	22	A. Nine years.
	23	Q. I'm going to put a couple of exhibits on
	24	this screen. Just ask that you look at them for me.
02:33	25	A. Okay.

02:33	1	Q. The first is going to be Grand Jury Exhibit
	2	Number 9. Is this your house?
	3	A. Yes, it is.
	4	Q. And that white vehicle out front, is that
02:34	5	your vehicle?
	6	A. Yes, it is.
	7	Q. Was that vehicle there on the morning hours
	8	of September the 4th?
	9	A. Yes, it was.
02:34	10	Q. Now you indicated that you, the noise that
	11	you heard was coming from your back patio; is that what
	12	you said?
	13	A. That's correct.
	14	Q. Showing you on the monitor Grand Jury
02:34	15	Exhibit Number 13. Is this your patio?
	16	A. Yes, it is.
	17	Q. And Grand Jury Exhibit Number 14, is this
	18	also your patio?
	19	A. Yes, it is.
02:34	20	Q. Now towards the bottom right hand of the
	21	photo it looks like there's some guns in that photo. Do
	22	you see that on the bottom right hand corner?
	23	A. It's an angle but I do see something laying
	24	on the ground.
02:35	25	Q. Do those belong to you?

02:35	1	A. No.
	2	Q. Were those there prior to the morning hours
	3	of September the 4th?
	4	A. No.
02:35	5	Q. And Grand Jury Exhibit Number 15, is this
	6	kind of the back part of your patio?
	7	A. Yes, it is.
	8	Q. And in this photo you see like a screen is
	9	damaged; is that correct?
02:35	10	A. Yes, ma'am.
	11	Q. Was that screen damaged prior to September
	12	the 4th?
	13	A. No.
	14	Q. Okay. So you indicated that you hear a
02:35	15	noise on your patio. What do you do at that point?
	16	A. I sat up in bed immediately and looked out
	17	my bedroom window which faces out towards the patio.
	18	Q. I'm going to show you what's been marked as
	19	Grand Jury Exhibit Number 25. Do you recognize this?

	21	Q. Is this a fair and accurate depiction of

Would your bedroom window be where kind of 4 Q. 02:36 in relation to this photo? 5 Directly opposite of the small window. 6 Α. That small window that you're seeing is my master 7 bathroom window and directly on the opposite side of 8 that building, the house, is my bedroom window. 9 Okay. 	12	is going to be Grand Jury Exhibit Number 19. The window
	13	that you looked out of, is that depicted in the photo?
	14	A. Yes. It is to the right of the clock that

Q. Can you tell me the general nature of the call that you were responding to?

And before you answer that, again for the record, it's being, I'm offering that not for the truth but to show what the sergeant did in relation to his investigation.

Go ahead.

A. As a K-9 handler and a K-9 sergeant I respond to most high priority calls in the valley. I was actually on a separate K-9 search when I was, I heard over the radio about an officer being shot and being down and injured. So I switched over channels, because I was on our Enterprise channel, I switched over to the Northwest channel to listen to the details knowing that, knowing that an officer has been shot, an officer is down, and I heard that the suspects weren't in custody. So generally, you know, our dogs are primarily a search tool, we use them for their nose and their capabilities. Knowing that this was possibly

going to turn into a K-9 search, I responded as well as 03:13 1 every K-9 officer that was on duty at that time. 2 3 When you arrived at the particular Q. location, and if you look on the screen, looking at 4 03:14 Grand Jury Exhibit Number 19, does this look familiar to 5 6 you? 7 Yes, it does. Α. Would this be the inside of that address we Q. 8 just talked about? 9 03:14 Yes, it does. It is the inside of the 10 Α. address. 11 12 When you arrived at the location did you Q. 13 have any information about someone who might be outside? 14 Our air unit stated there was a Α. Yes. 03:14 15 subject laying down in the backyard next to a long gun 16 but he couldn't identify it as being a shotgun or a rifle or whatever at that point. But he was laying down 17 behind some bushes. 18 19 And for the record, the statements of the Q. 03:14 air officer again are not being offered for the truth 20 but to show what this particular sergeant did once he 21 22 arrived at the house and to show what he was looking 23 for. So you got some information and what do you 24

decide to do once you get to the house?

