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Would you like any follow-up to be done up here, is that
13	what you mean?
14	THE COURT: Yeah –
15	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Oh.
16	THE COURT: that's what I'm saying. I won't make her answer –
17	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Understand.
18	THE COURT: any of these questions once she goes and sits back down.
19	So if there's anything either side wants to follow-up on, I would just ask –
20	MR. MAC ARTHUR: We do it up here, sure.
21	THE COURT: to protect her privacy and –
22	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Makes sense. Court's indulgence.
23	MS. ALLEN: Sorry.
24	MR. MAC ARTHUR: Yeah.
25	THE COURT: Yeah. I always hate to have to ask these questions. I'm sorry.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: That's okay.
2	MS. ALLEN: You, you're very – obviously, very emotional about it. So you
3	can understand why we would be concerned about that, really?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Um-huh.
5	MS. ALLEN: Yes or no. I'm sorry, we're still recording.
6	THE COURT: Yes.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yes. Sorry.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So fine. I mean –
9	THE COURT: Just a minute.
10	You know what ladies and gentlemen, just so you know, we are still
11	recording up here and so it's important that I just have everyone just stay quiet.
12	Thank you.
13	MS. ALLEN: Yeah. Do you think maybe a different kind of case, might be
14	better or were you concerned when you heard the charges?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah, I mean I don't know why anybody
16	wouldn't be concerned.
17	MS. ALLEN: Right.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: You know, I mean it's very serious.
19	MS. ALLEN: Of course. But you come from, obviously, a different
20	perspective.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah, I guess. I don't know. I don't really –
22	THE COURT: I think what Ms. Allen is trying to get at, should the defense be
23	concerned with having you as a juror in this case? Should they have any concerns
24	about your ability to be fair and impartial?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. MAC ARTHUR: And I'll just ask this and part of it's repetitive, but.

Look it's not that any of the attorneys up here have never had that kind of answer before, but no one has ever disclosed as far as I can tell for the first time in court. So this is –

MS. LUZAICH: That's not true.

MR. MAC ARTHUR: Oh, sorry. I'm sorry.

MS. LUZAICH: I've heard it two or three times.

MS. ALLEN: Yeah, but you do it all the time.

MR. MAC ARTHUR: With the exception of Lisa. And so for you it's very fresh, right. Many of the other people who disclosed may have had an opportunity to sit and process and figure out how they feel and how it affects how they look. And so the Judge and Betsy's question, I think, go to the issue of is there a danger that as we go through this trial and you sort of become more comfortable with, you know, what you said in open court and hear child alleged victims testifying and you're evaluating their credibility, as to whether they're not honest or not, is there a danger that due to this, you know, emotional state —

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Uh-huh.

MR. MAC ARTHUR: -- that's new to you, that it might impair your ability to objectively evaluate their testimony to you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Possibly. I can't really – I mean I don't know now, obviously; but –

THE COURT: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: -- it could.

THE COURT: And I know, I've noticed you back there, you've been paying

1	attention; you've been listening and so you understand what our concerns are?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.
3	THE COURT: We can't have jurors that say today we can be fair and
4	impartial but when you go back to deliberate upon a verdict, after you've heard all
5	the evidence say, no, I can't be fair and impartial. 'Cause you can't tell me that then
6	do you understand that?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Then I guess I would say no.
8	THE COURT: No what?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No, I can't be fair and – I can't guarantee that
10	I would be.
11	THE COURT: Okay. Who are you not going to be fair to?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Probably the defense.
13	THE COURT: Because of what happened to you?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.
15	THE COURT: Okay. So is there a danger of you kind of taking out on the
16	defense what happened to you?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I'd like to say no but I can't – I don't know.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Can I just ask her one question, please?
19	THE COURT: Absolutely.
20	MS. LUZAICH: And I mean no disrespect when I say this. You recognize tha
21	what happened to you is something that's entirely different than what's going to go
22	on in this court?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yes.
24	MS. LUZAICH: The relationship or lack of relationship, the situations are
25	entirely different?

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impartial?

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yes.
MS. LUZAICH: And all we're asking you to do is leave that, what happened to
you outside the courtroom and when you come in here listen to all the witnesses,
the kids, the grownups, the police, everybody objectively and make up your mind
about credibility and things of that nature, without thinking about what happened to
you. I mean can you do that?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yes.
THE COURT: Okay. If you or someone you loved were sitting at the defense
table right now, would you want someone like yourself on the jury panel?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: [No verbal response].
MS. ALLEN: I mean on this type of case.
MS. LUZAICH: And I don't mean to interrupt, but knowing everything that you
know about yourself.
THE COURT: Okay. Do you, do you understand my question?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.
THE COURT: Okay. So if, you know, your brother, your husband, cousins,
somebody you really care about, was sitting at the defense table, would you want
someone like yourself as a juror?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I don't really know.
THE COURT: Okay. Well, what kind of juror would you want for a loved one?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: One that would be completely impartial and -
THE COURT: Completely fair and impartial, right?
PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.

THE COURT: Okay. So are you a juror that can be completely fair and

1	MS. ALLEN: I think on these charges, just qualifying on these charges.
2	THE COURT: I'm sorry?
3	MS. ALLEN: I would qualify it just with the charges. Like if it was a stolen car
4	I think it wouldn't be an issue.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah, but -
6	THE COURT: Well, you know what the charges are, right?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah, I do.
8	THE COURT: Oh, okay.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I mean like right now I say yes, but depending
10	on – maybe in the situation it would be different. Like when I'm hearing stuff, it
11	would be different; does that make sense?
12	THE COURT: Yeah. And that's what I'm concerned about. 'Cause
13	remember I said it yesterday everybody –
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.
15	THE COURT: comes to the courtroom with lifetime – life experiences.
16	We'd never be able to find people that have no experiences, nor would we want
17	those kind of people as jurors. You understand that right?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah.
19	THE COURT: What we need is people that can leave their experiences at the
20	door and judge this case solely upon what they see and hear in the courtroom. And
21	the instructions on the law without allowing what happened to you to interfere with
22	that. Do you understand that?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I don't think I can do that.
24	THE COURT: Okay. You don't think you can set aside your personal
25	experience?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: I don't think I can.
2	THE COURT: Okay. And so does that mean you don't think you can be fai
3	and impartial to these parties?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yes.
5	THE COURT: Okay. And who is it you don't think you can be fair to?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: The Defendant.
7	THE COURT: Okay. You don't think he can get a fair trial with you on a
8	panel?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: No.
10	THE COURT: Okay. Is there any other follow-up?
11	MS. ALLEN: No, Your Honor.
12	THE COURT: Okay. I'm just going to – do you have anything at this chair
13	over here [indicating]?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #090: Yeah, just my purse.

4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
5	MS. LUZAICH: So what might, in your mind, be some reasons that a child
6	would not disclose abuse?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: They're afraid. Out of respect for an adult.
8	They might be afraid to tell you, as the authority, the teacher also; some – it
9	depends on the child.
10	MS. LUZAICH: So lots of different reasons?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: [Nods head]. Yes.
12	MS. LUZAICH: Is that a yes. Do you think that if somebody does something
13	foolish, something that you might do yourself that they're still entitled to the same
14	protection of the law that you and I are?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
16	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that if somebody commits a crime are they still
17	entitled to protection under the law for something else?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Can you listen to somebody who you hear that about and still
20	at least objectively, listen to what they have to say?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
22	MS. LUZAICH: So if somebody – you hear that somebody did something
23	really, really foolish, you won't automatically disbelieve them just because of that?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: No.
25	MS. LUZAICH: And if you hear that somebody may have broken the law at

1	some point, you won't automatically disbelieve them just because of that?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Take it into consideration of course, but you can still listen to
4	what they have to say?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.
7	What do you think about kids, Mr. Powell, hard to disclose abuse?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: I think it depends on the environment, how
9	they were raised.
10	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. And what about it? What about their environment and
11	how they were raised?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: I think that determines their communication
13	skills. So how they communicate is going to depend on how they were raised.
14	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that different kids in the same home that are
15	raised the same can communicate differently, will have different levels of skill at
16	communicating?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Sure.
18	MS. LUZAICH: What causes that in your mind or what could, I guess?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: I just think – I mean I have two boys that are
20	very different. So I know that even though they were raised in the same home that
21	they're very different in what their interests are and what – you know, how their
22	approach to life is.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think that or would you agree that different
24	people can perceive the same set of circumstances differently?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Yes.

1	MS. LUZAICH: And if they perceive it differently, would you expect them to
2	relate it later to somebody in the same way?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Not necessarily.
4	MS. LUZAICH: What might make them perceive it differently?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: They might just have a different point of view
6	from where there were, their ages may be different, I mean there could be numerous
7	factors.
8	MS. LUZAICH: What are some factors other than age or location? Anything
9	else you can think of?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Well, how they were raised and the
11	relationship that they have with the adults around them, all that sort of thing.
12	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think that what is important to some people is
13	not important to some other people?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Yes.
15	MS. LUZAICH: Might that enter into it as well?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Sure.

7	MS. LUZAICH: Right, right. Does everybody who commits a crime, does that

18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: It would depend upon the circumstances.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. For example?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Well, I haven't heard anything other than wha
21	you've asked me. So it would depend upon the circumstances.
22	MS. LUZAICH: The circumstances of what? Like the circumstances why the
23	would exchange sex for money –
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Exactly.
25	MS. LUZAICH: or what they have to say?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Exactly.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. If you hear that somebody has exchanged sex for
3	money at some point in their life, can they still be a victim of sexual assault in your
4	mind?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Yes.
6	MS. LUZAICH: So can you still listen to what that person has to say and at
7	least try and be objective about what they have to say?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #052: Yes.
9	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.
10	What about you Ms. Barlow, what do you think about that? A person
11	who exchanges sex for money, can that person in theory in your mind still be a
12	victim of sexual assault?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: I think so.
14	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you have an opinion about individuals who
15	exchange sex for money?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: I mean I don't think that's right, but I could
17	look at it objectively.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Clearly it's not right 'cause it is illegal.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yeah.
20	MS. LUZAICH: You could look at what they have to say still objectively. You
21	won't automatically say just because you did that I will, therefore, disbelieve every-
22	thing you say?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
24	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that a person who does that is necessarily a bad
25	person?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: I don't think so, depending on the
2	circumstance, why they did that.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. And that's something that you would take into
4	consideration?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #051: Yes.
6	MS. LUZAICH: What about you guys [indicating], Ms. Hiatt, Ms. Ence, Mr.
7	Hernandez or, sorry, Ms. Hernandez, Mr. Padernilla, do you want to comment on
8	that? Anybody? Ms. Hiatt.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Sure. I could be objective about that because
10	there are reasons why people do things. And it's important to know those reasons
11	before you make any kind of a judgment.
12	MS. LUZAICH: Okay.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Even if it is wrong.
14	MS. LUZAICH: Will the reason that somebody does it make a difference to
15	you?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes.
17	MS. LUZAICH: And if you hear a reason then what?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Well, then I still want to hear the whole story
19	before a decision is, you know, made.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So you will at least remain objective –
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes.
22	MS. LUZAICH: and listen to what the individuals have to say?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes.
24	MS. LUZAICH: What about the person who does something that you would
25	never do, that you think is foolish, not a crime necessarily but really, really dumb;

