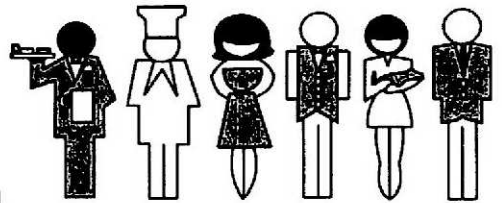

Dear Ms. Brown Honorable Justices of the Nevada Supreme Court:

We welcome the news that the Court anticipates entering an order adopting Temporary Residential Summary Eviction Mediation Rules as laid out in Exhibit A of the proceedings. This is an important step to ensure all tenants can access the resources they need to survive a pandemic and economic crisis, and we ask that the Court be open to supporting any necessary extensions when the mediation program sunsets on May 31, 2021.

As you heard from Culinary Union members Yanneth Romero, Laura Nguyen and Al Tate, before the pandemic workers like them had good jobs that provided for their families and some were expecting to buy homes. Now through no fault of their own, they face the agony of possible evictions that can traumatize and endanger entire families.

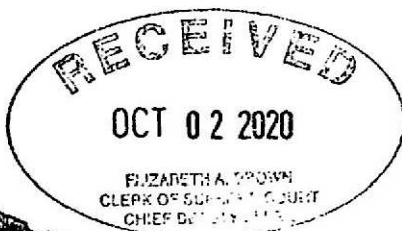