- As I arrive, other K-9 officers arrive as 03:14 1 Α. After getting the first suspect into custody 7 we would have to then begin a yard to yard search due to the fact that an armed subject may be in somebody else's 8 9 backyard in this neighborhood and this subject already 03:15 showing the propensity for violence. 10
 - Q. At some point did you and your fellow officers come up with a plan of attack?
 - A. Yes. I have one K-9 officer, he had a ballistic to offer cover because we knew we were going up against, based on the information I was receiving on the radio, we were going up against a subject that was armed, also a glass sliding door or a glass back door that may or may not provide cover to us. So I had an officer with a shield to provide cover. He would also be verbal to try and make contact with the suspect we took into custody. I also had another K-9 officer that was my coverage for deadly force. He had his firearm and was able to cover me, cause I was our less lethal option, that being a police K-9. And then I had one more K-9 officer that was outside for containment if the

I was able to see that both of his hands 19 were clear, that he didn't have a firearm in his hands, 20 now it being safe for us as an arrest team to go up and 21 then take him into custody. As not to leave the dog on 22 for an excessive amount of time or anything like that. 23 So we immediately went up and as we came, I actually reached through this hole because as we exited there was 24 25 a, this shotgun that's up against the wall was between

the subject's legs, the barrel was facing out actually 03:21 towards us as our arrest time. So I reached down and I grabbed the shotgun from between his legs and moved it because I was concerned, because the subject was moving 03:21 still that it might discharge into us which is why I grabbed it and I moved it from him because his legs were flipping around as well.

When I leaned through this hole and I moved the shotgun, I looked down and I saw the action of an assault rifle directly where the subject would have been laying when my dog initially made contact with him. - Q. So we're talking, there was a shotgun between his legs and then there was a rifle close to where he was?
- A. Yeah, like right next to him. Because I was able to reach over through that and move the shotgun and I'm directly over where I can see the rifle and I'm reaching between basically where his legs are. So my estimate would be that he was laying on top of it prior to my dog making contact with him, but as my dog bit him he came out of the bush or out of the area that he

- Q. Okay. And you indicated that you see that the suspect isn't holding any weapons.

When I can see both of his hands with my dog, the one being bit, the other one where he comes up and he's grabbing at my dog.
- Q. And after you moving the shotgun do you and your team take the suspect into handcuffs?
- A. We do. I go up, I take physical control of my K-9 partner Loki, I give him the command to release, which he did, and there was already an officer that was on top of the subject and was handcuffing him.
- Q. I'm going to show you what's been marked as Grand Jury Exhibits Number 26 and 27. Do you recognize the person depicted in these photographs?
- A. Yes, that is the subject that we took into custody in the backyard that night.
- Q. Do you recall who that suspect was identified as?

03:23 1 I believe his last name's Hudson. Α. 2 And this was the person with the shotgun in Q. the backyard? 3 Α. 4 Correct. 03:23 And for the record I'm just publishing 5 Q. Grand Jury Exhibit Number 26 again. That would be 6 7 Mr. Hudson; is that correct? Yes, it is. 8 Α. Now after taking Mr. Hudson into custody, 9 Q. do you do any search with your dog or in the neighboring 03:23 10 11 areas? 12 Well, my team began a yard-to-yard Α. Yeah. 13 search as we were getting good information that there 14 was a second suspect involved that could still possibly armed that just shot into a house. In the initial call, 03:24 15 16 I could see from looking in my computer while I was responding, was a prowler call with somebody in the 17 18 backyard. My concern for public safety is somebody that 19 was just in, you know, for what I knew at the time, someone that was randomly in a backyard opened fire 03:24 20 21 through a door. 22 Let me stop you right there. - Q. And all this information about the number of shots fired and the weapons involved, was all of that information later confirmed by you after going through the actual scene of the house?