1	you would never do it. Can you listen to that person objectively?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #053: Yes.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Ms. Ence, yourself?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #056: I feel I could listen objectively. I don't think a
5	person ever deserves to be a victim of a crime because they've done something
6	else. I don't think they've earned that, but because there were bad in one situation
7	so they deserve to be treated badly in another.
8	MS. LUZAICH: In your mind everybody in theory can be considered a victim
9	of a crime. They don't lose the ability to become a – to be considered –
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #056: Right.
11	MS. LUZAICH: a victim just because of bad things that they have done?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #056: Correct.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Can you listen to what individuals like this, you know, people
14	who do foolish things; people who make really poor choices. People who may
15	commit a crime, can you at least listen to what they have to say without auto-
16	matically discounting what they have to say because of what you've heard?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #056: Yes.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.
19	Ms. Hernandez what about yourself?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: I can listen to them but I wouldn't trust them.
21	MS. LUZAICH: When you said you wouldn't trust them, would you auto-
22	matically disbelieve – well, who is them? I mean somebody who's foolish? Some-
23	body commits a crime? All; all of the above?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yeah.
25	MS. LUZAICH: All of the above.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Correct.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. When you say you couldn't or wouldn't trust them,
3	does that mean that you would automatically disbelieve anything they tell you?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: No, but I would pay attention to what they're
5	telling me and base it on facts, other facts. I wouldn't just, you know, listen to their
6	story. I would –
7	MS. LUZAICH: You wouldn't blindly believe them?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yeah, of course.
9	MS. LUZAICH: But you wouldn't do that with anybody, would you? I mean
10	wouldn't you want to hear what everybody has to say before making –
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: True.
12	MS. LUZAICH: up your mind?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: True.
14	MS. LUZAICH: You had mentioned that you were going to school but you're
15	not enrolled this semester?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Uh-huh.
17	MS. LUZAICH: How come?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Just financial reasons.
19	MS. LUZAICH: School is expensive?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Um-huh.
21	MS. LUZAICH: Are you going to go back next semester?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yes.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Do you have much experience with kids?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: No.
25	MS. LUZAICH: So kids are going to come in here and testify. And when I say

1	kids, you know, under 18, not five or six.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Uh-huh.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Can you listen to what kids have to say and be objective?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yes, just like an adult.
5	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So you won't automatically believe an adult over a
6	child –
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: No.
8	MS. LUZAICH: simply because they're adults?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: It would be equal.
10	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it's harder for a child to disclose abuse than
11	for an adult?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: I think it's harder for them to explain because
13	they don't understand it themselves. And I, you know – fear, it depends on the age
14	and maturity level. The way they were brought up, but I mean a situation like that I
15	don't think anyone can find a way to explain it, you know. It's different for everyone
16	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think it's hard for an adult to disclose abuse?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: I don't really know.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Do you know anybody that's been abused?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: No.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it would be embarrassing to come into a
21	room full of strangers and have to describe intimate sexual details?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yes.
23	MS. LUZAICH: No matter how old you are do you think that's embarrassing?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yes.
25	MS. LUZAICH: And is that something that you would take into consideration

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when you are evaluating the testimony that you are going to hear?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that if somebody either acted or reacted to that kind of situation in a way that you would not have, are you going to automatically disbelieve what that person has to say?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: No.

MS. LUZAICH: Is there anything in particular that you're expecting to see in this trial?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: I don't – I'm not expecting anything. I'm just – you know, I just got to listen to the story, the facts and see if it, you know, if – and the evidence, and I don't – I'm not really expecting anything, sorry, on the subject.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Well, you say the evidence. What is evidence to you? Is evidence something that you have to be able to touch?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Facts. Yeah, something that's proven.

Something that's – you know, that you have paperwork of or someone saw and someone – something that's proven to me. Some –

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. In your mind can evidence be testimony, witness testimony?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yes. But, you know, sometimes people don't remember correctly.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: So a lot of times it might not be the correct – I just wouldn't go by testimony a hundred percent. I would rather have evidence. Not just solely on the testimony.

MS. LUZAICH: What is there is no evidence that you can hold in your hand?

Will I not be able to convince you, if -

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: I mean if it's – if the timeline is correct and other, you know, facts or I don't know come into place and they – I don't really know. Honestly, I haven't thought about it.

MS. LUZAICH: And, you know, we definitely put you at a disadvantage by asking you general questions without giving you any facts. So I'm sorry about that.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yeah, 'cause I don't really know, you know, the story or the – any background or information, so it's kind of hard to answer anything right now.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. You had commented that sometimes people don't remember things correctly. What might make somebody or cause somebody to not remember something correctly in your mind?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Well, you were talking about the accident and how you were paying attention to, you know, something different from the other person. So I think that we all have different interest in maybe some things. We didn't pay attention because we weren't interested in looking at that, so you might miss out on very important –

MS. LUZAICH: Details.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: -- facts, details.

MS. LUZAICH: And is that something that you would take into consideration when evaluating witnesses?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #067: Uh-huh.

MS. LUZAICH: Mr. Padernilla. Did I get that right?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Yes.
2	MS. LUZAICH: You – what do you think about that? What to you is
3	evidence? Is evidence something that you have to hold in your hand? Is it
4	testimony? What is evidence to you?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Well, I think it's a factor, something that I can
6	see that will give me a reason not to doubt that that is something that is relevant to
7	whatever is the point that is being taken care of.
8	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. When you say something that you can see.
9	Witnesses are going to come in, they're going to sit there and they're going to
10	testify. You'll be able to see them, so is - can witness testimony be enough for you
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: It can, yes.
12	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So you don't have to hold something in your hand –
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Oh, no.
14	MS. LUZAICH: to be able to be convinced?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: No.
16	MS. LUZAICH: And I'm not saying you won't get to hold something in your
17	hand, but if not are you going to require that?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: No.
19	MS. LUZAICH: As a charge nurse – well, how long have you been a charge
20	nurse? You've been an RN for a long time.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Uh-huh.
22	MS. LUZAICH: How long you been a charge nurse?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: In this particular job, since – well, seven
24	years.
25	MS. LUZAICH: What did you do before that?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: I work in a hospital as a floor nurse.
2	MS. LUZAICH: On a floor nurse, so treating patients on the floor?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Uh-huh.
4	MS. LUZAICH: Did you ever have occasion to be a nurse in the ER, in the
5	emergency room?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Yeah, I also experience that way back before
7	MS. LUZAICH: Have you ever had the occasion to participate in or observe
8	sexual assault exam?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Oh, no.
10	MS. LUZAICH: So if the doctor comes in here and talks to you about sexual
11	assault exam, you're not going to second-guess what the doctor has to say are you
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: No.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. What do you think about kids? Are all kids different?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Yes.
15	MS. LUZAICH: Just like all people are different?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Yes.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Can you be objective when evaluating the testimony of kids?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Yes.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that it is hard for kids to disclose abuse?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Usually, I think a kid usually tells the truth
21	about things that they want to tell. So I don't think so.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Can you think of reasons why a child might not disclose
23	abuse?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Well, for fear of unknown, something that
25	might happen once they tell the truth or whatever they have to tell.

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MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you think that – well, do you think that you can
evaluate the testimony of somebody who is going to tell you that they've done some
thing really foolish, something that you would never have done, can you evaluate
that person's testimony objectively?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: What about somebody who is going to tell you that they have committed a crime. Can you listen to what that person has to say and still try and be objective?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Sure.

MS. LUZAICH: Now, obviously, you're going to take into consideration the crime and things of that nature, but can you – you won't automatically disbelieve what they have to say –

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: No.

MS. LUZAICH: -- just because of that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: No, no.

MS. LUZAICH: How do you feel about individuals who exchange sex for money?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: They have their own reasons and I don't take it from them that they're bad or something like that.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So you can still listen to what that person -

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Oh, yeah.

MS. LUZAICH: -- has to say and, potentially, believe what they have to say --

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: -- potentially?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #074: Yes.

1	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.
2	I haven't asked anybody over here [indicating] that very interesting
3	question. Mr. Bell, what do you think, if somebody exchanges sex for money at
4	some point in their life, can they still be a victim of sexual assault?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yes.
6	THE MARSHAL: [Providing microphone.]
7	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.
8	If you hear that from an individual, can you still listen to what that
9	individual has to say and be objective about what that person has to say?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yes.
11	MS. LUZAICH: So, for example, you won't automatically disbelieve every-
12	thing they say simply because of that?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: No.
14	MS. LUZAICH: What about somebody who makes really, really poor
15	decisions; decisions that you would never make, your sister or your wife would
16	never make. Can you still be objective about that person?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yes.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that an individual who exchanges sex for money
19	could have a reason for doing that?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yes.
21	MS. LUZAICH: Not out of the realm of possibility in your mind?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: No.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.
24	Mr. Nober – Naber.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: Nabor [pronounces name].

1	MS. LUZAICH: Nabor, sorry.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: That's okay.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Like – Torres, Mr. Torres.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: Yes.
5	MS. LUZAICH: Like I said, my handwriting is terrible. What do you think
6	about that, can you objectively listen to an individual who is going to tell you that at
7	some point in their life, they exchanged sex for money?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: Yes.
9	MS. LUZAICH: In your mind can that person still be the victim of a sexual
10	assault?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: Absolutely.
12	MS. LUZAICH: What about the individual who makes extremely poor
13	choices?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: Meaning?
15	MS. LUZAICH: Can you listen to –
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: Oh.
17	MS. LUZAICH: and be objective –
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: Yes.
19	MS. LUZAICH: to what that person has to say?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #045: Yes.
21	MS. LUZAICH: Is there anybody over here [indicating] that can't listen
22	objectively to an individual who is going to tell you that they had exchanged sex for
23	money at some point? A couple of people are not – shaking their heads no. Mr.
24	Capeno, did I get that right; Capitanio?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #047: Yeah.

MS. LUZAICI	H: You – the otl	her people shoo	ok their heads n	no, you kind of –
PROSPECTI	VE JUROR #04	7: No, no.		

MS. LUZAICH: What do you think about individuals who exchange sex for money?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #047: I have no problem with it, whatever, I mean. It's illegal but if they need to do it and have reasons, I'm sure they have their reasons.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. You can still be objective and listen to what that person has to say?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #047: Yeah, definitely.

MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.

Ms. Spaur, you're an attorney, I doubt you've ever dealt with somebody who has exchanged sex for money along those lines. You just do civil, right?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Right.

MS. LUZAICH: What do you think being a civil attorney would do or would it help you or hurt you being a juror?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: I mean I think the only thing about being an attorney would help me as juror is that I understand that, you know, I want jurors to be objective about the testimony that's presented. I want them to keep an open mind throughout the entirety of the case until both sides have been presented and, you know, both sides have rested their cases.

So, you know, I would hope that I could be the kind of juror that I would want on a jury if I was trying the case, just because I know what the responsibilities are for both sides and I know what is at stake.

MS. LUZAICH: Are you a litigator?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Have you tried cases to a jury?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Once. We settle mostly. But I have tried
4	once, one case in California.
5	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Oh, in California?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes.
7	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Well, clearly, you know the burden of proof is different
8	in civil law –
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: right.
10	MS. LUZAICH: than here. The law is different in California than here.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Yes. And that was a product liability case so
12	it was far, far and wide from a criminal case, so.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Do you remember anything from law school, criminal law?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Vaguely. You know, I – law school was
15	awhile ago, but I got licensed in Nevada more recently and I had to take the bar
16	here too, so.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Whatever it is you know about criminal law will you forget it
18	and only follow the law that the Court reads to you?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #049: Absolutely. That's the other thing as a lawye
20	I know that the only law I'm supposed to bring to deliberations is the law that's
21	presented to me by the Court and I don't – honestly, I don't think I remember
22	enough to add my own, but I wouldn't anyway 'cause it's just what's presented as
23	the law we're supposed to be following here.
24	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.
25	Ms. Fried, you had said – and, I'm sorry, this is the part where I upset

1	people. You had mentioned yesterday that your mom had been molested.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Um-huh.
3	MS. LUZAICH: You said she told her parents and the parents did nothing.
4	They slipped it under the rug.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah.
6	MS. LUZAICH: How – how did that – like when she was describing it to you
7	did that – did it seem like she was angry about that?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Very. She holds – she still holds a lot of
9	resentment to this day against her parents.
10	MS. LUZAICH: Were you surprised that happened?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah.
12	MS. LUZAICH: That they didn't do anything about it.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Um – oh, that they didn't do anything? Not
14	really. I know my grandparents and they, you know.
15	MS. LUZAICH: Did she indicate was it a one-time thing or more than once?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: It was multiple times, yeah.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Did she tell immediately or was it later that she told?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Later on, after she was talking to her cousin
19	who it also happened to.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Do you know how she found out that it had happened to her
21	cousin?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: That I do not recall. I take the bits of informa
23	tion that she has given me, I do not pry into the situation, because – can I have
24	permission to approach the bench, please?
25	THE COURT: You may.