All right. Now showing you Grand Jury 6 Q. Exhibit Number 33. Do you recognize what's depicted in 7 this photo? 8 Α. Yes, this is the front window to the house. 9 This is the inside of the window. You would be looking 03:52 10 out and I'd be looking east. And that was the window 11 12 that was struck by gunfire as well. Could you tell for these particular impacts 13 Q. what type of weapon impacted this? 14

- This one was fired from the shotgun Α. Yes. and we know that because the shotgun was loaded with a bird shot round as opposed to a double-aught buck round.
 - Q. What does that mean in layman's terms?
- Sure. So there's three typical shotgun Α. rounds that would fire from a shotgun. There's a slug round which is just kind of a big circle and it fires out like a normal bullet. And then a double-aught buck round is a shotgun shell that has approximately eight or nine small pellets in it equal to approximately a 9-millimeter and when the shotgun's fired the nine

rounds will then spread out. A bird shot is just what 03:53 1 it's for, it's for hunting and shooting birds and 2 3 there's several very, very small pellets that are packed into this small bullet and when it's discharged from the 4 03:53 shotgun it spreads very, very quickly and creates a lot 5 of damage. And we were able to recover pellets that 6 7 were consistent with the bird shot from the shotgun from this part of the house. 8 9 Okay. Great. Thank you. Q. 03:53 Showing you Grand Jury Exhibit Number 35. 10 What are we looking at here? 11 12 This is a picture of the backyard and this Α. would be from the back door. This faces west into the 13 backyard so this is what the officers would have seen as 14 they opened the door. Well, I mean it was dark outside 03:54 15 16 so they wouldn't see that exactly but. 17 Was there any damage to any of the Q. property, specifically the chair in the middle, was 18 19 there any damage to that? 03:54 20 Yes, there was. There was a bullet impact Α. to the back of the metal handle of the chair. 21 22 Q. And I'll show you Grand Jury Exhibit 23 Is that a better view of that? Number 34. 24 Yes. Α. 25 And could you tell what type of impact that 03:54 Q.

damage came from? 03:54 1 2 Α. From which gun? 3 Q. Yes. Yes, that came from the AK-47, the SKS 4 Α. 03:54 rifle. 5 And how do you know that? 6 Q. 7 Well, we know that three shots were fired Α. from the rifle. We know that one shot was fired from 8 the shotgun through our investigation and we also know 03:54 that 12 rounds were fired from the officer's weapon. 10 were able to account for every single round that was 11 12 fired in this event. So just being able to piece it in the investigation we were able to determine that that 13 14 round was discharged from the assault rifle. 03:55 15 Okay. And Grand Jury Exhibit Number 37, Q. what are we looking at here? 16 This is a television. If you remember two 17 Α. pictures ago when you were looking outside and you saw 18 19 the chair sitting there, this is immediately to the left, so as soon as you walk out of the backyard it's 03:55 20 going to be on the left. This was a TV that they would, 21 22 the homeowners would use and sit in the backyard and 23 To the top of the television you can see watch TV. there's an impact and there's some damage as it moves 24 03:55 onto the left of your photograph there and that was 25

caused by the AK-47 as well. 03:55 1 How do you know that? Q. 2 3 Again just from piecing it together from Α. our investigation. We know that the three rounds from 4 03:56 the rifle were fired from the backyard. And the one 5 round from the shotgun, we know exactly where the one 6 7 round from the shotgun impacted. So we were able to piece together where all three of the rifle rounds 8 impacted. 9 03:56 10 Okay. Now you indicated that you knew that Q. three particular shots had been fired from the rifle. 11 Were there any casings found anywhere that helped you 12 13 determine that three shots were fired from the rifle? 14 Yes, there were three, they call them cart Α. casings or casings, but casing is a layman's term, but 03:56 15 yes, we found three of them in the backyard. 16 17 And did that give credence to the fact that Q. three shots had been fired? 18 19 Yes, ma'am. That with the three impacts, Α. 03:57 20 we were able to match that up. What makes you think one shot was fired 21 Q. 22 from the shotgun? 23 Because the shotgun was actually damaged and we were able to recover one shotgun round which you 24

guys saw into the window. During the exchange of

	3	to protect them from the west setting sun and as he
	4	falls through the screen there's, one of the officer's

	7	unable to manipulate the shotgun after that.
	8	Q. And the fact that you said one of the
	9	suspects fell through that area, was that confirmed by
03:57	10	observing the scene as well?
	11	A. Yes, that was one of the factors, yes.
	12	Q. And did you also have information from
	13	Sergeant Bitsko about where that suspect had been
	14	located?
03:58	15	A. Yes, we had information.
	16	Q. Okay. Now you said the officer also fired
	17	some rounds; is that correct?
	18	A. Yes, ma'am.
	19	Q. And who would that officer be?
03:58	20	A. Officer Grego-Smith.
	21	Q. I'm going to show you Grand Jury Exhibit
	22	Number 43. What are we looking at here?
	23	A. So you're looking east. This is the sun
	24	screen that I described to you. If you look in the top
03:58	25	right corner there's some duct tape there and we

03:58	1	actually had to use that duct tape to recreate that
	2	screen because it was damaged during the event. The
	3	green arrows that you see indicate impacts and there are
	4	12 impacts into the screen. And we know that Officer
03:58	5	Grego-Smith fired 12 rounds because we recovered 12 cart
	6	cases or casings from inside of the house from his
	7	position. And then we also did a count down of his
	8	weapon which revealed that he fired 12 rounds. So we're
	9	able to account for all 12 of his rounds.
03:59	10	Q. Did that also help you determine how many
	11	shots were fired from the other weapons involved?
	12	A. Yes, absolutely it does. And it also helps
	13	us in the placement of each person during the event.
	14	Q. Thank you. Now I'm going to show you
03:59	15	and you talked about this AK-47 or the SK rifle and then
	16	a shotgun and then another handgun.
	17	A. Yes, ma'am.
	18	Q. None of those belonged to Officer Smith;
	19	correct?
03:59	20	A. That's correct.
	21	Q. Were you actually able to locate those
	22	weapons?
	23	A. Yes, we were.
	24	Q. I'm going to show you Grand Jury Exhibit
03:59	25	Number 45. Are these two of the weapons that we're

referring to? 03:59 1 Yes. The one standing up is the shotgun 2 Α. 3 which we learned was placed there by Sergeant Bitsko when the subject was being taken into custody and the 4 one on the ground is the SKS assault rifle. 03:59 5 And showing you Grand Jury Exhibit 6 Q. 7 What are we looking at here? Number 46. That's the small frame semi-automatic 8 Α. handgun. It's a small Beretta .25 caliber. 9 04:00 10 And Grand Jury Exhibit Number 47, is that a Q. 11 closer up view of that weapon? Yes, it's a close up view of it. 12 Α. Grand Jury Exhibit Number 48, is that the 13 Q. shotgun we're talking about? 14 04:00 15 Α. Yes, it is. 16 Did you have a chance to actually look Q. inside of the shotgun? 17 18 Α. So we were, on the scene we were unable to 19 because again one of the officer's rounds went into the pump, and that's going to be on the right side of your 04:00 20 picture, on the bottom portion of the shotgun there's a 21 22 small black plastic area of the weapon and right in the 23 middle of it is where the round went in and it actually 24 bent the tube. The second tube on the bottom of the 04:00 25 shotgun actually houses the other rounds that you can