1	MS. LUZAICH: Oh, of course.
2	THE COURT: You may.
3	[Bench conference transcribed as follows:]
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: I just –
5	THE COURT: Okay. Just a minute.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Okay.
7	THE COURT: Good morning, Ms. Fried is present, badge number –
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: 50.
9	THE COURT: All four lawyers are present. Go ahead.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: My mother tried to kill herself when I was 16
11	years old.
12	THE COURT: When you?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: When I was 16 -
14	THE COURT: I'm sorry.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: because of the psychological.
16	THE COURT: Oh, I'm sorry.
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: And I didn't know this until, I mean I – about I
18	was 23 when I finally found out everything. And she was used to tell us that she
19	was going bowling, when I was younger, but she was really going to therapy. And
20	it's not something I want to discuss in front of, you know –
21	MS. LUZAICH: Of course.
22	THE COURT: Sure, sure.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: people, so. Just – it's hard.
24	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you very much.
25	THE COURT: Okay. So that was kind of why you don't talk about it a lot with

1	your mom?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Yeah.
3	THE COURT: Okay.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: I mean it's not something she brings up. She,
5	you know, a very private person and I – my brother didn't even know about it, so.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Until?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #050: Maybe six months ago, I think. And my
8	brother is older than me, so.
9	THE COURT: Okay. Are there any other questions?
10	MS. LUZAICH: I won't ask any more questions about that.
11	THE COURT: Do you have any questions of this particular –
12	MS. ALLEN: I don't.
13	THE COURT: Okay. Thank you very much.
14	[Bench conference concluded]
15	MS. LUZAICH: And, Mr. Bell, you had mentioned that your best friend and his
16	sister had been abused by their parents. How old were you when you found out that
17	that was going on?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Twelve, 13, 14, somewhere around there.
19	MS. LUZAICH: Had it been going on for awhile before you knew –
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: I don't -
21	MS. LUZAICH: or did your friend tell you right away?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: I'm not sure. He didn't necessarily tell me. I
23	saw physical abuse, actually the mother to the father multiple times while we were
24	there. And then his father committed suicide and I witnessed a lot of disturbing
25	incidents with his mother when she was finally committed. Then we took him into

1	our family.
2	MS. LUZAICH: So a lot of things were going on and even your best friend
3	didn't tell you about it?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yeah.
5	MS. LUZAICH: And then you had mentioned that your brother and his ex-
6	wife, their children were removed. Did you personal – was it CPS that removed
7	them?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yeah, I believe so.
9	MS. LUZAICH: Did you have any contact with CPS arising out of that
10	incident?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: I don't remember. I might have had to write
12	some statements where I think my mom was little bit more forthcoming in a lot of
13	that stuff because she immediately tried to take charge of the kids before they went
14	into the system.
15	MS. LUZAICH: And was that here in Clark County?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Yes.
17	MS. LUZAICH: Do you know – did your mom have an okay experience with
18	CPS?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: I believe so. I believe so. She took them or
20	for quite awhile. She still has one and then – and the other one was reverted back
21	to the mother.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you very much.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #046: Um-huh.
24	MS. LUZAICH: Ms. Stammetti, I'm sorry, you had mentioned that your mom

had an issue with her brother. Was that ever reported?

25

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Oh, I'm sure not. I mean reported, she told -
2	MS. LUZAICH: To police or any –
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: She told her dad and I know she told my dad
4	MS. LUZAICH: And did anything get done about it?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: No, he told – I guess he just told my uncle to
6	leave his sister alone and go somewhere else.
7	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Do you have any kind of relationship with your uncle?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Oh, no, I only met him once.
9	MS. LUZAICH: So he's just out of the family essentially or away from –
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Well and he passed away in the '70s –
11	MS. LUZAICH: Oh, oh.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: like I only met him one time.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Oh, okay. You had mentioned that your best friend and her
14	sister also had been molested. Did she tell you? How did you find out?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: She told me.
16	MS. LUZAICH: Was it something that happened one time or was ongoing?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Ongoing.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Did she tell you like the first time it happened or later or year
19	later?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: No, it was years later. I didn't know her at th
21	time.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Oh, okay. So your friend now –
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Yes.
24	MS. LUZAICH: when she was young had been.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Yes.

25

1	MS. LUZAICH: Do you know, did she tell anybody? Did it get reported?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: She told a counselor, yeah.
3	MS. LUZAICH: Counselor at school?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Um-huh, yes.
5	MS. LUZAICH: Did it get reported? Did the police get involved?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I don't know.
7	MS. LUZAICH: So you don't know if there was an investigation –
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I don't know.
9	MS. LUZAICH: or anything like that? Thank you.
10	Ms. Lewis, you okay?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
12	MS. LUZAICH: You talked about some domestic violence in the home?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Um-huh.
14	MS. LUZAICH: You said that your mom and your dad both had an interesting
15	relationship. Did that get reported?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah. It was my mom that would just – she
17	wasn't like a serial abuser or anything like that, it was just when she would freak ou
18	randomly and not every time it wouldn't be reported. They would settle it on their
19	own or my dad didn't know about a lot of it until I was a lot older and I told him.
20	When she would hit him, he would just leave the house to stop it. When she would
21	hit me, I would run away for the day or tell - once I finally started telling people ther
22	yeah, or if the neighbors heard us. I mean it could get –
23	MS. LUZAICH: They would call the police.
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: very loud; so, yeah.
25	MS. LUZAICH: You said that there was an arrest or two at some point?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Um-huh, yes.

MS. LUZAICH: Did she go to court?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No. We grew up in a very small town -

MS. LUZAICH: Small town.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: -- so it was just pushed down. My dad never pressed charges. It would – she would get arrested, she would come home.

MS. LUZAICH: You had something about separated for a few months.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Well, yeah. So she would always – if she didn't get her way or if he didn't apologize that she flipped out for whatever reason that made her mad, she would leave the house for a couple of months and go live with boyfriends or my uncles or whoever she wanted to go live with. And then once things got tough for her, she would come back to my dad and he'd take her in and the cycle would start all over.

MS. LUZAICH: Cycle. Okay. That's what I was going to ask you, so you're familiar with the cycle.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: It's definitely a cycle; definitely.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Definitely.

MS. LUZAICH: You had also mentioned that when you were 17 a little bit of assault, trespass. But you said that the police officer thought you had a good reason for doing it? I'm – what was the reason?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Okay. I had, even though I was only 17, I had had a boyfriend for five years steady. And he cheated on me with another girl. The girl was married. She was following me around town, again lived in a very small town. Every time I would stop or go to the store, she would follow me wherever I

went. I had a really fast car, so I'd turn it around, then start following her. She'd run to her husband. So by the third time I just got out of the car and I told her husband, tell her to leave me alone, keep her at home; get her away from me. I'm telling you I'm losing it, you know, I'm getting angry.

Well, he didn't keep her at home, she followed me a fifth time or fourth time and I got out – she parked on his property. I stepped foot on his property, I assaulted her. And the only reason I assaulted her, I wasn't going to do anything, but she turned to me and said I just F'd your boyfriend.

MS. LUZAICH: Oh.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: And I went okay and nailed her in the face a few times. And then when the cop arrested me, he asked me why did you do it and I saw that he was wearing a wedding band and I asked him, what would he do if a man just walked up and said that to him? And he goes, all right. She was also very well-known in the town, had been to court several times over starting the same kind of fights. So –

MS. LUZAICH: She was busy.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: She was – yeah. But the judge knew her and, actually, when we entered the courtroom, he thought she was the defendant, as usual. And when he saw that she was the plaintiff he had said, oh, if you were the defendant again, you would have been gone. So everybody, everybody knew her. And everybody knew me as being a good kid for the most part. So I did get sentenced. I did get a fine. I did get community service. But, again, the officer was very – a very good person and he got my record expunged and I didn't have to do any of that or serve anything, so.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So you had a lot of excitement in your young life?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes, I did.
2	MS. LUZAICH: What do you think about individuals who exchange sex for
3	money?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I think everybody has a reason for doing
5	something. Unfortunately, sometimes they are pressured or pushed or have lost all
6	hope and that might be their only means to survive.
7	MS. LUZAICH: So assuming you hear something like that from somebody
8	can you still listen to what that person has to say objectively?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes, I can.
10	MS. LUZAICH: You wouldn't automatically disbelieve what they say, simply
11	because they had at some point in their time exchanged sex for money?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No, I won't.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Can that person still in your mind be the victim of a sexual
14	assault?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Definitely.
16	MS. LUZAICH: What about individuals who make really, really poor choices?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Well, they're stupid but they're human.
18	MS. LUZAICH: Are they still entitled to the same protection of the law as you
19	have?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes, they are.
21	MS. LUZAICH: Thank you.
22	Ms. Randolph, what do you think about that?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #033: I agree too. They still deserve the same
24	protection of the law. I see a lot of people where I work at that come from all types

of backgrounds and just because I might not agree with their lifestyle doesn't mean I

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would disbelieve them if they reported something to me or said something to me.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.

Mr. Greenwood, what about you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Pretty much in the same boat. If someone wants to exchange sex for money that's – you can't judge them on, you know, just on that, you know. Different people come from different places and circumstances or different for different – you don't know how that person was brought up and why they're doing that. But you can still believe them if it's something else.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. So you can still at least listen to what they have to say objectively?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: You would take it into consideration, of course, but you wouldn't automatically disbelieve what they have to say?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Oh, no, just – they can – anybody can tell a lie, I mean or tell the truth. They just – that doesn't characterize the type person they are.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you. You had mentioned you were in the Navy?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes, ma'am.

MS. LUZAICH: What did you do in the Navy?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Was a machinist mate second class. I worked in the engine room on one ship and on another ship forklift and elevator mechanic.

MS. LUZAICH: For how long were you in the service?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Ten years.

1	MS. LUZAICH: Did you ever have occasion to sit on or participate in any way
2	in a Court Martial and Article 15, is that what it is?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: No.
4	MS. LUZAICH: I always get the number wrong.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: No.
6	MS. LUZAICH: Nothing like that?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: No, ma'am.
8	MS. LUZAICH: So nothing investigative or anything like that?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: No, I wasn't part of that. I did work at the brig
10	in my second –
11	MS. LUZAICH: What did you do there?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: I was a guard.
13	MS. LUZAICH: As a pseudo prison guard –
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
15	MS. LUZAICH: what did you do on a daily basis?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: I was part of receiving and release, which wa
17	- they would bring the individuals, the military individuals off the street and I was the
18	guy who checked them in and did strip search on them and give them the urinalysis
19	and then sent them up to block.
20	MS. LUZAICH: For how long did you do that?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Four years.
22	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Thank you.
23	Mr. Allen, what do you think about individuals who exchange sex for
24	money?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: I believe it depends on their circumstances.