immediately put into the gun as you pump the shotgun. 04:00 1 2 That was bent a little bit from the round so it was rendered, it was disabled. We were unable to manipulate 3 it on the scene. So they had to take it back to the 4 04:01 The crime scene analysts immediately took it back 5 to the lab and were able to take the weapon apart and 6 pull the shotgun casing or shotgun hole out of the 7 barrel of the shotgun which is the one that was fired, 8 the bird shot. 9 04:01 10 That would be just one shot? Q. 11 Α. That's correct. 12 And finally Grand Jury Exhibit Number 49. Q. 13 Is this the rifle that we're referring to? Yes, that's the one. And each round when 14 Α. 04:01 15 we found it, every gun had, the small handgun had a 16 round in the chamber as well as more rounds in the 17 The shotgun had more rounds in the tube and magazine. the AK-47 or SKS rifle had one in the chamber, which 18 19 means it was in the barrel ready to be shot, as well as 04:01 20 more ammo in the magazine. Thank you. At some point did you issue a 21 Q. 22 or apply for a search warrant for this particular 23 residence? 24 Yes, I did. I applied for a search Α. 04:02 25 warrant.

04:02 And did you help execute that search 1 Q. warrant for the house? 2 Yes, I did. 3 Α. I forget if I asked you this or not, I'm 4 Q. 04:02 sorry. As part of the search warrant did you recover 5 those weapons that we just looked at? 6 7 Α. Yes. Q. Did you recover any casings belonging to 8 any of those weapons? 9 We recovered all of the casings belonging 04:02 10 Α. 11 to all four weapons that were used. Now I want to fast forward a little bit. 12 Q. 13 Later on in your investigation did you learn that a person by the name of Steven Turner had been arrested in 14 connection, in possible connection with this case? 04:02 15 16 Α. He had been detained, yes. And would that be by Officer Vance that we 17 Q. just saw leave? 18 I'm sorry, I'm not sure which officer took 19 Α. him into custody. Yes, one of the officers did on the 04:02 20 21 perimeter. 22 Now at some point did you learn whether Q. 23 Mr. Turner had any injuries to him or not? 24 Α. Yes, we did. We knew that almost 25 immediately. 04:03

	16	A. We learned that, originally we were told
	17	that his injury, we were told that he was bleeding from
	18	his left calf and we were told originally that that
	19	injury occurred while he was hopping a fence or hopping
04:03	20	a wall and that's how he cut his leg. We then very
	21	shortly after that learned from Mr. Turner that he had
	22	been shot.
	23	Q. Let me stop you right there.
	24	A. Sure.
04:04	25	Q. That was going to be my next question. Did

you later on in your investigation learn that Mr. Turner 04:04 1 had actually acknowledged that he had been shot in the 2 3 backyard of that house? Yes, we did. 4 Α. 04:04 And was that from a statement that he gave? 5 Q. 6 That's correct. Α. 7 And for the record for the Grand Jury, Q. those statements will be coming in through a different 8 officer who will be testifying shortly. 9 04:04 10 Were you able to investigate how Mr. Turner had been shot in the leg? 11 12 Α. So once we determined that Mr. Turner was suffering from a gunshot wound, he was transported 13 14 to the hospital where medical staff in the hospital confirmed that there was a small fragment that was in 04:04 15 16 his leg. So we had to determine then on the scene if it 17 was from Officer Grego-Smith's rounds or did that round come from somewhere else. 18 19 How did you determine that? Q. Well, we knew that Officer Grego-Smith, we 04:04 20 Α. knew all 12 of his rounds struck the sun screen that you 21 22 guys saw the picture of. So in order for a round to 23 strike a human being, or a shotgun for instance, the