1	I'm open-minded. They probably had their reasons for doing that.
2	MS. LUZAICH: I mean, clearly, it's wrong; it's illegal.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Right.
4	MS. LUZAICH: But can you still listen to what the person who tells you that
5	has to say and at least be objective about what they have to say?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes, I think so.
7	MS. LUZAICH: Can an individual who tells you that at some point in their life
8	they exchanged sex for money, can that person still be the victim of a sexual
9	assault –
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Oh, definitely.
11	MS. LUZAICH: in your mind?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Is there anybody over here [indicating] who does not believe
14	that somebody who has at some point in their life exchanged sex for money can
15	later be a victim of sexual assault? Anybody not believe that that's possible?
16	Anybody; anybody?
17	Is there anybody who thinks that just because somebody does some-
18	thing incredibly foolish that they are not entitled to the same protection under the law
19	that you and I are? A lot of people are shaking their heads no.
20	As – who here watches CSI? Oh, come on, lots of people; everybody
21	watches CSI, don't they? So would it surprise you if I tell you CSI is fake? There is
22	nothing real about CSI.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: no.
24	MS. LUZAICH: A lot of people are laughing. Is there anybody here that
25	thinks CSI is real? So nobody is expecting somebody to come here and say that

they went to the house that we talked about and they sucked all the air out of it and, therefore, they found this little piece of semen or something like that from ten years ago that's going to make or break the case. Nobody is expecting to hear anything like that, right?

As jurors what you are doing in this case is you're going to listen to all of the witnesses. You're going to see any evidence that is admitted. And, then, you're going to go in the back and deliberate. And while you're deliberating in the back for there to be a verdict, you have to be unanimous. So what happens, Ms. Mandel if you're in the back and you're deliberating and 11 people feel one way and 1 – you feel the other way, doesn't matter which way, but 11 people feel one way and you feel the other way; what are you going to do?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Well, certainly, I'm listening to the other 11 people. Obviously, I've missed something if there's eleven and there's just me, but I also am pretty certain about – on my convictions and my understanding and my ability to listen. So I don't think my job as a juror is to convince people to come onto my side, but you know, I am open-minded enough that maybe I missed something.

MS. LUZAICH: You said, obviously, I missed something. Why? Why would it have to be you? Why couldn't the other 11 have missed something?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Well, I mean – you're absolutely right. And if I was egotistical in that nature to believe that I was so centric around everything is right because of me, then I would certainly have that thought but I'm not. And I'm also not of a school where I'm believe I'm right all the time.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Well, good. Thank you.

Mr. Carlyn, what about you? It's 11 to 1 and you're the one. What are you going to do?

misheard something?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: I'd probably, I guess, talk to them about why I think that. But I mean if 11 people are going against me, I'm pretty sure just like she said I missed something. But I would talk about it, why, you know why am I – why I'm saying that, you know. Why am I the one person? MS. LUZAICH: And you would talk about it. Well, if you're sure, will you stick to your guns? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: Yeah, why not? MS. LUZAICH: Oh, I don't know, you tell me. PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: I mean if I think I'm right and the 11 people aren't right, I'm going to stick to 'em. MS. LUZAICH: Okay. PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: We're going to be back there for awhile though. MS. LUZAICH: Okay. And what if you are positive that you're right. They can't change your mind. And it's Friday and it's five to five. Are you going to change your mind just 'cause you want to go home? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #023: No. MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Good. Thank you. Miss Ross, what about yourself? It's 11 to 1, what are you going to do? PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: I mean we – just like the two of them said, I mean obviously there's something that was missed or maybe they missed something that I caught or I mean we'd have to discuss it and talk about it. MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Everybody says that it's something you missed. Is it

possible that maybe somebody misheard something? You didn't miss it, you just

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Possibly.
2	MS. LUZAICH: Or is it possible that you just disagree?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: That as well.
4	MS. LUZAICH: What are you going to do? Are you going to stick to your
5	guns?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes. I mean –
7	MS. LUZAICH: If you're sure. If you're sure that you're right will you stick to
8	your guns?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: If I'm 100 percent sure that I'm right then yes
10	MS. LUZAICH: All right. Now, we can't talk about I can't, at least talk about
11	numbers here. But is that what it would take for you a hundred percent sure?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes. I'd have to be absolutely positive that I
13	was sure.
14	MS. LUZAICH: To fight the others?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: Yes.
16	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Can you – well, will you at least try and convince them
17	of your point of view?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: I would. I would let them know what I was
19	thinking, yes, absolutely.
20	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. You wouldn't leave or you wouldn't fold just 'cause it's
21	Friday and it's five to five?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #075: No.
23	MS. LUZAICH: Mr. Kamaunu, what about you, 11 to 1?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: The same thing like them.
25	MS. LUZAICH: Are you going to think that you missed something?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: No, but I probably want them to explain to me,
2	I mean not explain to me, make me see what they see. Maybe I'm not seeing what
3	they seeing, you know.
4	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Remember we talked about different perspectives.
5	Different people have different perspectives?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
7	MS. LUZAICH: Do you think that you might view witnesses differently than
8	the others do?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
10	MS. LUZAICH: And is that something that could make you feel one way and
11	them feel another way?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
13	MS. LUZAICH: Will you stick to your guns if you're sure?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Uh –
15	MS. LUZAICH: You know, there's no right or wrong answer ever –
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, I know it. I don't know because –
17	MS. LUZAICH: just truthful answers, that's all.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: they might show me something that - you
19	know what I mean?
20	MS. LUZAICH: Right. That's what I said –
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
22	MS. LUZAICH: if you're sure. If they can't show you something. If they
23	can't give you a reason to change your mind, are you going to stick to your guns?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
25	MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Ms. Haber, what about yourself, 11 to 1?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #024: Well, I would ask them, you know to tell me why they come to the conclusion that they came to. I would explain why I came to the conclusion I came to. If I still feel the same way that they can't change my mind, then I'm going to stick to what I believe.

MS. LUZAICH: Okay. Even if it's Friday, it's five to five?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #024: Yes.

MS. LUZAICH: But it is possible that they would be able to either point to something or –

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #024: Anything is possible.

MS. LUZAICH: Anything is possible. Anybody disagree with that, anything is possible?

Is there anybody who for whatever reason religious, philosophical, moral, is there anybody who cannot sit in judgment? Is there anybody who has any – anything about themselves that would prevent them from being able to sit in judgment?

As jurors, you're going to listen to the evidence and decide if the State has proven its case beyond a reasonable doubt. If at the conclusion of all the evidence, the testimony, if you are convinced that the State has proven its case, is there anybody who just couldn't say the word guilty for whatever reason? Is there anybody who could not say the word guilty?

Thank you. The State would pass the panel for cause, Judge.

THE COURT: Ms. Allen, you may voir dire the jury panel.

MS. ALLEN: Thank you, Your Honor.

If I may inquire about what time do we think we're breaking? Just so I can gauge.

THE COURT: Probably about 45 minutes.

MS. ALLEN: Forty-five minutes.

THE COURT: Is that okay?

MS. ALLEN: Oh, sure; of course.

THE COURT: I mean you're not limited -

MS. ALLEN: I understand.

THE COURT: -- to 45 minutes.

MS. ALLEN: Thank you.

All right. Good morning still. I think it's before noon, is it? I don't have a watch.

MR. MAC ARTHUR: 11:47.

MS. ALLEN: How is everybody doing? [Prospective jurors respond in the affirmative]. It's nice to meet all of you.

As Ms. Luzaich said yesterday, we're all just looking for a fair jury. You all see like very conscientious people. Mr. MacArthur and I have sat over there very impressed. And thank you for all your answers.

I just want to follow-up on some of the things that Ms. Luzaich asked. I hope I won't be very long, but we will see. I think she asked you something about CSI and do you watch CSI and a couple of people raised their hands.

I had a friend that used to ask juries, you don't expect someone to produce like a fingerprint in water, right? The ridiculousness of that; right. And she asked some questions about evidence and couldn't evidence simply just be from testimony. Does anybody here think evidence can't just be from someone speaking? If I tell you the light was red, the light was red and that's enough evidence, right? You don't have to actually see the triple light being red. Does any-

1	body disagree with that? No? No responses? Anyone? Okay.
2	And you very well over the next week and a half may – you may not see
3	any DNA evidence and would that bother anybody? No? No one. Okay.
4	Anybody back here [indicating], I don't want to exclude you. Does that
5	bother anybody? All right. No responses.
6	This is when you – well, let me start off with this, so you're sitting here
7	and Ms. Rhoades stood up and she started reading off the charges or she started
8	describing some of the charges. And how many people here did the sexual assault
9	actually stick in your mind? Like you can't probably remember the rest of what she
10	said, but do you all remember the sexual assault? Can anybody here remember
11	any of the other things she said?
12	UNIDENTIFIED PROSPECTIVE JUROR: Domestic violence.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Let's go. Where's the microphone? Okay. If you could
14	just pass it down. Is It Mr. Greenwood.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes, ma'am.
16	MS. ALLEN: Mr. Greenwood, all right. So you remember some of the other
17	charges?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Did the sexual assault immediately hit you?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: It – yeah, it hit you.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right.
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: It's the biggie.
23	MS. ALLEN: That's the biggie, okay.
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Oh, yeah.

MS. ALLEN: Does it bother you?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Does it? It doesn't bother me individually as a
2	person.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Well, yeah, obviously, you're not – sorry. I'm
4	talking and I get thirsty. You're not the victim obviously and so – or the alleged
5	victim obviously, so – but did the idea that you had to sit here and listen to facts
6	related to a sexual assault bother you?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: No.
8	MS. ALLEN: Does it bother you more that the victim may be a child?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Um –
10	MS. ALLEN: Or does it bother, not more, but does it bother you?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Well, no, a daughter or a child shouldn't have
12	to go through anything like that.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. So just a sexual is you're like that's fine, but if
14	it's a child that sort of ups the ante for you?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: It does.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. In that same vein, you were asked questions about
17	children disclosing.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
19	MS. ALLEN: Do you think that a child can lie about something like that?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think that they could lie about a sexual assault?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Are you on Facebook?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: I am.
25	MS_ALLEN: And Twitter and –

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1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes.
2	MS. ALLEN: all that stuff? Okay. So you – social media.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think social media has put – social media – and
5	not just social media in those things, but television, the Kardashians, all of that; do
6	you think that has sort of pushed sex upon this newer generation of kids? Like the
7	kids let's say 21 and younger? Would you agree with that?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Push? Pushing sex? Not so much as
9	pushing sex –
10	MS. ALLEN: It's more in the foreground.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: but pretty much just how to act, how to
12	dress, what's cool, who to hang out with and that stuff.
13	MS. ALLEN: What about the sex tapes that come out? Like, I think, Paris
14	Hilton or something, one of them, like Kim Kardashian, one of them; I don't know;
15	whatever. One of them –
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Both of them.
17	MS. ALLEN: they come out with the sex – so you know more than I do.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Both of them, yeah.
19	MS. ALLEN: I hide. I hide from this. But would you agree that things like that
20	let's say they didn't happen 20 years ago. Did they happen when you were growing
21	up? Do you recall when you were growing up a celebrity and I say celebrity in
22	quotes because really –
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Right.
24	MS. ALLEN: but, you know, do you recall them ever – a sex tape coming
25	out?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: No.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: No.
4	MS. ALLEN: So would you agree with me then that sex is more talked about
5	and discussed?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: It is.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Right. So it's a lot easier for children to access this
8	information as well, right?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: The Internet age, gen jetter thing.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Right. And if you're not a parent who's like literally on
11	your kid when they're on the Internet or whatever, they can access the view in
12	anything?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So information about sex is readily accessible to just
15	about anybody, is that right, these days?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes, ma'am.
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And much easier, more so, than when we were kids –
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes, ma'am.
19	MS. ALLEN: right? Like 30 years ago you had to go to a library or
20	something right?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Exactly.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: National Geographic.
24	MS. ALLEN: National Geographic, perfect. Okay. All right. Let's see. Do
<sub>25</sub>	vou – vou have two boys?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes, ma'am.
2	MS. ALLEN: So the luck that you had in your house is that you didn't have a
3	lot of drama?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Sure.
5	MS. ALLEN: All kinds of drama. Okay. So you had two boys. Do you think
6	that children have different priorities than you do?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Different priorities? I don't know, a kid pretty
8	much looks out for himself.
9	MS. ALLEN: Well, what I'm saying is do you think a 12-year-old has different
10	priorities than a 25-year-old?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So would you agree that a 12-year-old is concerned
13	about, like, friends and school and maybe if they're going to a dance?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Whereas maybe a 20 , hopefully a 25-year-old is
16	concerned about getting a job and being responsible?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Right.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And would you agree that 12 year olds or 15 year olds
19	maybe don't handle their priorities as well, they don't handle those priorities as well's
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. They don't maybe see the consequences for their
22	actions?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And so if they want to go, I don't know if you had – you