person would have to be on the other side of that

screen. We know through our investigation that

Mr. Turner was never on the other side of the screen 04:05 1 when shots were fired. We were also able to determine 2 through the investigation that Officer Turner, or excuse 3 me, Mr. Turner, as the last round, potentially last 4 04:05 round was discharged into the chair, which you guys saw 5 6 the chair, the round goes into the chair -- would you 7 like me to explain that part? Q. 8 Sure. Go ahead. The round goes into the chair, it goes in 9 Α. 04:05 and immediately kind of comes back at him. And we know 10 this because, as you saw in the picture, there were some 11 12 arrows that were pointed into the cushions. We were able to take some of that cushion apart and we found 13 bullet fragments that are consistent with a 7.62 or a 14 round that's fired from an AK-47, an SKS. And we were 04:05 15 also able to determine that the round, and this is from 16 medical staff as well --17 18 I don't want you to tell me what medical Q. 19 But he had a shot to his leg? staff said. 04:06 20 Yes, and it was very small we knew. Α. And you accounted for all of Officer 21 Q. 22 Grego-Smith's bullets? That's correct. 23 Α. 24 So based on that, did you determine that Q.

Mr. Turner had actually not been shot by Officer Grego?

He changed 04:13 1 that a couple times as far as vehicles go, but yes, he 2 drove over there. 3 When he got to the house, what if anything 4 Q. 04:14 did Mr. Hudson say he did? 5 6 They were, or he was going to go to the Α. 7 front door to see if it was unlocked and then the front door was locked. 8 So what did he decide to do? 9 Q. 04:14 Going to jump over the wall on the left 10 Α. side of the house to try the back door to go in through 11 12 there. And did he say whether he actually did jump 13 Q. over that back wall? 14 04:14 15 Yes, he did, he told me that he jumped over Α. 16 the wall. Did he say anything about trying, how he 17 Q. 18 was trying to get in the house? 19 Well, first they were going to try, or he Α. 04:14 was going to try the door, and if that didn't work they 20 were going to break a window and go through a window. 21 22 Q. Did he actually try to get in the house? Did he acknowledge that? 23 24 That he tried the door, yes. Α. 04:15 25 Q. Did Mr. Hudson say whether or not he saw

anyone at home at the house? 04:15 1 2 He said he could see somebody like looking Α. 3 or peering through the door, the glass door or the window. 4 Did Mr. Hudson say anything about whether 04:15 5 Q. he had any weapons or not with him when he went to the 6 7 house? Mr. Hudson stated he was carrying a shotgun 8 Α. when he went over the wall into the backyard. 9 And I'm just going to ask you just straight 04:15 10 Q. DECLARATION

TEGAN C. MACHNICH makes the following declaration:

- 1. I am an attorney duly licensed to practice law in the State of Nevada; I am the Deputy Public Defender assigned to represent the Defendant in the instant matter, and I am familiar with the facts and circumstances of this case.
 - 2. Mr. Turner is currently being held on \$500,000 bail.
- 3. As a public defender client, Mr. Turner is considered indigent. He was employed at the time of his arrest, but has obviously been unable to work. The current bail setting is excessive given his financial means. Bail is not meant to be punitive.
- 4. Mr. Turner and his family have lived in Las Vegas over 12 years. Among other family members, his mother and fiancé both live locally. He would not be a flight risk given his strong ties to the community.
- 5. As of his booking on September 8, 2015, Mr. Turner had no felony, gross misdemeanor or misdemeanor convictions. He did have a Las Vegas Municipal Court hold for minor, mostly traffic, offenses. While not downplaying the seriousness of the current charges, Mr. Turner has no history of criminal or violent behavior.
- 6. If released, Mr. Turner could provide a local address to reside at with his family members.
- 7. If this Honorable Court has any concern over flight or safety to the community, Mr. Turner is willing to comply by the terms of House Arrest while this case is pending.
- 8. Therefore, based on the foregoing, Mr. Turner respectfully requests that his bail be reduced to \$100,000 total. This bail amount is still an extensive inducement to return to court and to remain compliant on house arrest.
 - I declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct. (NRS 53.045). EXECUTED this 3^{rd} day of November, 2015.