25 had boys so they're not nearly as dramatic, but if they wanted to do something, then

1	children don't have a problem lying in order to get that, right? They don't
2	necessarily see the consequences of that?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Let's see. And just lastly, and then I'll leave
5	you alone for the day, you might actually be done. As I sit over here as defense
6	attorney, my concern would be your understanding of how the system works. I'm
7	not going to go through jury instructions or anything, that's for the Judge to give you
8	But our system designates the burden of proof to one party in a criminal case, do
9	you understand that?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
11	MS. ALLEN: Do you know who that party is?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: The party of what?
13	MS. ALLEN: Do you know who the party – which side has the burden of proc
14	in this case?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yes, the prosecution.
16	MS. ALLEN: Those two lovely ladies right there [indicating], right?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And you understand that I don't have to do anything for
19	the next two weeks?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: I don't know if that's true.
21	MS. ALLEN: Well –
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: You got to do something.
23	MS. ALLEN: the bar might have a problem with me, like I might [inaudible]-
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yeah, that would be that.
25	MS_ALLEN: But under our system of government and under our system of

1	criminal justice, I have no burden in this case. Do you understand that?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct.
3	MS. ALLEN: So Mr. MacArthur, while we may not be good lawyers if we did
4	this, we could play Tiddlywinks for the next seven days and if you don't find the
5	State has met their burden, you understand you would select to find Mr. Harris not
6	guilty?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Exactly.
8	MS. ALLEN: You can hate us, but you would still have to find Mr. Harris not
9	guilty?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Right.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And do you understand or do you have a problem with
12	that idea that we have no burden?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Oh, no. He'd have to be proven guilty.
14	MS. ALLEN: Well –
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: You're innocent; you got to be proven guilty.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Well, I have had a number of jurors say, well, they expect
17	that they would hear from us or they expect that we would call witnesses. And I can
18	tell you that we are but there may be - I wouldn't have to, you understand that?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Correct. Just like a person doesn't have to
20	speak at their own trial. They don't have to say nothing.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you understand then that Mr. Harris may or may not
22	testify?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yeah, that's fine.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And there could be reasons for that?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: Yeah.

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. And you have no problem?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #030: No.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Let's see. Thank you Mr. Greenwood, I very much
4	appreciate your time.
5	Mr. Allen, no relation, right? My name is Betsy Allen.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Oh. I don't think so.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. How are you?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Okay.
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So excited to be here, right?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Okay.
11	MS. ALLEN: When you got your jury summons did you call all your friends
12	and family and just tell: Oh, my God, I got summonsed to sit on a jury? No?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Told my wife. She told me.
14	MS. ALLEN: And you start canvassing people, hey, how do I get out of this?
15	What can I do to get out of this? No?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: No. I did reschedule, though, 'cause of work.
17	MS. ALLEN: Oh, you had to reschedule, okay. All right.
18	All right. So I think I saw you nodding your head when I asked the initia
19	question about when you heard the charges was sexual assault was that the one
20	that really stood out to you?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And likewise with Mr. Greenwood does it bother you that
23	you may hear a child come in and describe something that she alleges happened?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: No, I don't think so.
25	MS_ALLEN: Okay_Do you believe that you have the type of personality to

1	not rush to judgment on this?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Even though it potentially is a child, right?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Right.
5	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And the allegations are, obviously, very serious?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
7	MS. ALLEN: There was some questions asked about, I think, yesterday. Th
8	was yesterday and it may have been I think in the front row about sex being some-
9	thing that's very private. Do you recall anything about – you probably don't even
10	remember yesterday, do you? You just think about what was dinner was going to
11	be when you got home, right?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: No somebody made a comment about that.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you agree with that that sex –
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes, I think so.
15	MS. ALLEN: that it's a very intimate and private thing?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes. I'm pretty old-fashioned.
17	MS. ALLEN: All right. Okay. Fair enough. Would you agree – well, tell me
18	your idea of why it is intimate and private. Do you have a reason behind that?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: I would assume it's the way we were brought
20	up to think, think that way.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you believe it may have come from your parents?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Right.
23	MS. ALLEN: Or family, if you were raised in a close-knit family?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Society in general.
2	MS. ALLEN: Society in general, all right. Do you have children?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes, they're all grown.
4	MS. ALLEN: They're all grown. Do you remember when they were very little
5	vaguely?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: A long time ago.
7	MS. ALLEN: Do you remember when – and this may or may not have
8	occurred with you, but did you children ever strip off their clothing, like when they
9	were 18 months old, they'd take a shirt off or they didn't have a problem with just
10	being in a diaper? Do you recall that?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: I don't recall them stripping off their clothes,
12	but I'm sure they ran around in diapers a lot.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you recall if your children – well, let me ask this, do
14	you recall if you and your wife were the ones who instructed them on modesty?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Oh, yes.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you believe modesty comes naturally with children o
17	do you think it's something that's taught?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Oh, I think it's taught.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Much like the intimacy of sex?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Right.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you – and you believe it comes from parents or
22	people who raise the child, is that correct?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Most of it, yes.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So if a child were raised in such a way that it wasn't
25	intimate –

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Um-huh.
2	MS. ALLEN: that they weren't taught that sex was a private thing or that it
3	was intimate, do you think that could make a difference?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
5	MS. ALLEN: What kind of difference do you think it would make?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Well, they'd have a complete different outlook
7	and – at least until they got into school and started learning other things.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: I think –
10	MS. ALLEN: Do you think they would be more outwardly about it?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
12	MS. ALLEN: And they wouldn't have concerns about talking about it or
13	discussing it with people, is that right?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Right, right.
15	MS. ALLEN: If that's how they were raised?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
17	MS. ALLEN: How did you – well, let me ask you this, when your kids lied to
18	you did you know right away? Does it – do you have that parent meter, type lie
19	meter thing, where you're just like, you know, you're lying?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Our three kids were very well-behaved. I
21	think my wife could tell as soon as anyone of them would tell a lie.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So your wife had it?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: She – yes, she was – was – yeah, she knew
24	what was going on with all three of them all the time.
25	MS. ALLEN: It's probably intuitive, isn't it?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
2	MS. ALLEN: It's like, oh, oh, that was no; you're lying, right? Your wife just
3	caught it? Yes?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
5	MS. ALLEN: Okay. How difficult do you think it will be to judge – and it
6	doesn't matter if it's a child or an adult – someone who sits up here [indicating] and
7	tells you things that you've never met?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: I guess that would be a judgment call to see
9	how they present themselves. I guess it'd be pretty difficult.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Are you that guy? You want to sit here and
11	listen to this and you believe that you're the right guy to sit and discern what people
12	are saying and whether it's truthful or not truthful?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes, I'm very logical thinking.
14	MS. ALLEN: You are?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Yes.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Very rational?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: I think so.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #028: Analytic.
20	MS. ALLEN: Analytic, very good. Very good. I appreciate Mr. Allen your
21	time. Thank you very much.
22	Mr. Kamaunu.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Kamaunu [pronounces name].
24	MS. ALLEN: I'm sorry.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: It's all good.

1	MS. ALLEN: Are you originally from Hawaii?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. What island?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oahu.
5	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And when did you move to Las Vegas?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: 2003, April.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. And why – I'm sure you get asked this all the
8	time, so why would you ever move from Hawaii to Las Vegas; it's Hawaii.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Cheaper.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay; right, which is probably very, very accurate. Okay. You
11	have four daughters is that right?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
13	MS. ALLEN: And one son?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
15	MS. ALLEN: Wow, very good for you and you said two of your daughters
16	were –
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Sneaky.
18	MS. ALLEN: That's the word. Sneaky.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
20	MS. ALLEN: Did you see that start with them very early?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: No.
22	MS. ALLEN: You didn't? Okay. They're manipulative, I'm assuming?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You have to be on the lookout for them?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh. yeah.

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. How do you know when they're doing – when they're
2	trying to pull a fast one? Like what is it you see in them when they're trying to pull a
3	fast one?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: When they quiet.
5	MS. ALLEN: Oh, yeah, that's the worst.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: When I don't hear noises in the house –
7	MS. ALLEN: Yes. You hear nothing and –
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: something is going on.
9	MS. ALLEN: you're, oh, something is going over there -
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
11	MS. ALLEN: right. Okay. And so you have to immediately go and find out
12	what's going on?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, yeah.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. How old are these, the -
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Eight and 10.
16	MS. ALLEN: Oh, they're dangerous –
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you take everything they say at face value or is
19	everything sort of taken with a grain of salt?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Um –
21	MS. ALLEN: I mean when they tell you, oh, no, you know, it was actually –
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, no, no, no. I go check, yeah.
23	MS. ALLEN: um, no. Yeah, you have to go check?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, yeah.
25	MS_ALLEN: All right. Do you feel like that would be something you could do

1	here, where you feel like you would listen and take everything into account and you
2	would really look into it yourself?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
4	MS. ALLEN: You laugh?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: I mean, I mean
6	MS. ALLEN: No, that's okay, I mean and maybe I'm not asking good
7	questions. I understand. She said yesterday [indicating] we ask poor questions, we
8	really do; we outtalk ourselves, which is the biggest problem.
9	I asked Ms. [sic] Greenwood some questions about do you think the
10	social media –
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
12	MS. ALLEN: and, like, these celebrity things and all, do you think that
13	contributes to –
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, yeah.
15	MS. ALLEN: All right. Okay. I need to finish it. Teenagers, even early adults
16	sort of overly sexualize, they know a lot about what's going on?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So much more so than when we were younger?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, yeah.
20	MS. ALLEN: And I'm probably a lot older than you, but much more so than
21	when we were younger, is that correct?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, yeah.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And do you find that's a concern for you as a parent with
24	your children? And, do you talk to them about that?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.

1	MS. ALLEN: It bothers you, doesn't it?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, yeah.
3	MS. ALLEN: Yeah, okay. All right, those are hard –
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
5	MS. ALLEN: discussions to have, right?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: My wife is the disci, dis –
7	MS. ALLEN: Disciplinarian?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
9	MS. ALLEN: She is? Okay.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
11	MS. ALLEN: So does she rule with an iron fist?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
13	MS. ALLEN: She does. Oh, that's good.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, yeah.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I – okay. Do you think this access to sex – and I don't
16	mean sex the act, I just mean sex in general; do you think this access to it has
17	changed this generation of children? Do you think that they're just a little different -
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
19	MS. ALLEN: in that regard?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you find your kids succumbing to peer pressure, if
22	you know? I mean do you find that they have issues with that?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: I know they get issues with fashion.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Like they got to have this shoes because

, l	that's what everybody is wearing and –
1	
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. So –
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: certain kind of jeans or, you know.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So it's the, like, Hollister or whatever everybody is
5	wearing in school, they got to have the same thing?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah, yeah.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Would you consider that to be sort of a form of peer
8	pressure?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
10	MS. ALLEN: Do you see your own children pressuring their siblings in that
11	regard? Go do this. Let's do that.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, yeah; yeah, yeah.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you find the older ones maybe have a little more
14	control over the younger one?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And they can get them to do stuff if they want? Like –
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
18	MS. ALLEN: oh, we want to do this, so why don't you go do it?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah, yeah.
20	MS. ALLEN: And you can get in trouble for it.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Or they go to the favorite; they're like, hey, go
22	ask daddy for this.
23	MS. ALLEN: Oh, brilliant.
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So they go to the favorite, nice. Okay. And then they –
1	

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1	then that one comes and propositions you, okay. So would you agree then that pee
2	pressure doesn't have to come from the outside, it can actually come internally from
3	your – the other people in the house?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
5	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Ms. Luzaich asked a number of you if you automatically
6	would believe an adult over a child and you – I think everybody universally said no.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: No.
8	MS. ALLEN: Would you automatically believe a child over an adult?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: No.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So children – and you know obviously there's going to b
11	some come in and talk about an allegation of sexual assault.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
13	MS. ALLEN: Do you believe just because it's a child it automatically
14	happened?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: No.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You believe people can make those kinds of allegations
17	up?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes.
19	MS. ALLEN: Sex, sex for money I think is – and do you think – the question
20	was do you believe that people who perform sex for money are bad people I guess.
21	And I think it was –
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: No.
23	MS. ALLEN: No. It's – prostitution is the world's oldest profession, right?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah, yeah.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. It's legal in every county but two I think in the state.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
2	MS. ALLEN: People who make bad decisions likewise maybe don't – they
3	don't deserve to be treated badly or to be punished in any way for just bad
4	decisions, right?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: No.
6	MS. ALLEN: What about decisions that involve or what about bad decisions
7	involving your children? What if you commit a crime against your own children?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: It'd make me a bad person.
9	MS. ALLEN: Well, I'm just asking in general.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh.
11	MS. ALLEN: Do you think – would that – does that – is that going to affect
12	your ability or do – when you look at that person, will that affect what they say?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh, if somebody did something to my
14	children?
15	MS. ALLEN: Somebody – what if somebody – no, I'm talking about someone
16	who did something to their own children.
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Oh. All depends on the crime, you know.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. If it was sexual in nature, incest?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: That's wrong.
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Would that affect your judgment of that person?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. You'd look at them a little differently?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yes, I would.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Does incest go beyond a bad judgment call or a bad
25	decision? Is incest beyond a bad decision for you? Is it worse than a bad decision

1	guess?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #009: Yeah.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay, all right. Thank you very much.
4	Ms. Smith. Smith, oh, sorry, I apologize. How are you?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Fine, thanks.
6	MS. ALLEN: And I am sorry. How are you?
7	[Passing microphone]
8	MS. ALLEN: How are you?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: I'm fine. I'm good. Thank you.
10	MS. ALLEN: Likewise, were you excited to get your jury summons?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Elated; I say it once again.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You work downstairs, is that right?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
14	MS. ALLEN: So you must see a lot of very interesting people and things –
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
16	MS. ALLEN: working downstairs? How long you been down there?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: A year.
18	MS. ALLEN: A year. Okay. I apologize, let me go back. You have one
19	daughter, is that right?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Was she – I guess there's just at this point when they're
22	little –
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Um-huh.
24	MS. ALLEN: two classifications. Was she really good and calm or was she
25	sneaky and manipulative?
	1

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Well, um, no she was – she's a only child –
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: so.
4	MS. ALLEN: So is she more mature?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay. She –
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: And probably have a tendency to be a little b
8	more selfish 'cause she's not accustomed to sharing. So, you know, that was some
9	thing that I had to really work with her on as she got older, especially – and, well,
10	even when she was young with the toys.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Um-huh.
13	MS. ALLEN: So they were mine, right?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yeah.
15	MS. ALLEN: Mine.
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: I mean -
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Do you think that – and you're coming from a
18	little different perspective, I guess –
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Um-huh.
20	MS. ALLEN: 'cause she was an only child. I do understand that.
21	Do you think that her priorities were a little different when she was
22	younger, when she was 12 versus 25?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Well, I had a little – her father passed away
24	when she was about 14.
25	MS. ALLEN: Um-huh.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: And at 12 – her father was a singer and so at
2	12 was when her father discovered that – well, he told me it was time to introduce
3	the world to her. And so I started getting her in shows and so it was a little different
4	with her where she didn't have much play time at that age –
5	MS. ALLEN: Oh.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: from 12 to present time. She's gone to
7	school and been singing.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. When she – where did she go to school?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: She went to school here.
10	MS. ALLEN: Oh, she did, okay.
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Uh-huh, to high school here.
12	MS. ALLEN: High school here.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Um-huh.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And then she's now pursuing a career in singing?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes, still.
16	MS. ALLEN: All right.
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Um-huh.
18	MS. ALLEN: I think you said you had a prior – you had a prior issue with
19	domestic violence, is that correct?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: With my second husband.
23	MS. ALLEN: And you were the victim in that case?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Yes.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. If you were to find out that someone had falsified a

1	domestic violence, would that offend you?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: Offend me? No, because I know things like -
3	of that nature can happen. So, you know, people can lie.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: People can exaggerate. And people do a lot
6	of things, especially when they're drunk. So, I mean, because –
7	MS. ALLEN: I understand.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: I just have to speak from my personal
9	experience with the domestic violence. It was because of my husband's drinking is
10	what –
11	MS. ALLEN: Led to that.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: led to -
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #040: the issue. If it weren't for his drinking,
15	everything would be fine between us.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Thank you very much. I appreciate that. Than
17	you.
18	Ms. Lewis, I have to ask where did you grow up?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: In a very small town called San Manuel,
20	Arizona.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Yeah, I thought you said you were from Arizona. But this
22	town sounds like it could be a show, like a TV show.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah, yeah, definitely.
24	MS. ALLEN: Put a blank in and it sounds like it could have been a TV show.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: It's, you know, a small town.

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You – I think you may – I wrote down next to your name
2	reason for doing something. You said people have reasons for doing something?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Um-huh.
4	MS. ALLEN: You agree with that, obviously you said that?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes, yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Would you – let's see, so – sorry, I'm tired. Would you
7	agree that people's reasons for doing something are not always – they're not alway
8	appropriate. They're not always good reason?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Of course, yeah.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. They can be sinister?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. But they can be legitimate?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
14	MS. ALLEN: You were, I think, speaking in terms of prostitution. And that
15	sometimes people fall down on their luck and they have to do what they have to do
16	to survive?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And there's no reason to look down on people for that, is
19	there?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No.
21	MS. ALLEN: Do you agree that – with the idea that the defense has no
22	burden in this case?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes, I agree with that.
24	MS. ALLEN: You agree?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah.

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you have a problem with it?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I would assume or I would rely on human
3	nature being that if somebody accuses you of something, you would want to defend
4	yourself.
5	MS. ALLEN: Right.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: So if you were to play Tiddlywinks, I would
7	probably not
8	MS. ALLEN: Ever call me.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: think that you had a very good case and
10	would likely side with the other, but.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Or, or the case could be so bad we just don't have to do
12	anything right, necessarily?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Exactly, yeah, then it's obvious.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So it could be either way?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
16	MS. ALLEN: I promise I'm not going to play Tiddlywinks. I might read or
17	something, but – no, I'm just kidding.
18	You kind of hesitated on whether or not you agree with the idea that the
19	burden is with the State. Do you expect that we would call witnesses?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I would expect that. I would hope you would.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And if we didn't?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Again, if you didn't, I would just wonder why
23	somebody wouldn't defend themself.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Which leads me to Mr. Harris and whether or not he
<sub>25</sub>	would testify. Do you think that he should?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: That I don't have a problem with.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You understand our system is you have the right not to
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah.
4	MS. ALLEN: take the stand and that can't be held against you?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I do.
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you have no problem if Mr. Harris never takes the
7	stand?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I do not.
9	MS. ALLEN: All right. And there could be legitimate, perfectly legitimate
10	reasons for something like that?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I apologize, do you have a child? I can't remember.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I have two.
14	MS. ALLEN: You have two –
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Um-huh.
16	MS. ALLEN: okay. So do you think you're a reasonably good judge of -
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Very good.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you have that whole sixth sense?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Oh, I've got the mommy senses down, right.
20	MS. ALLEN: Right. So you know when they're lying?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Oh, yeah.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay. What about when their friends come over, do you – are
23	you equally as good at catching them?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah. Yeah, you know the kid's
25	characteristics and whatnot and they display different characteristics when they're

1	showing off for their friends.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. How old are your children?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Six and eight.
4	MS. ALLEN: Six and eight. Does the 8-year-old get the 6-year-old to do
5	things?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Oh, yeah.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Definitely.
9	MS. ALLEN: Peer pressure, as it were, but it's just not coming from outside?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And does – gets the 6-year-old in trouble?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Well, no, I know it's coming from the 8-year-
13	old.
14	MS. ALLEN: Oh, so you –
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: My 6-year-old is autistic, so it's pretty obvious
16	when he's –
17	MS. ALLEN: When he's being put up to something.
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: being told what to do. Yeah.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you catch it right away?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah, definitely.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Your 6-year-old probably doesn't really have
22	the ability to lie very well.
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: He tries to you know.
24	MS. ALLEN: Does he?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: He tried – again, the sneaky, the silly sneaky

1	part of it; but, no, he's not able to. I can always definitely tell when he's not telling
2	the truth.
3	MS. ALLEN: Is the 8-year-old a –
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: A girl.
5	MS. ALLEN: is a girl.
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah, my 8-year-old is –
7	MS. ALLEN: Oh, so, much – great – more the ability, I think.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes, oh, definitely.
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay, okay. All right.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Girls are always more manipulative.
11	MS. ALLEN: Do you see the difference in the genders with the two of them?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Definitely.
13	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah.
15	MS. ALLEN: Do you have a tendency or do you think you would have a
16	tendency to believe a child automatically over an adult?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No
18	MS. ALLEN: Just because they're a child?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: No.
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Going back to some of the questions earlier. Were you
21	little shocked when you heard the charges?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I was.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Were you expecting a stolen car?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: I was hoping for something not criminal in
<sub>25</sub>	nature, veah.

1	MS. ALLEN: Oh, like a car accident?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
3	MS. ALLEN: Oh –
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Or even a stolen car, but – yeah, I'm not
5	looking forward to being chosen for this jury if I am.
6	MS. ALLEN: You could have been lucky and got on a, I think construction
7	defect trial, they last like eight weeks or something.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Oh, good Lord.
9	MS. ALLEN: Those are fun. What – maybe even longer, I don't even know.
10	What – why did you make that statement? So you don't want to sit on
11	this jury?
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Honestly, I don't want to. I do understand that
13	the kids that are going to come up here may or may not have been pressured by
14	either party, you know, by the person who may have victimized them or the person
15	who's supposed to be their advocate. But I do understand that it's going to be hard
16	for me to see a young girl sit up there and say something that may or may not have
17	happened to her. And if she's believable, it's going to be much harder –
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: to hear her testimony.
20	MS. ALLEN: Is it possible that – could you see an instance where maybe
21	they – no one was victimized, there was no victimization?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Um-huh, yes.
23	MS. ALLEN: Yes?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
25	MS_ALLEN: Okay_I'm sorry_You have to answer out loud

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah.
2	MS. ALLEN: In that instance, if you were able to determine that, let's go with
3	no victimization, then would it bother you as much?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: If I – if I personally deemed that the witness
5	was not telling the truth then, no, it wouldn't bother me as much, because then it
6	wouldn't have happened, so.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Okay. Do you – well, do you think children are
8	easily manipulated? I mean do you think that –
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Both ways. Again, it definitely depends on
10	the child, their circumstances, how strong they are, how afraid they are; if they've
11	been threatened in any way, you know.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: But – so, yeah, a child could be easily
14	manipulated.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And would you agree that it doesn't have to come from
16	an adult, it could come from a sibling or –
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yeah.
18	MS. ALLEN: someone in the family?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #037: Yes.
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Okay. I think that's it. I think I'm going to leave you
21	alone. Wasn't too painful I hope.
22	Let's see, Mr. Newman
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes, ma'am.
24	MS. ALLEN: How are you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: I'm well.