POINTS AND AUTHORITIES 1 2 Nevada Revised Statute 178.498 provides: 3 If the defendant is admitted to bail, the bail must be set at an amount which in the judgment of the magistrate 4 will reasonably ensure the appearance of the defendant and the safety of other persons and of the community, 5 having regard to: 1. The nature and circumstances of the offense 6 charged: 2. The financial ability of the defendant to give 7 3. The character of the defendant; and 8 4. The factors listed in NRS 178.4853. 9 Nevada Revised Statute 178.4853 also states that: 10 In deciding whether there is good cause to release a person without bail, the court as a minimum shall consider the 11 following factors concerning the person: 1. The length of his residence in the community; 12 2. The status and history of his employment; 3. His relationships with his spouse and children, 13 parents or other members of his family and with his close friends: 14 4. His reputation, character and mental condition; 5. His prior criminal record, including any record 15 of his appearing or failing to appear after release on bail or without bail; 6. The identity of responsible members of the com-16 munity who would vouch for the defendant's 17 reliability; 7. The nature of the offense with which he is charged, 18 the apparent probability of conviction and the likely sentence, insofar as these factors relate to the risk of 19 his not appearing; 8. The nature and seriousness of the danger to any per-20 son or the community that would be posed by the person's release; 21 9. The likelihood of more criminal activity by the person after he is released; and 22 10. Any other factors concerning his ties to the community or bearing on the risk that he may willfully fail to appear. 23 24 The State objects to Defendant an adjustment in Defendant's bail. Defendant's current 25 bail setting is appropriate considering the incredibly violent nature of the case, the danger to 26 the community Defendant poses, and the likelihood of a prison sentence should Defendant be convicted. 27

For the instant offense, on September 4, 2015, Defendant and a co-conspirator, armed with an array of firearms, to include an assault rifle, a shotgun, and a semi-automatic handgun, attempted to commit burglary of a residence in our Southern Nevada community. Thankfully, officers from the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department promptly responded to assist the homeowners. However, upon their arrival, officers were met with a barrage of gunfire. Specifically, Defendant fired an AK47 rifle and struck Officer Robertson. Defendant's assault shattered Officer Robertson's right femur. Defendant fired a total of 3 rounds from the AK47. Later, officers were able to take Defendant into custody. Officer Robertson was rushed to the hospital and survived.

Considering the factors in NRS 178.498, and specifically NRS 178.4853 in turn, this Honorable Court should not adjust Defendant's bail setting. First, the State is unsure how long Defendant has been in Nevada but submits regarding his representation in his motion. For the second factor, Defendant claims to have been employed but the State doubts the accuracy of that fact based on Defendant's involvement in a residential burglary which, presumably, was an attempt to steal items of value which Defendant would likely not have the need for if he were gainfully employed. The State cannot speak to the third factor in NRS 178.4853 but would argue any involvement Defendant's family has with him did not prevent him from committing the instant, extremely violent act. For the fourth factor, the State submits that the facts of this case demonstrate Defendant's character and mental condition and argues this factor does not weigh in favor of Defendant. Considering the fifth factor, while Defendant may not have an extensive criminal history, he does have at least one failure to appear.

For the sixth factor, the State submits that while one perhaps would like to have the present ability to vouch for Defendant's reliability, in the face of the instant set of facts, that person simply does not exist. For the seventh factor, Defendant shot an officer in the line of duty at a close range with an assault rifle. The facts are violent and Defendant acted in an extremely callous nature. The level of violence and harm could have been much more significant. The case is strong and the likelihood of conviction is great. Accordingly, the

1	State will be asking for prison upon conviction and submits that a term of incarceration is
2	likely. For the eighth and ninth factor, Defendant is a dangerous individual. He clearly has
3	access to an assortment of deadly weapons and does not hesitate to use them.
4	Weighing each factor, Defendant's bail setting is appropriate. Considering the
5	incredibly violent nature of the case, the danger to the community Defendant poses, and the
6	likelihood of a prison sentence, Defendant's motion should be denied.