25

1	MS. ALLEN: Jump back to you. This is your second go around.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes, ma'am.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Speaking from – and I don't want to talk about the trial
4	itself, but just the idea of sitting on a jury, the first time you did it.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: Did you feel like you were somewhat educated? Like walking
7	into it did you feel, like, oh, wow, I didn't realize it worked like this?
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: I think I had a general understanding of how -
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: the courts work and how the jury worked.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Were you surprised at all by anything that happened, like
12	during jury selection or anything? Nothing at all?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: No, no.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Would you regard that as a pleasant experience?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Overall it was not a bad experience, no.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You like sitting on a jury?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: I don't like it –
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: any more than I dislike it, no.
20	MS. ALLEN: Oh, it's a civil duty, okay.
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes.
22	MS. ALLEN: So you see it as you're a citizen and I – this is the duty that I
23	have to county and my state and things like that?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes.
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Walking into the first jury did you have a clear under-

1	standing of who had the burden in the case?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. At any point in time did that bother you?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: No.
5	MS. ALLEN: Does it bother you today?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: No.
7	MS. ALLEN: Is there any reason you would be concerned if Mr. Harris did no
8	testify?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: No.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Doesn't bother you at all?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: No.
12	MS. ALLEN: All right. Are you aware of the, like the mandatory reporting in
13	the state of Nevada?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: I think I have a general idea, yes.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Can you just give me an idea of what your general idea
16	is?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Teachers or those that have interaction with
18	children see or suspect anything that would or could be potentially harmful to the
19	child, whether it be physical abuse, mental abuse, sexual abuse; that they report
20	that to Child Protective Services.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Or the police is that right?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Or police.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And they're under an affirmative duty to do that, is that -
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: To do so, yes.
25	MS. ALLEN: as far as you know?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes.
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Would – if you, I guess if you came upon some
3	information, I guess you found out that let's say someone didn't report something,
4	that would be certainly offensive to you, is that right?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: I'd be concerned –
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay, all right.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: yes.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I had spoke or I was talking with Mr. Allen about the idea
9	of sex being sort of a private, intimate thing. Do – were you – you probably weren't
10	paying attention to that?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: I was.
12	MS. ALLEN: You were, okay. Did you agree with some of the things we were
13	talking about or did you agree that the intimacy or privacy of sex is learned, it's a
14	taught behavior?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes, I would agree with that.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Somewhat like modesty?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Correct.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And would you also agree then that if it wasn't taught,
19	that someone would be able to talk about – there's no embarrassment or shield,
20	personal shield –
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes.
22	MS. ALLEN: does that make sense?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes, I believe they'd be a little bit more open.
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And so someone who wasn't necessarily taught the idea
25	that sex was private, they wouldn't have any problems talking about it to other
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1	people, is that correct?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: I believe so, yes.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. How important is education?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: I believe it's very important.
5	MS. ALLEN: Not everybody is meant to go to college is that right?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Not everybody can.
7	MS. ALLEN: Not everybody can, okay.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yeah.
9	MS. ALLEN: Some people are meant to maybe go to trade schools or do
10	different things, is that right?
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Sure, sure.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Okay. Thank you, Mr. Newman, I appreciate it.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #001: Yes.
14	MS. ALLEN: Ms. Stammanetti?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Stammetti.
16	MS. ALLEN: Stammetti. Sorry. I apologize. Your friend that disclosed this to
17	you –
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Yes.
19	MS. ALLEN: she had been, I guess, abused, is that correct?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Yes.
21	MS. ALLEN: Can you recall her affect when she was describing it for you or
22	telling you about it? Do you remember was she upset? Did she seem emotional?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Not particularly, she had pretty much written
24	her dad off.
25	MS. ALLEN: I'm sorry? Pardon?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: She had pretty much written her dad off, so
2	she wasn't – she had gotten through it.
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You said she was in counseling?
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I don't know that she went to counseling, no.
5	MS. ALLEN: Maybe I'm mixing it up. Did you have – was it someone in your
6	family –
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: She went –
8	MS. ALLEN: that went to counseling?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: No. She told a camp, I guess like a camp
10	counselor she went to. But I don't know that she actually went to a counseling for it.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. So you don't know if she actually did
12	counseling?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I don't believe she did, but I don't know for
14	sure.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. How do you think you would be at judging
16	people testifying, whether they're children, adults, anybody? How do you think that
17	you – what would make you good at judging someone on the stand, let me ask you
18	that.
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I'd listen to what they have to say and try to
20	be objective.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Does the – do the allegations, do you believe
22	that's going to sway your judgment in any way?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I don't think so.
24	MS. ALLEN: Is there a possibility it could?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I was kind of shocked at the allegations, I'll
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1	say that, but I don't believe it would sway me one way or the other. I'd like to hear
2	the whole story first.
3	MS. ALLEN: Were you somewhat like some of the other jurors that when you
4	heard sexual that just stuck? Is that the one –
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: It did stick yes.
6	MS. ALLEN: That was the one that stuck with you?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Yes.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You don't necessarily remember much of the other
9	ones?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: No.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. It's jarring –
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Yes.
13	MS. ALLEN: is that easy or is that a fair assessment?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Yes, I would say.
15	MS. ALLEN: Is it more so because there's a child or there could be children
16	or child involved?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I think it would be kind of shocking no matter
18	what, but that is bothersome, yes.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Is it bothersome – why is it bothersome, let me ask you
20	that? Why is that bothersome to you?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Because children can be trusting.
22	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Okay. Does that then preclude the idea that they
23	couldn't – that a child couldn't make this up?
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Oh, no, they could, they could make it up.
25	MS_ALLEN: Do you think it's something that could be easily made up?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I'm not sure how easily –
2	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: but it could be made up.
4	MS. ALLEN: All right. Do you – is it something where the testimony is
5	enough or are you the kind of person that would expect some sort of corroboration?
6	Some sort of extra proof that it happened?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I don't think I'd require extra proof.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. The testimony is enough?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Yes.
10	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And you believe you're a good judge of – just generally i
11	people? You're a good judge of people. You can tell if they're truthful or not
12	truthful?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: I think so, yeah. I feel like I am.
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Thank you very much.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #020: Sure.
16	MS. ALLEN: Let's see, Ms. Mandel.
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Yes.
18	MS. ALLEN: How are you?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Well.
20	MS. ALLEN: So I remember distinctly that you were the one who said it, so
21	I'm coming right back to you for it.
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Sure.
23	MS. ALLEN: And that was the conversation about sex and the privacy of sex
24	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Um-huh.
25	MS. ALLEN: You were the one who, I believe, posited the idea that it was a

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very private thing?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I said at least – I cannot quote what I said yesterday –

MS. ALLEN: I understand.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: -- 'cause it was yesterday after a long day, but certainly I felt that intimacy in a public – speaking upon intimacy or intimate relations in a public forum would be, I would think, most difficult for a child or for an adult.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. Does that change, based upon some of the things that I discussed with other jurors? The idea that that is something you learn at home?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Certainly, more people – we've also discussed how everybody is different, you know.

MS. ALLEN: Right.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I'm a different than a Smith or anybody else that's sitting in the courtroom and so we – perhaps, what seems very private and personal to me, absolutely might not be the same to another individual.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. And does – do you believe that that changes – well, going back to the idea of the modesty in children.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Um-huh.

MS. ALLEN: And do you recall that you were taught modesty by your parents and by your family?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: It's a funny question to answer.

MS. ALLEN: I know.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I mean I could – again, I don't believe in a lot of excuses in terms of blaming society or blaming the media. Growing up in Las Vegas, there's many of us in this room that did, so –

1	MS. ALLEN: Definitely.
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: you can't say growing up in Las Vegas
3	created a certain atmosphere. But my family was in show biz, so modesty, you
4	know, running around without a top as a child I'm sure was the norm. But maybe
5	that's the norm in Ohio. I don't know. I can say, certainly, that I went to school with
6	clothes on, so –
7	MS. ALLEN: That's good.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: if that's a part of modesty, then, yes,
9	modesty in Las Vegas exists. And – but I also – yeah, I guess it's taught. But I thin
10	it – you also come hardwired a certain way and recognize that that is where you als
11	feel most comfortable. You know, I –
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So when you say hardwired –
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Um-huh.
14	MS. ALLEN: do you mean that modesty is something that clicks at a certai
15	age?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I do believe so. I think as we change as
17	women and men that, yes, you become – your level of modesty changes.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And then would you then sort of transposing that onto th
19	idea that the intimacy, the sexual intimacy –
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Um-huh.
21	MS. ALLEN: and how that's a private thing. But you do believe that that
22	also is the same way, that we're hardwired in that say way?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No, I do not.
24	MS. ALLEN: You don't?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I don't.

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1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Can you explain that?
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Well I'm not well, I'm not an expert in
3	psychology –
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. That's okay.
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: or sociology.
6	MS. ALLEN: You don't have to be for the purposes of this discussion.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Well, good. So, you know, I do, I think there
8	is a difference. I think you might be an individual that perhaps enjoys sex.
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: But you still may be a modest individual. You
11	may live conservatively.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Does that change, like speaking about it, just generally
13	whether it's to your mom or to your counselor or to a room full of people? Does – is
14	- does that change that do you think?
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I couldn't answer honestly right now one way
16	or the other, black or white.
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Does – did the allegations bother you?
18	Meaning –
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: They do.
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Tell – is it just because it's a sexual assault and it's
21	generally a crime or is it because it's potentially or the allegations are against
22	children? What is it that bothers you about it?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Well, I think that any of the abuse charges
24	that were mentioned, it wasn't just sexual abuse; there were several different
25	abuses. There was forced prostitution. There was multiple things that just on an

everyday person that gets up, goes to the grocery store, does things that that's a lot to take in –

MS. ALLEN: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: -- so, yes, that bothers me.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. So coming from a perspective where you don't deal with this on a daily basis, that was shocking to you?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Sure.

MS. ALLEN: Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: And shocking that I would perhaps be dealing with it for the next two weeks.

MS. ALLEN: Do you think you're the appropriate person to sit on the jury then for that reason?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I definitely think I'm qualified. I have an open heart, an open mind and with experience as an adjudicator and different forms of competition, whether it's dance or scholastics, that my ability to I guess assess an individual in terms of honesty or dishonesty I think is very real; I'm capable of doing that. So my – a person on a panel, part of a panel, yes, I could be. Does it mean that – and I know I could be open-minded. But, to be honest, there is discomfort in the nature of the – the topics of this trial.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. And would you just generally agree that comes along with the idea of discussing sex in public? Anytime you're going to have to say –

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No.

MS. ALLEN: No? Okay.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No, I don't think it's specific to sex in public.

No, I think it's –

1	MS. ALLEN: No, I don't mean having sex in public, I just mean –
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Oh, come on.
3	MS. ALLEN: discussing sex in public.
4	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No. Either way, no. But I think the idea of
5	abuse from one person to another –
6	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: is a difficult topic.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And do you think that in the realm of possibilities these
9	things can be fabricated?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Yes.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You believe that there are children who can fabricate
12	these allegations?
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I do. I don't – as I don't want to believe it –
14	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I logically believe, yes, it can happen.
16	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You don't want to believe it 'cause you would never want
17	to think a child could ever do that, right?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I wouldn't want to think anybody could ever
19	do it, but people do it.
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And would you agree then that there's motivations
21	behind the actions that people take, good, bad, indifferent?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Certainly, a desired outcome, of course.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And so if you're looking for a certain outcome, you're,
24	you know, you're going to take route A, as opposed to B and –
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: You make a choice.

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. You make your choices, okay.
2	How am I doing on time?
3	THE COURT: You're fine.
4	MS. ALLEN: Am I? Okay.
5	THE COURT: Yeah. Go ahead.
6	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
7	What about – there was some questions about, you know would you
8	hold it against someone if they had performed sex for money. Would you ever hold
9	that against them?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No. We live in a capitalistic society. We gotta
11	do what we gotta do and if that's where someone has found their best way to
12	survive, no.
13	MS. ALLEN: So be it.
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Yeah, so be it.
15	MS. ALLEN: Right. It's – some people refer to it I guess as sort of a
16	victimless crime, would that be your assessment of it?
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: It can be an assessment of it, sure.
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And I think I said somewhere or to someone that it was -
19	it's legal in all but what, two counties, I think in Nevada?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: In Nevada, sure.
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And certainly that person doesn't deserve to be
22	assaulted or beaten or –
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No.
24	MS. ALLEN: the victim of a crime in anyway?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No.

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Same with bad choices, is that correct? Someone who
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2	makes bad choices, they don't deserve to be a victim?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And you wouldn't look at them any differently for some-
5	thing like that?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No.
7	MS. ALLEN: Okay. What about if the crime was against their own child?
8	What if this person who committed a crime against their own child, would you look at
9	them differently?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: I do believe that in every situation you always
11	hope that someone is the adult in the situation.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: And it's difficult to think, not being a parent
14	myself, with many friends that are parents, it would be difficult to think that a parent
15	would take advantage of their child, but it's not out of the realm of possibility.
16	MS. ALLEN: And use their children for whatever they could get? Is that – you
17	said that use – I think use their child, that they would use their child?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Uh-huh.
19	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So it's not out of the realm of possibilities that a parent
20	would use their child –
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Right.
22	MS. ALLEN: for anything that they could get?
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No. As we said earlier, anything is possible.
24	MS. ALLEN: Anything is possible. Okay. Okay. Do you think that you would
25	automatically believe a child versus an adult specific to the allegations here?

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: No. I mean I'm hoping to believe everybody,
2	they've been put under – had been sworn to tell the truth, so with that –
3	MS. ALLEN: Do you think that that – that you say they're sworn to tell the
4	truth, so do you think if they do lie like a light goes off or some – I mean you
5	understand –
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Right.
7	MS. ALLEN: that it's a judgment call on your part.
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Absolutely, I do. That goes back to my ability
9	to assess. But there is a part of me that wants to believe, the – maybe the child in
10	me wants to believe that the truth is being told, because you've been asked and
11	sworn to tell it.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. I appreciate your answers.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #041: Sure.
14	MS. ALLEN: Thank you.
15	Let's see. Let me go back to Mr. Lambert. How are you?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Good.
17	MS. ALLEN: How were you about getting your jury summons? Were you
18	excited?
19	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: How was I about it?
20	MS. ALLEN: Yeah, were you excited?
21	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Not generally excited. I mean I do lead kind
22	of a busy life and I got a lot of things going on, but I didn't disregard it either. I mean
23	I have no problem –
24	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: with serving.
- 1	

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So not at the top of your list of priorities, like your bucket
2	list?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: No, not necessarily.
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. Do you feel like just in the couple of days
5	you've been here it's been somewhat educational?
6	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: It's - I've expected everything that's gone on
7	so far?
8	MS. ALLEN: Really?
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Pretty much.
10	MS. ALLEN: That's a new one. Okay. What –
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: It's drawn on a little longer than I expected.
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. I understand.
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: The questioning is taken a lot longer than I
14	expected.
15	MS. ALLEN: I'll concede that.
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: But, you know, I've been summonsed a
17	couple of times but I've never actually served, so I kind of have seen the process
18	and been in a courtroom –
19	MS. ALLEN: Oh.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: for, you know -
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you've actually come in and been questioned before
22	but they –
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: No, not questioned. I've gone into the waitin
24	room and that's as far as I've gotten. But I've talked to other people that have and
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay.

1	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: just like knowledge from being a resident.
2	MS. ALLEN: You never – so you never actually got to this point?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Not to this point, no.
4	MS. ALLEN: All right. So I guess some of the same – it's some of the same
5	question is different; but what do you think about the burden of proof? Is it
6	bothersome that the defense has no burden in this case?
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: It's not bothersome, no.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you – I mean do you hold it against Mr. Harris if we
9	don't do anything?
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: No.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay. At the end of the day you understand if they don't prove
12	their case, Mr. Harris is not guilty; no matter what you think of him or anybody else
13	in this case?
14	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: I understand that.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. And that doesn't bother you?
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: No.
17	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you have children? I apologize my –
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yes, I have three.
19	MS. ALLEN: You have three kids.
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yeah.
21	MS. ALLEN: Are they grown, younger?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: I have two sons that go to college right now
23	and I have a daughter that's in high school.
24	MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay. So the daughter is the baby?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yes.

1	MS. ALLEN: All right. Do you, like some of the other parents you see, your
2	children, they can be manipulative, do you see that?
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Absolutely.
4	MS. ALLEN: And do you see it more from the girl from the boy?
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Um –
6	MS. ALLEN: Boys, I should say.
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: All three of my children are different.
8	MS. ALLEN: Okay. They all are different, so.
9	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: But, yeah, she's – she kind of plays things a
10	little bit more than the others.
11	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: I've got one that's really quiet and kind of
13	keeps to himself. And one that's just very outgoing and has gone through a lot of
14	leadership things, so.
15	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
16	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: So they're all different.
17	MS. ALLEN: All right. Are they – you said two are in college, is that correct?
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Correct.
19	MS. ALLEN: Are the three fairly close in age?
20	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Fairly, 21 to 15.
21	MS. ALLEN: So they did grow up together?
22	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yes.
23	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Did you see amongst the three of them like the older one
24	getting the younger one to do things or vice-a-versa even?
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yes, I've seen that.

1	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Sort of an – I'm characterizing it as peer pressure but I						
2	think we always seen it as external, sort of an internal peer pressure.						
3	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Right.						
4	MS. ALLEN: Getting one to do the other and –						
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yeah.						
6	MS. ALLEN: So one doesn't get in trouble or someone gets something out of						
7	it?						
8	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Right.						
9	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And then playing the parents against each other or						
10	whatever it is, is that correct?						
11	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: They're children.						
12	MS. ALLEN: Yes, they are. Do you think that children could have the ability						
13	to make up some – like the allegations in this case or anything; that they saw a						
14	spaceship land? I mean do you think children have the ability to fabricate things?						
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yes.						
16	MS. ALLEN: Excuse me. Do you find it harder to believe that a child would						
17	fabricate allegations like are the ones here?						
18	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: I think it's less likely, but I mean I think there's						
19	a lot of other things that kids would exaggerate about or make up or whatever, but I						
20	know that it's very possible. Yes.						
21	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you think it's less likely that a child would lie about						
22	something like that?						
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: No, I said that I think –						
24	MS. ALLEN: Sorry. If I'm misquoting you, tell me.						
25	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: I think – yeah, I think it is more likely that they						

would not make up something like this. I don't think that they – this is – there's a lot of things that child could make up, I don't think this is one that would be the top of the list of the things to make up.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. All right. And when you're referring to a child, you're saying something like – are you saying a 17½ –year-old, 18-year-old or do you mean someone who is like 11, 12, 10, 5 even?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: I'm not exactly sure how to answer that. I think that it – you know, the maturity level is going to vary, based on – and the age can have a lot to do with that. So when I say a child, yeah, generally I'm thinking of somebody that's still in school. You know, a teenager is still a child in a lot of ways. Although they are more experienced and they are more mature that when they were 10 years old.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. And do you agree that children, whether it's 18 or 17½, down, that they have different priorities than we do as adults?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yes.

MS. ALLEN: We have mortgages or car payments or whatever the case may be.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Absolutely.

MS. ALLEN: And they have – they want to be with their friends or they want to go to the party or whatever the case is with a child – a 12-year-old or 15-year-old. And those priorities are different, isn't that correct?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Correct.

MS. ALLEN: Do you think that they treat them a little differently than we do?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Each other?

MS. ALLEN: No, their priorities. Do –

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PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Oh, their priorities differently?

MS. ALLEN: Yeah. Sorry.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yes, they do. I mean obviously, you know, what we view as important is not always the same thing as what a younger person is going to view as being important. And their priority list is going to vary.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. And would you agree that they – the consequences for their actions are not necessarily readily accessible to them?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: It's not the first thing they're thinking about all the time.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. So they're, like, how to get to the party Friday night and if let's lie to mom, get the car and go. They're not thinking of the consequences of what's going to happen if they get caught necessarily. It's not, like, foremost thing?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: Yeah, it depends on the – it – again, it depends on the child -

MS. ALLEN: Right.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: -- and the circumstances and stuff. I think that, yeah, it would be very possible for, you know, getting in trouble would be not the number one priority. They're worried about what they want to accomplish, so. And I think, you know, as they get older, as people get older and you realize consequences for actions, then sometimes, you know, you're going to be more concerned about that.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. Do you think children can be easily led, either way? Whether it's – I mean for good or for bad, do you think children can be easily led and convinced to do things?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #025: It's - in some circumstances, yes. I mean I -

1	everybody is different. Everybody grows up in a different situation. Everybody has						
2	different values. I think that's just kind of a gray question.						
3	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Well, fair enough. If I'm asking a bad question, please						
4	feel free to tell me. You would not be the first. Okay. I would thank you very much						
5	for your time.						
6	Let's go to Ms. St. Clair. How are you?						
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Peachy.						
8	MS. ALLEN: Peachy. Day number two. You excited about this? Less						
9	excited?						
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Kind of mixed.						
11	MS. ALLEN: Less excited than you were yesterday?						
12	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: No, more excited today than yesterday.						
13	MS. ALLEN: Do you like the prospect of sitting on this jury?

22	cerned with regard to the charges in this case? Does that bother you?						
23	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I'm not sure how I can deal with it, if I can.						
24	But I'm willing to do it.						
25	MS. ALLEN: Okay. Are you saying that there's a possibility that emotionally						

1	you couldn't handle this or –							
2	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Might see some tears or something like that,							
3	you know, it –							
4	MS. ALLEN: Okay. That's fair enough. You have –							
5	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I love kids, you know it.							
6	MS. ALLEN: Pardon?							
7	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I love my kids and it's -							
8	MS. ALLEN: Right. Understandable. You actually – I think you said some-							
9	thing you've been working with CPS previously, is that right?							
10	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I had my nephew put in my care for six							
11	months.							
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So you've had some dealing with CPS is that right?							
13	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yes.							
14	MS. ALLEN: In your opinion do they generally do a good job?							
15	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: They do their best.							
16	MS. ALLEN: All right. Probably overworked?							
17	PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Very.							
18	MS. ALLEN: Okay. And a lot of cases, so – but you believe that they do thei							
19	best?

MS. ALLEN: Okay. Would you agree that sometimes the police department or police officer or CPS worker is only given a certain set of facts to work with? Maybe finding things out later, but they're given a certain set of facts to work with and they can make assumptions or decisions based upon those and it could be a mistake. You understand what I'm saying?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yeah.

MS. ALLEN: Would you agree with that?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: Yeah.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. What about this idea of judging children while they're testifying about some very difficult things to hear. Is that something that you feel you would be good at or that you could do?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I'm a little confused about the question.

MS. ALLEN: So you've heard the allegations. And so expecting that there could be children come in and talk about some very difficult subjects, are you the right person to sit in judgment of their truthfulness, what they're doing; how they're behaving on the stand, their demeanor?

PROSPECTIVE JUROR #014: I think I could do a pretty good job at that.

MS. ALLEN: Okay. And can you take what they're saying in conjunction with their demeanor and all of those other things and make a fair assessment or is it going to be what they're saying that would – do you think it would overpower you?
